## NEW CHEESE FACTORY FOR DUNGARVAN

DUNGARVAN is to have a new cheese factory. This welcome news was released last week-end and its establishment will mean a tremendous boost for the town and particularly local dairy farmers.

Unigate Ltd (Cow and Gate Division) in conjunction with the Dungarvan Co-Operative Creamery Ltd. have completed negotiations with the Industrial Credit Company acting on behalf of the Wexford Dairy Products for the purchase of the Wexford Cheese factory.

This modern factory was built in 1959/60 by a German Controlled Company. By arrangement with the Irish Government it has been operated on a caretaker basis since 1962 by the Dairy Disposals Co.

The new chairman of Wexford Creamery Ltd will be popular Dungarvan man Mr. Con Dempsey, present chairman of Dungarvan Co-op. Creamery.

The Dungarvan Co-operative Creamery Ltd. and the Cow and Gate Division have now agreed to form a new company and to build a new cheese factory in Dungarvan. Cow and Gate will market the cheese from the new factory. It is proposed to manufacture Cheddar Cheshire and other traditional cheeses. Most of the cheeses will be exported, but only certain varieties will be available in Ireland. When interviewed Mr Dempsey said it was hoped to start in about two years time. He production at the new factory said he greatly welcomed the new take over.

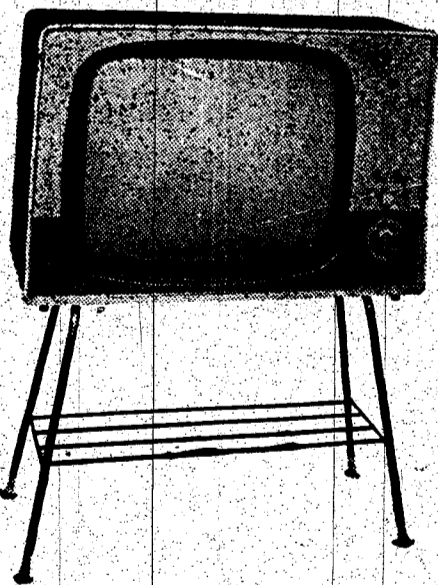

County Waterford Committee of Agriculture SHEEP BREEDING SCHEME, 1963

For the purpose of improving the breeds of mountain sheep in County Waterford, the Waterford Committee of Agriculture are prepared, subject to the approval of the Department of Agriculture, to locate a limited number of high-grade blackface rams on the commonage areas of the Comeragh and Knockmealdown Mountains on the following conditions:

- (1) The Committee shall grant 4 premiums of maximum £30 each towards the cost of Scotch Imported rams and 40 premiums of maximum £8 each in all other cases, within the limits of the allocation. The value of the premium in each case shall be less by £5 than the cost price of the ram. (2) In the allocation of rams preference will be given to applicants who apply on behalf of sheep owners who are prepared to mate the rams to selected ewes. (3) The Committee will endeavour to secure that only rams of a high standard of quality will be supplied, but they cannot undertake responsibility in case any animal should subsequently prove unfruitful or unsatisfactory for breeding purposes. (4) The ram must be maintained in good and healthy condition and retained in the flock for two breeding seasons. (5) Each applicant shall be required to lodge with his application a deposit of £5. Of the amount so lodged one half may be retained by the Committee where a sufficient supply of rams being available, a selected applicant fails to procure a ram. (6) In all cases of dispute in matters connected with this Scheme, the decision of the Minister for Agriculture shall be final.

Application forms, which must be returned on or before the 14th September, 1963, may be had from the undersigned. Special Notice—In the case of the high-value premiums mentioned at No. 1 above, applications for same must be received at the Committee's Office not later than Saturday, 24th August, 1963.

