The County Committee have decided to offer Nominations to Farmers' Mares to be served by Thoroughbred, Irish or Half-bred Stallions on the Register of the Department of Agriculture under the conditions set forth in the Department's Scheme for encouraging improvement in the Breeds of Horses, 1962.

Dungarvan - At Shandon, on Tuesday, 6th February, at 11 a.m.

Youghal No. 2 - At Clachmore, on Tuesday, 6th Feb., at 2.30 p.m.

Clonmel No. 2 - At Ballymacarby, on Wednesday, 7th Feb., at 11 a.m.

Lismore - At Lismore Show Field, on Wednesday, 7th Feb., at 12.30 p.m.

The value of the Nominations shall be as follows: - Thoroughbred Stallions, £5; Irish Draught Stallions, £4; Half-bred Stallions, £3.

Preference will be given to the best young mares under six years of age.

An Entry Form shall not be accepted in respect of any mare which, having received a Nomination in 1960 and 1961, proved in both seasons to be barren, nor shall such a mare be eligible for exhibition for nomination purposes in any future year unless the owner produces satisfactory evidence that the mare has become fruitful.

As far as possible, two-thirds of the nominations shall be reserved for Farmers of £50 Valuation or under. There is no upper limit in the valuation to draw an entry. The term "Farmer" is to be understood to mean a person who derives his means of living mainly from farming.

Special attention is directed to the following regulations: -

1. Only such farmers as are rated for holdings within the county are eligible for the exhibition of mares. (N.B. This regulation does not apply to herds).

2. Each qualified rated farmer is entitled to compete for Nomination for one Mare only but the Committee may award a second Nomination to Owners of Mares on the Reserved List.

3. SPECIAL NOTICE - Any person found (a) exhibiting a Mare not his bona fide property; (b) attempting to obtain more than one Nomination through any misrepresentation as to Ownership of his Mare; or (c) sending for service a Mare other than the one in respect of which the Nomination was awarded, is guilty of a Criminal Offence, and will be prosecuted.

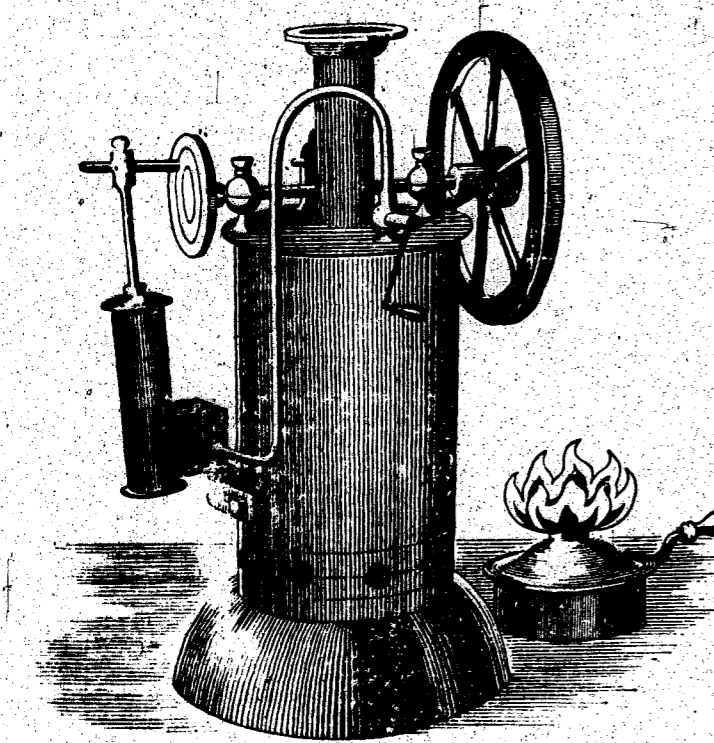

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

Considerable alarm and uneasiness was caused in Lismore by the report that the Dungarvan U.D.C. was making every effort to have a Library Headquarters erected in Dungarvan thereby depriving Lismore of one of its few remaining sources of employment.

I can, however, reassure the people of Lismore that such a suggestion cannot be even entertained by the County Council as a Library Scheme has already been passed by the Libraries Committee and the County Council which include: (a) the extension of Library Headquarters in Lismore; (b) the erection of a Branch Library in Dungarvan, and (c) a Branch Library in Tramore. I cannot say in what order the above scheme will be carried out.

