

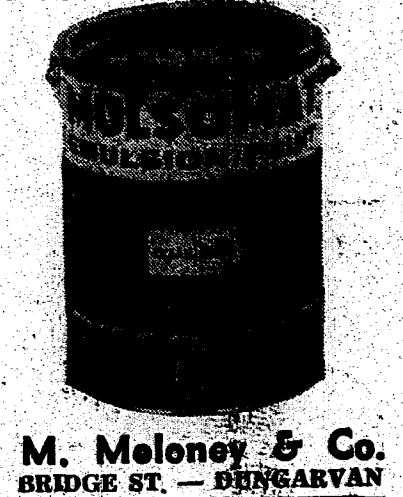

## Road Scheme May Put 3 1/2 on Rates

### Main Roads Superior To London City

WHEN the special meeting of Waterford County Council was held in the newly re-constructed Courthouse in Dungarvan on Monday last, members deferred to the Council's Estimates Sub-Committee the

At the outset, Mr. Hally told the members that if the proposed scheme was accepted in its entirety it would mean a net increase of 3 1/2 on the rates. The Chairman, Col. C. Curran, said in other counties they were given loans to take over and maintain roads. Deputy Kyne said any road being used by the public should, if possible, be considered. Col. J. Fahy said it was money down the drain spending money on roads, if they were not prepared to maintain them afterwards. Col. M. Harty said they had two different road policies in Waterford to-day — county and main. There seemed to be no limit to improvement on the main roads but one had to go to enormous trouble to try and have dangerous roads removed on a county road. Continuing, Col. Harty said "It has been said that our main roads are superior to a number of roads out of London City. That is to the credit of all connected with these roads but considering the conditions of some of our county roads, I think it is our duty to concentrate on them. I hold we should get a considerably increased grant for county roads over the next five years and concentrate all our energy on

them. We will only be doing what the people desire. After all no one in the county has asked for all the work that has been done on main roads." Col. G. Heskin said if they took over certain roads they should take them all over en bloc. Col. Fahy said if people availed of the special employment scheme grants the expense on the County Council would be much less than at present. Col. W. Kenneally — It's simply a question of — Are we going to put up 3 1/2 for roads or not? Col. J. Quirk — If we got a grant from the Government we wouldn't have to put up 3 1/2. Chairman — If this amount is out on the rates, it will be knotted on the head at the Estimates meeting. Col. Heskin — We should

either take them all over or none of them. Mr. Galgey — That is the best idea. Deputy Kyne said if they eliminated the few roads for which big sums of money was involved they could do the entire scheme for £5,000. It was postulated that would use the roads and it was postulated that should pay for them. The Chairman then proposed that they raise a loan not exceeding £15,000 for the scheme. Deputy Kyne said it would be a good idea to pay for the scheme by instalments and he felt a loan was a good way out of the problem. Col. Curran said £15,000 would cover the entire cost and it was a capital investment. Mr. Hally (County Engineer) said that subject to the Council approving of the £15,000

loan could then proceed, with all the roads as outlined in his report. Col. W. Kenneally said it was bad policy to borrow money for roads for a period of 10 years. If they put up £7,500 this year and £7,500 next year it would be much cheaper on the ratepayers. The County Accountant (Mr. P. J. O'Leary) said to borrow £15,000 for 10 years would necessitate paying back £19,000, whilst a similar sum for 5 years would mean paying £17,000. Col. Kenneally said by spreading the loan over ten years it would put 1/8 on the rates whilst it would only be 1/1 if paid off in 2 years. By 12 votes to 4 it was then decided to the transfer of £5,000 from County Road

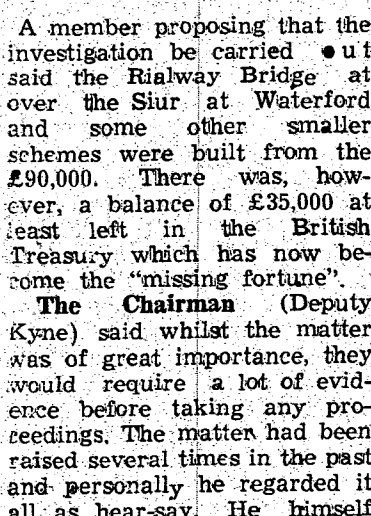

### WON NURSING PRIZE

Among the prizewinners at the nursing day at the Children's Hospital, Temple Street, Dublin, this week was Nurse Ercesa Kirwan, Kilmeadon.

