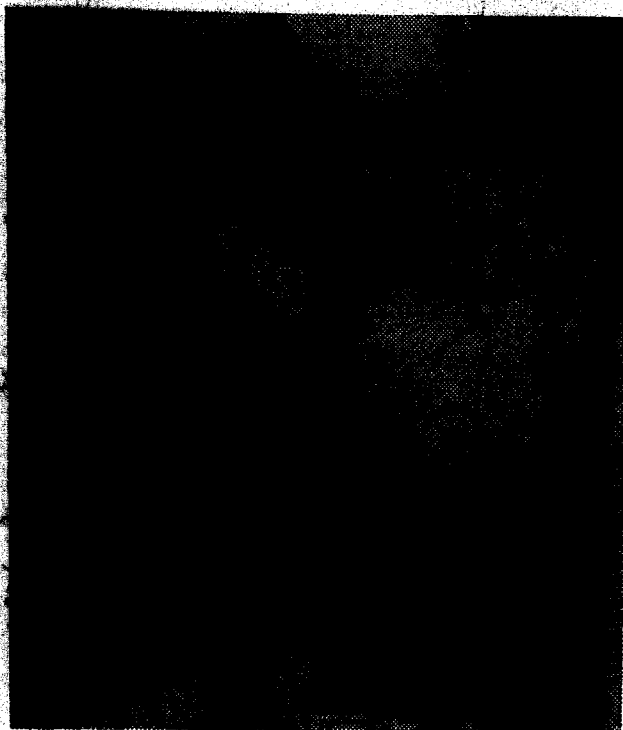

New System of Sewerage Required

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The streets involved are: O'Connell St., Chapel St., Mary St., The Square, Bridge St., Main St., Emmett St., Friary St., Church St. and the other small side streets off these. The report stated that these streets were presently served by old masonry sewers which had no manholes or inspection chambers.

The Town Clerk (Mr. P. J. Dore) said there would be a 60% grant of the loan charges available for the work.

The Council Engineer will prepare a full report on it with the estimated cost of such a scheme.

Will Erect Xmas Tree on Square

A letter from the Committee of Dungarvan Co's Week was read at a meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council on Friday night stated that all they could afford to do this Christmas was erect a Christmas Tree on the Square suitably lighted and have Christmas Carols played over a public address system. The Committee referred to the inadequate lighting of the main thoroughfares of the town and said if it was improved it would help brighten up the town.

The Council decided to ask the E.S.B. to make a survey and submit an estimate of the cost of any additional lights considered necessary.

WANT WATERMAIN EXTENDED

An application by Mr. M. M'Carthy, New Line, and Mr. M. Bohane, do., for an extension of the watermain at Clones Road to serve new houses they are building there was considered at a meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council meeting on Friday night last.

The Town Engineer submitted an estimate of £400 for the work.

The Council decided that if the Dept. would subsidise the cost by 60% they would not charge the applicants anything, and if not both would be asked to contribute to the cost of the work.

Request for more Staff

A request by the Matron of the County Home, Dungarvan to have an additional Nurse appointed was deferred to the January meeting at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Health Authority. The Matron in a letter to the Secretary, said at the moment there was only one nurse and three attendants on night duty for 146 patients. They were kicking about it, she added.

Mr. J. Griffin said they should not lightly regard this additional post and they should adjourn it until they got a comprehensive report as to its necessity.

Mr. Charles Curran, seconding, said this could start off something else in the hospital. There was more to it than met the eye.

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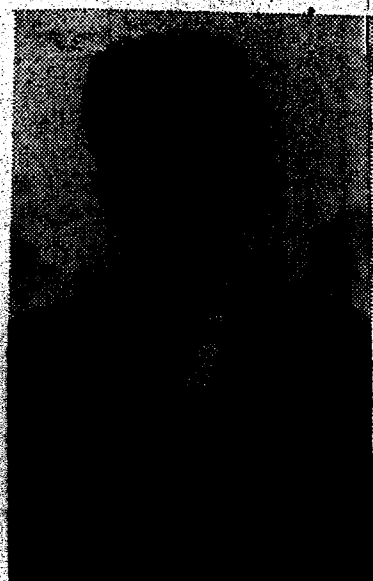

CASE AGAINST BROTHERS ADJOURNED

Having first decided to bind two Dungarvan brothers to the peace, Judge Sean Mac D. Fawsitt adjourned the case against David J. Riordan and Joseph Riordan when they appeared against a three month prison sentence imposed on them in the District Court for assaulting Liam Whelan, Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan. The appeal was listed at Tuesday's Circuit Court sitting in Dungarvan.

