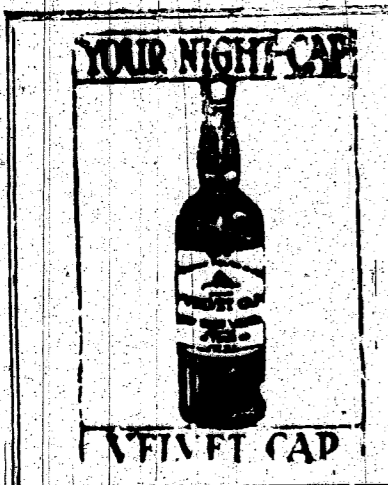

RECORD PRICE FOR LAND

"Not Funny At All"

— Says Deputation Member

WHILE the difficulties facing sheep owners and their flocks as a result of the snow blizzard, were related at last Saturday's Committee of Agriculture meeting, members were confronted with yet another problem, when a two-man farming deputation protested to the Committee about sheep trespassing on their lands. It was alleged by one member that when he went to put the sheep off his land, he was faced by Nire Valley men waving plants, and added that the position "wasn't funny at all."

Mr. Maurice Tobin said they came before the Committee as a last resort. They realised the sheep were trespassing on their land but the rest of the people would have to be considered also. They had to go to feed and they had to be watched, morning, noon and night. He saw seven or eight hundred sheep in a 9-acre field and had to turn out loads of them at different times during the day. The remarks of a respondent with whom he spoke to about the matter were "I know nothing about them."

We can't afford to feed these sheep, added Mr. Tobin. I also involves a lot of time to go out and clear out the sheep and then we find later that they are back again. Mr. John Hickey, Touraneena said he had a 25 acre farm bounded by two Land Commission estates. The sheep wandered from the estates on to his land and when he went to put them out he was threatened by several Nire Valley men. He couldn't live as his cat he were half starving.

AWARE OF THEIR PLANS
The Chairman, Mr. John Fahey said they were aware of the problems and sympathised with them. With all the snow it had been impossible to make any arrangements. A meeting was being held today (Saturday) in the Nire and they would do all they could for the case. The Nire men he concluded were as good as any for taking care of their sheep.

Mr. M. Harty said they had to go to the help of the Co. Council, Forestry Department, and the Land Commission to get some fences around these areas. The C.A.O. (Mr. P. Conroy) said they did not drop in the

DECISION ON RAILWAY LINE WITHIN A MONTH

Dr. Andrews, Chairman of C.I.E. will be able to make a decision on the Mallow-Waterford railway line within a month, said Col. Charles Curran, before the adjournment of last Monday's County Council meeting.

Col. Curran said he had been in touch with Dr. Andrews personally and had received that information from him.

Col. Norman Walsh said he had been really going to say nothing about the matter all day. He felt no good result would come about unless they sent a deputation to Dr. Andrews.

Col. Curran said Dr. Andrews was most anxious to meet a deputation from the Co. Council.

Col. T. Lannon said C.I.E. would be giving themselves a rest next. They would break the country if they kept on as they were going. The discussion then ended.

Two New Industries for Dungarvan

DUNGARVAN, County Waterford's capital, is eagerly preparing for an employment boom. Last week news that a factory backed by Irish and U.S. interests was to be established in the town, was received with great interest and elation by local residents. Reports stated that when in full operation the factory would give employment to 300. As yet no official information as to the nature of the factory has been made available.

Now following that announcement comes news of a second new factory for the town. It will be sponsored by the Irish Sugar Company and will entail the processing of soft fruit and vegetables.

The news was broken by Mr. George Heskin at last Saturday's meeting of Waterford County Council. Mr. Heskin who is a member of the Best Growers Association said the fruit and vegetables would be grown by farmers and small holders in the West Waterford area.

Mr. Heskin also said he had been approached by Lieut. General Cos. O'Connell, General Manager of the Irish Sugar Company, who is in West Waterford. He was anxious to establish a factory in the town where it was felt premises might be available at the apple factory. Strawberries, he said, were already being processed for the Sugar Company at the apple factory.

The factory would employ 200 workers when in full production and it would definitely be situated in Dungarvan. Mr. Heskin said the factory was expected to be in production by 1964.

"WONDERFUL NEWS"
The news of these factories for Dungarvan will be greatly welcomed by all. One trader said it was "wonderful news" and said that all sections of the community would benefit by it.

IRISH IN ENGLAND
By standards, Dungarvan is one of the best provincial towns in the country. Yet there are many young local people who are in England because of lack of work. This news then will be greatly welcomed by them. When the industries have been set up, unemployment in the town will be at an end and a call for workers—both male and female may be sent across the waters.

