will follow. The water events start around 5 p.m. The official opening will be performed by Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D.

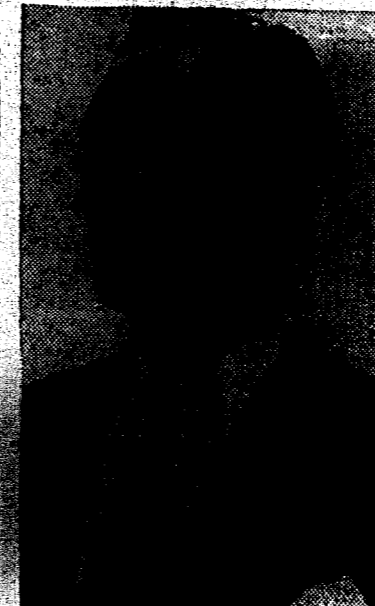

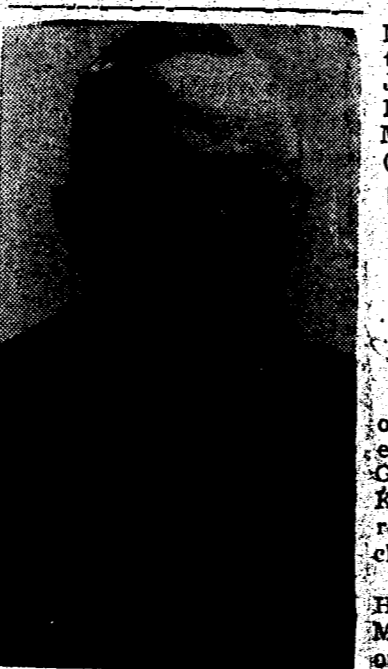

### DEATH OF GEORGE C. KIELY

BALLINABANOGUE, KILMACKTHOMAS

A great gloom was cast over Ballinabanogue and a very wide district at the announcement of the death of George C. Kiely which sad event occurred on Monday morning, August 17th, at Ardkeen General Hospital after a brief illness. He was a well-known figure in the county of his birth for his good-humoured wit and jovial manner and his capabilities as newspaper columnist and poet. He also served his country well in the fight for independence and was a great lover of the games of the Gael.

Widespread sympathy is extended to his wife, family and relatives on their very great loss.

His removal took place on Monday evening to Kilmuckridge Church followed by a very large and representative cortege. Very Rev. J. Harty, P.P., received and blessed the remains.

Following Requiem Masses on Wednesday morning the interment was made in the adjoining family plot. Very Rev. Fr. Harty, P.P., assisted by Rev. Fr. Barrett, C.C., officiated at the graveside.

The chief mourners were: Mrs. Mary Kiely (wife); Master John Kiely (son); Miss Judith Kiely (daughter); Mrs. B. Clayton, Mallow (sister); Mr. James Kiely, England (brother). (Kiely & Sons, Dungarvan had charge of funeral arrangements).

### AN APPRECIATION

On Wednesday of this week, one of journalism's most talented sons in the person of George Kiely, Ballinabanogue, Kilmackthomas, was laid to rest in Kilmuckridge's historic churchyard.

George died in Ardkeen Hospital in the early hours of Monday morning last, after only a brief illness and at a comparatively young age.

From boyhood, George's love for journalism was obvious. He was truly gifted with the pen and developed a distinctive style as the years went on. He was one of the Pigeon-based correspondents for several of the well-known Cross-Channel papers, and up to the time of his death was the "Observer's" much appreciated Kilmackthomas correspondent. His flow of journalistic lan-

guage was positively superb and he could phrase the most difficult of subjects with an appropriateness that was to be envied.

Awaiting Gabriel's clarion call (as he himself would say) with so many of the friends he loved so well, every homestead east and west of the Mahon will truly miss him. To his bereaved family and relatives we extend our deepest sympathy.

**KILL 1-6; VALLEY ROVERS 0-3**

VALLEY ROVERS, first round conquerors of county champions, Brickey Rangers, made their exit from the senior football championship at rain drenched Dungarvan

Putting it mildly, Sunday last was not a day that was in any way conducive to good football. In fact such was the state of the pitch after the Kilrossanty-Emmetts game, and with the rain continuing to come down in torrents, I felt, and many others also, that the game should not have been played. But Valleys were I believe, insistent that the game go on as scheduled, a decision that in itself contributed in some way to their championship dismissal.

