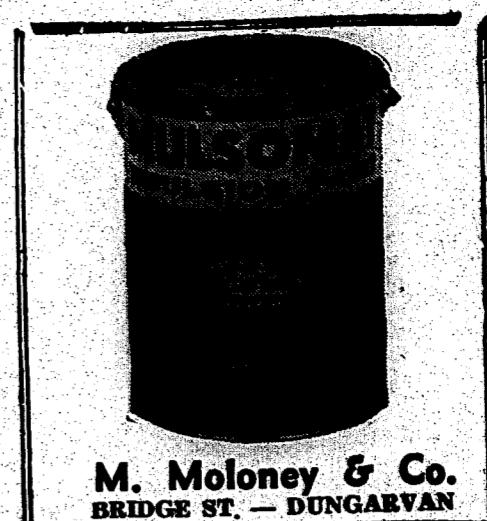

### DESPITE APPEALS CHAIRMAN REMAINS ADAMANT AND SAYS:

# 'I WILL NOT SIGN'

## 'Organised Chaos' in Council Board-room

**A** BLANK refusal by Acting Chairman Mr. Norman Walsh to sign the minutes of the previous meeting, heated exchanges between members and final adjournment to Wednesday next, April 25th. These were the highlights of a history-making Health Authority meeting in Dungarvan on Monday last — a meeting that one official described as "organised chaos."

The meeting had scarcely started and Mr. Walsh had only just asked "any questions arising out of the minutes" when Mr. W. Collins stood up and said they were highly irregular and could not happen between rational men.

Mr. Collins said at the last meeting when the Authority considered the creating of

posts of Secretary and Assistant to the Authority) Mr. J. Power proposed that no posts be created and that the existing method be left as it was. This proposal was carried. Then a proposal to create the post of Secretary was put to the meeting and passed. He was not trying to create a disturbance but the procedure was wrong. He would ask the members to return the minutes and the minutes would be corrected.

Secretary) said the minutes of the meeting in question were a true and exact account of what transpired.

Mr. Walsh (Chairman) — Do you, Mr. Collins, say that the procedure was illegal. If so we should hand it over to a legal advisor.

Mr. Collins—According to the minutes no posts were created.

Mr. Hynes said he had discussed it with a legal adviser who said the proposal of Mr. Power should not have been accepted as the appointment of Secretary was a statutory appointment.

Mr. Walsh—Why did you get legal advice? Were you a bit doubtful? Mr. J. Griffin said the only issue to be decided was whether or not the minutes were a true record of what happened.

Mr. J. Power said that in his opinion the minutes of the meeting were correct and proper.

Mr. Collins said that supposing the Minutes were signed as a true copy of what transpired, could the matter be brought up again.

Mr. C. Curran said that he also was quite satisfied that the Minutes were a true record.

Mr. Griffin said it was utterly ridiculous to quote any legal opinion as no legal adviser could give an opinion on chaos. The "status quo ante" would have to stand.

Mr. Walsh said Mr. Griffin was very dramatic now, but wondered why he did not react similarly the last day.

carry his proposal. Mr. Griffin said they were back where they started before the meeting.

The Acting Chairman said he would not sign the Minutes until he got legal advice. Nor would he sign them while there was doubt in his mind.

Mr. Collins said the whole thing was out of order and suggested they adjourn until they had got legal opinion.

Mr. Walsh—I hold with Mr. Collins. I will not sign the minutes.

Mr. Collins—The legal advice Mr. Hynes got is not right at all.

Mr. C. Curran — I suggest we move carefully. If we adjourn the meeting it is possible we may be surcharged.

Mr. Walsh—The whole thing appears very fishy to me. It is a complete contradiction and you need not be a solicitor to see that.

Mr. Collins—My contention the last day, I propose we adjourn the meeting.

Mr. Jim Quirk seconded.

Mr. Walsh—I'll play safe and will not sign the minutes.

Mr. Curran said that when Mr. Power's proposal was passed no further amendment was in order but that did not say the minutes were not a true record.

Mr. Walsh said he believed there was something very fishy. He was not satisfied and would not sign them.

