MANAGER IS DISAPPOINTED

Consultants Would Local Happenings

Effect a Saving

HE was very disappointed that the Health Authority had turned down the proposal to employ Industrial Consultants. There would have been a considerable saving and greater efficiency in the hospitals. This was stated by the Co. Manager, Mr. S. J. Moynihan, at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Health Authority.

Mr. Moynihan said that for an expenditure of £2,600 (half of which was recoverable), there would be a saving of at least £3,500 per annum. That over a number of years, would mean a very big saving and would give greater efficiency in the hospitals. There was no question of Trade Unionism being turned down as the Trade Unions themselves had actually employed them. Neither was there any intention of casting reflection on any of the staff. There would be no injustices to anyone and there would be no dismissals. The turnover in the institutions was so great that there would be no redundancy.

"I regret that we have decided so. I hope that sometime the Health Authority will reconsider it."

Mr. W. Kennelly (chairman) said he did not think

they had turned it down. Mr. T. Lannon said it was very wrong of the Manager to come along to-day after they had made up their minds about it.

Mr. Moynihan: Some members might have thought the last day that there would be reflections on some of the staff. That was why I brought it up.

Mr. Lannon: I think it is very wrong to comment on the members' decision.

Mr. Moynihan: I am not asking you to employ them.

Mr. C. Curran: There is duplicating and overlapping and I think there is an immediate need to have them in the hospitals. I would ask the members to consider it again. It is a most important matter.

Mr. Lannon said that a doc-

tor retired recently and they had to get two men to replace him. What efficiency expert was needed he said to work that one out.

Mr. M. Galsley said that in fairness he voted against employing them the last day. He thought it was the small fry that would be put out of a job. But after the explanation of the Manager he would vote for it now.

The Manager said there was no question of victimisation being done.

Mr. P. Browne said the question of employing industrial consultants had not been turned down. They were only awaiting the decision of the County Council on a similar matter.

The discussion then ended.

DIOCESAN PILGRIMAGE TO LOURDES

LOCAL COMMITTEE SENDS FOUR INVALIDS

SINCE 1958 the Dungarvan Lourdes Invalid Committee has sent twelve local invalids to Lourdes. On Tuesday next, as part of the Diocesan Pilgrimage (four more will depart from Dublin Airport, thanks to the wonderful work of this outstanding Dungarvan Committee.

Secretary of the Committee since its foundation in '58 is Mrs. B. Tyers, Fitzgerald's Tce., while the other officers are Mr. E. Breen (chairman), Mr. J. Moloney (treasurer), committee Messrs Bernard Tyers (senr.), Dinny McGrath and Noel Hackett.

The good work of this committee can be seen from the number of sick that have been sent each succeeding year. In 1958 one made the trip; in 1959 (2); '60 (3); '61 (3); '62 (3), and this year four are going. Besides, those four there will also be two private patients from St. Joseph's hospital.

The Pilgrimage Chaplain is Rev. Fr. F. Hopkins while Rev. Fr. Flavin, Chaplain, Carriglea Convent is Spiritual Director.

Also accompanying the Pilgrimage are Dr. O'Brien-Moran, Secretary Hospitalite De Notre Dame De Lourdes, Mr. P. McSweeney, Treas. Lourdes Committee for the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore; Mr. Eamonn Enright, Chief Broncaide; Dr. Phelan, Waterford, and Nurse Sheedy, do.

Also among the nurses making the trip is Nurse E. Drea-Moloney, the only local nurse to help on these pilgrimages so far.

The party will assemble at the C.I.E. station, Waterford, at 3.50 p.m. on Tuesday. They arrive in Dublin at 7 a.m. and depart from Collinstown Airport at 9 a.m. arriving in Lourdes at 11.59 p.m.

They will return on Sunday, October 6th arriving in Dublin at 12 noon.

Few people can really appreciate the amount of hard work put into this pilgrimage by the organising committee. They have had to devise a way and means of raising much needed funds and no praise can be too high for their outstanding work. They will forever retain the gratitude of those they are

helping but knowing the people through whose efforts these Pilgrimages are made possible, they accept it as being all part of a day's work.

SILO FIRE

For the second time in ten days one of the driers in the new £100,000 grain silo erected by 'Dungarvan' Co-Operative Creamery was damaged by fire and operations had to be suspended for a period.

