SALMON NET SEASON CLOSES

At midnight on Tuesday, 31st July, the season for netting of salmon closed rather on a mild note. The catches for the last few days were nothing near what they had been for the past six weeks. Although salmon catches were estimated as being very poor, the net men were compensated adequately by a heavy run of grilse with odd salmon for the last two months of the season. One section of the fishing fraternity that did not reap the harvest were those in Ardmore where fishing operations were hampered by sharks that did untold damage to nets. The recorded catch in the Lismore fishery district for June was 1,946 salmon, 8,532 grilse and 235 sea-trout weighing 30 tons, 6 cwt, and 22 lbs., which is deemed to be a record catch for any one month. It is understood that July returns when available will exceed those for June. Rod anglers are said to have done badly so far due to the fact that salmon are unable to get to the upper reaches due to the low state of the river above Fermoy.

LATE MR. P. J. BRODERICK

Sincere regret was felt at the announcement of the sad and unexpected death of a well known member of the community in the person of Mr. Patrick Joseph (Joe) Broderick of "Monserat" and North Main Street, Youghal, which took place last week at the Ron Secour Home, Cork after a short period of illness. The deceased was father of Rev. John Broderick, C.C., and brother of the late William J. Broderick, a former T.D. and Chairman of the Cork Co. Council. The late Mr. Joe Broderick conducted a flourishing and successful drapery business in the town where he took an active part in its affairs. He is survived by his widow and two sons to whom sincere sympathy is extended in their sorrow. The remains were removed to St. Mary's Parish Church, Youghal where Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated on Saturday last after which the funeral, which was both large and highly representative, took place to North Abbey Cemetery.

DROWNING TRAGEDY

At about 12 noon on Monday last a 63-year-old man named Robert Hogan formerly of Cloyne, when driving a horse and cart on the old metal Bridge in Youghal, accompanied by his two nephews, stopped the cart and was seen

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to fall over the bridge railing on the Youghal side which is about 5 feet in height. After a short struggle he then disappeared under the water. At the time of the accident there was a very strong ebb tide running and a strong south east wind. The gardai and civilians together with relatives searched for the body which was not recovered up to the time of going to press.

ARMY BAND RECITAL

At Redbarn Ballroom on Saturday night last a recital by the Band of Southern Command was given, conducted by Capt. Kealy, B.Mus. There were over 500 present at the recital which was thoroughly enjoyed and appreciated. The conductor and members of the band received a standing ovation. Prior to the playing of the National Anthem Col. Curran, O.C. Southern Command thanked the audience for their attendance at the recital and said it gave them much pleasure to perform for the people of Youghal. Continuing he said they were not likely to forget the generous people of the town and what they did for the troops in the Congo. He also thanked Capt. Kealy and the members of the band.

COWS ELECTROCUTED

Over the week-end three valuable cows owned by Mr. P. Shanahan of Gortecoran, Ballymacoda, were found dead in a cow house on the farm by the owner's wife. It is understood that the animals, valued at £200, were electrocuted.

GERMAN TRAWLER LANDS YOUGHAL MEN

Over the week-end last of the Youghal men who signed on German trawlers for fishing off the Greenland coasts, were landed at Cobh from the "Wurzburgh" after a 58 day trip when they took 480 tons of cod. The men were Thomas Keogh, Kevin White and John O'Mahony, all of Youghal. They said the trip was tough, working 18 hours out of the 24, and that it was a great experience.