It is, we feel sure, a call that will meet with a 100% response.

CO. COUNCIL MEETING ADJOURNED
The monthly meeting of Waterford County Council, due to be held on Monday last was postponed, as more than half the members were unable to attend on account of the prevailing rural conditions. The meeting has been re-fixed for today (Friday) at 11 a.m.

Col. T. Lannon said he was interested in a few financial matters on the agenda and as he would be going away on business he would ask for a month's adjournment. Col. Lannon asked what their annual estimate was likely to be this year. Mr. Curran (Chairman) said it would be out of order and quite improper to say until the Estimates Committee had met. The Estimate, however, was likely to be very controversial.

Col. Norman Walsh said they could be prepared for a 5% increase this year. The Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dowling said several members phoned in saying they would be unable to attend and asked that the meeting be postponed.

Col. Lannon said if they adjourned the meeting they should do so for a month. Col. Curran—That is not feasible.

Col. Lannon—There are items on the agenda that I am very interested in. Col. Curran—Is the salary one. We would adjourn that for a month.

Dep. Kyne (mover of the motion seeking retrospective payment in salaries for a section of the Council's clerical staff) said he would not object to having it postponed for a month. Col. J. Butler said they had only seven or eight members present and any decisions arrived at that day might not be a true view of the Council. Col. W. Dower suggested that the meeting be held later in the week. It was then agreed to adjourn the meeting to Friday and if another postponement is necessary the item re salaries will be adjourned to the monthly meeting in February.

HARDSHIPS OF RECENT SNOW BLIZZARD RECALLED

THE plight of many County Waterford farmers and the hardships endured during the recent snow blizzard were vividly told by members at last Saturday's Committee of Agriculture meeting in Dungarvan. Tributes were paid by the Chairman, Mr. John Fahey to C.A.O., P. Conroy and his staff, to Mr. Kieran O'Ryan, Co. Councillor and Committee member who did trojan work in helping to relieve the people of the Nire Valley and to all others who helped in no small way to fight the crisis.

Mr. Fahey said when the emergency arose—and emergency it was in every sense of the word—the C.A.O. immediately got to work. Sheep were dying from hunger and exposure and since the emergency, Mr. Conroy (C.A.O.) had been in the Nire Valley nearly every day and was on the phone to him, morning, noon and night. Mr. Fahey went on: "He was first successful in making hay available. Then following consultations with me, he contacted the Land Commission and got land for the stranded sheep."

The Chairman also praised Agricultural Instructor Nicholas Molloy who worked day and night making arrangements for the removal of sheep off the mountains. Also Knockmeal Creamery and Mr. O'Donnell, Clonmel, and the drivers who made the lorries available for the removal of the sheep.

WORKED TIRELESSLY
Nor would they forget the County Council roadworkers, he said, as it would have been impossible to move them had the workers not cleared the roads. The engineers too, worked tirelessly and the South Tipp, Civil Defence and Red Cross helped greatly to relieve the hardships in that area.

"Our colleague Kieran O'Ryan is another who was out day and night and did not spare himself. I myself was out but I could never hope to equal the trojan work of Mr. O'Ryan."

The Land Commission too, made the land available for sheep and it was never known before for them to make a decision so fast. They came forward in a wonderful way and even on Friday last we were given another estate near Clonmel.

ACT OF MERCY
The Chairman appealed to all private owners with lands available to make them available for the sheep. It might only be for a month or so and would be an act of mercy. It would be terrible to see sheep dying on the mountains from

me, were standing by, ready to go to the aid of the Nire Valley. In Dungarvan, some one said there was no emergency in the area. Had the military been allowed to the Valley all the sheep could have been saved.

Mr. Fahey—This morning as we came to Dungarvan we saw workers shovelling lumps of snow that had been lying on the roadside into the fields, while other people are still snowed in. Something is wrong some place.

Mr. M. Harty said there was a glacial spirit of co-operation and he hoped it would continue for a long time.

Mr. Norman Walsh—Could the County Council by unanimous decision on Monday make the machinery available for these private roads?

Mr. Fahey—The County Council may also have to get permission.

Mr. George Heskin said there should be legislation where they could go onto these roads in an emergency, without getting permission from elsewhere.

The C.A.O. (Mr. Conroy) said he would like to thank the five young instructors who took over strategic points on the mountain shepherding themselves with the sheep. He personally was very proud of them.

