'Drastic Action Must Be Taken'

WATER SCHEME WILL COST MORE

Originally estimated to cost £75,000, Dungarvan's new water supply improvement scheme will now be in excess of that expenditure.

Mr. P. J. Doyle, Town Clerk, told the members at Friday's meeting of the Urban Council that the estimated amount of the additional expenditure was £8,300, 80% of which is recoverable, and it was unanimously decided to provide the money.

Mr. Doyle said the increased expenditure was due to the main contract, wage increases, provision of stop-cocks and extension of Abbey-side scheme. There would also be increases for consultants fees.

Mr. P. Walsh, Urban Engineer, said wage increases had to be paid and they amounted to nearly £4,000. It was not originally intended to provide stop-cocks, but they had to be put in at a cost of about £5,000. Then a sump had to be laid and they were now pumping over one million gallons of water a day. The water brought grit and sand and had damaged the pumps and the only way to combat that was to take water from the boreholes into a sump. The sump would cost about £4,000 and the speed of the water rising in the bore holes to about half.

There was no scheme, he said, any place in the country delivering the amount of water they were delivering. If the water was not being supplied to industry there would be no need for a sump.

Mr. Doyle said that 60% of the excess expenditure would be a subsidy from the Government.

New £17,000 Promenade At Abbeyside ?

Dungarvan Urban Council has agreed in principle to the building of a new 550 yards promenade at Abbeyside at an estimated cost of £17,300.

In a report at last Friday's meeting of the Urban Council, the Engineer, Mr. P. Walsh, said the new promenade would be an amenity of very great importance to Dungarvan and Abbeyside. It would give access to a good safe strand and would bring large numbers in the summer season. He would recommend that they investigate from Bord Failte if a grant could be got for it.

The Town Clerk, Mr. P. Doyle, said they all knew the importance of tourism and it was expected that the income from tourism would be doubled in 1970. In 1962 the income was £62 million and they were being asked to contribute the maximum of 3d in the £ to the Tourist Council. He thought they should do something about their area which was quite attractive.

The new promenade would be 550 yards long, he said, while the engineer thought there would be a halting of the erosion if it was built.

Colr. R. Walsh said it would be very desirable if they could afford it.

Colr. N. Kelly said before discussing it further they should ask Bord Failte what grant would be available. The County Council have already

The Town Clerk, Mr. P. Doyle said they only received one tender which if accepted could be supplied within 24 weeks. The Council's original estimate for it was £14,000.

The Council is now awaiting sanction to raise a loan.

"PEOPLE GETTING RESTLESS"

The people were getting restless and the manner in which this was being imposed on them was unfair to the people, said Mr. C. Curran, at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Health Authority, when a total of £7,275 was approved of for certain hospitals.

The following were the amounts of money passed: £5,000 for General hospitals; £1,250 for Maternity hospitals; £400 to certain hospitals for the reception of the mentally handicapped children; £825 to hospitals for the reception of the blind.

Mr. Curran said they should not pass these automatically. The day had come when they must take a stand. The people were getting restless and a stop would have to come. The ordinary people could not pay the burden being put on them.

Mr. N. Walsh: This is mandatory. We have no say.

The Secretary (Mr. J. A. Hynes) said that 50% of the cost was recoverable from the Health Services grant.

Mr. Curran: I do not like the way this is being imposed on us. It is unfair to the people. The money was unanimously passed with Mr. Curran dissenting.

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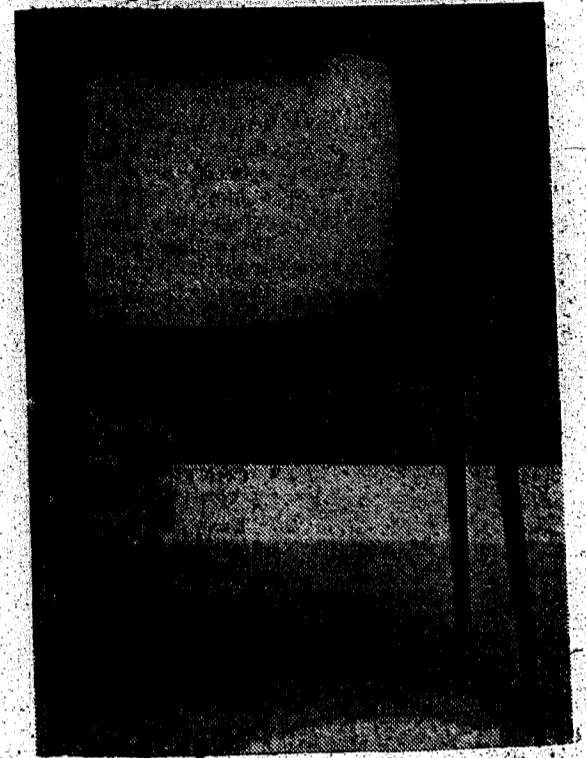

