## TALLOW NOTES

### LATE MR. JAMES DEANE

The death of Mr. James Deane, which occurred at his Chapel Street residence recently, evoked feelings of the deepest sorrow in the town and surrounding districts. The late Jim Deane came to Tallow from his native Middleton in 1915. He was employed as baker at Mr. M. J. Beechers for over 40 years.

In 1917 he formed the first hurling club in the town, and in 1925 they won the county junior hurling championship, with Jim in goal. He was selected as goalie for the Waterford senior hurling team in the Munster championship against Clare, which was played at Dungarvan.

A man of many admirable qualities, the town will be much the poorer on his passing. The remains were borne on the shoulders of former teammates to the Church of the Immaculate Conception, Tallow, and a guard of honour of hurlers walked beside the remains, which were received and blessed by Rev. Fr. M. Condon C.C., assisted by Rev. Fr. F. Lucey C.C. The interment took place in the adjoining cemetery, the above clergy again officiating.

# Lenten Pastoral

## LENTEEN REGULATIONS

Hereunder we give His Lordship's Most Rev. Dr. Cohalan's Pastoral and Lenten Regulations for the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore.

1.—Meat is allowed on all days in Lent, except Ash Wednesday, the Wednesday of Ember Week (6th March) and Fridays.

2.—Those between 21 and 67 years of age, who are bound to fast, may take meat and meat soup only once each day at their principal meal.

3.—Those who are bound to fast may take only one full meal and two light collations.

4.—From 12 to 18 ounces of solid food are permitted at these combined collations, that is, two-thirds of the quantity of food usually taken at breakfast and evening tea.

5.—One egg may be taken both in the morning and evening as part of these collations, and so may butter, cheese, milk, fruit, cereals and fish.

6.—The division of the total amount of food allowed at the two collations is left to the choice of the individual, and so are the hour and order of the meals, e.g. dinner about midday and collation in the evening or vice versa.

7.—A cup of tea or coffee may be taken, as often as desired.

8.—Parish Priests, ven. outside of Confession, and Confessors are empowered to dispense from the Law of Fasting or from the Law of Abstinence or from both.

9.—On Sundays there will be neither fast nor abstinence.

10.—Lenten Fast and Abstinence cease at Midnight on Holy Saturday.

Bishop's House, Waterford, 18th February, 1963

Very Rev. and Rev. Fathers and Dear Brethren,

LENT  
Once again the holy season of Lent is at hand. These forty days of prayer and self-denial will give us special opportunities of preparing ourselves, so that we may worthily commemorate the great mysteries of our salvation. At the end of Lent, during Holy Week, we shall commemorate Our Lord's Passion and Death on Good Friday, and His glorious Resurrection from the dead on Easter Sunday.

During Lent, therefore, we are invited to pause in the midst of our work and to take stock of our personal lives—to look into our very souls, so that we may discover how we stand before the all-seeing eye of God, and whether or not we are travelling along the road of life in the direction that will take us safely and surely to our eternal home with God in heaven.

Our Leader in life is Jesus Christ, who died on the Cross on Good Friday that we might be saved from the consequences of sin and that we might live with Him forever. He will, one day, be our Judge, and we know that he judges all persons and things, not according to their external appearances, but according to their inner goodness and truth. Human respect and public opinion, impose on us all a certain observance of external propriety; but we have a higher rule, we must strive not merely to appear upright and true before the eyes of men, but to be upright and true in the sight of God. Our Father, who is in heaven.

I avail, therefore, of this opportunity to ask every individual man and woman, every boy and girl in the Diocese to hearken to the call of Lent—the voice of God Himself calling us to be generous in the practice of prayer, self-denial and the conscientious discharge of the duties of each one's state in life. It is most heartening to know how many people, young and old, make an effort to as-

sume the Lenten regulations. I do not need to remind you that we are living in the midst of a world that is changing day by day, even hour by hour. It is evident that we must all adapt ourselves to the constantly changing world in which we live. We cannot hold back the hands of the clock. The world grows smaller day by day as man penetrates the secrets of God's creation. New and more efficient means of communication and of transport have transformed us from being an isolated nation and race into a community that is in the very midst of things and at the crossroads of the world, so to speak. Now, more than ever before, do we realise that we in Catholic Ireland, constitute only a very small part of a world that is for the great part a pagan, Godless world.

