Letter to the Editor

Poppy Day, Nov. 10th, is a day of remembrance for all those of all lands who laid down their lives in the Great Wars and especially for our own kith and kin.

It is kept in many countries: Canada, Australia, New Zealand, India, etc. (It would be a very large list to complete) and of course, Ireland.

The collection is to help all those in need and who served; for widows, for orphans, for the old and more incapacitated, for where necessary the provision of special surgical fittings and lastly to help in funeral expenses. Convalescent homes to help those who have suffered a recent illness are, especially for the old, a real blessing. In Ireland there is one in Co. Down and annually 40-50 are sent there from the South and it is greatly appreciated.

In the last few years this collection has shown a steady annual increase here. Last year it was just over £13,000. But this sum is nothing like sufficient. This is realised at Headquarters in London and last year they sent us £52,000. Even this is not enough. The more we send the more we get back.

We acknowledge gratefully the generous gift. In Waterford the British Legion spends just over £3,000 in helping the needy. I hope all of you realise that a debt is owed to all those who gave their lives and who now would not wish to have their old friends in want, will buy a poppy. They will be on sale on the 10th and 11th.

The first naval casualty list of the last war contained 25 names from between Rosslare and Kerry. The Red Cross had 220,000 addresses of next of kin in Southern Ireland. This information was provided by the late Capt. Henry Harrison, well known in this country as private Secretary to the famous

RECORD SALMON SEASON

From the records of catches of salmon for the 1962 season just published this year has been certainly a record one for all time in regard to the grilse or peale. The total recorded catch for the six months was 9,878 salmon weighing 94,872 lbs., and 27,204 grilse weighing 170,308 lbs. Nets accounted for 7,586 salmon and 23,462 grilse, rods accounted for 1,346 salmon and 845 grilse while the weirs took 946 salmon and 2,897 grilse. In all 1,184 tons of fish were taken, of which 964 tons were taken in June and July and the balance of 22 tons were taken in the remaining months of the season. The average weight was: salmon 9.6 lbs. and grilse 6.23 lbs., the latter being an all time high average weight.

From the above, it will be noted that very few grilse were taken by rods, this is said to be due to the fact that there was not sufficient water for the fish to enter the upper reaches of the river; thus they remained in the tidal portion.

For the month of July 3,515 salmon and 18,144 grilse were taken, while for the whole of the 1961 season the recorded catch was 6,140 salmon and 7,048 grilse weighing 44 tons, 18 cwt., and 11 lbs.

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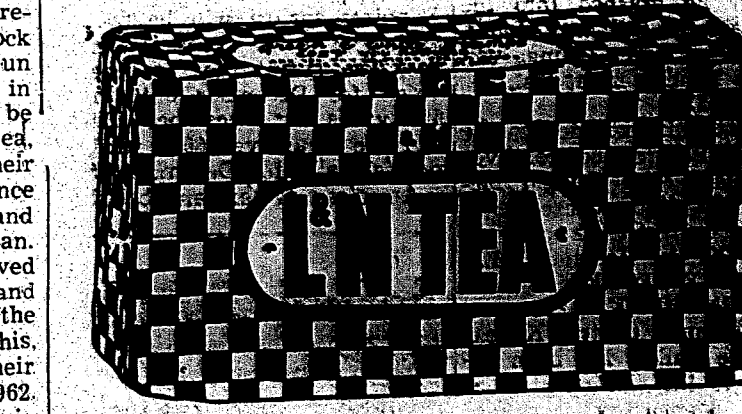

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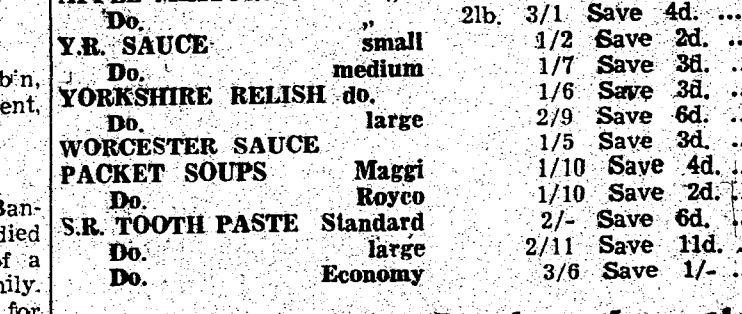

