What a Xmas Box for Ratepayers! CO. RATES UP BY 2/7

FOR three hours on Wednesday evening members of Waterford Health Authority deliberated on the Provisional Estimate of Expenses for the local financial year ending March 31st 1964. But the outcome of these deliberations

was far from being in the form of a Christmas present for the ratepayers who are now faced with increases of 2/7 and 2/5 respectively on the current year's figure for the County and City.

It was decided to adopt in full the Estimate recommended by the Estimates Committee, and to clear off during the coming year an existing debit balance of £42,596. The adoption of the recommended estimate meant an increase of 1/6 on the County and 1/1 on the City rate, while the decision to clear off the debit balance in one year against a proposal to spread it over two years put an additional 1/1 on each rate.

In a detailed report, Co. Manager S. J. Moranhan gave a figure of £290,356 for estimated gross expenditure for 1963/64 an increase of £47,020 on the current year. Receipts he anticipated would be £18,987, leaving a net increase for 1963/64 of £276,369.

The Estimate, he said, had been examined most carefully by the Estimates Committee and the figures were as far as possible without imposing the services administered by the Health Authority. He recommended that they be accepted.

Mr. D. F. Madden, a member of the Estimates Committee, said they had gone over every item on the estimate, and they now presented an honest estimate. All he could do was recommend that they pass it. It was his opinion that they had very competent officials and they had to depend on them.

Mr. John Griffin said as Chairman of the Estimates Committee, he endorsed what Mr. Madden had said. The Committee had recommended the payment of the net debit balance of £42,596 be spread over two years and he felt that a discussion on whether or not to accept that recommendation would be very useful. At the estimates meeting Mr. Norman Walsh proposed and he seconded that it be spread over two years. It was now adopted and the figures as presented in the estimate, they would be asking for an additional 1/6 for the County and 1/4 for the City rates. If the balance was spread over three years the increase would be 1/2 and 1/1 respectively. "But this," said Mr. Griffin "would be only putting off the

like to see a heavy balance cleared up but they should pay that debt over this year & next, and after that try to pay their way. To wipe out £42,000 in one year would be too much of a demand on the people. He proposed they adhere to the recommendations of the sub-committee.

Mr. Lannon said four years ago in Waterford he warned them that this would happen. They could live within the figure given if some of the gentlemen present did not give increases. They had a lot of poor people in the County and they were duty-bound to spend this money as though it was their own. They were not doing that however, he added.

Mr. Curran said that in fairness to the ratepayers they should spread the balance over 10 years. Mr. Lannon—There is £21,800 alone for increased salaries over the past year. I propose we pay it all off this year.

Replying to Mr. Milo Galgey, the Chairman, Mr. W. Kenneally said if they adopted the Estimate and paid off the balance in one year, the increased rate for County and City would be 2/7 and 2/5.

A proposal by Mr. Lannon that the balance be cleared off in one year was then put to the meeting and passed on the casting vote of the Chairman. The vote resulted in a 7-7 tie. Those who voted For were: Messrs. Lannon, Galgey, Morrissey, Gallagher, Collins, Power, Against—Messrs. Curran, Fréy, Foran, Roche, Quicke, Madden, Griffin.

Mr. Galgey said he had great pleasure in supporting Mr. Lannon's proposal. It would

give a great shock to those that gave the salary increases. The rates would be so high next year that they would not be able to give increases.

Mr. W. Foran—It will give a shock to somebody else as well. Mr. Lannon said if the balance was spread over three years it would mean an increase of more than 3/4 in the County rate. By this they were saving 5d. over the two years plus the interest.

Mr. Curran said he was proposing a total reduction of £20,000 in the estimate. They did it in the Co. Council and it worked, although it was said I could not be done. They had come to the period in their history when they could say—"there is an amount of money. Now work within it."

At this stage, Mr. Lannon questioned the cost of the action proposed by Mrs. E. F. Denny, Dungarvan, against Waterford Co. Council, arising out of the Paratyphoid outbreak in 1960. A prohibition order was served on Mrs. Denny and she was prevented from selling milk for human consumption from her dairy.

The Co. Manager said the claim was for £7,000 and the County Council could do nothing other than oppose it. If it went to court the cost might have been a lot more.

The Secretary said he had received a letter from the Co. Council's solicitor stating that immediate payment would be desirable.

SALARY SYSTEM CRITICISED

THE present system of granting increases to permanent Agricultural Instructors was severely condemned by Mr. Norman Walsh at Saturday's Committee of Agriculture meeting in Dungarvan. Appeals for amending legislation were made by him and he added that when they considered the direction from the Minister that gave increases to certain instructors, they realised that Ireland was becoming a bureaucratic paradise.

Before the meeting was a notice of motion in the name of Mr. Walsh, that the salary increases already granted to Permanent Agricultural Instructors be not now granted, as the system by which they were given was not democratic.

Mr. Walsh said there was nothing political in his motion. It was shocking that in a position could exist in the country.

Mr. Walsh: Let all other rural bodies be informed of the position. Here we are sitting like penny-boys with no say. How can we then be honestly named for the increases in the rates.

Mr. John Drohan said the whole thing revolved around amending an act of parliament.

Mr. Walsh: Yes, and to restore the powers that have been taken from us. We are directly responsible for the people who sent us in here, and it is a matter that should be aired very highly. Politics are playing their part in the General Councils and more is the pity. They should put their heads together like us down here.

Mr. Curran: There was a political exhibition given all right on the General Council.