The fire occurred on Monday night and the alarm was raised by shift workers who saw smoke billowing from the towering building.

Dungarvan Fire Brigade was quickly on the scene and remained on the scene until almost 2.30 a.m. Several tons of grain had to be drawn off before hoses could be placed on the burning section.

The previous fire which occurred ten days before was also in the same area of the silo.

INJURED IN ACCIDENT

Mrs. Ellen O'Shea, Ballinacorney, was removed to Dungarvan District Hospital on Monday evening last with a broken leg and extensive face injuries received after being struck by a motor car just outside the town. She was cycling home at the time of the accident.

Her condition was comfortable it was stated at the hospital to-day.

FACTORY FIRE

Shortly after midnight on Tuesday night Dungarvan Fire Brigade was summoned to an outbreak of fire in a dust extractor at the local Dickens Leather Factory.

The alarm was raised by workers on night shifts and the brigade was fighting the outbreak for a considerable time. While the dust extractor was fairly extensively damaged working operations were not disrupted.

HIGHEST OUTPUT

At a meeting of Waterford Committee of Agriculture on Saturday last the Chairman, Mr. Michael Harty said the agricultural output per man unit in the county was the highest in the country. There were, he said, statistics to prove that statement. Such a position he added, was a credit to the farming community of the county.

The C.A.O., Mr. P. Conroy, said the Chairman's statement was quite correct.

COSTAL EROSION
Cork Council announce plans for the expenditure of £115,000 on coastal erosion schemes throughout the county. The South Cork proposals include spending of £50,000 on a high concrete wall to prevent erosion at the base of the road

and private buildings between Green Park and Moll Goggin's corner at Youghal and a further £65,000 on the stretch between that corner and Claycastle. The Co. Engineer Mr. Buckley informed the County Council that a specially designed wall and toe is needed to prevent erosion of the Youghal promenade and property.

NAME FOR NEW HOUSING SCHEME
The new housing scheme at Dunne's Park comprising 24 houses, which will be occupied next month, is to be known as Dominic Collins Place.

NEW DUMPING GROUND
The Minister has approved of the sum of £600 for the taking over of the new dumping site at the approach to the old Youghal Bridge. The old dumping ground at Springfield is to be railed off. The new dump is situated about a quarter mile outside the town on the northern end.

PARKING AT NEW YOUGHAL BRIDGE
At a recent meeting of the Youghal U.D.C., Mr. Sean P. Daly, B.E., complained that cars were parking on the carriageway of the new bridge at Ardsallagh, which was only 24' wide and were parking at both ends of the bridge, which was only 100 yards in length. It was decided to refer the matter to both the Cork and Waterford County Councils for their immediate attention.

NEW HOUSING SITE
The Youghal Urban District Council have received sanction for the purchase of Jeneally's field at Bawnmore as a housing site for the sum of £1,500. Work on this scheme of houses is due to commence early in the new year.

MINISTER SEES ADVANCES IN PEAT PRODUCTIVITY

The Minister for Transport and Power, Mr. Erskine Childers, T.D., on Monday, September 23rd, paid an end-of-season visit to a number of Bord na Mona installations, where he was shown some of the latest developments in the mechanised winning of peat.

Mr. Childers was accompanied on his tour by members of the Board and its senior management. The party included: Mr. Aodhghain O'Raghallaigh, chairman, Mr. Dermot C. Lawlor, managing director, Mr. Anthony J. Woods and Mr. Thomas Roche, board members, Mr. Patrick Cogan, general manager, Mr. Lewis Rhatigan, chief engineer, and Mr. Eugene Redahan, chief civil engineer. Also present was Mr. D. O'Riordan, assistant secretary, Department of Transport and Power.

At Timahoe machine turf works, near Allenwood, Co. Kildare, the Minister watched an automatic sod-collecting machine at work. This process, which conveys the dried turf from the spread ground to a large storage pile, is now completely mechanised and during the season seven of these machines collect the 160,000 tons of turf produced at Timahoe each year for Allenwood power station. Under favourable weather conditions, in fact, the entire machine turf process from the cutting of the turf to its eventual loading on rail waggons is now done by machinery.