The Library Council (Central Library Authority) will give a 50% grant for the implementation of this scheme which has been in their hands for the past three years. It is up to the County Libraries Committee and the County Council to decide the order in which the above scheme will be carried out. No doubt they will take the local library needs into account when making their decision and I, personally, can see no reason, in view of conditions prevailing there, why Dungarvan Branch Library cannot be the first item to be implemented.

LICENSING OF BULLS

Applications for licences for bulls calved during the period 1st January to 30th June, 1961 should now be made. Application forms may be obtained from Garda stations, Post Offices, County Committees of

Agriculture and the Department. Application made after the 31st January will be subject to additional fees. The inspection of the bulls will take place at approved centres (including Shows and Sales) during February and March.

A licence will not be granted for any bull which is a reactor under the Bovine Tuberculosis eradication scheme. Persons keeping bulls of the prescribed age without licences are liable to prosecution and, on conviction, to a penalty of £20.

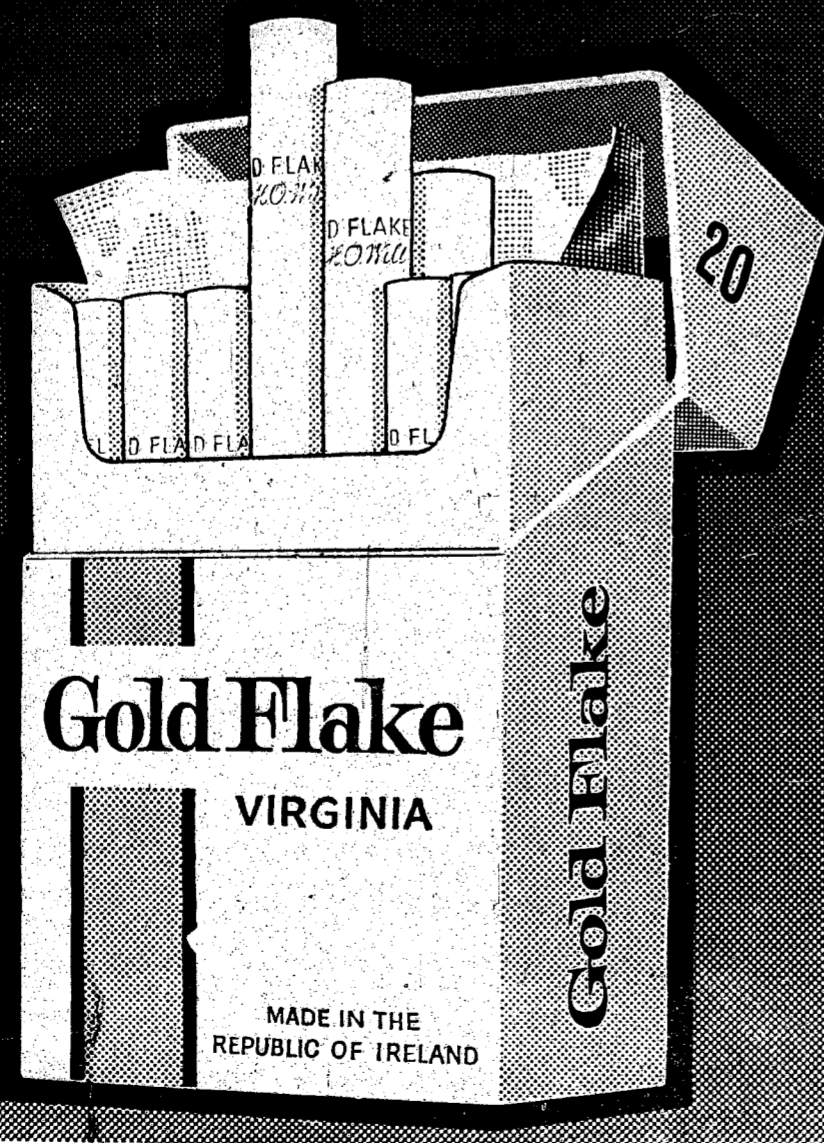
