## THE COUNCIL'S 'FAIRY GOD-MOTHER'

### Supplementary Estimate Discussed

HE found it hard to reconcile himself to the fact that a supplementary estimate could be raised without having an effect on the rates, and they were only fooling themselves, if they thought otherwise, said Mr. Norman Walsh, at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Co. Council when a £17,000 supplementary estimate raised earlier in the year by the Council was again discussed.

Mr. F. O'Leary, County Accountant, said that last year a total of £396,945 had been collected in rates, whilst they spent £388,921. They had received £251,031 in agricultural grants from the Department, as well as road grants totalling £170,000. They would up with a credit balance of £30,000, which was £20,000 less than the previous year.

It was at this stage that Col. T. Lannon asked what had become of the £17,000 supplementary estimate the Council had raised earlier this year. The money, he said, had been passed for roads but was supposed to be only for book-keeping purposes and in effect would not be spent. He was disappointed that the County Manager and Co. Engineer

for it. £17,000 was passed and I think ye are feeling ye're way, trying to cod the Dept.

Mr. Curran said no one was being dodged.

Mr. Hally said the statement that the money would never be spent was never made.

Mr. Curran said he made a statement that it would not effect the rates and he still stood over it. The supplementary estimate had been raised to get extra grants from the State.

Col. Lannon said by saying they were getting state grants they were only misleading the people. Where would the State get the money? he asked.

Mr. Hally said if the County Council did not raise the money they would have lost £25,000 in grants.

Mr. Curran said the whole thing was a straightforward device and no one became unemployed.

Col. N. Walsh said he couldn't understand how they could raise £17,000 without it effecting the rates.

Deputy Kynne: Ye are only dodding the people.

Mr. Curran said if there was any question of irregularity, the auditor would see it.

Col. Lannon: Will it ever effect the rates. When we were talking about that £17,000 that you get £17,000 that would not cost the ratepayers anything.

Mr. Hally said the statement made at the time was that the £17,000 would not effect the rates. That was correct.

Col. Lannon said the net effect was that the ratepayers would eventually have to pay

## COLR. CURRAN RE-ELECTED CHAIRMAN

Mr. Charles Curran (F.F.) said they now had two proposals and two seconders, but they would have to take the Council at the annual meeting on Monday last. This will be his fifth term of office.

Proposing Mr. Curran's election, Col. D. F. Madden said he saw no reason why they should not carry on as before. He felt Mr. Curran should carry on for the last year of this five year term. Col. M. Harty seconded.

Col. F. Roche said it was only fair that a party member should nominate Mr. Curran. He being one of the oldest members present felt it was his privilege to do so, and he had great pleasure in proposing Mr. Curran for the last year of the term. Over the past four years he had given all members an opportunity of expressing their views at all times, and in that respect they should have no complaints. Col. H. R. Dowd said he had great pleasure in seconding the proposal.

Mr. J. G. Dowling (Secretary) said they now had two proposals and two seconders, but they would have to take the Council at the annual meeting on Monday last. This will be his fifth term of office.

### RE-ELECTED VICE-CHAIRMAN

Also on the proposal of Col. Madden, seconded by Col. Harty, the outgoing vice-Chairman, Mr. Norman Walsh, was unanimously re-elected.

Mr. Walsh thanked the members for re-electing him un-animously, and when called on to act would do so to the best of his ability. That, however, would be seldom, because of the Chairman's excellent attendance record.

## COUNCIL TO ACQUIRE HOUSES AT SCRAMMIEN'S LANE

Dungarvan Urban Council is other development other than to acquire the houses at Scrammiens Lane by means of the Compulsory Order Act, and if negotiations with tenants in Thomas Street are not satisfactorily completed they will do likewise in respect of those houses.

At the monthly meeting of the Council on Friday night last the Town Clerk, Mr. P. J. Doyle, said that the County Medical Officer and Urban Engineer had indicated that no other development other than housing should be permitted in those areas. All 42 houses would be sold and while a large number of them had agreed no prices were stated. The County Manager has decided to get an auctioneer to assess and value them. Finally it was decided to issue a compulsory order for acquisition of the Scrammiens Lane houses and negotiate for the Thomas Street ones.