Admittedly neither side relished the conditions but the Rovers in particular seemed lost with the greasy ball and would surely have fared immeasurably better on a dry sod.

And yet, despite the adverse conditions it was a game that produced many excellent passages of football. Indeed the pity of it all was that the weatherman wasn't seen in a kinder vein, for this I believe would have been a classical epic if played under favourable conditions.

That Kill deserved their victory on the day however, goes without saying. Never once during the hour were they in arrears and contrary to all expectations had little difficulty in staving off the Valleys when they had the assistance of the strong second half wind.

Indeed the Derrinraun men's near total collapse in that second half was as unexpected as it was complete. For the opening half when playing into the teeth of the elements they had fared as well if not better than even their most ardent followers could have hoped for. At the break they trailed by a mere four points and I for one, considered this an inadequate Kill lead. Then when the Valleys reduced that deficit within a minute of the restart, it looked as though they were going to continue on their giant-killing way. But inexplicably they failed to sustain their challenge and when their defence conceded a simple goal in the third minute of the half, it was obvious they had shot their bolt.

**PLACED RELIANCE ON HALF BACKS**

The Valleys, of course, placed much reliance on their star half-back line of Jimmy Hewitt, Mick Connolly and Billy Acheson. But for once the line was not the all-dominating one it can be, and Acheson alone emerged as one of the stalwarts. Consequently the attack was never as well supplied as against the Rangers in the opening round, and seldom caused anxiety for a supremely confident Kill defence.

Throughout there was an element of needle in the exchanges and referee Paddy Kennelly issued marching orders to Eddie Hewitt and Martin Kennedy following a flare-up in midfield in the 25th minute.

Kill had first use of wind and rain, and within a minute full-forward Noel Power had their first point. In the fourth

minute the same player repeated the act, but Eddie Hewitt opened the Valleys account in the eighth minute when he pointed from a free. Kill then assumed complete mastery and in the 10th, 11th and 12th minutes had points per John Regan, Monty Guiry and Martin Kennedy (free). In the 15th minute Eddie Hewitt pointed another Valleys free but after Noel Power had crashed a drive from eight yards off the cross-bar in the 26th minute, a point by Monty Guiry gave Kill their 0-6 to 0-2 precarious half-time lead.

The Rovers restarted in determined mood and within a minute Pat Cleary had a point from a 21-yard free. But two minutes later a harmless looking lob by Paddy Duggan completely deceived the entire Valley defence and wound up in the net. That score ul-

terly demoralised the losers, who never subsequently looked like averting defeat. Kill were more than content to hang on to their lead, rather than attempt to increase it, and this they did without undue difficulty against opponents whose challenge visibly weakened with the passing minutes.

**SOLD**

Such was the standard of the Valleys attack that the winners' defence looked remarkably solid. Goalkeeper Nick Whelan made a successful return after a rather lengthy absence and Tom Kirwan, Ger Mooney and a tireless "Tucker" Guiry starred in front of him.

Martin Kennedy lorded it over friend and foe at midfield until his dismissal which incidentally seemed somewhat

on Sunday last. Under the most appalling conditions imaginable they had to concede best to Kill, who must now be favourites to regain a title they relinquished twelve months ago.

The Kill attack, led by Monty Guiry, had the backing of intrepid defenders against an uncompromising Valleys defence. Guiry completely outplayed Mick Connolly and repeatedly created opening that were not always availed of. Full forward Noel Power notched two points and was always a danger and of the remainder Mick Regan and Paddy Duggan were best.

**AHESON STARRED**

In the Valleys' defence Billy Acheson performed heroically and to my mind was the best man of the thirty. Goalkeeper Bobby Hewitt made several thrilling saves and full back Johnny Walsh belied his veteran years.

Both Jimmy Hewitt and Mick Connolly were strangely subdued, however, and failed to leave their customary imprint on the game.

At midfield a rampant Pat Cleary earned the major honours for his side. He worked ceaselessly all through, and defeat was certainly no fault of his.

That they failed to score from play is reflection enough on the scoring power of the attack. Eddie Hewitt whilst on, was about the only forward that looked capable of working through for a score, although Liam Bradshaw could not be faulted for want of endeavour.

**Kilkenny's Unimpressive Victory**

Kilkenny ..... 2-9  
Waterford ..... 1-5

Kilkenny, fielding at full strength, scored a merited but unimpressive seven point victory over a depleted Waterford side in a senior hurling challenge at Nowlan Park, Kilkenny on Sunday last. The game which was played in a torrential downpour never reached any great heights and the Noreside fans that braved the elements must have been gravely disappointed at their team's display.