No longer are our young people sheltered and protected from ideas and theories of life, standards of human conduct and behaviour, that have their source not in God but in Satan. It is little wonder that many of our young people are bewildered by the contradiction they find between the way of life they have learnt in the home and in the school, and the way of life that is portrayed for them in the cinema, the radio, the television and the dance hall.

**OUR CATHOLIC HOMES**

in this life and to be happy with Him for ever in the next.

Because it is more difficult than ever before for young people to-day to avoid temptation and sin—because, to-day, there are more insidious traps set to ensnare the young and the innocent and the weak, our boys and girls, to-day, need more than ever before to receive the unique help of God's grace by means of prayer and by the frequent reception of the Sacraments. Our Lord said: **"all you who labour and are heavily burdened, come to Me and I will refresh you."** Regular daily prayer, frequent Confession and Holy Communion, will most surely enable our young people to find the strength to overcome evil and to lead lives that are noble and upright and good.

I rely on you, therefore, dear Catholic parents, to do everything in your power to ensure that your own boys and girls will form strong habits of devout and regular prayer at home and in the House of God. I rely on your own deep appreciation of the incalculable value of Confession and of Holy Communion, to see to it that your children, as they grow from childhood into the difficult years of youth, do not neglect every opportunity of making sincere Confession of their faults and receiving the All-Holy Body and Blood of the Lord in Holy Communion. And because no lesson or command can be as effective as the example of your own Catholic life I ask, dear Catholic fathers and mothers, that you yourselves be constant and faithful in prayer and in the practice of monthly Confession and frequent Holy Communion.

I appeal, also, to the young men and women, boys and girls, of the Diocese. My dear young people, I ask you all to be loyal and true at all times and on all occasions to your Irish and Catholic Faith and noble traditions. Love God, Who created you—love Him in the person of Jesus Christ, His Eternal Son and your Saviour, Love Mary, the Mother of Jesus and your heavenly Mother, too. Love the father and mother whom God has given you in this life—love them always and be loyal to them through thick and thin. Whether you are near or far away from them, shrink from doing what would hurt them or bring discredit on the home from which you have sprung. Aim high in life and try to do well. Be happy, with the true happiness that comes from doing only what your Catholic conscience tells you is right and good.

In your daily life be conscious of the great blessing and privilege it is for you to know and believe in the religion that has come to us from God, Our Creator, through the lips of His Son, Jesus Christ, the God-Man. Aim at being an Apostle of the true religion to others, especially when you mix and mingle with those who do not know Jesus Christ or believe in Him, or obey Him. Seek to understand your religion better every day. Your religion, because it has come to you from God Himself, holds the answer to all the problems of life, it holds the answer to all the problems of your life. Be on your guard against every kind of propaganda for what is evil and untrue. In your study, in your work, in your recreation, be able to discern and pass right judgment on what is presented to you—the ideas, the theories of life, the standards of conduct, be able to discern what is right and what is wrong in the light of the extraordinary knowledge that is yours because God has revealed His truth to your mind and He has given you laws to obey for love of Him.