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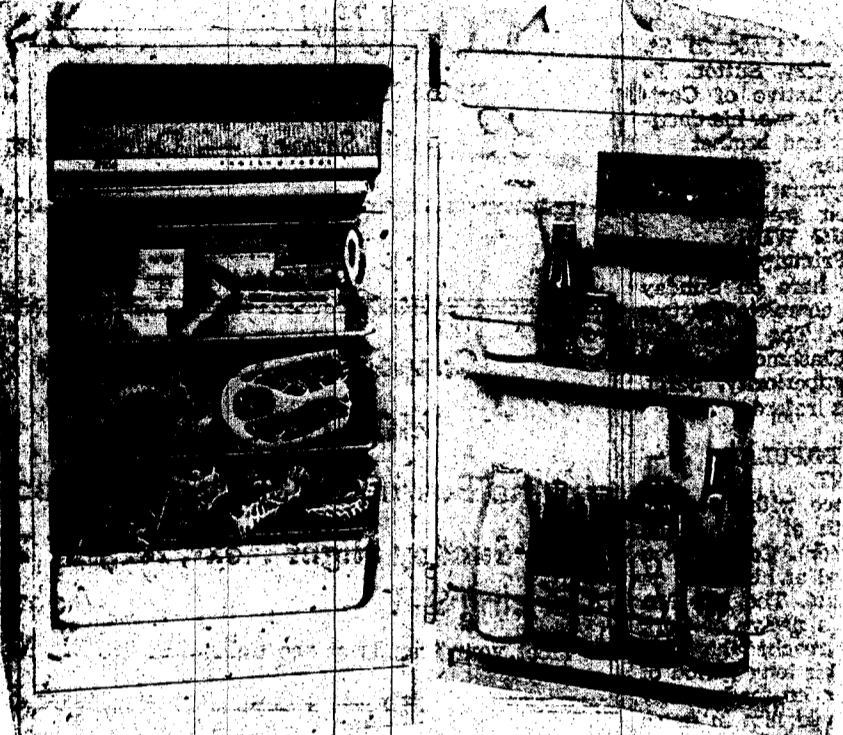

SALMON NET SEASON

Salmon fishing by various types of nets for the season came to an end on Wednesday July 31st at midnight. Despite the fact that returns for the last months are not yet available it is an established fact that the season must be regarded as the best season for salmon for the past eight years. Grise were plentiful although not as many as in the previous year when the total catch recorded was 27,204 an all time record. For the five of the six months net season the salmon catches recorded were as follows: Feb. 1914 of 19506lb. Mar 3,512 of 35,911 lbs. April 3,365 of 35,653 lbs. May 4,000 of 45,475 lbs and June 2,400 of 29,011 lbs making a total of 15,190 salmon weighing 165,566 lbs. The return for the month of July will not be available until September 6th next. As usual the best catches were in the bay as after the April harbour fishing is very poor. Weather conditions suited drift netting but rod fishing was hampered by the low state of the Blackwater and estuaries.

DEVELOPMENT OF THE BLAKWATER

The development of the Blackwater as one of the country's principal canoeing rivers and as a major tourist attraction is to be put before Board Faltie by Mr. P. McAuliffe, T.D. for N.E. Cork. He is to ask the Board to consider proposals to improve the facilities on the river without interfering with its well known fishing amenities. The Blackwater enjoys an international reputation amongst canoeists and each year groups come from England and the Continent to take the trip from Malloy down to Youghal via Ballyhooley, Fermoy and Cappoquin.

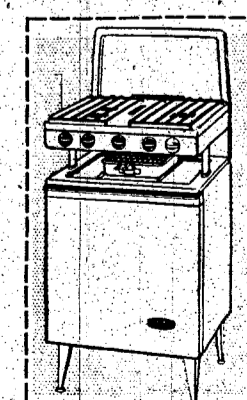



Spurn the wheel. Get out and about in the countryside on your own two feet this fine weather.

The Federation give the following advice on how to take the winning out of walking.

An aching toe or a burning foot can take all the pleasure out of your walks in the countryside so heed these hints.

Don't wear socks or stockings that are too tight. Avoid wrinkles and darns, they are prolific blister-raisers. Wear shoes that fit correctly. Remember that shoes that are too loose are as bad for the feet as shoes that are too tight.

In a long hike your feet will get longer and wider. Allow for this expansion by wearing shoes with supple leather uppers which give foot-cradling comfort and keep the toes free from cramping.

Your shoes should have resilient leather soles. Leather has the greatest puncture resistance to nails and sharp stones and it permits the evaporation of moisture through millions of tiny pores. This helps to keep the feet at an even temperature.