Mr. F. Roche said the position, as he saw it was that Mr. Power's proposal to create 10 posts was passed by nine votes to eight. The next thing to do before voting for anything else would be to rescind that.

Mr. Griffin said that in effect they were asked to create 10 posts that had already been created by law.

**A**T last Saturday's monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Committee of Agriculture many tributes were paid to Mr. J. J. Curran, Parish Agent, Ardmore, who has tendered notice of his resignation to the C.A.O., Mr. P. Conroy.

A letter from the Department's side that it was not in the best interests of Agriculture to have two different advisory schemes doing the same work in the County and they were going to scrap the Parish Agent scheme.

Mr. C. Curran said it was a step in the wrong direction to scrap such a scheme. He paid a great tribute to Mr. Curran and said his departure from the post was a great loss.

Mr. R. Walsh said the Dept. had given his decision and there was nothing they could do.

Mr. M. Harty said he would like to congratulate Mr. J. Curran, whose work was always magnificent.

Mr. W. Dower said Mr. Curran was always a most conscientious worker.

## IRELAND PRESERVED THE OLD MUSIC FORM — Lecturer

Ireland was unique in the matter of its music, stated Mr. Micheal O Ceallachain, B.Mus., Professor of Music, Rockwell College, Cashel, and former Lecturer in Music at University College, Cork. He was lecturing on "The Music of Ireland," under the auspices of Cumann Gaelach Iar-Dheise, at the Recreation Hall, Convent of Mercy, Dungarvan, on Thursday night last.

Ireland alone, said the lecturer, had preserved the old form of music which was common all over prior to the Renaissance.

Mr. O Ceallachain, who had a large and very attentive audience which included the Sisters of Mercy and the senior school pupils, illustrated his very interesting lecture with blackboard sketches, in addition to playing extracts from the piano and singing a number of songs. The proceedings throughout were held in Irish.

The Church will remain open on Holy Thursday night for some time after the evening services to afford an opportunity to the faithful to visit the Altar of Repose.

At the Friary: 6.30 p.m. Solemn Evening Mass of the Last Supper. Distribution of Holy Communion and procession to the Altar of Repose.

At Abbeyside: Mass and Holy Communion at 7.30 p.m. At Ballinroad: Mass and Holy Communion will be at 6.30 p.m., and the devotions of the Holy Hour will commence at 9 p.m.

**GOOD FRIDAY**  
Parish Church: 5 p.m., Liturgical Ceremonies and Children's Mass with Holy Communion. At 8 p.m., Stations of the Cross and Passion Sermon. Presentation of the Cross for veneration at the Altar Rails.

Friary: 4.30 p.m., Solemn Liturgy of the Passion and Death of Our Lord. The Readings. Prayers of the Faithful. Adoration of the Holy Cross. Holy Communion, 8 p.m., Stations of the Cross and Passion Sermon.

Abbeyside: Liturgical ceremonies commence at 4.30 p.m. with distribution of Holy Communion. Stations of the Cross at 8 p.m.

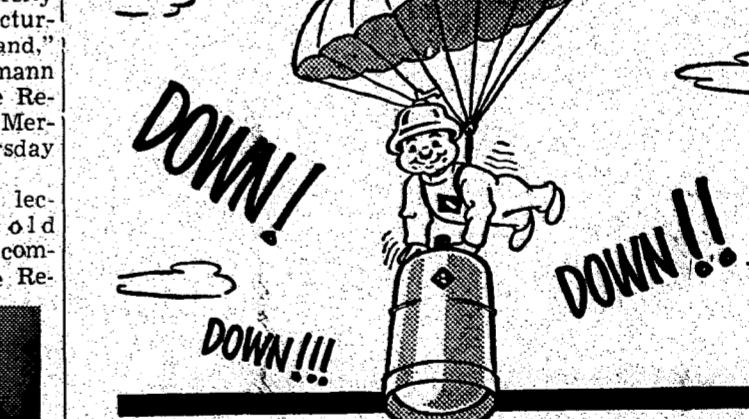

## 'Dunmore Councillor Was Neither Drunk Nor Irresponsible'

**A** STATEMENT concerning the marketing of Irish butter in England made at a meeting of Waterford County Committee of Agriculture recently by Mr. Milo Galgey, was subsequently raised in the Dail by Deputy Sean Ormonde and led to the Minister stating it was the statement of an irresponsible person.

