Housing Schemes Discussed

AN order by the County Manager (Mr. S. J. Moynihan) "that in accordance with the recommendations of the Dungarvan Urban Council, the tenancies of the new Boreenatra houses be offered to the persons whose names appear on the 3-bedroomed Priority list" was further discussed at last Friday's meeting of the Council.

The order also stated that no objection would be raised to any transfers arranged between the proposed new tenancies and existing tenants of three - bedroomed Council houses.

The Acting Chairman (Colr. Richard Walsh) said from information he had received there would be no transferring of houses. He was also told that people going into the new Boreenatra houses, would have to pay the same rent whether employed or not.

Mr. B. White (Town Clerk) said that was not correct. The lowest rent in the new scheme would be 17/6.

Colr. T. Lannon said if they gave a house to a man they could not force him to change later.

Mr. White said an employed man in Cahal Brugha would be paying less than an unemployed man in Boreenatra.

Referring to the proposed new scheme at Clonecty, Mr. White said the architect had been with the Department earlier in the week. They would be

advertising the scheme next month. The ball-alley would be knocked down. Mr. White also told the members that there would be a draw between the tenancies for the houses in Boreenatra.

The Council also decided to erect five lights near the scheme. One at each of the three blocks and two more on the approach road.

A member also asked if the handball club would have any claim against the Council. He believed they (handball club) put up the back wall or the gallery.

Colr. T. Lee said they put up nothing. The Council paid for all.

The Town Clerk said he would enquire about the exact position.

A member said they did not want to get caught with it at a later date.

Colr. Lannon said it was a pity to have to knock it down. It was a good place for sport. A Member - It was built in 1910 and had place first day. The discussion then ended.

SHEEP FARMERS AT LAW

Judge's warning to both Parties

IT was a disgraceful performance by neighbours and if he had anything to do with the case again he would take steps to have them bound over to the peace, said Judge Sean Mac D. Fawsitt at last week's Circuit Court in Dungarvan, when three Ballymacarbery sheep farmers were at law over trespass rights on the Lyre East and Lyre West mountain ranges.

Thomas Brazil, Lyre West Ballymacarbery sought an injunction against Patrick Galvin, Lyre East preventing him from trespassing on his grazing rights. Galvin sought a similar injunction against Brazil and Maurice O'Grady also of Lyre East.

Mr Finlay B.L. said the case arose out of grazing rights which each of the three parties were entitled to on Lyre East Mountain. There was now a series of claims that grazing rights were being interfered with by the driving off of sheep off the mountain.

There were five people with grazing rights on Lyre East and two on Lyre West. Galvin had two shares and Brazil and O'Grady one each. Brazil also had a similar right of grazing on Lyre West

9th last you got a solicitor's letter.

Brazil - Yes. Mr. Lardner - Did your dog drive in some of Galvin's sheep in front of yours.

Brazil - Yes. Mr. Lardner - Hadn't Galvin a complaint then?

Brazil - I don't think so. It was not intentional. Mr. Lardner - Are you sure the trouble on the mountain is that there will be no give and take?

Brazil - You couldn't give and take with Galvin. Judge Fawsitt said if peace could not be kept, the situation could not be tolerated. The grazing rights would have to be sold.

Mrs Alice Brazil, wife of the plaintiff said she was on the mountain on March 3rd. last with her husband when they had to put 45 sheep of their sheep back over to Lyre East. In doing so some of Galvin's sheep went with theirs. William Galvin, the defendant's son came along and accused her husband of driving off his sheep.

To Judge Fawsitt she said she told the defendant's son they were entitled to graze on Lyre East also and his reply was, "Where is Lyre East. There is no one talking about boundaries only ye."

Mrs Brazil said she was up on the mountain again on June 4th marking lambs with her husband, and none of their sheep were on Lyre East. Galvin's son was cutting turf on the mountain. Her husband began to put his sheep back onto Lyre East when William Galvin ran down to her and told her to stop her husband from hunting his sheep. He was very angry. She told him they were entitled to graze their sheep and he denied ever giving an undertaking in court that her husband was entitled to graze his sheep on Lyre East.

ALL IN BAD TERMS
Michael Wall said he has grazing rights on Lyre East mountain. He had a few disputes with the defendant Patrick Galvin. Galvin was keeping Brazil's sheep off the mountain (Lyre East). He saw him do so on June 1st last.

Mr. Lardner B.L. - Aren't you on bad terms with Galvin - All the neighbours are.

