## LATE PATRICK WAIDE

ARD'ALLAGH, YOUGHAL

Widespread regret was expressed in the town of Youghal and West Waterford at the announcement of the death which took place under tragic circumstances at No. 11 Main Street, Youghal, of Mr. Patrick Waide, of Ard'Allagh, Youghal. The deceased had been shopping in town with his son, and after confession at the Parish Church was proceeding to leave for home around seven o'clock when he collapsed and after being removed to a nearby house he died within a short time, having received spiritual and medical aid. A member of the late Faddy Waide family, the late Faddy Waide was a popular figure in and around Youghal. His wife, who predeceased him, had some years ago been the well-known Ballylemon and Dungarvan Christover families — was the popular N.T. at Ard'Allagh.

Deceased was father of Sister Mary Immaculate, Mercy Convent, Dungarvan and Sister Mary Scholastica, Nazareth Home, Balarat, Australia. His passing is deeply regretted by all and sundry and sincere sympathy is extended to those as well as the other members of the family — Olivia, S.R.N., Richard and Michael.

The remains were removed to Youghal Cottage Hospital and were reinterred to Pilltown Church on Sunday night and the large and very representative cortege bore testimony of the high esteem in which he and his family were held throughout the district.

Fr. Russell, C.C. Fr. O'Connell, C.C. and Fr. C. Power, O.S.A. officiated. Masses for the eternal repose of his soul were offered at Pilltown Church on Monday morning by Rev. D. Power, P.P., and Rev. T. Russell, C.C. Clashmore, after which the burial took place to the adjoining cemetery.

### LATE MICHAEL CURRY

RATHGORMACK

We note with sincere regret the death of Michael Curry, well-known farmer and sportsman. Mickie, as he was affectionately known, can surely be numbered amongst the greats in the sporting history of Co. Waterford. At the beginning of the century he won three All-Ireland medals with 'Dublin' in 1906-07-08. At that time he was employed in that City and played with Kickhams, then rated the best Club team in Ireland. Mickie learned his football in his native parish of Rathgormack who had a great team in those days and the writer saw most of the great games in which Mickie took a leading part, helping them to win county senior football championships in 1909-10, 1912-13 and 1918. As youngsters he was our hero when other Rathgormack names such as the Lynchs, Norris's, Powers, Daly and Walsh were on every Co. Waterford man and woman's lips. He captained the county team on a number of occasions.

He was a great lover of coursing and owned and bred a number of first-class greyhounds. How well do we remember the great Irish Cup meeting at Clounanna in 1909 when Michael Curry, of Rathgormack, with Happy Joe II divided the much coveted trophy with another famous Waterford sportsman, the late Bob Phelan's Pkeman, and it took a good dog in those years to win a course over this famous ground, and what a triumph for this great sportsman.

Mickie won numerous other prizes with later greyhounds on track and coursing and one of his best was that great bitch Cymbal.

As the years pass on the old brigade are leaving us but, thank God, they leave us with very happy memories of good old days and the many pleasant talks around the firesides of the dogs, the men and the horses. May God have mercy on the soul of Michael Curry and may the old sod in Rathgormack be loved so well rest lightly on him.

To his son and daughters sincere sympathy is extended in their great loss.

