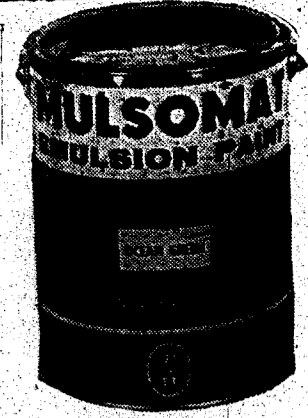

LATE MR. JOHN P. HURLEY

New York and Dungarvan

Profound regret was expressed throughout Dungarvan on Saturday last when the sad news of the unexpected death of John P. Hurley, in New York, became known. Deceased who formerly resided at Strand Street, Dungarvan, was a comparatively young man and his early demise has come as a great shock to all who knew him.

Before emigrating to the U.S. he served at home in the National Army. Previous to that he worked at Repps of Mee, Flynn, Main Street, and also with Waterford County Council. He also served in the American Forces in the last war.

In his native Dungarvan he was very popular and was a very keen G.A.A. follower. Of a quiet and gentle disposition, John P. endeared himself to all and on all sides but particularly by the old stock of the town, sympathy has been extended to his family and relatives in the Old Boro.

Since emigrating 35 years ago he never returned to Ireland but despite that he never lost his 'graft' to the homeland.

On the occasions of his funeral and burial in New York there were large and representative concourses present.

His last sympathy is extended to his wife, Catherine and his two daughters, Helen and Catherine, also his brothers, 'Eadly' (who formerly lived in Boreenatra) and sisters Mrs. C. Foran, New Jersey; Mrs. O'Keefe, Killosera.

YOUGHAL MEN FOR GERMAN TRAWLERS

The German Motor Trawler Biefeld made a brief call at Cobh on Saturday to take on seven Irishmen as crew members before resuming her voyage to Greenland where she will be engaged in fishing for ten weeks. Three of the seven were Youghal men, namely David Murphy, Liam Covey and Paddy Sullivan.

The ship is of 716 tons and was built in 1958. Three further Youghal men sailed on Monday morning from Cobh on the 1,000 ton German Motor Trawler Urzberg. They were Kevin White, Tommy Keogh and John Mahony.

In all, ten men from Youghal town have joined this fishing expedition, the first four to take off from Cobh last week were S. and M. Motherway (brothers), W. Murphy and C. Hennessy. Four ships of this German line called at Cobh during the week to collect a further 25 crew members.

COUNTY WATERFORD COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE CUTWORM ATTACKS ON CORN CROPS

Control of Leather Jacket and Cutworm pest attacks on corn crops may be obtained by the spreading of suitable bait over the affected area.

The Bait is made up by mixing Aldrex 30 or Dieldrex 15 with Bran at the rate of 1 pint per 2 stones of Bran.

Arkolite at 1 pint per 2 stones of Bran will give similar control. This amount of Bait will treat 1 acre of ground.

Water is sprinkled on the Bran until it feels slightly damp. The chemical is then thoroughly mixed through the Bran. The bait is best applied to the affected corn crop in the late evening.

Corn crops which have grown past attack would benefit now from a light top dressing of nitrogen to give up growth.