The Irishbred greyhounds "Dai and Duck," "Lios Mire" and "Toast the Prince," now in training at Miami, Florida, for the Irish-American International championship to be run at Biscayne track, have now settled down. Their trainer, Mr. Pat Dalton, has informed Bord na gCon that "Dai and Duck" in her first schooling trial over the Biscayne 3/16 mile course, equalled the track record (20.0 seconds) for that distance held by the American greyhound "Perfect Tip." 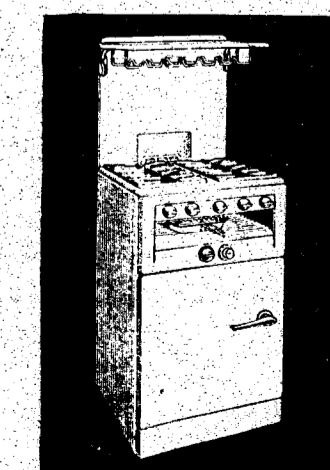

Clare well on top in League tie

CLARE 1-6 WATERFORD 0-5 ON the familiar spaces of Dungarvan's Fraher Field on Sunday last, Waterford's National Football League hopes for 1962/63 became extinct. Before what must have constituted one of the smallest attendances ever at an intercounty game at the venue, Clare handed out a football lesson to a spiritless Deise side and deservedly retained their unbeaten record thus far in this campaign.

Waterford's bid to capture national hurling league honours for 1962/63 commences on Sunday next, when the newly crowned Oireachtas champions travel to the Ennis Road grounds to play Limerick. The league is the one competition that Waterford have continuously failed to win, but judging on present form they must have an outstanding chance of ending that unsatisfactory state of affairs in this current campaign.

They are fielding a full-strength side, and although Limerick are never an easy proposition at home, their league defeats by Wexford and Cork, would indicate lack of good material at present.

Waterford, of course, have a fair claim for doing the unexpected, but on present form, should collect their first league points with something to spare.

With so much at stake for Waterford in this game, it was hardly wishful thinking on supporters part to expect at the minimum, a whole-hearted team effort to collect the points.

But despite the importance of the occasion, this expectancy was never fulfilled, and Clare were seldom seriously impeded in winning to the east: 1-6 to 0-5.

To describe Waterford's display as disappointing would be an understatement. Unfortunately they reserved their worst performance in years for their own following, and besides the loss of the points, failed also to salvage any prestige from the game.

They partially plotted their own downfall also by constantly over-using the ball. When in possession they persisted in over-elaboration which invariably brought fruitless results, against a Clare side that never stood on ceremony and wisely opted for direct tactics throughout.

The folly of these Deise tactics was never more clearly emphasised than in the opening quarter of the second-half. During that period Waterford played their best football of the hour, and were well on top in all sectors.

An interval switch which brought Andy Hallssey from full-forward to mid-field, met with immediate success, and the Dungarvan-based garda together with Martin Kennedy subdued a hitherto rampant Clare pairing of Taylor and Cotter.

But as the flow of football traffic was unmistakably towards the Clare goal, scores were not easily obtained. Much of that outfield advantage was blatantly abused by the utter misconception of forward play by the Waterford attackers, and their persistency in attempting to walk the ball through cost them likely scores.

The score told the story of these methods, and by the three-quarter hour they had only succeeded in reducing their interval deficit of four points (1-3 to 0-2) by two points.

No doubt these misconstrued ideas had a demoralising effect on the remainder of the side. After their fifteen-minute era of ascendancy the Deise retreated again cackled up, and it was Clare who dominated in the closing stages.

While Clare had many top-line performers none outshone full-back P. J. Kennedy. This garda, who has won inter-provincial recognition, fielded impeccably, and was never once beaten for possession.

His namesake Frank also lorded it over all-comers at centre-back, while Tommy Mangan and P. J. Fenner also acquitted themselves well.

Their mid-field pairing of Jim Taylor and Frank Cotter used their physical advantage in the best possible manner, and except for a period in the second-half were always on top in the sector.

Wisely their forwards took the shortest route to goal at all times. Full-forward Martin Quailly proved more than a handful for Eddie Mooney, and Frank Meaney, Jim Casey and Richie Pyne frequently threatened danger.

Waterford were best equipped in defence where S. R. bally's Tom Walsh, Tommy Fowler and Mick Connolly and Sean O'Monide in goal saved many awkward situations.

The new mid-field pairing of Jimmy Hewitt and Martin Kennedy was not a success, and it was only with Andy Hallssey's advent to the set-piece, that Clare's almost one hundred per cent dominance was broken.

The Deise attack also failed miserably in its duty. Monty Gury carved opening after opening that was never availed of and only Tommy Kirwan and Pat Harv could be singled out from the remainder.

improvement and undoubtedly indicate that we are progressing.