Walk with your toes pointing straight forward, not angled outward. This way you gain greater control over your limbs, and easier stride, and will allow your toes to do their share of the work.

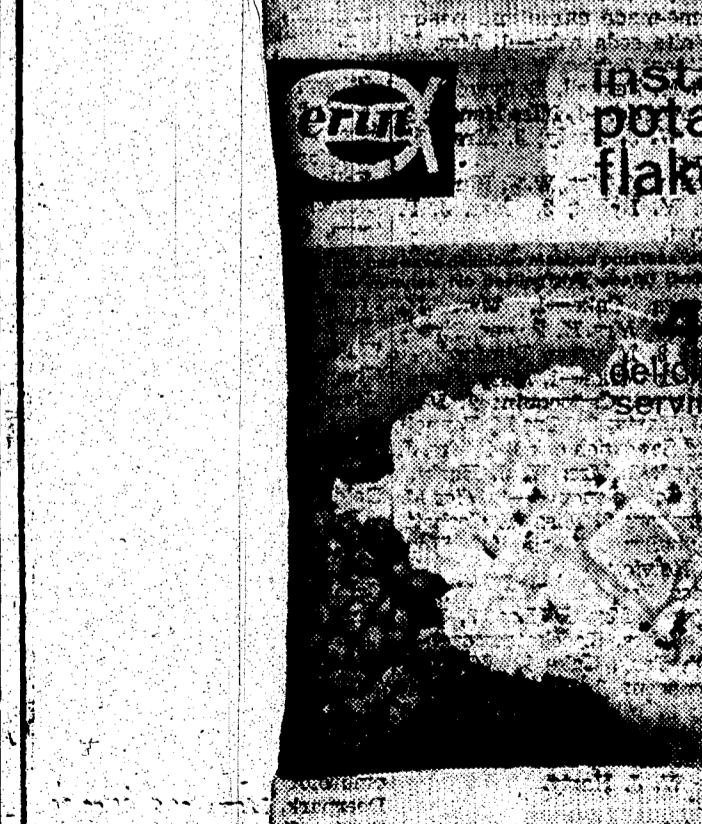

Labour Scarcity a Difficult Problem

ONE of the things which continually gets more difficult in the Irish farming is the provision of an adequate labour force. This is not really new as farmers have had to make adjustments and to alter their farming over a period of years since first

the wages of farm workers started to rise from the disgracefully low plane at which they were thirty years ago. In recent times, however, the problem has become more acute particularly since industry has begun to expand more rapidly.

In some areas, it is becoming almost impossible to get a skilled farm worker of the type who can turn his hand to any job and can learn a new technique in a short time. This is not because the men would not like to stay on the land but because industry can offer better wages and an increasing number of factories are offering more and better paid jobs.

Apparently, their interest in our yearbook was aroused when Dr. P. S. Deshmukh, President, Farmers' Forum, India, read a copy of it when he was here for the thirteenth general conference of the International Federation of Agricultural Producers last May. The articles in which he was particularly interested were "Education and Agriculture" by Rev. R. G. Livingstone, "O.E.C.D. Work in Agriculture and Food" by Mr. W. D. Porter, "Developments of the Common Market" by Mr. M. F. Barry, "Freedom from Hunger Campaign and the farmer" by Dr. B. R. Sen.

There are two sides to this question. One is that it is essential that farm prices should be raised as other prices are in order that farmers can keep their wage increases on a par with other businesses. I don't have to tell a readership of farmers that we don't like paying low wages and that we would all be more than pleased if we could afford to pay the sort of wage that the skilled farm worker deserves, a good deal more than many factory workers who just perform one simple operation which could be taught to anybody, and they certainly deserve as much when they have really learned their complicated trade as any other skilled tradesman. The fact is that at present they can take a job in another industry which does not demand any great skill or training and earn fifty percent more than they do on the farm, just because the farmer is not getting enough for his produce.

It is imperative that an arrangement of this nature be made in each area where a National Organisation is to work. Without such arrangement the Organisation is lost and his progress will be much slower. How many of our best voluntary canvassers would relish the idea of being sent into an area to canvass on their own where they do not know the local people and where they are unknown themselves? It is an unenviable position to be in. Local branches and county executives should give this matter very serious consideration when seeking the services of one of our national organisers. In some areas they received scant help and the results were of course disappointing. At the moment it is appreciated that farmers are very busy engaged with hay, but this should not prevent them from getting the services of a local, even a young lad, who may not be so busily engaged, to go along with the Organiser.