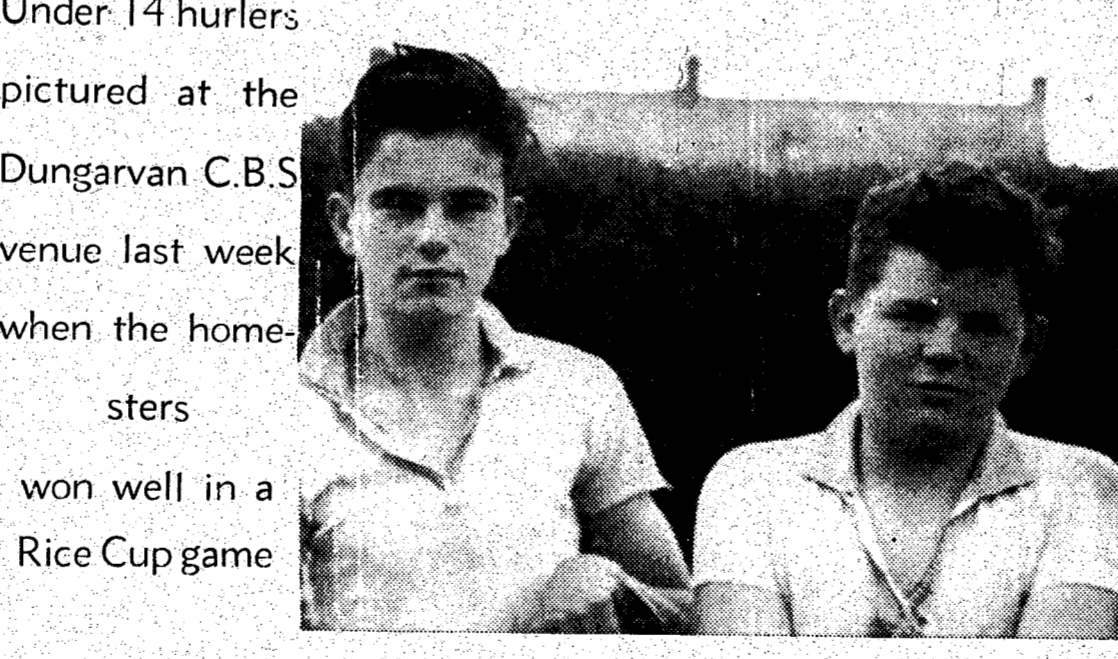

Poor Fare At Dungarvan

Faha - Old Parish Never Extended

Faha 3-5, Ballinameela 1-1
Old Parish 4-11, Tourin 0-3

ONLY a sparse attendance turned up at the Fraher Field, Dungarvan, on Sunday last where two Primary football championship games were down for decision. But the wisdom of those non-attenders was fully appreciated after two boring hours of football - the poorest two-game programme in fact that I have ever had the misfortune to sit through.

In the opening game, Faha, after a come-back after eight years experienced little difficulty in overcoming Ballinameela by 3-5 to 1-1 while Old Parish - easily one of the four teams on a rump home against a dejected and disoriented Tourin.

Where to start with these results is a problem in itself. The games were so far below that other than a brief synopsis of each would be uninteresting. It is however more sufficient to say that the other game will be remembered for the unfortunate onsets for very long.

The Faha-Ballinameela game, which personally I didn't expect too much certainly didn't present me with any pleasant surprises. For Faha, of course, the main object, victory, was achieved, but if this newly formed combination entertain any hopes of making this a year to remember, they will have to do infinitely better.

In fact, so disappointing were they in their championship debut that even they themselves must now realise that it will take a lot of hard training to come out on top.

Not that they didn't deserve this victory. On the contrary, they were far too good for the Ballinameela provided and weren't flattered by their ten-point victory.

Ballinameela, even before the game got under way, didn't feel confident about the out-

come. And with Jim Kiely and Roger Walsh crying off at the last minute their chances descended even further. Early on they looked quite capable of making a game of it but once their defence conceded soft scores their challenge inexplicably crumbled.

Faha, thanks to 2-1 late in the first half, led 3-2 to 1-0 at the interval and weren't seriously troubled to increase this advantage in a one-sided second moiety.

The winners were best served by Paddy Foley, Oily Harris, P. Hurley and McGrath, but only Dick Burke, "Roundy" Landers, Tom Murray, John and Mickey Cashman earned credit marks in an insipid Ballinameela display.

BRICKEYS HAD NO ANSWER TO COMERAGH POWER

Kilrossanty 1-5 Brickey Rangers 1-1

EVERYTHING comes to him that waits - So the ancient proverb says, and Kilrossantys perseverance was justly and richly rewarded at Dungarvan on Sunday last when for the first time since the now famous split, they succeeded in mastering the Brickeys and in doing so forced the coveted Phelan Cup to take its departure from Bushy Park after an unexpectedly brief stay.

