## ARBITRATION FOR PSYCHIATRIC NURSES

AT a special meeting of Waterford Health Authority held on Tuesday last the proposal of the Minister for Health to submit to arbitration the pay dispute involving psychiatric nurses was discussed.

The Acting Secretary, Mr. F. Money, explained that the Waterford Health Authority nurses in question had rejected the Labour Court award and full claim was allowed it would cost £30,000 p.a. Mr. T. Lannon strongly criticised the action of the psychiatric nurses and said they had acted in a dictatorial manner with a total disregard for the interests of the sick and the poor. The decision of the Labour Court should be final and binding. The nurses in question were already well paid. Mr. N. Walsh said that the officials concerned had, by threatening strike action, held a pistol to their heads. They should not submit to such a threat. Mr. M. Galgey said that the Labour Court award was reasonable. Mr. J. Griffen said that to avoid hardship to patients the nurses had agreed to arbitration. They (the nurses) were entitled to demand their rights. Mr. T. Gallagher said that the nurses were not overpaid, and they had acted in a reprehensible manner in agreeing to the Minister's proposal to submit the dispute to arbitration. Mr. J. Griffen proposed and Mr. D. F. Madden seconded, that arbitration be agreed to. The voting on the proposal was as follows: For—Messrs. J. Griffen, D. F. Madden, J. Power, P. Browne, E. Browne, F. Roche, W. Kenneally, T. Gallagher (8); Against—Messrs. T. Lannon, N. Walsh, C. Curran, M. Galgey, W. Foran (5).

When the vote had been taken, Mr. Foran described it as a "victory for the city members" and Mr. Gallagher reported that "the County Council members have a majority on this body and several of them are absent today."

MORE FUNDS NEEDED FOR POLIO

The Central Remedial Clinic, founded by Lady Goulding and Miss Kathleen O'Rourke, has for many years pioneered services for Ireland's disabled. Sheltered employment, the latest contribution to these services, is now a little over one year old, and an extension of the Clinic at Goatstown, just completed, has made available more space for this project.

Yet, while this will absorb a number from the long waiting list, the Clinic must continue to plan and extend help to the infinitely larger of disabled, eager to work and prove themselves, but obliged to sit at home and wait.

The Sheltered Workshop is just one of the many activities in the Clinic's expanding programme for victims of poliomyelitis and other crippling diseases. The Clinic transports its patients to and from their homes; it provides specialised treatment in physiotherapy, occupational therapy, remedial gymnastics, hydrotherapy; it provides meals, education and eventually, placement in useful employment. All this activity is carried on daily under the constant supervision and direction of the Medical Director.

The Clinic is financed from voluntary subscriptions. It is doing worthwhile work. It deserves your support, so please give as generously as you can. Remember, that even the smallest sum can help the Clinic to help others.

**SALMON SEASON ENDS**

At midnight on Friday last, July 31st, the season for salmon fishing by all kinds of nets and stake weirs came to an end and as far as can be ascertained, without the actual returns, it must be rated as a very successful season. On the whole, the salmon at various parts of the six months were scarce, but those captured were of good average weight and the price held well right up to the end of the season. The peale or grilse were late in showing up, but when they did arrive, they made up for any deficiency in the salmon catches. Last week the peale were rather slack with many boats, while others finished up well. In addition, the price obtained for the month remained the same, i.e., 3/6 for grilse and 5/- for salmon up to 10lbs.

Early in the year the upriver drift nets had a rather lean time, and here the draft nets did exceptionally well. This year peale were seen and taken as far up as Rathmore, Co. Kerry, which was very unusual and not anglers from Fermoy upwards are having good catches. Rod angling is permitted right up to September 30th. It is understood that this year the number of visiting anglers has been greater than ever. Fishermen in the tidal area are now cleaning and dismantling their nets to be refitted for the 1965 season.

