



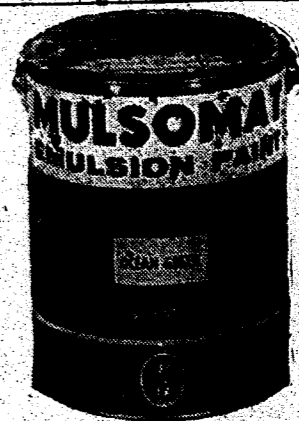

## Brickey Drainage Scheme To

### Start If ..

**SUBJECT to the annual maintenance cost not exceeding £900, it was decided by nine votes to six, at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council, to go ahead with the proposed Brickey Catchment Drainage Scheme, involving about 18 square miles.**

Colr. C. Curran (Chairman) said that certain Council members met some of the farmers concerned on Friday last. The position was that the Board of Works would carry out the work but after that it would be the responsibility of the County Council. This would mean an impact on the rates and the annual maintenance cost would be £900.

Referring to Colr. Milo Galgey, the Co. Engineer (Mr. J. D. Hally) said about 18 square miles were involved.

Colr. Galgey said it could cost the Board of Works were concerned in the scheme he would

have nothing to do with it. Colr. W. Kenneally said that while the annual maintenance might start at £900, it could be £1800 in three years time.

Colr. Galgey said it cost them £50 for an engineer to come down from Dublin for one day and look over it with opera glasses.

Mr. Hally said that while the scheme was desirable, what would be £900 this year could be £1200 next year. If they could get an assurance from the Department that £900 a year would be a stabilized figure it would be a different matter.

Colr. Curran said the Estimation meeting would be on in a few months time and they should do everything possible to keep down the rates.

Colr. M. Harty said he would appeal to the members to see the area. If they got the scheme done under the Land Reclamation Scheme they would be free from all responsibility. They should do all they could for those concerned and no stone should be left unturned in the interests of those people who were good honest ratepayers.

Colr. Curran said it was no good boating about the bush. They either adopted the scheme or they didn't. He proposed that they not proceed with it due to the fact that no ceiling had been placed on the level of future maintenance cost.

Colr. Wm. Dower proposed and Colr. S. Whelan seconded an amendment that subject to the annual maintenance charges not exceeding £900 they adopt the scheme.

Colr. Curran said the public would have to realise that such services would have to be paid for by them (public). He was completely fed-up with people being two-faced.

Colr. Dower's amendment was then put to the meeting and carried by 9-6.

The voting was: For the scheme: Colrs. Dower, Harty, Kyne, Whelan, Fahy, Heskin, Montayne, Keaneally, Madden (9); Against—Colrs. Butler, Curran, O'Ryan, Quirke, N. Walsh, Galgey (6).

### REPORT ON WATER SCHEMES ADOPTED IN PRINCIPLE

THE report of County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Hally, on Water Supply Scheme and Extensions in the County was adopted in principle, without entering into any financial commitments, at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

During the course of discussion on the report, Colr. J. Fahy said the responsibility of providing money for these schemes rested with the County Council and he strongly resented deputations coming into Council meetings and ignoring the County Councillors. They should not get such sympathetic hearing, he said.

The Chairman (Colr. Curran) said the public should realise and understand that it was the Council that would decide what was to be done in the final analysis. He did not want promises to be made by people that could not be fulfilled. People from outside the county came in and made promises over their heads.

Colr. Fahy said members of the public said they could ignore the Council to get things done.

Colr. N. Walsh said county councillors or T.D.s. from outside the county should not be given priority over their own representations.

Colr. K. O'Ryan—We seem to be afraid of outside interference.

Colr. Fahy said he was not referring to any particular part of the county in this case.

## Chairman Threatens to Adjourn Meeting

**CROSS-FIRE ON COMPULSORY IRISH** DURING the course of discussion on Scholarships at last Monday's County Council meeting in Dungarvan, heated cross-fire took place between Colrs. W. Foran and M. Harty, and as Chairman Curran repeatedly rang the bell for order, he finally threatened to adjourn the meeting unless order was restored.

The cross-fire started when Foran criticised the present educational system. All needed, he said, by pupils, was a good knowledge of English and Irish. It was necessary but they were not getting to build-up Latin through the medium of Irish. The brains of the country were being run on account of the rotten state of compulsory Irish.

Colr. Curran said he objected to any reflection on the Irish language, as an Irishman himself. A F. O'Connell would feel the same way about his language.

Colr. Foran While we have not yet finished. At the stage Colrs. Foran and Harty "back-fired" at each other and the Chairman said the meeting was being turned into a bit of a farce and if order was not restored he would adjourn the meeting.

Colr. W. Dower then proposed and Colr. Harty seconded that they retain the same age limit as before for scholarships in secondary, vocational and other approved schools.

Colr. Curran said the Minister for Education was adamant he was not satisfied with that, and had not sanctioned it for any County Council yet.

The proposal was put to the meeting and carried by 12 votes to 6. It will now have to go before the Minister for sanction or rejection.

**SCHOLARSHIPS RENEWED** On the proposal of Colr. J. Fahy, seconded by Colr. Harty, University Scholarships, tenable at U.C.C. were renewed for the coming year for Kathleen Dromey, John P. O'Brien, St. Garvan's, Toss, Dungarvan; and John P. O'Brien, Connolly Row, Dungarvan.

### Defendant Given Benefit of Doubt

Because there was a small doubt in the case he would dismiss it, said Justice L. Skinner at Dungarvan District Court, on Wednesday, when John Costigan (19), of Cathal Brugha Pl., Dungarvan, pleaded not guilty to being unlawfully in possession of brass, valued 30/- on August 24th last, knowing same to be stolen.