It was a game with a championship-charged atmosphere and electrifying tension—one of the best in fact between the teams for a long time. But at the end of this exhilarating encounter, there was unanimous agreement that Kilrossanty deservedly dethroned the champions.

So now the game all Waterford was awaiting with abated breath has at last materialised—Kilrossanty v. John Mitchells—but, unfortunately for Western fans, the game has been fixed for Waterford, on 3rd June.

FEELING OF URGENCY
On Sunday last one could sense that feeling of urgency in Kilrossanty's approach to the game. Fending on the outcome was whether or not they would be afforded the opportunity of settling the parish dispute on the field of play, and their intent dedication towards the game left no doubt that they didn't relish letting such a chance by-pass them so readily.

The results of such determination were two-fold. Their ambition for a crack at the "other Kilrossanty" became a reality, and secondly, they gave the lie to the general feeling in certain quarters that for them the end of the road had been reached.

But, make no mistake about it, this was Kilrossanty football at its best. Their defence was superb under the severest of pressure; their mid-field pair were more than adequate, while the advent of Tom Flynn to the attack has greatly improved this hitherto troublesome sector.

NOT A SIMPLE TASK
Nor was their task a simple

for and wave after wave of attacks tested to the full the mettle of the Comeragh defence. In the tenseness of the exchanges tempers became frayed and Pat Walsh and Tom Walsh (Glendalligan) received marching orders from referee Con Crowley. The winners goal had some narrow escapes in this period of Brickey dominance, but all six Kilrossanty backs stood the test superbly. Then, as if confirming their superiority the winners broke away and made victory secure with a late point by Colum Cunningham.

THE SCORING
Straight from the start Brickeys swept to the attack and after a minute Ormond was called upon to save well from Hallissey. Kilrossanty, however, then took up the running and Tom Walsh (Gortavickory) game them the lead in the tenth minute with a point. In the 13th minute Tom Flynn pointed a free, and two minutes later came one of the best scores of the game when a movement involving Noel Walsh, Flynn, Timmons and Whyte, ended with the latter pointing. For the remainder of the half Kilrossanty continued to control the game, but the nearest they came to scoring was in the 25th minute when Jimmy Whyte sent a shot crashing off the crossbar, with goalkeeper Richie Whelan well beaten.

DECISIVE GOAL
Only two minutes of the second-half had elapsed when Kilrossanty stretched their interval lead to six points. "Bucko" Timmons did the outfield so-called work before parting to Colum Cunningham who blasted home a great goal. Five minutes later the Brickeys were decidedly fortunate not to fall further in arrears when Cunningham with goal at his mercy weakly fisted the ball straight to goalkeeper Whelan.

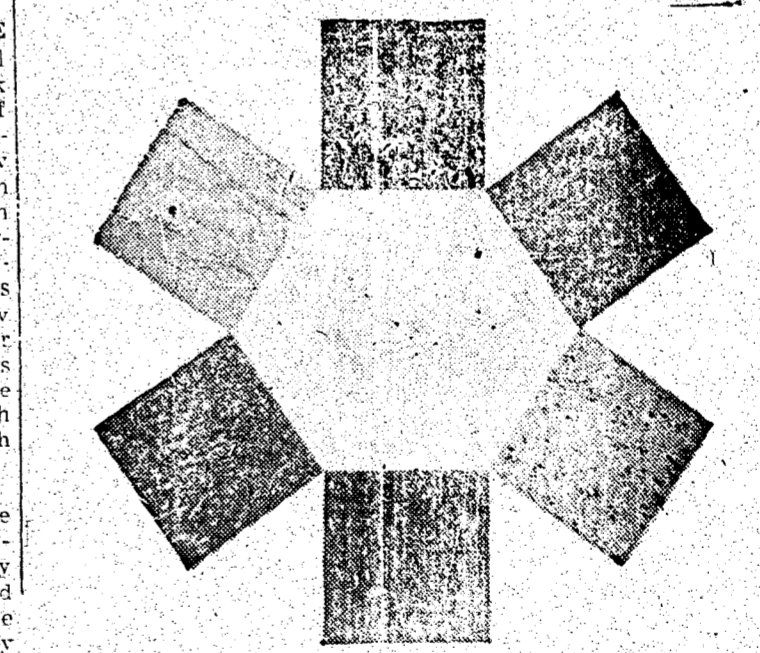
After Whyte and Justin Spratt exchanged points came the penalty award that gave Brickeys their only goal. Tom Foley was fouled by the Kilrossanty defenders, and Con Crowley immediately pointed to the spot. Without delving into the rights and wrongs of the decision, Justin Spratt, unperturbed by it all, coolly blasted the ball to the net.