## WEDDING BELLS

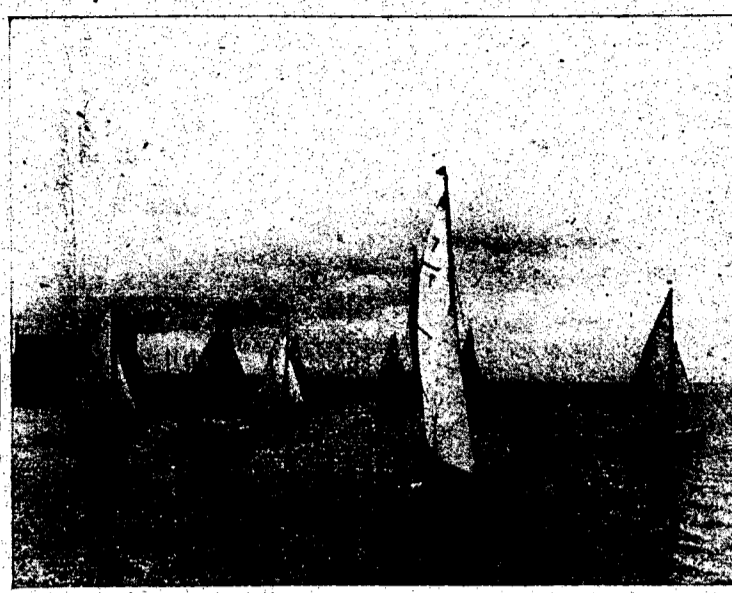
HURTON-HEFFERNAN

Later, a proposal to amalgamate Aglish and Clashmore dispensary districts was considered and it was suggested that then the residence be built in Aglish area and that the dispensary residences at Clashmore and Kereen be disposed of. This suggestion met with considerable opposition and a final decision on the matter was deferred for some months. At the last meeting of the Health Authority, however, the matter was finalised, when Mr. W. Collins proposed and Mr. P. Browne seconded that the new residence be built at Clashmore. This decision means that the dispensary doctor will continue to reside at a central position in the Clashmore area. The question of the two areas (Aglish and Clashmore) being amalgamated also now seems unlikely and it appears probable that the Aglish vacancy will be filled in the near future.

## Cappoquin Outclassed in Primary Final

**Portlaw 6-8 Cappoquin 1-4**  
**YET** another county title went Eastwards at Walsh Park, Waterford on Sunday last when Portlaw became Primary hurling champions with a facile 6-8 to 1-4 victory over Cappoquin. From a Western viewpoint it was an uneventful hour that unexpectedly terminated a hitherto impressive winning sequence en route to the decider.

Such was the confidence borne by the Cappoquin side that the result was regarded as sensational throughout the Western portion of the County. But those inattentive at the City venue were left in no doubt as to the merits of the respective sides over the hour as Portlaw's streamlined performance gave them an almost monotonous monopoly of the exchanges all through.

**MISSING STARS**  
But to fully explain Cappoquin's total eclipse would be a problem too difficult to find a satisfactory solution to. For a start, they were forced to field without Andy O'Keefe and Roger O'Shea both of whom had made valuable contributions to the side's passage to the final. These defections disrupted the general rhythm of the line-out and the subsequent enforced re-arranging of forces did little to help their cause.

Of the two, O'Shea's was probably the greater loss. This stylishly was sorely missed at midfield where despite the work of tireless Ger Mason, Portlaw's "Daw" Long and Seamus Cahill were very much on top. It should be noted that he arrived at that time when the score was 0-10 to 0-0. O'Shea's presence would not have succeeded in reversing the result, although with O'Shea and O'Keefe their margin of defeat would hardly have been as great.

**TROUBLES STEMMED FROM MIDFIELD**  
While all sectors of the side played well below par their major troubles stemmed from midfield where Portlaw cornered the roost. Except for the opening few minutes when the losers gave promise of making a game of it Portlaw dictated matters to a considerable degree. Their forwards, urged on by the promptings of their rampant midfielders threatened danger whenever on the offensive and they led comfortably (4-4 to 0-1) at half-time.

On the change over Cappoquin made numerous switches, most notable of which was the placing of Mick Lacey at midfield in an effort to break Portlaw's stranglehold in the sector. But well though Lacey played the winners continued to hold the balance of power, and there was never any semblance of doubt in that second moiety as to where the honours would rest.

**THE SCORING**  
Early Cappoquin pressure brought fruitless results, before Portlaw opened the scoring with a point from a "70" by Walsh. At the end of the first quarter Jim Jordan added a second before Gerard Kiely made it 1-2 to 0-0 with an opportunist goal.

Billy Conway had Cappoquin's solitary first-half score when he pointed in the 21st minute. But back came Portlaw and Daw Long brilliantly cut a sideline ball directly over the bar. Gerard Kiely scored goal number 2 and after Lond pointed a free, Patsy Stone and Willie Kiely sealed a marked first-half supremacy with further goals.

Portlaw again dominated from the restart and Long had a brace of points before GerMason had the losers second point of the game. Walsh from a "70" and Conway exchanged minor's before Patsy Stone put the issue beyond doubt with a well-taken goal.

Conway put some signs of respectability on the scoreboard when he goalied in the 21st minute but the closing stages were all Portlaw and Cullinane (1-0), and Long (0-2) put the finishing touches to a well-deserved triumph.

**WITHOUT A WEAKNESS**  
A winning team without a weakness. That is a brief but accurate assessment of Portlaw. They were masters of practically every situation and experienced few anxious moments during the hour.