What the Limerick March was all About

What was the Limerick march all about? Despite the publicity given to it in the national papers there are many who are still not clear on its purpose.

We come to Limerick, said Mr. W. Balfin, not to quarrel with our fellow citizens but rather to make them aware of the serious problems that are facing agriculture.

Mr. Maher showed how the farmers' share of the national income has dropped from 25% to 20% over the last ten years and said that this is not a just reward for the 33% of the population engaged in agriculture.

Another speaker, Mr. T. Cahill, pointed out that 100,000 farmers in Ireland are trying to live on less than 4 per acre.

Mr. Cahill also pointed out that what we need most is a large-scale enterprise on our small farms.

It was obvious, he continued, that there is a grave shortage of land and for this reason a list of priorities should be established on land purchases.

controlled central marketing improvement of holdings be greatly accelerated.
That the Government should plan with organised farmers and must be answerable to their constituents.

What is not generally known is that as a result of the nation-wide appeal to all farmers to join the N.F.A. in this drive, there has been a resounding response in many areas.

One has pleasure in recording the approach to this problem being shown by the cream manufacturers, local advisers, co-operative and hide improvement societies.

While welcoming this announcement the N.F.A. calls for a comprehensive scheme for agricultural development including an increase in the price of milk (Irish prices to the farmer are the lowest in Europe) and Exchequer responsibility for milk levies.

There is tremendous support behind this move in Kilkenny and indications show that farmers are prepared to remain firm on the issue in spite of recent threats issued by the local County Council.

Practically 100% of the farmers in the county and in the neighbouring counties have pledged their full co-operation in any move that may be required. It seems that the figure recently published by the Kilkenny County Council regarding the number of people who had not paid in full the amount of rates now due, was very misleading. It by no means conveyed the true picture as it exists.

KILKENNY FARMERS WILL NOT COMPROMISE
Farmers throughout County Kilkenny are adamant that no increase in rates above the 1962 level will be paid until a substantial increase in farm income is granted particularly through an increase in milk prices and the complete derating of the first £20 P.L.V.

That insufficient land is available in Ireland to meet the requirements of Irish citizens.
That in light of the many sales of large tracts of Irish land to non-nationals in recent years, the land of Ireland is not being preserved for the people of Ireland.

That the present rate of transfer of farmers from un-economic holdings to viable farms cannot solve the problems in the foreseeable future.
That insufficient attention is being given to structural improvements in small farm areas.

That legislation be enacted immediately to preserve the land of Ireland for the people of Ireland.
That all purchases of land, whether freehold or leasehold be controlled and that the following set of priorities in order of presentation be adhered to:

(a) To make the existing un-economic holdings of Irish farmers into viable units.
(b) To provide viable holdings for Irish farmers willing to give up their existing holdings in congested areas.

(c) To provide viable holdings for suitable qualified Irishmen who are at present landless.
3. That a comprehensive programme for the improvement of farm structures, particularly in small farm areas, be drawn up and implemented.

4. That the overall amended Land Commission programme on transfer, con-

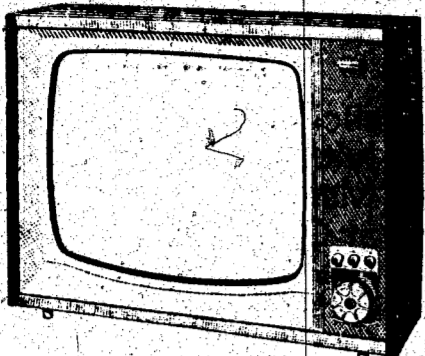

COUNCIL OFFERED FIVE-ACRE HOUSING SITE

The urgent need for land in the Dungarvan area was stressed at last Friday's meeting of the Urban Council when the Town Clerk Mr. P. Doyle stated they had received an offer of a five acre field in Abbeyside.

