WATERFORD COUNTY EXECUTIVE N.F.A.

ATTENTION ALL FARMERS!

A Regional Water Scheme costing £2,800,000 minimum has been passed by Waterford County Council at a recent meeting of that body. At a subsequent meeting the County Council stated they did not realise they had passed it saying they only approved of it in principle. Officials said it was passed, whereupon the Chairman proposed that it be rescinded. The Co. Manager asked that the rescinding motion be held over until such time as a sub-committee of the Co. Council meet a sub-committee

of the rural organisations to discuss the scheme. This meeting will take place on Thursday, 30th November, and the rural organisations represented will be N.F.A., Macra na Feirme, I.C.A. and Muintir na Tire. On Monday, 11th December, the County Council will meet again and will hear the results of this meeting. In order that the County Council may be in no doubt as to the attitude of all County Waterford farmers towards the Regional Water Scheme, the Waterford County

Executive of the N.F.A. are planning a Monster Meeting to be held in Dungarvan on the afternoon of Monday, 11th December and expect that every farmer and ratepayer who can do so will attend this meeting. N.F.A. has been taking the lead by giving the public the facts on this extravagant scheme. Watch this space next week for full particulars of the Monster meeting and for a full statement on the implications and cost to you of the Regional water scheme

PANEL DEALT WITH BEARDS, WATER, MARKET AND MAKE-UP

LISMORE IN THE LAST CENTURY The following feature we take from a daily paper under the heading of "Window on the Past" and we feel it might interest many of our readers. It was published along with a photo of Lismore bridge which in the photo is partially washed away.

On this day in 1853 the bridge at Lismore was partially washed away as is shown in the adjoining picture. The bridge had been built by the Duke of Devonshire in 1777 and stood firmly against floods and storms for three-quarters of a century. The floods in the fall of 1853, however, were greater than any in living memory. St. Patrick's Bridge, Cork, had been destroyed in the beginning of November. Malloy had also suffered severe flooding. Lismore further down the Blackwater had also felt the effects.

On November 17th the floods were four feet higher than had ever been known. During the afternoon of that day the water continued to rise and the smaller arches of the bridge were nearly closed. It was clear that the bridge was in danger and police tried to prevent people from crowding on the roadway of the bridge. They had great difficulty in controlling the crowd.

Shortly after five o'clock a cloud of dust was thrown up and water rushed through one arch had fallen. Immediately after an adjoining arch was swept away carrying with it one of the spectators, a woman. It happened so quickly that she was not missed until her body was found next day. The floods isolated the country on the north of the river as the bridge at Cappoquin could not be approached because of the water and the wooden bridge at Ballyduff had been swept away early in the day.

Yet despite the lop-sided appearance of the score-board at the end, the game always held interest, and the many fine individual displays added further to the pleasure of the fair-sized attendance. YOUGHAL CHRISTMAS SHOPPING SCHEME

The Tower Traders Association are embarking on a Christmas Shopping Scheme this year that will surpass all previous efforts. Two Christmas trees are to be erected on the north and south sides of the Clock Tower and will be brilliantly illuminated. The Association is again making an all out effort to bring a seasonal appearance to the town and to attract more business. Details of the prizes scheme will appear later.

NEW VOCATIONAL SCHOOL URGED FOR YOUGHAL

At a recent meeting of the Co. Cork Vocational Education Committee held in Cork, Mr. P. J. O'Gorman made a strong plea for the building of a new Vocational School at Youghal. Before the Committee was the architect's report on suitable sites for such a building. Mr. O'Gorman stated that two years ago they had received deputation from the Youghal Committee and the case made was favourably received. The present position was that the existing school was entirely inadequate for the number of students desiring to attend classes. This year 15 or 16 applications had to be refused. The present school had originally been an endowment school and had been taken over in 1929 and converted. Mr. O'Gorman further stated that there was a great demand for education in Youghal now one of the most highly industrialised towns in the county. Young people from the town and radius of 8 miles flock to the school. The sub-committee had inspected various places in the town and made its report. The Committee decided to pursue the matter further.

ESTIMATED HOUSING SCHEME FOR YOUGHAL

At a recent Council meeting the architect presented his estimate for the erection of 24 houses at Dunne's Park at a cost of almost £37,000 and it was unanimously agreed to make application for a loan for that amount. The Town Clerk stated that the Tallow Street site was now the property of the Council at a cost of £300 to be met out of revenue and it was the opinion that this site would accommodate ten houses. This site would have cheaper houses containing a living room, kitchenette, bedroom and toilet for a number of small families. In reply to a question the Manager stated that there is no firm engaged in the erection of pre-fabricated houses. A scheme outlined by the Town Manager (Mr. Regan) was adopted in respect of improvement of water scheme in the town from Moll Goggin's Corner to Claycave with a main, scrapping existing mains and a new 3" main from the Laundry to Quarry Road at a cost of £7,000, of which the Council would have to contribute 40%.

ARMORE SEWERAGE SCHEME

Work is now well advanced in this scheme. Great credit is due to the firm of contractors (Messrs. Barrett, Cork) and staff for the excellent progress made.