Whether this is sound economic or not is another matter but generally potato production on anything resembling a sizeable scale seems to have settled into the west and north-west regions. The soil in these areas is of course very suitable and again quite an amount of family labour is available for handling.

Can we now not to allow the overall acreage to decrease still further, but encourage an increase.

The main outlets at the moment are—seed for home and export markets, industrial factories (starch and alcohol), ordinary ware principally for home market although we do export some chip and crisp manufacture and more recently potato flake manufactured by the Irish Sugar Company. Early potato exports are mostly confined to the Southern and Eastern coastal regions. The success of this trade depends at most entirely on the ability of growers to produce earlier than competitors. So far our growers have competed with intense competition very successfully. It is true as well as the reputation of our seed exports is high.

The least remunerative side of production is that carried on by producers of the old acre output of which is mostly consumed on the farms with perhaps the odd bag sold for ware if the price is particularly attractive.

Potato Committee Meeting

The theme of our National Potato Committee meeting held on Wednesday last under the Chairmanship of Mr. D. Dolan, was to endeavour to formulate a plan to stabilise the industry and encourage increased production and expansion in marketing. A full attendance of members was present. Invited to the meeting to give their views and to help in the co-ordination of policy were Mr. J. Sheridan, Department of Agriculture, Mr. K. Burke, Manager, Irish Potato Marketing Company, and Dr. M. Neenan of An Foras Taluntais. Dr. Neenan spoke on the work of the Institute in the development and propagation of new varieties, research on plant diseases and the use of chemicals for control. Until the establishment of the Institute facilities for this type of work were very limited. It is hoped that now our progress will be much greater, with information and instructions to growers more easily available and based on trials conducted in our own peculiar conditions. The preparation of seed for marketing, together with a re-examination of the work of officials of the Department of Agriculture formed Mr. Sheridan's contribution. Mr. K. Burke, of the Potato Marketing Company dealt with actual marketing and the contentious problem of price and allocation of quotas. Many questions were asked by members which were replied to by the three visitors. At the conclusion of the meeting it was generally agreed that considerable progress has been made and the suggestion was offered that regional meetings should be held in the principal growing districts so that a greater number of people could be brought up-to-date on developments.

FARMERS MEET IN PARIS

Last week in Paris the N.F.A. fulfilled its duty of representing Irish farmers at another international agricultural meeting. That referred to was the 26th Session of the European Committee of Agricultural Producers to which the N.F.A. is affiliated. At the beginning of the fourth day session, regional policy for developing depressed areas in each country were discussed. This was of particular importance to the N.F.A. Farm Structures Committee. Much information was gathered on what others are doing in such areas and (b) industry as an alternative form of employment. The change in agricultural prices during the year was fully investigated, but as one might expect, the implications of the Common Market for each country really took up most of the time. Discussions also took place on anticipated surpluses to community requirements while a report was submitted, following a detailed study, on the pros and cons of vertical integration, or contract farming. The Committee's observa-

tions indicate that a substantial reduction in the number of people engaged in farm occupations is to be expected during the current decade. To ensure that this continuing evolution in the direction of a more diversified economy—on a regional as well as on a national basis—is fully beneficial it is imperative that countries increasingly devote their attention and resources to the reform of agricultural structures and to education and vocational training in rural areas.

