

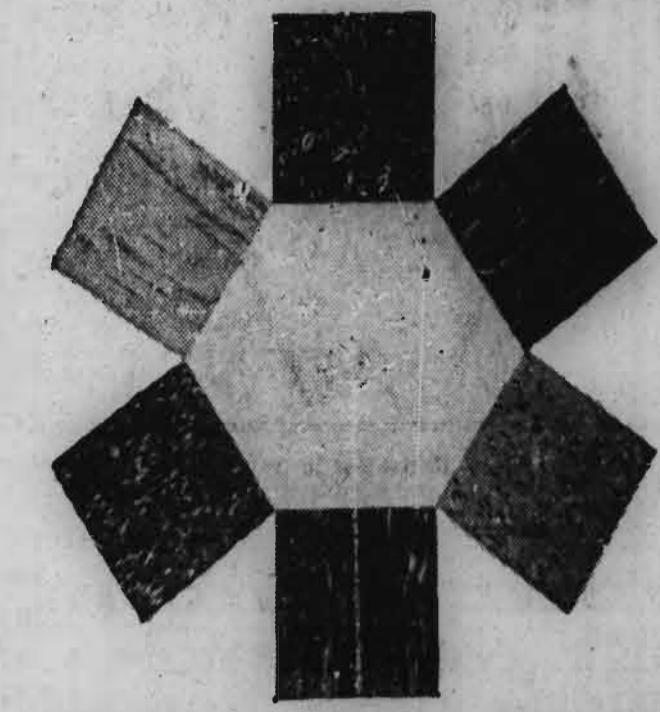

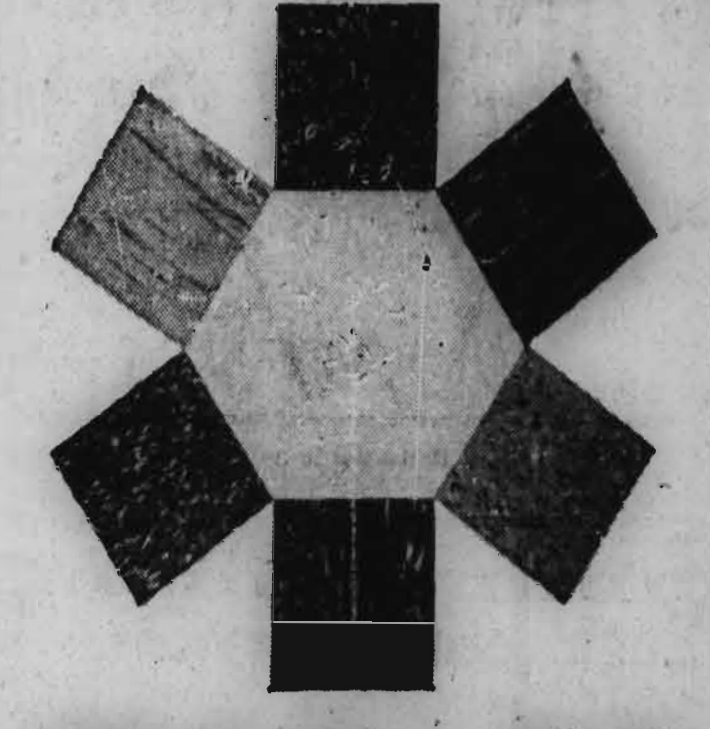

THEY ARE TRAINED FOR WORK

The Rehabilitation Institution is a voluntary organisation, stated Mr. P. Cahill, of the headquarters staff, Dublin. It was formed ten years ago for the purpose of training disabled people for employment...

NEW HOPE

In the very near future, he said, a centre for women will open in Longford for training in all branches of domestic science and poultry-keeping. Many of these people had come to the Rehabilitation Centre from hospitals or institutions which they had scarcely dared even to hope that they would be able to leave one day...

NO RED TAPE

Continuing Mr. Cahill said that the centre is a purely voluntary body, non-political and non-sectarian. They raised their own funds and were not hampered by red-tape. He instanced the case of a man of eighteen, deaf from a form of meningitis tuberculosis, whose lip-reading ability was nil, whom the rehabilitation institution had first tutored in affected lip-reading, and he is today, although stone-deaf, a business machines demonstrator with a leading Irish firm.

