On the Saturday the County Waterford junior and minor championships will be held in the Town Hall and Friary Hall to be followed that night by a ceilid in the Town Hall to 12 midnight.

A special stage is being erected on the Square floodlit and amplified for the convenience of visiting musicians—and during Saturday night and Sunday afternoon there will be dancing exhibitions by pupils of Mrs. Hallahan, T.R.C.G. 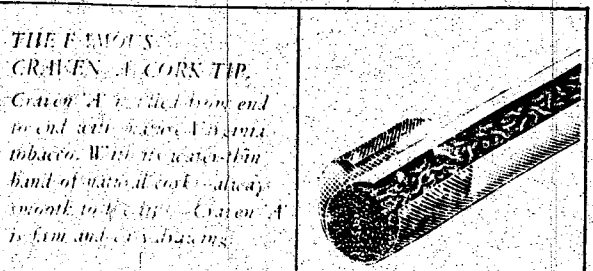

Local Man Appointed to Important British Agricultural Post

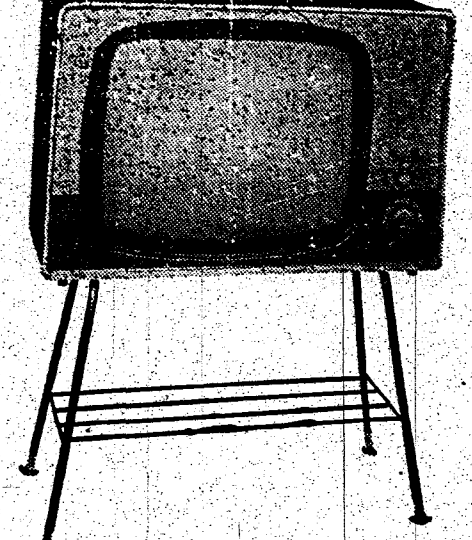
It gives us great pleasure to record that Mr. Michael Donnelly, eldest son of Mrs. Donnelly and the late Terence Donnelly, Glenmore, has been appointed on the permanent staff of the Royal Agricultural Society of England, on their Pedigree Beef Bull Performance Testing Unit and other livestock enterprises at their new headquarters at Stoneleigh Abbey. This is the site of the new Royal Show Grounds and comprises 150 acres with a demonstration farm of 500 acres. The Unit will consist of Beef Pedigree Breeders young bulls coming in on 168-day trials from all over Great Britain and will cover nearly all beef breeds with room for up to 70 animals starting. The trials will cover liveweight gain, food conversion etc.

Michael who has been with the Ministry of Agriculture Livestock Division at Reading for the past eleven years was selected from a large number of applicants.

Michael was a well-known Brickey footballer and at mid-field helped the side in the many successes in the late 'thirties and forties, playing with such stalwarts as Martin Curran, Ned and Jimmy Power, Paddy Joe McGrath, John Hansbury, Lee, Cotter, Paddy McCarrthy, Dodo McCarthy, Stephen Hickey, Stephen Curran, Nicholas McGrath etc. While Mick was a sixth-standard pupil of the C.B.S. he was a permanent member of the secondary schools senior hurling team.