How was the £90,000 which accrued from the sale of the Waterford-Dungarvan and Lismore Railway in 1898 allocated? That was the poser put before members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their meeting on Friday last. Finally, after a lengthy discussion it was decided to request the Department of Finance to contact the British Treasury for the purpose of establishing a full-scale investigation into the allocation of the money.

A member proposing that the investigation be carried out said the Railway Bridge at over the Siur at Waterford and some other smaller schemes were built from the £90,000. There was, however, a balance of £35,000 at least left in the British Treasury, which has now become the "missing fortune".

The Chairman (Deputy Kyne) said whilst the matter was of great importance, they would require a lot of evidence before taking any proceedings. The matter had been raised several times in the past and personally he regarded it all as hear-say. He himself brought the matter to light in 1942 but he had no substantial or concrete evidence to rely on. The "her" of the Urban Council, Senator Jack Butler said that in his opinion the financial agreement of 1921 between the English and Irish Governments brought to an end all such agreements. Deputy Kyne said he didn't know what to think of the whole affair. The actual agreement was there and all outstanding liabilities were taken over by the Irish Government. The Town Clerk, Mr. J. Howlett, said there was no documents in the Council relating to the money. At the time, 1898, the town affairs were being run by the Dungarvan Town Commissioners. Deputy Kyne said it would be unwise to pursue the matter until they had received further information. There were shrewd and able town-

**They Find it Fascinating . . . And Useful at Home, too**

Among the various clubs, organisations and societies in the town which cater for the recreational hours of the people there is one group in which the members devote their leisure time to preparedness to face a possible emergency. **READY TO HELP**

They are the officers and members of the Civil Defence Organisation who are steadily forging ahead with their training in serious concentration to be ready with the vital assistance should the need ever arise in this country.

**BE PREPARED**

With the scouts' motto "Be Prepared" as a watchword the women and men of the Dungarvan Civil Defence are preparing in sections such as Welfare, Auxiliary Firefighting, Casualty, First Aid and Warden to deal with the effects of possible nuclear fall-out, should any atomic explosion take place in or near the country.

**MAN IN CHARGE**

Civil Defence Officer in charge of the operation of the scheme in Co. Waterford is Mr. Thomas O'Donoghue, B.E., A.M.I.C.E.I., who resides at the Youghal Road, Dungarvan, and who is an Assistant Engineer in the County Engineer's department of Waterford County Council. By day he is in charge of the road maintenance in the Kilmacthomas-Dungarvan area and his evenings and nights are spent in the organisation of the county's civil defence network.

**CATCHING UP**

Interviewed by the "Observer," Mr. O'Donoghue outlined the civil defence set-up since the Department of Defence in 1950 started, with a small technical staff, to try to catch up in Ireland on the head-start which the 1939-45 war involved European countries had in regard to survival following atomic bombing.

Following a request in 1957 to the local authorities a recruiting drive was launched, and Mr. O'Donoghue is currently hard at work in rounding off the county groups into a well-trained and fully-equipped unit.

**CHAIN OF COMMAND**

The twenty-two dispensary districts in county Waterford, said Mr. O'Donoghue, form the springboard from which the services will expand. At the moment, the selection of District Wardens in each of these areas is well advanced, and the warden group is one of the most important in the service. A warden will be appointed (in the sub-divisions through District Posts with a Warden Officer in charge), for each three townlands so that, through the chain of command and with the assistance of radars survey meters, meteorological reports, a plan of campaign can be quickly worked out for any emergency.

**COUNTY OFFICERS**

County Chief Warden is Mr. Noel V. Kelly, Waterford, a member of a prominent citizen firm of accountants. Popular Kilmacthomas businessman Mr. Edward Hill is the Asst. County Chief Warden.