Mr. Patrick Galvin said in 1959 there were court proceedings between Brazil and himself over the same thing. The Judge (Judge Fawsitt) advised both of them not to interfere with each other on the mountain. There was peace up to last August when his sheep were driven off the mountain. That happened several times and he had an idea that Maurice O'Grady and Brazil were to blame. On Nov. 9, 1962 he went to see his sheep and he found Brazil's dog chasing them down the mountain. He asked Brazil what he was going to do about it and he said he was going to do nothing about it. He refused to come to see where his sheep had been driven to.

He witness then went to his solicitor.

On June 4th last Brazil set his sheep dog on three of his sheep. He (Brazil) thought he could do what he liked.

Judge Fawsitt - Two or three people on this mountain think the same thing.

Mr. Galvin - I did not interfere with Brazil's sheep on Christmas. I never drove his sheep into Lyre West on November 30th 1962 I saw my sheep being chased off the mountain by O'Grady and Brazil. I have kept my part of the Court promise to keep peace. I want neighbourly relations and I do not want to start another court battle. I do not want fighting or rowing.

Cross examined by Mr. Finlay B.L. Galvin said he was out to see if his sheep were all right on Christmas day. He did not stir Brazil's sheep. He never shouted at his son to kill Brazil's dog.

Judge Fawsitt - This case is a clear conflict of evidence. What is at the back of it all?

Galvin - He trying to hunt me out of house and home.

William Galvin said he worked on the farm of his father (the defendant). He was cutting turf with his father on June 4th last when Brazil and his wife set their dog on three of their sheep. On December 4th 1962 he was collecting his

sheep when Brazil tried to drive his sheep into his.

To Mr. Finlay B.L. he admitted saying to Mrs. Brazil that it was only they who were talking about boundaries, he denied throwing a stick at Brazil's dog the day he was cutting turf.

IN THE HEEL
Mr. Maurice O'Grady, the defendant in the claim by Galvin said he never interfered with Galvin's sheep. He never had any trouble with the other neighbours, but Galvin always seemed "to be in the heel".

Judge Fawsitt Everyone seems to be suspicious of everyone else in this case.

Witness - The Galvins attacked my sheep with dogs. It is cruelty to animals. On September 28th 1962 Galvin's son set a dog on three sheep and one of them had a hole in his nose as a result. He has attacked my sheep with dogs on several occasions. Judge Fawsitt said there were three claims before him and there were complaints on each side that the other was interfering. It was quite obvious that the situation prevailing was not a happy one to say the least of it. When the case last came to court he directed that each side not interfere with the other. He adjourned it with liberty to re-enter, and obviously that was a mistake by him.

CONTRADICTION OF EVIDENCE
I have a flat contradiction of evidence in this case, said Judge Fawsitt, I was not impressed by Brazil's evidence but I thought less of the defendant's. There is a cause to be found for this case. Galvin is endeavouring to keep Brazil away. It is a disgraceful performance by neighbours, and if I ever have anything to do about this case again I will take steps to have them bound to the peace. There are times when sheep will have to be separated but I do believe there was an attempt by Galvin to ferment litigation.

He gave an injunction to Brazil against Galvin refraining him from trespassing on his grazing rights, and dismissed the claims by Galvin against Brazil and O'Grady.

He allowed a stay in the event of an appeal.

'STOP ME NOW'

Mr Brazil continued, "On Christmas day last I was out looking at my cattle when I saw my sheep being driven off the mountain. I eventually got back Galvin came on and drove his sheep in to mine. He said 'Stop me now' and had a stick up to my nose. Shortly after that I brought in my sheep because of the bad weather and on the 2nd. February, 1963 I brought them back out to the mountain. Galvin's son was in the ditch and he would not let me put the sheep on the mountain. He drove his sheep in front of mine and gave me no scope to get them into the mountain."

Witness, continuing his evidence said he again went up to the mountain ranges with his wife on March 3rd. last and he found all his sheep in Lyre West. He was putting some of them back into Lyre East when Galvin's son William came along and said there was no such thing as a boundary. He (witness) then went to his solicitor.

'KILL THE DOG'

On June 4th he went out to mark his sheep, and was again accompanied by his wife. They were practically all in Lyre West Galvin and his son were cutting turf. He began to turn sheep back out of Lyre West when William Galvin ran down and accused him of hunting his fathers sheep. The defendant sent his son up to kill his (plaintiff's) dog and was shouting 'Kill the dog Willie'.

He could not leave out his sheep and lambs now on Lyre East because they were being driven off.

To Mr. M.J. Lardner B.L. for Galvin. Mr. Brazil said peace reigned for two years after the first law case. During the summer of 1962 he never drove off Galvin's sheep.