Certainly the Kilkenny men wanted to show vastly improved form on the first Sunday in September if they hope to retain their All-Ireland crown. They faced a Waterford team without seven of its regulars and yet were hard enough pressed to prevail.

Admittedly the weather conditions were a major deterrent to both sides but one can hardly attribute solely the elements as the root cause of Kilkenny's poor display.

The All-Ireland champions had the tonic of a first minute goal, yet they never dictated the exchanges as many expected they would. It soon became apparent that Waterford's experimental fifteen was a match for the homegrown and when Tony Mansfield scored a goal midway through the half, they jumped into a deserved lead. However, the Noresiders soon equalised and a goal from a free by Eddie Keher set them on the road to victory. They tacked on a brace of points and at the interval led by 2-4 to 1-2.

The second half scoring was kept at the minimum by the respective defences. Kilkenny mentors made many personnel and positional switches during

the second moiety, but all to no avail, and with better forward finish the Deise men would have been much closer at the end.

This display must surely cause many headaches for the Kilkenny mentors. Their full line of defence was particularly unsteady whilst a continued loss of form by Eddie Keher is having its repercussions on the attack in general. They were best served on Sunday by Ollie Walsh in goal. Ted Carroll and Pat Henderson in defence, Paddy Moran at midfield and Tommy Walsh and Tom Murphy in attack.

Fighting as they did, an untried team, Waterford did exceedingly well in the circumstances. They were more unskilled to the heavy conditions than Kilkenny, and but for a hesitancy in attack could have made it an even more embarrassing "practice" for the champions.

New goalkeeper P. Sheridan had a capital hour, and Tom Cunningham, Austin Flynn and Larry Guinan were the defensive stars.

The John Moylan - Jimmy Byrne midfield pairing was not the answer to the problem sector, although Moylan was faring promisingly until forced to retire with a facial injury that required stitching.

The forwards lacked real power and should have run up a far greater total. However, veterans Philly Grimes and Mick Flannely were well to the fore but did not get the necessary support.

KILROSSANTY are through to the semi-final of the senior football championship. On Sunday last at the Fraher Field, Dungarvan, they securely booked their passage to the last stage but one, when easily accounting for Emmetts in a one-sided thrill-less encounter that was waged in a torrential downpour.

The scoreline truly indicates just how dominant Kilrossanty were throughout the hour. They reigned supreme in all sectors and the issue was nothing more than a foregone conclusion from an early stage. The Comeragh men stepped up considerably on recent insipid performances adding further to the contention of many that we see the best of them only when the championship is in its closing stages.

From a spectators point of view, however, the fare only rivalled the conditions under which the game was played. The pitch was turned into a veritable quagmire after a tractive minute, making it virtually impossible for participants to serve up a tractive football. But even making due allowances for the appalling conditions, Emmetts display was nothing less than a total disappointment. They floundered all too easily in far too many sectors whilst a complete lack of guile in attack gave many of the Comeragh defenders a virtual "day off."

For a few brief moments early on the game gave promise of a closely fought epic. # Co. Board Meeting

# Tallow Delegate Abused Chairman Suspended Until He Apologises

**EDDIE CUNNINGHAM**, a member of the Tallow G.A.A. Club was suspended at a meeting of the County Board on Monday night last when he abused County Chairman, **Jamie Moloney**, following the ruling out of order of an appeal by the Tallow club against **Lismore** who defeated them in the juvenile hurling championship. Cunningham stands suspended until the Chairman receives a fitting apology from him.

The appeal by the Tallow Club was against the decision of the Western Board who failed to uphold their objection to Lismore's juvenile hurlers, who defeated them in the Western semi-final. In ruling the appeal out of order, Mr. Moloney said Tallow had violated Rule Six, which stated that the signature of the appellants should be attached in Irish.

Mr. Cunningham said they were making a right farce of the rules in Conty Waterford if that was the case. The Chairman was very quick to quote the rules.

Seamus Power (Mount Sion) said he did not think Mr. Cunningham's attitude was enhancing the Tallow case. It should be resented by the Board.

Chairman—My contention is that rule six was violated and I will have to rule the appeal out of order.

Mr. Moloney went on to state that the appeal was lodged because a Lismore player played whilst under suspension. He wanted to make it clear that when such happened a player was entitled to further suspension.