HELD TO ONE POINT
The defence has never played with such positive assurance and their feat of holding the entire Brickey attack to one point from play speaks volumes for their ability.

At long last Matty Lonergan has come out of his shell and his fielding approached something near its old status. His corner men, Jimmy Maher and Tom Moloney also defended in rare style and behind this trio was Sean Ormond at his very best.

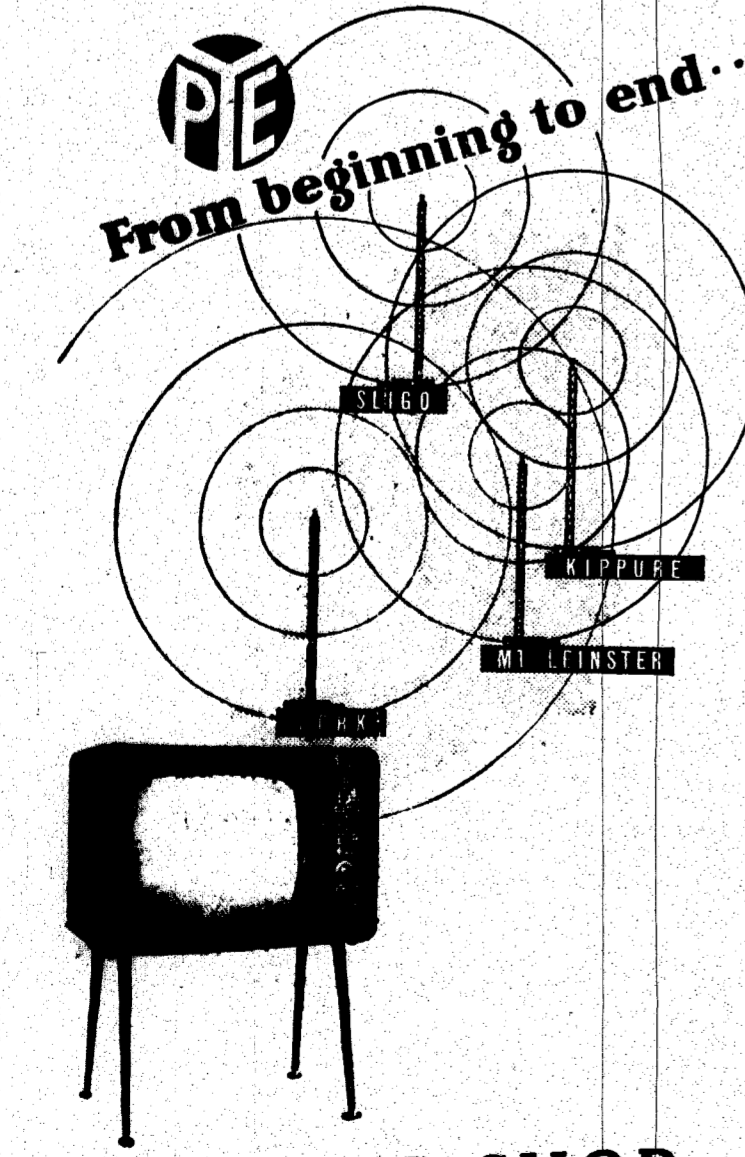

Championship Opens At Thurles WATERFORD CANNOT BE OPPOSED Clare Lack Vital Experience

