Conflict of Evidence

JUDGE GIVES DECREE TO HELVICK FISHERMAN

A Helvick fisherman, John Dwan, was given a decree for £18 by Judge L. B. Skinner at Dungarvan District Court on Wednesday— the sequel to a collision between a van driven by the complainant and a Consul car, driven by Dr. Margaret Faye, Model Farm Road, Cork, at a bend known as "Cody's Corner," Ring, on August 9th last. A counter-claim by the defendant for £10 was dismissed.

In evidence Mr. Dwan said, on August 9th last he was driving his 1955 Morris Van from Dungarvan to Helvick. At Knockenpower he approached a sharp corner and bend and changed down to second gear. He was only about one foot from his correct side, and the width of the road at the point of impact was 18 feet wide.

Coming to the corner he was doing only about 15 miles an hour, but had reduced his speed to 5 miles at the point of impact. He could not say what speed the other car was doing. After the impact he sent one of the Ring college students for the guards, but meanwhile the defendant moved her car 60 ft. away from the point of impact, and to the other side of the road. She was very aggressive and asked him if he was mad. She said he was not fit to drive a car, and accused him of taking the bend at 60 miles an hour.

Witness continued: "When Garda O'Doherty arrived the defendant at first denied moving her car, but when one of the students verified it she admitted it. She then said that I moved my car, and again I had to get the students to verify that I did not."

Cross-examined by Mr. A. R. Farrell, for the defendant, witness denied saying to Dr. Faye at the start that he did not want a guard. It was he who sent the student to the barracks and not the defendant. She did not say to him that she was holding him responsible for the accident. She did accuse him of driving too fast.

Deputy Kyne in Dail

Speaking on the motion in the Dail, on Wednesday, 5th February, on the Motion to Increase Disablement Benefits, Deputy Kyne said:—"I support this motion as I support any motion which aims at improving the lot of the poor. I agree with Deputy Lenehan, not only do these disabled poor need sufficient to enable them to live but they need others in their families to devote the whole or part of their time to looking after their physical needs as well.

The disabled have as good a claim to draw on State funds as have those who draw the non-contributory Old Age Pension for their financial support. Old age pensioners and blind pensioners do not contribute towards their pensions, but still they get a lot more by way of State help than the Disabled persons.

"All of us must agree that the most in need should have first call on whatever funds are available. I do not agree with Deputy Burke, however, that this matter can be remedied at Budget time only. We had, for example, today, an announcement by the Government that they were giving 12% to the Civil Service. I quite agree that the Civil Servants are entitled to this increase, but surely if some £4 million can be found to meet this, a sum of less than a quarter of a million pounds can be found without waiting for the Budget to pay an increase to the Disabled poor.

"To suggest, as Deputy Burke did, that the increase could only be paid if the Civil Servants were prepared to have an increase in their salaries at Budget Time, was not right. The Labour Party had always made it clear that if extra taxes were to be imposed that were clearly earmarked for Special Welfare benefits or Disablement Allowances, the Party would be ready to have high wages. The Labour Party had done so in the past and would do so in the future. This motion for an increase in the Disablement Benefits is a demand for the Labour Party."

Notable Feat by Local Firm

Electrical Engineering Services this week carried out marine electrical repairs on the Scottish fishing boat M.B. Kinvara which had developed electrical trouble while fishing around the Waterford coast. The boat's engineer, however, was not able to clear the fault and the boat had to suspend work and come in to Dungarvan Harbour. As the trouble was of a very complicated and serious nature the skipper contacted some firms in Waterford city, but failed to get a firm to handle the work. The boat generates its own electricity, which supplies the navigational apparatus, radio transmitter, fishing gear, engine starters, pumps, etc. and this type of electricity is of the Direct Current category or D.C.