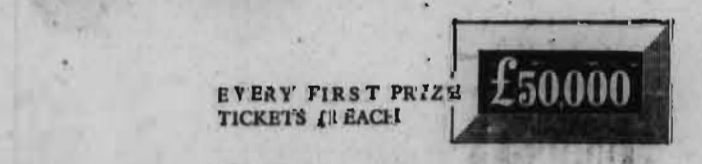

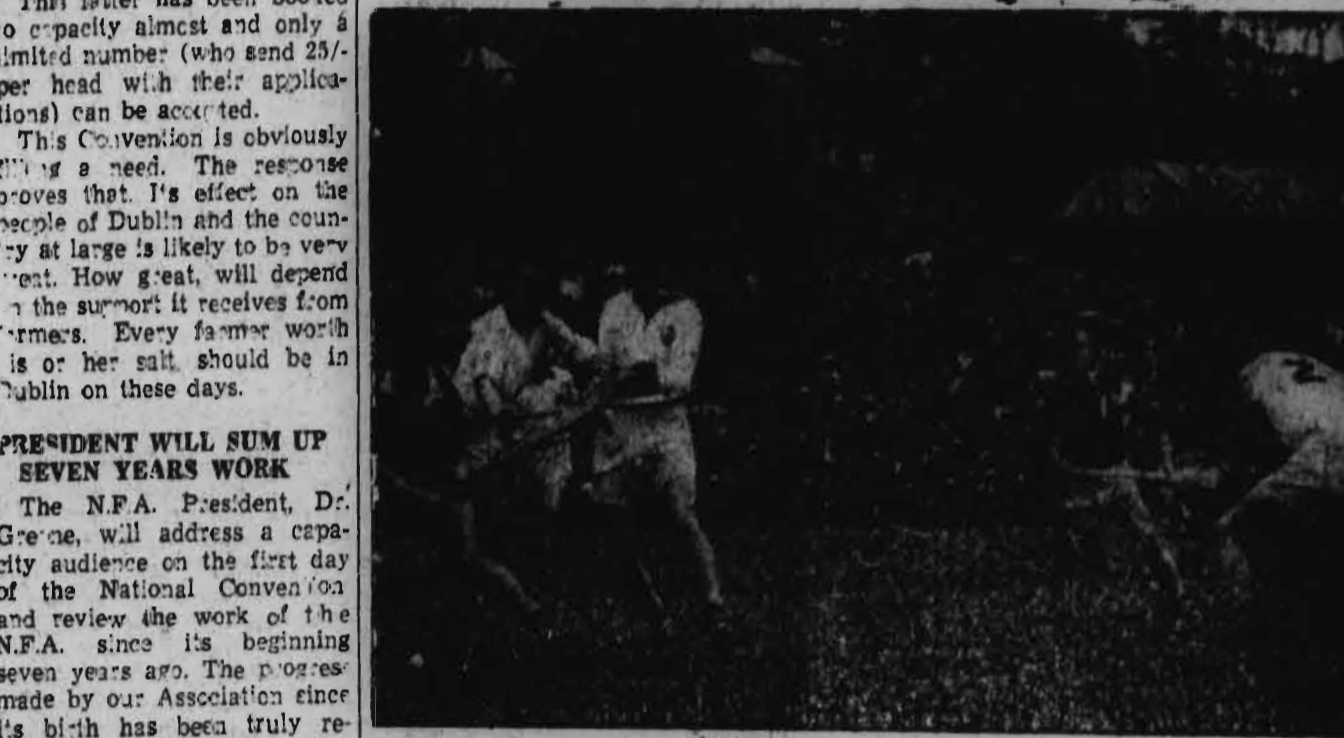

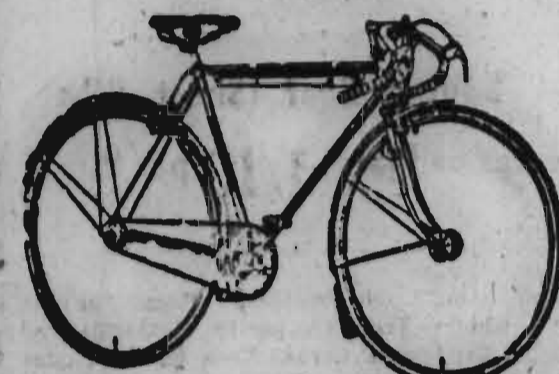

Also present was our old friend Johnny Ryan (then a mere youth, Tommy'Brien, Pat Hackey, Joe Gass, Pats Keane, Leamybrien and the o'Kilrossanty football star Maurice Hurley. After a spirited contest, in which no quarter was asked or given, Pad Landon asked the following question: How many children aged seven months and a foot-night died in the City of Jerusalem in the year 1857.