Mr. P. Coffey (Chairman of the Eastern Board) said that having ruled the appeal out of order they could do nothing about the player in question.

Mr. Cunningham then left the meeting in protest and as he left, said: "What can we expect from the Nire Valley, anyway?"

Mr. Moloney—Come back Mr. Cunningham—I will not. Seamus Power said Cunningham was obviously a member of the Tallow Club and he proposed he be sus-

pending for his conduct. The chairman was trying to do his best without being abused and insulted by a Tallow representative.

Mr. N. McGrath seconding, said Cunningham should be suspended unless a fitting apology was forthcoming from him for his conduct.

Mr. Moloney—Unless I get a fitting apology from him he stands suspended from the Gaelic Athletic Association.

## TOURIN APPEALS RULED OUT

An appeal by Jimmy O'Gorman (Tourin) against a 12-month suspension imposed by the Western Board on him following the Tourin-Cappoquin Intermediate hurling championship was also ruled out of order by the Chairman.

O'Gorman was suspended for remarks passed to the Western Board Chairman after the game and was also suspended for three months for being ordered off. The suspensions were to run concurrently.

It is unfortunate that Stradbally should have to concede ground advantage in this decider, but that factor alone should spur them to greater heights and it may not after all, deter them unduly.

The Reds have not enjoyed a great deal of success in this grade in recent years, but the present side is moulded in the very finest Stradbally tradition and an unmistakable confidence is sweeping the Parish at present.

Impressive though they have been in all their Western games to date, it was their defeat of a highly rated Abbeyside team in the Divisional final that really caught the public eye. The Villagers were strongly fancied to take the title but they had no answer to Stradbally's brilliant display and went under by a clear seven points margin.

The Reds undoubtedly possess a fine all round side, but it is the exceptional footballing ability of Co. minors P. Clancy and Joe Curran that may well swing the game in their favour. Good and all as 'Sion may be I cannot see them containing this pair, who will I believe prove the architects of a narrow victory.

A word of warning however, for the Western champions. There are no finer championship battlers than Mount Sion. To have emerged from the Eastern Division was an achievement in itself and led by the wily Stephen Green, are reputed to have a fine side. 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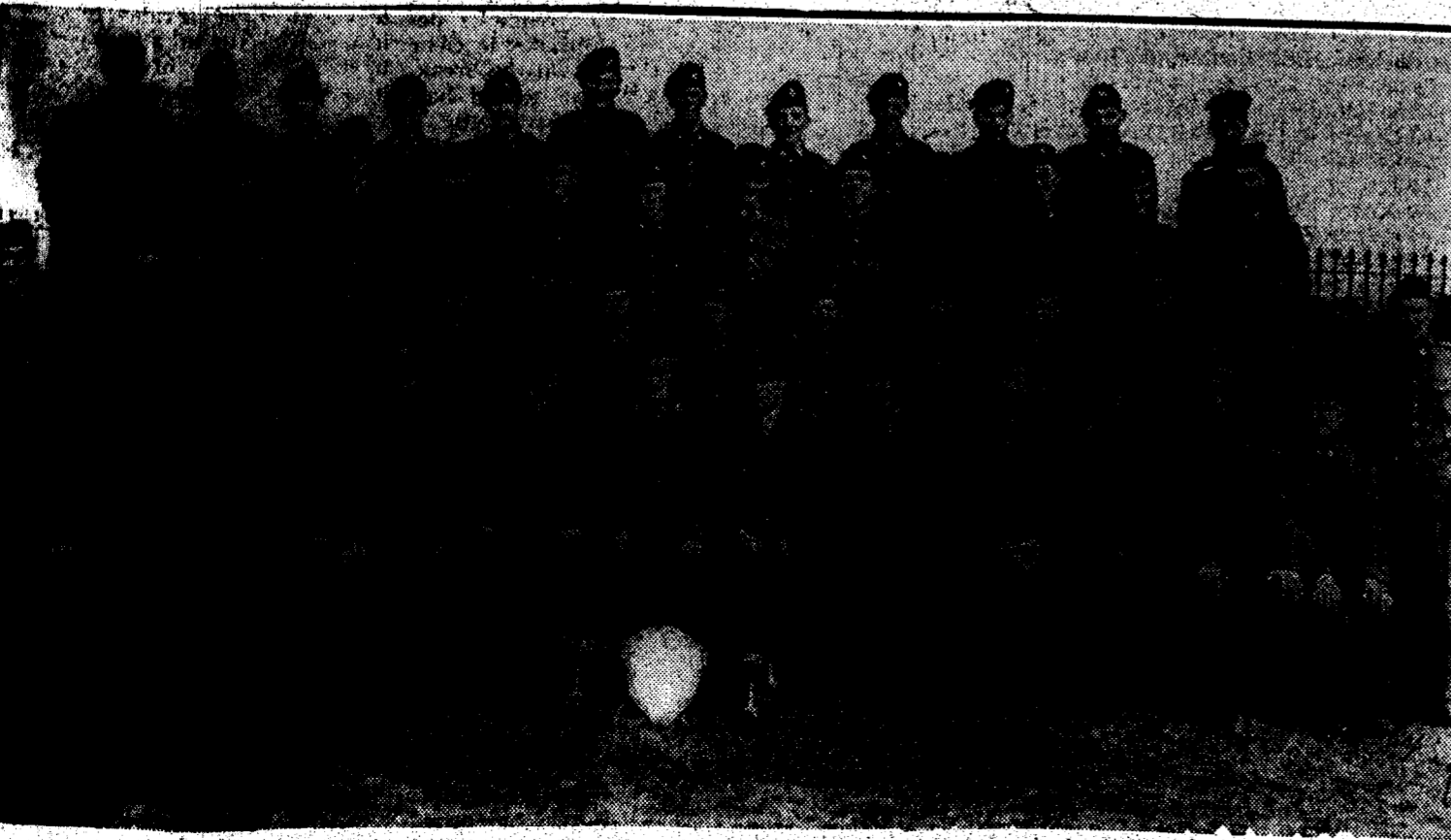