Mr. Lardner - I put it to you that Mr. Galvin's sheep were being driven off the mountain in November 1962 and that was the cause of all this fresh trouble.

William Galvin said he worked on the farm of his father (the defendant). He was cutting turf with his father on June 4th last when Brazil and his wife set their dog on three of their sheep. On December 4th 1962 he was collecting his

sheep when Brazil tried to drive his sheep into his.

To Mr. Finlay B.L. he admitted saying to Mrs. Brazil that it was only they who were talking about boundaries, he denied throwing a stick at Brazil's dog the day he was cutting turf.

IN THE HEEL
Mr. Maurice O'Grady, the defendant in the claim by Galvin said he never interfered with Galvin's sheep. He never had any trouble with the other neighbours, but Galvin always seemed "to be in the heel".

Judge Fawsitt Everyone seems to be suspicious of everyone else in this case.

Witness - The Galvins attacked my sheep with dogs. It is cruelty to animals. On September 28th 1962 Galvin's son set a dog on three sheep and one of them had a hole in his nose as a result. He has attacked my sheep with dogs on several occasions. Judge Fawsitt said there were three claims before him and there were complaints on each side that the other was interfering. It was quite obvious that the situation prevailing was not a happy one to say the least of it. When the case last came to court he directed that each side not interfere with the other. He adjourned it with liberty to re-enter, and obviously that was a mistake by him.

CONTRADICTION OF EVIDENCE
I have a flat contradiction of evidence in this case, said Judge Fawsitt, I was not impressed by Brazil's evidence but I thought less of the defendant's. There is a cause to be found for this case. Galvin is endeavouring to keep Brazil away. It is a disgraceful performance by neighbours, and if I ever have anything to do about this case again I will take steps to have them bound to the peace. There are times when sheep will have to be separated but I do believe there was an attempt by Galvin to ferment litigation.

He gave an injunction to Brazil against Galvin refraining him from trespassing on his grazing rights, and dismissed the claims by Galvin against Brazil and O'Grady.

He allowed a stay in the event of an appeal.

Fr. Hehir was educated at Dungarvan C.B.S. and was employed as a fitter in the Dungarvan Co. Op. Creamery from 1945 to 1950. In June '51 he emigrated to Australia, in which country he worked his way around as a fitter and also in Tasmania. He commenced his studies for priesthood in 1955.

We wish the newly ordained Dungarvan-born priest, many fruitful years in the Vineyard of the Lord.

SALMON NET FISHING

At midnight on Wednesday last July 31st salmon fishing by all classes of nets and weirs Sunday the old return fares came to a close and the season might well be classed as being exceptionally good as regards the number of salmon and grise taken as well as the price paid to fishermen. There is no doubt that when final figures are available the number of salmon will be much greater than that of the previous year or for many years, as it was an exceptional season when over 27000 were landed in the district. Up to the 1961 season net fishermen had a good many lean seasons but since then they seem to be coming into their own but as to quantity and quality of both salmon and grise. Despite the fact that peate are to be seen breaking water in large numbers both in the harbour and the bay, still rod anglers are not having good catches in many parts of the freshwater. Net men at Ardmore struck a very bad patch for some weeks past due to presence of sharks in the bay. It has been learned that next season there will be at least four additional boats operating for salmon in Youghal. Catches for June were 2400 salmon 29,011 lbs and 5,512 grise of 130,780 lbs.

NOTICE TO OWNERS OF LAND IN COUNTY WATERFORD

LOCAL GOVERNMENT (Sanitary Services) ACT, 1948
The attention of owners of land is drawn to Section 34 of the above-mentioned Act, which prevents the use of land for camping in the County of Waterford without the Owner first having a Licence for such use.

In this respect the Landowner's attention is drawn to the following definitions—

- (1)—Land which is the site of a temporary dwelling and all land which is within 100 yards of the site and of which the occupier is the occupier of the site shall be land used for camping.
- (2)—The Owner of land which is not to be deemed to be the occupier thereof.
- (3)—The expression "temporary Dwelling" means any (a) tent or (b) van or other conveyance (whether on wheels or not), or (c) shed, hut or similar structure, or (d) vessel, on inland waters, used for human habitation or constructed or adapted for such use.

In their own interests owners of land in County Waterford are advised to communicate with the Secretary of the County Council before using or allowing the use of their land for camping. Failure to comply with this requirement may result in the prosecution of the offender and the subsequent removal of the temporary dwelling.