The Chairman Deputy T. A. Kyne said the first question they should ask was did they need land for building? If they did they would then have to find out how much was available.

Colr. T. Lee said another couple of hundred houses were needed in the town.

Another member said if the land was at the right price they should get it.

YOUGHAL LIFE-BOAT IN SEA DRAMA

Around 6 a.m. on Sunday morning last, Youghal Life Boat was alerted by Valentia that a trawler was ashore in Youghal Bay. Seemingly the bearings given were misunderstood as after a check up it was found that she was some place between Ardmore and Mine Head. The Life-Boat put to sea at 6.20 watched by a large crowd and reached Ardmore Bay in heavy seas backed by a S.E. gale. Here they found a French trawler driven well up in the bay and being pounded by heavy seas. Prior to their arrival, seven members of the crew had been hauled ashore in a rubber raft by members from Ardmore and the Captain and mate remained on board. The trawler, grounded in heavy fog at 3 o'clock, sent out distress signals giving the position as Youghal Bay, and it was later learned that the navigation aid on board had broken down and the Capt. believed at the time that he was in Youghal Bay.

In an interview with the Coxswain Dick Hurley of Youghal, he stated that: "When we arrived at the scene at 7 o'clock conditions were very bad. We came as close to the trawler as possible and hailed the skipper if he intended to come off, but he was not prepared to do so. At 10 o'clock we were joined by the Helwick Life-Boat and we succeeded in getting three of the crew out of the trawler. We had ahead and as we were being anchored out and engine full slowly dragged shorewards we were obliged to cut the ropes.

"Finally, at about 11 o'clock we made a final effort to persuade the Captain to leave the ship, which he did with great reluctance. We then brought both men to Youghal, arriving there at 12.30, after being six hours at sea."

A local Master Mariner Patrick J. Walsh, on leave in Youghal with his family arrived on the Strand at Ardmore, and he, having a knowledge of French, was anxious to help in the rescue operations. Capt. Walsh, with a local fisherman Michael Fitzgerald, boarded the ship by means of the raft and joined the Skipper and mate. Captain Walsh said that when he boarded the craft she was then sound, making no water but was being washed by heavy seas and being driven closer to the shore. She was then holed by a rock and her engine room and fish hold became flooded in a short time.

The weather was rapidly worsening and after we cut loose the ropes to the Life-Boats the dinghy was swept away.

After much persuasion they got the skipper into the Youghal Life Boat and Mate into the Youghal Life Boat and followed themselves. Capt. Walsh paid glowing tributes to the work of the Youghal Life Boat and crew, and the manoeuvring in heavy seas alongside the stricken craft was the finest he had ever witnessed in his 30 years at sea.

The Life Boat suffered minor damage, the mizen mast being broken, as well as some of the rails and the rudder sprung. The Captain Philippe Malette and the Mate Fortine Detec later returned to Ardmore where they will remain to supervise efforts of a Dutch salvage tug that is standing by but its operations have been hampered by thick fog and the fact that the trawler is being driven further into the shoal water to the beach.

The craft is one of a fleet of French trawlers "Fei des Ondes" and the owners are expected in Ardmore this week-end. All during the week crowds of sightseers visited Ardmore to see the stricken boats she lay in the surf, pounded by heavy seas.

The remainder of the crew left on the Innistallen on Monday evening on the first stage of their journey home. They travelled to Southampton and then to the home port of La Harve.

The Gardai have been maintaining a night and day watch on the 300-ton trawler. It is thought that unless she is taken off over the weekend, when tides will be the highest for the year, she may become a total wreck.

1963 SALMON SEASON
The 1963 salmon season which closed for rods on September 30th and nets and weirs on July 31st, must now be recorded as the most successful and lucrative in living memory. The total recorded catch amounted to 19,219 salmon of 207,122 lbs., and 21,534 grilse (sea) of 127,855 lbs. Of this amount, 15,870 salmon (181,708 lbs.) and 19,457 grilse (115,962 lbs.) were taken by nets; 1,280 salmon (14,169 lbs.) and 1,751 grilse (9,750 lbs.) were taken by the weirs, while the balance of 2,061 salmon (21,355 lbs.) and 326 grilse (1,943 lbs.) were taken by rods. The total catch in terms of tons was 149 tons 9 cwt., 3 yrs., 25 lbs., which exceeds that taken for the 1962 season by over 18 tons and therefore must constitute an all time record. In addition, 1,105 sea trout were taken by nets and 56 sea trout in the weirs. One trout weighing 13 lbs. was taken in a drift net in Knockadon. The average weight for salmon was 10.78 lbs., and grilse 5.83 lbs. As compared with the previous season there was an increase of 9,341 salmon and a decrease of 5,670 grilse or an all round increase of 3,671 fish.