He also wished to state that he could not have got better assistance from anyone than he got from the Co. Engineer from the start. He and his workers and machinery put themselves at their disposal and Mr. Hally said he was as interested in saving stock as anyone else but he had no legal right to go on private roads as with the machinery.

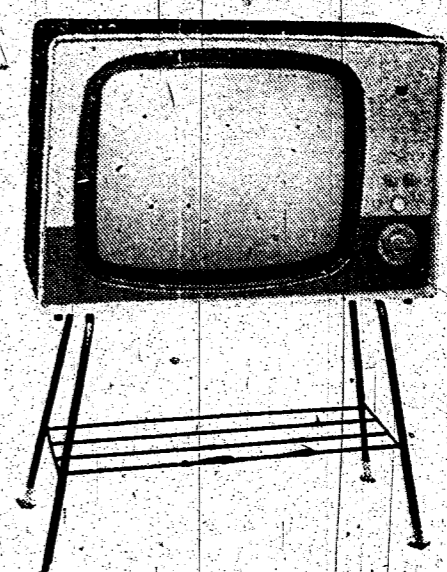
The Chairman said he could not see why the Council, in such an emergency could not have got permission to clear those roads.

Mr. O'Ryan also thanked South Tipp, Civil Defence, the Land Commission and the C.A.O. whom he said worked tirelessly.

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Pay for Seed: Free Inspection

At last Saturday's meeting of the County Committee of Agriculture, it was unanimously decided to make potato seed available for 33 growers in the County provided they pay for the seed. The Committee will give free inspection. Previously it had been decided to drop the Potato Scheme but at Saturday's meeting Mr. Michael Harty said he had been requested by the people for its continuation. Mr. Norman Walsh said they should keep to their previous decision. He did not believe in

subsidising a small section of the community at the expense of the county, at large. In a few weeks time they would be faced with a rate increase of about 6%.

Mr. Harty said the scheme would be putting money in the growers' pockets. The C.A.O. (Mr. P. Conroy) said if they did not have the scheme they would have to import seed potatoes from Donegal at a great deal of expense. He was not aware that any of the County Committee of

HAND FEEDING AND CARE OF SHEEP
Flock owners who are in a position to give some additional feeding to their sheep at the present time are well advised to do so.
Even limited rations of hay, bales or at the shed stage, swedes and baled straw in sweet condition will keep the sheep in strength while the ground remains covered with snow.
The feeding of concentrates in sheep troughs is strongly recommended. Rolled Oats, Ground Feed Wheat, and Bran can be used in mixture 5: 4: 1. Feed up to 1 lb. each per day. Mountain sheep will take this supplementary feed quite readily if they are confined to a small area of ground when the rations are being offered to them.

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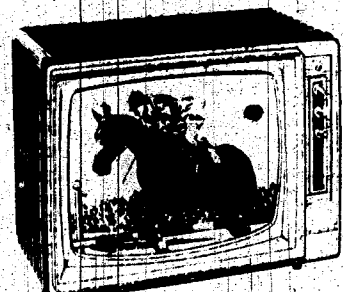
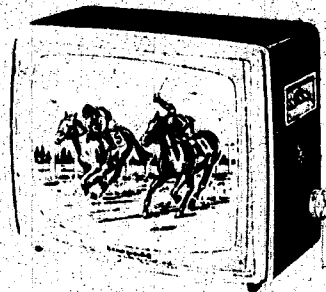
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TALLOW NOTES

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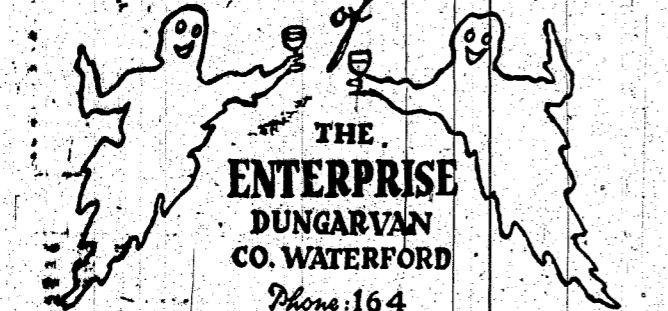
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NATIONAL TEACHERS MEET

"NIRE VALLEY PEOPLE NOT FORGOTTEN"

PRIOR to the adjournment of last Monday's County Council meeting (weather conditions prevented more than half the members from attending), an allegation was made by Colr. Kieran O'Ryan, during a discussion on the recent county-wide snow crisis, that the people of the Nire Valley were completely forgotten about.

The allegation was emphatically denied by County Engineer Mr. J. D. Hally, who added that no one on his staff spared themselves in helping out the hard-hit areas.

