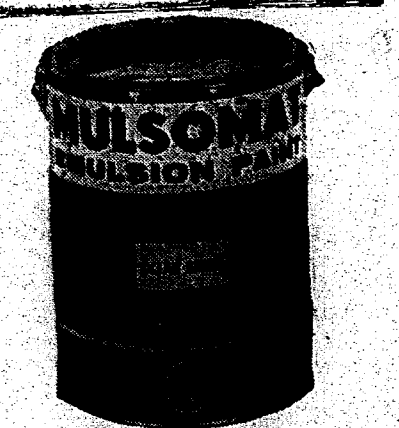

# Unofficial strike continues

**OVER 200** workers employed by Dungarvan Leathers, decided at a special meeting on Monday night to take unofficial strike action on Tuesday. They were due back to work on Tuesday after their annual holidays.

The firm indicated that on the resumption of work after the holiday period over fifty men would be laid off. Notice was sent out to some of the men not to resume work until notified.

## MANAGEMENT'S STATEMENT

A spokesman for the firm gave our reporter an outline of the plan envisaged by Dungarvan Leathers Ltd. stating that the amalgamation of the D.L.C. Co. Ltd. and Bhlana Tanneries, Dublin, took place to gear themselves to be able to compete with German, French and other tanneries in the Common Market. With this end in view they have erected new buildings here and are now engaged in the placing of machinery together with the addition of new machinery to streamline production.

The spokesman assured our reporter that the words "dismissal" or "redundant" should never have been used in any description of the present dispute. The word "delay" should be the operative word.

They had done their best during the holiday period to get the machinery lined up according to plan but as this is not yet completed they are not in a position to take back all the men.

When they were back in full production the spokesman assured our reporter that all the men would be taken back and probably more.

It has come to notice that some confusion has arisen in regard to the interpretation of one of the points mentioned in the address given by the Taoiseach to Muirfin na Tire delegates at the Rural week in Thurles on Tuesday, August 14th. In referring to loans on favourable terms to be made available to land holders in the West who would sell their holdings to the Land Commission to enable them to buy farms elsewhere in the State, the Taoiseach mentioned that these terms would include freedom from interest and postponement of capital repayment in the early years. This has been interpreted by some newspapers as meaning that the loans would be free of interest throughout.

## Govt. Interest in Small Farms

### SMALL FARMS STATEMENT

Following a meeting held in Enniscorthy, Co. Mayo, attended by delegates from the Western County Executives on the subject of small farms, this statement was issued:—  
"The meeting welcomed Government interest in small farm problems, as shown in the Taoiseach's address to Muintir na Tíre last week. It particularly welcomed:—  
(a) Government recognition of 40,445 acres of good land as being the minimum required under present prices and circumstances for an economic unit. (Economic Unit being the size of farm able to give a living to a farmer and his family.)  
(b) The new approach to resettlement of farmers in less congested areas.  
(c) The promise of a scheme of loans, on favourable terms, which will include freedom from interest and postponement of capital repayment in the early years.  
(d) The proposed formulation of new schemes of loans through the Agricultural Credit Co-operation, for the special benefit of small farmers to enable them to borrow within specific limits on their own personal security.  
(e) The rural home economics advisory service suggested.

Commenting on the possibility of population growth, production of baby beef for export, forestry development and the re-seeding of barlet bog, the meeting felt that these were long-term projects and would do little to alleviate the present critical situation. It was also felt that the question of industrialization was not being approached in a realistic manner, since no truly economic analysis had been made of the desirability of establishing industrial areas and the size of such areas on the one hand, or on the other hand, of creating scattered units.

Members present felt that reference to "improved marketing arrangements" is purely poultry, eggs, wool, lamb, etc., had to be regarded in a dubious light since even the findings of the Marketing Commission, 1960, under the chairmanship of Dr. Juan N. Greene had not yet been implemented. The N.F.A. National Wool Scheme has achieved much in quality and grading matters and they hoped that the Taoiseach has taken cognisance of this. They accepted the Taoiseach's statement that greater co-operation through "more organization" is necessary and

they expected greater sympathy from the Government for the efforts already made and being made by the National Farmers' Association, in co-operative enterprise throughout the country. The meeting unanimously accepted the statement by the Taoiseach that "in relation to National Income, the Irish State supports its agriculture to a much greater extent than other European countries." This statement is unjust because:—  
(a) It neglects to mention the actual assistance given per farm, e.g. the subsidies in Britain are £900 per farm, compared to a maximum estimate of £170 in Ireland.  
(b) Farmers are a larger proportion of population in Ireland than in other European countries.  
(c) Other countries protect their farmers by maintaining positive prices in Europe.  
(d) The figure constantly quoted by the Government of £10n. a bushel to Irish farmers does not bear scrutiny.  
(e) A suggestion made in the National Section of the Irish Farmers' Journal some time ago is well worth emphasizing. The point in question was the desirability of Personal Accident Insurance policies being taken out by farmer's sons working on the home farm under the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Acts to act as a buffer.

We would advise members of the N.F.A. Insurance Scheme includes a Personal Accident policy which, for a very reasonable annual premium, entitles the insured person to a weekly payment of £10 over a period of up to 100 weeks in the event of temporary total disablement. A Personal Accident policy is of course, just as wise an investment for a farmer as it is for his son. Those interested should write to N.F.A. House, 27 Earlsfort Terrace, Dublin 2, for a leaflet on this subject.

These arrangements, however, had to await the approval of the Finance Bill in Dail Eireann. The Department of Local Government informed us this week that the Licensing Authorities in each county were recently circulated with instructions to make arrangements for the refund to those who had paid the full £8 tax. Enquiries from a number of County Councils disclosed the fact that generally speaking farmers will get their refund automatically. We came across only one Licensing Authority (Dublin Corporation) which is objecting to this on the grounds that it would simplify administrative work if each farmer was required to apply for his refund. In other cases it was mentioned that while the cheques would be issued without any application from farmers, there would be a few weeks delay in doing so.

