RE-ACTOR PRICES CRITICISED

While discussing the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Scheme at last Saturday's meeting of Waterford Committee of Agriculture, some members criticised strongly the prices being paid by the Department for reactor cattle.

Mr. Norman Walsh said they should ask the Department to speed up the payment for reactors.

Mr. M. Galgey said the Dept. had cut down by about £10 the price being paid for reactors. The position was most unsatisfactory.

Mr. Richard Walsh said he did not think that was right. They (Dept.) were of course only giving the market value for reactors and not the replacement value.

Mr. Galgey then proposed that the Dept. give an increase in the market value for reactors. Mr. W. Foran seconded. The proposal was carried unanimously.

Mr. Foran said the prices would have to be increased if they were not going to have chaos in the final stages of the eradication scheme. Otherwise the scheme would not be brought to a successful conclusion.

Mr. R. Walsh: The Dept. are not saying they are paying less than before. Who then is right?

Mr. M. Galgey: When did any Dept. in this country ever say they were wrong. They thought they were infallible. The discussion then ended.

Letter to the Editor

I Challenge Mr. Curran
Dear Sir,

I feel I must take Mr. Charles Curran, Chairman, Waterford County Council, to task for certain statements he is reported to have made at the last meeting of the County Vocational Education Committee. I have chosen to challenge him on six points.

Firstly, he is reported to have said "that he is against the way Irish is being presented." Alas, he didn't go any further. He did not tell us what was wrong with the presentation and he didn't make any suggestion for the improvement of the situation. That's constructive criticism for you!

The second point in my challenge concerns his reported statement of being "all in favour of Irish." I doubt this. If he were in favour of, or sincere about Irish, he would prove it by actions. "Talk is cheap," Mr. Curran, "but tobacco costs money" — as the Irish proverb says. Sincerity should be proved by actions. Why doesn't Mr. Curran attend Irish classes and learn Irish? As a member of the Vocational Education Committee he would be giving an example that would be followed by others. Why did he not turn up at a public meeting to consider ways and means of furthering the use of Irish, held a few years ago, at his own suggestion.

I will deal with the third point very briefly. As reported in last week's issue of this paper, Mr. Curran said "that it was a tragedy the way the thing" (meaning the Irish language, I suppose) "was being commercialised." Now I challenge Mr. Curran to prove his statement. If he can prove any case of commercialising of Irish in the County of Water-

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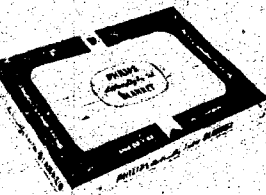

Committee Seeks Extension of B.T.E. Scheme

A proposal by Mr. John Drohan that they recommend to the Department of Agriculture an extension from December 31st to April 30th of the destroying of reactor cattle due to calf...

At the outset, when discussing the B.T.E. scheme, the C.A.O., Mr. P. Conroy said the scheme was making good progress and all the reactors should be clear by the end of the year.

Mr. Milo Galgey said there were some cows classed as doubtful after two tests. What happened, he asked, if she was doubtful for the third time.

Mr. George Heskin said after two doubtfuls the cow went down.

Mr. Galgey said he had a cow that was not put down after two tests that proved doubtful.

Mr. Heskin said if that was the case then they had been misled. If a cow was doubtful after two tests she should be regarded as a reactor. That was the law. There must be some mistake, he added.

Mr. Galgey said he would like to have his case investigated. He was quoting the Vet. in this case.

Mr. Drohan said they should extend the date for slaughtering of reactors from December 31st to 30th April.

Mr. K. O'Ryan said it would be better for the Department to pay better prices for reactors.

Mr. Michael Hartly (Chairman) said he agreed with Mr. Drohan's views. As slaughtering cows on December 31st meant the loss of thousands of calves.

Mr. Norman Walsh said the very same thing could happen in March. Where then would they draw the line?

Mr. Hartly said the calves would be born by March and that would mean extra prosperity for the country.

Mr. Galgey said they would have the same trouble whenever they set the deadline.

Mr. R. Walsh said a February date would not settle the problem at all. If it was delayed to April all the cows would have calved.

Mr. Norman Walsh: You are only delaying the scheme.

Mr. Galgey: We should stick to our own deadline of December 31.

Mr. Drohan said it was very hard for a farmer with 9 or 10 cows due to calf and have them destroyed in December.

The Chairman said the Department had been given 100% co-operation by the farmers of the county. No county in Ireland had given such co-operation at Waterford.

