

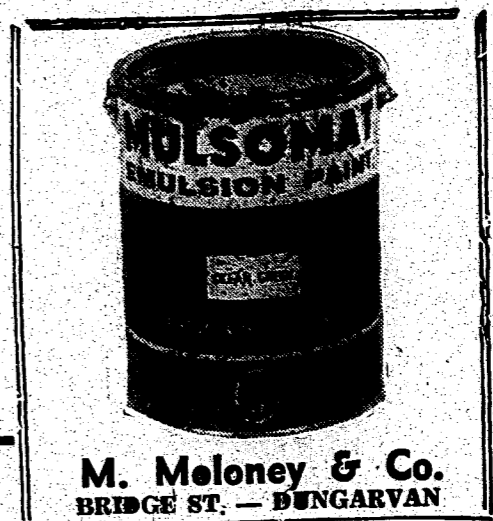

Racing

THIS year's annual Dungarvan Point-to-Point meeting will go down in the record books as one of the most successful ever. As always arrangements were excellent good entries made for splendid racing while the unpredictable weatherman smiled favourably on the fixture and attracted a near record crowd to the magnificent Killossera course.

A Grand total of 33 horses ran in the five races.

Feature of the day was another double for the Connaught rider, Mr. Joe Mulcahy, who started the season at Carrigrohilly last week by riding two winners; a win for Mr. P. O'Donnell in the Open Maiden event on Mr. John Twomey's Silken Crest and another success for young Mr. William Bowne on Imperial Star, on which he gained his first win at Patrickswell last week.

Two of the races on Monday were sponsored, one for horses which had never won more than two point-to-point races, by Youghal Carpets Ltd., and the other by Waterford Flour Mills Ltd.

Mr. Mulcahy completed his double in the first and last events in which he scored on Glenard and What Is. Glenard had won at Carrigrohilly last week and now won the Open Farmers' Race in decisive style on which Mr. Francis Flood had the leg up. Raylteen Geal made the running for nearly two miles but then Mr. Mulcahy sent Glenard into the lead and from that on he drew steadily ahead to win by ten lengths. Killconey Wood was a distance further behind third. Mr. P. L. O'Keefe's What Is had a right tussle in the Waterford Flour Mills Stakes with Tappy Henry and War Knight. Coming to the last there was nothing between the two and after clearing this, Mr. W. McLernon dashed Happy Henry into the lead but Mr. Mulcahy, riding a strong finish, was in command again as they came to the enclosure and then rode out What Is to score by two lengths from Happy Henry. War Knight being only a half length off third. Moondeavour made the running for a mile when she ran out and then fell and after this Clovaunis held

the lead for another mile until she too fell. What Is then going on only to be strongly pressed by Happy Henry and War Knight in the last half mile.

BIG FIELD

Edwards and n'na. Fruh WR. Fifteen declared in the Open Maiden race. Miss Edwards and Cacao'oi being made joint favourites. The race, however, went to the outsider, Silken Crest, which got the best of a fast run race, the pace proving too much for many of the runners. Miss Edwards made the early running and then Painter's Cottage was in front for a time but at half way King Brian had taken it up. With a mile to go he fell and then the joint favourites along with Silken Crest were left in front. Mr. O'Donnell quickly raced Silken Crest into a good lead but after the last, Mr. P. J. Stokes on another outsider, King Pin came with a fine run but was too lengths in arrears at the post. Third, ten lengths off, was Owenduff Signal, and then came the favourites Cacao'oi and Miss Edwards.

Cashel trainer, Mick Browne and his son, William, who will be sixteen next month, repeated their Patrickswell win with Imperial Star which now won the Youghal Carps Stakes for which a fast pace was again set. This was only Master William's fourth mount but he quickly made it his second success for setting off in front he was never headed and in fact, came home alone, winning by a distance from Tarpis. After a couple of miles in this event Miss Frances Fitzgibbon's mount, Well Laced, fell and Miss Fitzgibbon was injured slightly.

