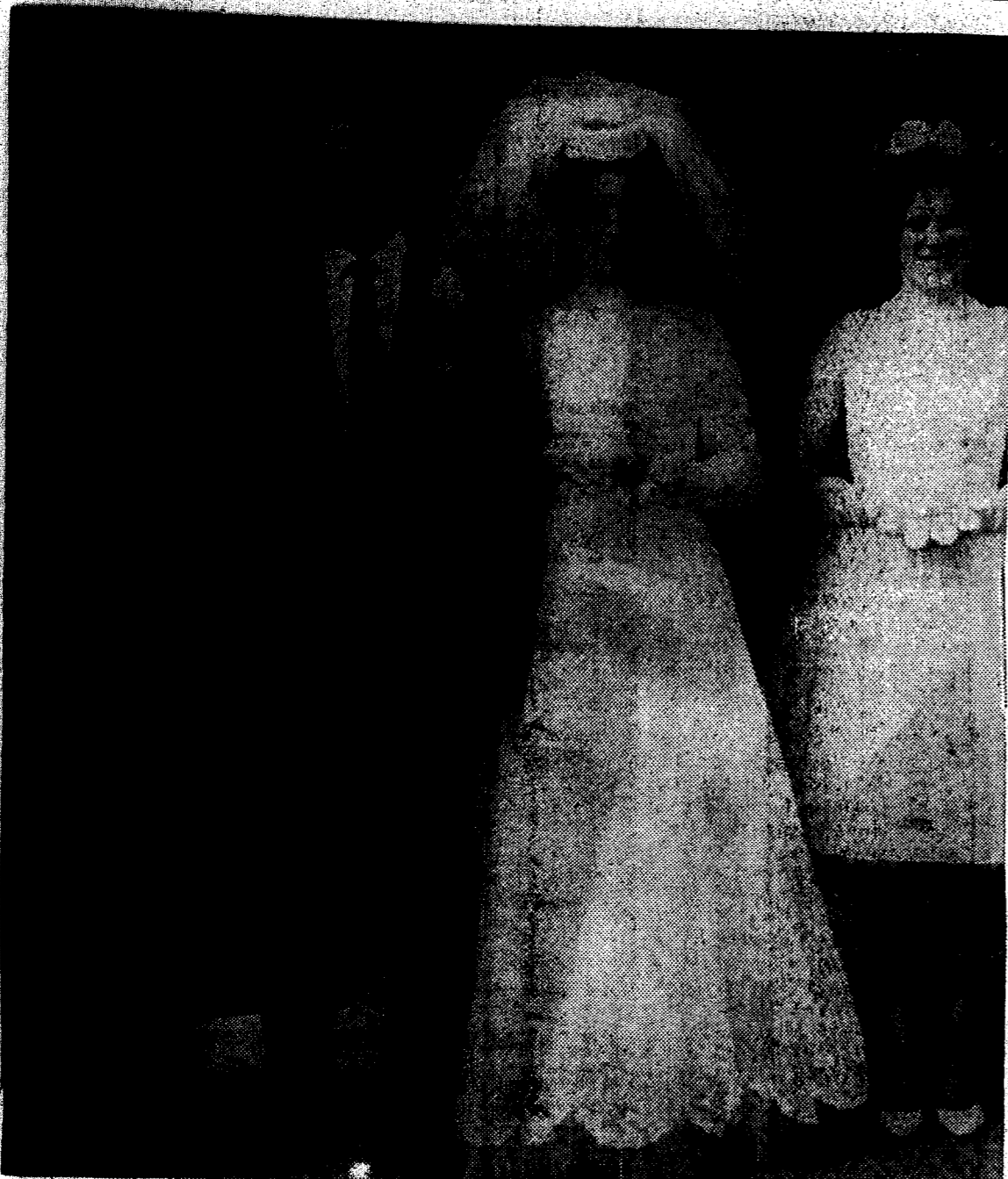

## DUNGARVAN CREDIT UNION

The Board of Directors elected at a recent meeting of the above include: President, Dr. P. K. Murphy; Vice-President, P. Walsh; Treas., P. J. Foyle; Secretary, T. O'Loinsigh; J. J. Cutler, M. Curran; D. Donovan, J. Foley, T. Kyne, T.D.; E. P. King; H. Kelleher, E. O'Doherty, T. T. McCarthy.

The functions of the Board of Directors are:—

(a)—Act upon all applications for membership, except to the extent that it may have authorized the approval of such applications by an executive committee or by a membership officer.

(b)—Require any officer or employee having custody of or handling funds of this credit union to give bond with good and sufficient surety in an amount and character to be determined by the board in compliance with regulations, and authorize the payment of the premium or premiums therefor from the funds of this Credit Union.