At the current High Court Sitting in Cork a settlement was announced in the case in which Michael John Covehey of Youghal sued William Hennessy of Mounton, Ballymacoda for injuries including a fractured thigh, severe head and facial injuries sustained when he was knocked down by defendant's car on December 5th last. The plaintiff agreed to accept the sum lodged in court, £1,306, in settlement of his claim plus £200 towards his costs. 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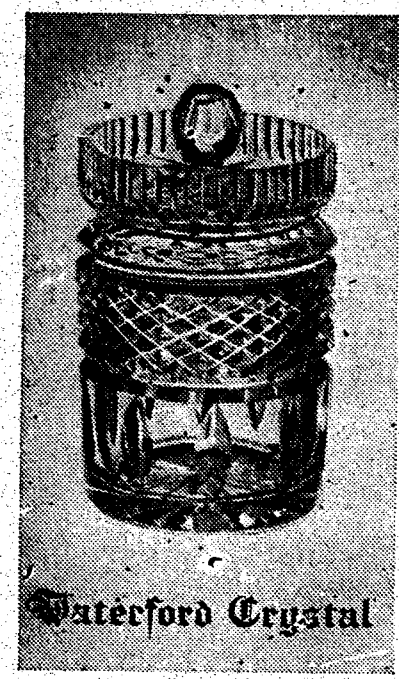

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Classic Victory for Kilrossanty

Kilrossanty 1-12 Emmetts 0-5
NOT once nor twice but on innumerable occasions have Kilrossanty sides proved the scribes and critics wrong during the past decade or so of championship football. And as one watched the present Comeragh side advance in majestic-like fashion to the second round of the senior championship by decisively beating Emmetts 1-12 to 0-5 at Dungarvan on Sunday last, the more obvious it became that when the chips are down there will always be a Kilrossanty to contend with.

Short established regulars Matty Loneragan, Jimmy Maher, Bucko Timmons and Pat Flynn (who has however, returned to an alien code after a brief reinstatement) these Comeragh men put on a performance that must have opened wide the eyes of all remaining championship contenders.

INVINCIBLE
Many and varied are the methods that have been used to counter-act the Kerry-style football of catch and kick. But as Kilrossanty—whose tradition it is to exploit this brand of play, almost flawlessly displayed it in all its phases when sweeping to this ten-point victory, the firmer was my contention that when displayed at its best, it is a near invincible football style.

The Comeragh men haven't played as devastatingly since they won out the championship in 1960. Their defence revelled in high dropping balls and only once was goalkeeper Sean O'Rourke called upon to exercise himself in saving.

At midfield the position—that of Kilrossanty superiority—was just as pronounced. Emmetts as inspired Tom Flynn did as he liked with the ball and ensured that Emmetts would be toiling in the sector for the hour.

Up front, the Kilrossanty forwards, without Timmons, were always dance-cous. They continuously probed and often pierced the lesser suspect rear-guard, and as many classic points were lofted over, the less anxious team followers became about them.

DISAPPOINTED
In contrast Emmetts disappointed. For one thing they at all times tried to take that little too much out of the ball and invariably came unstuck in their movements. This fact is particularly applicable to their first-half display when as a result several likely scores were lost.

Little wonder then that they trailed 0-9 to nil at half-time. Admittedly, Kilrossanty had the advantage of whatever breeze there was, but it was clear to all and sundry that this advantage played but a small part in the running up of their three goal lead.

During this period, Emmetts, despite being outplayed, never gave up, but much of their work was nullified by their continued over-elaboration. During the interval recess it was, on reflection as obvious as night must follow day, that bearing an abnormal turn of events Emmetts were booked for defeat.

The manner in which they accepted defeat set a headline for all others to follow.

FIRST MINUTE LEAD
Kilrossanty wasted precious little time in going about their task and within a minute Tom Flynn potted, while, "Cheasty" Loneragan (2) Flynn and Begley added further points before Flynn had one of the best scores of the game when he pointed a free from what appeared to be an impossible angle. Left-half back Noel Walsh moved up-field in the 24th minute and availed of a poor clearance to point another spectacular point by Flynn in the 27th minute made it 0-9 to 0-0 at half-time.

Flynn was again on the mark three minutes after the interval from a close-in free before Dick Tobin opened Emmetts' account with a like score in the sixth minute. Four minutes later "Cheasty" Loneragan put the issue beyond all doubt with a well-taken goal and second later White tacked on a point. Points by Dick Tobin in the 13 and 14th minutes and Paddy Walsh in the 24th minute erased some of the lopsidedness from the scoreboard and just before the end Flynn from a free and Walsh exchanged points.

FLYNN'S DISPLAY
While the game itself will not hold a cherished place among any of the "greats" the midfield display of the winner Tom Flynn was one of the times I have seen for quite some time. His handling and kicking and indeed his general approach had an unmistakable stamp of class about it and his deadly marksmanship put his finishing touches to a regal performance.

His partner, Tom Walsh (Gendalligan) was for once outshone in the sector but what he accomplished was thorough and with Flynn proved an unbeatable partnership.

DEFENCE IN ITS ELEMENT
Even without Matty Loneragan and Jimmy Maher, the defence was in its element, reaching "to the clouds" for aerial balls. Mick Pender who took over from Loneragan at full-back was the rock on which many an Emmetts' attack perished and Noel Casey who replaced Maher and Tom Moloney were equally good.

As with many renowned players, Jimmie Power seems to improve with age. At all times he was master of Eddie Brett and kept urging on the side to greater heights. Young Noel Walsh gave yet another vintage display at left-half and if Tony Baldwin wasn't his customary brilliant self, he made few if any costly mistakes.

BEST OUTING FOR SOME TIME
Plied by Flynn and Tom Walsh, the Comeragh forwards enjoyed their best outing for a long time. Nedeen Loneragan drafted from midfield for the first time was an outstanding success and bagged 1-2. Paddy Fitzgerald and Jimmy White, veterans though they may be, linked up effectively between the centre and full-forward berths respectively and "Gort" Walsh, Colum Cunningham and Denis Begley ably completed a successful sextet.

REFLECTED
Emmetts eclipse is reflected on their heavy defeat. Endeavour alone was far short of the necessary requirements on this occasion, and gallantly though they tried, there was never any real doubt about the outcome.

confidently throughout and Garry Quinlan, Jack Kiely and Jim Cliffe were the stars of an overworked defence. 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
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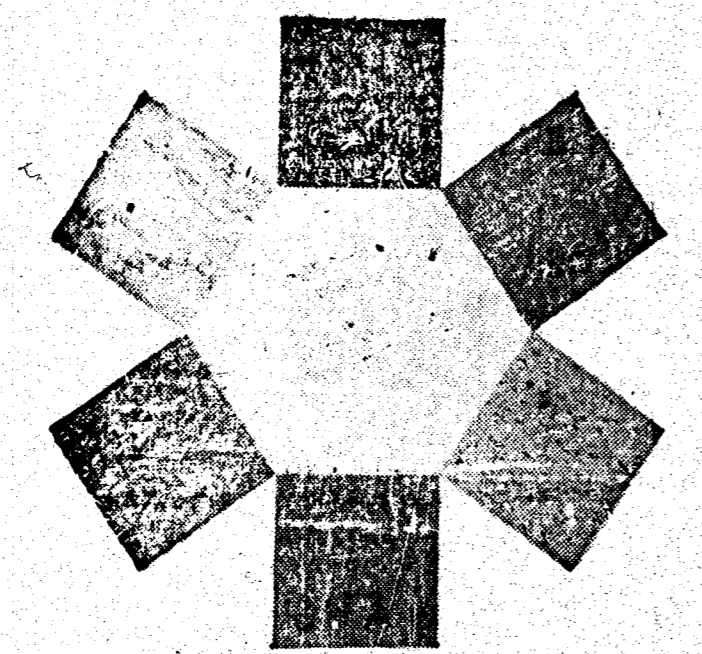
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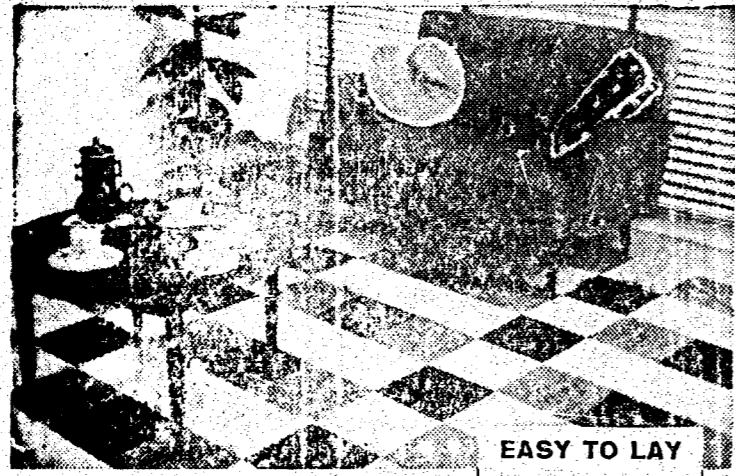

N.F.A. NEWS

Output Up Income Down

Farm output reached a new high record of £211 million in 1961 or £134 million more than the 1960 figure. When pointing out this in the course of his speech in Dail Eireann on the Estimate for his Department, the Minister for Agriculture reported as giving the impression that farmers never had it so good—that in fact last year was their best ever.

This rosy picture must surely be the cause of much bewilderment among farmers, who are only too well aware from their own experience and from the indisputable facts and figures produced by N.F.A. that the position in regard to farm income is far from satisfactory. It is noteworthy that the farmers' interpretation of the position is supported by no less competent and knowledgeable authorities than the Agricultural Institute and the Economic Research Institute. The latter has forecast a further drop in farm income for 1962.

The Minister could have thrown some light on this apparent conflict of opinion if he had pointed out that although farmers have increased their output and their productivity, they have not benefited in proportion to their efforts. Reduced prices for farm produce, coupled with rising costs on all sides, have seen to it that the value of the extra output has been siphoned off by other sectors of the economy.

This has been said many times by the N.F.A. but it is necessary to keep this basic truth before the public mind. It is not being rewarded for their labour in accordance with recognised principles of social justice, but to imply that they have no cause for complaint will certainly not improve matters, to say the least of it.

FIGS COMMITTEE DEMANDS ACTION

The first meeting of the newly elected National Pigs and Bacon Committee was held in N.F.A. House during the week at which the Committee outlined its programme for the coming year. As might be expected at this time a good deal of emphasis was laid on marketing and the re-organisation of the industry to meet competition in the likely event of our joining the Common Market.

Dissatisfaction was felt at our slow progress in providing the country with the necessary facilities for progeny testing, particularly in the light of the increased work which the Danes are doing in this field. We are almost as far behind there now as we were in 1958 when we built our first Progeny Testing Station.

It appears to us that we have not yet got over our marketing problem and we look to the Pigs and Bacon Commission to rectify this position.

SURPLUSES DISRUPT WORLD MARKETS

It is a pleasure to read the speech of a Minister for Agriculture and discover that we can find little fault in either sentiment or form. The speech was made by M. Pisani, French Minister for Agriculture and a key figure in the European Community negotiations.

We quote as follows: "The problem of organising world markets crops up everywhere. Firstly, because of the disproportion which exists between the relative volume of surpluses and the effect which they have on world markets. It also occurs because of the lack of balance which the present system of organising world markets creates between the developed industrial countries and the others. It is useful therefore to look at world markets so that we can weigh the value of some liberal economicists who dispute the powers which we have (or which we have not) of tackling the problem.

"Research shows that what is often a very small surplus has effects on the world which are very considerable. What one calls 'world market' is really the market for surpluses. All the quantities necessary for feeding the producers' home markets are outside the 'world market.' This must be understood where there is no world market which covers all the production, but where there is a world market it has the effect of a world market which has ten controls contradictory to the world market.

"Let us take some figures and I shall quote only the products for which organisation of the market seems desirable or necessary: "In wheat the surpluses, as I have defined them, reach only 15% of production. The price on the world market of this wheat doesn't reach 70% of the price received by the producers. "For coarse grains the surpluses are hardly 5% of production and the price does not reach 70% of the lowest European Price. But these coarse grains are of decisive importance, not only in their own right as a market but because they are the basis of animal production and the greatest need of the underdeveloped countries, the underdeveloped countries."

"In sugar the surpluses sold on the world market hardly reach 12% of world production and the price 40% of the world price. The French price is about £6 per quintal. Following the difficulties between Cuba and the United States the price on the world market fell to 30% and has now risen to about £3.

"In beef the surplus is 10% of production. Meat entering the world market (frozen meat) is sold at 45% of the normal price. In milk products the surpluses are of the order of 10% and when France exports a kilo of butter she puts in the box with it three-fifths of its value. In total there is about 45% of losses when it goes on the world market. "These figures are obviously designed to give an order of magnitude; they may be different from region to region and country to country as from month to month. But they highlight the extraordinary disproportion which there is between the volume of surpluses on the world markets which are completely artificial. I should add to all this the charges for storage both in handling and financing. We know that the American surpluses are in the order of £60,000,000 per day. "But with the present system we are facing the poor countries which export to restrict their production and we are even affecting the rich exporters. The first countries to give up production are the poorest, those who have the greatest need to produce but who, because they do not sell at remunerative prices, will stop

producing. Even the rich countries America and Canada are going the road of restriction. "While the world is hungry we have set on foot a system which reduces the production of food in the world but we are going still further. The system leads to the pauperisation of agriculture and in particular of the poor countries, because you succeed in selling on the world market only if you can sell on the home market at high prices. It must be realised that continuing in this road we will precipitate agricultural revolutions."

M. Pisani went on to discuss the moral and political objections to restricting food production when the world has 500 million people hungry and while population rises 45 million a year food is produced for only an extra 35 million.

DISCOUNT SCHEME EXTENDED

In response to many requests from N.F.A. members we are pleased to confirm that Bord na Mona has agreed to continue the rebate on peat briquettes until the end of August. Members who purchase at least four tons of peat briquettes (in two lots if preferred) can obtain a refund of 7/6d per ton on making application through the local N.F.A. Branch Secretary.

An offer of special terms on bulk purchases of machine turf by N.F.A. members has also been made by a Co. Sligo firm. This will apply to farmers in Sligo, North Leitrim, West Roscommon and North Mayo. N.F.A. Branches in those areas have been supplied with details of the scheme.

PESSIMISM GAVE WAY TO SUCCESS

The following extract from the recent Annual Report of the N.F.A. National Honorary Treasurer, Mr. T. Finegan, will have a special meaning for his counterparts at Branch level, and indeed for all who have helped to bring the Association to the successful position which it occupies today as the voice of Irish farmers.

"The road to success during the past seven years which might be considered the formative years, was not an easy one. The obstacles were many and at times appeared unsurmountable. Pride, prejudice, personalities, fear of our success from other sections and even from within the ranks of our own agricultural industry and community, false interpretation of our objectives and last but by no means least, lack of capital to develop our policies, appeared at every turning on the road and marred our way. Entering forsaken territory, we had to start not even from ground level but from a background of inertia and pessimism, groping, feeling our way, but still progressing. Today I believe, we are well up the ladder of success.

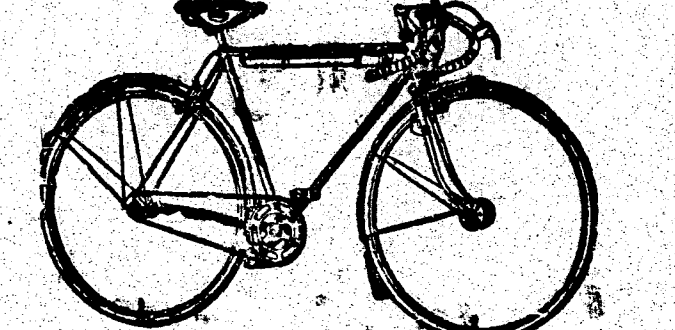
"We now look forward to full membership of the Farming community in the N.F.A. each farmer paying his fair share in financing the mechanism of the solution of the problems of low farm income. LIMERICK HERE WE COME

The stage is set, preparations have ended, and in a matter of days, the most talked of Munster hurling final in years will be under way.

Not for a decade or more has a game whipped up such interest and enthusiasm as Sunday's clash of Waterford and Tipperary at the Ennis Road grounds, Limerick. Indications point to a 50,000 plus attendance, and a game that will set a fitting seal on the South's hurling calendar for '62.

Tipperary-Waterford rivalry, friendly though it may be, is amongst the keenest in the game. Prevailing is a healthy respect for each other, each inwardly knowing the strength of their opposites.

In recent years championship encounters between the counties have resulted in one-sided and unequal tests of hurling skill. In '58 and '60 it was proverbial cake-walks for Tipperary, while '59 blue-printed one of Waterford's greatest hours when they humiliated the then All-Ireland champions by 9-3 to 3-4.

If ever there is to be a change from this trend of things however, then Sunday is surely the day. Whatever course one chooses to take in summarising the game, there will always be ques or marks and doubts as to the likely outcome.

In certain sectors Tipperary would appear to hold the edge, but likewise on paper at any rate Waterford also seem to have the whip-hand in other positions. But overall the position of the relative sides seems to be one of all-round equality.

Thus with supreme confidence do I predict a titanic struggle for the title. Tipperary as holders may be slight favourites, but Waterford mindful of their own brilliance when vanquishing Cork remain unperturbed.

To the victors goes the added privilege of qualifying for the All-Ireland Final against Wexford, on September 2nd. Already three of last year's senior finalists—Down, Offaly and Dublin have fallen by the wayside. Tipperary being the sole survivors in this year of fallen champions. Will Sunday see the grand slam in this fall of the mighty or will Jimmy Doyle and his men prove the execution to it all? Time alone will tell.

● LAST SUNDAY'S GAMES

Kilrossanty, looking a better side than at any stage since the "big split", overwhelmed Emmetts 1-12 to 0-5 in the senior football championship on Sunday last.

Although Kilrossanty had to field without Matty Loneragan, Pat Flynn, Jimmy Maher and "Bucko" Timmons, the manner in which they disposed of a brilliant but inferior Emmetts side must re-install them as strong championship contenders again.

Their defence, in which Mick Pender ably stood in for Loneragan at full-back, was almost impregnable and held their opposing attackers scoreless for 26 minutes. At mid-field Tom Flynn gave a magnificent display and wound up with no less than six points to his credit.

The winners forward-line always moved in unity, and picked off some wonderful points particularly in the opening half.

Emmetts, though beaten to a frazzle for most of the game never ceased to give of their best and accepted defeat in a sportsmanlike manner.

BALLYDUFF AND FOURMILEWATER WIN

As a result of stirring games at Cappoquin and Lismore the way is now clear for a Ballyduff-Fourmilewater (holders) Western junior final. At the Cornerstone venue Ballyduff had but two points to spare over Ardmore in a game that hung in the balance for the hour, while Fourmilewater somewhat fortunately beat Kilgobinet 3-7 to 2-5.

In this latter game Fourmilewater had many anxious moments against a Kilgobinet side that displayed remarkable enthusiasm. Right through the game it was the challengers who called the tune and with only six minutes to go tenaciously, but not undeservingly held a slender lead.

But then, the possibility of their title being stripped from them now entrenched in the category of grave, the champions made their final game-saving effort's. Under all-out assaults Kilgobinet's defence wilted and conceded the scores that under-lined the difference between success and defeat.

It was a truly memorable game, productive of many splendid passages of caman craft at the highest level, and thankfully waged in an exemplary sportsmanlike manner.