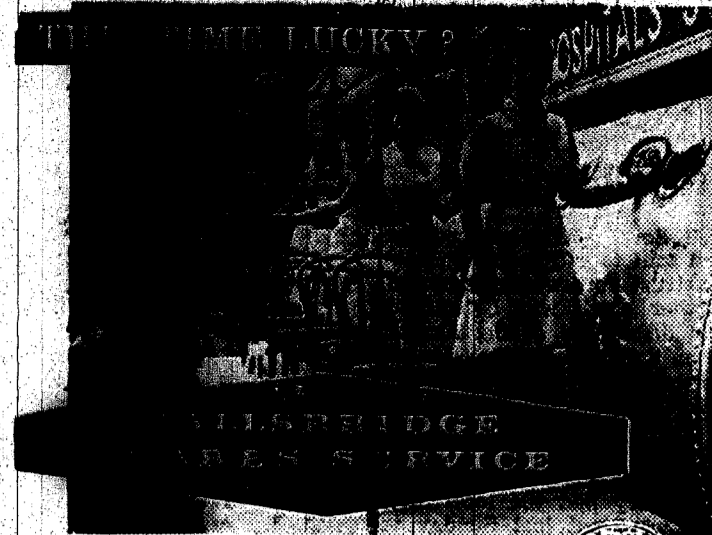

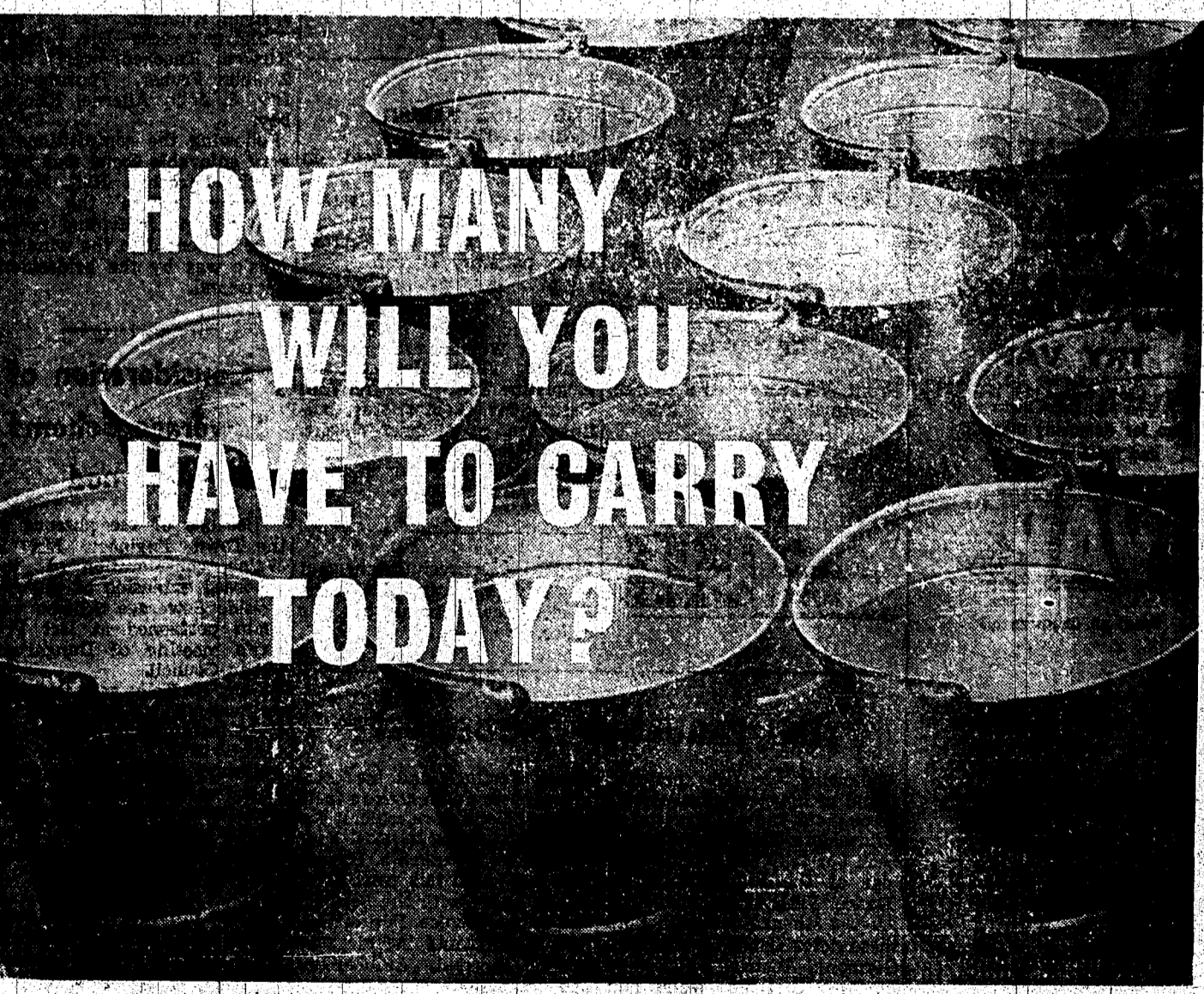

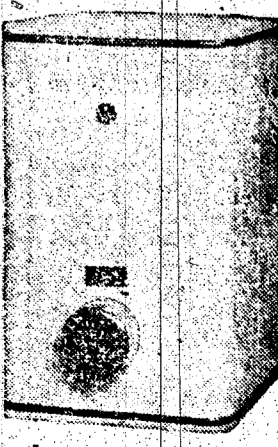

When comparisons are made with their League final meeting in May, Sunday's game might be termed something of a disappointment. But out there on that Ennis Road pitch, there was little opportunity for fancy frills or classical stick-work, as champions and challengers fought out a vibrating battle for undisputed supremacy. The conditions, summer-like though they were, were more of a hindrance than a help and did much to take from the over-all standard of the game.

It was a victory for Waterford's tenacity and their refusal to accept what at one stage looked inevitable defeat. Territorially, they were well beaten by a Tipp side that was intent on gaining revenge for those Oireachtas and League reverses, but as so often before, they came from behind in champion-like fashion to record one of their sweetest victories ever.

Up Tipp-way, their defeat has stunned them into stony silence. The countless opportunities that were inexcusably frittered away were paid for by the supreme penalty—the relinquishing of their oft-won titles. Waterford, on the other hand remained cool and unfurried during that period of Tipp supremacy. Then when opportunity knocked at their own door, they quickly availed of "what was going" and made for a mockery of Tipp's advantages elsewhere throughout the field.

Now the County awaits with unprecedented enthusiasm the All-Ireland Final showdown with Kilkenny on September 1. The memories of the recent past — '57 and '59—are still very vivid ones and the Deise County will be a deserted one come that first Sunday in September.