To which Pad Finn retaliated by asking where was the birthplace, burial place and also the religion of the grand-parents of the oldest woman in Tipperary. Stokes was in ecstasies and he asked the "Resper" would he think Solomon himself could answer the questions and the Resper thought he would give him a bit of a headache. That ended the debate with honours even. Pad Landon upholding Stradbally's reputation and Pad Finn the honour and renown of Kilrossanty.

**They are Learning a Third Language**

Dungarvan Urban Council Town Clerk, Mr. John J. Howlett, who resides in Helwick, started a new language drive recently, and this time the language turned out to be French.

With Ireland's participation in the European Common Market imminent, and with the tempo of travel abroad during summer vacation increasing greatly among Irish people during the past few years' knowledge of a continental language or two is of considerable assistance.

**ENTHUSIASTIC RESPONSE**

Last summer Mr. Howlett and a group of local enthusiasts met to discuss the formation of a group interested in the acquisition of a foreign language. The response to the circular letter issued by them was encouraging—with the majority in favour of receiving instruction in French.

Following an approach to the County Vocational Education committee, a French class was formed at Dungarvan Technical School and the record number of forty-seven adults enrolled for the course at a fee of £2 each.

**CAPPOQUIN TEACHER**

Mrs. Monica Walsh, B.A. H.Dip. Ed., Springfield, Cappoquin, who graduated with honours in French from University College, Cork, and who taught French and Art in secondary schools for a number of years prior to her marriage, was appointed to teach the Dungarvan classes.

**NATIVE SPEAKERS**

Meeting for a two hours period twice weekly the group will have no difficulty in acquiring the correct French pronunciation and bias, as in addition to their teacher, who speaks fluent idiomatic French and has spent some time living in France, they have the added assistance of speech records made by native French speakers which are played over an amplification system during each class. Illustrated text-books geared to the broadcast lessons enable the pupils to learn quickly by visual and aural means.

**EMERGENCY AID**

Interested in the Dungarvan project and willing to encourage and help is the Cultural Service section of the French Embassy in Dublin, which is glad to supply films, film strips and text's dealing with France and French affairs generally, so that students may imbibe French culture, history and tradition.

**ICI ON PARLE FRANCAISE**

This "French without Tears" method being used in Dungarvan will enable many from town and district who are already planning a summer holiday trip to Lourdes and to the popular cities and resorts of France to obtain greater enjoyment and satisfaction from their visit by enabling them to get in touch with the French man-in-the-street in the vernacular.

**Deputy Davern in The Dail**

In the Dail recently, Mr. M. J. Davern asked the Minister for Finance the cause of the delay in carrying out reconstruction works on the Convent of Mercy School, Cappoquin.

The Minister stated this is one of a large number of schools with the Office of Public Works for the execution of improvement works. It has now been reached in order of priority, and the preparation of the working drawings with a view to the invitation of tenders is in hands.

**Questions in the Dail**

**WATERFORD CHIPBOARD FACTORY**

Mr. Davern asked the Minister for Industry and Commerce in the Dail why the grant for the erection of a chipboard factory at Lismore Co. Waterford was refused in view of the fact that the directors of this factory were extremely anxious that the project should be established at Lismore, whether by or the Industrial Development Authority gave any direction that this factory was to be established in Waterford City; And also, why and if in view of the high number of unemployed and the abnormal number of emigrants from Lismore he will give the reason why Lismore was not selected.

Mr. J. Lynch (Minister for Industry and Commerce) — Applications for grants under the Industrial Grants Act are dealt with by An Foras Tionscal which is an autonomous body. I understand from An Foras Tionscal that there was not a refusal of an application for a grant for the erection of a chipboard factory at Lismore. The selection of a location for an industry towards which a grant is sought is entirely a matter for the promoters of the industry. No direction was given by me or by the Industrial Development Authority or by An Foras Tionscal that the chipboard factory should be established in Waterford.