Referring to the matter of the outside, the Chairman, Colr. Charles Curran said that during the past month they had experienced very severe weather conditions. He now wished to thank Mr. Hally, his Engineering staff, road workers, drivers and all others who had helped to clear the roads and brought help to families in need. All worked magnificently and the work done in the county was the best in the whole country. He personally had received many messages of gratitude for the work done.

"RED TAPE"

Mr. W. Dower said he agreed entirely with Colr. Curran but felt it was a pity the machinery could only be used on the public roads. Many people were snowed in and the Council could not help them because of some "red tape."

Deputy Kyne said he also wished to endorse Colr. Curran's remarks. While in Dublin he had heard adverse remarks about other County Councils, and he was glad to say that was not the case in Waterford.

Colr. Curran—The work he was magnificent. The Council staffs worked day and night and the people of the county are delighted and proud of them.

Colr. Norman Walsh asked if relief could be given to some people not on public roads who are still bound in by snow.

PROUD

The County Engineer thanking the members for their kind remarks, said he was proud of the work being done by his own engineering and working staffs, and also by the men from whom machinery was hired. As far as the other roads (non public) were concerned, if there was need for any emergency, such as a horse, a car or a tractor, they would have gone on the roads. However, they had to draw their own somewhere and they had

no legal right to go on these roads. If it was the Council's wish that they go on these roads then they would see what they could do about it.

Colr. N. Walsh—That was the feeling of the Committee of Agriculture on Saturday.

Mr. Hally said he told the Chief Agricultural Officer, Mr. P. Conroy, that they would do any emergency work asked for. As matters stood it was not legal for the Council to go on to roads that were not public.

HALF WAY THROUGH DIFFICULTY

Colr. K. O'Ryan said they were only half-way through the difficulty yet as "Saturday night's snow" had added to the general hardship.

There was a note of emergency in the Nire Valley, continued Colr. O'Ryan, and some in Dungarvan said there was an emergency in that area. He asked for the military in County to be sent out but while they were polishing their buttons no word came to send them. As yet old people in the Valley have to carry their own loads through the snow for hours of four hundred yards. The South Tip, Civil Defence said they might assist once but what were the Dungarvan Civil Defence doing?

Mr. Hally—They were out helping also.

Colr. O'Ryan—Is holding socials their only function?

Mr. Hally—That is a very generous remark.

Colr. O'Ryan—They were forgotten about in the Nire Valley.

Mr. Hally—They were not.

Colr. O'Ryan—The workers deserve the praise more than the engineers.

Mr. Hally said the Civil Defence in Dungarvan willingly volunteered their services. Nor was it fair to say the Nire Valley was forgotten about. There was more plant put there than in any other place in the County.

Colr. O'Ryan—Surely the military could have been brought out. They had the men and trucks at their disposal. The Council workers went to the help of the people and so

bad was it that a corpse had to be taken through the snow by hand.

Colr. Curran (Chairman) said he was in the Treasurer's office one day during the crisis when an emergency came through and an order for a possible help was given immediately.

Replying to Colr. O'Ryan, the Co. Engineer said that while the Nire suffered greatly other parts of the county were also badly hit by snow.

Colr. Curran said between Clashmore and Dungarvan there were people who could not get their cars out.

Colr. O'Ryan—The military should have been let into the Nire Valley. Again I say the people there were completely forgotten about.

Mr. Hally—There is no justification at all for that remark. I would also like to point out that the Civil Defence is a voluntary organisation and we cannot tell them what to do.

Colr. O'Ryan said the only excuse the sergeant in Ballymacabry could give about the military was that they would not justify the expense.

Colr. J. Doherty asked if the Council could by resolution give the Co. Engineer the power to put the machinery on non-public roads.

Colr. N. Walsh said the Council on its own was totally inadequate to deal with the crisis and the military should have been called out. For that the Minister for Defence was to blame.

Finally it was decided to have the matter brought up in the Dail to find out who is responsible for sealing an area an emergency one.

DID WONDERFUL JOB

Colr. Curran said the County Engineer was not the senior official in the County, and Mr. Hally would not be within his jurisdiction to declare emergency areas. He was, however, quite satisfied that Mr. Hally and his staff did a wonderful job and he was very pleased with the manner in which the machinery had been got going right away. The workers, he added, also deserved praise for their strenuous efforts.

Colr. Tom Lannon said after this blizzard, when train was the only means of transport for a few days, the people who were thinking of closing down the railway, should think again.

Colr. O'Ryan said if the Nire area had been declared an emergency one, the Government would have helped.