Among the Sub-County Wardens are secondary school teacher Mr. Michael V. (Vin) O'Donoghue, B.E., Lismore, a well-known Gael, who was former President of the Gaelic Athletic Association. He is assisted by Mr. Peter O'Kelly, Lyrath of the Munster & Leinster Bank, Lismore.

The Dungarvan officers are: Mr. P.K. Conroy, B.Sc., County Chief Agricultural Officer and Mr. Maurice Neelan, Creamery Manager, Dungarvan Co-Operative Creameries Ltd.

Filling the post at Kilmacthomas is Mr. D. J. Coghlan, Rosmore House, progressive dairy farmer and one of the foremost men in the Waterford County Executive of the National Farmers' Association.

In charge at Tramore is School's Inspector Mr. Michael Rice, M.A., while the Principal of Ballinacorney National School Mr. Michael Culloo, N.T., who is prominent in G.A.A. and Macra na Feirme circles, covers this parish.

Other county officers are: Mr. Sean Power, N.T., Dungarvan; Mr. James Timmins, Ballynagall; Mr. John O'Donovan, N.T., Keelfour; Mr. Andrew Coughlan, Ballyheast; Mr. Jas. Cullen, N.T., Grang; Mr. Ed. Buckley, N.T., Bonmahon; Mr. Michael Creagh, N.T., Kilmacree; Mr. James Moloney, N.T., The Nire.

**MUCH USEFUL KNOWLEDGE**

All these men, and many others, are finding that the training which they are undergoing in Civil Defence is not alone fascinating and absorbing as a part of national defence, but is also proving very useful in its application to every-day affairs.

Such things as first-aid, use of ropes, proper methods of tying and lashing for maximum

security, safe use of ladders, shoring-up and fastenings and the safe-working-loads of materials, are coming in handy for various work inside and outside the house—not to mention the invaluable advice and practical hints in connection with fire-fighting which one can appreciate properly and assess calmly the seriousness of a fire and the proper method of tackling it, in the early stages, prior to the arrival of the fire-brigade.

**FIRST-AID**

First-Aid lectures are currently being attended by the various sections of the Dungarvan Civil Defence Organisation, and the members are going through a thorough training under Dr. Kevin Murphy, Assistant County M.O., assisted by Miss R. Ryan of the Waterford Health Authority and Mrs. T. Flynn, Abbeyside.

Richard Ryan, Edward Morrissey, John English, Commencing their training are Messrs. P. J. Foyle, B.E., of the County Council Engineering staff and Mr. P. Walsh, B.E., Town Surveyor, Assistant County Controller for Civil Defence is Mr. I. G. Dowling, A.C.I.S., Waterford County Secretary.

**TRAINING GROUND**

The old dispensary residence at Bonmahon has been taken over as a training ground, and in the summer the groups attend special exercises and hold an annual field-day with a full turn-out of personnel and equipment.

**BARBECUE AND SOCIALS**

Though the work on which these public-spirited citizens are engaged is serious, and they work seriously at it, there is plenty of fun and relaxation among the members. One of the highlights of the year is the barbecue dinner—prepared with the use of emergency gear—and served in Army-fashion and eaten in the outdoors—held at the conclusion of the Field Day at mid-summer in Bonmahon. A dance rounds off the evening. There are friendly socials and get-togethers held by the Dungarvan Group which testify to the grand spirit which exists among the women and men of the Civil Defence. A comprehensive list of sound films is available from the headquarters well-stocked 16 mm film library.

It was decided to apply to the Minister for Transport and Power for a licence to run a bus service daily between Dungarvan and the City. ENCREASE FOR OVERSEER It was also decided to grant a salary increase to Mr. P. Browne, Town Overseer, come into effect from Feb. 4th. On the proposal of Deputy Kyne, seconded by Colr. Tom Lee, it was agreed to give an increase of 8d. an hour to tradesmen employed by the Council and to reduce their working week to 45 hours. The new increase is retrospective to October 10th last.
