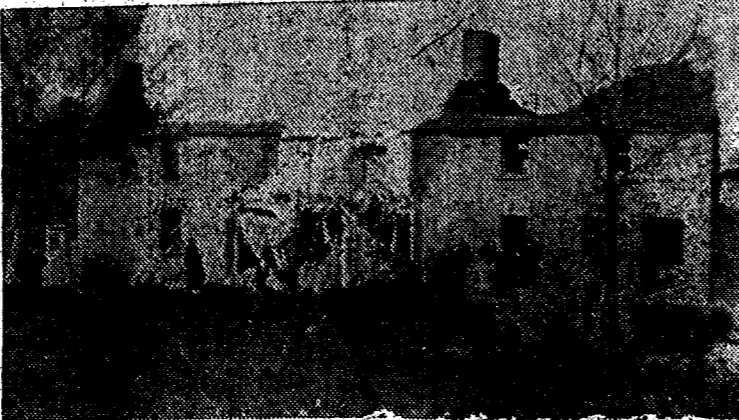

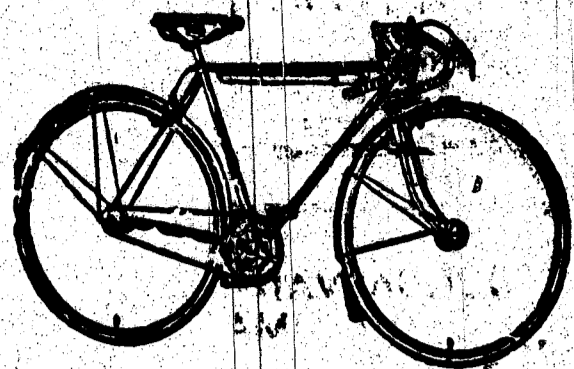

Office and High Mass at 10.30 a.m. on Saturday last, preceded the interment, which took place in the adjoining cemetery, where the clergy in attendance at the obsequies were officiated at the graveside. Shoals of Mass cards were received.

**After A Period of failing health** and at the allotted span, Miss Johanna (Jo) Power, Kilmacthomas, breathed her last at her residence on Friday, 27th ult. (Feast of St. John, the Evangelist). **IMPORTANT NOTICE**  
**Control of movement of cattle**

As from 1st January, 1964, movement of cattle by road from the Clearance Area (comprising Counties, Cork, Kerry, Kilkenny, Limerick, Tipperary and Waterford) into the Attested Area (comprising all other 20 counties) is prohibited except under permit through the checkpoints and during the times specified below.

The personal rates of Disability Benefit, Unemployment Benefit and Old Age (Contributory) Pension shown in column (2) above are subject to reduction where there are certain deficiencies in the number of contributions paid or credited. Increases for dependants if payable, are always paid in full.

The increases payable in respect of qualified children remain unchanged.

**Old Age (Contributory) Pensions**  
The provisions regarding the counting of contributions under the former National Health Insurance Acts for pension purposes have been amended with effect from 3rd January, 1964. From that date the yearly average of contributions may be calculated over a period not exceeding the last 20 contribution years before the age of 70 is reached. Any person whose claim to pension has been rejected because of his failure to satisfy the average test and who was insured between the ages of 50 and 65, may have his case reviewed by writing to the Secretary, Department of Social Welfare, Old Age (Contributory) Pensions Section, Aras Mhic Dhiarmada, Dublin 1.

On the death of a man who was in receipt of an old age (contributory) pension which included an allowance in respect of his wife, the widow becomes entitled to widow's (contributory) pension.

One commonage area of 274 acres on Broe Mountain has been inspected and further investigations into ownership, etc., are in hands with a view to opening negotiations for the purchase of another two areas totalling 64 acres in the same area.

Negotiations are also under way for the purchase of two areas in Dyrick totalling 21½ acres. Furthermore, it is hoped to complete the purchase of another area of 27½ acres in Broe Mountain shortly.