Entries for Irish Sweeps Derby 1963

SECOND "FLASHBACK" OF PERFORMANCES 1962

(Irish Sweeps Derby entries in capitals.) Our first "Flashback" of the 1962 performances of the Irish Sweeps Derby entries brought us up to the closing day of July. In it we pointed Mr. D. G. Van Clief's CROCKET (King of the Tudors—Chandeller by Goyama) as the most spectacular two-year-old seen out in Britain this season. So far as his sex is concerned, we have no occasion to alter that judgment now, for he has gone into winter quarters, his unbeaten record intact. In the period under review he won three six furlong events, the most notable being the Middle Park Stakes at Newmarket. He had to be hidden to get the better of Young David by two lengths in the Gimcrack but won the Middle Park in most attractive style outpacing Henry Omer by 11 lengths. CROCKET was bred by Lord Harrington in Co. Limerick and sold as a yearling for 3,200 guineas. His title to the juvenile Championship has however been challenged in the past month by the Irish-trained Noblesse whose Class engagements next season are confined to the English and Irish Filly events. She too is unbeaten and on her latest appearance won Doncaster's mile Timeform Gold Cup. Europe's richest two-year-old prize. Although Noblesse is not in the Irish Sweeps Derby, the Timeform Gold Cup further emphasised the claims to recognition of Mrs. A. B. Biddle's handsome home-bred colt PARTHOLON (Milesian—Poleo II by Pharis II) for this fall-brother to Myster by the last to leave the starting gate but made up a good deal of ground from halfway to take second place. Previously PARTHOLON had got the better of MOLINO in a close finish to the seven furlong National Stakes at the Curragh in September and an analysis of his record to-date denotes steady improvement from each and every outing. Mrs. A. B. Biddle has another strong candidate of her own breeding in the lightly raced IONIAN (Milesian—Persian View by Persian Gulf) who on his second track appearance made all the running to score a four lengths victory over NADIR SHAH and PARTHENIA in the six furlong Duke of Edinburgh Stakes at Ascot in October. His dam has already bred a Classic winner in the shape of Zenobia (Irish 1,000 Guineas) as well as the high class sprinter Satan. Amongst the unplaced contingent in the Timeform Gold Cup was Mr. R. F. Dennis's KING OF BABYLON (King of the Tudors—Babylon by Baham) bred at the family's Stenget Stud. His preparation had been interrupted though and it is probable that he was feeling the effects of a busy season. To judge his 1963 prospects, it would therefore be wiser to go on his sturdy two lengths winning margin over Romantic in the Champagne Stakes at Doncaster for his victims, 'hat occasion included YOUNG DAVID, CREPONE and PONTIFEX. The Dewhurst Stakes is the last major two-year-old race of the year run at Newmarket and this season's event produced minor surprise with the easy-back FOLLOW SUIT (Ballymoss—Persian Lila by Persian Gulf) holding FORE-ARMED at bay by a neck. On a line through CREPONE (4th) FOLLOW SUIT emerges the equal of KING OF BABYLON, and possessing much scope for improvement is an advertisement for the first crop of his sire. He was bred in Co. Kildare by his owner Lt. Col. Giles Lodge. Going back in time trainer Jack Jarvis is responsible for VICTORY WAY (Never Say Die—Winning Ways by Fairway) who set a new track record in the Nottinghamshire Breeders Yearling Plate at Nottingham in August and again returned a fast time in the Lambeth Plate at Hurst Park at the start of September. Mr. A. E. Beuben's Irish-trained MOLINO (Darius—Angelus by Colombo) created a big impression in the Convivial Stakes at York, his first track appearance. He is a half-brother to Martini II and Vimy Ridge, both notable Stakes winners in North America. In a finish of heads Mr. I. Kornberg's MANDAMUS (Petition—Great Fun by Big Game) set new figures for the Hurst Park seven furlongs by beating Hong Kong in the Cherinova Nursery while he demonstrated that the handicapper had not yet got his measure with another success the Sidney Thompson Nursery at Brighton. The mile brought out the best in Lord Roseberry's FIGHTING SHIP (Doutelle—Jane by Alycador) when over his trip he opened his winning account in the Feversham Stakes at Doncaster at the principal expense of Idomeno and PARCOGAN. ONLY FOR LIFE (Chanteur—Life Sentence by Court Martial), a 1,600 guineas yearling purchase showed grit and determination on his debut when wearing down Staffordshire K.O. by three parts of a length in a driving finish to the Clarence House Stakes at Ascot. Vincent O'Brien has one of the most powerful strings of juvenile talent in Ireland and many of his winners hold the Irish Sweeps Derby engagement. Notable amongst them are Mr. James Cox Brady's FOM TIFEX (Darius—Cheville by Chamossaire) who scored in both the Harcourt Stakes at Leopardstown and the Beresford Stakes at the Curragh; Mr. Walter Burmann's PHILEMON (Never Say Die—Winged Foot by Big Game) who triumphed over considerable interference in the Angsey Stakes at the Curragh; the Irish equivalent of the Champagne Stakes; and Mr. John McShain's DEEP GULF (Persian Gulf—Sweetcake by Blue Pete) who captured home from PARTHOLON on his one and only outing to-date. The majority of Paddy Prendergast's successes this year have been achieved in England but his winners at home include Mr. J. R. Mullion's RAGUSA (Ribot—Fanfan II by Ambrosio II), Mrs. J. R. Mullion's LANDLORD (Hard Tack—Rustic Maid by Ribber Prince), and Lord Ennisdale's CHRISTMAS ISLAND (Court Harwell—Tahiti by Ocean Swell). Of the trio RAGUSA looks the best prospect for the future for he defeated the subsequent Gowran Park winner TOMAHAWK (Milesian—Amber Steel by Steel-point) very comfortably in the seven furlong Sair Stakes at the Curragh in October. This event was for previously untraced colts and fillies. The pick of the Autumn winners saddled by Seamus McGrath was Mrs. P. W. McGrath's HILL O'DOON (Hill Gail—Flandra by Precipite) who ran "green" when scoring in the Sallins Stakes at Naas in September and the following month got into all the trouble going, when inches out of a place behind PONTIFEX in the Beresford Stakes at the Curragh. Several English and Irish trained youngsters notched winning victories at Doncaster in France during the Summer, including Mr. Arpad Presch's HYPACINTHE (Hill Gail—Phicarses by Cranach) in the 44 furlong Prix de Lisieux. The feature event of the Deauville meeting, the six furlong Prix Morny, went to the Aga Khan's odds-on favourite DARANNOUR (Sunny Boy II—Danira by Dante) whose dam is a half-sister to the Prix de L'Arc de Triomphe winner Migo! Making his run in the centre of the track, he drew away at the distance to defeat Shamrock by a snug 14 lengths. Like the Timeform Gold Cup winner Noblesse, the French Grand Critarum winner Mita Dancer does not hold any Derby engagements, but on the big race day Mr. Pierre Wertheimer's GARDE COEUR (Mourne—Blue Kiss by Pharis II) scored over a large field in the mile Prix de la Forrière. Another Autumn winner in France with scope for further development is Mr. M. E. Speelman's TOURNAMENT (Vandale—Touraine by Cranach) who took the nine furlong Prix Trepass at Le Tremblay first time out. In Italy the Marchesse Icisa della Rocchetta's CALLAMIDE (Braque—Carnigmano) lost the Grand Critarum at San Siro by a length to the outsider Viteull.