Mr. T. Lynch—Did I understand the Minister to say that no direction was given by him that the chipboard factory should be established in Waterford City?

Mr. J. Lynch—Exactly.

Mr. T. Lynch—Is it a fact that the chipboard factory was established in Waterford City because it was the best place?

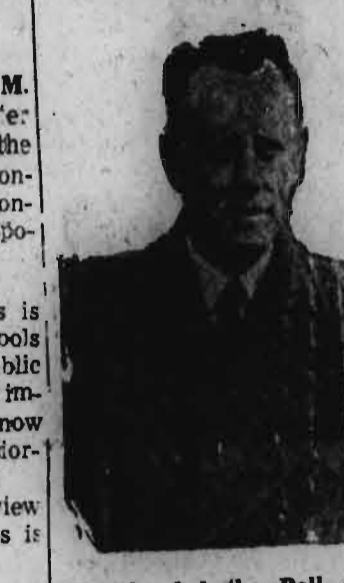
Mr. J. Lynch—I have no idea. It was the place decided on by the promoters.

# Gaelic REVIEW OF '61

WITH the year slowly slipping to its end and 1962 just around the corner, it is appropriate for a saunter down memory lane, and review briefly the highlights of the year. Was '61 a successful Gaelic year for Waterford? At club level there was a marked improvement on

former years - Mount Sion's retention of their long won hurling crown, their recording of the big championship double, Kilgobinet's first-ever win in a county final and pulsating minor hurling and football finals... all punctuate memorable landmarks over the year.

On the inter-county fields, however, the Daise county was not laden with any great success and championship and final defeats gave no cause for elation. The year's start at the beginning and the first of the county's foremost hurlers, the senior hurlers, had been a disappointment for them, and to doubt the eyes of all scrutineers from carefully as the '61 league campaign got under way.

**SENIOR HURLERS**  
But showing no ill-effects from a heavy championship defeat, they played an unbeaten league trail into the new year. At the concluding stages of that lengthy campaign, Waterford continued to flourish. Their senior hurlers duly qualified for their second league final.

From the outset, group specialists and champions Tipperary, and Roscommon, played served up a series of exciting hurling thrills. Remember the game? At twenty minutes play Tipperary were unmistakably leading the side and led 4-3 to 0-2 at the interval were still 6-2 to the good.

The substitutes were Waterford in the half-way if any would have guessed that the Tipperary side had the entire Tipperary fifteen scurrying like frightened children back into the goalmouth.

Waterford's attack was cut until two minutes from time only three goals remained the sides. But the winners grimly held out and eventually happily took their tenth league title by 6-6 to 2-1.

Despite defeat, Waterford's attack was, when championship time came around, was the hottest of hurling. The really hot matches. And although the Tipperary side failed to upset Waterford's predictions, Waterford were far less impressive in victory than when losing to Tipperary. At that time I thought "This team certainly would not beat Cork" and subsequent events unfortunately proved me right.

Against the Leaguers it was a different story. Fifteen that played on Thurday fanned the half an hour there was a bit of a tussle between the sides. The Cork selectors, naturally, picked "Rinsey" for the championship. There was no holding them. "Rinsey" played to his rings around the goalmouth and was the same as a lion in his skin. He led the side to a 1-1 victory.

The championship hopes faded. Waterford's future looked bleak and uncertain. The opening game of the cup-tie league campaign against Tipperary was decided with no time for celebration. But unexpectedly Waterford sealed the hurling title and swarmed the Limerick men in the late decisive manner bossie Jimmy Cullen at Dr. Cullen Park. They received an unexpected score before finally wrapping up victory by 4-7 to 0-2.

As to how ended the year in the hurling, it was a bit of a surprise. The hurling league observed the trend, particularly against Waterford and Cork, but should their hurling be hampered by the same splendour as against Limerick, they can deliver any disillusioned spectators.

**SENIOR HURLERS**  
One of the real discouraging aspects of the year must have been the continued decline in the ranks of the county's senior hurling selection. The opinion by vanquishing more Waterford hurlers by Limerick in the first round of the championship, and the fact that Cork annihilated Waterford in their turn were not helped by Tipperary, and Roscommon came along and the Tipperary boys. Surely they have been clearly Waterford's greatest opponents in the past few years past the county has failed to make any impression in this grade, and the future is looking bright.