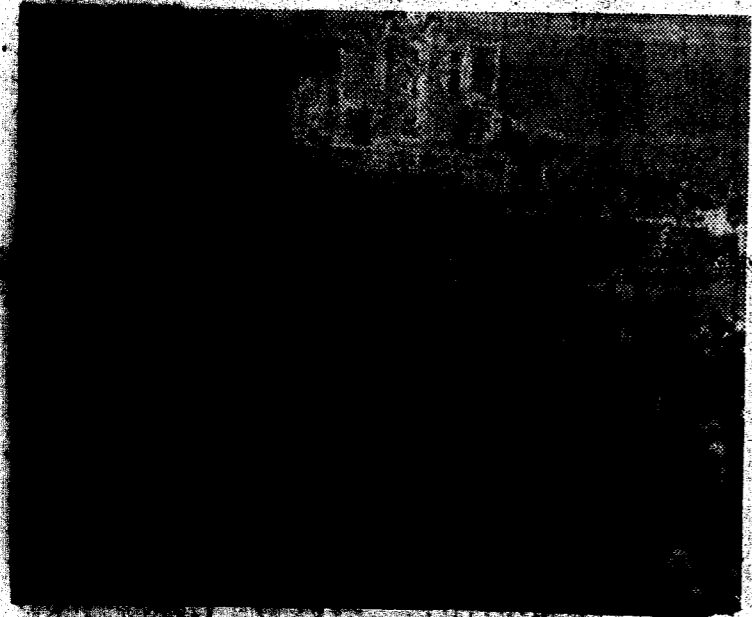

## £2,000 FOR WORK ON CUNNIGAR

On the proposal of Col. M. Harty, seconded by Col. W. Dowd, Waterford County Council has decided to spend a further £2,000 on the protection work at the Cunnigar, subject to a State grant of £1,600.

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**"DON'T TOUCH CAUSEWAY BRIDGE" Lismore Again Favoured for Library H.Q.**

Because the reaction of the local Councillors was not favourable, a suggestion by the County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Hally that the Causeway Bridge linking Dungarvan and Abbeyside be replaced, was adjourned at a meeting of Waterford County Council on Monday.

In a detailed report Mr. Hally stated: "The growth of traffic on the Water-Dungarvan-Youghal road in recent years has been very considerable and shows no signs of diminishing. There is a bottleneck in the town of Dungarvan in the shape of the Causeway bridge. It is narrow and virtually has no footpaths and is severely humpbacked to the extent that it is impossible when approaching from either side to see what traffic is coming from the opposite direction.

"For these reasons I consider that the replacement of the bridge is necessary and essential to orderly development and the safe passage of traffic, both vehicular and pedestrian on this road. I am aware that this bridge has no record of fatal accidents or even serious ones over a number of years but I feel that it would be to say the least unwise to await the event of such an accident before taking action. There is no doubt in my mind but that the bridge needs to be replaced and I recommend that the matter be referred to a consulting engineer.

Deputy Kyne said he would get Mr. Hally arrested and move that bridge. Two passages could be laid out from it for as little as £1000 for the pedestrians, leaving the roadway free from traffic. He would not advise the County Engineer to destroy the finest one-eyed bridge in Ireland.

**Dissatisfied with Dept's Reply**

A reply from the Department to a resolution sent objecting to a reduction in the County road improvement grant for the current year, was read at a meeting of the County Council in Dungarvan on Monday last.

The letter stated: "Reductions would be made in the amounts of County road improvement grants in the case of counties where road progress had reached an advanced stage."

Colr. Lannon said thousands and thousands of pounds had been squandered in the county on roads in the past few years. Colr. M. Harty said he was entirely dissatisfied with the Department's letter stating the county roads in Waterford were in an advanced stage of repairs. They cut the grant for the county roads and increased the Main road grant. He would stand by the people who were slaves in this county and had to travel on roads that were covered in muck and slush. I propose, he said, that we request the Department to refund us the money they cut in the county road grant.

