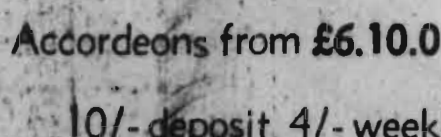

LOCAL HAPPENINGS

CALF REARING AND PIG MANAGEMENT LECTURES
Lectures under the R.D.S. extension scheme, arranged by the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee, for the winter season will include two lectures by Mr. Simona Curran, M.Agr.Sc., one at Ballinacorney and one at Dunhill, when the subjects dealt with will be the nutrition and management of bacon pigs and the modern developments in calf rearing.

FASHION, DOMESTICITY & STATE AID
Does the modern Irish girl prefer fashion to domestic responsibility? This is a subject that will be debated when Dungarvan meet Kilmathomas in the county debating competition organised by the Co. Executive of Macra na Feirme.

OF THE YEAR COMPETITION.
A member of the Ballinacorney branch Macra na Feirme, of which she is the secretary, she was also narrowly beaten in last year's final.

SUCCESS OF THE GUN CLUB
Now in full swing is the Dungarvan Gun Club and a game of restocking was held on Saturday. There existed then only the scattered remnants of a pheasant stock and nothing was to be found on a few farms and in the open woods, due to the fact that only inter-breeding had taken place down the years.

THEIR FIRST DRIVE WAS MADE
for the 1960 season and they spent sixty pounds on the very best stock of birds and eggs obtainable for restocking. In addition and with the organised co-operation of farmers and enthusiasts, Sunday outings were arranged in an effort to eliminate vermin. Year by year since they have played their part in this work. They arranged their sanctuary and respected it. After the passing of the first two seasons came the reward for the formation of the club. Having sown their seed there were fine clutches of birds to be found all over the area and outside it.

CLUB SECRETARY, MR. P. J. GORDON
has kept to rearing birds each year since, as have others. They have spent hundreds of pounds subscribed entirely by the members on restocking and conserving game. They have a pretty good game terrain and are mindful of that. The rules of the club specifically state that membership is confined to residents of the club area.

ORGANISING DRIVE
At the meeting of the Waterford County Executive of Macra na Feirme in Dungarvan, it was decided that the executive would sponsor all national competitions in the county during the winter months and progress was reported on the national debating competition.

AN ALL-OUT ORGANISING DRIVE
was planned, each branch agreeing to endeavour to increase its membership, and it is also expected that a number of new branches will be formed in the near future.

AS PART OF THE CAMPAIGN
each established branch and each new branch will be visited before the end of the winter season.

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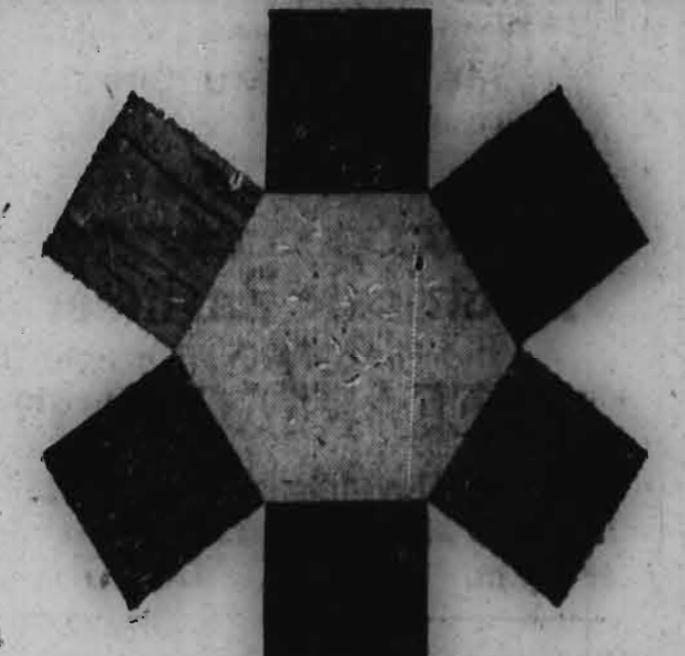