We must also look at this problem from another point of view, from the angle of doing something ourselves to make it possible to pay the sort of wages that will hold a man. For instance, when wages were at a good deal lower all round than they are now, both in industry and on the farm, and milk prices were only a couple of pence less than they are to-day, it was possible to keep one man to milk and feed twenty to thirty cows. Now it is not possible to pay the sort of wages that would keep that man if he is to spend his time with such a small herd. The only solution is either to give up milk or to increase the number of cows to forty or fifty and alter the system of housing, feeding and milking so that one man can look after them and still have time to spare for some other work.

There is another very important reason why the Organiser should be accompanied by a local N.F.A. representative. The local man would be in a better position to ensure that the correct N.F.A. branches, which is especially important in the case of standing orders which, if not correctly completed can cause a great deal of confusion afterwards in allocating fees. This problem cropped up in a few areas—it would not have arisen if local people were on the job to help and advise.

At the recent annual general meeting of our National Council the work of our national organisers came in for a great deal of praise and deservedly so. As the outgoing National Hon. Treas., Dr. J. Greene reported "up to the end of 1962 the fruits of their labours have resulted in a guarantee of an annual income of 14,679.10.0 on the basis of signed standing orders." This has been a tremendous achievement and of course the amount mentioned has increased substantially in the meantime.

HEALTH ACT DISPARITY MUST GO
Recent indications of an expected upward revision of the annual salaried income limit for the Health Act benefits prompts the question as to what the Minister for Health intends to do about the farming section of the community. It will be remembered that some years ago, when the upper income limit of salaried people went up to £280 per year, the upper limit for farmers still remained at £50 P.L.V.

Our local voluntary workers have helped considerably in most areas, to bring about this happy state of affairs. They have arranged lists of non-members in the order in which they are to be called on and they always provided a local N.F.A. man or his son to do the rounds with the Organiser, yearbook for 1963.

According to the Farm Survey the annual income per unit of family labour averaged £296 for 30-50 acre farms and rose to £401 for 50-100 acre farms" (£1 P.L.V.) can be taken to correspond with 1 acre of land, on average). The disparity, between the £50 P.L.V. farms and the £280 salaried man reveals a most unfair discrimination against farmers.

Reports to date have not given any cause for optimism that the scope of the Health Act will be widened as far as farmers are concerned. This is disappointing in view of the fact that farmers are already treated as second class citizens by comparison with other sections of the community as far as the Health Act goes. The N.F.A. Committee responsible for these matters is giving close attention to this question at the moment. It is to be hoped that their efforts will be successful in bringing farmers into line with their more fortunate salaried fellow citizens.

SPECIAL MEETING OF LIQUID MILK GROUP
The N.F.A. Liquid Milk Group meeting in Dublin during the week decided to make every endeavour to have the price of the produced liquid milk increased by 2d. per gallon from 1st September onwards and has taken steps to implement this decision.

# Gaelic Jottings

## VALLEYS FIANCED AT DUNGARVAN

Will Valley Rovers — the greatest championship battlers of all, qualify for yet another Western final? or will Cappoquin, traditionally a hurling stronghold, but now making a forceful impact in the football scene, upset the Rovers' apple, and go on to the Divisional decider for the first time in years?

The answers to these vital questions should be forthcoming at Dungarvan's Fraher Field on Sunday next, 2.15 pm, when the sides meet in the semi-final of the Western junior football championship. If only because of their phenomenal championship tradition and their truly imposing record of the past half-dozen years, the Valleys must be regarded as favourites, however slight, on Sunday. They have geared themselves for an all-out assault on this year's crown and Derrinlarua will be a disappointed village this week-end should they fail to advance to the final.

While as always, that truly amazing footballing family — the Hewitts, will supply key men to the side, they can also call on veterans Johnny Walsh, Oliver Nugent and Billy Acheson.