The skipper, who was not a newcomer to Dungarvan harbour as he had been here about ten years ago, contacted some old friends who directed him to Mr. Tads Moloney, Electrical Engineering Services Ltd. Mr. Moloney made a complete inspection of the generators, dismantled the Control Panel, traced and cleared the fault and fitted some new parts. Some special parts could not be procured in this country, and this for a while presented a problem, but Mr. Moloney, to the skipper's amazement, altered the control system and had everything working and back to normal in twelve hours. The Kinvara sailed at high tide on Saturday morning. The skipper was loud in his praise of the local firm's skill and service and it is worthy of note here that such a firm as Electrical Engineering Services Ltd., under the direction of Mr. Tads Moloney, is a great asset to our town.

Conflict of Evidence

JUDGE GIVES DECREE TO HELVICK FISHERMAN

A Helvick fisherman, John Dwan, was given a decree for £18 by Judge L. B. Skinner at Dungarvan District Court on Wednesday — the sequel to a collision between a van driven by the complainant and a Consul car, driven by Dr. Margaret Faye, Model Farm Road, Cork, at a bend known as "Coady's Corner," Ring, on August 9th last. A counter-claim by the defendant for £10 was dismissed.

In evidence Mr. Dwan said, on August 9th last he was driving his 1955 Morris Van from Dungarvan to Helvick. At Knockenpower he approached a sharp corner and bend and changed down to second gear. He was only about one foot from his correct side, and the width of the road at the point of impact was 18 feet wide.

Coming to the corner he was doing only about 15 miles an hour, but had reduced his speed to 5 miles at the point of impact. He could not say what speed the other car was doing. After the impact he sent one of the Ring college students for the guards, but meanwhile the defendant moved her car 60 ft. away from the point of impact, her reason for moving the car, and to the other side of the road. She was very aggressive and asked him if he was mad. She said he was not fit to drive a car, and accused him of taking the bend at 60 miles an hour.

Witness continued: "When Garda O'Doherty arrived the defendant at first denied moving her car, but when one of the students verified it she admitted it. She then said that I moved my car, and again I had to get the students to verify that I did not."

Cross-examined by Mr. A. R. Farrell (for the defendant), witness, denied saying to Dr. Faye at the start that he did not want a guard. It was he who sent the student to the barracks and not the defendant. She did not say to him that she was holding him responsible for the accident. She did accuse him of driving too fast.

The defendant, Dr. Margaret Faye said she was driving her father's consul on the date in question. Her mother was in the front and her father and

two sisters were in the back. She was in neutral gear and was only creeping.

Judge Skinner: It is a most dangerous thing to be out of gear and running on the brakes alone.

Witness went to say that she was close to the wall on her correct side, and the plaintiff's van came sweeping around the corner on its wrong side. He then swerved to the left, but struck her car a glancing blow. He continued for a distance and then stopped. She told him that she was putting the full responsibility on him, but he did not say anything. She said she wanted a guard and he showed a reluctance to get one. She then sent for a guard. Whilst waiting for Guard O'Doherty to come a lady in a Volkswagen came on the scene and she asked her to wait until the guard came before going through as she did not want to disturb the position of the cars. Shortly afterwards a man driving a Hillman came on, but he said he would like to go through so she guided him through, also the Volkswagen and a tractor trailer that also came on the scene. She then told her father that she was moving her car as it was in a dangerous position. That was away from the point of impact, her reason for moving the car.

In reply to Mr. E. P. King, Solr., for the plaintiff, she said she never denied to the guard about moving her car.

At this stage Judge Skinner asked if Guard O'Doherty was in court, but Supt. Costello said Guard O'Doherty was now pensioned from the force and was working in England.

The defendant's father, Mr. Seamus Faye corroborated his daughter's evidence about how the collision occurred.

Mr. King: I put it to you that you know little or nothing about the accident, and you are doing the best you can. The defendant's two sisters, the Misses Una and Sheila Faye gave corroborative evidence as to how the accident took place.

Judge Skinner said he was inclined to believe Mr. Dwan's evidence. Miss Faye was going along out of gear, he said, which was a most dangerous thing.

