

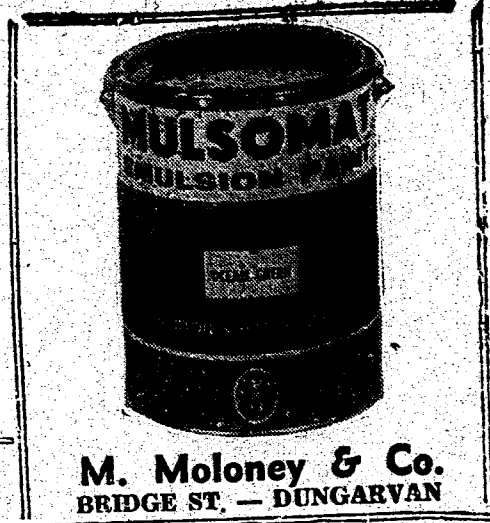

'MASTERS IN OUR OWN HOUSE'

THE Minister is doing everything in his power to get rid of temporary instructors. But as we are paying 50% of their salaries my answer to him would be that we are masters in our own house. This was stated by Mr. Norman Walsh at last Saturday's County Committee of Agriculture meeting in Dungarvan, when C.A.O. Mr. Conroy, read a letter from the Minister for Agriculture requesting the Committee to consider the desirability of filling on a permanent basis, post presently occupied in a temporary capacity.

The Department's letter referred to the growing parting amongst Committee's of Agriculture of employing instructors on a temporary basis and renewing them periodically. As a result of this practice about one-third of the instructors were now employed on a temporary basis.

The Minister is very concerned, the letter went on, about this trend, which, if allowed to continue would result in a completely temporary advisory service and would undermine the system under which advisory personnel should be recruited. The Working Party of the Organic Co-Operation which studied the advisory services some years ago, were very critical of the position of making appointments on a temporary basis since then the position had worsened considerably.

OBJECTONABLE

The Minister also considered that the award of annual increments to temporary instructors on the same basis as if they were permanent officers would be objectionable. Accordingly, he would not be prepared to approve of incremental increases in salary after 1st September, 1962, in the cases of temporary instructors, whose salary would

be then a point equivalent to the second or higher incremental point on a permanent instructor's scale. In the cases of other temporary instructors, as (Misses) would not be prepared to approve of an increase as from that date, which would bring their salaries above the second incremental point on a permanent instructors scale.

In reply to Mr. R. Walsh, the C.A.O. (Mr. P. Conroy) said there were at present six instructors in County Waterford—three on a permanent basis and three temporary.

'PUTTING GUN TO OUR HEADS'

Mr. Norman Walsh quoting the introductory statement to this report, said the Minister was simply putting the gun to their heads and trying to force them to agree to all permanent appointments.

Mr. Michael Hartly, said it was a despicable attitude by the Minister. He was now trying to worsen the position of temporary instructors.

The Chairman, Mr. John Fahy said it was the ambition of every temporary instructor to become permanent. This recommendation first came from the Agricultural Science As-

sociation and they did it for the good of their members. The Minister then accepted it.

Mr. N. Walsh said if they always accepted the officials' views they might as well get out. The official view is often wrong, he added.

Mr. J. Butler—And it is often very right also.

Mr. N. Walsh—I want my right to establish a temporary post if I so desire. I propose we reject the proposals contained in the Minister's letter in toto. Let there be no beating about the bush. If our temporary instructors felt we were doing them an injustice they wouldn't stay overnight with us.

NOT THEIR FAULT

The C.A.O. said it wasn't the temporary instructors' fault that they remained on. They were all anxious to obtain permanent posts.

Mr. George Heskin said they should be realistic and back the Government in view of their nearness to the Common Market.