(c)—Within the limitations prescribed by law, determine from time to time the interest rate on loans and deposits, the rate of interest refund, if any, to be made to members, the

maximum number of loans to members, and the maximum amount that may be lent, with or without security, to any member.

(d)—Have authority to declare and authorize the payment of annual or semi-annual dividends on shares of members.

(e)—Determine from time to time the number of shares which may be held by one member and the maximum amount which may be held in deposit account by one member, such limitations shall apply to all members.

(f)—Fill vacancies in the board, credit committee and supervisory committee as provided in this Constitution.

(g)—Have charge of the investments of this Credit Union other than loans to members, except to the extent that the Board may have appointed an executive committee to act for it in the purchase and sale of securities or the making of loans to other Credit Unions or both.

The next meeting of the Dungarvan Credit Union will take place on next Tuesday night, November 10th, at 8.30 p.m., at the Courthouse, Dungarvan.

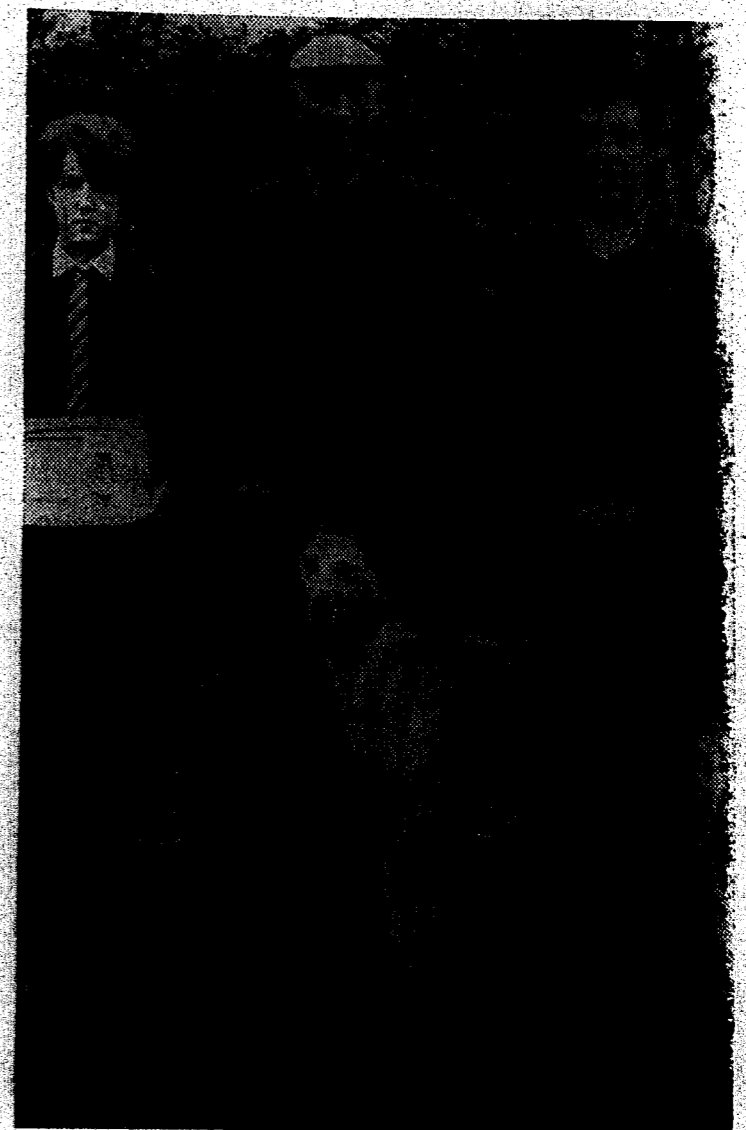

IN one of the poorest finals seen at the venue for a long time, Ballyduff captured the Western junior football crown by defeating Old Parish by a seven point margin at the Fraher Field Dungarvan on Sunday last. Then two minutes before the interval, the Old Parish defenders conceded what to me seemed an unnecessary penalty when they fouled Paddy Feeney inside the parallelogram. From the resultant spot kick Mick Murphy slammed the ball to the net.

Old Parish took up the running immediately after the restart but once again their forwards were way off the mark. Thrice within as many minutes they missed absolute sitters of scores and it is my belief that an Old Parish score at this stage, be it even only a point, would have meant a much closer finish.

Then in the 10th minute Mick Murphy stretched Ballyduff's lead with a point and a further minor by Dave Barry gave them a clear five-point advantage entering the closing quarter.

Vainly Old Parish tried for scores that might snatch them a belated reprieve. But the Ballyduff defence remained steadfast and this, coupled with Old Parish's own attacking shortcomings seldom made a score look likely. Then in the final ten minutes the winners assumed complete control and a brace of points by their best forward Mick Caples in the 21st and 28th minutes put the issue beyond all doubt.