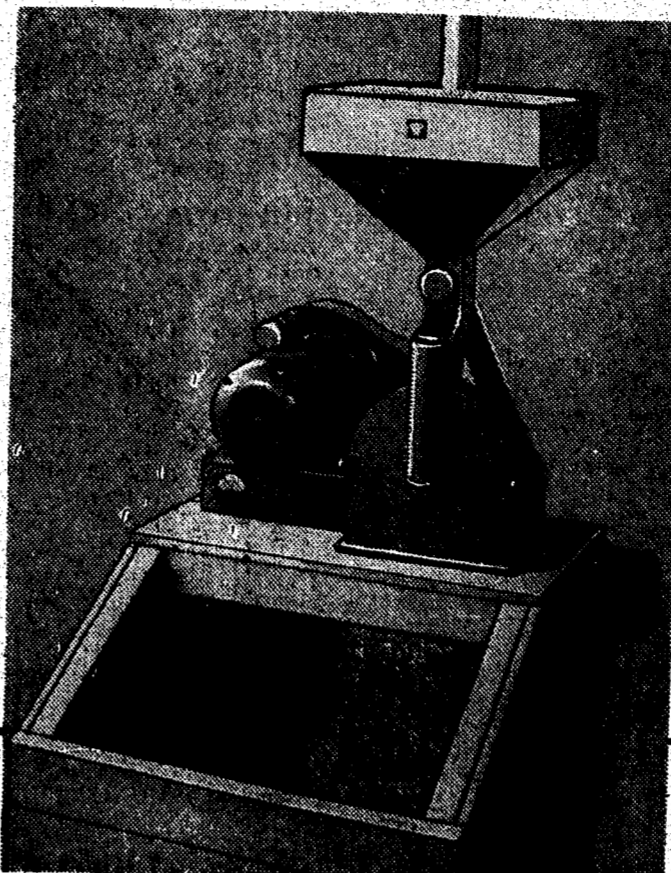
**Late Mrs. Kathleen Power**

**ROBBERS FAILED TO SHOW UP**

At 12.45 on Wednesday an anonymous phone call was received at Dunganvar Creamery stating the premises would be robbed in twenty minutes. Naturally the management took the necessary precautions to deal with such a situation but the robbers failed to put in an appearance at the appointed time or since.

**Sequel To Controversial Game**

A meeting of the West Waterford G.A.A. Board was held on Tuesday night last, and among the games discussed was the controversial Tourin v. Cappoquin game, and which resulted in a number of players being suspended.

When the referee's report of the Tourin v. Cappoquin game was read, some time elapsed before it was adopted due to a Tourin delegate's assertion that it was not accurate.

The report stated that M. Lacey (Cappoquin) was ordered off for rough play and as he was leaving the pitch he was struck on the head by a Tourin player. When some of the Cappoquin players were lifting him from the ground, they were attacked by some of the Tourin players, who used their hurleys in a dangerous manner, and in fairness to Cappoquin they were forced to defend themselves.

He said that at this stage he considered calling off the game and were it not for the assistance he got from the Chairman of the Western Board, who helped him to restore order, he

would have been forced to do so. Reporting on the rest of the match, he said that he ordered O. Wilkinson and J. O'Gorman of Tourin to the line for striking their opponents. He said that there was no sportsmanship displayed by these teams at any stage and refereeing it was almost impossible. Every decision he made, he said, was disputed, and his umpires and himself were subjected to threats and abuse throughout the game.

He also noted the abuse and insulting behaviour of J. O'Gorman to the Chairman of the Board, who was helping to restore order. He also reported S. Murray for his behaviours during the game.

L. Doocoy said the report was not accurate, as Lacey did not go off immediately when sent off, and he did not fall to the ground when struck.

The Chairman said that he saw the game and the referee had described it very fairly and accurately.

Rev. Fr. Farrell (Kilgobinet) said that he was not at the game but from very reliable

people he had been told that it was disgraceful and disgusting the way some of the players behaved. He said for weeks after, it was being talked of from one end of the county to the other. He said that the referee's report was substantially correct, and that the maximum penalties should be applied. He spoke about the duties and responsibilities of the members who had seen the game. He regretted that he had not seen the game, as they he would be in a position to propose suitable action.

The report was then adopted and the Chairman asked for the views of the meeting. When he got none, he read the report paragraph by paragraph and when there were still no comments, he said he was sorry to see that members were now reluctant to discuss the matter. He said that the affair could not be more serious and the Board had to discharge their responsibilities. "Did anyone think that the teams should be penalised or censured?" he asked. He then commented here on the extraordinary silence with which the report was being treated.

and said that if the Board delegates shirked their duty, then he would do it himself.

L. Doocoy said that after the first flare up the game was as quiet as anyone would wish to see.

Chairman—I was not. I saw the game and it was the worst display of bad sportsmanship that one could see.

D. McGrath (Affane)—I saw the game and it was the worst I ever saw. There was no sportsmanship and I wouldn't single out one team more than the other. The referee's report was accurate.