At this time, also, I should like to renew the appeals already made to the Priests and Faithful people of the Diocese for prayers to invoke the help of God's grace and blessing on all who are engaged under Our Holy Father, Pope John XXIII, in the tremendous enterprise of the Ecumenical Council. God willing, the Council will be assembled in Rome on the 8th September—Our Lady's Birthday. During these months when the Council is in recess, all important work of preparation is being done by Cardinals and Bishops, not only in Rome itself, but throughout the whole world. The final decisions that may be reached by the Council before this year, 1963, ends, will undoubtedly have the most far-reaching consequences for

the whole human race. Even those outside the Catholic Church are amazed at what has been undertaken and even achieved already, as well as the extraordinary hope and promise for the future that the Council has inspired. More than any Pope in history, Pope John XXIII has succeeded in focussing the attention of all men of good will on the Catholic Church—the Church that we know to be the One True Church of Christ on earth. During these weeks and months ahead we should all be fervent in our prayers that the spirit of Christ may be renewed in the world and that all who glory in the name of Christian may respond to the earnest desire of Christ, expressed in His prayer to His Father at the Last Supper, that they all may be one as Thou—Father in me, and I in Thee; that they also may be one of us.

The following is an extract from a letter of Our Holy Father, Pope John, addressed to every Bishop of the Catholic Church, concerning the continuation of the work of the Ecumenical Council:

"From the time the Ecumenical Council was convoked and finally inaugurated, in every continent and across the seas wherever are found children of the Catholic Church, at first a respectful attention was noted, then a lively interest and now an expectation ever more eager and hopeful of great results."

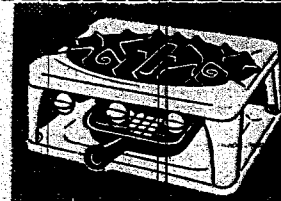

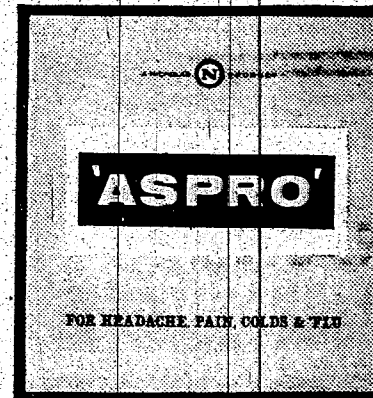

YOUGHAL NOTES

SALMON FISHING. Despite the severe weather conditions prevailing the catches of salmon by nets, although less than the previous week, was considered to be fairly good. The run of fish so far is of the storky type averaging 10 lb. which is considered to be a good sign in the first month of the season. On Friday of last week one boat at Ballinacash landed 14 fish which is indeed a record. The price to fishermen ranged from 3/8 to 10/- per lb. in the upper reaches. Ardmore and Ballycotton net men are having fair amount of salmon and are hopeful of a successful season. FATE OF OLD YOUGHAL BRIDGE. At a recent meeting of the Cork County Council Mr. Sean Brosnan, B.L.Made a plea for the retention of the old bridge for the convenience of cyclists and pedestrians and would be a help to many hundreds of people traveling to their work in Youghal and district. It was agreed to have a report on the matter for next Council meeting. The Council had already decided to demolish the bridge and invited tenders for its removal. It has been closed to traffic since January 23rd. FIRE ALARM. On Saturday night last the Youghal Brigade under second officer Michael Loughlin, was called to a chimney fire at the Windmill Lane, which might have had serious consequences but for the timely summoning of the brigade. The outbreak was extinguished after about 14 hours. YOUGHAL DISTRICT COURT. At Youghal District Court before Mr. Justice Skinner, Thos. Col. Dowry said that while the bridge itself was a credit to all concerned, the approach roads were far from what they should be.