In the last year two blocks of land totalling 1,143 acres in the areas mentioned have been acquired by the Department for State afforestation purposes and part of this area will be included in the 1964/65 planting programme.

**Heifer Grant Scheme LATE CATHERINE MORONEY COMERAGH**

The scheme of grants for calved heifers, announced by the Minister for Agriculture some weeks ago, comes into operation on January 1st. Broadly the scheme provides that a grant of £15 will be paid to a herd-owner in respect of each heifer in his herd which calves on or after January 1st and which also is additional to the number of cows in the herd during 1963. The 1963 cow herd will be taken as the size of the herd at the time of the 1963 herd test under the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Scheme. If there has been more than one test of a herd during the year and if there is any difference between the numbers of cows in the herd at the times of these tests, the greatest number will be taken as the basic herd for the purposes of the grant scheme.

The scheme will be operated through the local District Office of the B.T.E. Scheme. A printed outline of the scheme is being sent to every herd-owner through the post and farmers are advised to study this document thoroughly.

The following example may help to show how the scheme will work:

If a farmer's herd in 1963, at the time of the B.T.E. scheme herd test, contained 6 cows and 4 calved heifers and

if, after January 1st, he has 10 cows and 4 calved heifers, he will qualify for a repayment of £30 in respect of two of the calved heifers. If he retains all of these animals he will qualify for a grant in 1964 by adding one or more calved heifers to the total of 14. If he sells, off, say two cows and buys two heifers which subsequently have calves, these animals will not qualify for grants, as they would not be additional to the total of 14, which would be unchanged by the replacements.

Where a herd has not had a herd test during 1963 and the owner feels that he qualifies for a grant under the heifer scheme he can apply to his local B.T.E. office and his case will be considered on the basis of whether the herd is making a contribution towards the over-all object of increasing cow numbers in the country.

A herd-owner should not apply for inclusion in the scheme, even if he has newly calved heifers, unless the total number of milch cattle in the herd is greater than that of the basic 1963 number.

When animals in a herd qualify for grants, all cows and heifers in the herd will be given a special mark, and cows or heifers bearing this mark will not be counted in any other herd for grant purposes.

If there is a reactor in a herd when inspected under the grant scheme, any claim for grants will be held over until the reactor has been removed.

If an animal has been moved into a herd in contravention of the movement controls under the B.T.E. scheme it will not be counted for the purpose of the grant scheme.

Herd-owners who consider that they qualify for grants under the new scheme, and particularly if they have additional heifers which are expected to calf in January, should obtain an application form from their local B.T.E. District Office without delay.



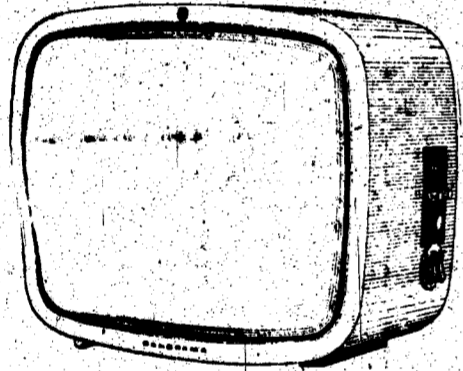

### Success of Campaign Against Warble

It is estimated by the Department of Agriculture that up to 500,000 cattle were dressed with the new systemic remedies for warble infestation before the campaign ended in mid-December. The response from farmers has been remarkable, especially as the campaign only got under way in September. The 500,000 animals treated represent a significant proportion of the total number of herds in the country.

The success of this short campaign was due, not only to the anxiety of farmers to get rid of the pest, but also to the very high degree of co-operation that was brought to bear on the problem by voluntary organisations, veterinary practitioners, agricultural advisers and the manufacturers of the two products which were used to dress the animals. Regional schemes organised at short notice, probably account for the greatest proportion of the treatments. It is hoped that similar schemes covering a great portion, if not all of the country, will be organised next year as eradication of the pest on farms where neighbouring herds are not treated only leaves the treated animals open to re-infestation the following season.