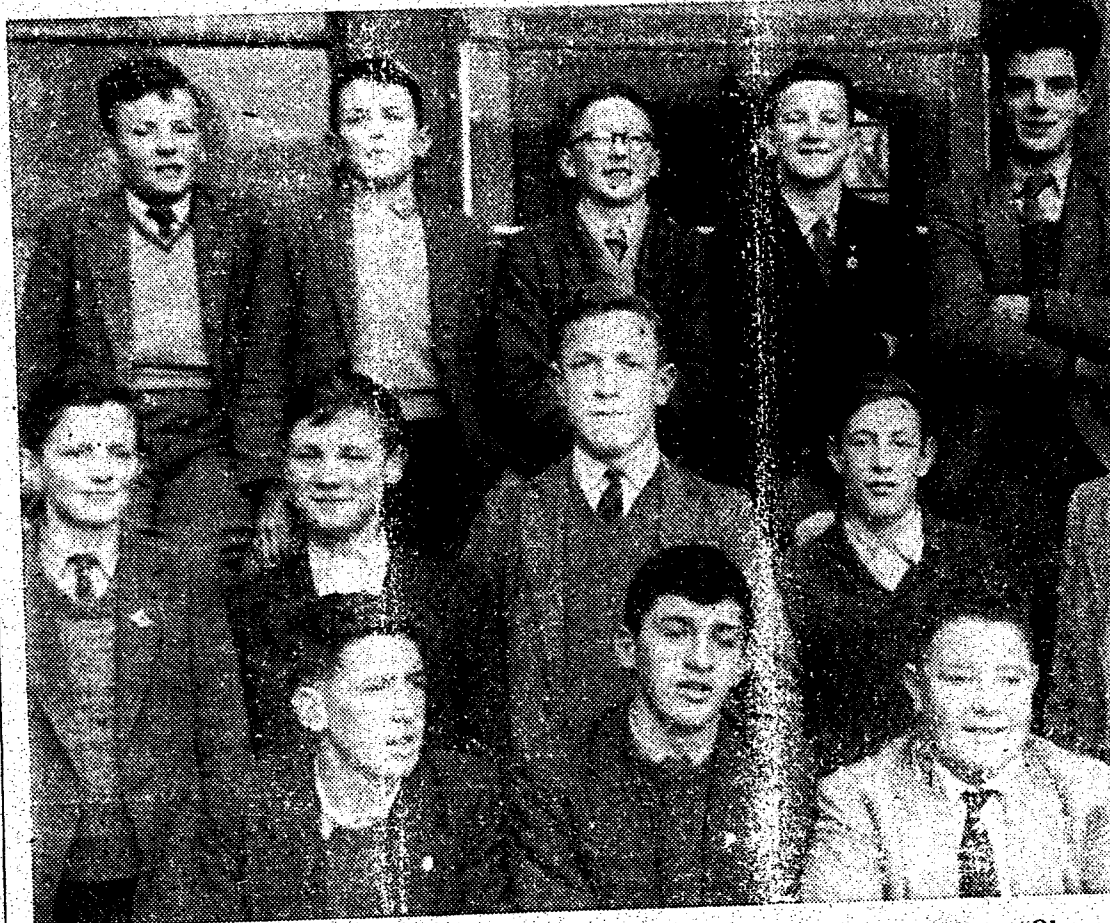
Mr. R. Walsh proposed and Mr. Sean Whelan seconded that 75% of their instructors be permanent in future.

Mr. N. Walsh said the Minister was creating a situation where it would be impossible to appoint a temporary instructor. He was forcing the Committee's hand, and that was the ugly point.

Mr. Charles Curran proposed that they employ a maximum of two-thirds of their instructors on a permanent basis. Mr. R. Walsh then withdrew his proposal in favour of Mr. Curran's.

A vote was taken and Mr. N. Walsh's amendment to reject the Minister's proposals was defeated by nine votes to four. The voting was—For—Messrs. N. Walsh, Hartly, Foran and O'Ryan (4); against—Messrs. Curran, Butler, Whelan, Drohan, Fahy, Heskin, Montayne, Galgey, R. Walsh (9). Mr. W. Dower abstained from voting.

Training Them Young



ONE of the pioneer clubs of the Macra na Tuaithe— junior young farmers' organisation—in the county is that of Dungarvan, which is still going strongly.

One of the First

When in April of 1952, the late Sean Moylan, then Minister for Education, backed the drive for a rural youth organisation, one of the first of the twelve centres which he visited to formally launch a branch was Dungarvan.

For a Decade

Among the officials of the Department of Agriculture and Education and representatives of the local agricultural and educational committees present on the inaugural evening was Mr. Thomas F. Maher, B.Sc., Church Street, Dungarvan, who took charge of the local branch—and he has been busy since, week out after week in the past ten years, guiding the affairs of the rural youth groups in the county.