Council Discusses Camping Problems

Dungarvan Urban Council has decided to postpone restriction of camping sites around the town until a report from the Government's Commission on Itinerants has been published. At a recent meeting of the Council one member stated that itinerants camping in a certain area were a general nuisance and asked if anything could be done to have them removed.

The town clerk, Mr. P. Doyle said at Friday's meeting that the gardai had limited powers in dealing with them. Fires could not be lighted sixty feet from the public road. They could however deal with them in the matter of parking.

The Council, he said, had power to prohibit the erection of temporary dwellings and their retention in any particular part of their area. They must have some area where they could go. But before making a prohibition order they would have to prove that the amenities of the town were in danger or that public health was in danger. He felt they should have discussions with the Co. M.O.H., the Co. Engineer and the Supt. of the gardai. The Government would be discussing the Commission's report next month and it might be advisable to await the outcome of that. In the meantime, he said, the supt. would endeavour to keep the itinerants on the move.

Deputy Kyne said they should not be allowed to camp at the Spring. It was disgraceful and they should be moved further out.

The discussion then ended.

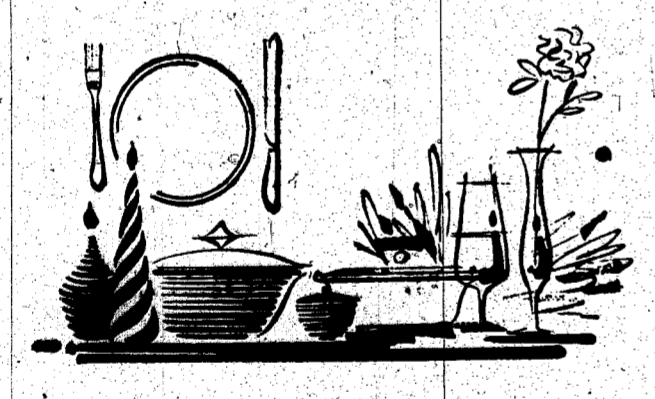

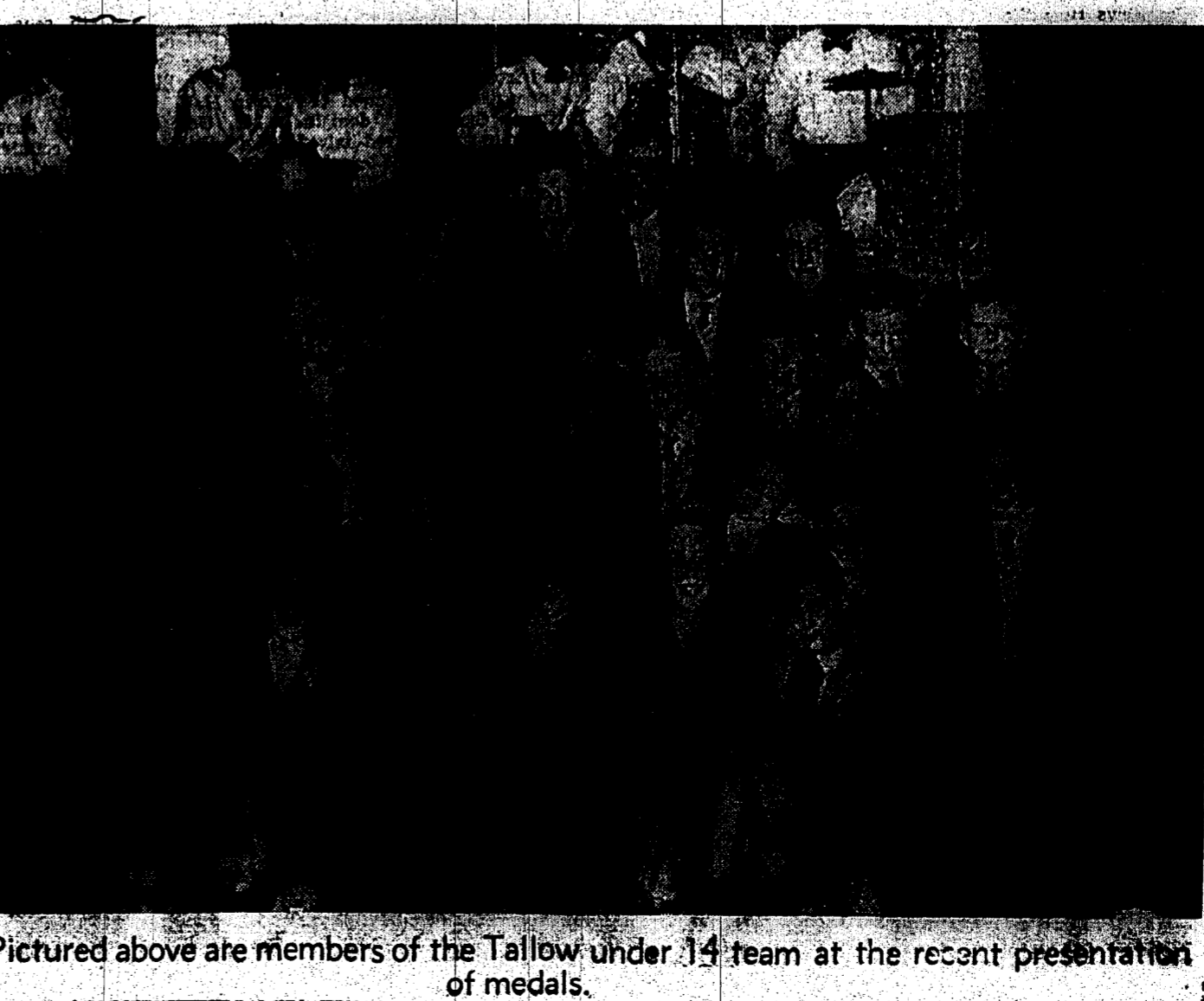

But eve the handful of Waterford supporters in the stands and terraces, will readily admit that their charges were more than a trifle fortunate to earn "a second bite at the cherry." The Yanks were the fitter, faster and more purposeful side and for them it must have been galling to be so belatedly thwarted of a title they looked certain to win for the greater portion of the hour.

Had the New York attack been even reasonably successful with their scoring attempts the Deise men might well have found themselves beyond redemption long before the end. The Yanks had by far the better of matters territorially in the opening half and it was more through their own inaccuracies in attack rather than any outstanding Deise defensive feats that kept the issue in the melting pot for the entire hour.