**HISTORIC FEATURE**  
A historic feature of the side was that two fathers and two sons shared in the victory. Goalkeeper Noel Sullivan gave a superb goalkeeping exhibition and his father "Sonny" proved his worth when introduced as a sub in the second half. The Kiely "father son" combination wreaked havoc on the Cappoquin defence. Veteran Willie was ever-dangerous at full-forward while his "offspring" Gerald, was joint top-scorer with two goals. The over-all status of the defence was outstandingly high. All six gave polished exhibitions but it was O'Shea, Vincent Long and Frank Walsh in particular never put a foot astray.

**LONG WAS BRILLIANT**  
Their midfielders Dak Long and Seamus Cahill more than anyone else paved the way for victory. Long, a county minor this year, was the man of the match. He was at his irrefragable best all through and aided by an effective partner in Cahill they outplayed all opposition pitted against them. The scoreboard speaks sufficiently well of the scoring power of Portlaw's attack. Mention has already been made of the parts played by Willie and Gerald Kiely, but the remaining quartet—Jim Jordan Keith Maher, P. Cullinane and Patsy Stone also contributed handsomely to victory.

**DEPRESSING**  
What of Cappoquin? For their legion of supporters who made the long trek to Waterford, it was a depressing hour, made all the more painful by its unexpectedness. No blame however, can be attached to full-backs Jimmy Arrigan, Jim Meskill and Jimmy Lacey while Mick Lacey boined at centre-back and midfield never gave up trying. Ger Mason also, turned in a great hour at midfield but only Vincent O'Connor, Billy Conway and 55-year old veteran Paddy English accomplished anything of note in a weak attack. Portlaw—N. 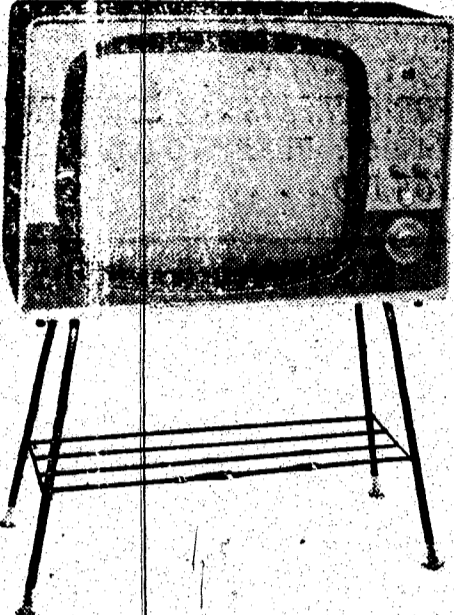

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# Ring Reign After 38 Years

### ● Gaelic Jottings

**RING SHADE IT IN EPIC REPLAY**

Reputations that were so distastefully tarnished in the drawn game a few weeks back were salvaged — and even embellished — in a thrilling junior football replay between Ring and Newtown at Dungarvan on Sunday last.

Those of us that saw both the drawn and replayed games between the sides were literally flabbergasted at the difference between the standard that prevailed on those occasions.

This replay was as thrill-consuming an hour as one could possibly wish for. Both sides were as equal in ability as the similarity of twins and at no stage was the result foreseeable by a single individual in the big attendance.

Five times in all the teams were level and it was only a minute from time that Tommy McGrath, with a coolness that truly belied the tension-charged atmosphere, tapped over the match-winning point from a 14 yards free.

Throughout, it was nip and tuck; fortunes fluctuated frequently and the lead changed hands on numerous occasions. The rancour of the drawn game was non-existent and both sides gave exemplary exhibitions of sportsmanship.

While it was a pity that either side should have to lose, few can denounce the merits of Ring's hard-earned victory. They were the better footballing team and unlike their methods in the drawn game, used the open spaces of the Fraher field to exploit this advantage.

But if Ring can rightly devour the sweetness of their success, Newtown, even in defeat, earned many new admirers. Their bid for a unique junior double has been thwarted by a solitary point and although Ring are worthy champions, they could well have completed that "junior grand slam" on Sunday.

All credit, however, to both for putting on such a top-rate decider. It surpassed by far the senior final and proved beyond all doubt that the insistence of the drawn game was just one of those days.

Incidentally this was NOT Ring's first-ever junior championship success. They were junior titleholders in 1924 when a side captained by Joe Hartly (father of Tommy Joe, present skipper) beat Grace-deu (Waterford) in the final the following year they battled their way to the senior "A" only to lose to Clashmore by a point. History has quite a habit of repeating itself. Will it do so again this coming year?

It is of interest also that besides their present inter-county senior stars Tommy Joe and Pat Hartly, other members of the side have received County recognition at different grades.