Merit Award

In recognition of his service to the organisation he was awarded a certificate of merit, with gold seals attached marking each full year, at a special presentation ceremony organised by the Macra na Tuaithe Organisation with the co-operation of Irish Shell Ltd.

Mostly Ring

For a period of its existence, the Dungarvan Macra na Tuaithe group might have been called Ring Macra as the majority of the members came from Ring Gaeltacht district. Many of the boys of the earlier groups have long since graduated to the adult Macra na Feire and National Farmers' Association branches, after having received a sound training in the junior section.

A large number of the lads also followed up their rural training with joining one of the Social and Rural Science adult education courses which have been sponsored in this county at various centres by University College, Cork, over the past decade.

Education and Fun, Too

It wasn't all work in the junior groups—the lads enjoyed the social side also, and sometimes they combined business with pleasure when they attended such functions as

Participation in stockjudging competitions, question-time sessions and debates with members of other clubs both inside and outside the county keeps the lads keen and interested and their group-leader, Mr. Maher is ever ready to suggest new and interesting ventures and projects to catch their imagination.

They Do It Themselves

It is the boys themselves who conduct their own meetings and lay their plans; the Adult Leader keeps discreetly in the background with a watchful eye on the proceedings and a helpful hint or two when required.

Kilmc' Still Without Instructor

WATERFORD COUNTY COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE is to ask the Appointments' Commission to appoint as quickly as possible an agricultural instructor in the Kilmacthomas area. This was decided at Saturday's monthly meeting when members were told Kilmacthomas was still without an instructor.

Mr. P. Conroy, C.A.O. said the Appointments Commission recommended Mr. John Curran, B.Agr.Sc., Ardmore for the post but he declined from accepting it.

Mr. Charles Curran said they would have to take their share of the blame in having no instructor appointed in the Kilmac' area. His own area

(Clashmore etc.) was also left without an instructor. Mr. N. Walsh said if an appointment was made it would be the Kilmac' area. They could then consider Mr. Curran's area at a later date. Mr. J. Fahy (Chairman) said Mr. J. Curran had been appointed and he declined. All they could do now was refer it back to the Appointments' Commission. Mr. Fahy's suggestion was unanimously agreed to.

Ambassador Was Teacher at C.B.S.

Ireland's new Ambassador to Spain, Mr. Timothy J. Horan, as Charge d'Affaires, who has been the country's Minister to Switzerland, was a member of the lay teaching staff at the Christian Brothers' Secondary Schools, Dungarvan, over a quarter of a century ago.

A native of Cork, he is a B.A. and H.Dip Ed. graduate of Cork University. Following his brief teaching career in Dungarvan he joined the civil service and was appointed a third secretary of the Department of External Affairs in 1938, and in 1942 went to New York as Consul.

He returned to Dublin as Acting Head of the Consular Section in 1945 and the following year he went to Lisbon as Charge d'Affaires of the Irish Legation. The same year he was sent to Madrid as Secretary of the Legation and in 1947 he went to Paris in a similar capacity. He returned to Dublin as Counsellor of the Department in 1949, and in 1955 he went to Buenos Aires, Argentina, as Charge d'Affaires.

He became Assistant Secretary of the Department in 1958 and the following year he was appointed Minister to Switzerland. He is married and has three children.

PARISH PRIEST LEAVES FOR PERU

Very Rev. Patrick Ahearns, P.P., who leaves this week for Peru in answer to the call for Irish priests to work on the South American Missions visited his brother and friends here on last Friday to say farewell. Fourth son of the late Mr. John and Mrs. Ahearns, Tintur, and brother of Very Rev. Pierce Ahearns, D.D., St. John's College, and Rev. John Ahearns, C.C., Ballybricken, he ministered as Curate in St. John's Parish, Waterford, and for many years in Tramore before he was appointed pastor of Killea in 1957. His decision to go to South America where priests are so badly needed, is typical of his zeal and concern for the propagation of the faith.

"Father Pat" has the prayers and good wishes of his many friends in his native parish for a fruitful mission and a safe return.