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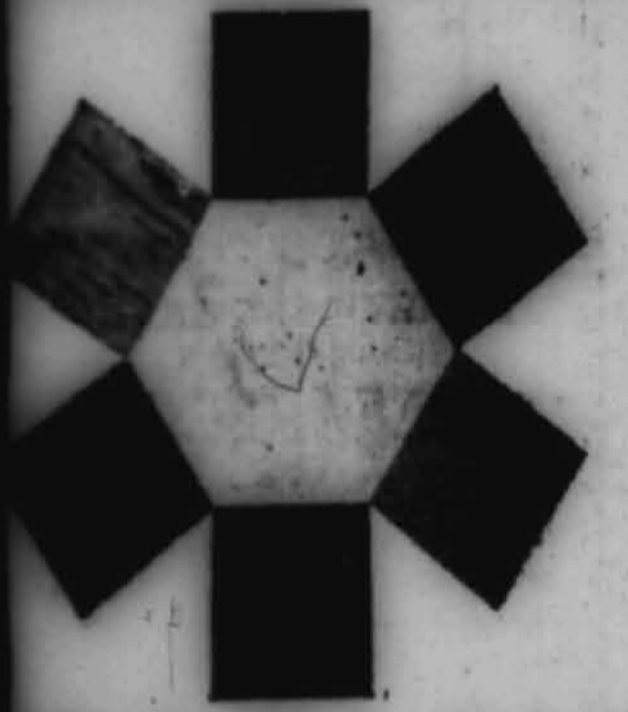

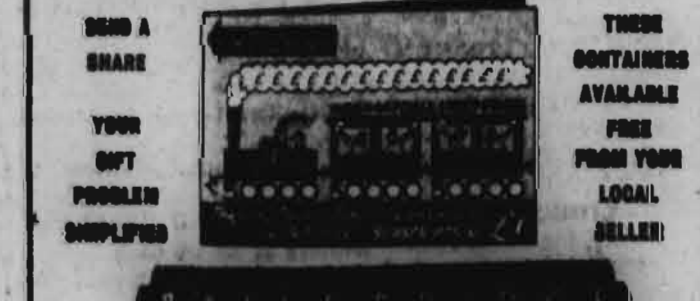

HOW TWENTY CLARE FAMILIES DID IT THEMSELVES

Piped water on a community basis

"Water on tap," a farmer sitting at home two years ago, jolting a letter to the County Council asking them to provide his area with a roadside hand pump, would have told you it was a far-fetched, impossible idea. Yet within a year of writing that letter it was an accomplished fact for himself and sixteen of his neighbours.

The idea of getting piped water on tap in the Crussa area near Newmarket-on-Fergus, Co. Clare, first came to John Casey, the farmer concerned, when the County Council replying to his letter told him that the provision of a

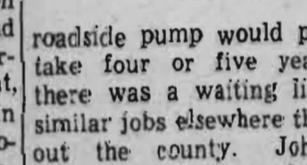
roadside pump would possibly take four or five years, as there was a waiting list for similar jobs elsewhere throughout the county. John—not satisfied to wait this length of time—then wrote to the Department of Local Government who replied and suggested a group scheme as an alternative. The Department sent down an inspector to survey the area to see if such a scheme was practical. He reported favourably and drew up the plans for the scheme after the water divines had located in sufficient quantity only 200 yards from a suitable reservoir site. With these points cleared it was agreed to push ahead.

The plan drawn up by the Department inspector divided the houses that wanted water into groups of one or two. The 15 houses were to be supplied with water from a reservoir to which it would be pumped by electricity from a deep well.

The other two would have their own pressure pump and a separate shallow well as they were too far away and pressure would be a problem if they were to be supplied from the reservoir.

The first thing needed was money and this was obtained by way of a loan from a bank with seven of the farmers going security for it. With money available to start work, the local committee which consisted of one person from each household, appointed a working committee of four: Chairman, J. Flannery; Secretary, Daniel Liddy, N.T.; Treasurer, Tom Hartigan, and Walter Fahy, to deal with day to day administration problems.

The first work, boring the two wells started in February of last year, and water in sufficient quantity was struck at a depth of 87 feet in one well and at 20 feet in the outlying well. With the wells output

than for credit. Over 2 miles of trench was laid to contain the piping, some of it hard going through rocky ground. The main piping was 2" in diameter with 1" tees off it to each house. As the trenches were opened, the pipes were jointed—a simple operation—on the bank, ready to be laid.