Colr. Curran said he would like to emphasise that other areas in the county were as badly hit as Ballymacabry and the Nire.

N.F.A. DID NOTHING

Colr. Denis Montayne said one organisation that did nothing during the crisis was the N.F.A. Yet they had hundreds

of them marching through the streets of Dungarvan last year protesting about the rates.

Mr. Hally said if it had been a regular occurrence they could have been prepared for it, but owing to its unexpectedness, miracles could not have been expected. He had no apologies to make for what they did or didn't do and he was satisfied no hardship was caused to people unnecessarily.

FISH FOR FRIDAY—AND OTHER DAYS TOO

A man who knows a great deal about fish and fishing is Dr. A. E. J. Went, D.Sc., Ph.D., A.R.C.S., M.R.I.A., Scientific Adviser, Fisheries Branch, Department of Lands.

22 Motions Listed for Convention

SUNDAY is Convention day within the County, when delegates from all clubs stand on equal footing and review a year that in many ways has been spectacularly successful. Dungarvan as heretofore will be the venue for this annual get-together, which commences at 2 p.m.

Again outgoing Secretary Declan Goode presents a detailed report of the year's activities. He deals at length with the County's appearances in all grades during the year, with particular emphasis on the senior hurlers. Their championship successes and failure are recalled while just tribute is paid to them for their wonderful O'eachtas victory.

Of the senior hurling county final in which Erin's Own wrested the title from Mount Sun, Declan is lavish in his praises. Congratulations are extended to both finalists in serving up hurling that will be remembered for many a day. Financially he says the Board is in a strong position, and he looks with confidence to '63 when Waterford will again battle their way back to the top.

Unopposed Declan Goode is again unopposed as Secretary. For night on quarter of a century now he has filled the role of Secretary with honour and distinction. His value to

the Board is appreciated in all corners of the County and his unassuming character has gained for him an enormous degree of popularity.

Outgoing Chairman and Treasurer Jamie Moloney N.T. and Paddy Kennedy respectively also have opposition listed against them but as with the Secretaryship, they will in all probability be re-elected without a contest. Nicolas Mac Craith has been nominated to stand against Mr. Moloney, while Mick Doyle (Mt. Sion) has found support for treasurership.

Three nominations have been received for the two positions as representatives to the Munster Council, Outgoing men Tom Lannon and Seamus Power are again in the field, with Donald Whelan and Nicolas Mac Craith.

There are a total of 22 motions down for discussion which are given hereunder: 1—That any club asked to travel over 25 miles for a championship or league fixture be given not less than £10 expenses.

2—That all county finals rotate each year between east and West Waterford, starting this year with hurling in West and football in the East; (B) also that each year in both divisions of the County, the finals will rotate between the clubs approved by County Board. That the existing bye-laws be rescinded if any.

3—That the venues for all County Finals be fixed at same meeting of County Board. Ceapach Chuain (1, 2, 3) 4—That all county finals be played in Eastern and Western venues on alternate years except in the case of agreement between teams from the same division contesting the finals. Hurling finals and football finals to be played in different divisions, i.e. the one year (Existing bye-laws) to be amended accordingly.

5—in the event of draws in injured players. 19—That the Co. Board be instructed to procure a suitable playing field in the Kilmacthomas area.

20—That in future replays of the County senior finals, the participating clubs be entitled to share each of the gross gate. 21—That in future senior county finals and inter-county games, the rest of Walsh Park be increased from £25 to £50.

22—That in 1963 each Club be furnished with a current copy of the County Bye-laws. Rogha Eireann (18, 19, 20, 21, 22)

23—That a set of hurleys be made available to juvenile hurling teams that took part in the 1962 juvenile hurling championships. Cathal Bruha (7)

24—That the Phelan Cup be run on a two-Division league system, commencing on or after first Sunday in October and the final between the Division winners to be played on or before first Sunday in May. De La Salle (8)

25—That the senior hurling and senior football finals be played in Waterford and Dungarvan on alternative years and the remaining championship county finals be played at an Eastern or Western venue on alternative years. Existing Bye-laws to be amended accordingly. Gall Tir (9)

26—That senior and junior clubs who regrade players to their Primary team may not pay those regraded players against a primary team proper. Naomh Mhuire (10)

28—That all Junior and Primary teams attached to senior clubs be drawn against each other in the first rounds of the championship. 15—That the following paragraph be added under sub-heading (e) to Rule 95, Page 93, O.G. 1962: "Rule to be amended accordingly. Neither team concerned in an objection shall take any further part in the same competition until the alleged infringements have been disposed of by Divisional, County or Provincial Committee."
