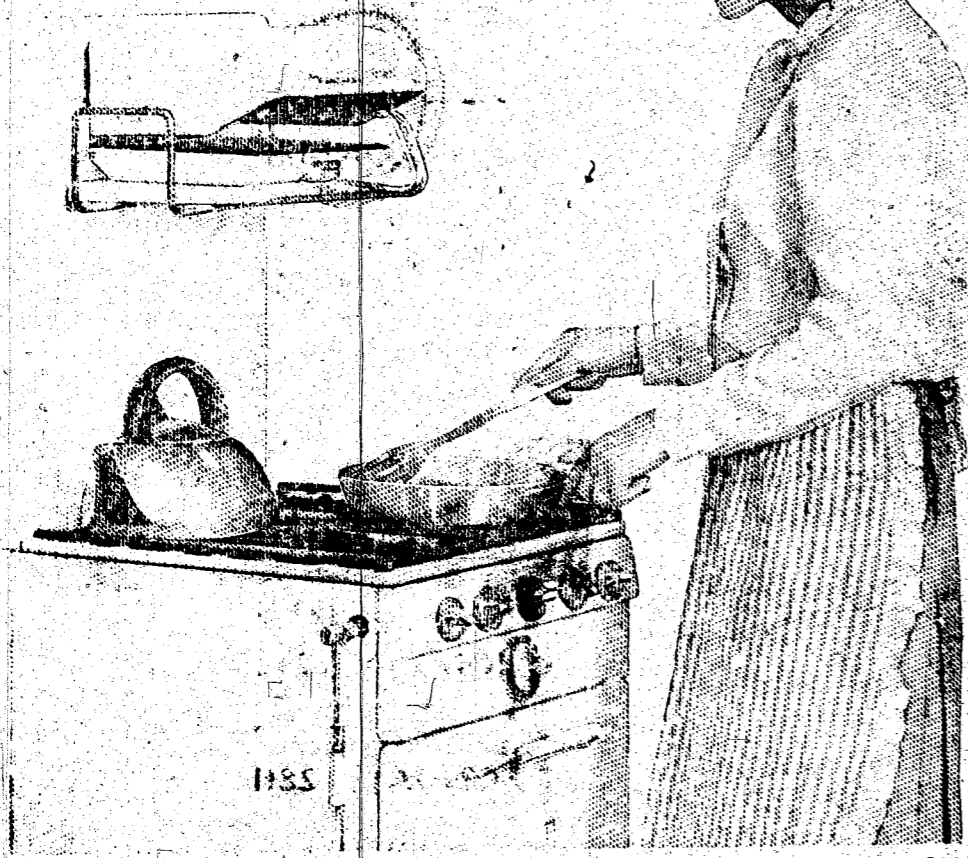

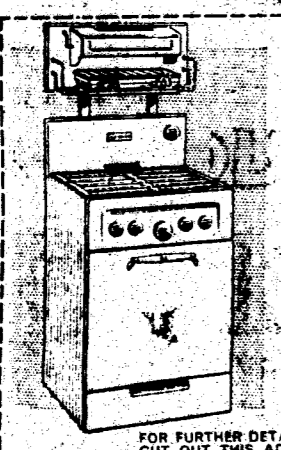

## Kilmacthomas Notes

**Bereavement.**—Mrs. Margaret Coffey, who died at the County and City Infirmary, Waterford, on Thursday of last week, 17th inst. (Feast of St. Margaret Mary) was an excellent Catholic neighbour, who took a keen interest in the welfare of her native town. Beovad wife of well and popularly known Mr. Richard (Dick) Coffey, Portlaw (a familiar figure in sporting circles in the area, and a keen supporter of the local G.A.A. teams) and mother of the Rev. Fr. Brendan Coffey, O.S.A., Galway. She deservedly enjoyed much esteem and respect, and is sadly missed by her sorrowing spouse, sons, brothers, sister, nieces, nephews and daughters-in-law, with all of whom sincere sympathy is widespread in their tribulation.

A large and representative attendance accompanied the removal of the remains to St. Patrick's Church, Portlaw, where the coffin was placed overnight on a catafalque before the high altar.

Subsequent to the celebration of Requiem Mass at 10.30 o'clock on Saturday, interment was made in the adjoining cemetery amidst every manifestation of profound sorrow. Rev. D. Quinlan, C.C., Portlaw, officiated at the graveside. Many spiritual bouquets and messages of condolence were received.