Deputy Kyne in Dail Notable Feat by Local Firm

Speaking on the motion in the Dail, on Wednesday, 5th February, on the Motion to Increase Disablement Benefits, Deputy Kyne said: "I support this motion as I support any motion which aims at improving the lot of the poor. I agree with Deputy Lenehan, not only do these disabled poor need sufficient to enable them to live but they need others in their families to devote the whole or part of their time to looking after their physical needs as well.

The disabled have as good a claim to draw on State funds as have those who draw the non-contributory Old Age Pension for their financial support. Old age pensioners and blind pensioners do not contribute towards their pensions, but still they get a lot more by way of State help than the Disabled poor.

"All of us must agree that the most in need should have first call on whatever funds are available. I do not agree with Deputy Burke, however, that this matter can be remedied at Budget time only. We had, for example, today, an announcement by the Government that they were giving 12% to the Civil Service. I quite agree that the Civil Servants are entitled to this increase, but surely if some £4 million can be found to meet this, a sum of less than a quarter of a million pounds can be found without waiting for the Budget to pay an increase to the Disabled poor.

"To suggest, as Deputy Burke did, that the increase could only be paid if the Civil Servants were prepared to vote for increased taxation at Budget Time, was not right. The Labour Party had always made it clear that if extra taxes were to be imposed that were clearly earmarked for Social Welfare benefits or Disablement Allowances, the Party would be ready to give their support. The Labour Party had done so in the past and would do so in the future. This motion for an increase in the allowances to Disabled persons had the support of the Labour Party."

Electrical Engineering Services this week carried out marine electrical repairs on the Scottish fishing boat M.B. Kincora which had developed electrical trouble while fishing around the Waterford coast. The boat's engineer, however, was not able to clear the fault and the boat had to suspend work and come in to Dungarvan Harbour. As the trouble was of a very complicated and serious nature the skipper contacted some firms in Waterford city, but failed to get a firm to handle the work. The boat generates its own electricity, which supplies the navigation apparatus, radio transmitter, fishing gear, engine starters, pumps, etc., and this type of electricity is of the Direct Current category or D.C.

The skipper, who was not a newcomer to Dungarvan harbour as he had been here about ten years ago, contacted some old friends who directed him to Mr. Tadg Moloney, Electrical Engineering Services Ltd. Mr. Moloney made a complete inspection of the generators, dismantled the Control Panel, traced and cleared the fault and fitted some new parts. Some special parts could not be procured in this country, and this for a while presented a problem, but Mr. Moloney, to the skipper's amazement, altered the control system and had everything working and back to normal in twelve hours. The Kincora sailed at high tide on Saturday morning. The skipper was loud in his praise of the local firm's skill and service and it is worthy of note here that such a firm as Electrical Engineering Services Ltd., under the direction of Mr. Tadg Moloney, is a great asset to our town.