When the case was called, Mr. D. P. Sheridan, B.L., for the defendants said the whole trouble involved a domestic matter and since the District Court the parties had consented to reconciliation. He would ask the Justice to bear that in mind. The matter which caused the difficulty had been resolved and harmony would exist between them in the future.

Dr. D. R. Counahan, State Solicitor, said at Dungarvan District Court on Sept. 9th last Liam Whelan had three O'Riordan brothers before the court on alleged assault charges. When the case was called Mr. King, S.O., appearing for the defendants was not in court and it was agreed to adjourn the case until the three defendants had given an undertaking not to interfere with Whelan. When they all had left the court, however, two of the brothers — the appellants in this case, assaulted Whelan on the street. They were brought back into the Court and tried before Judge Skinner for assault and were each sentenced to 3 months imprisonment. There were on

He could not do other types of work because his hands were allergic to timber and water.

Dr. P. O'Connell said he examined Fitzgerald at about 8.15 p.m. in Leamybrien Garda Station. He was then perfectly normal and he was so normal at that time that he could not have been very bad two hours previously and he thought he would have been capable of driving two hours previously to this.

Judge Fawsitt said it would take a good deal to shift his mind in this case. He thought he was correctly convicted by the District Justice.

Mr. Morris (defending) said this was the appellant's first offence and conviction now would automatically mean 12 months suspension from driving. That would mean a loss from between £500 and £800 in wages to him.

Judge Fawsitt said he was very sorry for this young man but he was satisfied about the Sergeant's evidence which was that the appellant was swaying and staggering with him on the way to the station. He did not accept Fitzgerald's story about the lighted match. He was thinking of increasing the £4 fine imposed in the District Court but in the light of what would follow this conviction he would not do so. Accordingly he would have to confirm the District Justice's decision and convict the appellant.


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

YOUGHAL CHURCH'S 500th ANNIVERSARY

To mark the 500th anniversary of St. Mary's Collegiate Church, Youghal, a Festival Service was held there on Wednesday last, at 4 p.m., when the Preacher was Rt. Rev. R. W. Joyce, Bishop of Limerick. The Bishop of Cork, Cloyne and Ross, Rt. Rev. R. G. Perdue, presided at the service, which was conducted by the Rector, Rev. T. H. Robinson. St. Mary's Collegiate Church built in the early 13th century, stands on the site of a great 10th century Byzantine or Romanoesque Church, which was destroyed in the storms of 1192. The beautiful choir and carved stone front are among features added about 1250 in the decorated English style.

Today, the Church appears much as it did in the days of its greatness, due to the restoration undertaken in 1854 by Rev. F. W. Drew and in 1890 by Canon Joyce, D.D.

Amongst those associated with the Church's history are St. Walter Raleigh, Mayor of Youghal 188/89, and Oliver Cromwell, who, in 1649, conducted his campaigns from Youghal as headquarters, on December 27th, 1464. Thomas Fitzgerald 8th and of Desmond founded Our Lady's College of Youghal, and created St. Mary's Church, a Collegiate foundation. The college and church enjoyed considerable influence until 1579, when both were sacked by Gerald, 16th Earl of Desmond. Part of the Church was restored in 1819 by Boyle, Great Earl of Cork, who built a tomb for himself in the south transept.

£70 Decree For Farmer

Judge Sean D. Mac Fawcett, at Dungarvan Circuit Court, on Tuesday, upheld the decision of the district court and awarded a decree for £70 to Denis Ryan, Ballymarket, Dungarvan, for a breach of warranty by Martin O'Hanlon, Ballyslish, Johnswell, (Kenny), in respect to the sale of a half bred Jersey cow and a freisian heifer to Mr. Ryan at Dungarvan cattle mart, on 1st June last.