LEFT A LOT TO BE DESIRED

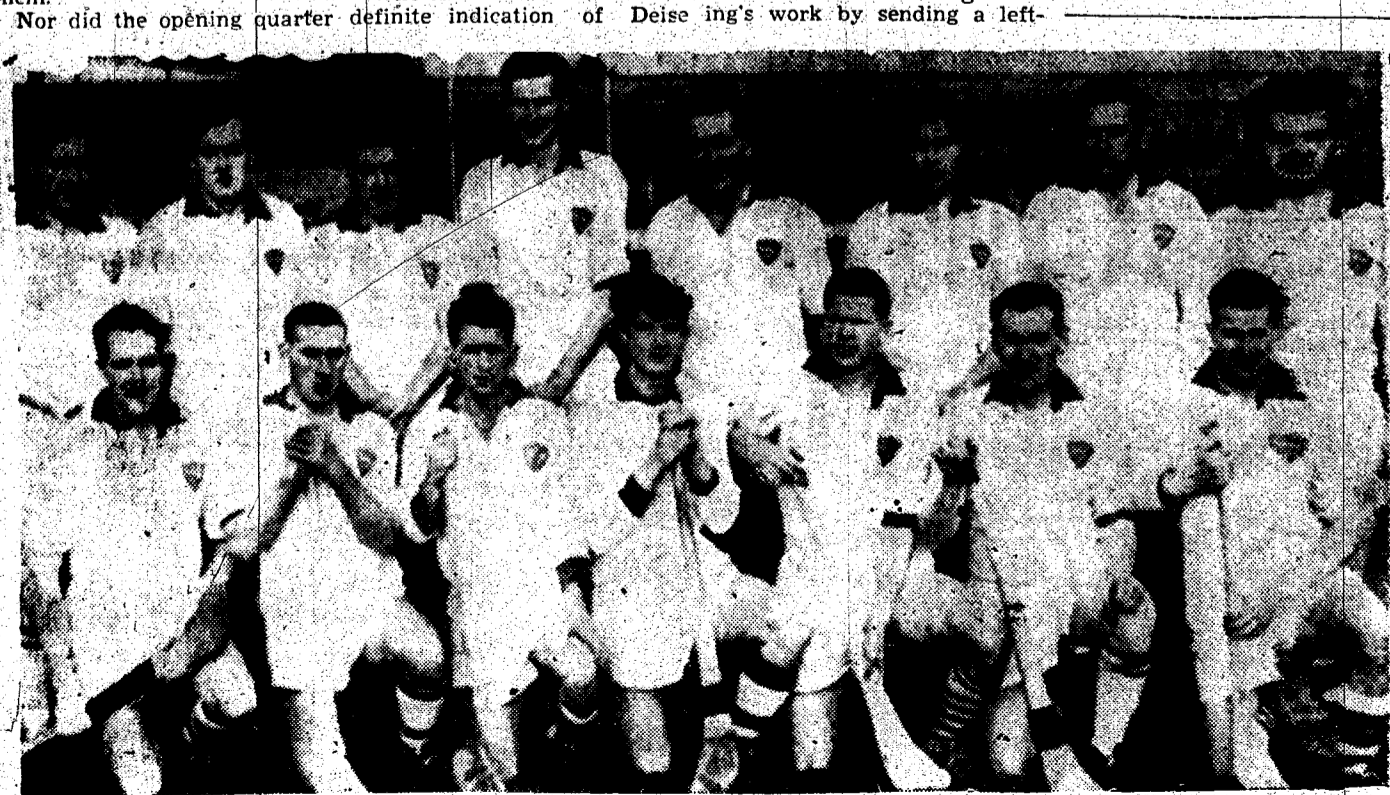
Even allowing for the strength of the visitors, Waterford's display left a lot to be desired. For my part at least I detected a lethargic attitude about their play, for which they came within an ace of paying the supreme penalty. For more than half the game they gave the impression of being confidently cocky of dismissing the New York challenge and then when they put on the pressure late in the day found that the Yanks were more than a match for their most intensified efforts.

As they piled on the pressure in these closing stages, the game which up to them had provided indifferent fare, sprang to vibrant life. The exchanges which often carried with them a noticeable needle became razor keen and were marred by a regrettable incident in the New York goal-mouth five minutes from time. Except for the opening few minutes the first half belonged almost entirely to the Yanks. They secured a stranglehold at midfield that John Meaney and John Kirwan never seemed capable of breaking, while the Deise defence never inspired confidence in the face New York attacks.

Not surprisingly, men-shuffled the side that made it exceedingly difficult to trace the whereabouts of several of the players. Five minutes before the break they trailed by 1-4 to 0-1 but goals by Kirwan and Grimes to which New York replied with a major by Brendan Kelleher left only three points between them at the short whistle.

SWITCHES

Countless were the switches resorted to during that half to stem to some extent New York's supremacy. Guinan and Flannelly took over at midfield; Grimes was brought to the forty to mark a rampant Mike Sweeney while Joe Condon took over from the injured Charlie Ware at top of the right. These changes, let me add, were made out of extreme necessity, as the threat of a heavy defeat loomed over them.

Then and only then did we see the real Waterford. With the dream of a first-ever league title drifting further away from reality they threw caution to the wind and with the evergreen Grimes foremost in their game-saving efforts, there was drama and tension poured into those closing stages. Soon the Americans had their lead cut to an insecure two points and in a nerve-racking finish Flannelly and Grimes grabbed the points that made a replay necessary in Kilkenny on next Sunday.

CALL FOR EXTRA TIME

Immediately after the game pandemonium reigned as the Waterford men remained on the pitch anxious to play extra time. But the Yanks having usurped their quota of subs and carrying two other casualties, would not hear of such a suggestion and at length it was decided to renew acquaintances again at Newlan Park.