The tenure of office of elected members of the Limerick No. 4 Board of Farming Machinery will expire in October and the Conservators are holding office during the ensuing five years (previous five years) have to be elected. The new regulations provide for postal nomination of the candidates, and postal voting. The present Board have fixed Sept. 15th to be the latest date for receipt of nomination and 1st October as the latest date for receipt of voting papers. Due notice of election will appear in next week's issue of this paper. This new system will facilitate voting by persons who hitherto experienced difficulty in travelling to election centres in Fermoy and Yougal. The holders of full season licences, not and certain Classes of Limerick papers are entitled to vote. After publication of notice of election on 29th August forms of nomination will be obtainable from the Clerk to the Board, Mr. W. J. Sweeney, Office, 11 The Mall, Yougal, from whom persons entitled to vote will receive voting papers. There are twelve seats to be filled by election, six in the Limerick A division and six in the Limerick B division. The twelve elected conservators with nine ex-officio will constitute the new Board whose first meeting will be held in October.

Many counties have not yet met their pledged payments as they felt due this year, and in order to improve the situation the President, Mr. Richard Deasy, has written to every County.

In his letter he pointed out that the future progress of the Association depends largely on finance. For the last two years the N.F.A. National Council has adopted an annual budget under which the year's income and programme are determined. The entire income is expected to be in Central Office by the 30th September, in any year.

A sizeable amount of the money due for the current year has still to come in. Much of this is expected shortly under the Creamery Order Scheme. The balance remains to be collected. In order that no County should default in meeting their individual pledged amount the President, after consultation with the National Hon. Treas. and Assistant Secretary, has decided to ask one individual in each county to act as Finance Liaison Officer, between Central Office and the County Executive. A rigid deadline has been set for the completion of the job at county level—it is the 31st October, 1964. This is necessary since the financial plans for the 1965 Budget must be finalised—before submission to the November Council Meeting—in the light of the funds received by that date.

Meeting all the targets will be a big job but as the President pointed out, it must be tackled now simultaneously by every county because "we all depend on one another."

**NEW LAND BILL UPSETS FARMERS**

The new Land Bill has had a stormy passage since it was first introduced in the Dail on the 11th July, 1963. Government Ministers have shown their irritation at the fact that it was not passed before the Summer recess. It is to be brought up again when the Dail convenes sometime in November.

The Oireachtas Committee of the N.F.A. made a careful study of this Bill when it was published and while the Association welcomes many aspects of it, it disapproves strongly with three or four clauses. The Committee has spared no effort in informing the Government, all Deputies, leaders of public opinion and the farming community of the objectionable sections of the Bill.

Its efforts have met with only partial success so far. Until the offending clauses are omitted or radically changed the N.F.A. will continue its pressure.