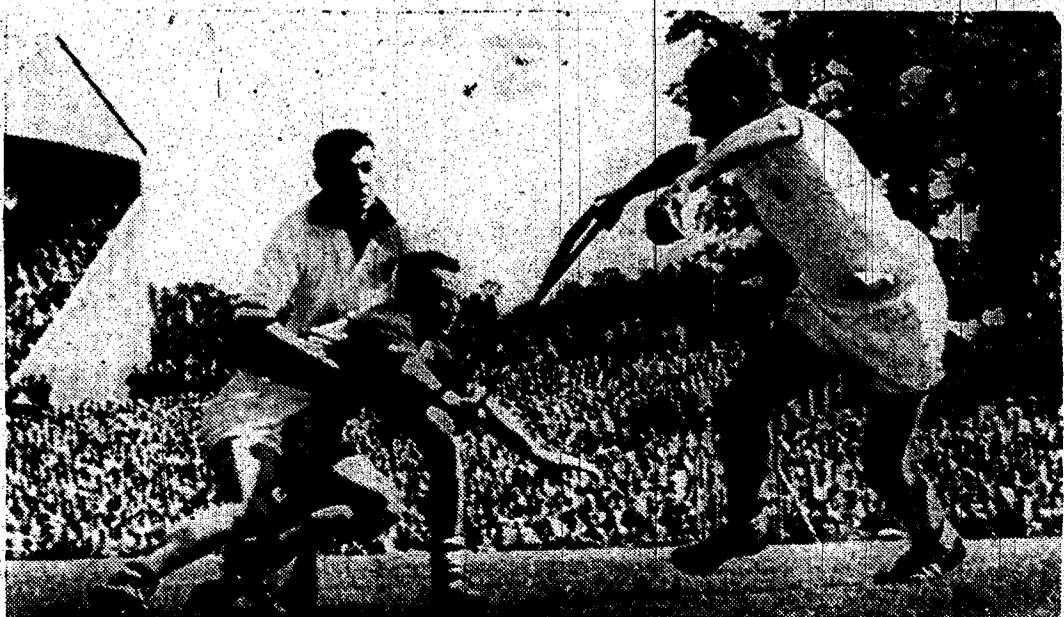

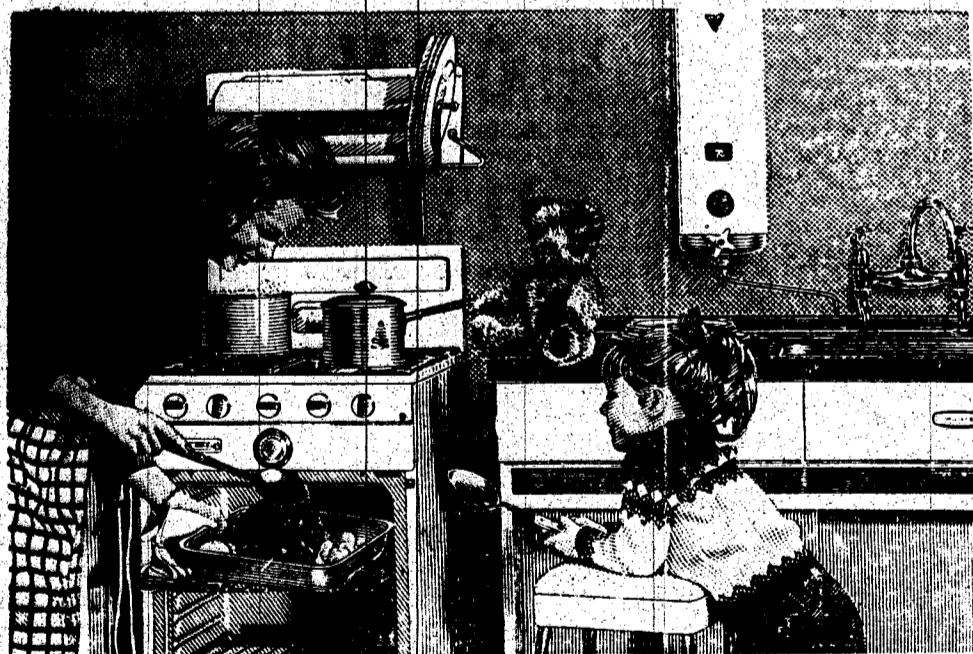

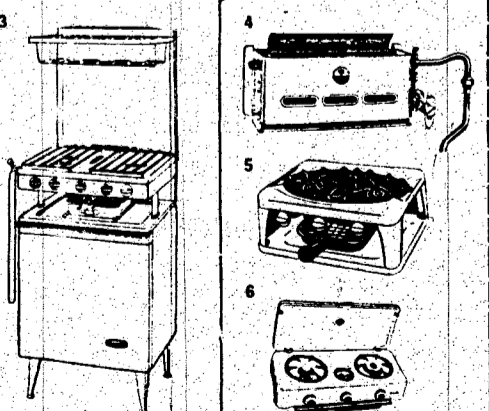

N.F.A. NEWS Help, Given to U.N. Children's Fund

N.F.A. HELPS UNITED NATIONS CHILDREN'S FUND

Farmers in some areas have been asked to contribute the price of a pound of butter towards UNICEF - The United Nations Children's Fund. The money is to be deducted from their monthly cheques and we understand that the response so far has been good.

Some branches of the N.F.A. are making a big drive in this respect and we feel certain that a large proportion of the final amount realised will come from our members.

In consultation with Senior Officials of the UNICEF Organisation in Ireland we gather that the money collected will be devoted to the purchase of agricultural commodities, principally powdered milk, for distribution in needy areas. In contributing to this worthy cause Irish farmers will be doing a great service to mankind and to themselves indirectly.

The purpose of the United Nations Children's Fund is to help further the efforts of developing countries to improve the condition of their children and youth and prepare them to carry forward their countries' economic and social development more effectively.

UNICEF provides assistance for services benefiting children and youth in such fields as: health, nutrition, education, social welfare and vocational training. It also helps Governments to assess the main needs of their children, establish priorities and plan comprehensive programmes to meet them.

UNICEF is a part of the United Nations with a semi-autonomous status. It was created by the General Assembly in 1946. It is governed by a thirty-nation Executive Board, ten members of which are elected each year by the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations. It is supported by voluntary contributions from governments, organisations, and individuals.

At the moment UNICEF aid is going to well over 100 countries for some 500 projects. Its projects are locally established, locally staffed and locally administered.

In widely different areas throughout the world UNICEF has done outstanding work. It continues to do so. It is an organisation worthy of support and in conclusion we feel that we should emphasise the fact that it is not 'mere give away food scheme'. While its efforts may not be based mainly on long-term ideals, the undertakings it engages in are associated with other projects directed to building up the economy of the recipient country. The main purpose of its efforts is the realisation that the preparation for life received by the rising generation is a major key to self-sustaining, economic and social development and that it represents an investment in human resources.

