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## STRIKE COULD HIT TOURISM -warns Dowd

The bus strike, which was already affecting the safe flood and a number of people, would adversely affect it, says on much more than the H.H. Dowd, Lismore, who is the representative of the Irish Tourist Association in the Gresham Hotel, Dublin, at the week-end.

Mr. Dowd said many people believed that the basic cause of the dispute was the attempt by C.I.E. to introduce buses operated by one man for tours in the country.

The arguments advanced in favour of their introduction was that the system has been operating for years in Britain. There are many things done in England which it would not be wise for us to adopt here, he added. This operation increased the risk of accidents, he said. The association should request C.I.E. not to impose one-man buses on the touring public.

# Priory House again in the News

ONCE again the proposed utilisation of Priory House, Dungarvan as a Health Clinic was vehemently opposed by Mr. T. Lannon, at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Health Authority. Allegations that its purchase was the greatest piece of corruption to ever hit the county were also made, and it led to a lengthy and at times heated discussion.

AT THE OUTSET THE COUNTY MANAGER, MR. S. J. MOYNIHAN OUTLINED THE HISTORY RELATING TO THE PURCHASE OF PRIORY HOUSE ON FEBRUARY 17TH 1955. THE CO. COUNCIL APPROVED THE APPOINTMENT OF A COMMITTEE TO NEGOTIATE THE PURCHASE OF IT, AND AT A SUBSEQUENT CO. COUNCIL MEETING IT WAS AGREED TO BUY IT FOR THE PURPOSE OF TURNING IT INTO A HEALTH CLINIC.

Mr. Moynihan said the Co. Engineer of that time, Mr. Sheedy, reported that the general state of the building was very good, but it was necessary to redecorate the whole place. He did not believe that Mr. Sheedy ever said that they would always be spending money on it—which Mr. Lannon was quoted as saying in a Dungarvan paper. It was quite obvious the Co. Home was unsuitable, as suggested by a member of the Health Authority. It was one mile from the town and would be unfair to ask old people to walk there in all weathers.

Mr. Moynihan went on: "All these years when a Child Welfare Clinic could have been provided in Dungarvan, they have been spent in a senseless wrangle as to its location, with consequent accumulating effects on the health of the children now growing up. An attempt has also been made on many occasions to link my name with the purchase of Priory House but I can assure the members that I have not had hand, act or part in the

negotiations that led up to the purchase."

Mr. Moynihan also expressed the opinion that the resolution passed at the last meeting of the Authority to drop Priory House as the centre for the new clinic was not effective.

Mr. Lannon: I am saying the Co. Manager was linked with it. Wasn't a member of the Co. Council the auctioneer? The only people the Co. Manager was interested in was the architects, to give them jobs. If there was proper law in this country Priory House would never have been purchased by the Co. Council. It was the greatest piece of corruption ever to hit this country. The Co. Manager is talking about the children's health, but if he was interested in them the clinic would have been built in the proper place long ago. If we had a proper Minister he would inquire into the whole thing. The people are being misled and their money is being squandered. These fellows are doing nothing and they have the country broke.

Acting Chairman Mr. Norman Walsh asked if the Co. Council ever agreed to sell Priory House subsequent to having purchased it.

### CIRCUMSTANCES NOT GOOD

Mr. Charles Curran said that everyone who was a member of the County Council at that time knew that it was to be sold and was actually put on the market. He knew the circumstances under which Priory House was bought, and they were not good. For the sake of good feeling and all the Authorities in the County he would ask the Co. Manager to drop the whole thing.

Mr. James Power said he would not blame the man that took the auction. He was only making his livelihood.

Mr. N. Walsh said as acting Chairman he felt the correct course was the one suggested by Mr. Curran that they forget about it. It came as a bombshell to him when the matter came up again, as it had been decided to sell it.

ing of money on old buildings. Mr. Curran said it was only a question of opening of doors now. If it was the feeling of the Health Authority that they set proceed with Priory House then they should send a Deputation to tell him the circumstances surrounding the issue.