Because of the general unrest in farming circles over the implications of the new Land Bill as it now stands a special Council meeting to discuss it will be held in N.F.A. House on Tuesday, 29th Sept. County Executives have been asked, by the General Secretary to discuss this matter fully at a meeting before that date in order to brief their County Representatives. The considered opinion of each county will be sought at the Council Meeting. To facilitate discussions at the County Executive meetings in question, documents have been dispatched to County Secretaries. These include, the Land Bill 1963 (as introduced), Explanatory Memorandum and N.F.A. Observations of the first two are available from the Government Information Sales Office, G.P.O. Arcade, Dublin 1 at a cost of 2/-.

The third is available on request from Central Office. The ultimate form that the Land Bill will take is of vital importance to farmers and a large attendance is expected at the forthcoming meeting. Over the next few weeks mention will be made in these pages of specific items in the Bill and county reactions as reported to Central Office.

**NEED FOR MORE TREES**

Forestry in Ireland is not developing as rapidly as it could and should. Greater expansion at State and more particularly at private level, is desirable and economically sound.

Our needs for timber and timber products are likely to increase substantially in the years ahead and the more we can produce at home the more employment we will be able to give and the less money will need to leave the country. In 1963 imports of timber and timber products cost us over £15m. With increase home production much of this could be saved, because of imported timber is replaceable by Irish timber.

According to a recent survey carried out European timber trends it appears that while Europe was virtually self-sufficient in 1950, it imported 20 million cubic feet more than it exported in 1960 and will likely double that figure by 1965.

In other words it would appear that for some time to come there will be a sellers' market in timber which fact should act as a stimulus to us here in Ireland.

**GRAIN COMMITTEE CALLS FOR INCREASED PRICES**

A resolution calling for increased grain prices, submitted by Kildare County Executive, was unanimously adopted, last week, at the first meeting of the N.F.A. Grain Committee, selected at the 1964 annual general meeting. Members expressed concern at the low prices prevailing and considered it would prove detrimental to the future of cereal growing in the country if prices were not increased. In particular, it was felt that the low prices prevailing for feeding barley offered a very real threat to our having an increase in barley acreage sufficient to meet our growing requirements in the immediate years ahead. It was also agreed that steps should be taken to have wheat and barley prices increased in accordance with the proposals outlined by the Association in the Green Book.

The Chairman, Mr. J. Mullins, in his opening remarks, extended a welcome to the new member on the Committee. There was quite a lengthy agenda for discussion,

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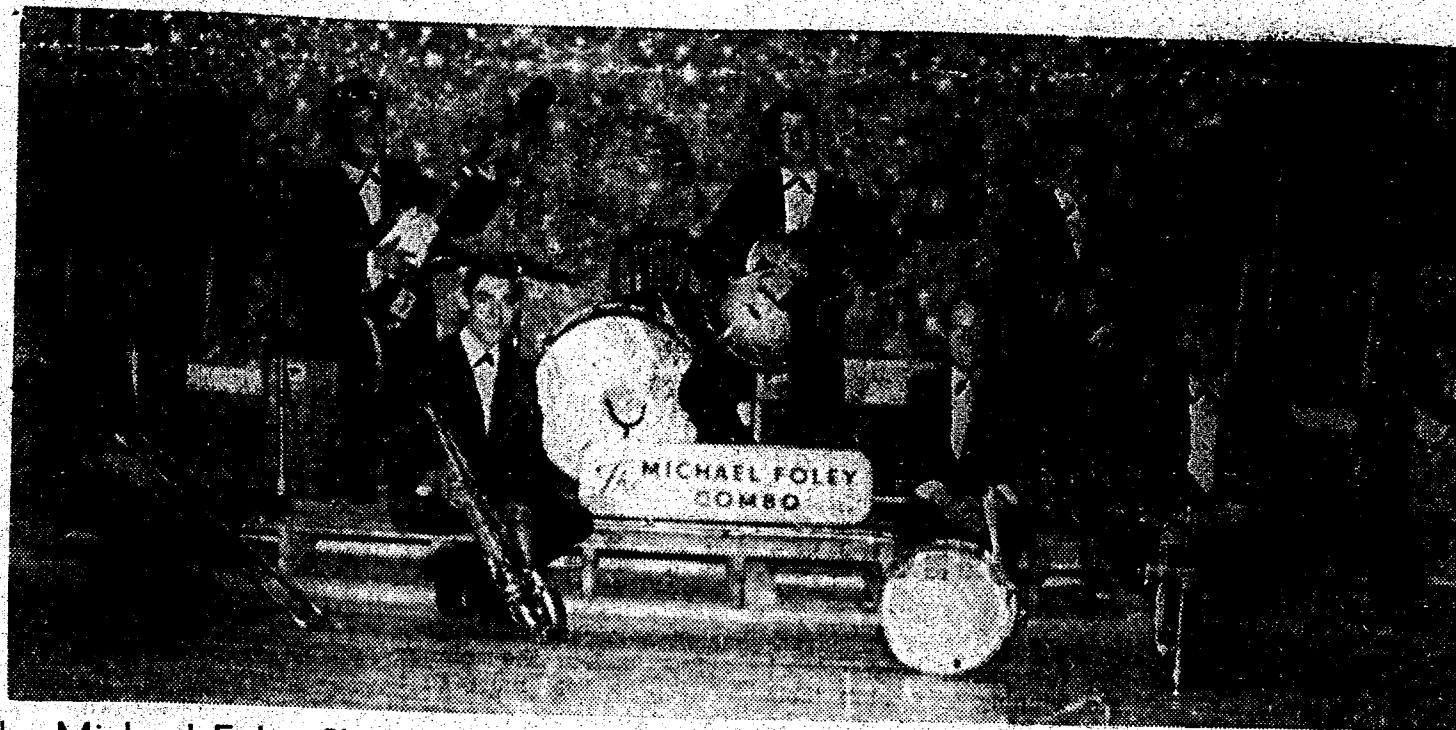