PARISH PRIEST APPOINTED

His Lordship the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, has appointed the Reverend Michael Leahy, S.T.L., L.S.S., Professor of Sacred Scripture at St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, to be Parish Priest of Killea, Crooke and Pathiegg in succession to the Very Rev. Patrick Ahearns who has given us all such an inspiring example by volunteering to serve the people of Peru in the Missionary Society of St. James the Apostle, under Cardinal Cushing of Boston.

This appointment will take effect on Sunday, 4th March.

CARDINAL-DESIGNATE, SON OF CAPPOQUIN MAN

The announcement that Most Rev. Dr. Michael Browne, Irish Master-General of the Dominican Order will be raised to the Cardinalate was learned in Cappoquin with particular pride and joy. The distinguished Churchman is son of the late Mr. Maurice Browne, who was a member of one of the town's oldest families. The late Mr. Browne was Mr. David Browne's uncle of the Cardinal-Designate. He died about thirty-five years ago.

SALMON NET FISHING

Up to the closing days of last week salmon were again scarce, while many boats did not have a fish for the week; the best boat at Youghal was 9 lbs. mark and the current price to fishermen is 8/- per lb.

YOUGHAL GASWORKS

As a result of last week's bombshell from the Co. Manager that Youghal U.D.C. Gasworks will cease to operate on 30th April, residents who still use town gas are still busy in trying to decide whether to buy a gas stove or to have a house to house canvas by the local agents for bottle gas and the E.S.B. held a demonstration in the Town Hall. It is now strongly rumoured in town that the Gas Works is not to be closed and it would appear from inquiries that this information has come from a reliable source. A letter to the Press during the week from four former members of the U.D.C. protesting against the proposed closing of the Gas Works is the subject of much comment locally. It would be interesting to know why these Councillors are now interested when they took no action on the Gas Supervisor's recommendations in 1951 for certain essential repairs and improvements. It is rather late now to develop an interest in the affairs of the poor of the town and the Old Age Pensioners who are the main people concerned. If some action was taken in 1951 by the Council there would certainly be a different story today when 20,000 is required to put the works in proper working order.

YOUGHAL BRIDGE

The work of building Youghal Bridge is said to be far ahead of schedule and it is expected that the contract will be completed by mid September. Workmen can now travel from one side of the river to the other across the structure.

At the Ardsallagh end the first and second eyes are taking shape as the reinforced iron work has been removed down to lower water level. Afterwards a diver will cut them down to the level of the river bed. Half the bridge in its finished state is now exposed to view. The four river piers which will support the bridge are now in position. The bridge will be 998 feet in length with a pier span of 196 feet. The carriageway will be 24 feet wide and with two footpaths of 4 1/2 feet each the overall width of the structure is 33 feet. The bridge is still an attraction to visitors from many parts especially on Sundays and Wednesdays.

YOUGHAL DISTRICT COURT

At Youghal District Court before Mr. Justice Skinner, John Murray of Churchfield, Cork, was fined 10/- for dangerous driving of a lorry which collided with the Youghal Postal Van at Aghavine Cross on Jan. 24th and a charge of not keeping to the left of the roadway resulted in the P.O.A. being applied. At the same Court, Mr. Carey, Shanakiel, Ballymacoda, was charged (1) driving an untaxed car at Youghal of Dec. 24th and (2) without having the necessary insurance certificate. Guard McNulty proved the charge and Mr. J. N. R. McNamara, Solr., for the defence, pleaded guilty. The Justice imposed a total fine of £12 to be paid within two months.

LATE MRS. MARY BARRETT

Deep regret was occasioned at the death of Mrs. Mary Barrett, of North Main Street, Youghal, which took place on Saturday last after a comparatively short period of illness. Widow of the late Michael Barrett, Stationer and Tobacconist, the deceased was a member of a well-known farming family from Knockacore. Possessing a kind and gentle disposition, the late Mrs. Barrett was held in high esteem in the town of her adoption. She is survived by her son, Mr. Joseph Barrett, and daughter, Miss Mary Barrett, to whom sincere sympathy is extended. The remains were removed to St. Mary's Parish Church where following Solemn Requiem Mass on Monday, the funeral followed by a large and representative cortege took place to North Abbey cemetery. Very Rev. Canon Sheehan, P.P., officiated at the graveside assisted by Rev. E. G. O'Dwyer, C.C., Rev. D. P. O'Donnell, C.C. and Rev. D. P. Noonan, CC.