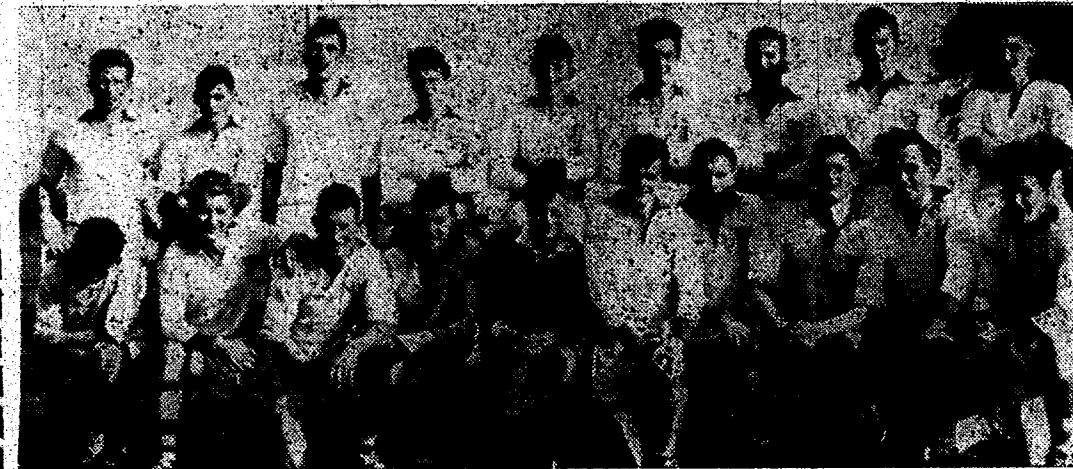

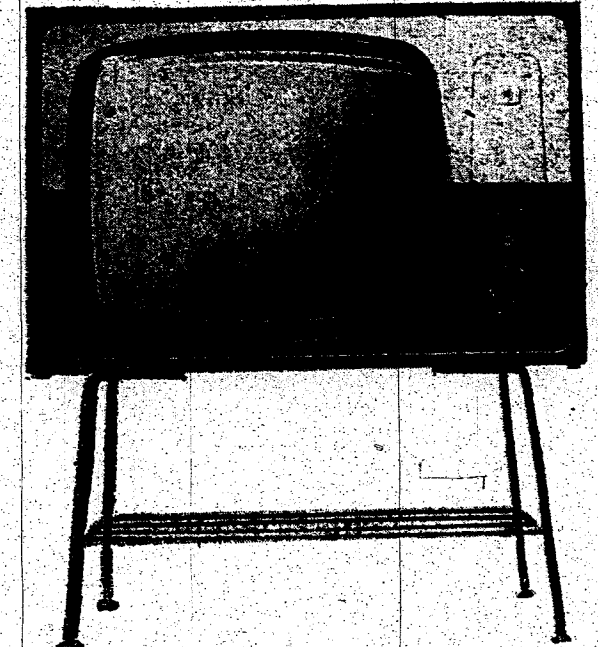

### BRICKEYS—IN A PHOTO FINISH?

While the national hurling league final at Croke Park is undoubtedly the main attraction on Sunday next, the Fraher field, Dungarvan, should be the meteca for a huge attendance when Brickey Rangers and John Mitchels meet in the senior football championship semi-final. It is a game that has caught the imagination of the county at large and it bids fair to provide us with a spectacle that will be as vibrating as it will be thrilling.

Last year it will be recalled that these clubs figured in one of the most spectacular marathons ever staged in the county. Four times in all they met in the second round of the championship when only fortuitous goals set the Brickeys on the road to victory. Those epics will not readily be forgotten, and should in fact be instrumental in luring an enormous hosting to the venue for this latest episode in a great footballing rivalry.

For Mitchels this will be their fifth attempt to master the Rangers. With any luck at all they could have done so in two of last year's drawn games but a wave of confidence is sweeping the club that Sunday will be the day.

That of course is the view of one of the contestants. But out Bushy Park way they are equally firm in their belief that the 1962 victory will be repeated—this time at the

above par. And what of the Rangers? In the previous round against Mount Sion they were sufficiently impressive to give supporters hope of greater things to come.

In all probability they will have Bill Spratt at centreback with Patsy Donnelly in the right corner. But while Kevin Walsh is an automatic goal-keeping choice, many believe the defence will be altered somewhat, with the possible inclusion of Fintan Gee.

Much will depend on his duel with Wall Connors (?) and if he can shake off the attentions of the resolute Mitchels defender, could well create the vital openings for Justin, Michael and Pat Spratt.

So obvious is the all-round equality between the sides that it shudders at the thought of forecasting the outcome. Rival followers could offer a variety of reasons as to why their favourites will win, reasons that are not easily overlooked.

But let me add a P.S. This semi-final could well need another hour to decide.

### YANKS WILL BE NO PUSHOVER

While the county at large accepts Waterford as national hurling league champions, they will not be officially crowned as such unless they defeat the New York selection at Croke Park on Sunday.

All-Ireland and Oireachtas defeats have left the county in a none too happy frame of mind and another reverse cannot be entertained if prestige is not to suffer greatly.

It is common knowledge that Waterford is being regarded as a spent force in certain quarters, and only a convincing victory on Sunday can scotch that opinion.

The announcement of the side to do duty has given rise to widespread comment. Eye brows were raised at the complete omission of Tom Chasty, a decision which has been clarified by the announcement of his suspension, followed by his announcement of inter-county retirement.

General satisfaction has been expressed at the selection of Johnny Quarry, the former Dungarvan star, as full forward on the New York side. Incidentally the team-trainer is Amby Galvin, a brother of Billy Galvin who was a member of the successful forty-eight team.

Elsewhere in this issue I will give a more detailed preview of a game that could determine the immediate future of Waterford hurling.

### TIPP, REGAIN OIREACHTAS CROWN

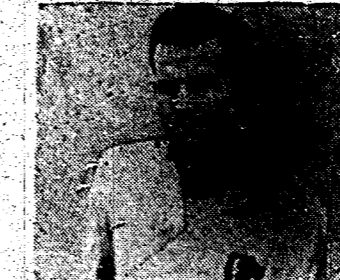
### HENNESSY AND RYALL