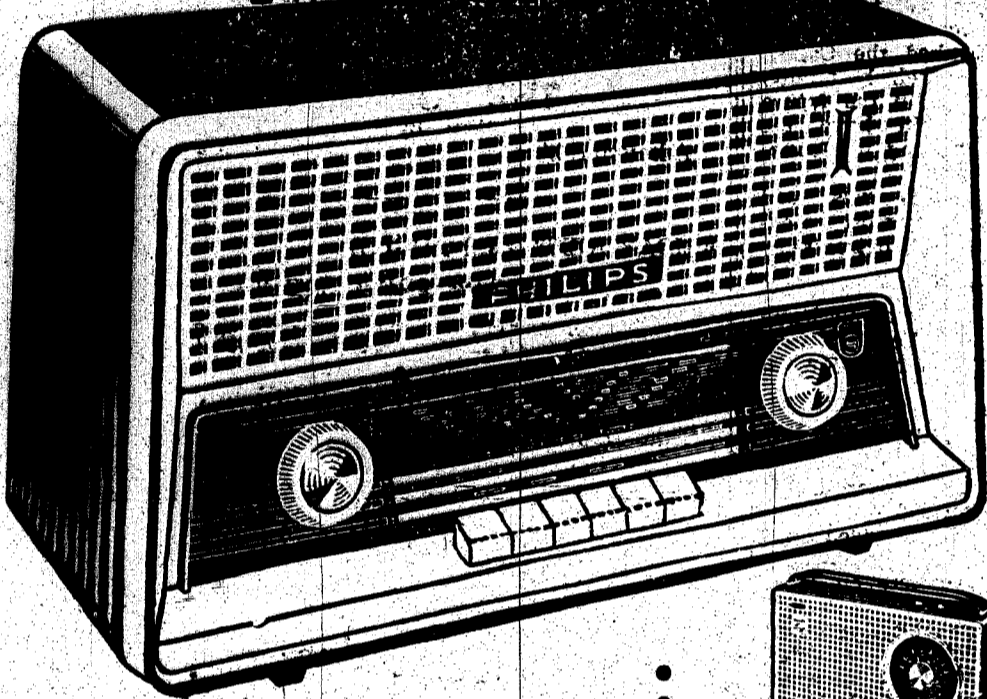

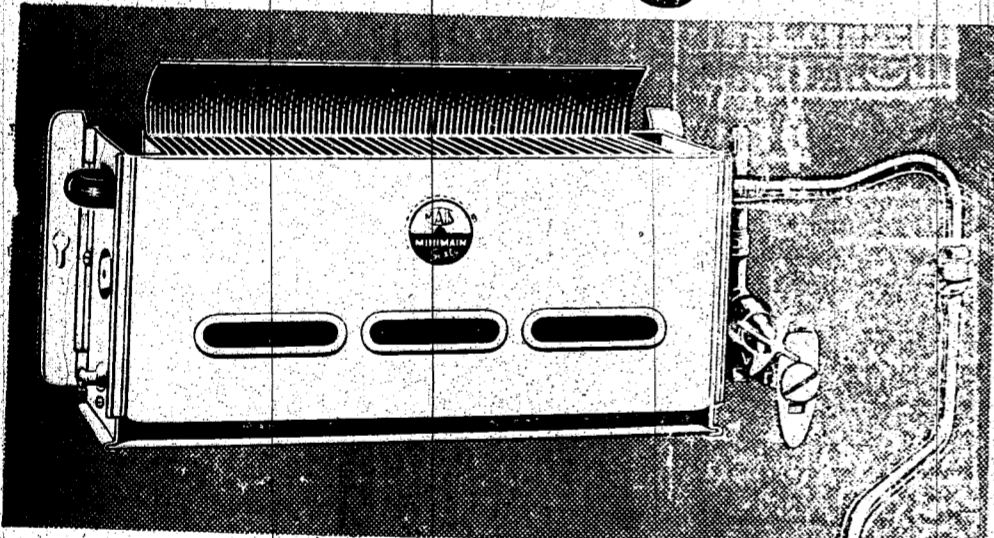

NEW SAFETY MEASURES ON MF TRACTORS

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE

CHILDREN'S ALLOWANCES

In accordance with the Social Welfare (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, 1963, a children's allowance at the rate of 10/- a month will be payable as from 1st November, 1963, in respect of the first or only qualified child in a family.

Heads of families with only one child under 16 years of age should claim this allowance on a form AL2 which may be obtained at any post office. The completed form together with the child's birth certificate should be forwarded to the Department of Social Welfare, Children's Allowances Branch, Aras Mhic Dhiarmada, Dublin 1.

Persons who are in receipt of children's allowances after 1st August, 1963, need not make a claim in respect of their first child.

