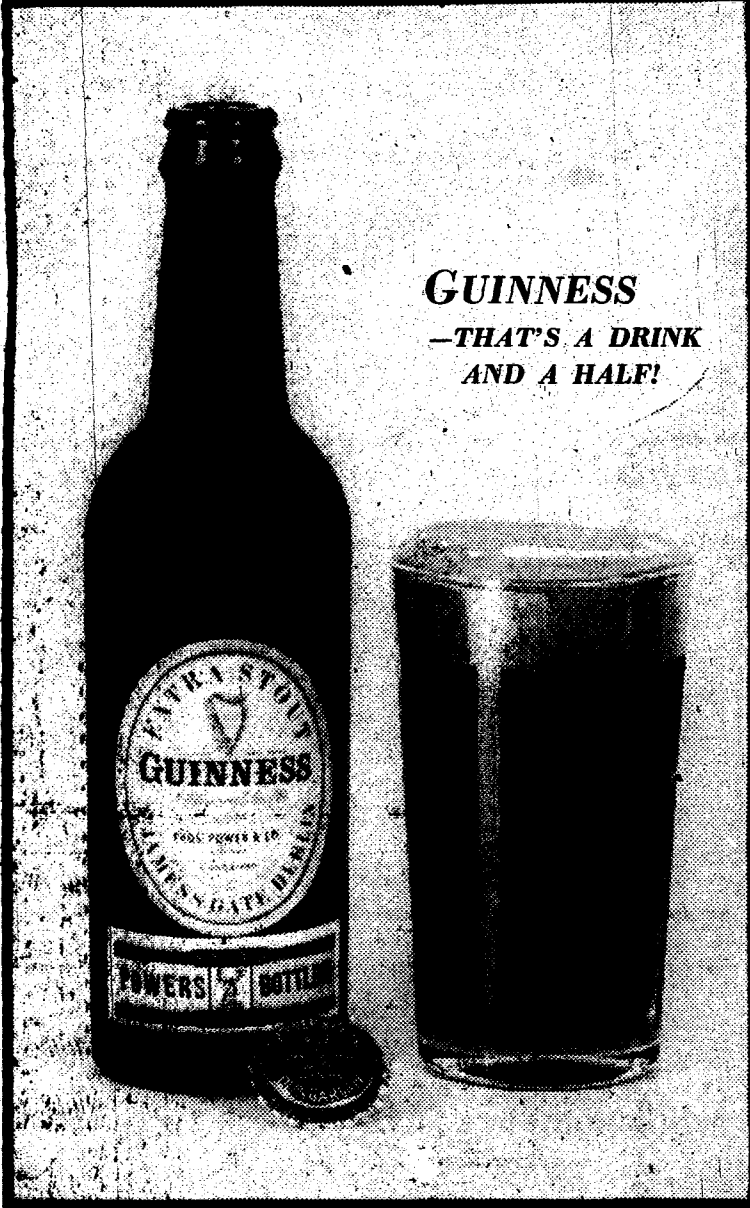

**ROUND two in the rent war between the 66 tenants of Dr. Caseyville, Dungarvan, and Co. Manager S. J. Moynihan, is now well advanced. The decision of the County Manager to increase the rents of certain houses in this Council scheme has met with strongest disapproval from the tenants and present indications are that the feud will be a long and bitter one.**

On Friday night a special meeting was called at the request of the Chairman, Deputy T. A. Kyme to consider the position. The Co. Manager, however, was not present at the meeting.

Before the meeting the tenants took part in a protest march to the Town Hall, led by five housewives. Slogans were carried, some of which read: "Caseyville United"; "No Dictatorship"; "Caseyville Wants Fair Play"; and "Baillif If You Like."

A deputation from the tenants then came before the Council meeting, and one of them, Mr. Johnny Daly said they had certain proposals to make but they would not reveal them in the absence of the Manager.

Mr. P. Tutty said until the

Manager agreed to meet the tenants they would withhold their rents.

The members of the deputation praised the "Observer" for the publicity given to their case.

After a lengthy discussion it was decided to send a three man deputation of Councillors to the Manager, in an effort to get him to reconsider his order and to reduce the increases to a lower level.

## PASSING OF "THE POET OF THE COMERAGHS"

LATE MICHAEL WALSH, BALLINGOWN  
AN APPRECIATION

Mikey Walsh, the famed poet of the Comeraghs is dead. On Sunday last he was laid to rest in historic Kilrossanty Churchyard beside so many of those he loved so well. As an Irishman there was none more staunch and his ideals were firmly moulded along those of Pearse and Connolly. Only a 32-county nation, free from seashore to seashore would satisfy him.