Mr. D. P. Sheridan, B.L. for Ryan, said, on June 1st last his client purchased a half-bred Jersey cow for £50 and a freisian heifer for £65, at Dungarvan Mart. The animals were the property of Mr. O'Hanlon. There was a warranty of four gallons of milk a day with the Jersey cow and a warranty of "free and fair" going with the heifer. The Jersey cow was at least 15 years old and the most his client would have got for her was £20. The second animal gave very little milk and went dry. Recently, his client disposed of this animal for £46.

Mr. M. McGrath, Veterinary Surgeon, Dungarvan, gave evidence of examining the Jersey cow on August 23rd, and he formed the opinion she was at least 15 years of age.

Mr. M. V. Morrissey, Veterinary and cattle dealer, Dungarvan also gave evidence of seeing the Jersey and he also would think she was fifteen years old.

Mr. Liam Sweetman, V.S., Waterford, said he examined the cow on November 19th last and would estimate her age at 10 to 12 years.

Mr. Laurence McArdy, Department of Agriculture Inspector said he was attached to the B.T.E. Section and they had a record of all tested animals. When this Jersey was tested in November '62, her age was given as seven.

Judge Fawcett said he was satisfied that a warranty was given in each case and Mr. Ryan was entitled to succeed. He then gave him a decree for £70 and allowed him costs and expenses.

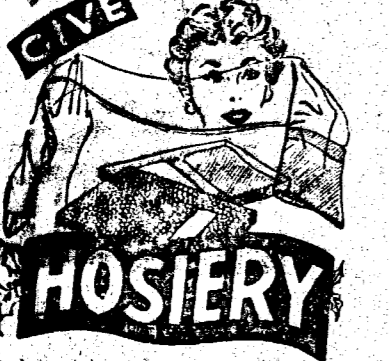

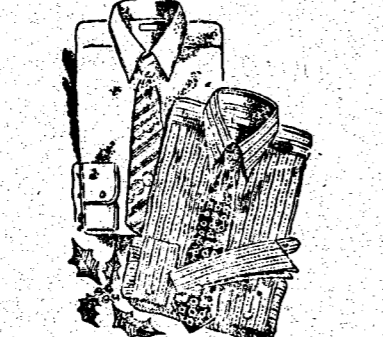

NEW PARKING LAWS FOR DUNGARVAN

New parking bye-laws are to be introduced in Dungarvan. This was the text of a letter from the Assistant Commissioner of the Garda Síochána read by the Town Clerk (Mr. P. Doyle) at a meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council on Friday night last.

The following are the streets that will be involved: Main Street—North side from the junction of Galway's Lane to the Square (from 9 a.m. to 6.30 p.m. on week days excluding Thursday and from 9.30 a.m. to 1.30 p.m. on Thursdays. Restriction not to apply on Sundays and Bank Holidays.

Castle Street—Both sides from its junction with Main Street to its junction with Davitt's Quay (a full line). Friary Street—From its junction with Emmet St. to a point 81 yards down the street.

Mr. P. Whelan said he thought the bottle neck of O'Connell Street, from Cnapel Lane Corner to the Jet Cleaners should also be included.

Senator J. Butler said that a lot of traffic was passing along Cnapel Lane and they should have parking on one side only in that area.

The Council agreed to forward these additional proposals to the Commissioner of the Garda Síochána.

Mr. Thomas Lee drew attention to the danger at the road passing the hospital. Two people had already been killed there and a third was nearly killed there recently. He said the high wall surrounding the hospital should be taken down and this would give a view on to the road.

The Council unanimously decided to draw the attention of the County Council to this matter as they were the road authority.