SUNDAY IS "D" DAY FOR SENIOR HURLERS

The rocky road to Dublin, the end of which is reached on the first Sunday in September at Croke Park, is once again beckoning and the hurlers of Waterford and Clare will do battle on the famed Thurles pitch on Sunday next in an effort to shorten that long and testing road.

Straight away let it be said that I expect a Waterford victory—and a convincing one at that. But in the white heat of championship battle one never knows. This death or glory competition almost by tradition brings its annual shock results and for that very good reason, alone the Deise men would be well advised not to take too much for granted.

As matters stand however, Waterford are entitled to be regarded as the strongest of favourites. Their form in the National League—despite that set-back against Cork, has been impressive and now after a thorough training spell should be in the pink of condition. There can be no denying the fact that physical trainer Jack Frazer of Tallois has been, he has not each and every member of the panel through an exacting footlight, yet none of them show any ill-effects. One thing is certain, at any rate—the finest Deise team ever to leave the county will journey to the Thurles venue on Sunday.

What of Clare? Well, not for many years has the Banner County experienced such a lean and hungry era. To-day they are rated above only Kerry in Munster which is certainly a sad reflection on their status. But let us not give up hope just yet. They have a number of outstanding players, and as a team they are settling in well. As I write this preview to the game, however, on this date, there is hardly any need to say much more in this column. However, with nothing to lose and everything to gain, Clare can be expected to put everything into this one hour. And on the basis of that, I believe we could witness a far better game than most are expecting.

CLARE FIANCED IN MINOR TIE

The same Counties meet in the minor hurling championship which acts as a curtain-raiser to the senior game.

Down the years Waterford have been very poor in this grade and it has almost become an accepted fact that they will make their exit at the first hurdle.

This year, however, a thorough search has been made of the County in an effort to unearth the best possible material and recent challenge games have shown them up in good light.

But Clare, back-boned by Patsy C.B.S.—this year's Harty Cup winners and All-Ireland College runners-up—are expected to have an exceptionally good side and must start favourites to thwart Waterford's ambitions.

INTER HURLERS DISAPPOINT

The County's Intermediate hurlers were disappointed by the way side at Walsh Park on Saturday last and were well and truly trounced by Galway to the tune of 4-8 to 2-2 in the Munster semi-final.

Following their victory over

Kerry in the first round, Waterford were the general fancy to prevail on Sunday. But playing well below that Kerry form and against a Galway side that had class written all over it, they were never able to claim equality.

At half-time the Tribesmen led 2-5 to 0-1 and even if the second-half was more evenly contested there was never the slightest doubt that they would win.

On a disappointing Deise side the only ones to impress were Frankie Corcoran, Ned Fitzgerald, Vinny Long and the Ballymac pair Mick Connolly and Kieran Ryan.

BRICKEYS RELINQUISH PHELAN CUP

Brickey Rangers who only a few weeks ago won the 1961 Phelan Cup by beating Kilsossanty, relinquished their hold on that trophy on Sunday night last when they fell before a slick-moving Comeragh machine at the Fraher Field.

On all previous occasions this year there was no more than a flick of the ball between the sides but in this latest meeting Kilsossanty with a vintage display of quality football swept most easily to a 1-5 to 1-1 victory.

Mick down this Kilsossanty victory as an achievement worthy of the highest praise. They outplayed, outpaced and outwitted the Rangers for practically the entire game and vindicated for her my belief that with additional scoring power up front would be more than a match for the best.

And in left-half forward Tom Ryan, who seems to have the answer to the selectors' prayers, in this his first outing in his green and gold jersey. Ryan, with a deft touch, showed enough skill to suggest he is the man the attack so badly needed. So my warning now is: Beware, Kilsossanty are on the move.