Eanna O'Faolain was honoured by the senior selectors a few years back and Nick Graves, Sean Kiely and Bobby Curran were all members of the County's minor team in 1955.

For Newtown, this was their second defeat in three years at the final hurdle. But judging by Sunday's display, ultimate success cannot be delayed much longer.

**● CRUSHING DEFEAT FOR CAPPOQUIN**

Stunning as was the news for Western followers that Cappoquin had been beaten in the Primary hurling final by Portlaw at Waterford on Sunday, the extent of that defeat — 6-8 to 1-4 threw all that had been the Cornerstone men in action during the year into a state of disbelief.

It was a result as unexpected as it was decisive and knowing the capabilities of the Western champions, it stamps Portlaw as an exceptional Primary side and one that will shake up many in the junior championship next year.

For Cappoquin it was an anti-climax to a campaign hampered by many outstanding achievements. They never produced the form that annihilated most Western opposition and except for the opening minutes were outclassed by superior opposition.

Their hopes were severely dented however, even before a ball was struck in this decider. Two of their greatest stalwarts half-back Andy O'Keefe and midfielder Roger O'Shea were

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forced to cry off with injuries and without them the side was clearly disjointed.

But if the game disappointingly failed to come up to expectations it was a historic final in many ways.

Cappoquin had in centre-forwards Paddy English one of the oldest (if not the oldest players) in the game to-day. Paddy, who is 55 was seeking his eighth medal after 40 years on the playing fields and as yet has arrived at no decision about retiring.

But if English stole much of the limelight, the composer of the Portlaw team was surely unique. For sharing in this victory were two father and son combinations who between them created their own particular piece of history.

Full forward Willie Kiely was flanked on his left by his son Gerald while Sonny Walsh (father of goalkeeper Noel, came on as a sub in the second half.

**● TRIBUTE TO CLASHMORE**

One of the finest tributes that could possibly be paid to any die, came from referee Con Crowley on Sunday last when he said Clashmore served up the finest football he had seen this year at club level when defeating Portlaw in the recent Primary football final.

When speaking to Con on Sunday, he told me he was greatly impressed by Clashmore's display in the final and he could see them going a long way if not the distance in next year's junior championship.

Coming from a man like Con Crowley, that is praise that should make every Clashmore parishioner mighty proud.

**● LATE MICHAEL CURRY RATHGORMACK**

The sympathy of this column is extended this week to the relatives of the late Michael Curry, Rathgormack, who died last week-end.

Mike, as he was so popularly known by Gaels the country over, was regarded as one of the finest footballers ever to leave the Deise county.

Besides playing for his native Rathgormack, he was also a member of the Dublin Kickhams in their halcyon days and won 3 All-Ireland medals (incidentally, 2 Dungarvan men Tommy Walsh, brother-in-law of deceased, and Hugh Hilliard also won All-Irelands with Kickhams). His last game was with Rathgormack against Dungarvan in the 1926 senior final in which he was directly opposed to Pax Whelan.

He was also a well-known figure in county circles and divided the Irish Cup with his good dog, Henry Joe.

Regarded by everyone who knew him as a gentleman on and off the field, Mike Curry has now been laid to rest, but memories of his football greatness linger on amongst those privileged enough to have seen him play.

**ABBEYSIDE TOO GOOD FOR PILTOWN**

**● MENTORS PART IN VICTORY**

**● BATTLE EBBED AND FLOWED**

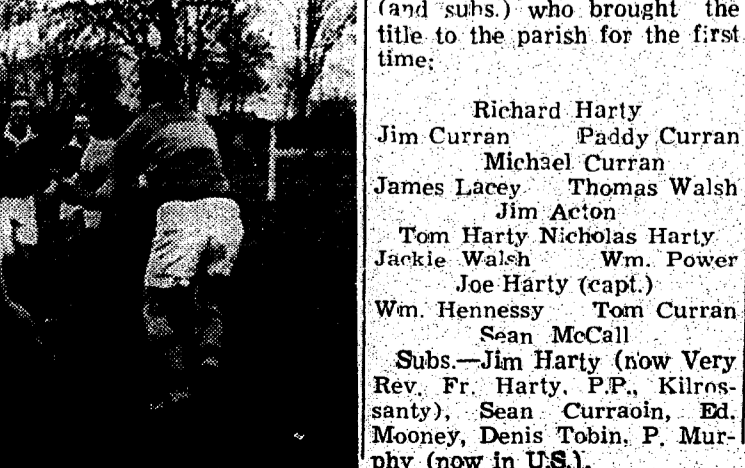