Macra na Feirme National Grass Competition

The future prosperity of every Irish farmer is closely bound up with the use he makes of his grassland. Since 5/6 of the arable land in under grass, we must recognise it to be our most important crop and the one from which the major portion of our income must be derived. But, do we know how much our grass crop is yielding per acre in the form of grass feed or money, or if we can yield economically with proper care and management? In other words, are we aware of what increase in income and profits a good annual yield of grass can bring?

The first national grass production competition sponsored by Macra na Feirme, can give this information. It can tell you what is your grass yield per acre, what improvement can be achieved and how much better off this improvement can make you. In addition, you could win one of the 2nd prizes which are 1st, £250, 2nd £175, 3rd, £100, 4th £75, and 5th, £50.

So far we have a very good entry but we feel it is not sufficiently representative or widespread to produce the best results. We believe that those who take part in the competition will benefit immensely by it, whether they win prizes or not.

It might be of interest to mention that it is not necessarily the farmer who is producing the most grass who will win in each county. The effort made by each competitor will be taken into account so that the farmer on poor or wet land will stand an equal chance of winning with the competitor on rich land.

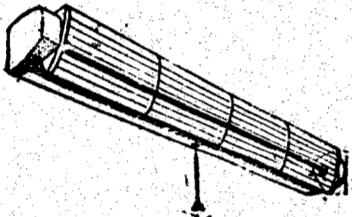
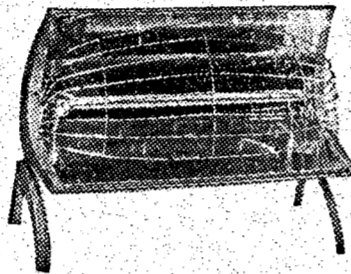

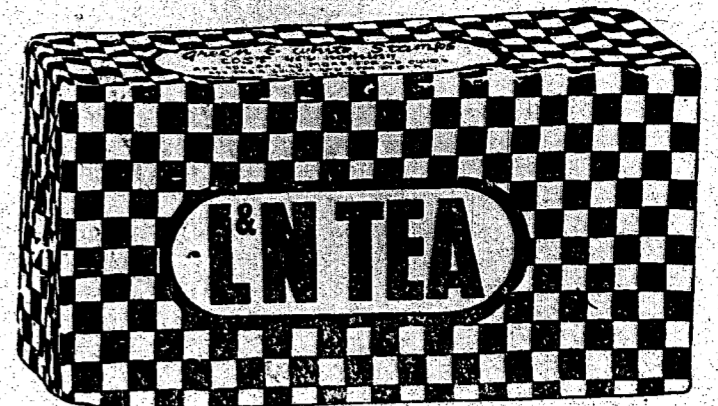
DEPUTY ORMOND IN THE DAIL

Mr. Sean Ormonde, asked the Minister for Transport and Power if he will state with regard to the Waterford Tramway bus service whether there has been any improvement in the financial return and the number of passengers carried during the past year as compared with the old rail services. The Minister replied—I assume that the Deputy is referring to the substitute bus service provided by C.I.E. I am informed by the Board that the operation of the service during the year ended 31st December 1961, showed an operating profit, the former rail was operated at a loss at the time of closure.

The number of bus passengers carried by C.I.E. in the period 1st April—30th October, 1961, showed a small increase on the number of rail passengers carried in the same period of the preceding year.

Mr. Ormonde asked the Minister for Health if he has seen a recent statement by the Co. Manager that the alarming cost of medicines provided under the Health Act was responsible for much of the estimated increase in the cost of the health services for the coming year; and if so, if he will carry out any enquiry into the prices which the public must pay for medicines at the present time in order to allay public unrest in this matter. The Minister replied—My attention has been drawn to the statement referred to by the Deputy. I may point out, however, that in the health authority area in question, the average cost of these items per patient day appears to be increasing rather rapidly and I am having the position looked into.