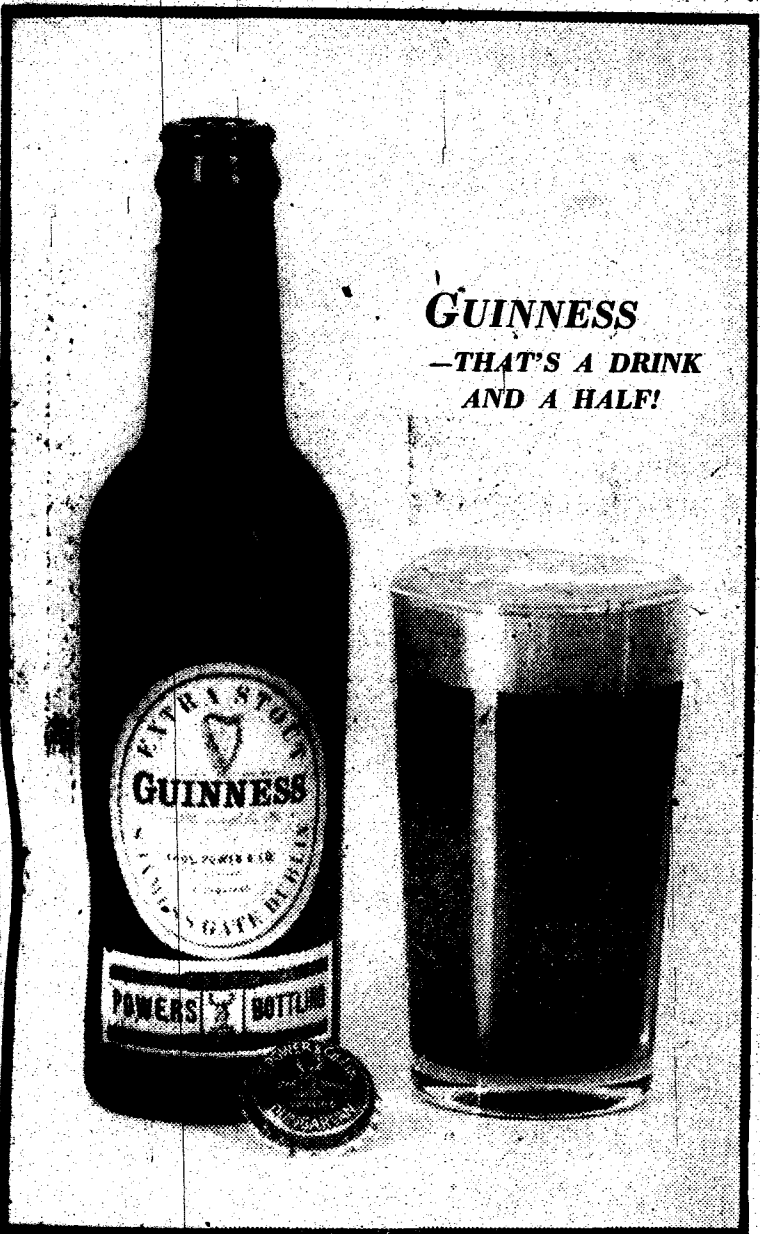

#### TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION

At a recent meeting of the U.D. Council, it was decided to enter Youghal for the 1964 Tidy Town Competition. The Chairman remarked that it was the duty of everyone to see that the town was kept tidy. In Youghal this was difficult as we had one long street where there were a few eye-sores which should be tidied up. The Town Superintendent was directed to contact certain persons in town requesting their co-operation in keeping the town tidy.

#### £100,000 TO BE SPENT ON YOUGHAL

For many years past the long sought development of Youghal as a sea-side resort, remained static. Now steps are being taken in the right direction as work has already begun on a five year amenity plan to cost over £100,000, which will be borne jointly by the Cork County Council and the Government.

When the work is completed Youghal will have a complete new look and includes: (1) Widening of the main road at Loreto Convent from the present 16 feet to 30 feet, with a six foot slipway on either side. (This section of the road was the worst bottle-neck in the town); (2) The roadway, as well as leading to the town, will also lead into the '98 Park which will be newly laid out and on one side of which will be a colourful mural 60 feet by 9 feet. The newly erected promenade in the Park, now nearing completion, will be protected by an artistic railing; (3) The making of a shrubbery on the roadside opposite the Lighthouse to be supplied with plants from the Council's nursery; (4) Widening of the promenade on the front strand by 30 feet and erection of a new and specially designed sea protection wall; (5) the completion of the promenade will have a long narrow strip which will be made into different play areas for children. The main entrance will be on the east side and the ground will be laid out as a winter garden complete with natural rock and anchored seating accommodation. On the west side will be an area developed as a children's wonderland stepped up and down at different levels with circular cellular houses of many sizes. Facing westward will be a large roundabout for children. The cost to be the liability of the Urban Council as well as the cost of the Green Park and the Council expect a 50% grant in respect of both schemes. The cost of the other works will be done jointly by the Co. Council and the Government.