The newly established inter-county grade for the stronger hurling teams, Tipperary being the first provincial champions, but not before they showed off a strong Waterford challenge in the second round.

**FOOTBALL ON THE DECLINE?**  
The county's fortunes in football during the year could

hardly have been less rewarding. Having failed to secure any honours in the National League, the seniors slumped even lower than wildest expectations when crashing heavily to Tipperary in the championship at Dun-carvan. That display must rank with the poorest ever by a Waterford football side and drew justifiably adverse comment from all quarters.

But just like the hurlers, one never really knows what to expect from them. With gloom and despondency prevailing they set out on their league programme. But whilst many felt they were merely fulfilling their obligations, they brushed aside the challenges of Kilmanny, Tipperary and Clare and now, with only a home game against Limerick outstanding, look near certain to win sectional honours for the second time.

The juniors had the misfortune to run into a crack Kerry team in the first round of the Munster championship and proved no match for Kingston, who went on to capture Provincial honours in the easiest fashion.

To the minor footballers go the greatest share of the year's honours. This year's side was easily the best to represent the county for quite some time and though beaten by Cork in Fermoy in the Munster semi-final they were far from disgraced. In fact the seven points that Cork had to spare at the end flattered them, as the Waterford forwards missed numerous scoring chances during the hour. The very fact that Cork went on to capture All-Ireland honours is in itself a tribute to the calibre of Waterford's team.

**CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS**  
From this review it can be seen that the inter-county success was few and far between. But the thrilling games witnessed in many club encounters during the year proved no small compensation. At last Mount Sion seem to be faced with serious challenges for their hurling crown. Fourteen ambitious clubs set out in quest of glory in this year's championship but right along the line (providing for lack of the draw kept them alert) everything pointed to yet another Mount Sion Eoin's Own final. Luckily these great rivals avoided each other in every round and held their meeting in the county final drew a record attendance of 16,000.

And they were not disappointed. The hurling may not have been superb, but the tension and ever-changing fortunes of the sides earned the same 'heat' as Eoin's Own obviously meant to make their year and in the final analysis only a matter of inches decided them from glory.

Records from time with the side level, Eoin's Own were awarded a 21-vents free but the usually steady Joe Condon drove the ball just wide and so to the replay. This time the champions made their only mistake and only twice during the hour were they headed. All too obviously, Eoin's Own had mixed their chance and so the champions made it a record-equalling "nine in a row".

**SURPRISES**  
The senior football championship was just one trek of surprises from start to finish. Who, honestly speaking, could have forecast a Mount Sion Eoin's Own early in the year? But here unflinching courage overcame all the odds and defied popular opinion by vanquishing more Waterford footballers.

Some particular made a complete mockery of the form book. In the opening round they were opposed to the championship favourites, Brickey Rangers, and after playing like a beaten team for three quarters of an hour, played like men inspired in the closing stages to steal a real march on the Brickeys.

Again in the semi-final they were generally regarded as outsiders against an Ardmore side that made a tremendous impact in their first year in senior ranks. But like the old dog for the hard road, the City team proved too experienced and seldom looked like losing. Stradbally likewise opened many eyes in their march to the decider. Without being over-incredibly, in early rounds against group sides, the Reds causing the sensation of the year when they dethroned the champions, Kilrossanty, in

a game that will be recalled more for its ruggedness than for good football. The final itself, however, was very disappointing. The Reds started brilliantly and threatened to completely overrun Mount Sion. But they only flattered to deceive and the City men had the cherished double achieved ever before referee Billy Daniels blew the full-time whistle.

**JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS**  
"Try and try again, and you'll succeed at last." That must have been the slogan of the Chesay-led Ballyduff Leaside this year. Beaten in the last two finals, they again reached the final and this time made no mistake by beating Fourmilewater.

The Ballyduff men, however, cannot be too far away from highest junior honour. They swept all before them in the West and certainly gave the Ballyduff men more than enough trouble in the county final. The least said about the junior football championship the better. Enniscorthy proved themselves the pick of the West-bearing teams like Ring and Valley Rovers in a triumphant run. Ballyduff put themselves in line for the Junior double by annexing Eastern honours but that the unimpressive conclusion to the whole affair left us without a county final in the grade.