While the cost of drugs and medicines supplied by health authorities under the health services is kept under review by my Department, I have no functions regarding an inquiry into the prices which the general public must pay for medicines; this would be a matter for the Minister for Industry and Commerce.

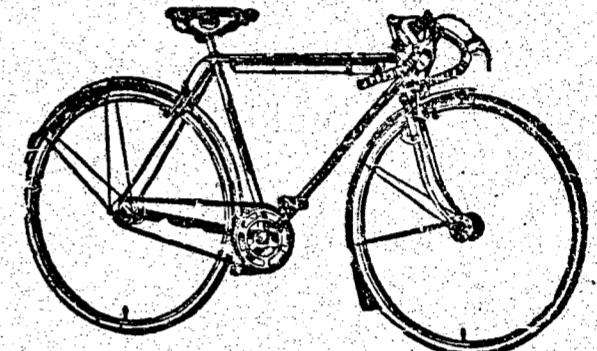

ONE UP, ONE ONE DOWN FOR MUNSTER

Sunday last was a day of mixed fortunes for Munster in the Inter-provincial Railway Cup series. As expected the hurlers cruised to an easy victory over an all-Galway Connaught selection at Ballinasloe and qualified for yet another St. Patrick's Day final against probable opponents, Leinster. But whilst Southern followers must have been highly satisfied at the outcome of the Ballinasloe tie, their satisfaction was greatly marred by the humiliating defeat of the footballers at the hands of Leinster at Tullamore.

To be beaten was bad enough but when the Province was at the wrong end of 2-17 to 0-8 trouncing it made the matter even worse.

What has happened to Munster football? Not even the Kerry men on the selection appeared to be qualified for this class. And when the Kingdom representatives fail to make the grade, what can we expect from the less renowned football counties.

The only feasible thing to do now is pick up the ashes of this debacle and if possible salvage the worthwhile material for the future. This display was also the worst possible advertisement for the championship hopes of all Munster Counties, all of whom at this stage at any rate appear to have quite a bit of leg-work to make up before being on a par with counties such as Down, Offaly or Dublin.

In the hurling game at Ballinasloe, the Waterford pair, Seamus Power and Martin O'G Morrissey were in top form. Morrissey after a slow start, settled down to turn in a polished display and Power, who helped himself to two goals, at times bewitched, both and bewildered the Connaught defence.

FOOTBALLERS MEET CORK IN CHALLENGE

In preparation for their forthcoming National League game against the winners of the Kerry section, Waterford travel a practically full strength side to Fermoy on Sunday next to meet Cork in a challenge game.

In all their League games to date, Waterford, although remaining unbeaten haven't been exactly over impressive. This meeting however, with Cork is a test of a different nature and should prove very informative as to the present status of Deise football.

Waterford mentors are undoubtedly treating this game seriously and the side chosen to do duty is the best available. Missing from the team that recently beat Limerick is goalkeeper Sean Ormonde (unavailable) and De La Salle's Corcoran is given another chance between the posts. Corcoran, however, has distinguished himself before in the county jersey and can be relied upon to do so again.

The attack will be strengthened by the return of Monty Guiry who was missing against Limerick. Guiry replaces club-mate Martin Kennedy at left-half and with Brendan Coughlan and Justin Spratt constitute a formidable attacking line.

Cork may be the fancy of most but while the result in reality is really immaterial, the display of the counties will be carefully scrutinised by their respective followers. Here's hoping Waterford will live up to the promise and improvement of the past few months.

Their hurling heritage and razor-keen, yet respected rivalry ensures that thrills are part and parcel of every game between the Counties Little wonder then that their meeting in the Kinnane Cup at Walsh Park on Sunday, is arousing more than average interest.

Kilkenny have always been welcome visitors to the Urbs Intacta. Even when their sock was lowest they nevertheless managed that something extra against Waterford. Likewise the Deise men always seem to gain inspiration from the sight of the black and amber jersey and if Sunday's game proves an exception to the general rule, in so far as these counties are concerned, it will come as a major surprise to most.

Not even the fact that both sides are compelled by injury, and otherwise to field below full strength, can detract from this. The tournament is highly regarded by all Gaelic Councils and the incentive to win it should be strong enough to suggest that there will be no punches pulled on Sunday.