But if Waterford's grandstand finish revived memories of recent glory hours, their display taken on the whole gives little cause for adulation. The newcomers, as yet, are not making the impact expected of them while the veterans with the exception of Grimes and Flannelly were not up to standard on Sunday. There could no doubt be justifiable grounds for grouse at the manner in which the New York referee, Paddy Fleming, handled the game. He seemed reluctant to blow for any frees however blatant, and the latitude he allowed some of the New York defenders was highly questionable.

THE SCORING

The game was only two minutes old when Grimes gave Waterford the lead with a point. Seven minutes later Pat Kirby who was to prove such a thorn to the Deise defence, flashed over the equaliser. In the 15th minute the flying Kirby was again the architect of a New York score when he finished a centre by Stephen Ryall to the net. Ryall, himself, had a point in the 17th minute followed by further classical minors by Brendan Kelleher and Jerry Keating. Wholesale switches were a definite indication of Deise

disatisfaction and in the 28th minute John Kirwan operating in attack, gave Donal O'Brien no change with a sizzling drive. But almost instantaneously, the Americans hit back for a goal by Kelleher which Ned Power brilliantly saved but could not prevent from trickling over the goal-line. Seconds later it was Waterford's turn and Grimes was on hand to goal after O'Brien had only partially cleared a pile-driver from John Meaney.

Twice before the interval the Deise defence had fortuitously escapes and New York's superiority was in no way reflected in their three-point interval lead.

Within seconds of the start, Kirby brought out the best in Ned Power and it took a wondrous save to prevent his side from falling further in arrears. Then in the sixth minute, Grimes, now on the 'forty' slipped through for a point and within another minute only the brilliance of goalkeeper O'Brien denied him a goal.

But not to be outdone three Americans again besieged the Deise goal, and Kirby rounded Cunningham with apparently nonchalant ease and hand-tapped the ball to the net. Seamus Power had a well-taken over-head point in the 9th minute and a like score by Meaney left only a goal between the sides again. The visitors replied with the most spectacular point of the game when Brendan Hennessy having lost his hurley, kicked the ball over the bar from almost fifty yards out. Ryall duly obliged from a free and even Deise supporters must have given little for their sides chances.

FIGHT BACK

Then came their fight back, instigated by Grimes when he goalied from a melee, Piling on the pressure they pinned the Yanks to their own domain, and again the red-haired O'Brien saved at the expense of a fruitless '70. Only two minutes remained when Flannelly cut a sideline ball from fully fifty yards over for a point and seconds before the end the indomitable Grimes finalised an outstanding evening's work by sending a left-

handed drive over for the equaliser.

GRIMES THE HERO

Many, many times in the past, Phil Grimes has rescued Waterford from defeat, but seldom has he been seen to such advantage as in this league final. He was a constant torment to the New York defence and was the one man that looked capable of snatching the game from its roaring hot fire.

Between the posts Ned Power was back to his best form and can be exempted from blame

for the three goals that beat him. For Tom Cunningham, however, it was a game best forgotten, as he could never fathom the elusive Pat Kirby, but Austin Flynn and John Barron repeatedly cleared their lines.

In a none too dependable half line Jimmy Byrne emerged with greatest honour while Jim Irish was seldom the master of Stephen Ryall.

MIDFIELD PROBLEMS

Midfield presented its problems from the opening whistle. Neither Meaney nor Kirwan could claim equality with their opposite numbers and despite numerous changes this area of operation never yielded fruitful results.

With the exception of a tireless Mick Flannelly, Grimes got little assistance in attack. Flannelly roamed the field in search of work and his beautifully-taken point in the closing stages was an invaluable help. Joe Condon, when he came on as a sub greatly impressed particularly when switched to defence and is favoured for retention for Sunday's replay.

NEW YORK'S BEST

New York's defence never yielded an inch. Goalkeeper Donal O'Brien gave a faultless

exhibition of net-minding and got good cover from Pat Dowling and Con O'Connell. Centre back Mike Sweeney was beyond doubt the individual star of the side and he was excellently flanked by John Murphy and Paddy Hennessy, both of whom were however, forced to retire with injuries. Their midfielders Brendan Hennessy and Jerry Keating ruled the roost for the entire hour and Pat Kirby, Stephen Ryall and Brendan Kelleher were best in an attack that frittered away golden chances. Dungarvan's Johnny Quarry tried very hard while on but could never outwit a vigilant Austin Flynn.