A similar charge against Michael McCarthy, also of Cathal Brugha Pl., was adjourned for an indefinite period as the defendant was presently outside the jurisdiction of the Court.

Mrs. Georgina Wyse said her husband was a general dealer. Four or five months ago they missed about £80 worth of stuff from their premises at Shandon. On August 24th the defendant Costigan and McCarthy came to sell them some soap. She knew Costigan from coming occasionally before. They tried to sell her brass which she positively identified as hers. Her husband kept them in the yard while she went to the Cattle Mart to phone the guards. He (Costigan) had no authority from her husband or herself to take the brass.

Sgt. J. Browne said he visited both Costigan and McCarthy. In their presence, Mrs. Wyse said the brass was stolen from her premises. They said they had found the brass near the swimming pool. He (witness) took Costigan into custody and charged him.

Garda D. Hallissey said he later took a statement from Costigan in which he stated that on August 24th he went down by the swimming pool with McCarthy. He saw a brass in the water near the pool and he brought it to Jack Wyse in Shandon to sell it. Mrs. Wyse said the brass was some of the property stolen from her and she phoned for the guards. His statement added that a man named Kirby saw him taking the brass from the water.

Costigan in evidence corroborated his statement made to Garda Hallissey. Mr. Ed. Kirby, Caseyville, said on August 24th he was working in the pool and he saw the defendant with the scrap iron. He (Costigan) said he had found it and would get a few shillings for it. Replying to Supt. M. Ryan (prosecuting for the Attorney General) witness said he did not see the brass on the strand at any time that day. Neither did he see the defendant taking it from the strand. He only saw him with it.

Justice Skinner, having dismissed the case, made an order for the return of the scrap, and added: "I would not, however, suggest that Mrs. Wyse should give a reward for its return."

### Strike Notice Served on D.L.C.

Four-hour Talks Break-down in Waterford

Following the refusal of the officials of the A.T. & G.W.U. to withdraw strike notice on Dungarvan Leather Factory, a conference under the conciliation officer of the Labour Court failed to get under way at Waterford on Wednesday night after four-hours attempt to bring the parties together, broke down.

A representative of the Federated Union of Employers, on behalf of the management sought to have strike notice withdrawn until the full machinery of the Labour Court was implemented. The notice on the company will expire at normal finishing time on Wednesday next. The dispute arose when the company failed to re-employ the men on a strictly seniority basis after a 4-week unofficial strike. 149 workers are involved.

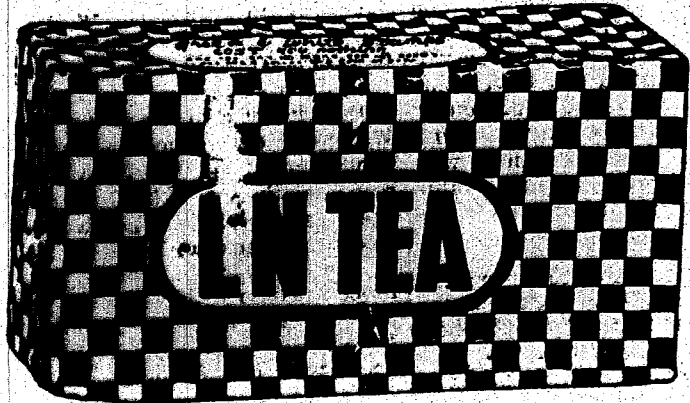

"Villierstown: In conformity with Policy of Council, proposed scheme for Villierstown is designed to enable extensions to be made to serve the surrounding area on the basis of the information compiled in the Water Survey. For the moment the intention is to confine the supply to the village and immediate surrounds and with estimate of cost, will be presented to Council in near future.

"Ardsallagh: The demand in this area warrants a full investigation of the problem of supply. Matter should be referred to Consultant for report.

"Coolroe-Aglish: Extension of approximately 840 lin. yds., at an estimated cost of £1,300, would serve 5 houses. Recommendation.

"Aglish: Extension of approximately 1,400 lin. yds. to serve 3 houses, at a cost of £2,250, not recommended.

"Woodstock: To be considered as part of Villierstown Scheme.

"Curragh Ardmore: Extension of Ardmore Scheme for 300 lin. yds. (cost, £550); Recommended.

"Creggs, Clashmore—Six applicants; cost, £1,500."

It is noted that the Villierstown Scheme is the first to be dealt with since completion of Water Survey. A new sewerage scheme has also been approved for Villierstown.

## WANT CLASSES FOR TRADITIONAL MUSIC IN COUNTY

A two-man deputation from Dungarvan Branch of Ceoltas Coolibri Eireann came before Tuesday's meeting of Waterford Vocational Committee, asking the Committee's "blessing" to form weekly classes in traditional Irish music in various centres in the county. They were Mr. Liam Comerford, Mary St. and Mr. Jack Tobin, Ballymacnaghe, both prominent members of the local branch.

Mr. Comerford said they wanted the blessing of the Committee to hold classes in traditional Irish music. A scheme had been devised by the Department and Ceoltas Coolibri Eireann and what was envisaged was to teach how to read music as well as play. The scheme was presently operating in Clare, Westmeath and Wexford under the Vocational Committee. He thought that by approaching the Committee they could do something to work out a scheme. If the classes were formed it would mean the appointment of a temporary part-time teacher.

The Acting C.E.O. said a part-time teacher would cost 10/9 an hour.