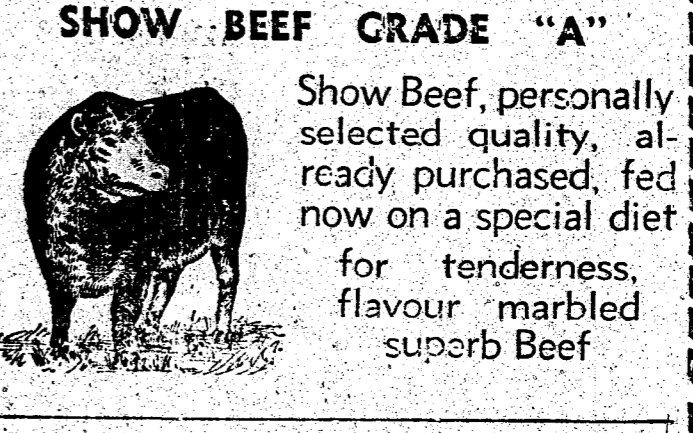

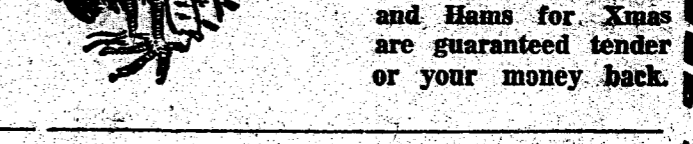

ABBEYSIDE WIN SARGENT CUP

Erin's Own Decisively Defeated in Final

THERE was a truly fitting climax to a golden and gloriously memorable hurling year for Abbeyside on Sunday last when before a small attendance at Cappoquin they captured their first ever Sargent Cup with a well deserved and thoroughly convincing eight-point victory over Erin's Own. Thus they repeated their championship victory over their City rivals by a similar margin and in the process proved beyond all doubt that they now pose the greatest threat to Mount. Zion dominance.

It was a bitterly cold day for hurling and quite understandably the crowd was a small one. But it was for the most part a final that failed to sparkle and the passages of substandard hurling were far too frequent over the hour. That much said, however, let me hasten to add that there was precious little wrong with this Abbeyside performance. It was Erin's Own who failed to live up to expectations, and because of their inability to match strides with the rampant Villagers, the game suffered.

This decoder saw both sides in an unmistakably determined mood. Abbeyside, intent on repeating their championship success, the city men equally intent on reaping total compensation. But for most of the hour the Villagers ruled the roost, and if this side retains its current form during the coming year, it will take a really top class side to defeat them.

On Sunday last they were splendidly served fore and aft. The defence emerged from the day with colours flying; midfield was all that was expected of it, and their accurate snipe was forwardly gave the losers the complete run around. Indeed, it is hardly being said to Erin's Own to say that they were fortunate to have escaped as lightly as they did, for on the hour's play the winners were far more superior than their eight point margin might suggest.

From the start the Villagers began to assert quite a noticeable degree of supremacy, and inside the opening ten minutes three goal-kicking of goals were not grazed. The first fell to Ned Moore, but from less than ten yards range he blazed wide of an open goalmouth. Two more "golden" opportunities went begging and one of them these were missed they might well rue before the hour had run its course.

INTERVAL LEAD

But once Tony Mansfield opened the scoring for them in the 15th minute with a pointed free, they seldom looked back thereafter. Throughout the opening half they had by far the better of matters territorially, and were good value for their interval lead of 2-3 to 1-2.

On the resumption play did improve considerably, and after Abbeyside had stretched their lead with a goal, we saw Erin's Own produce their brightest hurling of the hour. They slowly began to dictate terms in many of the key sectors, and when they came within two points of the Villagers after only eleven minutes the issue was thrown wide open again.

But then it was that the Abbeysiders—all fifteen of them—revealed their true potential. They hit back as though indignant at this sudden Erin's Own upsurge, and for the remainder of the half literally toyed with their opponents. Once their commanding lead

was reduced to an insecure two points, and many must have felt Abbeyside were fading from the scene.

But like true champions, they steadily weathered the storm, and for the nine subsequent minutes, neither defence conceded a score. Then in the 20th minute Liam Enright—now dominating the midfield scene, notched a fine sixty yard point and two minutes later Moore ensured victory with another goal. Now literally playing ducks and drakes with the opposition, Abbeyside's superiority swept to every position. Mansfield added another minor and before the close Enright did likewise rounding off a polished victory in a disappointing final. It is almost impossible to know where to start in handing out praise to the Villagers.