But at Saturday's Agricultural meeting in Dungarvan, Mr. Galgey said he was neither irresponsible nor drunk when he made the statement and the Minister has obviously misinterpreted him.

Mr. Galgey said that what he had complained about was that butter sold over the counter in England as Irish butter was not in fact Irish and resembled far grease and he was also led to believe that their (Irish) butter was being blended in England. It was high time their commodities going on the English market were clearly marked as Irish and the same applied to Irish bacon, he said. The Irish abroad would buy their products if they were marked Irish.

The Chairman (Mr. John Fahy) said Mr. Galgey's statement drew a lot of publicity.

Mr. R. Walsh said twelve months ago Mr. Galgey's statement would have been correct.

Mr. Fahy said the statement made was that inferior butter was being sold in England and marketed as Irish.

Mr. C. Curran said that Mr. Galgey by his statement, had passed no reflection on Irish butter.

Mr. Galgey said the question was put to the Minister in such a way that he would reply to it the way he did. Neither would Deputy Ormonde have put the question the way he did had he read the local press.

The discussion then ended.

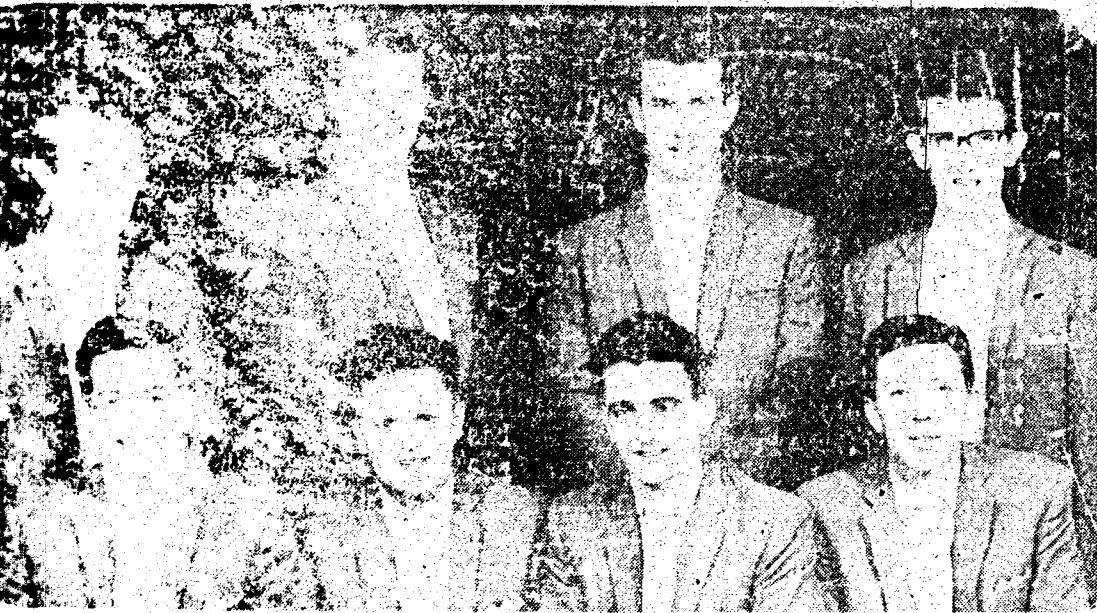

# Injury Claim Dismissed

A CLAIM for £600 for injuries received when the plaintiff Miss Lily Quinn, Church Street, Cappoquin, slipped while leaving the branch office of The Munster and Leinster Bank Ltd., on October 6th, 1958, was dismissed without costs by Judge Fawsitt, at Tuesday's Circuit Court in Dungarvan.

The plaintiff, Miss Quinn, said on October 6th, 1958, she was in the Munster & Leinster Bank Cappoquin for the purpose of cashing a cheque. The Bank was only a private house and a person would have to pass through a hall-way to get to the bank. There was a mat in the hall leading to the bank room. On the way out she put her foot on it and it slipped from under her and she fell forward and fractured her wrist. A Miss McGrath helped her up before the Bank Manager, Mr. Hutchinson, brought her into a room and offered her whiskey. She went to her own doctor and he advised her to go to Waterford for an x-ray. When she was in the room with the Manager he told her Mrs. O'Connor (owner of the house) was liable and not the Bank. In her opinion the floor on that occasion was highly polished.

