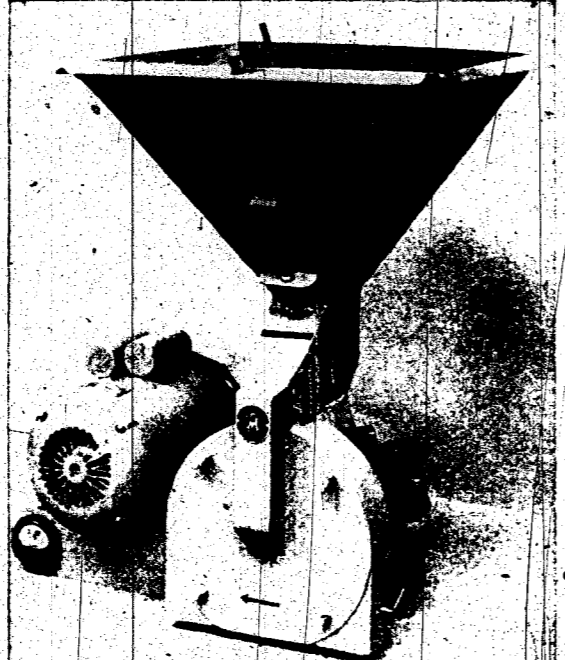

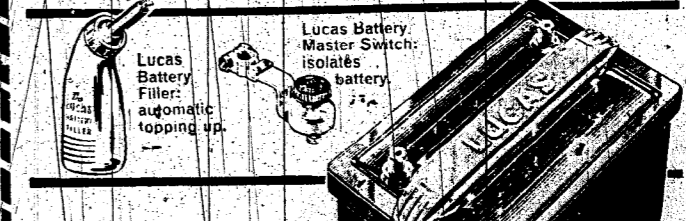
Local oarsmen, undaunted by the severe weather conditions, have been regular in their attendance at the coming season.

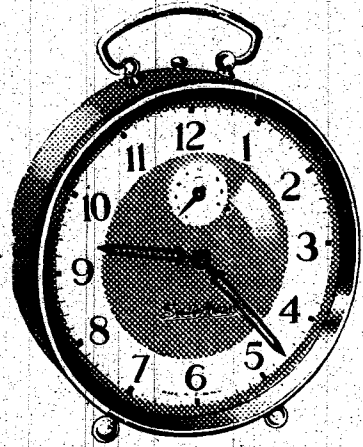

DUNGARVAN MAN DIES IN THE U.S.A.

We take the following from an American paper:

Funeral services were held recent at St. Mary's Church of Michael J. Drohan, 88, retired signal engineer of the Boston and Maine Railroad, and a resident of Winchester for 70 years.

Celebrant of a Solemn High Requiem Mass was his son, Rev. Athanasius, C.P., of Our Lady of Sorrows Monastery, West Springfield.

Mr. Drohan died December 28 at his home 85 Nelson St., after an extended illness. He was born in Dungarvan, Co. Wick, and came to this country as a youth. He served the signal department of the Boston and Maine for 62 years, holding one of the road's longest employment records on his retirement.

On the occasion of his 50th anniversary he was honored at a testimonial banquet attended by many top rail officials of the East. Presiding at the banquet was the then Governor-elect, Maurice J. Tobin.

He was considered one of the top signal interlocking authorities of the country and when the Boston and Maine installed its modern freight classification yards outside North Station he was in charge of all signal work. He served for many years as signal consultant to the Maine Central Railroad.

He was married to the former Johanna Fitzgerald at St. Mary's Church, on December 26, 1896. She died five years ago.

He was a charter member of St. Mary's Holy Name Society and was a member of the Winchester Lodge, B.P.O.E. and many railroad organizations. During his entire 70-year residence here he lived on Nelson Street.

Besides Fr. Athanasius he leaves three sons: Edward W., director of public relations at Boston City Hospital; Walter M., registrar of the Lowell Technological Institute; and John M., of the auditing department of the B. & M., and a daughter, Sister Athanasia, C.S.J., of the Regis College faculty, Weston, Mass. Six grand children.

Interment was at Calvary Cemetery, Montvale.