WIDOWS' PENSIONS

An increase in Widows' Pensions may be paid as from 1st November, 1963, in respect of a child, grandchild, step-child or adopted child of the widow or of her deceased husband. Application for such increase should be made by writing to the Secretary of the Department of Social Welfare, Aras Mhic Dhiarmada, Dublin 1.

The rules governing the calculation of the yearly value of capital for Widows' Pension purposes have been amended to take effect from 1st November, 1963. Widows whose claims were rejected, or rewarded at reduced rates, because of capital should make fresh application for Widows' Pensions, or for revision of their existing pensions.

Changes in Children's Allowances Scheme

The Department of Social Welfare draws attention to an important change in the Children's Allowances scheme. The amount of capital to be ignored in accordance with the existing scheme is payable only in respect of the second and each subsequent child under sixteen years in a family, and families in which there is only one child under that age are not, therefore, qualified for an allowance under the Social Welfare (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1963, however, a children's allowance at the rate of 10/- a month will be payable as from the first child under sixteen in a family.

The heads of families in which there is only one qualified child should now claim this allowance. The necessary claim form may be obtained at any post office. The form when completed should be sent with the child's birth certificate to the Department of Social Welfare, Aras Mhic Dhiarmada, Dublin 1.

Persons who are in receipt of children's allowances after the 1st August 1963, need not make a claim in respect of their first qualified child.

Persons who are in receipt of children's allowances after the 1st August 1963, n

Persons who were in receipt of an allowance which ceased prior to 1st August, 1963, and who, at the present time, are still under sixteen years of age should forward a fresh claim together with a birth certificate in respect of their child.

As well as extending the scheme to include the first child the Act also increases the existing rates of allowance for the third and each subsequent child in families of three or more children by 4/6d a week, from 2/6d at present to 2/6d. As from the 1st November 1963 the monthly allowance for a family of three children will be increased from £1.17.6d to £2.2.0, while for a family of five the new rate will be £3.5.0, as against £4.1.6d.

TICKET PROBLEM IS GRAVE

NEVER in the history of the history of the game has the search for All-Ireland hurling tickets been as intense throughout the County as at present. But we can officially announce that the "number floating" will be an all-time low this year. The reason—the County Board has been allocated 420 tickets less than in 1959.

At last Monday night's meeting of the County Board, the Chairman, Mr. J. Moloney N.T., said the total number of tickets being allocated to the County by Central Council was 1370, which was 420 less than the number allocated in 1959.

The following is the actual allocation: 350 Lower Deck of Hogan Stand (15/- each); 70 for Corner Stand (7/6); 140 for Cusack Stand (7/6); 200 for upper deck of Hogan Stand (10/- each), plus the following extra tickets for participating in the final: 350 lower deck and 100 each Cusack and Corner stands.

Mr. Tom Lannon said they should write to the General Secretary, Mr. Padraig O'Caomhain and tell him they were dissatisfied with their allocation. It was a very small allocation he said, for a county that was involved in the final.

Valley Rovers for Sixth Successive Final

VALLEY ROVERS 4-8; CAPPOQUIN 3-6

SUCH is the regularity with which Valley Rovers are appearing in Western Junior Football finals that it is difficult to envisage a decider without them. And true to form, the lived up to their phenomenal championship record at Dungarvan on Sunday last when decisively beating Cappoquin in a disappointing semi-final.

The game was productive of little good football and while the Valleys were fully deserving of their five point victory their all-round display left a lot to be desired. It was quite apparent, even to their own partisan followers that they were not the Valleys of old and considerable improvement is compulsory if they are to beat Ballinacorney in the Divisional final.

It is of course more than a possibility that having "sensed" a definite superiority, they were content to merely "amble" their way through the game. Their play was at times half-hearted by a lethargy that was most unbecoming of a championship encounter and I find it difficult to believe that the Derrinlaure men ever slipped into top-gear.