The experience gained this year suggests that such campaigns should be organised so that dressing of the cattle would begin in mid-September and end by mid-November, as this period proved the most advantageous in the trials carried out by the Department before these dressings were officially approved.

Some fears had been felt before the campaign that side-effects would be found in some of the dressed cattle, but reports from veterinary surgeons indicate that the number of such cases reported has been small, that not all of them could be definitely regarded as due to the dressing, and that in all cases the animals recovered quickly. The Department, however, still advises farmers not to use these dressings on cows that are near calving.

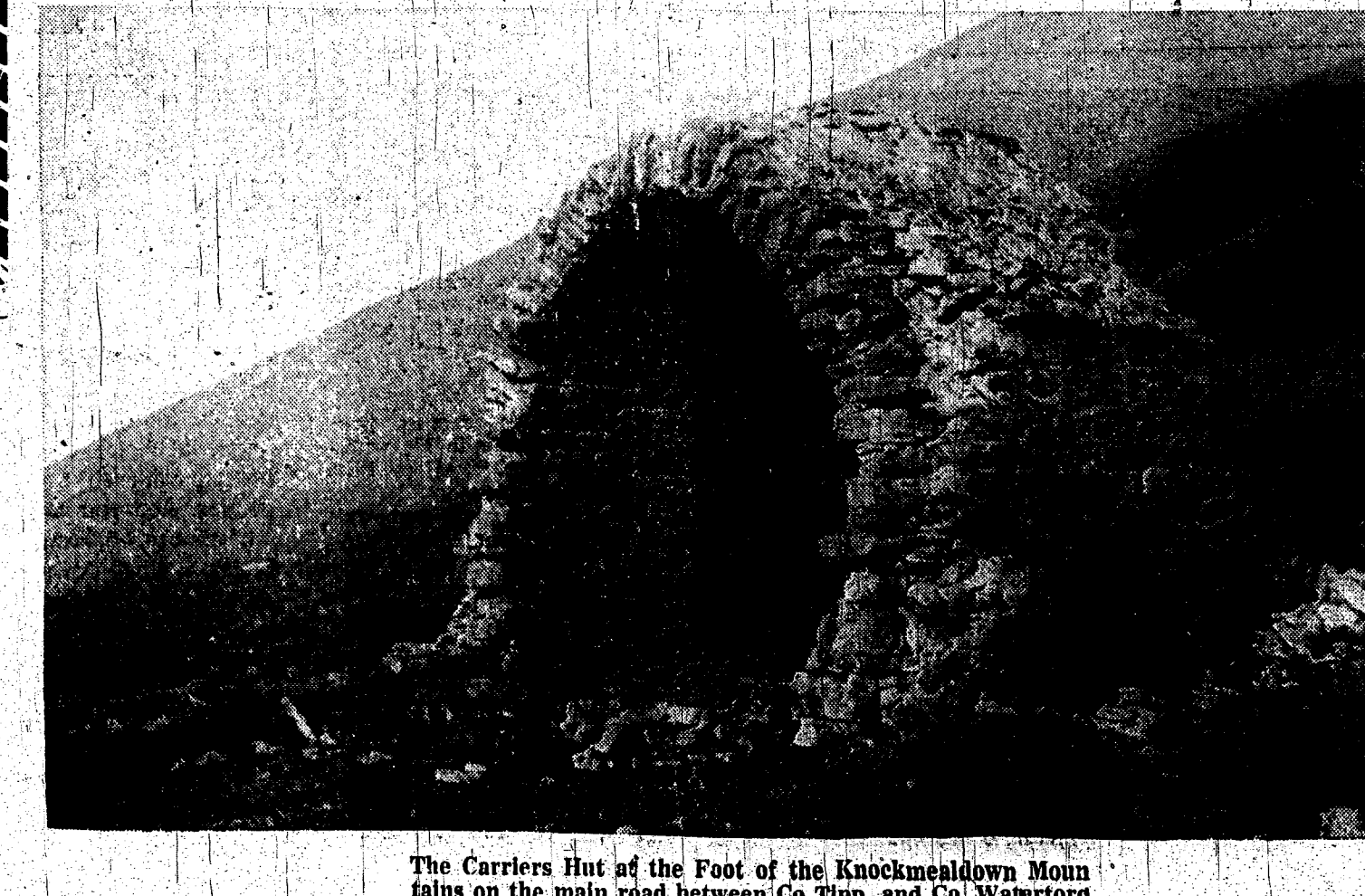

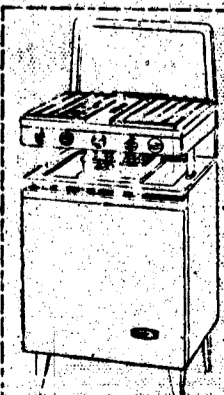

19219 salmon weighing 217.92 lbs. and 21,531 gr. weighing 197.65 lbs. were taken in 40,753 fish of 334,867 lbs. It has every sign of being a good season and we trust that if possible it might be an improvement on 1963 returns in order to make up for past poor seasons.

YOUGHAL MAN'S TRAGIC DEATH

On Christmas morning a groom was cast over the town, when it was learned that at 11.30 p.m. on Christmas eve a young man from a well known Youghal family had received fatal injuries in a hit and run accident. At the time of the accident he was on his way home with toys for his six young children, the eldest being 7 years and the youngest three weeks. He was Thomas F. O'Brien (25), of Coast Guard Station, Youghal. The accident took place at South Abbey, within 200 yards of his home and he died at midnight at the Youghal Cottage Hospital without regaining consciousness. The car did not stop after the accident. Medical and spiritual aid was rendered on the spot by Dr. E. T. O'Riordan and D. Reidy, C.C.

The deceased was a rigger in the employment of Messrs. Braithwaite & Murphy, Build-