OPENING OF SALMON SEASON

Severe cold and unsuitable weather prevailed for the opening of the salmon net and rod season on Friday, February 1st, when the rod men had more luck than the net men.

In Youghal, no salmon were taken on the first day; two were taken at Ardallaigh and three at the Dromana/Villertown area. The rod men, especially in careysville, did much better, when eight salmon were landed. In this stretch of the river known as the golden mile, forty salmon were taken for the first three days. Net fishermen do not expect any great results in this abnormal weather, but with a softening, it is expected that there will be a vast improvement. On Monday nine fish were taken by the Youghal boats, ten up river and so far there are no catches at Ardmore and Ballycotton. The opening price this week to fishermen was 9/- per lb.

Among the 27 choice bred mares hooked to visit Tambourine II this season are Tahiti, winner of the 1954 Prix de Diane (French Oaks), Capriccio, whose four successful produce include the 1962 Prix de Diane winner, Sorja and Piampert who ran second to Mrs. Howell Jackson's Never Too Late II in the 1960 English Oaks.

Although Tambourine II has not been syndicated, breeders looking for nominations have been obliged to contract for a four year period, which is believed to be unprecedented and preference has been given to those who made take to pose rather than sell the offspring. Well-known breeders who have taken up nominations include: Mrs. J. Stern, Mrs. Strassburger, Mrs. Susy Volterra, Mr. Marcel Bousset, Mr. E. de Brignac, Mme. E. de Cazaux, M. P. Dubosson, Mr. Howell E. Jackson, Mr. Winston Guest, Earl of Harrington, Hon. R. Watson, Mrs. A. B. Biddle, Mr. G. R. Askew, Mr. Phil Bull, Mr. H. D. A. Williams, Lord Howard de Winton, Mr. J. F. C. Bray and Mr. Joseph M. Grath.

On the basis of the announced figure of 550 guineas (no foal no fee) the stallion, given 75% fertility, will have earned about £60,000 by 1966 when his first crop appear on the racecourse. Assuming a 10% success, by his two year-old's the Stallion's fee could be £50,000 and if his first crop of three year olds includes some smart winners, one would estimate Tambourine's earnings reaching £40,000 to £50,000 a year.

It is, therefore, not within the bounds of possibility that starting off as he does with such eminent mares, his sabbatical animal could earn during the course of his stud career, something in the order of half-a-million pounds. That prospect is with in his grasp because of his victory in the Irish Sweepstake Derby, 1962 (total value £67,370).

THE LAST PASSENGER TRAIN

On Saturday night last, the last regular passenger train left Cork for Youghal and return amid fog signal detonations at Cork Station. There was no formal close down or farewells, although large crowds gathered at the intermediate stations, especially at Killeagh, to cheer the four carriage diesel train, driven by J. The train arrived back at Cork Station at 8.45 without any ceremony. 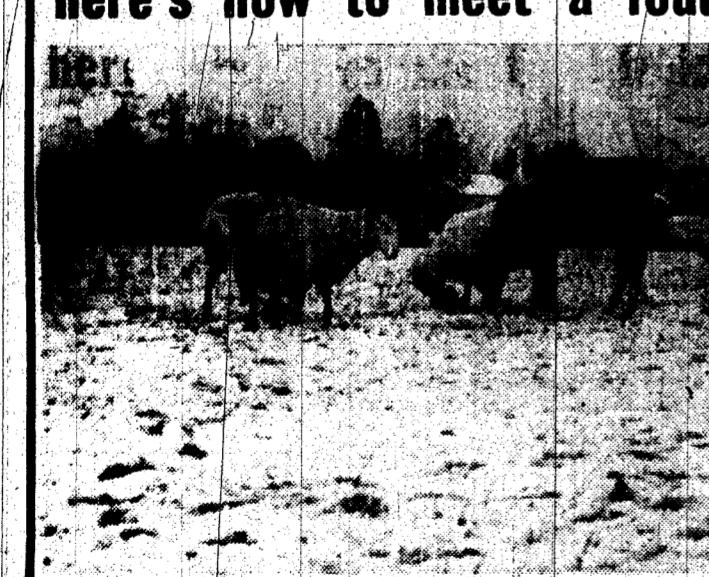