Mr. Comerford said they were thinking of centres for Ballymacnaghe, Dungarvan, Kilmacthomas and Cappoquin. There would be one class a week at each centre. Each class would be for two hours.

Senator J. Butler said the C.E.O. should go into the matter and have something definite regarding the finance and formation of the classes for the next meeting.

Mr. Comerford said all they wanted was the Committee to

consider if it was feasible. He thanked them for their patient hearing.

Finally Mr. Butler's suggestion was agreed to and the matter will be considered at the Committee's monthly meeting in November.

## Want Site for New School at Passage

Waterford County Council at its meeting in Dungarvan on Monday agreed in principle to sell a four-acre site at Crooke, Passage East to a local Committee for the purpose of erecting a new school.

Very Rev. Fr. Leahy, P.P., Killea, Dunmore, said the school in Passage was overcrowded and was not suitable. The playing yard would be much for the winter and they could not get a grant from the Board of Works. They were not begging for the site but wanted to buy it. He hoped they would be reasonable about the price.

Colr. R. Walsh said he would like to support Fr. Leahy. It was very essential as the present school was out-dated. The only suitable land available for a new school was owned by the County Council and it was imperative that they get it. It was only a reasonable and commonsense request.

Mr. E. J. Keyes, Housing Officer said certain legal proceedings would have to be considered but if it was agreed to sell, the other formalities could be dealt with.

Deputy Kyne said it was more important to have a school for the present people than houses for the people to come. He would prefer to build a school than houses.

# 'Village' Make Championship Exit

## GOAL-KEEPING BLUNDERS PROVED COSTLY

**Erin's Own 5-8 Abbeyside 1-6** **ALTHOUGH** a fourteen point winning margin grossly exaggerates the extent of their over-all superiority, Erin's Own's victory over Abbeyside in the senior hurling championship semi-final at Dungarvan on Sunday last meritoriously places them in line for yet another final tilt at long-reigning champions, Mount Sion.

But if the result merely coincided with the belief of the majority, the expected thrills never materialised. As in the Brickeys-John Mitchels football encounter of the previous Sunday, early goals of the soft variety "killed" the game and left the outcome in the nature of a foregone conclusion.

It would of course be an injustice to Erin's Own to suggest that the result would have been reversed had not the Villagers conceded those first-hand goals. Undeniably they would have had to fight harder for victory, but no matter what course the game had taken it is my firm conviction that he Poleberry side would still have triumphed.

### EQUAL

True it is that for long periods in the game Abbeyside were the equal of the opposition in the outfield duels. But it must have been heart-breaking for their tenacious and hard-working defence to see many of their sterling qualities become disastrously insignificant as a result of some atrocious goalkeeping blunders by Thomas Hogan.

By my reckoning three of the four first-half goals were the fault of this usually reliable custodian, who unfortunately for Village supporters chose Sunday to have "one of those days."

### TRAILING BY FOUR GOALS

Thus, although territorially Abbeyside also enjoyed an equal standing they found themselves trailing by 4-5 to 0-3 at the break. During those opening thirty minutes the City men had played with whatever breeze there was - so slight, however, as not to have any noticeable interfering effect on the game.

It didn't therefore take any extraordinary imaginative powers to draw the right conclusions from the half-time position. Abbeyside had obviously blundered themselves to defeat in half an hour, and left Erin's Own in a near unassailable position.

### COMMENDABLE GRIT

Yet to their credit, Abbeyside faced their unenviable task with commendable grit and determination. Furthermore, as they literally threw caution to the wind, they displayed to the big attendance the quality hurling of which they are so capable. In a manner of speaking they threw the book at Erin's Own, and provided us with the best hurling of the hour for fifteen minutes of that second half. But they could do no better than reduce the arrears to eight points, although at least two open goals had been unbelievably missed.

Doubtless, disheartened by their failure to cut their leadway to a worthwhile extent, Abbeyside's enthusiasm slowly evaporated. The winner then assumed almost complete control and left no doubts about their superiority in the final quarter.

### ABBEYSIDE TAKE EARLY LEAD

Playing against a slight breeze Abbeyside swarmed to the attack from the throw-in and after four minutes Willie Redmond gave them the lead with a point. Within a minute however, Erin's Own struck their first decisive blow when Carlow-born Peter McGovern scored. Duck Whelan pointed a Village free in the 9th minute and two minutes later the same paver landed a great "set" free for Erin's Own.

### TWO GOALS IN A MINUTE

Then twice within the space of sixty seconds Thomas Hogan suffered the ignominy of picking the ball from the net. The goal that should have been saved, Leo Murphy shot the first and McGovern from a Joe Condon pass had the second. Mcaney and Condon added

set-tos with Johnny Hogan and besides McGovern in attack, Leo Murphy and Seanie Dugan were always dangerous.

### KIELY ABSENT

Abbeyside were unfortunate at being forced to field without centre-back Mick Kiely and it is with justification that followers are adamant that had he been available McGovern would not have had to reap so rich a harvest. For goalkeeper Thomas Hogan it is a game that will only recall night-marish memories. On his day he would have saved all but one of the shot's that beat him but on this occasion was badly lacking customary confidence.

Fronting Hogan, Austin Flynn did all that one defender could possibly do and must have gone very close to shunting Charlie Ware off the county team. Ned Moore played solidly at left-half while John McGrath and Denis Flynn after an indifferent start, settled down to play well in the half-line.

### WHALE OF A GAME

Diminutive Johnny Hogan played a whole of a game at mid-field on Joe Condon and was ably assisted by Danny Barry.