ing Contractors in Cork. He was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius O'Brien of De Valera Street, Youghal, and son-in-law of Mr. E. P. Lynch, U.D.C., Youghal.

After the accident the gardai in surrounding stations were alerted and there was intense activity in the Killalea Castle-martyr area. All cars were held up and in a short time Sgt. Murphy and Guard Dunne in a squad car found the car with two men parked about a quarter of a mile outside the village of Castlequarry in the direct of Youghal. After interrogation both men were brought to Castle-martyr Barracks and at 2.30 on Xmas morning, James O'Riordan of Lower Castle-martyr, a steel worker at Ver Home Dock, was charged at a special court before Mr. John Barry, J.C., with the manslaughter of Thomas F. O'Brien. After full evidence of arrest by Sgt. Murphy, he was remanded on bail to next sitting of the Middleton Court.

FUNERAL OF THE VICTIM

The remains of Thomas F. O'Brien were removed from the Youghal Hospital on St. Stephen's Day to the Parish Church, where Requiem Mass for the repose of his soul was offered on Friday morning. The funeral took place that afternoon at 3 o'clock to North Abbey Cemetery, and the cortege, the largest seen in Youghal for many years, bore testimony of the deep sympathy extended to his widow and six young children. The attendees included Chairmen, members and officers of the Youghal Council, Officers and Members of the Lismore Board of Commissioners, representatives of Cork City Council, County Council, G.A.A. Club, Youghal Fishermen's Association, Youghal Coursing Club, Youghal Teachers' Association, Officers and members of Vocational Committee, etc.

Very Rev. Canon Sheehan, P.P., officiated, assisted by Rev. F. G. O'Dwyer, C.C., Rev. D. Reidy, C.C., Rev. D. Conboy, C.C., and Rev. J. Stout, African Missions.

Death of Popular Showband Member

Late Ned O'Brien

Ned O'Brien is dead. These were the tragic words that not alone numbed his native Lismore on Thursday December 19 last with grief and sorrow, but also many other places throughout the south of Ireland.