He was a poet of exceptional ability for which he was known the country over and well beyond its confines. He recorded in verse the heroic deeds of those who paid the supreme sacrifice, many of whom he personally knew.

He loved the games of the Gael especially football and was steeped in Kilrossanty's proud tradition. He witnessed every championship victory by the green and gold since 1888 and praised in brilliant verse the men who figured in them.

Here we quote excerpts from those famous ballads: "The stuff is still in Comeraghs

And will until the day  
When the trumpet tones of  
Gabriel  
Will call us all away."  
After the 1919 victory he wrote:—  
"The ball was thrown between them  
Pat Keating led the way  
And Matty Ryan from  
Leamybrien  
He gave a grand display."  
Of the 1939 victory he said:  
"And after that was fit for  
tat  
And neither side would yield  
Till Pats Fitzgerald shook  
the mat  
They took and kept the lead."  
When recording the patriot's praises he never failed to mention the names of the two great Kilrossanty soldiers who paid the supreme sacrifice—Pat Keating and John Fitzgerald and likewise in lighter vein he always made reference to his great friend the late Johnny Ryan.

Appropriately his coffin was draped with the Tricolour. May the soul of his beloved Kilrossanty lie gently on the breast of this faithful son—R.I.P.

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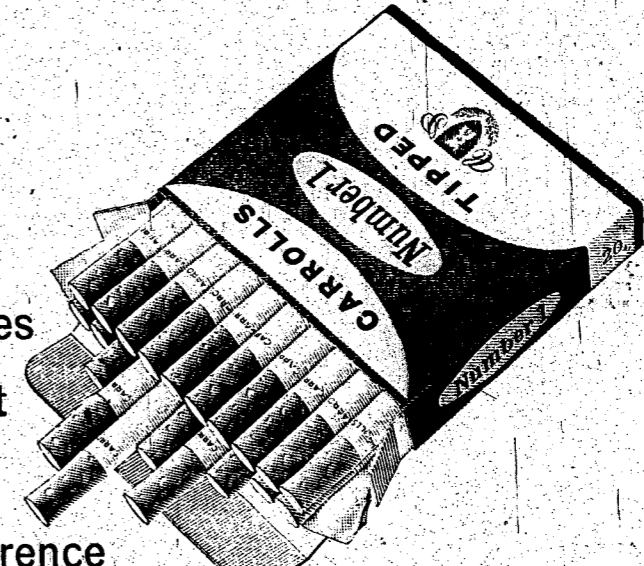

INCOME TAX 'NO PENALTIES' CONCESSION

In his Budget Speech on 23rd April, 1963, the Minister for Finance indicated that he was prepared to afford to those who might have been evading their Income Tax liabilities, an opportunity to put themselves right without having to pay the penalties usually incurred for tax evasion.

# INFORMATION AND THE FARMERS

Farmers reading about the work of the Agricultural Institute or looking at trial plots and experimental farms or granted is reasonable when one remembers the value of agricultural exports which each year increases would automatically bring about.

The N.F.A. is determined to get an improvement in dairy farming income, because it is such acknowledgment for the work they are trying to do. The future development of the country depends on it. It is

The Laying Down of Land to Hay and Pastures is the title of leaflet No. 42, which emphasises the three main factors, e.g. soil fertility, the use of the right seeds and the management of grass.

Other leaflets which have been revised and re-issued by the Department of Agriculture are No. 97 "Noxious Weeds"; No. 112 "Common Poisonous Plants"; No. 24 "Diseases of Turkeys"; No. 68 "Trees for Shelter and Ornament"; and No. 163 "Braxy in Sheep".

## N.F.A. NEWS

**BARLEY AND WHEAT PRICES**

The N.F.A. Grain Committee in recent talks with Senior Officers of the Department of Agriculture proposed that an increase in barley and wheat prices were now essential. This is necessary in order to offset the increased costs which will arise from the recent wage agreement under which other sectors are to get a 12% increase. It is also necessary if we are to ensure that farmers get their fair share of increased national productivity. Many forget that agricultural productivity is increasing just as fast or faster than other sectors of the economy but farmers are not being rewarded accordingly.