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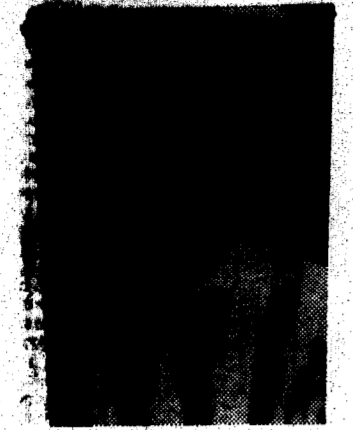

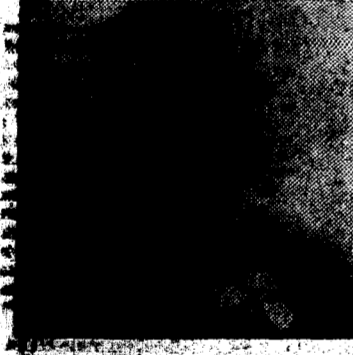

## Shamrocks Fancied at Lismore

**THE** Dungarvan and Lismore venues hold the stage on Sunday next and hurling followers should flock to both where expectant thrillers are down for decision.

The Old Boro venue undoubtedly commands pride of place where Abbeyside and Brickey Rangers provide the all-western pairing in the senior hurling championship semi-final. Up at the Castle Farm grounds the Intermediate standard-bearers of Tourin and Shamrocks do battle for the right to meet Ballyduff in the Divisional decider, whilst the only football tie of the day is at Dungarvan (7.30) between Affane and Kilgobinet in the Junior championship.

Earlier this year few if any could have envisaged the Brickeys and Abbeyside figuring in the penultimate stage of the senior championship. In their respective first round ties both were regarded as rank outsiders and given little chance of reaching the last four. But both tore the form book to little fragments and they figure in Sunday's much-discussed semi-final on merit alone.

Of the two, Abbeyside appear to have the better credentials, and are favourites to qualify for the decider on Sunday. Their performance in scoring an eight-point victory over a star-studded Erin's Own team was meritorious to say the least, and they are expected to be an even more potent combination for this latest encounter. They appear to have the ideal blending of youth and experience and it will come as a major surprise to Village supporters should they fail to justify their favouritism.

Following their defeat of Erin's Own it was feared that overconfidence might well be their greatest enemy but the manner in which the players have responded to the callings of trainer Paddy Langan dispels any suggestions of their being caught napping.

It is indeed strange to see the usually football-minded Brickeys gripped in a hurling fever. But such is now the case and it is doubtful if a Brickey side, irrespective of the code, has trained as diligently as the present hurling side. Ever since they relinquished their football crown at the first defence they have concentrated solely on hurling and a quiet air of confidence pervades the camp for this coming battle. They more than anyone recognise the fact that they are the outsiders, but they approached their first round game under similar circumstances and yet proved the masters of the more fancied men of Fourmilewater.