Youngest son of Michael O'Brien and the late Mrs. O'Brien, of Parks Road, Lismore, Edmund, or Ned, as the deceased was more popularly known to his countless friends everywhere, developed a sudden illness just a mere six weeks ago and was removed to Ardkeen Hospital, Waterford, where he progressed very favourably so good in fact that after a week or so he was discharged and was out amongst his many friends again. However, five days after he was discharged, he was again taken ill and was transferred from



Ardkeen Hospital to the Richmond Hospital, Dublin, where he died. He was aged 27 years.

Being a member of a most musical family, it was not natural that Ned's main interest was in music too, and indeed, it is a striking tribute to Ned that the Bridesiders Showband of which he was a member for the past three years, is regarded as one of the leading bands in the south at present. He was lead vocalist and played tenor sax and during his period with the band he became known throughout Ireland for his musical ability and showmanship. Specialising in songs in "country and western" style, he had four Radio Eirann broadcasts to his credit.

A keen follower of all sports, he was in his younger days a prominent playing member on the Lismore hurling team and was also an active member of the Lismore Dramatic Society. He will be sadly missed by his countless friends everywhere, but more especially by his sorrowing family and relatives, and to his heartbroken father; sisters Kathleen, Mary, Eileen, and brother Michael, we extend our very deepest sympathy on their great loss.

The remains were removed from Dublin to St. Carthage's Church, Lismore, on the following Friday evening, and were accompanied by one of the largest corteges ever seen in Lismore, and were received and blessed by Very Rev. Canon Dunphy, P.P., V.F., assisted by Rev. Fr. Queally, C.C., and Rev. Fr. Slattery, C.C., and the burial took place in St. Carthage's Cemetery on Saturday. The above clergy again officiated at the graveside. Another large and representative cortege was again present.

N.F.A. NEWS Busy Month Ahead

If January is to be taken as an example of what is likely to take place during the coming year we are in for a very busy time.

Apart from Commodity Committee meetings—nine of them are already scheduled for the following important meetings are to be held: Jan. 7—Organisation Group; Jan. 15—Central Executive Committee; Jan. 16—Special Council Meeting; Jan. 30—January Council Meeting.

MIXED BAG OF RESOLUTIONS

The extraordinary variety and number of resolutions which come before the National Council each month is perhaps the most obvious proof that our Association is viable. Individual members through their County Executives obviously feel that they can turn to the Association to get jobs done.

At the December meeting more than forty-one resolutions were considered. Some of them were accepted in toto, others were referred to particular committees for their consideration and recommendations.

Below we give a few of these in order to show our readers how other members are thinking and in order also to give them an idea of the tasks that lie ahead.

Livestock: Mention was made of the heavy losses from foot rot in Dairy cows livestock and a strong recommendation was made, to have this problem investigated without delay in conjunction with the Agricultural Institute. Some solution to this problem must be found.

Another resolution called for a calf-subsidy on the first ten calves with a sliding scale after that number. Some standard in production should also be stipulated.

A further resolution read: "That Central Office approach the Government and ask that legislation be passed abolishing market tolls."

One county asked "that the Government pay a subsidy on the first 15 cows in each herd instead of on calved-heifers."

Miscellaneous. — "That another specific demand for an increase in the price of milk should be made."

"Many counties recommended that the withholding of any increase in rates next year should be made a national issue."

"That the prices of potatoes in the Dublin market be given in the morning's news on Radio Eireann."

"That the N.F.A. should organise a wool growers cooperative on a national basis to handle wool."

"That the difference between the price of maize to importers and compounders (£7 per ton difference) should be investigated."

"That there should be a guaranteed price for eggs or that they should be subsidised."

"That the Meticulous Damages Act, particularly with reference to motor vehicles which are stolen or damaged, be reviewed. Insurance Companies collect premiums to cover this, but frequently extract the payment from ratepayers, under the provisions of the above act."

"That the Minister for Lands be asked to make commercial timber from forests available to the local farmers and that the forester-in-charge be given more latitude in this matter."

"That the Minister for Industry & Commerce put a stay on the payment of claims against the Equitable Insurance Company until the in-

vestigations into the affairs of the Company are completed."