### WHELAN'S DISPLAY

Not in a long time has Duck Whelan displayed such tremendous form as on Sunday last. He roared all over the field in search of work and scored and made a few great points. On this showing he would be a far better proposition on the county team than Charlie Ware.

Willie Redmond also greatly impressed in attack by his stylish hurling and notched two first-class points but of the remainder only Liam Enright could be termed a success.

**THE** belief of Waterford's football followers everywhere that the turn of the road had been reached in the County's struggle to reach the top bracket, was rocked from its very foundation at Walsh Park on Sunday last when they failed to Kilkenny by 1-7 to 0-7 in their opening game of the current League competition.

To really pin-point the cause of this unexpected defeat would be a difficult task indeed. This Kilkenny challenge was confidently expected to be overcome without any great difficulty, but instead they played second fiddle to the Noreiders who proved themselves full value for the brace of league points they collected.

Perhaps complacency on the part of the Deise men was the root of their downfall but whatever the cause, mentors will have to search further afield if they hope to find a team capable of retaining sectional honours won for the second time last year.

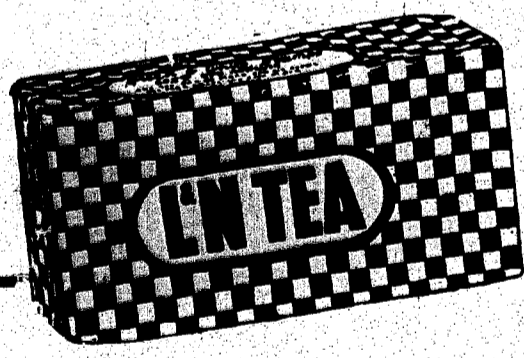
Waterford elected to play with the slight breeze in the opening half after winning the toss and within seconds of the throw-in Jimmy Hewitt landed a point. Kilkenny quickly equalised and after Sean Ormonde effected a great save from point blank range, Pat Butler slammed the resultant rebound to the net. Tommy Kirwan raced through for a Waterford point but again Kilkenny regained the initiative and full-forward Wilson scored two points in rapid succession. Butler added yet another but in a determined Waterford rally, Hewitt and Monty Guiry cut the deficit to a goal with minutes before the interval.

Despite facing the breeze the Deise men swarmed to the attack on resuming and for the first and only time during the hour played as their Munster final form suggested they could have with the visiting defence and points by Giury and Kirwan left only a point between the sides. But instead of heralding a Waterford resurgence they only served notice on the Kilkenny men that their first-half advantage was slipping. The Noreiders hit back with points by Wilson and Martin Meally and though Tommy Joe Hartly replied with a like score for Waterford, the closing stages were dominated by Kilkenny. They encamped in the Deise half and fittingly had the last score of the game - a point by Wilson. All credit then to Kilkenny for upsetting the Deise applecart. Few outside their own supporters gave them little chance but they fully deserved their victory.

They had a sound goalkeeper in Lawlor while Mick Egan was the outstanding defender on view. In attack Wilson, Butler, Meally and Walsh were best.

Waterford's lack-lustre display deserves severest criticism. This was a game that on paper and form should have been won with something to spare. Few reputations escaped untarnishing and several of the side have left themselves perilously near "axe-ing" for the next outing.

Those to emerge with any honours from the game were goalkeeper Sean Ormonde, defenders Tommy Power, Martin Kennedy and forwards Monty Guiry (also at mid-field) Jimmy Hewitt and Tommy Kirwan.



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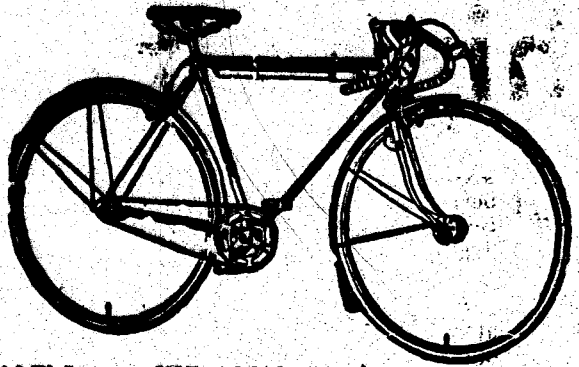

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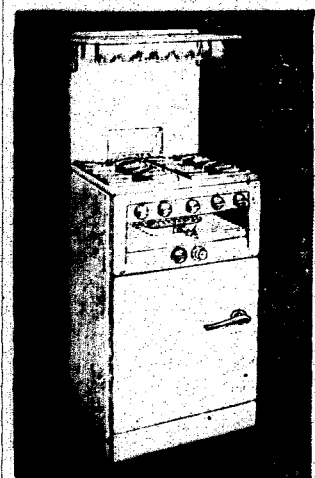

Libel actions brought by Thomas Wade, general foreman T. J. Murphy Place, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, against Beaverbrook Newspapers Ltd., London, and the Waterford News and Star Ltd., O'Connell Street, Waterford, have been settled, Mr. Justice Teevan was told in the High Court, Dublin.  
Mr. Wade had complained that he was libelled in reports which appeared in the "Daily Express" and "The Waterford News and Star" concerning a strike at a £193,000 building scheme at Browney, Co. Durham, on which he was the general foreman.  
Mr. Doyle, S.C., who, with Mr. Diarmuid P. Sheridan (instructed by Messrs. J. F. Williams and Son, Solrs., Dungarvan) for Mr. Wade, said the settlements provided for the payments by each of the defendants of a sum for damages and costs.  
Each of the defendants was to make an agreed apology through their respective counsel in open court to Mr. Wade.