While Cappoquin never rose to the heights of their previous games their defeat was almost as much their own doing as any other individual factor. That they were an inferior side on the day I accept, but the manner in which they overplayed the ball must have earned them the wrath of their supporters.

RAN INTO TROUBLE

They freely ran into trouble by persistently attempting to literally walk past an opponent with the forwards being the chief culprits in this respect.

There were periods in both halves when they undoubtedly held the upperhand but their attackers—six of them were guilty of many "misadventures". On occasions they had golden opportunities of tapping over points but dissatisfied with this, they proceeded to indulge in petty passing that invariably broke down near goal.

The losers fared best in the opening half when facing a strong breeze and when they only trailed by 1-5 to 1-1 at the short whistle, the issue was very much in the melting pot.

But within seconds of the restart incredible slackness in Cappoquin defence allowed Noel Wall to blast the ball to the net—a score that all intents and purposes settled the issue.

DECISIVE SCORE

Thereafter the Rovers, at times unimpeded, tackled on the scores and with only ten minutes remaining were in an unassailable 3-8 to 1-3 lead. It was only then that Cappoquin succeeded in forging the breakthroughs and their belated scores gave the scoreboard its respectable appearance.

FIRST TO SCORE

Cappoquin were first "to register" when Ger Mason pointed a 3rd minute free. Three minutes later Oliver Nugent was hauled down inside the Square and from the resultant penalty Eddie Hewitt blazed the ball over the bar.

Veteran full forward "Galligan" Byrne put the Valleys ahead when capitalising on a weak kick-out and Eddie Hewitt quickly stretched that advantage with a pointed free.

Then came the Cappoquin goal in the 22nd minute which gave them the lead for the last time in the game—a well-executed movement that was polished off by Maurice Kelleher. The Valleys quickly regained equilibrium with an Eddie Hewitt point and they

finished the half "in style" with a goal by Byrne and a point by Noel Wall.

Restarting with Jimmy Hewitt at centre-back, the Valleys struck the game's decisive blow within thirty seconds. It was a prodigious clearance by Hewitt that led up to Wall slamming home a goal from which Cappoquin never recovered.

"Galligan" Byrne and Wall quickly added points before Maurice Kelleher and Ger Mason replied with like scores for the losers.

It was the veteran Byrne who finally put the seal on victory for the Valleys when he scored goal number three after nineteen minutes. Eddie Hewitt pointed yet another close-in-free, before Eddie Fraher investigated Cappoquin's face-saving rally with a fisted goal. Ger Mason (2) and Fraher tackled on points and in the dying moments Wall and Eddie Fraher exchanged goals.

The full-line of attack contributed more than any other sector to the Derrinlaure victory. The veteran of this ageing side, "Galligan" Byrne heralded his return with a devastating display and constantly had the Cappoquin defence at sixes and sevens. Noel Wall in the left corner was top scorer while Eddie Hewitt's accuracy from frees was unerring. In all the trio accounted for their side's entire total.

While failing to raise a flag, centre forward Oliver Nugent had his best game for a long time and his excellent fielding feats highlighted a fine individual display.

Kieran Ryan worked solidly at mid-field but it was only when his partner Jimmy Hewitt reverted to defence that he was seen at his best.

His defence simply gloried in the tactics adopted by the losers' forwards and Mick Connolly, Billy Hewitt and Billy Acheson were all impressively sound. Behind them the full line inspired no great confidence and gave little protection to goalkeeper Liam Bradshaw, who however, gave a really top class performance.

In a Cappoquin defence that seldom found "the measure" of their opponents, Mick Lacey, centre-back Lane and substitute Billy McCarthy were best. In fact McCarthy was by far the best defender when called in and for the life of me I cannot understand why he was left in "cold storage" on the side-line for so long.

Both midfielders Ger Mason and John O'Brien never gave up trying but in attack only Maurice Kelleher, Mickey O'Connor and belatedly Eddie Fraher met with any success.