"That the Government give interest free loans to farmers with a valuation under £20 P.L.V."

Incidentally, it was more evident than ever at the last National Council Meeting that special emphasis will be given by the N.F.A. in all its requests to the Government in matters which concern small farmers in the poorer counties.

OUTSTANDING PRIZES IN NEW LOTTERY

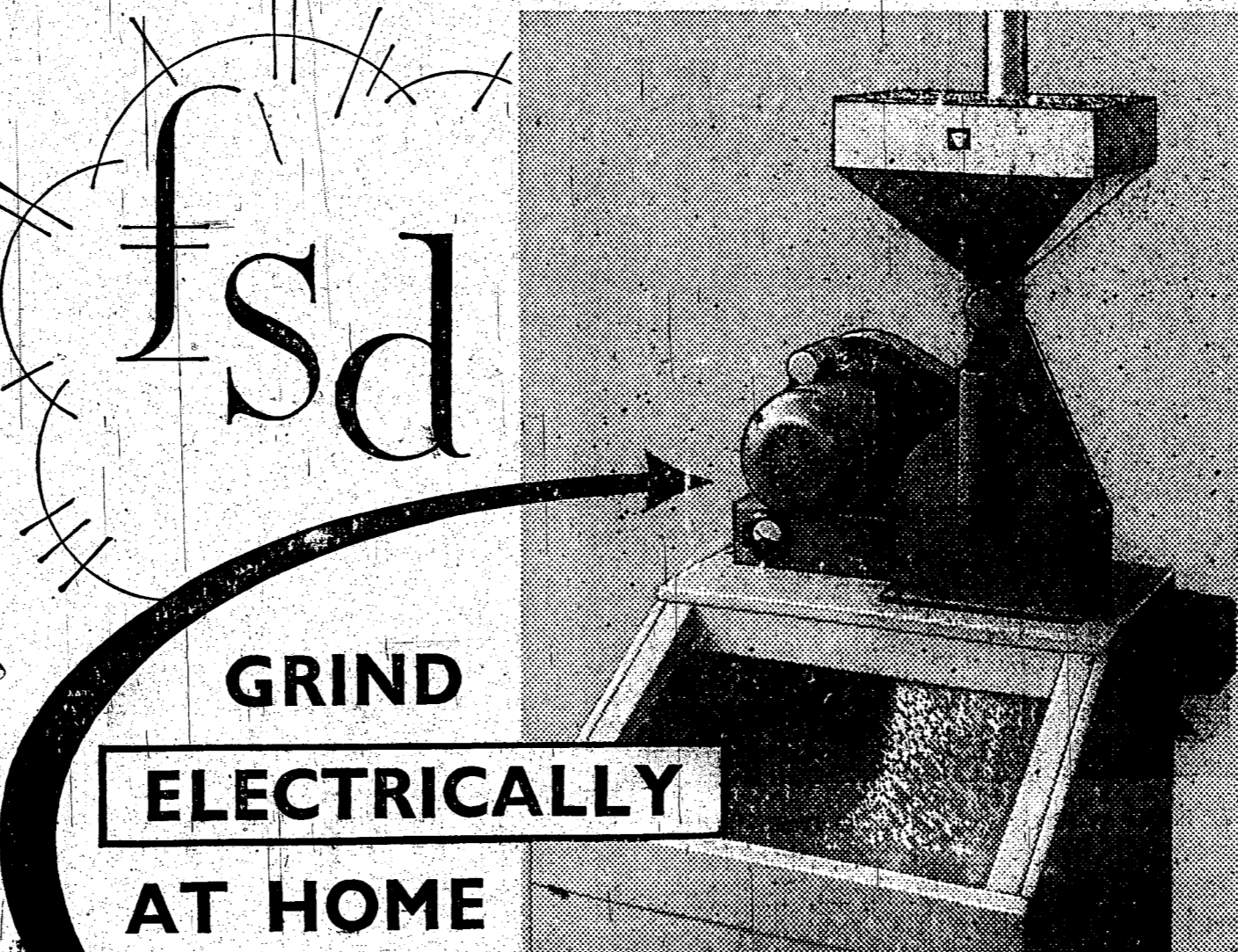

# Coursing Feast At Clonea

**NEVER** in the history of the Dungarvan Coursing Club have entries been so spontaneous as for next Monday and Tuesday's (6th and 7th) Deise Cup meeting at Clonea. Already all the stakes are full and with hares in fine trim next week's event should be a very successful one.