But even more encouraging for them is the return to the fold of Fourmilewater's Mick Connolly and Kieran Ryan. With the failure of Ballymacarby to field a football team this year, Connolly and Ryan were automatically left on the "vacant list," and the Rovers wasted no time in snapping them up.

What of Cappoquin? It is seldom we hear of them causing even a minor stir in football affairs, but all that has changed in dramatic fashion this year. They have strung together a more than useful side, that to-date, has accomplished everything asked of it.

But for them Sunday is the acid test. They have as yet not countered opposition of the Valleys' calibre but they believe their buoyant enthusiasm will see them through.

Experience, however, weighs heavily in the Derrinlarua men's favour. Time waits for no man and for many of the Valleys, this must surely be their last opportunity of annexing a county title. It is this vast experience — gained over years of championship campaigning, that may prove decisive on Sunday.

Cappoquin, let me state emphatically, are quite capable of proving me wrong. But nevertheless, the Rovers remain my choice and should prevail in what may well be a photo finish.

## JUNIOR HURLING SEMI-FINAL AT LISMORE

There promises to be hurling fireworks at Lismore on Sunday when Shamrocks and Ballyduff Upper meet in the Divisional junior championship semi-final — a game that could well prove the highlight of the day.

Twelve months ago, Ballyduff battled their way to the Western final only to be beaten convincingly by Fourmile-water. On that occasion they lacked the services of prolific goal-scorer Michael Quirke and they laboured under this too great a handicap.

But now Quirke is again available and confidence in their camp is at an all-time high, that not alone will Shamrocks be beaten but that last year's final defeat will be atoned for.

They have already beaten Kilmobnet impressively en route to Sunday's semi-final. On their day they are a match for the best in junior ranks and many believe that their rugged

brand of hurling will carry them to victory.

While Quirke is undoubtedly their key man, they are by no means a one-man team. The experienced Joe Daly is still a solid defender while in Shamie Flynn, Jimmy Feeney and Maurice Moloney they have hurlers with experience believing their youthful years. From a hurling viewpoint it can be said without fear of contradiction that Shamrocks have few if any equals in the Division. They have been knocking on the championship door without success for the past few years and it is more than a belief that they will gain total compensation for those tantalising defeats of former years.

They received quite a scare in the opening round against Kilmossanty when after trailing for most of the game they luckily won by the minimum of margins. Against Geraldines, however, they displayed far more confidence and teamwork and were not flattered by their thirteen point victory.

On Sunday they will be strengthened by the return of Tommy Geary and with Michl. (Bonzo) and Liam Tobin and Frankie Corcoran will be looked to by followers to instigate victory.

It promises to be an intriguing semi-final between teams with major contrasting styles. Shamrocks are without doubt the better hurlers — in fact the stivlists of this championship. Given a dry sod and reasonable luck, they could master any side in the Division.

Ballyduff can hardly be placed on a hurling par with Shamrocks, yet I am not for one moment suggesting they are not well-equipped with hurling ability but it is their team toughness that stands to them so profitably.

If anyone is to "cramp" Shamrocks style, Ballyduff are the side but in a game that is as open as the proverbial field I take Shamrocks to slog out a narrow victory.

## TOURIN MAY BEAT AFFANE

At the time of writing there are doubts about the Primary hurling game between Affane and Tourin being played on Sunday. The game is scheduled for Cappoquin at 2.15.

Should the fixture be fulfilled, it should be a great hour's hurling between two of the strongest sides in this championship. Either of them could well be good enough to win it out but in what is likely to be a close game, the hard-hitting Tourin men are given the vote.

## JUVENILE SEMI-FINAL

The remaining game on Sunday is at Dungarvan where the Old Boro Juvenile footballers meet Abbeyside or Stradbally (who at the time of writing have yet to meet) in the Western semi-final.

## LOAL DERBY

The Western juvenile hurling semi-final between Dungarvan and Cathal Brugha at the Fraher Field on to-night (Friday) is arousing considerable interest locally.

To date, the Dungarvan boys have been very inconsistent; they impressively beat Abbeyside but only slushily beat Stradbally in the second round. Cathal Brugha under the guidance of Eddie Fitzgerald accounted for St. Laurence's in the opening round and then received a walk-over from the Brickets. They are strong and fit and will not hear of defeat in this razor-keen local derby.