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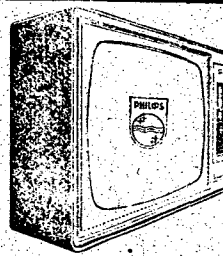

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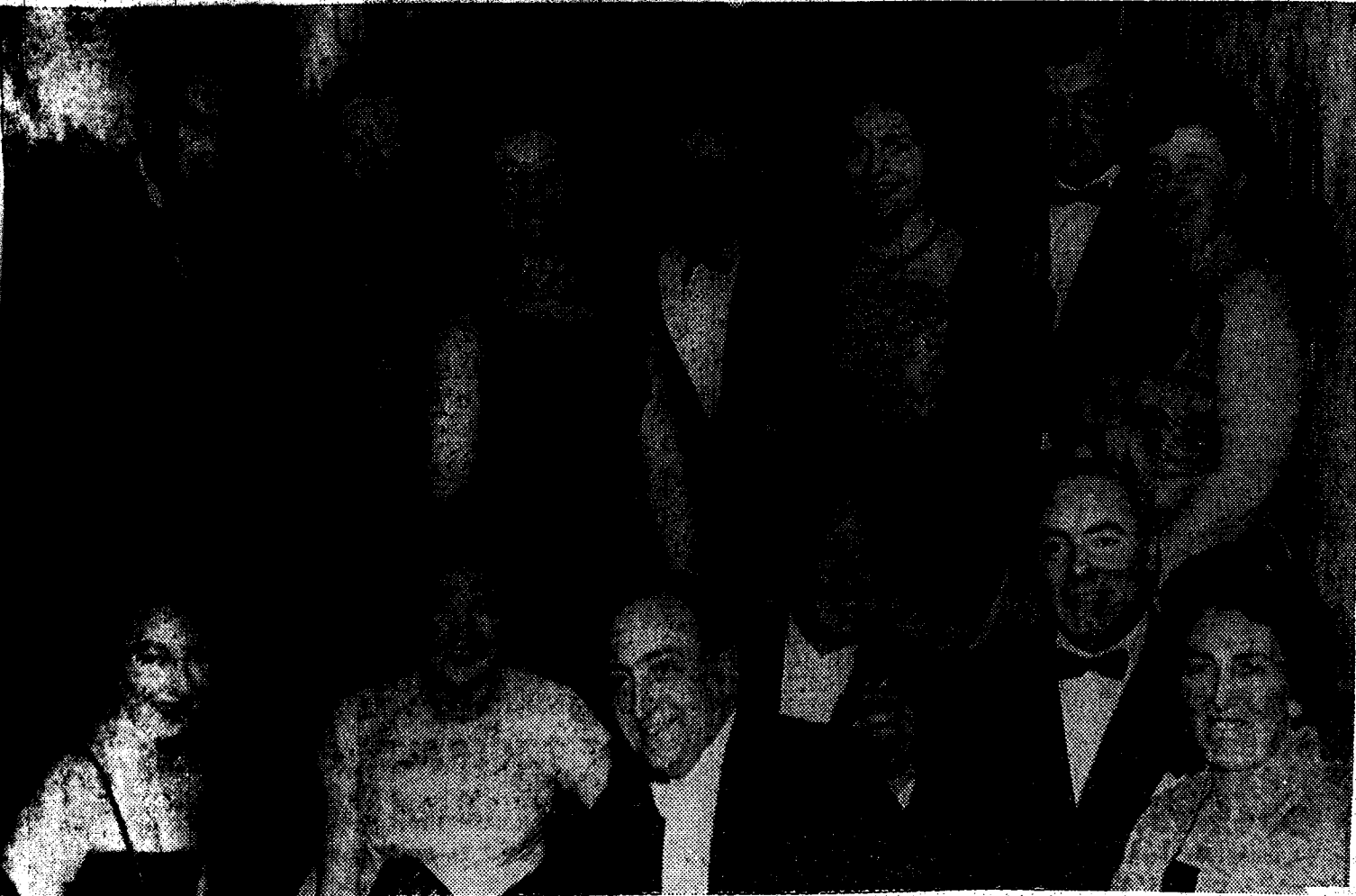