Mr. Drohan: I recommend an extension to February.

Mr. W. Foran said the Department had fallen down on the price they were paying for reactors. It was a pity they were not a little more constructive in dealing with the remaining reactors in the county.

Mr. Drohan then proposed an extension to April and Mr. G. Heskin seconded.

Mr. J. Quirk proposed that the deadline remain at December 31.

Mr. Quirk's was defeated by eight votes to five, while Mr. Drohan's was then taken and carried by a similar vote.

This recommendation will now go to the Department of Agriculture for consideration.

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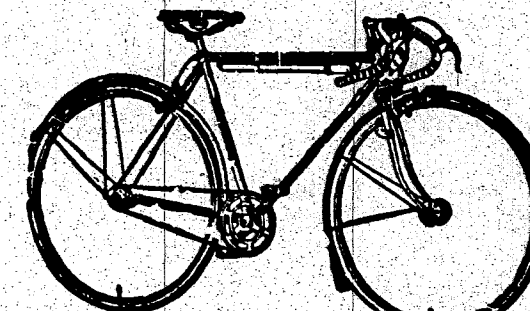

Too often they were flurried into half-clearances or muffed shots at goal. Meanwhile every man the home fifteen was giving the game all he had. The defence was rock-solid with the coolly brilliant Michael Tobin in goal, oozing confidence. Tommy Condon was the linchpin in this sector and what a wonderful display he was. He commenced a huge area of play—how the Tipperary minor selectors can afford to do without this lad's services is nothing short of baffling. It was no wonder that Condon's legs became "rubbery" towards the end, for he played himself into the ground, and into the hearts of the spectators. Anthony Duggan was an extremely sound full-back who revealed in the heavy going and he had great support from Jimmy O'Dea and Liam Waters. Eamonn Keyes had another brilliant game, but what a "find" Noel Power was. The Ballylemon lad stormed through this game and emerged as one of the heroes. Skipper Sean Coleman and Sean McGrath turned in a tremendous midfield display—one remembers Coleman's valuable scores and lengthy clearances, while McGrath displayed inspiring courage in the face of two nasty injuries. Indeed it was when the Caseville lad was forced to retire that the Waterford city boys really became a menace.

Up front the forwards worked with a will. John Mahoney was a shrewd pivot and initiated a many attacks. Connie Kelleher had his best ever game and his whipping of around bore had the opposition sorely troubled. Michael Dolan never found anything easy in the Waterford full-back, but he stuck gamely to his task and shouldered much of the front-line brunt. Paddy O'Brien and Mick Brett were always threatening danger and if O'Brien hadn't much skill, he more than paid his way with four points to emerge top scorer. That leaves Tony Nagle and this lad who has turned in so many sterling displays for his school was always in the thick of things on Saturday.

WEST WATERFORD NOTES

In this column last week, following receipt of a number of complaints, we referred to the fact that coincident with the imposition of the Turnover Tax, the prices of some commodities were increased by more than the amount of the Tax. This, of course, was a statement of fact. In fairness to shopkeepers, however, it should be made clear that the steep increases referred to were generally applied at manufacturers' level and that retailers are not to blame. May we point out that our reference was to prices in general and not to those at any particular centre.

VIEWS AND PRICES

Price increases have been the big topic recently and we got a few viewpoints on the situation:—

A shopkeeper had this to say: "Some prices have been increased over and above the amount of the Turnover Tax. We are not responsible for this and in fact it is a source of embarrassment. Our profit margins remain unchanged."

A rural housewife commented: "I am not concerned with the reasons for the increases. All I am concerned with is that in the case of several commodities prices have increased from 5 to 12 per cent."

A farmer: "It appears that manufacturers and distributors are to blame in most cases for the big increases. The Government should introduce a system of price control."

A worker's wife: "Prices have certainly gone up by more than 25%. This means a reduction in the standard of living for those existing on a small salary."

Old Age Pensioner: "We are promised a half crown extra next January. In the meantime we are expected to tighten our belts."

BRICKEYS POISED FOR 'KILL'

Rangers Can Make History

BELIEVERS in superstitions cannot but oppose Brickey Rangers in their bid on Sunday next to carry off the County's Blue Riband of football, when they meet defending champions, Kill, in the long awaited decider at Dungarvan's history steeped Fraher Field. The Rangers, rightly regarded by many as the luckless ones, that fate has decreed will never be acclaimed senior title-holders will attempt to blow sky-high that footballing "myth" that to date has stood its feet just as Kill... another of the supposedly doomed contenders, did twelve months ago.