Mr. Childers later visited Derrygreenagh bog, near Rochfortbridge, Co. Westmeath, where milled peat is produced for the Board's briquette factory at Croghan, and for the 80 megawatt ESB power station at Rhode. Here the local manager, Mr. John J. Kelly, showed the Minister one of the most

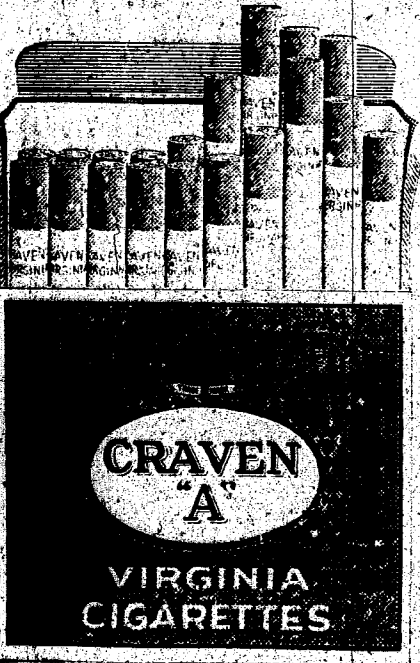



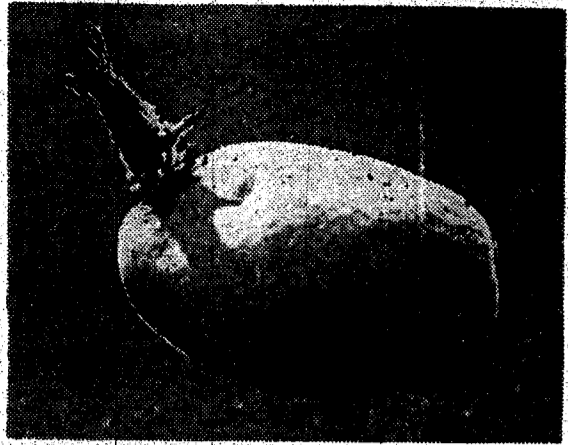

Fluorescent lighting fittings are hung in the alleys between stacked sprouting boxes and are switched on for twelve hours a day. Any farm building which can be made frost proof may be used. One fitting is sufficient for the controlled sprouting of a ton of seed potatoes. Purchase price is £10 and running costs are low—certainly no more than 7s. 6d. per ton.

Nursing Posts Created

By eleven votes to three, it was decided at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Health Authority, to create three posts as General Practitioner District Duties. The areas concerned will be: (1) Dungarvan, Ring, Whitechurch; (2) Ballymascary, Kilsheelan, St. Mary's, Seskinane; (3) Clashmore, Tallow.

Proposing that the posts be created, Mr. J. Griffin said it would be a step in the right direction.

Mr. W. Collins seconded. Mr. T. Lannon said they were told that every post created would effect a saving.

The Co. Manager said they were replacing the Mid-wives. Mr. Griffin said the areas that were already enjoying these services believed they

were a boon and a blessing. It was not fair to people in other areas to deprive them of these services. They were of immense benefit and he felt that the people in the other areas could not be given the service too soon.

Mr. J. A. Hynes (Secretary) said there were 12 mid-wives operating at present.

Mr. Milo Galgey said they should bear in mind that Jubilee Nurses attended every patient.

Mr. Hynes said these new nurses would do the same.

Mr. Galgey: Well, I am in favour of them so. Mr. Lannon proposed they should be for one month. Mr. W. Dower seconded. This proposal was defeated by eleven votes to three. Mr. Griffin's proposal was then passed by a similar vote.

Overtime for Ambulance Drivers Questioned

WHEN the Auditor's report came up for discussion at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Health Authority, Mr. W. Foran said the £800 for overtime for the ambulance drivers was ridiculous and fantastic. He asked was it right to have ambulances running out

to remote places for one patient. He felt they should have hackney cars available.

Plea to Allow Pensions Officer Remain in Lismore

An appeal was made by Mr. J. Quirke at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Health Authority to the Minister for Social Welfare, to allow the Pensions Officer to remain in Lismore.

Mr. Quirke said the Pensions Officer in Lismore was being transferred and there was no one being sent to replace him. He would appeal to the Minister for Social Welfare not to have him transferred.

Mr. J. A. Hynes (Secretary) said they could never anticipate where a patient would get sick. They did not think hiring hackney cars would be economic.