The N.F.A. National Industrial and Transport Committee has again written to the Department of Local Government asking that each Licensing Authority should clarify the position for tractor owners in its administrative area by means of a public notice. **PENALISING CO-OPERATION**  
Recent letter from Dungarvan Fruit Growers' Society underlines the unfair treatment of co-operative societies as regards tractor taxation. As the N.F.A. has pointed out many times in the past, there is no justification for the imposition of tax at the rate of £31-10-0 per year on tractors owned and operated by farmers through the medium of a co-operative society. We maintain that such tractors should qualify for the £2-10-0 taxation rate just as if they are owned by individual farmers. The Dungarvan Society uses the tractors for spraying between April and July each year which is permitted at the 5/- rate. For a period of three

months between the end of August and the end of November the tractors are used to haul fruit from the members' orchards to central depots. The Society is obliged to pay a half year's tax at the £31-10-0 yearly rate in order to be allowed to carry out this haulage work. Many other co-operative societies throughout the country could give examples of similar difficulties. This is a matter on which the N.F.A. has made frequent representations to the Minister for Transport and Power and other Government Departments. Everyone agrees that co-operative enterprise should be supported and extended, not curtailed and limited. If the Government is sincere in wishing to encourage co-operation this business of Society tractor taxation is an obvious and simple way to prove its sincerity. **DAIRY COMMITTEE TO EXPAND**  
A more realistic attitude is being introduced into our trading arrangements with countries in Eastern Europe. This was stated at a meeting of the National Dairy Committee held last week in N.F.A. House under the Chairmanship of Mr. T. J. Maher. Such an approach long overdue and it is hoped that the moves contemplated will have the desired effect. Members felt that the same approach must be used when dealing with other European and foreign countries with whom Ireland has presently an imbalance of trade. It is regrettable for example that it is necessary to import £14.4m. of goods from Germany while Germany in turn imports only £5.5m. worth of goods from us. The same can be said of our trading relations with many other countries. If the Government would see to it that the countries in question bought from us goods of equal value to that bought from them, there would follow a greater degree of productivity in agriculture and in industry as a result. The obvious advantages of such arrangements are great indeed. The Dairy Committee also discussed ways and means of expanding its work. It was felt that all sections of the milk industry should be represented on this committee and suggestions made to bring this about are presently being considered. It recommends that all counties engaged in milk production should appoint immediately milk sub-committees within their counties to handle the interests of dairy farmers therein. Furthermore, it should be the aim of these sub-committees to see that a representative from them should travel to and take part in the National Dairy Committee meetings. **AGRICULTURAL CREDIT CORPORATION NEEDS OVERHAUL**  
Only those who do not need loans can get them from the Agricultural Credit Corporation. Those who do need them cannot get them. There were the opinions of many people who attended the meeting in Brillyhanis last week to consider small farm structure in western areas. Delegates felt that the Agricultural Credit Corporation had not done the job intended of it. They called for a complete reappraisal of the Corporation's activities to date and welcomed the statement mentioned by the Taoiseach in his recent address to Muintir na Tíre that loans would be made in future on personal security only. Members present also felt that the proposal that the Land Commission should acquire holdings that have been left vacant for a period of five years or more, be bristled with difficulties. What of the man, they asked, who went to England for four, five or six years in order to earn money to invest in present uneconomic holdings? Furthermore, if this law is introduced, the meeting felt that it should apply to the whole country. Another point raised at the meeting was the Taoiseach's statement that "a scheme of loans, on favourable terms, will include freedom from interest and postponement of capital repayment in the early years." This statement was ambiguous and the meeting asked the National Farm Structure Committee to take up the matter with the Department concerned and have it elucidated. Many other suggestions and recommendations were made and these are to be referred to the next meeting of the National

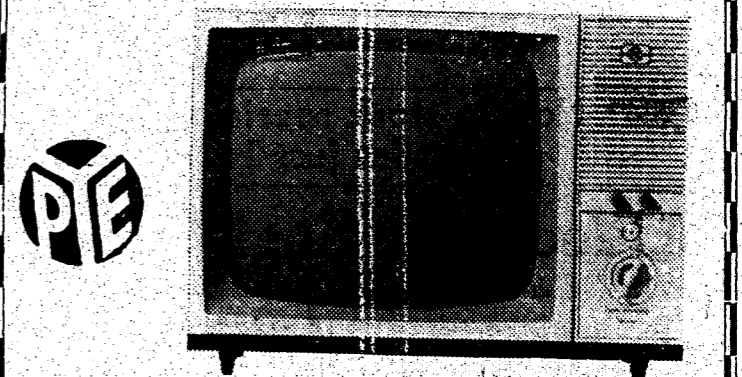

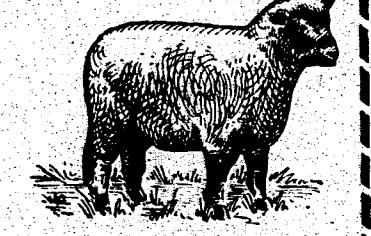

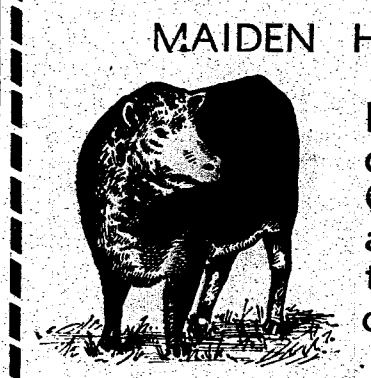