This proposal was agreed to.

**WATERFORD WANTS ITS OWN MANAGER**

A resolution by Kilkenny Co. Council asking that the Counties Kilkenny and Waterford should cease to be grouped counties for the purposes of the County Management Act, 1940 to 1955, was unanimously adopted at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

Colr. T. Lannon said they should have the one Manager for the County and City of Waterford.

The County Manager, Mr. S. J. Moynihan, said if it was decided to have a separate Manager they would have to pay all the Manager's salary, whereas at present Kilkenny and Waterford jointly shared the cost.

Colr. Madden said it was a magician and not a manager you would want to look after two counties.

Mr. Galgley said they should have a manager of their own.

Colr. Lannon said it would be money well spent, because he could look after the staff. How could engineers get £450 a year travelling expenses, he asked, and have six weeks holidays. The expenditure and purchases should be looked after and he proposed they have their own manager.

Colr. W. Dower seconded. The proposal was unanimously agreed to.

**WILL LEASE LAND FOR £10 A YEAR**

At last Friday's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council it was decided to lease to Mr. St. Leger, Council property at Davitt's Quay, for the purpose of extending his newly acquired Garage premises at a rate of £10 an acre.

Colr. Lannon said £10 was a very small sum.

Colr. T. Lee suggested they adjourn the matter to the next meeting to allow members discuss it further. Colr. John McCarthy seconded.

Colr. R. Walsh proposed they lease the property for the £10 and this was carried by four votes to three.

**Newspaper Article Criticised**

DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL at its monthly meeting on Friday night last unanimously decided to sell a five acre site at Springmount to the Arrow Manufacturing Co., Denver, Colorado, for the purpose of establishing a factory on the site. The purchase price is £200 an acre plus legal costs—exactly what it cost the Council when they bought it from Waterford Health Authority.

When the matter arose Colr. Richard Walsh referred to an article which appeared in another local paper last week and asked if it was correct that they were selling this site for £200 an acre after purchasing it for £500 an acre.

The Chairman, Deputy Kyne, said that in the past he had put up with a lot of criticism but his personal opinion of this newspaper article was that it was sabotage of the Council and those that were trying to bring an industry to the town. It was well known he said that the Urban Council decided to seek the land from Waterford Health Authority as a site for an industry if they could get one. They did not almost definite and it would give employment to 100 adults. He deplored anything that would effect the bringing of that industry to the town. Many urban areas were even giving land free for factories, and they were not doing this. He did not think there was anything wrong in letting the land for what it had cost them plus legal expenses. He thought that was a very good bargain for them. They could, of course, have offered to switch the site to Abbeyside where they had land but it would mean long travelling for most of the workers in wind and weather for most of the year. The factory representatives had seen the site at Springmount and were satisfied with it and he deplored any kind of criticism that might be detrimental to their efforts to get the industry. The factory might be for an approach made by him to have any objections to the whole matter withdrawn, and he was proud of what he did.

Colr. Lannon said there was too much talk about these factories coming to Dungarvan. It would be a blessing if they got them but with all the talk they might meet clever men in other towns who would try to cut away from them the factories they hoped to get.

**WILL NOT SPEND £10,000 ON LIBRARY BOOKS**

A proposal by Deputy T. A. Kyne, seconded by Colr. F. Roche that they approve of the borrowing of £10,000 for the new library books was defeated by 11 votes to 9 at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Co. Council.

The County Librarian, Mrs. Hayes, said she was asking the Council for £10,000—£5,000 for non-fiction books and £5,000 for juvenile books. It would be less than a penny increase in the £1 on the rates.

Colr. Dowd proposed they adjourn it until they heard from An Comhairle Leabharlanna with regard to their resolution about the headquarters in the county.

Deputy Kyne proposed they approve of the borrowing of the money and this was defeated 11-9.