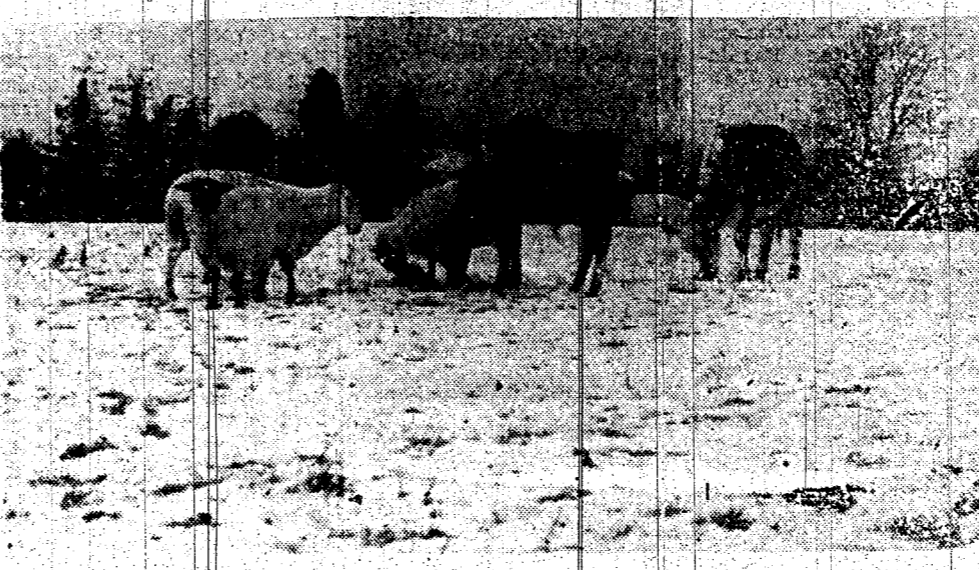
Col. M. Harty said it was most unsatisfactory.