GOALKEEPER STARS

High on the list of stars, however, must surely be placed goalkeeper Pat Enright. His was a superb exhibition of top-class net minding in unfavourable conditions, and it will not take many repeat performances to have him challenging for higher honours.

In the full line Austin Flynn was magnificent, and it has been many a long day since I have seen corner men John Browdie and Bernard Shields play so well.

But it was the half back line I would rate the most complete sector of this side. In the centre-half position Mick Kieley had one of the finest games of his life—and that is praise indeed. Without doubt he is an outstanding centre-back and undoubtedly merits a run there with the county side.

On the right, John McGrath, after a few indifferent displays, came right back into top form and was complete master of Joe Condon. On the other flank Rogie Cashin has never played better hurling. His ground deliveries were lengthy and relieving, and

started against no less a man than Tom Walsh.

The Village midfielders surpassed all expectations. Liam Enright, as expected, was their star hereabouts, but Danny Barry had what I would think was his best ever game in the club's senior colours.

For a while early on it appeared as though their attack was in squandering mood, but after some early misses they found the target.

They started with Duck Whelan at full forward and Ned Moore at top of the left but it was when Whelan moved to the half line with Moore taking over on the fringe of the square that they really moved well.

Whelan in particular had a fine hour scoring and making scores whilst Moore's two two goals were but one particular feature of a great hour. Johnny Hogan was again a wall to the wisp attacker that always posed a threat; Tony Mansfield was always probing to maximum effect and Pat McGovern and particularly Jack Eistead also left their imprint on the decoder.

In the Erin's Own defence that could seldom relax, only Joe Coady, Jim Irish and Willie Walsh earned distinction.

Their midfielders Peter McGovern and John Meaney both played well, but over the hour were mastered by the Villagers pair.

The losers attack could make no appreciable headway and of the sextet only Tommy Walsh and to a lesser extent Maurice Dowling posed any real threat.

Phelan Cup Final May Be Thriller

ARDMORE HOPE TO MAKE AMENDS

WILL Sunday next be third time lucky for Ardmore, or will they suffer defeat in yet another competitive final? At the Fraher Field on Sunday the beaten County finalists meet John Mitchels in the 1963 Phelan Cup final and this is one decoder that I predict with confidence will produce a sparkling hour's football.

The year thus far has been a heartbreaking one for Ardmore. Already they have suffered defeat in the County championship final in the most frustrating manner imaginable and recently they were unlucky to go down to St. Molleran's in the County junior hurling final. Now they are presented with their last chance of capturing a trophy and would it not be some little consolation for them if they captured the Phelan Cup on Sunday.

Mitchels however, are not interested in sentiment. This is their big chance also of taking their first trophy since the club was formed and they are determined to grasp that opportunity with open arms.

Whilst Ardmore claim and with maximum justification that they threw the senior championship away against Kilrossanty, Mitchels are equally convinced that they should be reigning titleholders to-day. In the second round at Sunday's venue these same sides met when Ardmore emerged single point winners. I saw that game and unhesitatingly state that Ardmore were steeped in good fortune to prevail. Mitchels conceded several soft scores that day, which eventually led to their downfall. Now they are dead bent on proving that result "all wrong", and prospects of a battle royal could hardly be brighter.

Were I a Mitchels' follower, however, I would do well to remember that Ardmore have come on the proverbial ton in the interim. In the County Final against Kilrossanty they were the most perfectly trained team I had seen in a long time and their appearance in the county junior hurling decoder has ensured that they remain superbly fit.

Mitchels in an effort to counteract this have also done a spot of training and when I spoke to Billy Kirwan during the week he seemed confident the Seaside's would not have any great advantage over them in this respect. In fact Billy was quite confident of the outcome and believes they will win by a reasonably safe margin.

Both teams play an open attractive game and for that reason this decoder is drawing tremendous appeal. Ardmore want a trophy so very badly; Mitchels want to master the Seaside's more impressively than their neighbours Kilrossanty did. Could there possibly be a more attractive build up to any decoder?