Mr. J. Beresford won the local (confined) race on his own horse Sheba II, gaining command at the last fence to win by two lengths from Tur-

kish Delight III which lost ground at this obstacle on each circuit. Mr. Matt Kiely's mount led to this point first time round, regained the lost ground to lead at half-way but fell back again when jumping this fence on the second circuit. The Brown Ranger then took the lead but at the last Sheba II jumped into the lead and resisting a strong finish by Turkish Delight, the mare won by a couple of lengths. The Brown Ranger being only a length behind Turkish Delight.

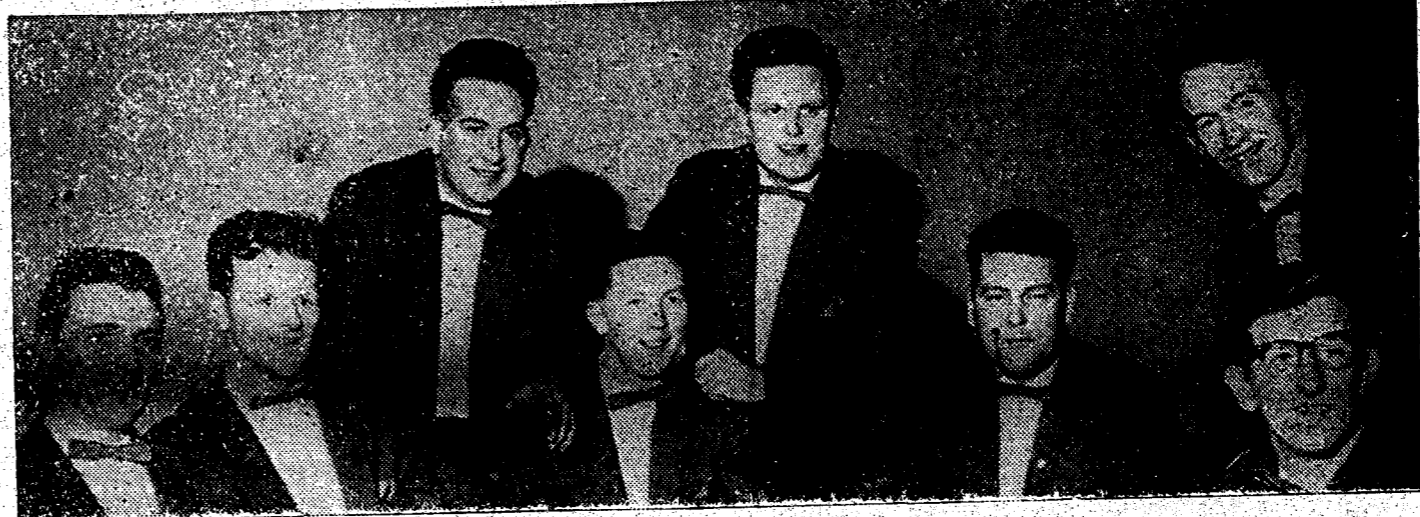

Savoy Showband for Town Hall

A dance will be held at the Town Hall, Dungarvan, on Sunday night next, February 11th, presenting for the first time in Dungarvan the sensational Savoy Showband (Waterford), voted one of Ireland's leading bands. Rock 'n' Roll Competitions, 1st heat will also be held. Dancing 8.30 to 1 a.m. Admission (inc. tax) 4/-.

Thursday, 22nd February is the date. Yes on that night the dynamic Dixielanders Showband will be making their first appearance at the C.S.M. Ballroom, Clonea. This Cork full-time professional outfit is the rage of the country to-day. Everywhere they play they have been acclaimed as a super showband and hold the attendance record for the Olympic Ballroom in Dublin.

Many tempting offers to tour foreign countries have reached their manager, one of which takes in a tour of all the leading cities in America.

Now they are coming our way. Unfortunately a band of the Dixielanders calibre does not often come to Dungarvan and we can expect the C.S.M. to be packed to capacity for their first visit.

The following is what Bertie Nesbitt, writing in the Ballymena Weekly Telegraph, had to say of them—

Last week at the Flamingo Ballroom, I had the pleasure of hearing for the first time one of Ireland's top showbands—the Dixielanders.

These boys come from far away Cork and in their five years' existence in the world of entertainment this has been the first time they have crossed the border to give us in the fair North a "tuneful earful" and from the way they were received I don't think we will have to wait a long time until they are back again.