SLUMPED

True it is also that while Waterford have succeeded in remaining close to the top of the hurling tree since the drawn and replayed All-Ireland thrillers of '59, Kilkenny have slumped somewhat. However, every county, yes, even Kilkenny experience their bleak era but now the county seems to be emerging from that temporarily haze and Norse-side followers haven't faced the future with such optimism as at the present for a long time.

Unfortunately they will be deprived of some of their top stars for this game. Ollie Walsh, Andy Comerford and Denis Heaslip will be missing owing to the callings of Railway Cup duty. Of this trio Walsh's loss will be felt least as mentors are fortunate in having such a capable understudy as Liam Cleere. Cleere is a custodian of the highest qualifications and would be a first choice in many counties.

And yet despite the loss of these three the Leinster men have still at their disposal a share of good material.

LOST NONE OF THEIR QUALITIES

In defence the Walshes, Tom and Link, and Johnny McGovern seem to have lost none of their many qualities despite the passing years and few scores will be come-by easily with them living around.

Now on the attack, be ready, be faulted. Admittedly with Heaslip in the van, the danger to Waterford's defence would be greater. Yet any team carrying sharp shooters like Eddie Keher and Billy Dwyer must be carefully watched.

SIMILAR PLIGHT

If the Kilkenny men are hampered by defections, Waterford find themselves in a similar plight. For a kick-off both Jackie Condon and Larry Guinan are on the injured list and Tom Cheasty is undergoing a six-months suspension. The absence of this trio could outweigh any Kilkenny losses and selectors have wisely, I think deferred final selection until later in the week.

With selectors left in this uncertain quandary we can only wait and see what the outcome of their deliberations will be. The panel chosen for the game shows no real surprises but somehow I feel as many a tried and trusted warrior as possible will be selected.

CERTAINTIES

The goalkeeping job should again be allotted to Dickie Roche, whilst Tom Cunningham and Austin Flynn are certainainties for the right-full and full-back berths respectively. Jackie Condon's withdrawal creates a vacancy at left-full and the berth seems to rest between John Barron and Joe Harney both of whom are significantly enough included in the panel.

The usual full-back line of Mick Flannelly, Martin O'G Morrissey and Jimmy Byrne should be kept intact but who will Joe Condon's midfield partner is difficult to predict. Billy Dunphy operated there without a great deal of success against Limerick in the League and I will not be surprised if

the selectors gave Mount Sion's Mick Dempsey a run.

CHEASTY STILL ABSENT

The continued absence of Tom Cheasty means Phil Phil Grimes may remain on the forty flanked by Frankie Walsh and Mick Murphy. Alternatively Mick may team up with Seamus Power and Doc Walsh in the full line, and Monty Guiry, the Kill footballer, could earn his chance in the half-line.

A date both Counties are unbeaten in their sections of the League and this game will also prove an invaluable asset to both for the tough ties that lie ahead.

WATERFORD VICTORY?

It goes without saying that I expect yet another closely fought game. But somehow, Waterford, before home supporters appear a better choice to me and I take them to score yet another victory, if only a slender one over their Norse-side neighbours.



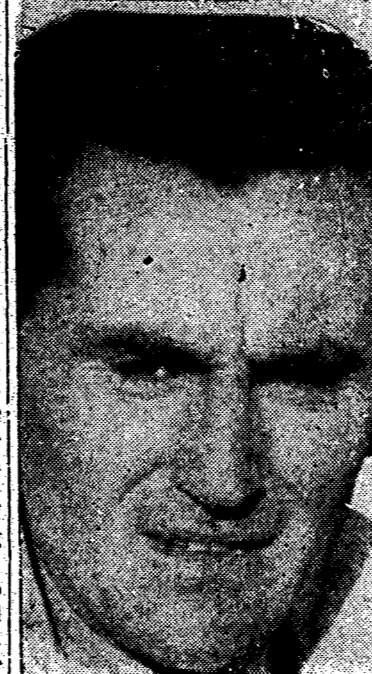

After the speech-making, young and old enjoyed the dance music which was provided by The Bridesiders Scowband. The Bandstand was gaily decorated with the green and white colours of the club. Time, however, literally flew and on an occasion to remember came to an end at 2.15 a.m.

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