## INCREMENT FOR DUNGARVAN TEACHER "WE HAVE NO SAY"—Mr. Walsh

...C.E.O.—I don't think so. Everything is thrashed out and nothing is given away lightly.

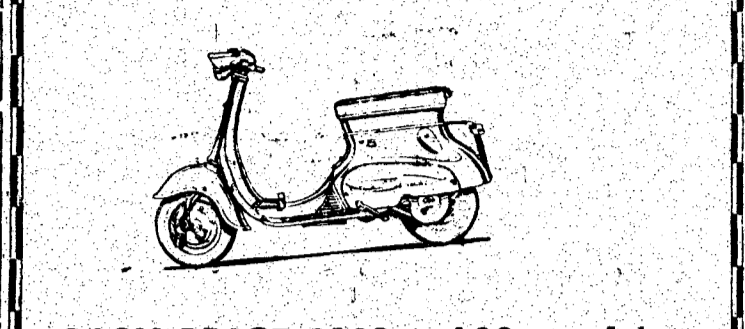

## WHEAT POSITION DESPERATE COMMITTEE DISCUSS PROBLEM

Speaking at an emergency meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan, on Saturday, Mr. George Heskin said that the millers were ruining wheat growing and he was sure that next year nobody would grow wheat. Farmers could not produce wheat to reach the standards required by millers and he called on the Government to step in and save wheat growing in the country.

Mr. Heskin said that wheat growing was part of the national economy and if the millers killed the production of wheat there would be a crisis.

Mr. F. Fahy said the millers bought out the small mills and now they had the monopoly.

The C.A.O. said that lorry drivers with loads of wheat had been kept waiting for 12 hours and longer at the Waterford Mills before the grain was accepted. Now the mills would accept only a quota from every agent.

Mr. Quirke suggested that the members call a meeting of the General Council of the Committee of Agriculture and ask the Minister to attend. The situation was desperate.

Mr. Galgey said that they should also check on the barley situation as there was no hope at all of getting in the barley left in the fields.

Mr. Fahy said that the members should express their appreciation of the 12/6 bonus a barrel on wheat given by the Minister to offset the losses sustained by the farmers. It was regrettable to see big wheat ranchers getting this money.

Mr. Galgey said that a week after the wheat was taken in last year there was a barrel on last year there was not a barrel of millable wheat to be had in the country. It had all been exported, but by the end of the year the Government were importing pollard from Russia.

The Minister, he said, should not allow any imported feeding stuffs into the country until our own requirements were first met. Something was radically wrong.

Mr. Galgey added that 60% of this year's wheat was still in the hands of the farmers in the East Waterford area.

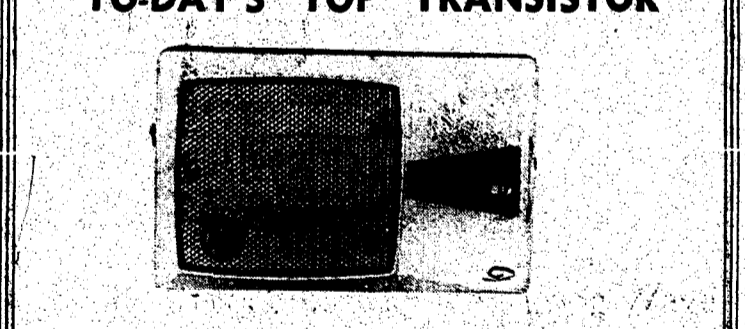
Mr. Charles Curran said that big wheat ranchers were drawing about £6,000 each out of the subsidy recently given by the Government to compensate farmers for wheat losses. That was scandalous.

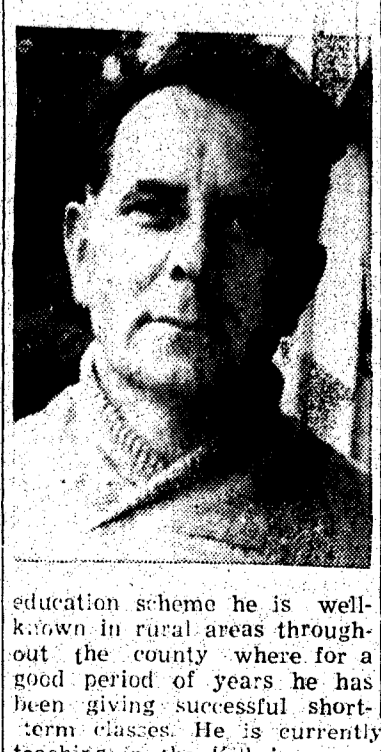

**N.F.A. NEWS**  
**Farmers relieved of Transport Charges**

**FARMERS RELIEVED OF TRANSPORT CHARGES**  
Members of the N.F.A. Grain Committee held a further meeting with the Irish Flour Millers Association last week to discuss harvest progress. The Flour Millers assured the N.F.A. that there would be no alteration of the standards applied to the purchase of millable wheat following the Government's decision to support wheat growers.

We are pleased to state that the Flour Millers Association have agreed to revert to the former practice of meeting the transport and commission charges on wheat drawn to their premises which is not accepted for milling. The normal cartage of 1/ per barrel will still apply to all wheat collected at the farm.

On the 29th September we stated: "Farmers are being loaded with additional burden of heavy transport and commission charges on unmillable wheat which will reduce the price considerably unless steps are taken to alleviate this impost." Farmers will be glad to know that these steps have been successfully taken.

This was the second achievement for the N.F.A. Grain Committee within a matter of a few days, following as it did, hard on the heels of the Government's announcement of the decision to ease the situation for grain growers by meeting part of their losses on this year's harvest, following N.F.A. representations.