## FARM WAGES

Over the last 10 years farm wages in West Germany have almost doubled. According to the Federal Bureau of Statistics, the net income of male workers has risen by 91% on the larger farms and by 94% on those of average size. For female workers, earnings increased by 84% on farms of more than 123 acres but by only 79% on smaller farms.

## EVERY FARMER SHOULD HAVE THESE LEAFLETS

The information leaflets published by the Department of Agriculture may be obtained free and it is a pity that more farmers do not make use of them. They deal with a wide variety of farming topics and off and on they are brought up to date. In recent months a batch of revised leaflets has become available and farmers are advised to write for these and replace the older editions they may have already.

## THE SOVIET GRAIN

This year's cereal crop in the Soviet Union was about 96.2 million metric tons compared with 148.2 million in 1962. According to Mr. Khromchikov, this year's crop was 835 million metric tons or about 13.7 million tons less than in 1955. The figure recorded by the Mr. Krustchov is far below the estimates of the harvest which had put the Soviet harvest at 130 million tons.

## INCREASE MILK PRICES GOOD INVESTMENT

If farmers are to achieve, in cattle production by 1970, the target set for them in the Second Programme for Economic Expansion there will have to be major developments in dairying. To bring this about, every feasible means will have to be employed and small farmers will have to receive practical and special attention.

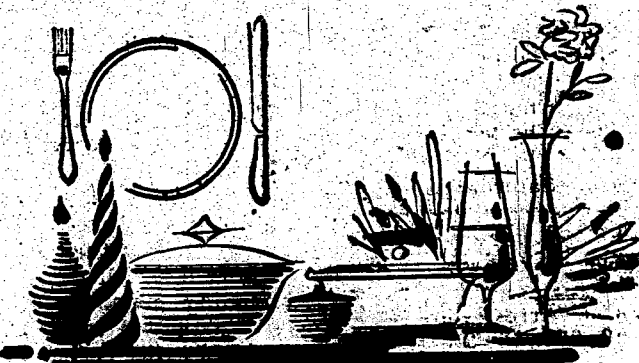
## TALKS ON BRITISH MEAT MARKET CONTROLS

Ireland will be represented at a multilateral conference in London towards the end of January called by the British authorities in connection with implementation of the policy announced last May by the British Minister of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, Mr. Soames, of promoting greater stability in the marketing of meat (fatstock, beef and lamb) in Britain. The aim is to get voluntary agreement about imports into Britain and to apply standard quantities to which the British price guarantees for home production would apply. Multilateral arrangements of the same kind for bacon, in which Ireland participated, were recently agreed in London.

Preparatory to the forthcoming multilateral conference on fatstock, beef and lamb, representatives of the British Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, have been bilateral talks with representatives of the Governments of the other supplying countries. A further talk will take place between representatives of the Ministry and the Irish Department of Agriculture next week. Earlier talks took place in September and October last,

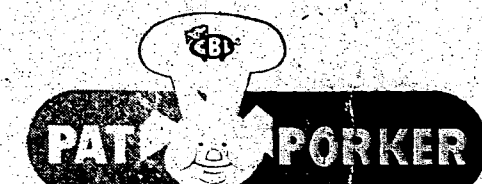

They have a wonderful record in this competition, having won it the two years of its existence, and on Sunday will be dead heat on completing a great hat-trick of victories.

"Our older boys are our younger men," he said, "and I believe the youth are ready to accept what will be taught to them. If we do that we will be on the right road. Every man should do his full for his club and the clubs would benefit as a result."

Referring to the referees, he said they were the most important section of the Association, and he would give them precedence over the players and officials. They had to face the players and a public that was not greatly enlightened on the rules. The incoming Board would do all they could for the referees in their Division.

Concluding, he congratulated all the Western teams that had won out County titles. It was a very good year for the division and apart from a little trouble they had some very good games. Also they had never received such co-operation from the clubs.

In his report on their financial position, the treasurer Mr. Tom Walsh said they ended the year with a credit balance of £81.

The Chairman said this was only the second time they had ended up the year on the right side. The convention agreed to have the incoming Board consider favourably the question of a bonus for the Secretary.

When the Secretary's (Seamus O'Brien) report was read and adopted, the Chairman made special reference to the section of it dealing with sportsmanship. They should take this very much to heart, he said. During the year '63, they had a little trouble on the playing fields, but most of it occurred in the minor championships. This did not speak well of the younger people or those in charge of them.

Of the refereeing position, Rev. Fr. Michael Farrell (Kilgobinet) said they would have better behaviour if they had better referees. He asked if they were in a position to start a course for referees.
