WORLD MOURNS PRESIDENT'S ASSASSINATION

COUNCILLOR'S PRAISE FOR HOSPITAL STAFF

Colr. Rd. Walsh who was recently a patient in Dungarvan District Hospital was lead in his praises of the entire staff at Friday's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council.

Colr. Walsh thanked first the members for their good wishes after he was involved in an accident.

He wished, he said, to offer his sincere appreciation of the entire staff of the District Hospital. He personally got his name and consideration while all the other patients received the same first-class treatment.

The Chairman, Deputy Kyrle, said all the hospitals in the County were second to none.

Waterford's Tributes To Great Statesman

THE numbing tragedy of the senseless assassination of President John F. Kennedy, in Dallas, Texas, on Friday last has, outside of his own native America, caused deepest regret in this land of his

ancestors. While Statesmen the world over paid tributes to a man that was surely to become the greatest leader in the history of the United States the entire Irish nation offered prayer as their tribute to this Nation we so proudly claimed as one of our own.

Over the week-end many Public Bodies in County Waterford paid their respects to the late President. On Sunday both senior and junior football finals were cancelled while on Tuesday many local businesses, including the Co-Operative Creameries Ltd. closed for the day. There was a 7.30 p.m. Mass in both the Friary and Parish Churches also on Tuesday for the dead President, at which there were overflowing attendances.

At a Pontifical Requiem High Mass at the Cathedral, Waterford, on Tuesday evening, His Lordship, the Bishop presided. Colr. M. Morrissey, Tramore, represented Mr. Charles Curran, Chairman, Waterford County Council, and Mr. J. G. Dowling, County Secretary, represented the Co. Manager.

At the conclusion of Friday's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council the Chairman, Deputy T. A. Kyrle, said it was only appropriate that they express their sympathy at the assassination of President Kennedy. It is tragic, he said, that this man should be murdered for his ideals in the liberation of the Negroes of the U.S. They were all very proud of him and regretted very much this terrible tragedy.

Colr. Nicholas Kelly said every Irishman who knew him was so proud of a man of such great ability and a man of such great courage. He was a great loss to the whole free-thinking world.

He was a man of great courage and will be remembered for his fight in the Civil Rights issue in the U.S. We remember him for his stand on the Cuban issue when he forced Godless Communism to bend the knee.

We should extend sympathy to his widow and family, brothers and sisters. At this time tributes are being paid to

great Statesman, and while tributes are being paid in our own way, we should remember him where remembrance is best, at the altar of God.

Mr. Charles Curran seconded the vote of sympathy.

Ald. T. Gallagher, assenting himself with the expression of sympathy said everyone in Ireland had felt a personal loss by President Kennedy's death. When he was very recently he got a grip of the Irish people and all they could do now was pray for him.

Mr. J. Power said he was the greatest Statesman of all time.

Mr. P. Browne said the late President had proved himself a great man and they appreciated his life as much as the Americans. He was a staunch supporter of this country.

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Our picture of the late President Kennedy was taken on his June visit to Ireland. 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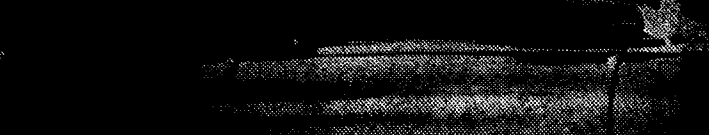

Letter to the Editor

A-Chara,

When, at the Estimates Meeting of County Waterford Vocational Education, I was informed that the Committee of Irish teachers had considerable difficulty in securing pupils for their classes, I made the following comment:

"In the circumstances it is a bit of a joke to continue to employ three full time Irish teachers. Despite the fact that large sums of public money (£200,000,000 since 1921) have been spent on the Irish revival, the Language has made no worthwhile progress and there is a considerable degree of public apathy. Less Irish is spoken today than 30 years ago and in some areas it has ceased to exist. It is a tragedy that it is to a large extent, being commercialised. As a lifelong supporter of the Irish revival I am satisfied that if the Language is to survive there will have to be a new approach to the whole problem. The fact that Irish is being used extensively in the F.C.A. and other organisations seems to indicate that the Language can be revived."

I consider this a reasonable proposition in view of the impetuous and rather hysterical outburst of Mr. T. O'Ceilleachair, Co. Wick, in his letter to the Executive Officer of the V.E.C. in which he expressed his personal abuse, misrepresentation and cheap attacks and displays an elementary lack of respect for the normally associate of a devoted exponent of the Language. If he feels compelled to abuse somebody I suggest he should direct his attacks towards those who are really hostile to the revival of the native Language and the maintenance of our Irish way of life.

It is regrettable that T. O'Ceilleachair recently any charge of commercialisation of the Language and I would remind him in that regard.

It is, I am sure, not meant to be a typical example in Co. Waterford. The circumstances

under which the thriving Irish College at Ardmore was "acquired" and destroyed reflects little credit on those responsible. It was a mortal blow to the Irish Language by people who claimed to be leaders of the Revival Movement. If Mr. O'Ceilleachair wants full details of this sordid affair I shall be glad to oblige. It will be an eye-opener for him and his friends who may not already know of it and for the general public.