It must be remembered, though, that despite the direct Exchequer contribution of £1,315,000, farmers still stand to lose £2 million on the wheat crop.

Farmers are again reminded that the system of appeals in doubtful samples to the Central Wheat Laboratory still obtains. It is vital that farmers should obtain the authorised purchasers' dockets and hold them in safe keeping.

These achievements of the N.F.A. are all the more noteworthy when it is known that at the same time, the Association was actively engaged in matters affecting many other

branches of agriculture, such as Livestock, Dairying, Pigs, Poultry, to mention but a few.

**HOW IS THE COMMON MARKET GOING?**  
No self-respecting newspaper, magazine or journal would dream of appearing in public nowadays unless it contained some reference to the Common Market. Public figures, journalists and commentators of one kind or another vie with each other in their use of high-sounding phrases to emphasise the urgency of immediate action in some sector of our national economy, in anticipation of Ireland's entry to the European Economic Community.

It is useful to bear in mind that, while all this discussion is taking place, the very subject of discussion is itself undergoing a continuous process of adaptation and development, in an endeavour to keep to a pre-arranged schedule. The formulation and application of the Common Agricultural Policy of the E.E.C. has given rise to many headaches for the participants—there were few, if any, unanimous agreements.

Let us then take a look at the present situation, with regard to the agricultural aspects of the Common Market.

The D.G.A. (General Department of Agriculture of the European Economic Community) continued to work through out the summer but for several weeks it had to limit its activities to watching the "working out" of the Community regulations applied since the 30th July (Cereals pigmeat, eggs and poultry, fruit and vegetables and wine).

The agricultural regulations of the 14th January which were applied on the 30th July, have still to be completed in certain respects, as indicated by the following summary:

**Cereals:** The system of reconciling prices between the Six partner countries has been finalised. According to the original timetable, the Council of Ministers has until the 1st April, 1963, to tell the member states what measures they must take for cereal prices for the 1963/64 harvest and until the 1st September 1963 to announce the measures to be taken for the 1964/65 harvest.

**Pigmeat:** The system of levies is not yet working except for carcasses and half-carasses. For cuts a special rule will be finalised before the 1st November, 1962.

**Fruit and Vegetables:** The standards of Community quality are not being applied yet except for trade between member countries and third party countries, but they should be progressively applied to fruit and vegetables sold within each member country. Between now and the 31st December, 1962, the Council of Ministers are expected to finalise the method of applying this rule.

**Financial Regulations:** According to the Community Agricultural financial regulations the European Fund for agricultural development progressively take over certain expenditure which is now being borne by the member countries; Help for exports to Third Party countries, intervention on internal markets, financing of structural reforms etc. Between now and the 30th September the Commission should present its proposals for the 1962/63 season.

Outside the necessary finalisation for regulations already in operation there are new community regulations to be completed.

**For Beef, Milk Production and Rice:** The Commission is known to have already presented its proposals. These should be applied between now and the 1st November, 1962, and it seems that it will be impossible to keep to that date.

**For sugar:** a regulation was intended to be applied on the 1st January, 1963, and it is anticipated that this will be put back until the 1st April, 1963, but it still has to be finalised.

**MOBILE HEALTH VOLUNTARY HEALTH SCHEME**  
Members of the N.F.A. group scheme of Voluntary Health Insurance are asked to study carefully the literature which has been sent to them during the past week. This concerns an important change in the whole basis of the scheme and subscribers are asked to indicate, on a postage-free reply form, the extent of benefits for which they wish to insure themselves from the next renewal date.

Up to now, there was a choice of three subscription levels, in return for which the subscribers became eligible for corresponding levels of benefit.

Under the new system, there are two basic units of benefit, one for the hospital maintenance charges and one for other treatment charges in hospital. The subscriber can now choose whatever combination of units he considers necessary to cover himself and his dependants, up to a maximum of 12 of each type of unit.

The literature which has been circulated to members, sets out the new arrangement in detail, and indicates the number of the new type units which a subscriber would require to continue his insurance on approximately the same basis as at present.

It is most important that the reply form be returned within the specified time limit to the Voluntary Health Insurance Board.

**FRENCH LIVESTOCK EXPERTS VISIT IRELAND**  
By arrangement with the N.F.A. National Livestock Committee, a group from the French livestock and meat industries visited this country last week, and had discussions with their Irish counterparts in the course of an intensive six-day tour of our livestock farms, Livestock Mart, Research Centres, and Meat Factories.

On the whole, the visitors were favourably impressed by our livestock production, marketing and meat-processing systems, but they did emphasise the fact that we will have to produce leaner beef if we wish to secure a sound footing in the continental market.

**TURKEY MARKET PROSPECTS GOOD**  
Hopeful news for turkey producers is contained in the latest assessment of market prospects for the 1962 season. The optimistic note is based on four factors:

- 1—Turkey numbers in this country are down by 16% compared to last year, and therefore last year and there is an estimated drop of 10% in England and Wales. Demand will therefore be greater.
- 2—We are now producing birds of a much improved quality, as a result of the general adoption of white-breasted varieties.
- 3—British housewives have developed a preference for the fresh, New York dressed turkey, which forms the bulk of our turkey exports.
- 4—There are reasonable prospects of developing other export outlets, particularly in Sweden where a recent trial consignment of Irish birds proved to be very satisfactory.