In further evidence, Miss Quinn said prior to the accident she used pack and send antiques to a Mr. Rowan in California, who was a cousin of hers. She was paid at the rate of 10/- a box and her average weekly earnings were £6 a week. After the accident she was unable to tie the parcels due to a weakness in her hand. For 12 months after the accident she didn't do any work. Every Christmas she was given a gift of £20 by her employer but since the accident she hadn't received it any more.

Cross-examined by Mr. Crosby, B.L., defending, witness said she had been in the Bank on two or three occasions prior to the accident. On this occasion she slipped on the mat and fell forward. She denied tripping over the mat.

Mr. Crosby: This mat was not in the bank premises but in the porch. I must suggest to you the cause of the accident was that you were not keeping

a proper look-out.

To further questions plaintiff said the Bank Manager told her Mrs. O'Connor was liable. She kept no records of payments she received from Mrs. Rowan, and apart from her own evidence she had no proof that her weekly wage was £6. She was unable to do this type of work for twelve months after the accident.

To Judge Fawsitt she said after the accident the Bank Manager said he would help her in every way and that 'I would not be at the loss of a penny by it.'

Miss Esther Fraher said she had been in Cappoquin Bank several times. There was two mats in the hall and the flooring was polished. One of the mats was at the Bank door and the other at Mrs. O'Connors' premises. After the accident the mats were removed.

To Mr. Crosby, defending, she said no one had ever fallen on the mats before. She never thought they were anyway dangerous.

Dr. Robert O'Driscoll said he examined the plaintiff on October 6th, 1958. She had a collic fracture of her wrist with moderate displacement. The wrist was placed in plaster paris cast. The plaster was on for five or six weeks. On March 24th, 1959, he told her to resume light packing for two months. From March, '59 to February '60, he never saw her. She then complained of a pain when doing work. She said two months previously she could not do all the work and her nephew had to do the packing. To-day she had told him that she was getting occasional pain. Her condition would be consistent with a collic fracture.

Mr. Crosby (for the Munster and Leinster Bank) said there was no evidence of negligence on the defendants' part. The porch where the accident oc-

curred was common to both premises and because the floor was highly polished did not mean there was negligence. Neither was there evidence that the floor constituted unusual danger.

Mr. Peter O'Kelly-Lynch, a senior bank clerk, in Lismore, said he had been going to the Cappoquin Branch two days a week for almost fifteen years. He was in the Bank on the day of the accident and observed Miss Quinn leaving the premises. He heard a noise and then saw her being assisted to her feet outside in the hall. There was linoleum on the floor but he would not say it was highly polished. Mrs. O'Connor was responsible for keeping it clean but it was only polished rarely. In 15 years he never knew of anyone slipping on the mats or complaining about them and they had an average of 40 to 45 customers every day. After the accident no one from the Bank removed the mats as they were not the property of the Bank. The linoleum was also removed from the floor about two years ago by Mrs. O'Connor.

The written evidence of Miss Kathleen McGrath, Allen St., Cappoquin, was read to the Court by Mr. Crosby, B.L.

She said on the day of the accident she was in the Bank at about 11 a.m. She heard a person fall and she then saw Miss Quinn on the mat on the floor. As far as she knew the floor was neither polished nor slippery.

Mr. Crosby said again he would have to say the defendants had no case to meet. The evidence of Mr. O'Kelly-Lynch

and Miss McGrath stated that the floor was not slippery. It was not sufficient for the plaintiff to come in and say the floor was slippery and she slipped on the mat. He would submit that this was a case that should be dismissed.

Miss Skinner (for plaintiff) said the very fact that the linoleum and mats were removed after the accident suggested that there was something wrong.