"Dear Mr. Omond, "With reference to your representations regarding the carrying out of the works indicated to you in the attached communication, the following are my relevant observations:—"1. Any repairs found necessary to the link road leading from Brenan Cross to Ballydwan West Cross will be carried out in due course. This road is on the Five Year Plan and will be listed for improvement under the County Road Grant in due course."

"2. Any repairs found necessary to the link road from Seafed Cross to Glen Cross will receive early attention. "3. The removal of the dangerous bend on the road via Maurice Halley's farm, Ballyyog, will be listed for attention in due course, but you will, I am sure, appreciate that there are many other dangerous bends in the County that must take priority over this work."

"4. No financial provision has been made by the Council for the provision of any extra public lighting in the current financial year and in any case the two centres mentioned are outside the confines of Ballynaneen village."

"5. White lining in the county is proceeding on a basis of priority of importance of trunk roads and you will, I am sure appreciate the importance of adhering to this priority list."

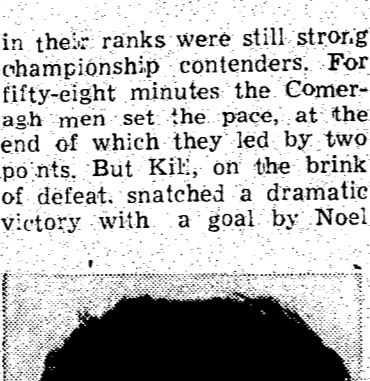

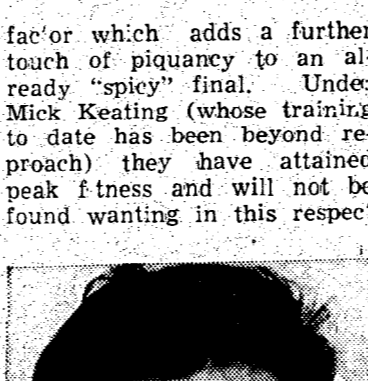

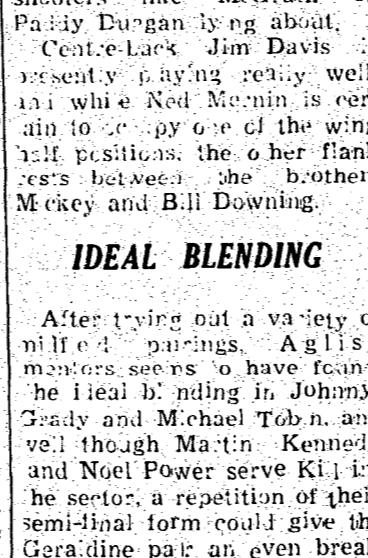
TEAMS NOT YET ANNOUNCED

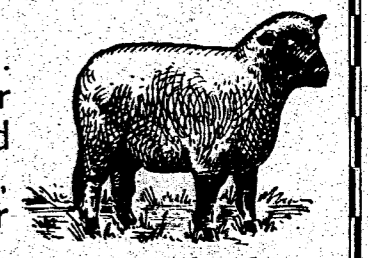
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