This encouraging picture is, however, tempered with one or two warning notes. In the first place as the N.F.A. has said so many times before, not only must the birds be properly finished by the producers, but the people in between the producer and the consumer must play their part in ensuring that turkeys are in good condition and attractively presented when the housewife goes along to make her choice at her local retailers shop.

The time is once again opportune to repeat the N.F.A. National Poultry Committee's demand for implementation of the Agricultural Marketing Advisory Committee's recommendation for the setting up of a Turkey Marketing Board. There are many producers to whom the above mentioned prospects will be of little consolation, because they have already been forced out of the business as a direct consequence of chaotic marketing conditions prevailing in previous years.


Surely, turkey producers are entitled to this type of market assessment sufficiently early in the season so that they may decide whether it is worth staying in production or not. Only an efficient Marketing Board with adequate producer representation, can provide that service. How much longer will we have to wait for its establishment?

**HATCHERY SUPPLIERS OUTING**  
A very interesting outing was had by members of the Hatchery Suppliers Association on the 4th October when they visited the Munster Institute, Cork.

The object of this outing was to enable Supply Farmers to see for themselves the various aspects of the work carried out at the Munster Institute in connection with poultry. This included different stock improvement programmes and experiments in the use of the latest ideas in housing and management of growing and laying stock.

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
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# Geraldines Confident of Victory But..

## BRICKEYS GET VOTE TO WIN

#### Ballydurn Can Capture Junior Crown

##### NEXT SUNDAY'S GAMES

Both ends of the county are very well catered for on Sunday next, when Dungarvan stages the semi-final of the senior football championship between Brickeys and Geraldines, and Ballydurn and Fourmilewater meet in the junior hurling final at Walsh Park, Waterford.

But while the latter game is a highly attractive one in its own right, it can hardly command the appeal of the footballing "war" between clubs that openly profess a "lack of love" for each other.

Yes, while classical football may take a back seat at the Fraher field on Sunday, these razor keen rivals from Bushy Park and Aglish are expected to turn on a vibrant display of the code at its exhilarating toughest.

General opinion favours a Brickey victory. Everywhere one goes the Aglishers are given little hope of success. But how in the name of providence can a side with as much dedication to their task as Geraldines be completely written off? Personally, I think the Rangers will qualify for the final against Kill, but not before overcoming as stiff a challenge as they have met or are likely to meet in the entire campaign.

Indeed, do not for one fleeting moment cast aside the likelihood of a Geraldines victory. In recent times they have swamped Stradbally and Ring in challenge games, and should Paddy Kenneally continue his fantastic scoring achievements in these games, then Aglish Village could well, on fate Sunday night.

##### BALLYDURN GET VOTE

The junior hurling final at the city should produce hurling at its best, when Ballydurn and Fourmilewater join battle for the right to become participants in the highest grade next year.

By junior standards, both can be included in the top bracket, and it is one game that can, with justification be expected to produce a battle royal.

In the preview to Sunday's games elsewhere in this issue, a more detailed survey of the game is given, and an attempt will be made to correctly recast the victors in this intriguing junior decider.

##### LAST SUNDAY'S GAMES

It is, after all yet another Mt. Sion-Fraher's Own senior hurling final. On Sunday last, these two city sides disposed of the "country" challenges of Ballyduff and Abbeyside respectively by clear-cut margins in semi-finals that fell far below expectations.

At Dunhill, Ballyduff challenged Mt. Sion strongly for more than half an hour, but in the end they were overpowered by a vastly superior opposition.

##### AT DUNGARVAN

Blessed with the good fortune of a dream start, Erin's Own were never in danger of defeat in the second semi-final against Abbeyside at Dungarvan.

They were presented with three "gift" goals in the opening half scores that flattered them at the close, but nevertheless, none can deny them the right of a place in the final for the fourth year in a row.

##### FOOTBALLERS FLOP

But if the championship semi-finals went "according to plan," the defeat of the county's footballers to lowly Kilkenny in the National League, was a shattering blow to their hard-won prestige. After such a splendid year, this 1-7 to 0-7 defeat puts a sickening damper on past impressive performances.

In fact this set-back can only undo the good work of the past twelve months. It is common knowledge that Kilkenny are far from being at the football forefront, and it speaks little for Waterford that they could not collect the two league points on their own venue.

Just where to turn, to from here is problematic. At a time when the future looked distinctly promising, this reverse could have serious repercussions.

However as Divisional holders, the retention of sectional honours is yet possible. Success in the remaining games is imperative, but only a major step-up in Sunday's form will achieve this.

#### CAPPOQUIN COAST TO EASY VICTORY

Cappoquin, back-boned by several seniors of a year or two ago coasted to a comfortable 7-6 to 0-1 victory over Brickey Rangers in the Divisional semi-final of the Primary hurling championship at Dungarvan on Sunday.

Leading by 3-6 to 0-1 at half-time after having played against the breeze, the winners simply arried to victory in the second-half.

The game was too one-sided to be of any interest, but Cappoquin, if they are to be judged on the general standard of the grade look certain to replace Kilgobnet as Western champions.

They were brilliantly served by Mick Lacey who started at centre-back, but moved to mid-field at an early stage. Andy O'Keefe, Gerry Mason, Roger O'Shea, Billy Conway and ageless veteran Paddy English.

Despite the hopelessness of their task Brickeys never ceased trying. They were well served by an overworked defence by Jack Donoghue (goal) brother Paul at full-back, Mick Ferncombe and Paul Killigrew, Michael Spratt and Pat Crowley tried hard at mid-field all through but in an attack that received little scope only Tom Ferncombe and Cooney looked the part.