Judge Fawsitt said the plaintiff claimed she entered the Bank premises to cash a cheque. He was satisfied she was there as an invitee. Coming out of the Bank she fell on the mat and fractured her wrist. The onus however, was on the plaintiff to satisfy him that the defendants were responsible. There was no evidence to show the condition of the floor immediately after the accident, the only evidence being that of the plaintiff herself. It would have been a great help to him if there was some other evidence to support that of the plaintiff and he was surprised the Bank Manager Mr. Hutchinson had not been called in evidence by one or other of the Counsel. He was uncertain and could not say whether or not the floor was highly polished. The onus was on the plaintiff to prove that. They had failed to do so and on those grounds he would have to dismiss the claim. He allowed defendants costs.

Miss G. Skinner (instructed by Farrell & Morrissey Solrs.) was for the plaintiff and Mr. Crosby, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. Goldberg, Solrs., Cork) was for the Munster and Leinster Bank Ltd.

afraid to lose the few shillings.

At this stage heated discussion and cross fire took place between Mr. Walsh and Mr. Gagey, and general disorder took place as many of the members tried to air their views.

Finally Mr. Walsh said he would not run away from his responsibility. The members would however, have to come up and force his hand to sign "Norman Walsh". If they decided to have the Minutes signed and he refused they would come down on him like a ton of bricks. Therefore he saw no reason for putting a proposal that they be signed to the meeting.

Mr. Curran said there was a lot more to it than the surcharging. At some stage it would have to be established if the document was correct. Now was the time to decide that.

Mr. Griffin said they should decide to-day. There was no point in going to a solicitor asking him what was the effect of the document. Nor would the Chairmans signature have any particular effectiveness.

Mr. Collins — The whole procedure was wrong.

Mr. Griffin — We are not asked if we approve of the procedure. We are asked if what is in the minutes is correct. Whatever about the procedure being bad at the last meeting, there is no doubt

that the procedure at this meeting is not correct.

Mr. Walsh said he would put the amendment (that they be signed) to the meeting but irrespective of the result he would not sign them.

Mr. Griffin — You are out order Mr. Chairman telling us what you will do before we take a vote.

Mr. Walsh — You needn't be so smart about it. You know my intentions very well.

Mr. Griffin — You are taking extraordinary liberties. It is not for the sake of the few shillings I will lose that I am voting to have the minutes signed.

The amendment to sign them was put to the meeting and passed by 11 votes to 4.

The voting was—For— M/s Gallagher, Curran, Foley, Foran, Roche, Cahill, Gagey, Madden, Power, Browne, Griffin (11); Against— Messrs Dower, Quirke, N. Walsh, Colling (4).

Mr. Dower said as one that had voted against the amendment he felt that now that the meeting had decided that they should be signed he failed to see how Mr. Walsh could be involved.

Mr. Walsh — I will not sign them until I get legal advice.

Mr. Griffin — We are now in a right mess.

Mr. Walsh — I am firmly convinced there is something wrong. Yet you want me to put my signature to something that is wrong. I will not do it. He then announced that the meeting stood adjourned to Wednesday next, April 25th.

# COMMITTEE CONSIDER REDUCTIONS

FOLLOWING a decision at the estimates meeting of the County Council to cut by £1,000 the expenditure of the County Committee of Agriculture for the 1962/3 financial year, the monthly meeting of the Agricultural Committee on Saturday last deliberated on possible reductions on the amounts of grant to certain schemes and shows.

The following suggested reductions came before the meeting for discussion: Subsidies to Shows, £200; fox destruction scheme, £140; shelter belt scheme, £200; seed potato scheme, £100; sheep breeding scheme, £440; experiments and demonstrators, £100.

Mr. Charles Curran said the decision of the County Council to reduce it by £1,000 was a complete necessity. The various organizations gave them no help whatsoever and only made a series of appeals.

Taking the suggested reductions in rotation, Mr. Michael

Harty said it would be harsh to take £200 from Show subsidies. He would be agreeable to a big cut but not 100% reduction.

Mr. Curran said he realised it was harsh but unfortunately they had no alternative.

It was then decided to cut the project by £200. This decision defeated a proposition of a £100 cut by six votes to 4.