Mr. Walsh said unless they stood on their own two feet and realised they were the people's representatives, no good would be achieved. He proposed that they call on the Minister to bring in amending legislation regarding the system of granting salary increases, and that they circulate their intentions and views to all other Committees of Agriculture.

Mr. Walsh's proposal was passed unanimously and the discussion then ended.

MOTION ON ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTORS ADJOURNED

Because of the absence of Mr. R. Dowd, a motion in his name, that a motion on additional instructors, be adjourned to the next meeting of the monthly meeting of the Waterford Committee of Agriculture.

Mr. Charles Curran said that this question had given rise to a great deal of controversy, and there seemed to be a conflict of opinion on the views of the farming community in the county. He suggested that they get the views of the N.F.A. on the matter.

Mr. William Foran said they should adopt a wait and see attitude and adjourn the motion.

Mr. Milo Galgey said he did not believe in consulting people who were not responsible for the ratepayers. Such people could come in and say what they liked, but in the final analysis it was they who had to strike a rate.

Mr. George Heskin said he felt that they should get the views of the N.F.A.

Mr. W. Foran said if the present trend was maintained they would have the small shopkeepers as well as the N.F.A. marching in protest very shortly.

TEMPORARY INSTRUCTORS GRANTED INCREASES

BY a 7-5 vote at the monthly meeting of Waterford Committee of Agriculture on Saturday last, it was decided to grant to temporary agricultural instructors similar salary increases, already granted by Ministerial direction to permanent officers.

When the matter came up for discussion, the Chairman Mr. John Fahey said the matter had already been considered at the November meeting. The position was that the Permanent Instructors had been granted increases in salary, and they now had to decide whether or not they would bring their temporary officers into line with them.

Replying to Mr. Wm. Foran, the C.A.O. Mr. P. Conroy said his information was that they were granting the same increases to the other officers.

Mr. J. O'Quinn said that case which had been all out in instructors permanent.

were getting very good satisfaction from the temporary men, and they should be very cautious how they voted.

Mr. Walsh said that while Mr. Foran was no spendthrift in public life, he disagreed with him now. They were in a unique position—so unique that the power was being taken out of their hands, and until that position was changed they should adopt a very strong line. The system that was operating was no longer democratic.

Mr. Foran said he now had second views on the matter, and would withdraw his support for it.

Mr. Heskin: Well, I will propose it so. Mr. John Drohan seconded it. Mr. Curran said this was the best time this issue would arise as practically all the instructors were going permanent. The proposal to grant the increases to the temporary personnel was then put to the vote and carried by the two-thirds majority.

Those taking part in the film include actors Des Perry, Art O'Laoghaire and Thomas Hayes (who himself is a producer of note; he directed "The Cradle of Genius", a documentary on the Abbey Theatre).

Also present at the social which followed were writer Risteard de Paor, Actress Maura Kinsella and Godfrey Graham of Telefís Eireann. The films were inaugurated in Irish by Rev. Fr. V. de Paor and later shown in Coláiste na Rinne to the children.

Colm O'Laoghaire thanked all the parishioners and the members of Aisteoirí na nEaglais Phobail and Aisteoirí na Rinne for their co-operation in the making of the film and said that this film was now regarded by many competent critics as the most authentic documentary yet to come out of rural Ireland. It was authentic because it was acted and directed by Irishmen.

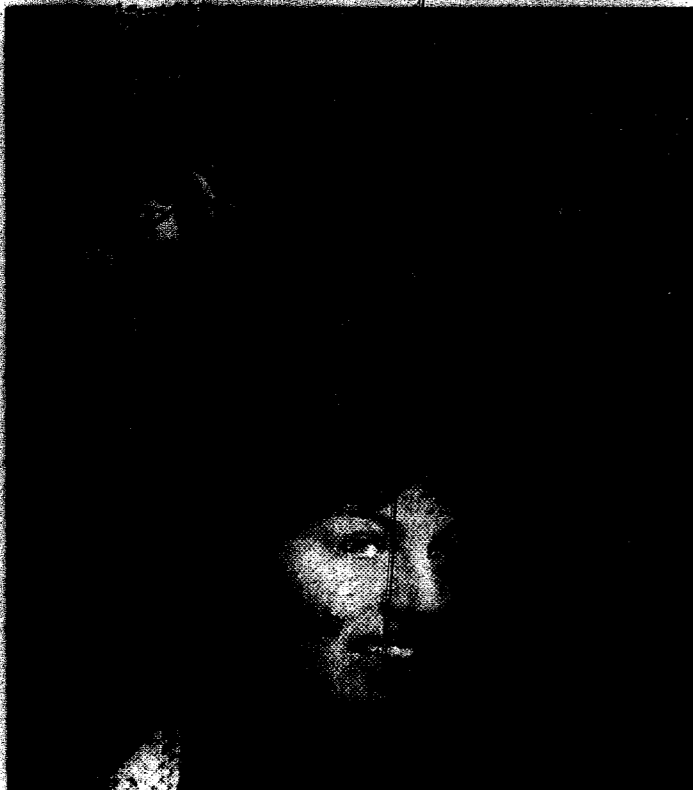

THE STARS OF '62

Mick O'Connell and Donie Nealon. These are the Gaelic stars of 1962, as decided by the Gaelic Award selection committee on Monday night last. Both have had memorable years highlighted by a series of classic displays in their respective codes and are worthy choices for these coveted awards.

Mick O'Connell, as predicted in last week's issue, was a unanimous choice. Only two others—team-mate Tom Long and Dubliner Des Foley were ever considered but neither offered the slightest challenge to the Valentia star.