Mr. J. Griffen said that speaking as one who knew nothing of the past history of Priory House, the position was that they could all see the necessity for a clinic in Dungarvan. The general opinion of this body whatever the reason seemed to be that they did not favour Priory House. The Manager said the resolution rejecting it was not effective, but they were not so dumb and consequently the only thing to do was for both sides to bury their pride and think of the welfare of the people of Dungarvan and provide an alternative to Priory House as a clinic.

He added that he did not think the less of the Manager over the purchase of Priory House. They should get a place without delay and not indulge in squabbles at the expense of children. They should forget about it until there was a lowering of temperatures, and at the next meeting discuss the location of it.

Mr. Lannon: If it is public money that is to be spent why should we get a place that is not suitable?

Mr. W. Collins: What size must the clinic be?

Co. Manager: Big enough to hold a child welfare centre.

### DEFT AT A LOSS

At this stage the Secretary (Mr. J. A. Hynes) said he had been in contact with the Minister over the phone that morning in connection with the resolution of the last meeting and he stated that the Dept. was at a loss to understand

why the Health Authority had now decided to abandon Priory House.

Mr. Collins said they should forget about their differences and get a clinic built.

Mr. N. Walsh said the only way to deal with it was by way of Deputation to the Minister. He (Minister) was not aware of why they decided to reject Priory House. Now they should go and tell him.

Mr. P. Borwne said they wanted a Deputation to go to the Minister to tell him why they should not have these premises, but the other members never saw the place and knew nothing about it.

Mr. W. Foran said there was something greater involved in this matter than the providing of a clinic. A lot of peoples characters were involved in the purchase of the building.

### AUCTIONEER WAS SMEARED

The members of the Co. Council at the time agreed to the purchase of it," continued Mr. Foran. "Now the auctioneer is being smeared right, left and centre. It is a very unfair attack on a man that cannot defend himself here. He got the job and was entitled to take it. Why not have a sworn enquiry to clear the characters of the people involved?"

Mr. N. Walsh said that in fairness to the auctioneer, it must be stated that he got instructions from the vendor and was not acting on behalf of any public body.

Mr. Curran: There is a lot more involved than the money.

Mr. Griffen: What then is involved? Finally it was decided that the members inspect Priory House after the meeting and the matter will be discussed and we hope finally decided at the next meeting of the Health Authority.

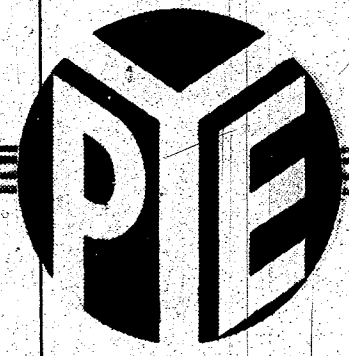

Notice to Owners of Land in County Waterford

The attention of owners of land is drawn to Section 34 of the above-mentioned Act, which prevents the use of land for camping in the County of Waterford without the Owner first having a Licence for such use. In this respect the Landowner's attention is drawn to the following definitions: (1) Land which is the site of a temporary dwelling and all land which is within 100 yards of the site and of which the occupier is the occupier of the site shall be land used for camping. (2) The expression "temporary dwelling" means any (a) tent or (b) van or other conveyance (whether on wheels or not) or (c) shed, hut or similar structure or (d) vessel on inland waters used for human habitation or constructed or adapted for such use. In their own interests owners of land in County Waterford are advised to communicate with the Secretary of the County Council before using or allowing the use of their land for camping. Failure to comply with this requirement may result in the prosecution of the offender and the subsequent removal of the temporary dwelling.

## CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES AT MIDDLETON

Waterford's Munster championship campaigns commence at Middleton on Sunday next when the intermediate hurlers and junior footballers meet Cork in both codes. Waterford's record in these grades is a dismal one and it is some thing of a rarity if either progress beyond the first round. Thus, more in hope than in confidence the Deise sides travel to Cork territory on Sunday. The enormity of the pick which the Leisters enjoy is an assurance that they will field top class teams and Waterford will start underdogs for both games.