FOOTBALL fever is rampaging through the Western Decies as Sunday's much discussed and eagerly awaited championship semi-final between Brickey Rangers and Geraldines draws perilously nearer. It is a pairing that is a ready-made assurance of fire-works (legitimate I hope) and Dungarvan's Fraher Field should be thronged when Billy Daniels sets the game in motion at 3.30 p.m.

At Waterford hurling captures the lime-light where Ballydurn attempt to carry off the first leg of a unique junior double when hey meet last year's beaten finalists Fourmilewater in the County final.

But attractive though this hurling decider undoubtedly is, it is the Dungarvan tie that one will inevitably reflect on with greatest interest. The hum of expectancy is gradually increasing in momentum, and although Brickeys are regarded as firm favourites in most quarters, it is but a compliment to Geraldines fighting qualities — and their ability to hand out a pasting to an already disgraced form book, that few will want to be absentees from the game on Sunday.

#### UP AGAINST IT

But believe me when I say they are up against it in this Aglish challenge. Not since they won junior honours in the fifties have Geraldines been imbued with such determination to succeed. The very fact that they are rated under-dogs will only make them all the more eager to stun Gaeldom.

#### HEAVY WEATHER

While Brickeys made very heavy weather of qualifying for this semi-final, their four-match set-to with John Mitchels is bound to be of inestimable value to them. Each suc-

ceeding game of that now historic marathon saw them patch up weaknesses against the Comeragh opposition and mentors believe — and with justification that they have at last the ideal blend to carry them to a first county title.

Many times in the past they faltered when their cherished ambition looked well within their grasp. But always that "something" went wrong and they were left pondering on how ultimate success eluded them.

#### NOT ANNOUNCED YET

While neither camp has announced its team at the time of writing, it is but logical to assume that Brickeys will field the same side as overcame Mitchels two weeks ago.

Richie Whelan, has, by his consistently sound displays made the goal-keeping spot his own and as always, Patsy Donnelly, Pat and Bill Spratt and Nicholas McGrath will form the nucleus of their hard-hitting defence.

Against Mitchels, Wick Walsh teamed up with Andy Hallissey at midfield and this pair may be allotted similar posts on Sunday.

#### EXCEEDED EXPECTATIONS

As with Brickeys, Geraldines are also expected to make few if any changes from the side that has exceeded all expectations to date.

Goalkeeper Tom "Fardie" O'Connell has on form few peers in the county and the defensive phalanx of such stalwarts as Billy Crofty, Bill Downing, Ned Merrin, and M. Tobin will pose a problem for even the Brickey attack.

#### RYAN'S WORTH

The worth of Roger Ryan to the side as a midfielder and forward is blue-printed by the decision to bring him home from England for the game. He is again expected to line-out at midfield where it will take the best the Brickeys have to match him.

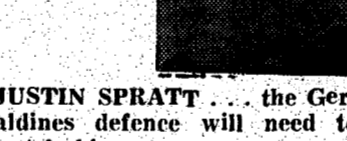
So far in the championship the attack has scored five goals — all brilliantly executed efforts and danger men like Paddy Kenneally, Terry and Jim Merrin and Stylo Riordan will let few chances go abegging.

Thus, having weighed up the respective sides, it is the writer's honest opinion that a doubtful and unrelenting hour lies ahead. The Brickeys must be the choice in the circumstances but Geraldines fully bent on qualifying for the final, will not hear of defeat.

#### JUNIOR FINAL

The junior hurling decider between Ballydurn and Fourmilewater at Waterford could well provide one of the classic championship games of the year.

#### BALLYDURN FAVOURITES

Despite the fact that Sunday marks Fourmilewater's second successive attempt to regain their senior status, Ballydurn must be regarded favourites to foil the Western champions again. In the Eastern championship they obliterated all opposition — Gael Og by 4-6 to 2-0; Ballygunner 3-10 to 2-8; and Mount Sion, 4-17 to 2-1.

That latter victory in particular stamped them as a really formidable combination — and for my part are as talented a junior side to emerge from the Division for quite a while.

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showdown with Kill. Opportunists Justin Spratt and John Woods will flank Farrell, while Patsy Murray whose goals also played a decisive part against Mitchels, Pt Curran and Tom Foley will in all probability form a full line of attack.

Both sides rely purely and simply on hurling skill to carry them to victory and for that reason alone Sunday's final should be worth travelling a very long way to see.

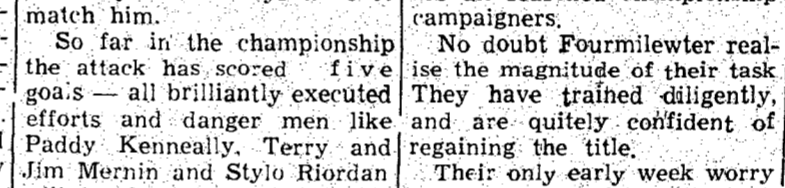
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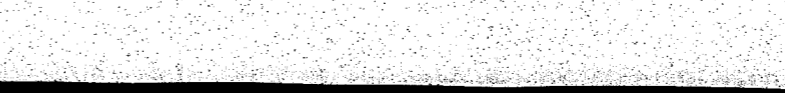

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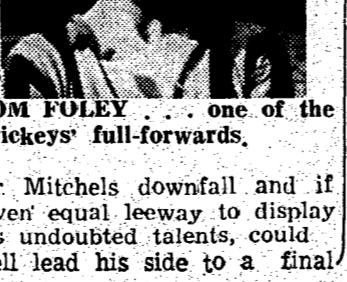
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#### FARRELL THE KEY MAN