As to his "six point challenge," I have, as a public representative, far too many important problems to attend to at present to give time to dealing with such puerile rubbish.

Mr. O'Ceilleachair would be well advised in his own interests, not to allow himself to be used as a mouthpiece for malcontents and disgruntled cranks (such as the type of crank who approves of the destruction of safety signs).

The people of Co. Waterford are a patient people, but they are not as gullible as he seems to believe.

In rather haughty terms Mr. O'Ceilleachair refers to the "plight" of Vocational Education in the county. Vocational Education is entirely a matter for the Committee appointed to administer it but if he has any revolutionary views on the subject, he should submit them through the Executive Officer of the V.E.C. in which he is a member of the V.E.C. In any event, Vocational Education in Co. Waterford was efficiently administered long before the arrival on the scene of Mr. O'Ceilleachair.

In conclusion may I remind Mr. O'Ceilleachair that it is not the duty of all public representatives to criticise and obstructively examine all items of public expenditure so as to ensure that all schemes are administered efficiently and economically and that his somewhat inane vapourings will not direct me from serving the people of my native county in that regard.

£5000 LOAN FOR REPAIRS

On the proposal of Colr. N. Kelly, seconded by Colr. T. A. Kyrle, it was decided at Friday's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council to raise a £5000 loan to carry out essential repairs on Council houses.

The Town Engineer (Mr. P. Walsh, B.E.) said there was an enormous amount of repairs to be done but they had no money to do them. All they could do was put up a lean and get the essential repairs done. In Congress Villas the floors in some of the houses were gone completely and would have to be repaired. There was no money available and they should think in terms of a loan of £1500.

The County Manager said it would be good finance if they applied for more and they need not use it only if necessary. If they got sanction for £5000 they need not draw it all if they did not want it.

Colr. Kelly's proposal was put to the meeting and passed with Colr. Lannon dissenting.

Mr. Wade then asked the Council why they had been given a quarter of an acre by the Council.

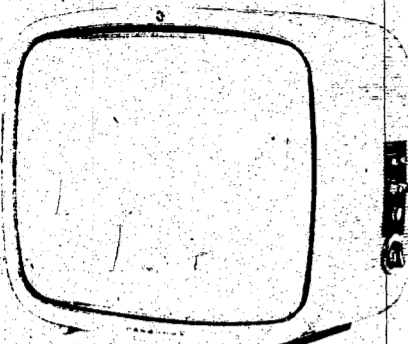

A Clerk.
With regard to the deci-
sion of the Minister for Local
Government to reduce by
£8,034 the County Road Grant
to Waterford County Council,
it is important that the facts
of the case be made known to
the general public. In the
course of his letter the Minis-
ter expressed the view that the
amount of money provided by
the Council for County Roads
was inadequate and that in
view of this nature the
Council should be guided by
the recommendations of the
County Engineer.

The position is as follows:
At Estimates Meeting, the Co.
Engineer sought a sum of
£103,830 for County Roads and
the Council provided £101,427.
For Main Roads, the Co. En-
gineer asked for a sum of
£79,530 and Council approved
a sum of £82,364 as com-
pared to £62,063 for last year.
In addition Council made avail-
able for new roads a sum of
£10,000 and also a sum of
£10,000 for cost of snow clear-
ance last winter.

It is of interest to note that the
Rate in the £ for Roads for
current year is 12/8.13d. as
compared with 11/6.62d. for
last year.
With regard to suggestions
that the action of the Minister
will result in some redundancy
amongst roadworkers it is to be
noted that some anxiety
has been caused amongst the
workers concerned, who are
the least privileged of the
Council's staffs.
In the past the Council has
always managed to solve its
financial problems without
having recourse to such brutal
measures as the dismissal of
roadworkers.

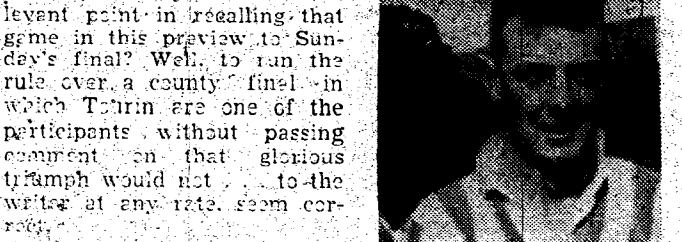

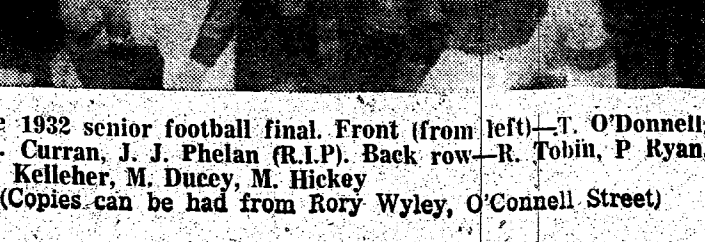