Players of Clare, always played their part in making this a first-rate game. They had to fight without Patsy Donnelly and 'Shackamartin' Woods and though well beaten over the hour, never gave up trying. Towards the close they really opened up the play but by then the issue had been put beyond doubt and they got little change from a Kilsossanty defence that has never emerged from any game with such distinction.

And so the way is paved for the most exciting game of all—'Old' Kilsossanty versus 'New' Kilsossanty. John Mitchell's already the entire County is awaiting this clash and the game has been now fixed for June 3rd at Waterford.

LAST SUNDAY'S GAMES

Never have I sat through such a dismal fare as that served up in a two game Primary football programme at Duncannon last Sunday.

The Faha-Ballymacalla encounter which opened the afternoon proceedings was bad enough but the Old Parish-Tourin game which followed was even worse.

Faha won a very poor game by 3-5 to 1-1 against Ballymacalla's second string while Old Parish after leading 2-8 to 0-1 romped to a facile 4-11 to 0-3 victory over Tourin.

At Lisroece Ballyduff even without Mikey Quirk had little difficulty in beating the home-ers in the junior hurling championship. The Ballyduff hero was Brendan Coughlan, the county football star.

In the remaining game of the day, Clashmore before their own supporters scored a 1-8 to 0-1 victory over Kilgobinet in the Primary football championship.

POSTPONED

The Primary Hurling championship between Cappoquin and Dungarvan, which was arranged for the former's venue was postponed.

THE luring attraction that only the debut against Clare at Thurles, in a game that while none can anticipate defeat, very few would nevertheless dare discredit or underestimate the challenge of the Banner County.

Shock results have long become the life and soul of the championship. Hardly a campaign is completed without an average quota of upsets and it is this unlookable fact that will send Deise followers scurrying to the Mid-Tipperary venue in their thousands on Sunday.

To most neutrals the game may not be of any special significance, but within the confines of the immediate counties concerned, the game, and its likely outcome, has taken precedence over all else for the past week. Everywhere, except in Clare itself, followers are of the opinion that there can be only one result—a Waterford victory, and a clear-cut one at that. On the basis of current form such predictions are pretty well founded, but more than once before the axe has

help them in their mission. But any suggestions that Waterford may be caught napping can be scotched immediately. This Clare challenge may not be the most formidable possible, yet, under the tutelage of trainer Jack Frazer Waterford have prepared as diligently as though highest honours were at stake.

KIELY'S RETURN

A further boost to their morale is the return to the fold of 35-year-old Dungarvan veteran Johnny Kiely, whose last game in the county colours was in the replayed All-Ireland in '59. Since Kiely's all too premature retirement the No. 14 spot has been a constant headache to the selectors. Several have been tried and found wanting in the berth, and even ex-captain John Barron was given a try-out in the berth. But not one of the many experiments proved successful.

Then, in a recent Sargeant Cup game against Cappoquin, Kiely gave a masterly display in the Old Doris jersey and proved beyond argument that he was alone was the man for the job.

So when the selectors sat down on Monday night to pick the team, they not surprisingly opted for the grey-haired maestro. As yet he has not indicated that he will play for certain, but somehow I feel he will answer the county's call, for his presence alone on the team would be a tremendous psychological advantage.

NOT THE ONLY HEARTENING FEATURE

Kiely's return is not of course the only heartening feature of the selected side. The re-appearance of Larry Guinan and Tom Cheasty will be welcomed in most quarters, although the former's selection as mid-field partner for Joe Condon has come as something of a surprise.

He supplants club-mate Mick Dempsey, who can consider himself somewhat unlucky to be demoted to the subs, particularly after playing so well in the league quarter-final against Cork.