It is ironic that this year when a particularly serious effort was to be made by the county to make a worthwhile impression in these championships, that they should be partially hindered by the abnormal weather conditions of recent weeks. Full scale hurling games were arranged for Dungarvan where it was hoped selections could carefully select the best sides. The elements however, deemed it necessary to postpone these essential preliminaries and Sunday's chosen teams can only be taken on trust.

Of the two, the hurling clash has the greatest promise of this year. Both counties are headed by former senior players and it could well prove a gripping struggle between them.

On paper at any rate Waterford would appear to have their best side for a long time. Yet the omission of such fine hurlers as Jimmy Walsh and John Moran (Dungarvan) makes it difficult to fathom.

Conor's Michael Gorman has given the vital goal-keeping berth fronted by Joe Harney, John Walsh and Seamus Kenny. Harney and Walsh have had valuable senior experience and are unlikely to yield places little to the Cork full-back trio.

The Deise half-backs Mick Gaffney, Roger Ryan who has years of senior club experience behind him and Frank Corcoran (Shamrocks) is an experienced one, all three being abundantly equipped with hurling ability.

The midfield pairing of Kieran Ryan and Phil Deise is a strong one but much will depend on how Ryan O'Connell who is on the fringe of permanent senior recognition.

Personally the Deise attack must carry with it a sizeable question mark. Firstly, Fourmwater's Mick Connolly seems completely misplaced at right half forward and while the full-line of Regan, Harry Russell (back after a twelve months absence, through injury) and Red possess scoring power aplenty, they can expect little change from a resolute Cork defence.

Should Waterford buckle down to their task from the opening whistle, it is not beyond them to upset the odds. Cork of course remain favourites but in the championship that counts for the title and a one hundred per cent team effort could well see Waterford safely into the second round.

**FOOTBALLERS CHANCES**  
Such has been the monotony of first round defeats for the junior footballers in recent years that many have come to regard their yearly championship debut as the side's "annual outing".

But on Sunday and despite having to concede ground advantage, there is quite a deal of confidence in the County's ability to overcome Cork in this first round tie. The team boasts wh players that have proved their worth in the higher grade and if they lack anyway favourable towards them they could shock the tiered Leisters.

The Waterford defence looks very sound with exceptionally good fielders in Sylvester Murray, Fat Harty and John O'Brien of Tramore.

At midfield the Michael Kennedy-Martin Kennedy partnership would credit to the County's senior side. Cork rely on Denis McCarthy and Davey Moore in this sector but it is doubtful if they can master the talented Waterford partnership.

Up front Waterford are also well served with scoring forwards. The halfline of Paddy Duggan, Monty Guiry and John Martin (Gauliers) is a powerful one with Noel Power who will take watching on the fringe of the square.

In Cork there is tremendous confidence behind the home county selection. Their defence is comprised of solid and experienced footballers while an attack that has players of the calibre of Der's Philpott, Brendan Larkin and Joe O'Keefe (the former St. Augustine's, Dungarvan star) must be respected.

As with their hurlers, general opinion also favours a Cork football victory. But this is a powerful looking Deise side and if their forwards can capitalise on an expected mid-field advantage then it is quite on the cards that "The Rebels" will be beaten.

The Deise defence, however, cannot afford to be found wanting in any respect. The

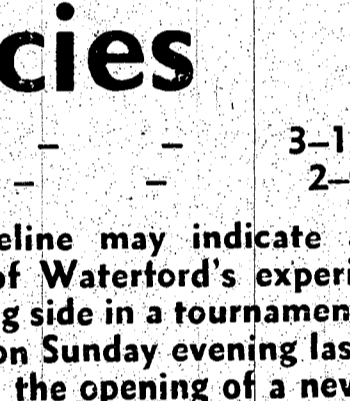