P. Kennelly said he was not at the game and anyone who was not should not propose anything. Reports often made things worse than they really were.

J. Cunningham (Tallow) said he was surprised now at all the silence after all the talk they had heard about the game. He said that the people who were elected at the Convention should be here to deal with it.

Chairman—Everyone has the same responsibility.

A FAIR ADMISSION The Chairman then said that the referee was unable to

name the player who struck M. Lacey, he was now putting the onus on Tourin to do so. If they did not, he said, the player would be named anyway.

L. Doocoy said the finger of suspicion was beginning to point now, but he was admitting that he was the one who struck M. Lacey. He said he did so because Lacey had struck his brother with his hurley. "I got struck on the head with a hurley," he said "and only for I had been wearing a cap at the time. I'd still be in hospital." He then complained that this was not in the report.

J. Cunningham said that this was a fair admission.

The Chairman then asked for a proposition and when a member proposed six months, he said that he would not accept it.

D. McAllister then proposed 12 months and this was seconded.

After the Chairman said that he would not accept a lesser penalty as even this was lenient, there were no other propositions and a 12 months suspension was imposed.

L. Doocoy complained about the suspension and said that others should get the same penalty.

Chairman—We must impose penalties when they are deserved, otherwise someone else must take over.

When J. O'Gorman's case was being dealt with, he said that he did not mean to hit the player and in fact he only struck the player's hurley after he had been struck himself.

W. Grant proposed 2 months suspension.

The Chairman said he saw the incident and while he would accept that the element of intent might not have been present, he would not accept a proposal of two months.

Rev. Fr. Farrell then proposed six months and this was seconded.

D. McAllister proposed three months. This was seconded and carried.

When J. O'Gorman's case was being dealt with, O. Wilkinson said that J. O'Gorman had been put off in the wrong and even the newspapers said this.

On the proposition of T. Walsh, a 3 months suspension was also imposed on J. O'Gorman.

When dealing with the concluding paragraph of the report the Chairman gave an account of the behaviour of J. O'Gorman and S. Murray of Tourin. He said it was putting it mildly to say that their language was unparliamentary and as Chairman of the Board, he felt ashamed to be present during the reported incident. He said he was invited to their rooms after the game to accept an apology, but he had declined to do so as it was the Board more than himself who had been rebused and insulted.

D. McAllister proposed three months.

Chairman—I won't accept this as it is much less than the minimum.

Rev. Fr. Farrell then proposed 12 months and W. Grant seconded.

The Chairman said that this was the minimum he would accept. In the case of S. Murray, Tourin, it was agreed he was responsible for an amount of trouble, and the Chairman ruled that he be banned from sidelines for two years.

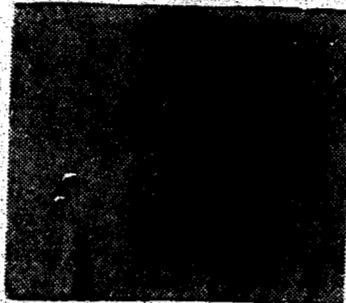

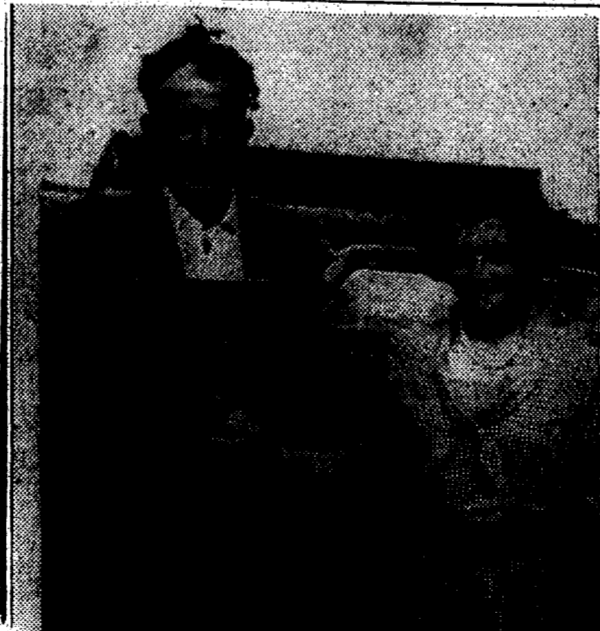