Mr. J. Griffin said it was sheer irresponsibility for them to have a harrassing discussion on the question of ambulance drivers. The only thing that might come out of a discussion on the overtime for ambulance drivers was that the drivers might drive too fast with the patients. He thought it was a comparatively small thing and they should not direct themselves to that £800.

Mr. Lannon also stated that the Health Authority was charging too much for beef and bacon from their farm. In view of that he could not propose the adoption of the Auditor's report.

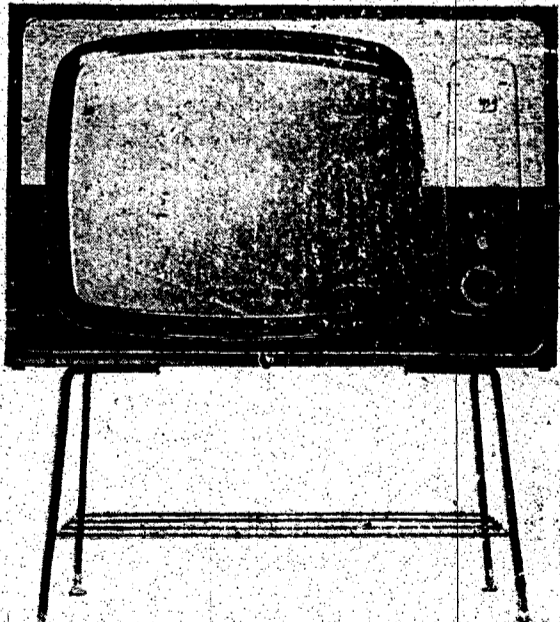



WON FILM FESTIVAL AWARD

"Progress Reported," the Bord na Mona film about the Irish peat industry, has won the award for the best industrial documentary film at the recent International Film Festival at Victoria, Vancouver Island, British Columbia, Canada. The Bord na Mona film was one of five documentary films entered in the festival by this country.

"Progress Reported" was produced for Bord na Mona by Vincent Corcoran in association with Stanley Schofield Productions of London. The film, which is in colour and runs for about 30 minutes, was directed by the internationally-known film-maker Joe Menzies.

It tells the story of an American journalist who comes to Ireland to write a story about "the old bog road" and how his misconceptions about the nature of Ireland's modern peat industry are swept away when he visits Bord na Mona installations in various parts of the country. The film shows how a bog is prepared for production, and how Bord na Mona's different products—methylene turf, milled peat, peat briquettes and peat moss—are produced. The increasing use of peat in industry and its importance as a fuel for electricity generation are also dealt with.

"Progress Reported" has attracted considerable interest, both in Ireland and abroad. It has already been shown at film festivals in Berlin, Edinburgh, Lagos and Cork before its success at Victoria, and several dispiriting missions (it) have copies of the film which are in constant demand by individuals and organisations who are interested in developments in the peat industry.

In Ireland the film is distributed by the R.R.C. Organisation and it has been seen in cinemas all over the country. Several cinemas have booked a second screening in response to public demand. Recently circulation of the film began in Northern Ireland, where it is arousing considerable interest.

A Bord na Mona spokesman said: "The film has been invaluable to us in bringing home to the general public and the economic significance of the Board's activities. We are always pleased to lend a 16 mm copy of the film to any organisation interested enough to show it, and already many schools and societies of all kinds have borrowed it. Members of the public will have another opportunity to see the film at the Trades Union Exhibition at the RDS in Dublin this week."

NO SOLUTION WITHOUT UNDERSTANDING
"Agricultural progress in one country inevitably reflects itself in the market for agricultural products in many other countries," said Mr. R. Deasy, President N.F.A., when speaking in Dublin last week.

Some of the members present stated emphatically that farmers in their areas have come to believe that Government and Department officials were not only unsympathetic, but were also opposed to the idea of organised producer representation. This state of affairs could not, they said, be allowed to continue further, because the agricultural industry and the country as a whole were suffering as a consequence.

New Group Formed: A new group has been appointed, and has already held its first meeting to consider the organisational structure of the Association. Its terms of reference will include the composition of Commodity Committees, Central Executives and National Council.

Occasionally, in the past, members have found fault with the membership of particular committees. To avoid such criticism in the future then ew group has appealed to all Co. Executives to submit in writing suggestions for an improvement in the present structure, method of election, etc. If members take this appeal seriously improvements will be introduced before very long. If they don't, then it is only right to point out that it would be unfair to criticise without making suggestions for improving the present system.