**Deputy Kyne Re-elected U.D.C. Chairman**

DEPUTY T. A. KYNE (Labour) was unanimously re-elected Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council, at last Friday's annual meeting. The outgoing vice-chairman Mr. R. Walsh (Fine Gael) was unanimously re-elected.

Deputy Kyne was proposed by Colr. Thomas Lee and seconded by Colr. John McCarthy, whilst Colrs. J. Butler and McCarthy proposed and seconded Mr. Walsh respectively.

Colr. Walsh said that in Deputy Kyne they had the best Chairman in the country. He was always present at their meetings, and looked after the affairs of the Council and town excellently.

Deputy Kyne thanked the members for re-electing him for the final year of the present term. He also thanked Mr. Walsh for his remarks, and added, "It is all part of my duty."

When re-elected, Colr. Walsh thanked the members, and said if called on to take over the chair he would do so to the best of his ability.

Mrs. Hayes asked if the Council would consider putting up the entire £20,000 that was required.

Colr. Dowd said they would put up £10,000 and they would prefer to forego the £10,000 in grants and put it all up rather than give in to dictatorship.

Colr. Foran said in view of all that had been said he would now withdraw his proposal to adjourn the matter.

A vote was then taken on Deputy Kyne's amendment and was defeated by 14 votes to 6.

#### SALMON FISHING

Last week there was a considerable falling off in the catches of salmon and peale in Youghal Harbour and bay while further upriver the fish are very numerous. Catches in Ardmore, Ballycotton and Knockadon are still very poor now in the last month of the netting season. In the fresh water portion of the district, peale are very numerous, especially from Mallow upwards. However, in the Fermoy Ballyduff area fishing is very bad and this is said to be due to discoloration of the river as a result of sand and gravel washing above Fermoy. It has been reported that anglers, for both salmon and coarse fish given up as the river's condition was unfavourable to angling.

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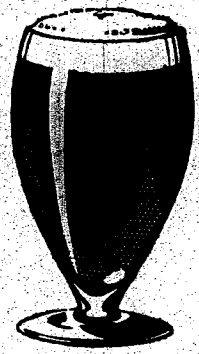
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**KILMAC NOTES**

According to the ancient "life" which we may regard as having been cast in its present form about the 12th century, Declan first saw the light of day at Drumroe, Cappoquin and that he received Christian baptism, upbringing and instruction. All this presupposes the existence of a Christian community in Waterford, a quarter of a century before the preaching of Patrick. A priest named Coleman is stated to have baptised the infant Coleman; afterwards, became a bishop, and local tradition has associated him with the church of Kilmacoman in the present Old Parish. Nothing now survives of Kilmacoman Church, but its former site is well known as is the thorn bush which overshadowed the Holy Well.

Unfortunately, we have hardly any details of Declan's work. His ancient biographers were so intent on editing their holy patron that they have forgotten to draw a picture of the man. The biographers have succeeded in exhibiting the saint as largely a pious disciple of the Cross. All this is, however, according to the 12th century notion of religious biography.

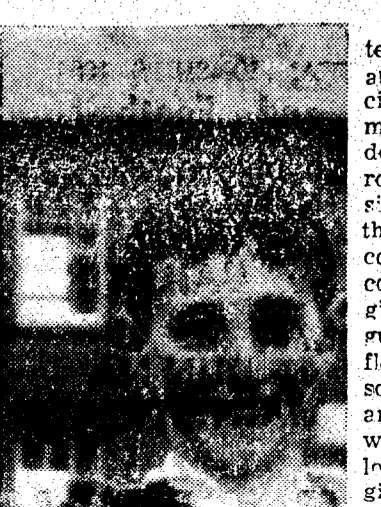
Twice to date these sides have met. The first game ended all square after a great tussle but Mitchels were below form in the next clash and

With a nattendance of thirty-two members, Madam President opened our June Guild meeting. A long list of items on the agenda were discussed in detail.