It is a game that understandably has evoked tremendous County-wide interest and near hysterical excitement in the rival camps. The very novelty of the pairing adds an appealing spice of piquancy to it all, and if pre-match expectations are of any significance it should provide what may well be a record attendance with an encounter worthy of the great occasion.

It borders on the unbelievable that a club with so proud a tradition as the Brickeys are still without a place in the victors roll of honour. They have contributed more to the game than most in the Deise county, but exasperatingly they have failed to crown their efforts with success. On several occasions they appeared all set to create history, only to have their hopes dashed, often in the most frustrating manner imaginable.

What then, does Sunday hold for them as they endeavour to lay forever the bogey that has so long haunted them? Can the efforts of such past stalwarts as James Conway (after whom the present trophy has been donated), Eddie and Paddy Spratt, Stephen Hickey, Ned and Jimmy Power, Bill Fennell, Mick Donnelly, John Hansberry, and Dodo McCarthy to mention but a few, be fittingly crowned now by the present black and amber standard bearers. By any standards it is a mammoth task, but one let me add that all Brickeyites firmly believe will be accomplished.

It is doubtful if ever in their long history a fitter side will represent the club as on Sunday next. Since beating Mitchells in the penultimate stage they have prepared with a diligence that is the basic root of success. Nightly with the aid of car and tractor lights and any other available "brighteners" they have been "hard at it" and it will not be lack of fitness if they are to fail again.

PAT SPRATT AN ABSENTEE
Ironically however, they will be without versatile Pat Spratt who has played a major part in their march to the final. Pat received severe injuries to his leg in the game against Mitchells and despite every effort to beat "the dead-line" he will be forced to sit it out against the holders. His absence, undoubtedly weakens the side, but fortunately they are abundantly equipped with adequate reserve material and his replacement—which at the time of writing has not been announced, should fill the bill to general satisfaction.

That then is the pictorial of the challengers, together with their intentions and beliefs. But what of Kill the reigning champions, and amongst the victors holders of the Conway Cup.
On their way to this decider the champions have held of them that a certain "bendoo" would forever stand between them and highest honours. But few can ever forget the manner in which they smashed that make-believe "Indian Sign" when crushing Geraldines in a boringly one-sided final last November.

REMAINED UNBEATEN
At that time, I wrote of them: "They are one of the finest footballing teams that the county has ever produced... a viewpoint let me add that has not changed one iota in the lengthy interim. Since then they have remained unbeaten and besides qualifying for a defence of their title, have also had the name of Kill inscribed on the Phelan Cup. Such credentials cannot be overlooked and because of that they are the general fancy on Sunday. Nor are they likely to be lulled into any false state of security, and they too will come prepared.

In fact I can state with certainty that the Brickeys from the very start have been regarded as the real danger to their title. The holders can be sure well remember the

disadvantages of a poor start, and were a full command at the end of the hour. Again in the semi-final against Mitchells they laboured in the early period, and at the half-way stage trailed by five points. But their relentless

TEAMS NOT YET ANNOUNCED
Neither camp has (as I write) decided on a definite line-out, but from knowledge

may rely on the men that mastered the Mitchells. Who the selectors will name instead of Spratt is anyone's guess, as Frankie Conroy, Patsy Murray, Tom Foley and Pat's younger brother Jim must all be considered for the vacancy. Their defence which to date has proved its mettle will face its greatest test on Sunday and all six will have to be at their best.

Kevin Walsh has, since taking over in goal proved a real role-booster for the men in front of him, namely Patsy Donnelly, Nicholas McGrath, and Peter Ferncombe.