Over-all the team shows three personnel and two positional changes from the one defeated by the Leesides, Mick Dempsey, John Meaney and Mick Murphy (injured) are replaced by Larry Guinan, Tom Cheasty and Kiely, while Grimes, then on the "forty" moves over to the right, and John Barron vacates the full-forward spot to take over Mick

Not that one can deny them or even attempt to, their right to start firm favourites. The National League campaign just concluded proved conclusively that the county still remained close to the top in the code, and only by freakish misfortune

tune were they deprived of a place in the league final against Kilkenny.

In comparison, Clare's record makes dismal reading. Not since 1955, when they conquered Tipperary and Cork on their way to the Munster final, has the county stood in the hurling limelight. On a few occasions followers were given a minor flicker of hope, but always that hope was dashed by demoralising defeat.

To-day, their position is no better. In fact if anything there has been a further decline in their hurling standards—a decline that can only be halted by victory against Waterford.

THOROUGH WORK-OUT

Sunday's side has been given a thorough work-out however, and a series of challenge games may have had the desired effect. Their motto on Sunday will be one of "we have everything to gain and nothing to lose," and this in itself may

NO ALTERNATIVE

The failure of Colligan's Paddy Fitzgerald to impress in last Sunday's Intermediate game against Galway, left the selectors with no alternative but to call on Dickie Roche Against Cork. Roche was given any slips on Sunday night and the side facing a real uphill challenge.

No fact can be found with the back-up line of Tom Cunningham, Ausin Flynn, and Jim Byrne. The latter, if one is to judge him on recent displays is without a peer in this position, while Cunningham and Flynn by their performance should give no cause for concern.

One again the unpredictable Martin O'Morrissey commands the pivotal berth. On his day he is a class defender, but so long as he has his displays been of late that one can only take him on trust. Mick Flannelly was an automatic first choice at right-half, and few people are with the retention of Jim Irish on the opposite flank.

POTENT PARTNERSHIP

While Dempsey's omission is a surprise, the re-arranged mid-field partnership of Larry Guinan and Joe Condon is still a potent one. In fact the blending of toughness and skill could yet prove an ideal one. The 'Shin man' will carry out any 'softening up' work that may be required of him, leaving Condon to do the hurling of which he is so majestically capable.

Roche's on Tom Cheasty—back after a six months term of suspension has not been too encouraging. In training he showed signs of his long lay-off and all Waterford will be fervently hoping that the staleness will have deserted his hurling by Sunday. Phil Grimes should benefit considerably by his transfer to the wing and Frankie Walsh if in form could give the scoreboard operator a busy afternoon.

MAY ADOPT ROVING COMMISSION

The showman's craft and guts of Kiely will extend the Clare full-back line to the limit. Again he can be expected to adopt a roving commission and then place corner-forward Seamus Power, and John Barron for vital scores.

Barron's selection in the corner is however, mystifying and unless he makes an immediate impression may be replaced.

The Clare mentors were confronted with numerous problems when they sat down to select their side on Tuesday night in Ennis. Except for a few reliables who can hold their own in any company, the side for the most part is made up of newcomers to the rigours of an exacting championship encounter.

In Mick Hayes the Banner County are fortunate in having a goalkeeper of outstanding ability. For over a decade he has brilliantly managed his county's net and though now in his mid-thirties is still amongst the game's leading custodians.

EXPERIENCED TACTIC

The full-line of defence appears to be the most experienced sector of the side. Eam-

on Long, Ted O'Donnell of the Erin's Own Club in Waterford and Sean Cusky all being top-flight defenders.

The attack will be spear-headed by Ruane's Jimmy Smyth, one of the greatest forwards ever produced by the County but Naiose Jordan, Pat Henchy and Jerry Ryan have all proved their worth over the years.

But over-all the side doesn't appear to carry sufficient top-class material to upset the form book. Waterford are bound to benefit by the return of Kiely, Cheasty and Guinan and throughout most sectors of the field look far too experienced for the opposition. And on that count alone I make them the choice to prevail by a reasonably comfortable margin.