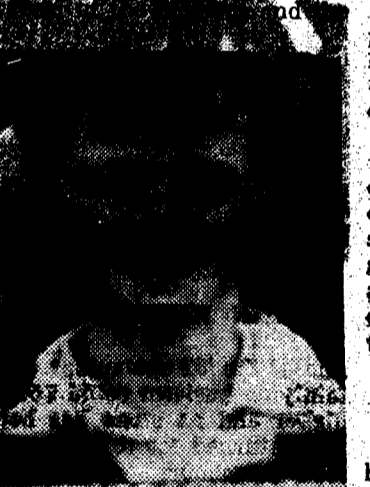

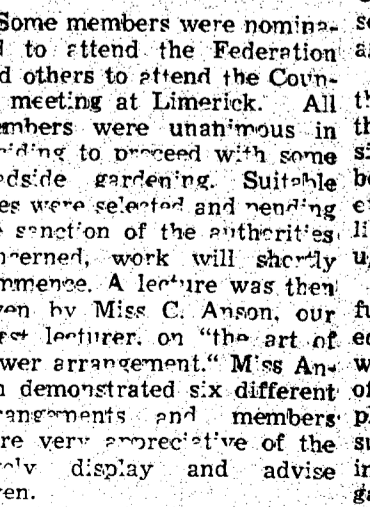

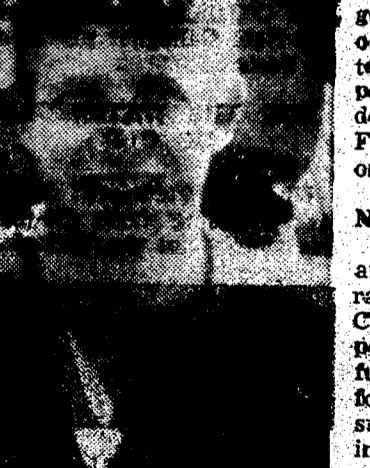

SHEEP SCAB MUST BE WIPED OUT

There are, still some cases of sheep scab in this country, and it is essential that every vestige of this disease be wiped out. An intensive eradication campaign is being undertaken this year to ensure as far as possible the dipping of all sheep within the prescribed dipping period.

As a necessary preliminary to this campaign, a survey of all existing sheep dipping facilities was commenced last year. Results to hand indicate the necessity for repairs to many baths, both public and private, and, in some cases, for the erection of new baths. When the survey has been completed, a scheme for the subsidisation of the erection of new baths by local authorities in areas where additional facilities are needed will be introduced.

It was a comeback made all the more spectacular by its complete unexpectedness and as Waterford mercilessly battered Cork's defensive rampart in those dying moments, the huge Cork following must have awaited the final whistle with agonising patience.

### TOILED

In fact the "diamond" of the side—centre-back, midfield and centre forward, toiled and laboured fruitlessly for practically the entire hour. Inevitably the disadvantages that emanated from lack of supremacy in these vital sectors took its toll, and in the final analysis went a long way towards costing the county its place in yet another provincial decider.

Cork, on the other hand were adequate in most sectors, without being particularly brilliant in any way. They were superbly fit, which allied to their youthfulness gave them an advantage that they utilised well, and one feels that we have not seen the best of them by a long shot yet.

### WIDE OPEN

The opening half, although

Toiling as they were at midfield Cheasty took over at partner to John Ahearne with John O'Brien moving to centre forward. Almost immediately they were again in front when a Grimes centre was doubled on by Seamus Power and again keeper Barry was taking the ball from the net behind him. But Cork were not to be denied and Gallagher had their second goal in the 18th minute when his 40 yard lob was badly misjudged by goalkeeper Flynn and wound up in the rigging. But six minutes before the break, Jimmy Byrne levelled matters when he pointed directly from a "70", and at the half-way stage the sides were still level at 2-3 each.