N.F.A. SAVES £1M FOR FARMERS

Following strong representations by the N.F.A. Industrial and Transport Committee the Department of Local Government has made substantial modifications in their proposed lighting regulations for road vehicles. In the original proposals the Department did not advert to the exceptional circumstances associated with the use of agricultural tractors, trailers and machinery and if the proposals had gone through in that form the N.F.A. calculated that the cost of implementing the proposed regulations for tractors and trailers alone would cost farmers something in the region of £1,150,000.

Our calculation was based on manufacturers' quotations for the additional lighting equipment and on Government statistics for the numbers of agricultural tractors and trailers in the country. In addition many agricultural machines which have to travel on public roads occasionally would have been affected by the proposals and this would have put the total cost for farmers considerably higher than the figure just mentioned.

Apart from the actual financial cost there was also the point that the new proposals would have the effect of requiring farmers to have the lighting system on their tractors in full working order at all times, whereas, it was always sufficient to have the lighting equipment in working order during lighting up hours. The N.F.A. took a firm stand on this particular issue and insisted that farmers should not be penalised for not having an effective lighting system on

their tractors and trailers during daylight hours. We are glad to report that our arguments on this point have also been accepted by the Minister and Department of Local Government.

The following are the amendments as set out in the Department's revised memorandum.

(a) Tractors used on the land and only used on the road in connection with Agriculture, and trailers drawn thereby will be exempt from the requirement to have lamps, direction indicators and reflectors in the day time. Such tractors registered before 1st July, 1964 (and trailers, if registered before 1st July, 1964 will not need to be fitted with direction indicators at night.

(b) There will be a complete exemption for vehicles taxed at a rate not exceeding 5/- used for work on the land and which are only used on a road while crossing the roadway from one adjacent field to another.

(c) An agricultural tractor may have fitted thereto a rear mounted ploughing lamp capable of showing a white light to the rear, but the lamp must not be shown lit in a public place.

(d) Vehicles used at agricultural demonstrations in public places (off the public road) will be exempt from the requirements of the regulations while at such demonstrations (e.g. ploughing competitions).

MEETING OF APPLE GROWERS ASSOCIATION

Although we do not produce sufficient apples to satisfy the entire home trade all the year round, the quality produced is equal, and perhaps better in many cases than what can be produced elsewhere, and during the period that home grown apples are available, growers are at least entitled to a fair opportunity to market.

The question of grading according to E.E.C. standards was raised at a meeting of the Apple Growers Association, held at N.F.A. House, last week and it was pointed out that the majority of growers were already grading apples to a very high standard, and this was particularly true of the Dungarvan Co-operative Society which caters for several hundred comparatively small growers.

This may come as a surprise to many people who seem to be labouring under the impression that the only quality apple that can be procured in this country is that which is imported. Unfortunately, some elements of the trade are inclined to give priority to imported fruit over that of home produced, and consequently the public can hardly be blamed if they buy imported, when these particular stocks are being constantly pushed before their eyes. This unfortunate situation was never more clearly noticeable than last season with a constant demand from the trade to allow imports, while sufficiently large stocks of good quality home grown apples were still available.

The suggestion to grade according to E.E.C. standards was welcomed by the growers as was also the question of standardisation of packs. Resulting from this we may well find ourselves within a comparatively short period exporting fruit with all countries. ONE of the members said at the meeting that he exported apples, which were sold at Covent Garden, in open competition, and returned the highest individual price.

COUNCIL OF WAR VISITS ADENAUER

The importance attached to agricultural problems was well illustrated recently at a meeting in Bonn, when Mr. Rehwinkel, President and Mr. Hummel, Secretary General of the German Farmers' Union met Chancellor Adenauer. Among those present were Professor Ehrhart, Chancellor Designate, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, the Minister for Finance and the Minister for Agriculture.

President Rehwinkel did not put a tooth in it when he said that certain things would have to be done immediately for farmers. Industry, he said, has benefited immensely by its recent progress. Despite its productivity, however, prices have gone up and so have salaries. So also have the costs of pro-

Germany: Between the 1st April 1962 and the 31st March 1963, there was a drop in male agricultural workers of 3.1% and of female agricultural workers of 7%. In the previous period there were drops of 8% and 12% respectively. Sales of milk are expected to rise considerably in Germany following a new system of distribution of milk especially in railway stations by means of refrigerated cartons. This development follows a scheme by the Minister for Agriculture who each year makes available a large sum of money to subsidise the manufacture of milk distributing machines. This year the amount laid aside for this purpose amounts to 1m. DM or roughly £85,000.