Although both sets of selectors are delaying team selection until later in the week, few changes are expected from the line-outs that have carried them thus far in the championship. Abbeyside, however, may alter somewhat the composition of their defence as it seems highly probable that a

place will be found for former inter-county player Mick Kiely. The Ballinacourty man only came on in the closing stages of the Erin's Own game but looked so impressive that he would be a decided asset to their defence if fit. I for one expect him to be included in defence on Sunday.

The Village defence is perhaps the strongest sector of the side, including as it does such accomplished performers as Austin Flynn, John McGrath and tenagers Rogie Cashin and Tommy Donovan. Behind them they have a top-class goalkeeper in Pat Enright another member of their minor side and he is unlikely to make the Brickey forwards any presents during the hour.

Midfield duty will in all probability fall on the shoulders of Liam Enright and Denis Flynn and up front the biggest dangers to the Brickey defence may be Donal Whelan, Tony Mansfield Johnny Hogan and the hard hitting Ned Moore at full-forward.

The Brickey defence is an uncompromising one that will not be penetrated easily. Bill Spratt, Wick Walsh, Paul Killgrew and Pat Harty are dour defenders and will be expected to bear the brunt of Abbeyside's attacks.

Tommy Joe Harty's one month suspension expires on Sunday and he is expected to team up with John Woods at midfield and the duels hereabouts will, I believe, have quite a bearing on the outcome.

Against Fourmilewater their attack functioned in precision like manner at times and the key men that day—Tom and Jas. Walsh, Justin Spratt and Frankie Cooney may also cause the Village defence greatest worry.

Although few seem to give the Brickeys a real chance, I cannot visualise this game being a cakewalk for Abbeyside. The Villagers will, I ex-

pect, enjoy a midfield advantage that should be translated into winning scores but their margin of victory may be much smaller than many seem to think.

Then of course, there is the Brickeys great championship tradition. They are never beaten easily in the knockout competition, as proved against Erin's Own not many years ago and they will put up a dogged resistance against Abbeyside on Sunday.

### SHAMROCKS OR TOURIN?

The meeting of Shamrocks and Tourin at Lismore in the Intermediate championship has all the ingredients of a thriller. There are no keener rivals in this grade to-day and certain it is that only an hour's pulsating hurling will make known Ballyduff's opponents in the Western final.

Even before the championship commenced the men from Knockanore were the general fancy to emerge from the Division. To-date they have done nothing to undermine that confidence and have been impressiveness personified en route to this semi-final. But it is accepted in most quarters that they face their greatest test to date in Tourin—an obstacle they are going to find exceedingly difficult to overcome.

For some years past Shamrocks have been knocking at the door of championship success, but this year-hopes are higher than ever before that they will lay the bogey that has plagued them for so long. They have a really stylish hurling fifteen with exceptionally fine hurlers in Frankie Corcoran, Billy and Bonzo Tobin, Paul Allen, the Nicholsons and J. J. Murphy.

And what of Tourin? They enter Sunday's game under extreme handicap and must field without several of their key players.

Definite non-starters are full back Wally Doocey and midfielder Jimmy O'Gorman, both presently serving twelve months suspensions. But their troubles do not end there, and Tom Fives and Stephen Scanlon are on the injured list and at the time of writing must be regarded as doubtful starters.

When defeating Cappoquin in the previous round they gave a highly impressive display and could they call on the same fifteen on Sunday would be my choice to advance to the Divisional decider. Certainly they will feel the loss of Doocey and O'Gorman and if Scanlon and Fives fail to pass fitness tests their hope will diminish even further.

And yet when I spoke to some members of the team last week they seemed reasonably confident of upsetting the odds. Their determination in view of the prevailing circumstances will be greater than ever and I personally can see Johnny Gorman, Frank McGrath, Tom and Dick Doocey, J. J. Scanlon, Ollie Wilkinson and Tommy Barry back-

boning a mighty challenge. But under the circumstances the vote must go to Shamrocks. As already stated Tourin at full strength would have been my choice but in the light of recent happenings I cannot go beyond a hard-earned Shamrocks victory.

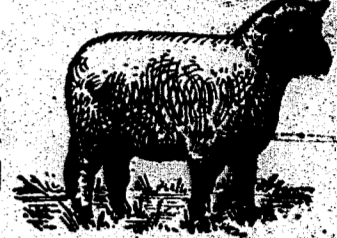