Wild Bird Protection Act

It is announced that the Government has made an Order transferring to the Minister for Lands functions under the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1930. The Order will come into effect on 27th November, 1961, from which date responsibility for implementing policy under that Act will pass to the Minister for Lands. Mr. Michael J. Flavin, from the Minister for Justice.

This transfer of functions, in relation to the protection of wild birds, is a logical step following the transfer of functions already executed in the complementary sector of game preservation. For the future, the administration of both the Game Preservation Act, 1930, and the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1930, will be unified within the Department of Lands.

UNEMPLOYED DEPUTATION PROTEST TO COUNCIL
The existing unemployment problems in Dungarvan at present was again forcibly brought to light on Friday night last when a seven man deputation - all unemployed - presented to members of the Urban Council at their monthly meeting.

Mr. Patrick (Mackey) Brennan, 14 Congress Villa, spokesman for the deputation, said there were approximately 70 unemployed men in the town at present. He asked if the housing scheme at Boreenstra had commenced and if so when would local men be employed on the scheme. They would like to see work at the site but the 70 men said there was no work for them.

Mr. Brennan went on to say that when they visited Boreenstra only three men were working on the site and one of them had been let go on Friday night.

Another member of the Deputation, Mr. James Brennan, said that he was very little hope of unemployed men getting work. When he inquired about a job at the site he was told that there would be no work for them.

"Cards were stacked against us" Ballyduff Get Six Months

Meeting Told of Alleged Betting Incident

The failure of Ballyduff Lr. to field out against Emmetts in the recent County junior football final had dramatic consequences on Tuesday night when the specially convened meeting of the County Board imposed a six months suspension on the players and officers of the club.

On the presumption that the Board would award the game to Emmetts, Ballyduff lodged an objection against such, but the Chairman, Mr. P. O. Fainin, ruled it out on all points.

The referee, Mr. L. (Billy) McGrath, Dungarvan, in his report, said he travelled to Waterford on the instruction to referee the junior football final between Emmetts and Ballyduff. He was told on arrival at the field by Mr. S. Grant, Secretary of the Eastern Board, that Ballyduff were refusing to play under him. Emmetts took the field at 3.13 p.m. and he gave Ballyduff until 3.45 to come out. When they failed to do so he threw in the ball to the Emmetts players and then blew the full time whistle.

Mr. S. Grant, Sec. Eastern Board, said there was no compromise from the Ballyduff side about a referee as there was no sign that they would play under Mr. McGrath. He left the field to get tickets as he knew there would be trouble. When he came back on Sunday their prospects of another meeting with the Ballymac men would be very bright.

Mr. Fanning said the facts stated by the referee couldn't be disputed. He had no option but to award the game to Emmetts who were prepared to play it. He formally moved that they be given the game on the referee's report.

Mr. J. Moloney seconded. The proposal was carried by a clear majority.

BALLYDUFF'S OBJECTION

The Board then proceeded to deal with Ballyduff's objection to Emmetts being awarded the game. The points of the objection were: (1) That they (Ballyduff) did not get the prescribed period of notice of the fixture; (2) That the notice received did not comply with the rule; (3) That they did not receive ten days' notice of the game; (4) That the referee violated Rule 102 dealing with betting; (5) That the referee knowing that he had violated the rule should not be allowed to referee the game.

Mr. Eamonn Cheasty (Ballyduff) replying to point 1 of the objection said a team must get 10 days' notice of a match, and they did not get that notice. It had been held in this county that 10 days was the period.

Mr. Fanning—Did you ever receive less than 10 days' notice before and still fulfil a fixture. The Ballyduff delegate tells us what is supposed to be accepted as regards prescribed notice. The junior hurling final was fixed when the notice was given. The notice was given to the field ready to go off. Surely that is a sign they got sufficient notice.

Mr. P. O'Sullivan (Ballyduff) said this year's junior hurling final was originally timed for 4.30 but they got 3 days' notice of the change of time to 3 p.m. There is a minimum of 4 days for Prescribed Notice.

Mr. Fanning—Are you setting for 4 days now instead of 10.

Mr. O'Sullivan—We are setting.

Dealing with the officers of the club, Mr. Fanning said they (officers) had a duty to see the people under their control were subject to discipline. Ballyduff's Secretary had aggravated the situation and their Chairman (Mr. O'Sullivan) established to-night that he was a party to the action, and the Board could not take such a policy lightly. As Chairman of the Board he would put it to the members that at least a 12-month suspension be imposed on the Chairman and Secretary of the club.

The Co. Chairman has given you a lovely glossy picture of it all. The cards were clearly stacked against us.

Mr. J. Moloney (Chairman, Western Board)—I didn't care who won the match. It had no worries for me, provided the game was played as it should be played. I had no axe to grind with Ballyduff and if they think so then I think less of them now than I did before. Let no one think we're stacking the cards against them. I for one don't do it.

Mr. S. O'Brien (Secretary, Western Board)—The reference to the referee is disgusting and is only a cheap way of defending their arguments. The defending their arguments. Their very efforts to defend themselves have brought the Association into disrepute.