Abbeyside piled on the pressure after the restart but failed to penetrate a solid rearguard.

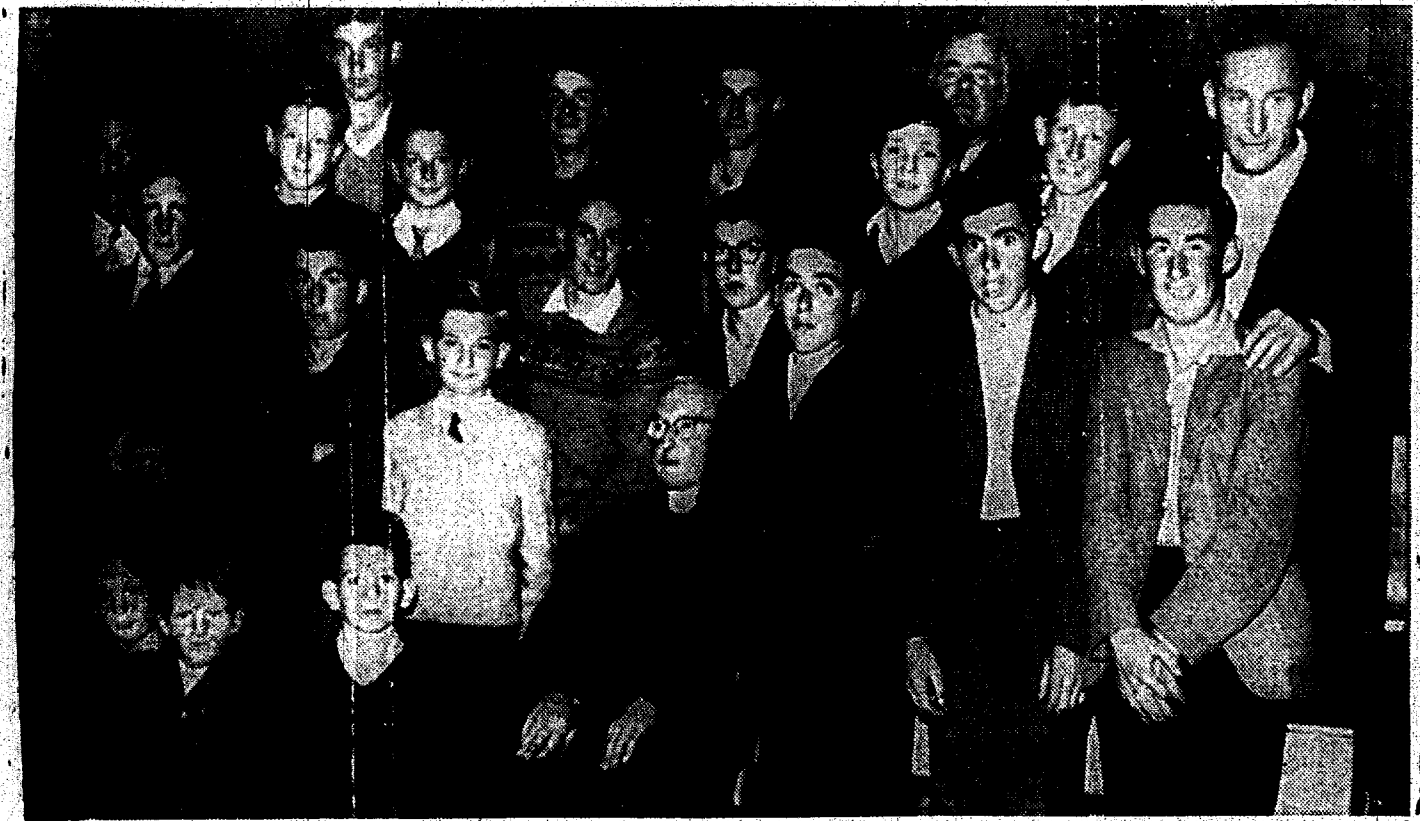
WATERFORD'S LEAGUE GAME POSTPONED

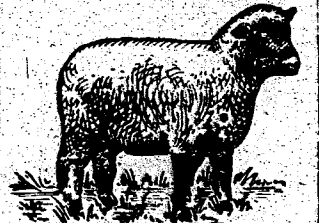
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