Poppy Day this Saturday

Poppy Day this year will be Saturday, 7th November. This is the day which the world over is set apart to remember those who gave their lives in order that human understanding rather than power should dominate and control human relationships. Human relationships in the spirit of the Christian challenge of peaceful endeavour, which is the Master's wish. It is then a bounden duty to care for and look after those whom our dead have left behind and those who suffered. This is owed to them. We know that in the last great war alone 220,000 of our men decided that the effort to subdue the rule of power was worth while. In recent years in this country there has sprung into existence an organisation which is now spreading to many parts of the world. One which because of its righteousness, has been undertaken by the United Nations. All of us should be glad to think that this originated in this country. It is founded on the Christian teaching of—good neighbourliness; peace on earth and goodwill to men, which knows no frontiers—Mu'nair na Tíre. This is the same ideal that our men died for. Good neighbourliness is the opposite to antagonism, enmity, hatred, greed. There is still a small section of our people whose hearts have failed to absorb this end take action to express that those who died for this great cause deserve no consideration. What a pity. Last year this collection was bigger than ever before: £14,300 was collected. In return, Headquarters in London sent us £63,000. This was indeed a grateful acknowledgment of what is owed to our dead in a common cause. There are many calls on this fund here, and to meet all these we need more money in spite of the fact that last year £4,000 was spent in County Waterford. This amount does not include special help from regimental funds, the Red Cross and other charitable associations. What is sent to us in proportion to what we collect. The more we collect the more we are sent. I feel sure that all of you will discharge the trust our dead, by dying, imposed on us all: to care for those they loved, their comrades and friends who suffered, the widows and orphans. Is there then any need to ask you to buy a poppy on Saturday, November 7th? I think not. A poppy will be waiting for you. In some small way let us pay our debt to those who died that the world should be free. A poppy for you is available.

LATE PATRICK GUIRY AGLISH

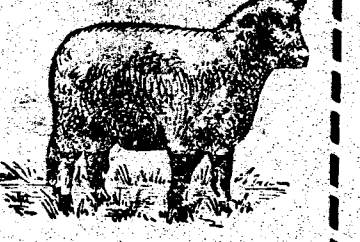

## Should Master Dublin at Walsh Park

## Affane Through To County Final

FOR Waterford Sunday next marks the opening of the National Hurling League. At Walsh Park the Decies open their campaign against Dublin in a game that is vitally important to the league.

aspirations of both counties. Defeat for Waterford would mean an uphill battle for the remainder of the campaign, whilst the Metropolitan having already dropped a brace of points to Limerick cannot afford another defeat.

The announcement by Central Council last week that the League winners will travel to New York next Summer for the final proper has given an added impetus to the competition and a greater incentive to all participating counties. Thus it is imperative that Waterford make a winning start on Sunday.

In the corresponding game between the Counties twelve months ago Dublin caused something of a stir by defeating the then reigning Munster champions at Croke Park. Defeat by Westford and Limerick in the same competition followed and the outlook for the future looked gloomy to say the least. Now did the championship bring any solace for although Cork could be deemed very fortunate winners by the minimum of margins, the Leesiders were in turn literally demolished by Tipperary in the Provincial decider. Many held the view that Waterford would have given Tipp a far better game in that Munster final, but whilst accepting in full that contention, it is impossible to close one's eyes to the fact that the county's fortunes have slumped considerably in the past twelve months.

Now another competitive year is dawning and Waterford with a blending of youth and experience look to this league for a quick return to the top of the hurling ladder.

### ELEVEN RETAINED

Despite the championship defeat by Cork, the selectors have not panicked and no fewer than eleven of the men that finished the hour against the Leesiders are honoured again on Sunday. Ten of them occupy the same positions, the odd man out being Seamus Power who now moves from top of the right to the fringe of the square. But only ten of those were on the original line-out against Cork, John Meaney coming on at midfield late in the game, a position he again occupies on Sunday.

The Metropolitan selectors have decided to give dual performers Lar and Des Foley a well-deserved rest and Sunday's side is undoubtedly considerably weakened by their absence. Des 'Snitchie' Ferguson returns at right full-back but otherwise the side is the same as that which defeated 'C' in their last league outing.

It is for the most part a youthful Dublin side but with hurlers like Ferguson, Paddy Croke, Pat Maycock, Frank Whelan and Mick Bermingham on the line-out they will have good hopes of victory.

### FOUR NEWCOMERS

Although Waterford men have picked in the main the men who have served the county so loyally for so long, they have decided to give four an opportunity of establishing themselves permanently on the side. Neither John Barron or Mick Finnerty were available and it was decided to give Jim Power, Liam Enright, Mick Regan and Mick Murphy a chance in the premier grade.