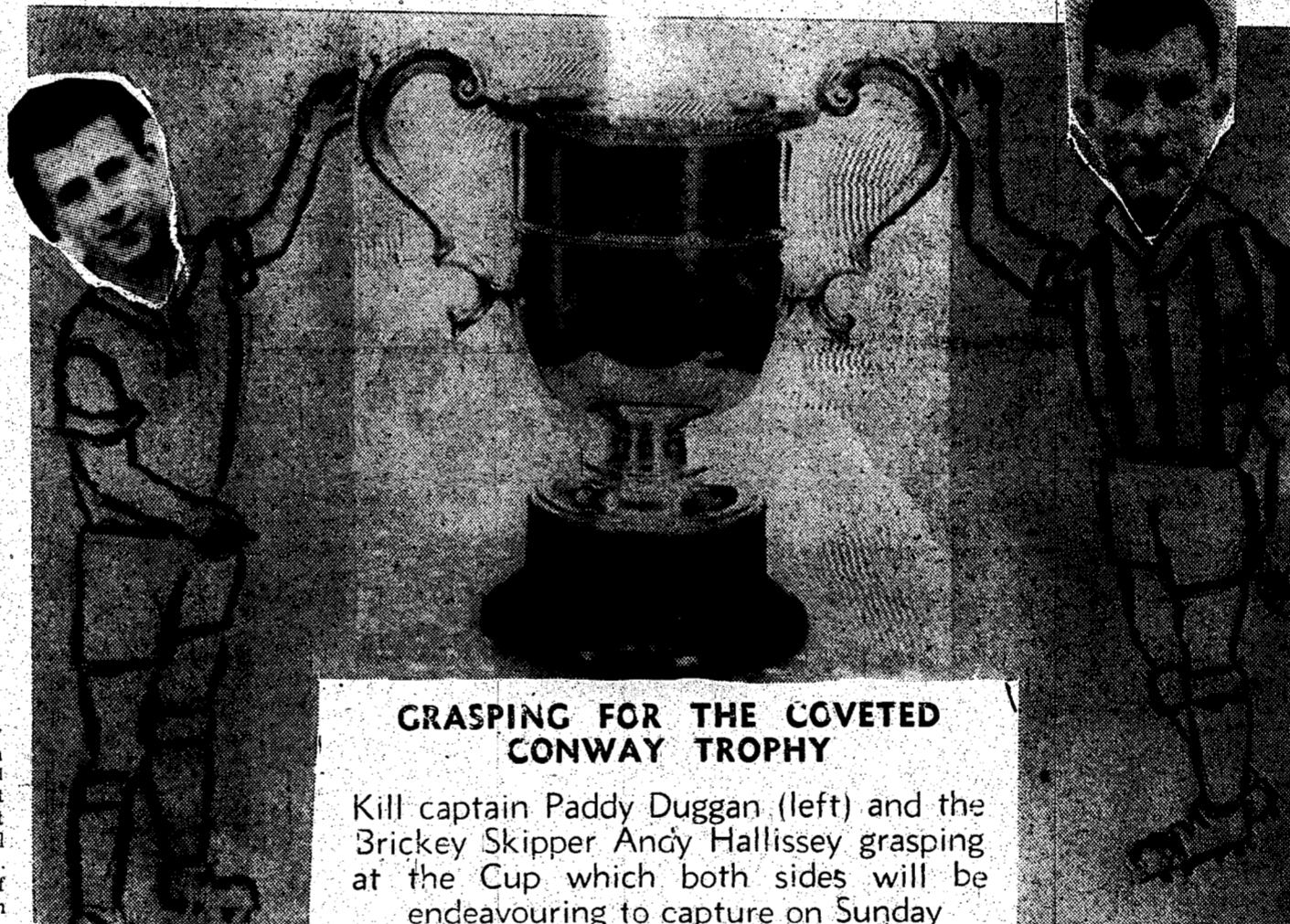
There has been no greater Brickey servant over the years than the veteran Donnelly and it would surely be a case of well deserved were he to win that coveted medal on Sunday. Now in the twilight of a great career he has adorned the scene for more years than one can expect a superlative display from him in what may well be his last championship final.

To Bill Spratt, falls the onerous duty of curbing Monty Guiry, and he can expect little assistance from "Wick" and John Walsh, who will both have their hands full coping with Duggan and Tibbs. John Sheehan and Andy Phillips, the skipper of the side, can hardly hope to master the towering Kill pairing, but should they claim even equality in the area they will have gone a long way towards taking the title.

Like Kill the challengers greatest attacking power is in their half forward trio of John Woods, Mick Farrell and Michael Spratt. Farrell's suspension expires on Saturday night and he will undoubtedly be the key figure in their attack.

Paddy Curran seems the likely choice to stand on the fringe of the square, and while Justin Spratt is assured of one of the corner berths, the remaining position will cause the only real headache.
And now to the delicate task of attempting to name the victors. Kill's consistency over the months plus their potency in so many vital sectors, entitles them to enjoy the role of favourites.

THE BRICKEYS THIS TIME?
But on this occasion I feel the form book will take a tumble, and I expect the Brickeys to make history in what should be a thriller. They can I believe, upset the champions rhythm sufficiently to carve out a victory that would surely be heralded the county over.