Mr. Peter Prendergast, manager of the Arcadia Ballroom, Cork, where the Dixielanders are the resident band tells me that the boys were overwhelmed with the reception they got in the various dance halls during their six day tour.

No wonder, if the dance audience at the Flamingo and O'pheus are anything to judge by, for no sooner had the 'Na-

tional Anthem' faded out when all around me boys and girls—especially girls—were asking "When will they be back? they're tops."

The Dixielanders they call themselves, but they are not as their title would suggest, an outfit which specialises in jazz or Dixieland style, although admittedly it is included in their repertoire.

Band leader Sean Lucy tells me that when the band was first mooted their title was naturally chosen because of the type of music they played, but as rock'n'roll grew popular they had to adjust themselves to public demand.

So they now principally cater for the 'rock' and 'pop' followers and, believe me, this outfit have enough "snap crackle and pop" to keep half a dozen bands happy.

The more I listened to them the more I compared them

with Ireland's "top twosoe" The Clipper Carlton and the Royal Showband and let me say now that if these boys keep on the way they are going they will finish way out in front.

Each member of the band is a star in his own right, but I am going to single out Joe McCarthy—not only is he a grand drummer but he is one of the most liveliest comedians that I have heard on the stage.

Now to the remainder of the band personnel. There's band leader Sean Lucy (clarinet and tenor sax), Theo Cahill (trombone, guitar and concert flute), John Sheehan (trombone), Jimmy Minern (tenor sax), Finbarr O'Leary (piano), Steve Lynch (guitar and banjo), Chris O'Mahony (bass guitar)—and wonder of wonders—they all are vocalists and good ones at that!

There was a capacity attendance at the Devonshire Hotel, Dungarvan, on Friday night for the opening day of the season of the annual Becharri's Waterford County Beekeepers' Association.

Messrs. Patrick Morrissey (President), Mr. Martin Curran (Chairman), and Mr. Michael Moynihan (Secretary), welcomed the many new members who attended.

A very interesting lecture illustrated by slides of the International Beekeepers' Congress held in Madrid, Spain, last autumn, was given by Mr. J. Ahearne, Cork, Secretary of the Munster Federation. Local beekeepers were surprised that a land so barren as that illustrated could produce honey.

Mr. Curran gave details of the progress of the scheme at the Two-Mile-Bridge Apiary and thanked the County Committee of Agriculture for their assistance in this scheme.

Welcoming the many young boys from the Christian Brothers Schools and from the Christian Brothers Schools and from the Technical School who were present at the meeting, the secretary invited all present to pay a visit to the Apiaries. He pointed out that there was money in honey nowadays, with much of educational value too, and that by comparison with the averages

for England, Spain or Australia this country was a beekeepers' paradise with great potentialities for honey production.

At a meeting of the Board of Conservators held at Fermoy, presided over by the Chairman, Mr. R. G. Annesley, there attended Mrs. Phillip Brig. Jephson, Capt. Black, Messrs. H. Holroyd Smyth, J. A discussion took place on the proper method of using a drift net in the Dromana-Villierstown area when Mr. Green intimated that he would make a motion at next meeting that the Department be asked to hold a Sworn Inquiry with the view to making a By-Law defining the proper use of such net.

In the course of his report Inspector Woulfe stated that the spawning season must be regarded as being satisfactory. There were still spawning salmon in the Lickey, and also a good run of sea-trout in the Glensilane, Finnisk and Lickey rivers. The thanks of the Board is due to the Garda all over the district for their co-operation during the close season. Arrangements for protection during the open season were almost complete. The four keepers at Villierstown area took up duty on Jan. 1st, and the launch at Youghal was in commission from January 15th. The Board agreed to hold next meeting at Mallow on February 22nd when members will have the opportunity of inspecting the Bearforest Salmon Hatchery, where approximately one million ova is being hatched out. 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

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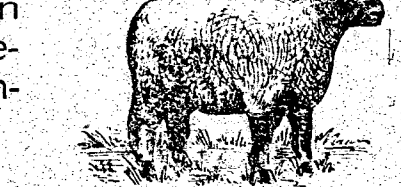
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