Power takes over in goal from Pat Flynn; Enright, on the strength of his county final display with Abbeyside with Meaney. But Enright as he so ably proved throughout the entire club championship

this year has plenty of ability and is I think, a player worth persevering with.

### CHEASTY RETAINED

Personally I am glad to see Tom Cheasty retained at centre-forward. After his disappointing display against Cork in Thurles, many were inclined to write him off completely but the Ballyduff man in form is a threat to the best of defenders. He is due a good spell again and Sunday might well usher in a revitalised era for him. A back in form Frankie Walsh is on Cheasty's left with Dunhill's Mick Regan completing the line. Regan takes over from the injured Mick Flannely, and if he can reproduce his club form he could fit into this attacking set-up.

Because of Barron's absence through illness Mick Murphy (Erin's Own) is brought on at top of the right with Seamus Power moving to full forward. Murphy has a permanent fixture on the side before breaking his leg and Sunday marks his return to 'the big time' after an almost three years absence.

Power should be ideally suited to the full-forward berth and should have a rare set-to with Paddy Croke. On the left of the line is the brilliant Philly Grimes who, though now lacking the mobility of former years still remains the side's ace marks-

display will be scrutinised carefully and thoroughly.

A vote of confidence has been passed on the defence en bloc that did championship duty against Cork. The Western men Tom Cunningham and Austin Flynn team up with Martin Og Morrissey in the full line and it is essential that they give the debutante Power maximum protection.

Tommy Hearne is again chosen as pivot flanked by Larry Guinan and Jimmy Byrne. The latter was the only one of the three to play with distinction against Cork, so better things will be expected from Guinan and Hearne on Sunday.

The return of John Meaney to midfield was more or less inevitable. He starred when

introduced in the closing stages against Cork and he and Liam Enright now take over the sector from John O'Brien and John Hearne.

This will be Enright's first outing in the senior jersey and it will I suppose be expected a little too much of him to strike up an immediate successful partnership with Meaney. But Enright as he so ably proved throughout the entire club championship

### SHOULD WIN

### JUNIOR FOOTBALL FINAL AT WATERFORD

It has been a wonderful gaelic year for Ballyduff Upper Division and county Intermediate championship titles have come their way in hurling, and now they have taken the Western junior football crown. And Sunday next will see them do battle for the remaining honour within their powers to grasp, when they meet Rathgormack in the county junior football final. This decider is scheduled for Walsh Park and will not occur in register to the Waterford-Dublin National hurling league game.

Only on Sunday last were the Reds crowned Divisional champions with a seven points victory over Old Parish, and although not over-impressive in victory, are confident of capturing yet another title at Rathgormack's expense. In all their games to-date, save last Sunday's, they have shown themselves to be footballers of considerable potential, and the writer for one expects them to pull out all the stops against the Eastern champions. Whether that itself will be sufficient to see them through is, of course, an entirely different matter. They face a Rathgormack side believed by many to be the strongest to represent the Eastern Division for many years, and must be regarded as the outsiders of the two.

Their side is unlikely to show many changes from Sunday last, although all the forwards, with the exception of Mick Croes, would want to step up on that Old Parish form. Paddy Quirke, Joe Daly and Davy Barry are their key men in defence, whilst John O'Gorman and Mick Murphy

from a solid midfield partnership.

It is something of a shattering blow to Rathgormack that they are forced to contest the final without the services of their star performer Pat Coughlan. Ballyduff at this stage of any championship are exceedingly difficult to beat. I confidently expect them to surpass any of their displays to-date and on that belief they must have quite a good chance of further honours.

However, the venue is likely to favour Rathgormack and their better all round balanced side coupled with this likely ground advantage may be good enough to swing the issue in their favour.

### CAPPOQUIN TIE DOUBTFUL

The winter football league between Affane and Cappoquin is down for decision at Cappoquin on Sunday but at the time of writing there seems to be some doubt about the game being played.

EXCEPT for early moments of uncertainty Affane as expected qualified for the County Intermediate football final by virtue of their comfortable victory over Brickey Rangers in the Western final at Cappoquin on Sunday last. It was a decider however, which produced precious little sparkle and the far-sized attendance were given little to enthuse over as Affane's superiority became more pronounced with the passage of time.

But if the winners experienced little difficulty in qualifying to meet Erin's Own in the County final, they were considerably less impressive when decisively defeating Cappoquin at the same venue on the previous Sunday. In fact, outplayed though the Brickets were for most of the hour they would have been in much closer contact at the end had they possessed a reliable place kicker.

The winners also fell short in this respect however, and they failed to score from a number of easy kicks.