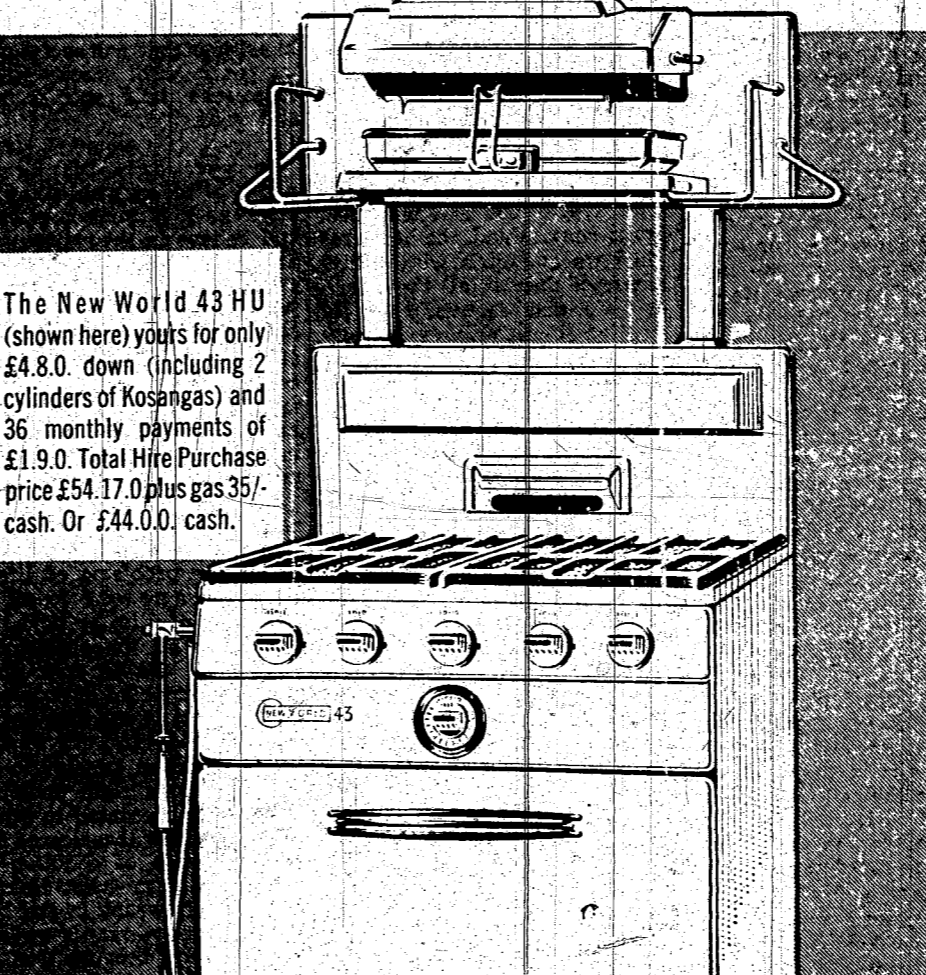

all other sections of the community. It is an annual increase in income to meet increasing costs. The meeting also expressed the hope that justice would prevail and that the proposals and constructive suggestions of the N.F.A. Dairy Committee would result in the Minister meeting out justice to the dairy farmer. Should justice not prevail, the course of action open to farmers would be limited even if not considered desirable. Speaking to over 2,000 farmers at an N.F.A. symposium in Limerick, Dr. Fitzmaurice Van Kemna (a leading European expert on the production and marketing of dairy products) made a categorical statement to the effect that creamery milk prices in Europe would be set out at 2/6 per gallon. The present price of creamery milk to the Irish farmer is 1/7 1/2 per gallon 3.5 per cent butter fat. Prices pertaining in European countries at the present time are 3/7 per cent butter fat are as follows: Belgium 28.5, Netherlands 29.5, France 28.4, Western Germany 23.1, Luxembourg 27.5.

Consideration of the Minister's statement to press ahead with economic development programme as planned, the meeting particularly deplored the Minister's statement which in their opinion ran directly contrary to accepted Government and National policy. Mutual co-operation is necessary to ensure of achieving this objective. The Minister in turn must co-operate with them.

BISHOP OF GALWAY: Most Rev. Dr. Brown, Bishop of Galway, said in a recent address that every section of the community has a duty to ensure that agriculture was properly protected, was promoted and that it was afforded every possible help. He urged every possible help to be given to the farmer to enable him to secure a proper livelihood on the land.

"All farmers," he said, "should be proud of the fact that they had in the present crisis a great Pope who has made a great impact on the world opinion and who was a farmer's son and proud of it."

His Lordship wished the best to all.

FRANCE AND GREAT BRITAIN AND THE COMMON MARKET: The French Agricultural Organisations have examined the problem raised by the breakdown in negotiations between the E.E.C.C. and Great Britain. In a communique issued after their meeting a short time ago they declared that "the difficulties presented have arisen for political and economic reasons which exceed agricultural questions."

agriculture do not seem impossible of solution but there are still very great obstacles to be overcome, concerning on one hand the British system of applying low world prices and on the other hand the free determination of the community economy with regard to third party countries particularly those of the Commonwealth.

The wide divergence which exists between the British and the United States remains on these essential items necessitates on the part of Great Britain a more marked evolution towards a true Common Market.

NO GREAT DIFFICULTY IN REACHING AGREEMENT: In generally well informed circles it has been indicated that Adenauer proceeded at his recent visit to Paris, a compromise proposal to General de Gaulle, according to which the European Commission in Brussels would be given the task of drawing up a detailed inventory of the points at issue between the Six and Gt. Britain.

Certain circles in the French Department of Agriculture have pointed out that the agreement reached between the Six and Britain is mainly in the industrial sector and the points of conflict are mainly in the agricultural sector.

In London the atmosphere is calm. The British Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Holmes, in an interview in London declared up to now certain regulations have been worked out for the Community of the Six. Some of these regulations will still be valid for an enlarged community, but you must admit that certain others will have to be adapted. This is all that we ask and if the political objections which are made to the entry of Great Britain are withdrawn, we do not see any great difficulty in arriving at agreement on the agricultural sector.

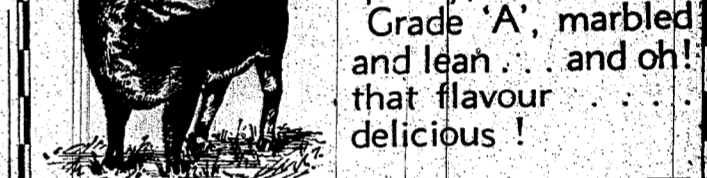