Mr. P. Conroy said all the schemes there were suggested reductions were of considerable benefit to the public and they did not want to drop them. But now it was a case of necessity. At this stage it was agreed to cut by £200 and £100 the shelter belt scheme and the seed potato scheme respectively.


The C.A.O. said he would be very sorry to see the Sheep Breeding Scheme (for which a reduction of £440 was suggested) go.

Mr. W. Dower came in with the C.A.O. and it would be a disastrous step for agriculture. Mr. J. P. O'Connell said they were already committed to the sheep breeding scheme and it would be unfair to knock the sheep breeding scheme off his head now.

It was unanimously decided to make no reduction in the sheep scheme.


Mr. Conroy said as a result of the cuts he was left with very little in reserve should any emergency arise. However, there was no great harm for one year and he hoped they could restore these schemes next year.

Mr. Curran said everyone realised the position as at present but they could look to the future with great confidence.

Cappoquin 4-5; Dungarvan 3-3 Abbeyside 2-7; Colligan Rockies 3-2

CAPOQUIN won - and deservedly so, this first round Sargent Cup tie at Dungarvan on Sunday last, that was a dress rehearsal for the forthcoming championship. But if the Cornerstone side had a handsome enough winning margin, do not be misled into thinking their championship meeting at the same venue is a foregone conclusion. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Nor by this am I trying in any way to detract from a Cappoquin side that found themselves facing early adversity but had it in them to overcome two disasters of the opening five minutes and come back sufficiently well to score a well merited victory.

Merely am I trying to emphasise clearly the equality of the sides as I see it. Yes, I am fully alive to the fact that Cappoquin were the victors in their Sargent Cup encounter, but neither am I oblivious to the game's many merits when a little tinge of good fortune could have sent the gas flowing Dungarvan's way.

DRAB AFFAIR

Unfortunately it was yet another one of those drab affairs that seem to be the general trend of late. Neither side showed any outstanding potential and selectors on both benches have many headaches to solve before they meet again in the most important money of all.

No doubt greatest interest centred on the small but sunny figure of Dungarvan's former county star, Johnny Kiely. No one expects admiration from him on this his first outing with the club for many years, yet no one doubted the ability of this hurling dynamo to turn the game in the Blues favour.

GREAT GOAL

As expected he lined-out at full-forward and scarcely had the game been set in motion when he began to display the craft and skill that have earned him a reputation second to none. Shrewdly he placed colleagues for many likely scores that were not availed of, and as if further proof were needed he waltzed his way through for a great goal.

Indeed when Dungarvan raced into a 2-1 lead after only five minutes, thanks to Kiely's inspiring presence the Blues seemed headed for victory.

FELL APART

But just as dramatically as they had started, they suddenly and inexorably fell apart. Cappoquin gradually but with ever-increasing assurance took command and fought back so well that they turned over at half-time on level terms of 2-1 all.

Dungarvan men too must have fully realised the precarious position they were in. They had played with a strong breeze in that opening half and had the better of matters territorially. Yet, they could do no better than end the half on level terms.

They restarted with Kiely at mid-field and moved Tom Cunningham back to his best position at centre-back. But while both sides' hands still clung to the winning scores, yet Dungarvan were not without their chances in this period but they were seriously troubled Cappoquin's completely solid defence in which John Fraher stood out as the outstanding figure.

Towards the close the winners had assumed almost complete control an only sporadic Dungarvan raids helped to

But it is the firm belief of those that they have a genuine grudge with the decision of referee Liam Conboy in the game which decided them of a goal that would have sent them back into the wilderness in the second round. With only minutes remaining and Abbeyside fully extended to retain their slender lead, the Rockies were awarded a 21 yards free. Dick Tobin failed to rise the ball but cut it off the goal and the referee of all things gave a throw-in. It could surely have been only one of two things - a goal or a free - but this decision which had a serious look of arbitration or the "happy medium" about it was a difficult one to understand.

And yet even apart from that stroke of misfortune the losers should have had the game wrapped up. In the opening half when they found it breezy they succeeded in keeping closely in touch with the winners. Admittedly a positively brilliant Paddy Fitzgerald in goal was

Even if one were to forget the storied rivalry between these counties which is always the mainstay of excellent hurling when they clash, the present set-up guarantees top-class fare.