Waterford restarted with a flourish and after Frankie Walsh missed near goal, a drive that seemed certain to go over for a point, frustratingly came back off an upright. Gerry Sullivan and Grimes (free) exchanged minors, but a goal from a 21-yards free by Patsy Harte in the 5th minute sparked off an era of ascendancy that paved the way for the Cork victory. Between the 11th and 19th minutes Sullivan, Gallagher and Bennett reeled off points and a further

goal and point by Harte and Gallagher respectively gave the Leesiders what looked like an unassailable ten point lead entering the closing quarter. But tradition dies hard in Waterford where it has existed for so long and the Deise men as champions, refused to allow their hard-won title to slip from them without a worthy fight. In the 20th minute Grimes fired over a close-in free and within a minute Mick Flannely's overhead flick ended up in the net. Cork had a point by Hayes in the 24th minute but within another minute Phil Grimes was on hand to tap home a goal after Barry had only batted the ball away.

Then more pronounced than ever before became John Meaney's presence on the pitch. In the 26th minute he commenced a dazzling solo run from midfield that he culminated with a crashing drive that nearly tore the rigging from its moorings. Nor was he finished his work of devastation and a point from 60 yards by the Erin's Own man left the sides level in a now enthralling game.

### HARTE'S GOLDEN POINT

Then came Harte's golden point from a free, and in the dying seconds Grimes was narrowly off target with a placed ball from fifty yards. The hour had run its course; the shrill blast of referee Fitzgerald's whistle signalled the end, and Cork's deserved one point victory ensured a change of champions in the Province this year.

Cork's victory has long been awaited in the county, and they can acclaim several of Sunday's top-rate performers.

Their full backs, Doolin O'Riordan and Murphy gave nothing away soft, but it was the power hurling of their half-back trio of Terry Mahoney, Mick McCarthy and Pat Fitzgerald that took the major defensive honours.

Gerry O'Sullivan reigned supreme at midfield for most of the hour, and must surely be given the honour of Cork's "man of the match." His partner John Hayes was an industrious if unspectacular aide.

The Cork attack relied for the most part on their speed of foot to outwit the Deise defence, and whilst their full-forwards were played out of it, the half-forwards, Patsy Harte, John O'Halloran and particularly Noel Gallagher picked off the decisive scores.

### NOT THE WATERFORD OF OLD

What of Waterford? Except for the closing stages the team was simply not the Waterford

of old, and it might turn out that this defeat could mark the end of the road for some. All four championship debutants—Pat Flynn, Tommy and John Hearne and John O'Brien seemed over-awed by the occasion, and played below normal form. Goalkeeper Flynn seemed particularly unnerved and it was somewhat surprising that the experienced Ned Power was not called upon for the second-half.

The full-line of defence did all in its power to avert defeat, and both Tom Cunningham and Austin Flynn turned in proverbial blinders. Martin Og Morrissey was also the master of Mick Archer, and when moved to centre-half in the latter stages of the game, proceeded to outplay John O'Halloran. Of the half backs, only Jimmy Byrne emerged with distinction. Larry Guinan surprisingly allowed Gallagher the world of freedom, whilst Tommy Ahearne never appeared happy in the middle of the line.

Putting it bluntly, midfield

was a washout from the start. Neither John O'Brien nor John Hearne were up to standard, and it was a pity John Meaney was not introduced earlier in the game. When he did come in he nullified Sullivan's brilliance and scored 1-1 during his brief period of duty.

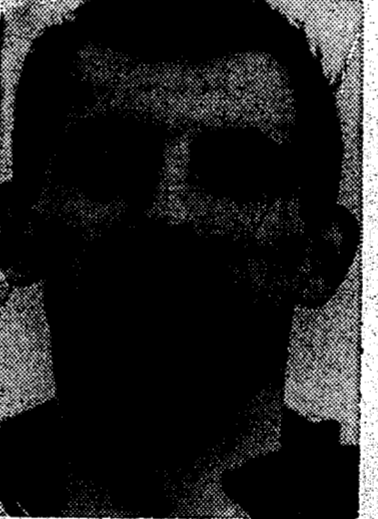