Although neither team has been selected, it is definite that the Ardmore team will show at least one change from the side that did duty in the County final. Pat Pender was injured in that game and will not be available so a new full forward must be found. Their rearward automatically picks itself. John Colbert remains their tried and trusted goalkeeper and little fault can be found with Noel Power, Eddie Mooney and John Mulcahy.

But it is the half-line that has been proving itself the sheet anchor of the side. Paddy Carlton is a solid and stylish pivot, whilst Tommy Power and Bertie Hallahan are really top-class wing halves.

There seems to be some doubt at this stage about the composition of their midfield. John Joe Carlton was married last week and if available will occupy one of the berths, with Donal Lenane fancied for the other sector.

Against Kilrossanty it was the forwards who brought about defeat and if they are Sunday they will have to show considerable improvement. Fin Hallahan should be the big danger man in the half-line, although Jim Rooney and Mickey Carlton on their day are good forwards.

In all probability Austin Flavin will be recalled in the full-forward line. The Mitchels team will be announced later in the week, but it is expected that former forward Sean Power will now be seen at full back with the former occupant of that position, Wally Connors, taking

When the sides met in the championship the Mitchels attack could not be faulted for defeat and both individually and collectively will take a deal of holding on Sunday.

Their half-line of Billy Kirwan, Rogie Connors and Tom Gough on paper at any rate looks to be the real danger line. The evergreen "Billeen" is still a great forward and unless closely watched could wreak havoc.

Now that Sean Power has been drafted to defence it is difficult to predict what the full forward line will be. However, Tommy Kirwan and Sam Anderson are certain to be included and the other position may well go to Nicholas Cowman.

In view of the magnificent County final effort and because they are likely to enjoy an advantage in fitness, the odds seem to favour an Ardmore victory. Their forwards can hardly be as back again and they must be fancied to make this "third time lucky" lucky.

But this I add as a warning postscript for the Seaside's... Mitchels are one of the most talented sides in the county and they are in serious vein about Sunday's decoder. They were unfortunate not to have beaten Ardmore in the championship—make no mistake about that and if they can stay the hour could well deprive Ardmore of another title.

But above all it should be a football classic if the conditions are favourable.

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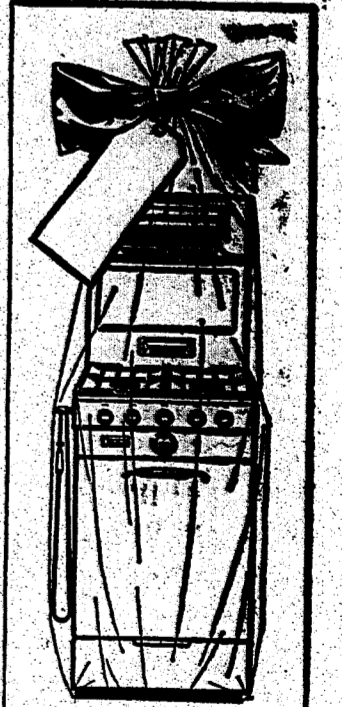
ROAST STUFFED TURKEY

Turkey
Salt
2-4 oz. melted butter or margarine

FOR THE STUFFING:
6 cups of bread crumbs
1 cup finely minced onion
1 cup lard, margarine or dripping
1 cup finely chopped celery
1 small teaspoon pepper
1 dessertspoon mixed herbs
1 lb. pork sausage meat
Hot water as required
1 good teaspoon salt

To make the stuffing—Melt the fat and cook the minced onion in it over a gentle heat until golden brown, add some of the bread crumbs, stirring well to prevent burning. Turn into a large bowl and add the rest of the ingredients. Mix in enough hot water to moisten. Allow to cool before using. Wash the prepared bird inside and out, drying well. Rub over inside with salt, all over with melted fat. Place in pre-heated oven, Regulo 5, allowing 12 minutes per pound and 15 minutes over for birds up to 14 lb. in weight; reduce to Regulo 2 for the last hour.

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