UNIQUE GOAL-LESS DECIDER

WATERFORD AGAIN CAPTURE MUNSTER CROWN

Unerring Grimes was Match-Winner

WATERFORD - 0-11 TIPPERARY - 0-8

THREE years of frustrating championship defeats were bridged at Limerick's sun-drenched Ennis Road grounds on Sunday last when Waterford regained their status as Munster hurling champions by dethroning the reigning title-holders.

To concede that the game fell somewhat short of expected standards is no more than an accurately brief synopsis of an hour in which Waterford irrefutably proved that they are presently the Tipperarymen's masters. On Sunday things did not go exactly according to plan for them, yet despite hitches in their invariably effective systematic machine, they achieved what they primarily set out to do—the winning of their fifth Munster crown.

In ways one might even describe the game itself as something of an anti-climax. The intense fervour of the exchanges ruled out classical stick work, as both sides clearly indicated from the start that the outcome alone mattered. Under such circumstances it was wisest to abandon all ideas of indulging in the niceties of hurling and a relentless but legitimate fury dominated each man's approach to the game.

It has been said and with some justification that Tipperary were unlucky to lose. Territorially they had an almost unbelievable advantage, while Waterford's scoring opportunities were far fewer than the champions. Yet the Deise men made light of these enormous disadvantages and earned out a victory as sweet as the County has ever recorded.

SUPERIOR SIDE
Furthermore it is my firm, unbiased contention that any team that can strip Tipp of all three major titles in so short a space of time must surely be the superior force. In recent years Waterford's championship luck has been "black out," particularly when Tipp provided the opposition and it is no more than their due, that lady luck should smile on them on this occasion.

Their stonewall rearward treated fiercely the best efforts of Tipp's attackers to break through for goals. Those Deise defenders never stood on ceremony, but above all, refused to panic even in the face of furious onslaughts.

OBSESSED
Tipperary, obsessed with the idea of scoring goals simply played into the hands of men who revelled in their opponents' persistency in attempting to walk the ball to the net. Then, at the other end of the field, menacing raids were halted by Tipperary defensive indiscretions which were penalised to the hilt by the unerring free-taking accuracy of Phil Grimes.

During the opening half, the holders dominated the out-field exchanges to an alarming extent. On top at midfield where Theo English and Donie Nealon literally "toyed" with Joe Condon and John Meaney, there was a constant flow of "traffic" towards the Water-

ford goal. But with what must have been galling frequency to followers of the blue and gold, the ball sailed to the wrong sides of the uprights.

Eight times in the space of the first thirteen minutes, those usually accurate forwards were guilty of atrocious misses and by the interval their tally had reached the even dozen.

TWO POINTS IN ARREARS
At the break, Waterford trailed by a mere two points—0-5 to 0-3, when in all honesty they were fortunate not to have been far more substantially in arrears. And yet the writing was to my mind on the wall for Tipp even at this premature stage.

For all their superiority they could do little better than abuse it. It was as clear as day must follow night that Waterford were not functioning efficiently and I could not help believing that when they would be the Tipp dominance would be broken.

But the opening minutes of the second half again saw the holders dictating the trend of the game and when Jimmy Doyle scored a long range point they seemed set to make it four titles in a row.

DECISIVE MOMENT
Then however, came the decisive moment of the game. Mick Dempsey was introduced at midfield in place of Meany and not only did the Mount Sion man break Tipperary's strangehold on the sector but he transformed the side in general.

Gradually the tide of battle turned. With unmistakable certainty Waterford took over control and between the eighth and thirteenth minutes, added five match-winning points.

It was during this period that the game was raised from its mediocracy and in the white heat of battle tempers became frayed and referee Gerry Fitzgerald found occasion to warn the offenders.

A brace of Tipperary points restored equilibrium, catering the final ten minutes, at which

stage it was a bold man indeed who would dare attempt to forecast the result. But then the panic signals were flouted in a flagging Tipp defence and three Grimes fired over points from placed balls.

But if the hurling up to this left something to be desired, the closing minutes truly bear adequate description. Tipp, throwing caution to the winds, made desperate, despairing attempts to notch a game saving goal. McKenna, Devanney and Doyle all had commendable efforts brilliantly saved by Ned Power, and when a last minute free by Jimmy Doyle was belted to safety a Deise triumph had been assured.

OFF-COLOUR DAYS
While all shortcomings are rightly overlooked in victory, I believe this was one of Waterford's rare off-colour days, and yet, is it not a criterion of the teams outstanding ability that they could inflict a three-point defeat on Tipp, with key men such as Morrissey, Condon and Cheasty playing well below their best?

Tipp, it is true, had their chances, but failed to take them. They will forever rue those first-half misses, but at the risk of repetition I again say they bowed the knee to a better all-round side.