"It was a community effort. The community worked voluntarily and with enthusiasm and the work went speedily ahead. For example, four aged people had the work done for them without question of cost. Farmer Tim Hannon already had piped water in his house, but agreed willingly to have the pump sunk and the reservoir erected on his land. He now has stock watering troughs on his land connected to the scheme. Walter Fahy, who lives six miles away had the supply laid on to an uncultivated farm on one of his out-farms to demonstrate his enthusiasm and support for anything progressive. Meanwhile a 10,000 gallon prefabricated tank was erected on a 176 ft. high hill and the deep well pump was installed by the E.S.B. This pump fills the tank and the water is fed by gravity to the taps from the tank. The plumbing work, that is, connection of the taps in the kitchens and the installation of the sinks and wastes completed the job.

Now each of these households in the Crussa area can boast of piped water on tap for the home and farm. It took many hours of hard work to see the scheme finished, but this voluntary effort saved, according to Chairman, J. Flannery, an estimated four or five thousand pounds. The overall cost of the scheme was between £1,400 and £1,500 without taking into account the voluntary labour. Each of the 17 householders qualified for £50 Local Government Grant

and the 250 County Council Grant.

The entire cost of running the scheme has been worked out at 5/6d. for farmers and 3/3d. for the six cottiers every two months. This sum, which is added to their electricity bills, includes the cost of the maintenance and any repair of the pumps and the electrical and which may arise.

Near Crusheen village on the other side of Newmarket-on-Fergus, a farmer and two cottiers, Joe Fogarty, Patrick Barry and James McNamara, organised their own group scheme and now have water on tap in their homes pumped from an existing road side well. The well, a County Council one, had a hand pump which they removed and replaced with an electric pump. Water can still be drawn from the roadside by means of a great type tap. Joe Fogarty, who is further away from the pump has the water laid 400 yds. across the fields to his farmhouse and has already embarked on the second stage of his water development scheme—building a kitchen, bathroom and septic tank. Later he intends extending the water supply to drinking bowls in the new cowhouse he proposes to build.

The supply is already out to the cattle troughs in his fields and with it the time wasting job of drawing the water for the stock has disappeared for ever.

These people in Crussa and Crusheen can look back at the old days without water on tap and wonder how they managed. Others are looking forward. At Crusheen village, an indeed in many centres throughout the country, meetings are being held to organise another group scheme, this one to embrace the 35 households in the village. A similar scheme to Crussa is mooted with a reservoir on a wooded hillside overlooking the village.

The success of these schemes is really more than the provision of water on tap for 20 families. It is evidence that the community spirit which is responsible for the co-operative housebuilding in nearby Newmarket-on-Fergus in the 1870's is still alive and flourishing in Ireland.

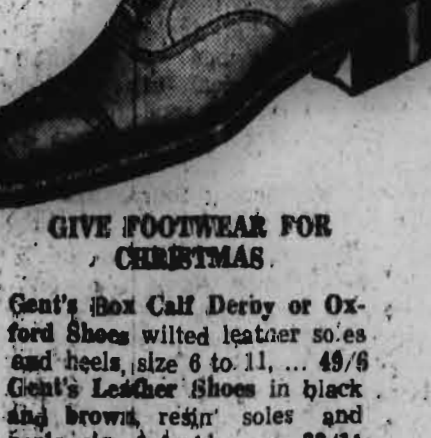

LAST SUNDAY'S CONVENTION

The 1961 Western Convention at Liscroon on Sunday last will surely go down on record as one of the quietest in history. True, clubs moving motions put their cases well but over-all the interesting debates and business that have been so customary at these annual functions were never in evidence on Sunday. The original number of motions—7, was reduced to the bare half-dozen and the business of the Convention was dealt with in near record time.

The election of officers caused the greatest stir of the day—and the biggest surprise. Two of the three outgoing representatives to the County

Board—Mickey Tobin and Donald Whelan were defeated and replaced by Michael Culloo, Ballinamesel, and John Coffey, Fournilweaver. Of the thirteen original nominations, three were withdrawn reducing the field to ten.

Incidentally, gate receipts for the year were down, but the Board showed a credit balance of £602.10 for their year's work.

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR
