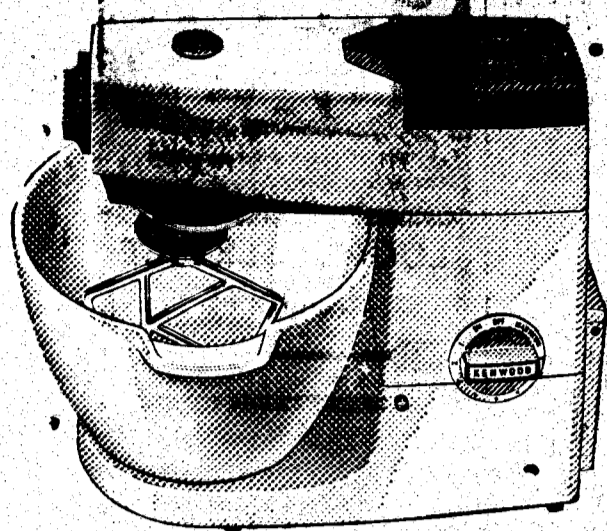

The Edible-Nest Swiftlet

The Edible-Nest Swiftlet is a native of the Far East but closely resembles our own Swift. The Chinese prize their nests as a great delicacy and are prepared to take considerable risks gathering them. The nest is small and pouch-like which the bird makes from the thickened mucus which is supplied by an outside salivary gland. They are built high up on the walls and roofs of great caves. The first nests which usually fall prey to the next hunters are white, translucent and of a fibrous texture which the bird weaves in a criss-cross fashion and looks like meringues. The second crop of nests is not so highly prized as the bird is running out of saliva and is forced to stretch the mixture, by adding grasses, hair and feathers.

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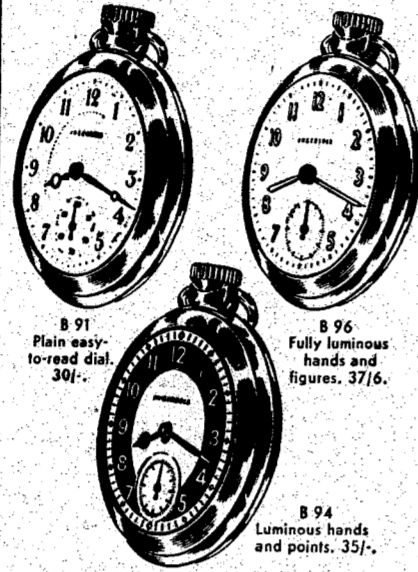

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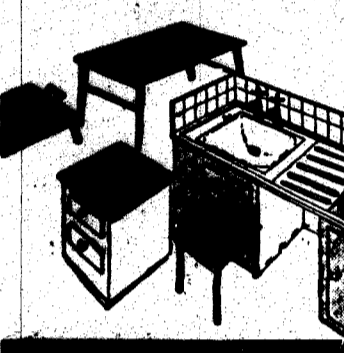

**BORD NA MONA
FORGE AHEAD
Record Output and
Revenue**

Bord na Mona had an operating surplus of £910,296 for the year ended 31st March, 1962. This is £74,628 more than in the previous year. Interest charged against this surplus amounted to £710,112 (up £114,188) and depreciation £294,722 (up £19,478), making a total of £1,004,834, so that there was a net deficit on Revenue Account of £94,538. This is the position shown by the Board's Report and Accounts just published. During the year the Board paid into the Exchequer a total of £1,072,673 made up of £801,060 for interest and £271,613 in respect of repayment of State advances. The total amount, which has been paid by the Board to the Exchequer to the 31st March, 1962, amounts to £6,002,751, being £4,480,602 in respect of interest and £1,522,149 for Production.
Production for the year was 2,179,923 tons of machine turf and milled peat, 207,465 tons of briquettes and 258,746 bales of peat moss. The figures for machine turf, briquette and peat moss production were the highest yet achieved in any year. Over 80 per cent of the peat moss produced was exported.
TURF FOR E.S.B.
Over 1,300,000 tons of turf were sent to electricity generating stations. Deliveries of machine turf to the stations at Portarlington, Allenwood and Lanesboro' amounted to 516,559 tons while 818,158 tons of milled peat were delivered to Ferbane and Rhode stations.
CAPITAL WORKS
The second new briquette factory at Croghan, Offaly, was completed and officially opened during the year. Work on the bogs and development continued and satisfactory progress was made. The amount of capital which the Board may borrow was increased from £19,000,000 to £24,000,000 by the Turf Development Act 1961.
Briquettes were freely available and sales increased by 50 per cent on the previous year's figure. The export of milled peat to Great Britain for use in various industrial applications continued. The export value of the peat moss, milled peat and briquettes exported was approximately £250,000. Increased wages forced the Board to review its price structure and some increases in prices were necessary. This was the first increase in the price of machine turf sold to the public since 1955. The new export price of loose briquettes is the same as that charged ten years ago.
Revenue from sales amounted to £4,315,978, the highest in the Board's history. The number of the Board's employees at peak was 7462.

MEETING**

Mr. S. O. Maoldomhnaig, Chairman, presided at a meeting of the County Board G.A.A. held at Dungarvan on Monday evening.

**APPLICATIONS FOR
RE-INSTATEMENT**

Twelve applications for reinstatement to the G.A.A. from former members of the Dungarvan and Abbeyside soccer clubs were deferred until the next meeting of the Board, pending investigation of the dates given on the applications. Mr. Seamus Power said that it was doubtful if the dates given were the last dates on which the applicants had played soccer as newspaper reports of junior soccer games played less than three months ago included the names of some of the people who had now applied and who should have been six months away from the game. After a long discussion on the matter it was decided to agree to have the dates examined before the next meeting.

INVESTIGATION

The Board agreed to a request by the Western Board to hold an investigation into the cause of the eruption in the junior football game between Clashmore and Shamrocks at Cappoquin on July 22nd. In the application for the investigation the Western Board stated that players and spectators were involved and that one of the clubs concerned had requested the investigation. This investigation will be carried out at the next meeting of the County Board on Sept. 10th.

OIREACHTAS TOURNAMENT

The Board unanimously agreed to accept an invitation to play in the Oireachtas tournament in which Tipperary, Wexford and Kilkenny will also take part. The application stated that the first game will be played on Sept. 16th or 30th but it did not give the pairings.

DATE CHANGED

At the request of the Board, the Western Board officers agreed to change the date of their junior football final between Valley Rovers and Ring from Sunday, August 26th to Sunday Sep. 16th. This request was made in order to facilitate their laying of the minor and juvenile finals.

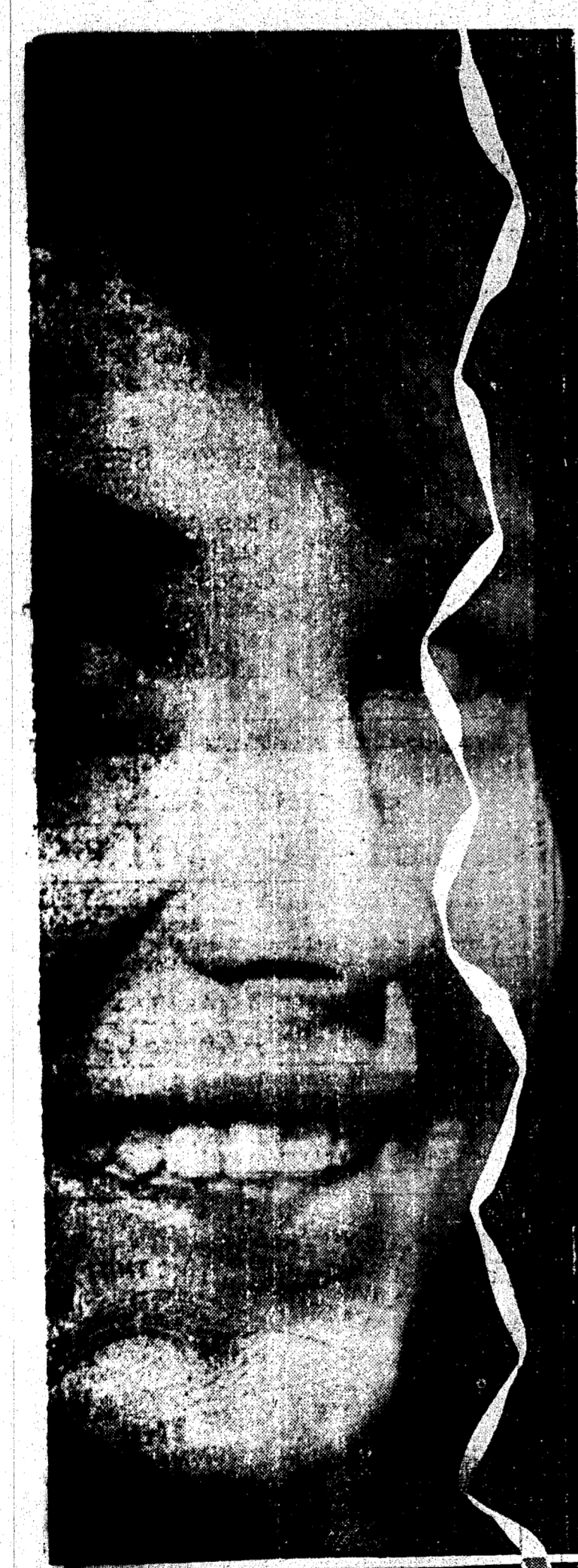

IN the dourest senior football game of the current championship, Brickeys conquerors of county champions, Mount Sion, in the first round, and John Mitchels the newly formed side from Kilrossanty, failed to reach a decision

It was a tough, robust game where good football was at a premium. 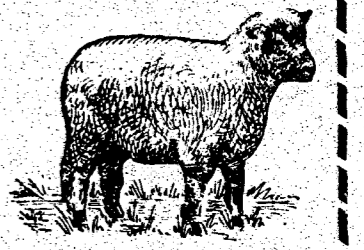