The main attraction of the course is the Deise Cup event for 32 permanent nominators with the winner's prize raised to £300 this year. The two-day fixture started in 1947 under the presidency of Mr. Pax Whelan, with the presentation of the original Deise Cup by Mr. P. J. Lynch for 32 All-Ages, with one proviso that the cup be won twice to become the outright property of the winner.

The first joint hon. secretaries were Mr. Joe Foley and his sister Eileen, who though now domiciled in Brookline, Mass. U.S., still retains a lively interest in the doing of the old club and her many friends were delighted to see her in the pink when she paid a flying visit here last coursing meeting.

With the emigration of Miss Foley and business commitments of brother Joe, Miss Kathleen O'Brien took over the secretaryship and was later joined by Mr. Noel McHugh as joint hon. secretary and on their regretted departure the present popular and efficient secretary, Mr. Billy Fitzgerald took over.

The Stake became a nomination event in 1957, but in the meantime the Deise Cup found yearly respites in places as far apart as Bandon and Dublin, as follows: (1947) Do Rally (Kilkenny); (1948) Light of Ballyelough (Cork); (1949) Smashin Navy (Tipp.); (1950) Antrim Seal (Clonmel); (1951) Lena's Big Boy (Tipp.); (1952) Astra's Champion (Dublin); (1953) Keeries Mac (Kilkenny); (1954) Romantic Fergus (Dublin); (1955) Happy Abode (Tipp.); 1956 Orions and the Bear.

In the first nomination event Miss Kitty Butler's (Sec. I.C.C.) Kentucky Minstrel (afterwards Waterloo Cup winner) just beat the previous year's winner, Orions and the Bear, in the final. In 1958 The Citizen Rajah, nominated by Joe and Jim Harty won. In the following year Mrs. M. Fives and the late Mrs. E. Foley, nominated the winner, Pride of Shournaught, and Mrs. Fives was again the winner in 1960 with Right Well to win the Cup outright. Paddy Lynch won the trophy with "Getting In" in 1961 and Mrs. Fives hit the headlines again in 1962 with General Boy. Last year Mr. Noel McHugh had the winner in The Fridge.

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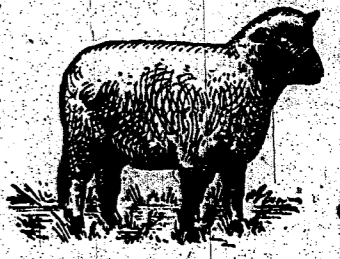

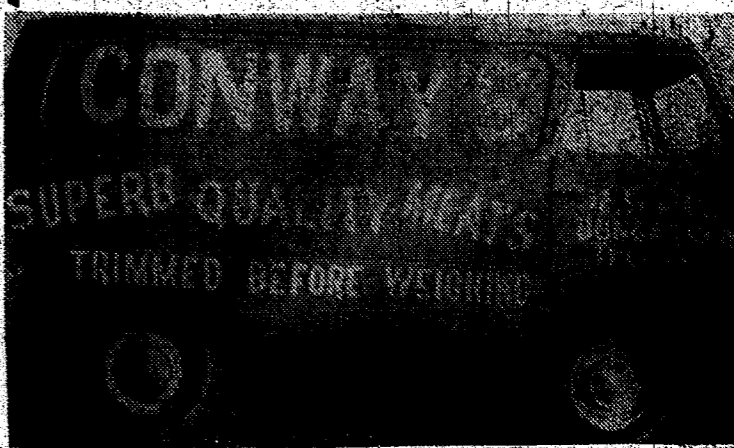
