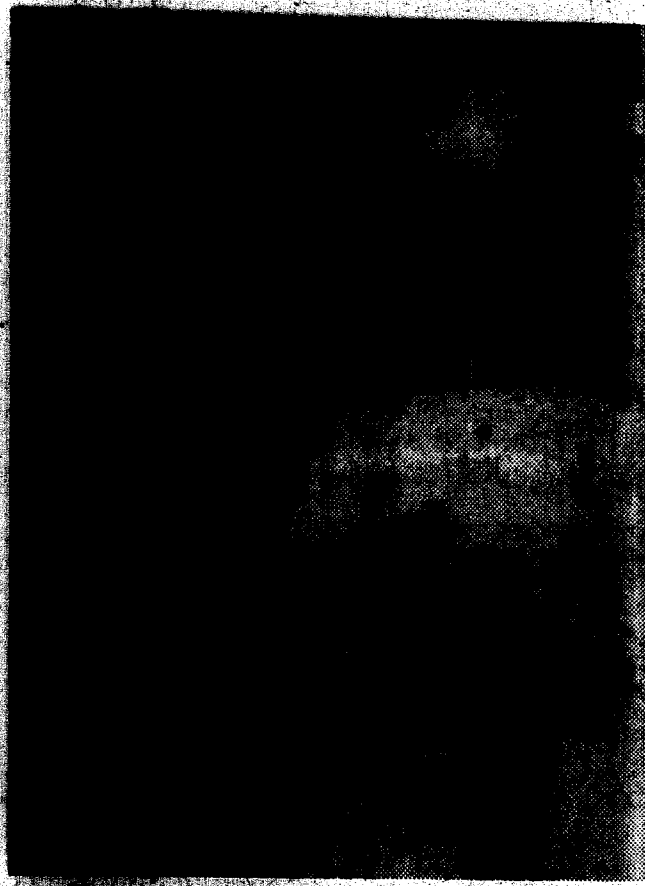

## Drivers in Head-on Collision

A HEAD-ON collision on a straight stretch of road at Leamybrien on November 22nd last had a sequel at Dungarvan District Court on Wednesday when Michael Keame, Rath Kilmeaden Carrick-on-Suir was convicted of dangerous and drunken driving and had his licence suspended for twelve months.

Dr. Paul O'Brien said that on the date in question, he was driving from Dungarvan to Carrick-on-Suir at about 6.20 p.m. On a straight stretch of road near Leamybrien he saw a car in front of him and another in front of it. The car directly in front of him pulled out to the right as though it intended to pass the one in front of it. There was a car coming in the opposite direction and the two of them crashed head-on. He stopped and heard women and children screaming and went to see if he could do anything for the injured. He saw the defendant and he observed a definite odour of liquor from him. He was lurching forward on the wheel of the car, but that could have been from the impact.

Dr. T. F. Lynch, Kilmacthomas said he went to the scene of the accident at 8.50

She received a broken arm and some other bumps.

Corollus O'Sullivan said he was driving his car to Dungarvan on this date. After passing Kirwan's garage at Leamybrien he saw cars coming against him. The first of them did not dim. This car was in the centre of the road and was going in a zig zag manner and the driver then crossed completely to his wrong side and crashed into his car. He (witness) had stopped his car when the defendant's car crashed into his. The defendant never even braked the car.

Witness went on to say that after the accident the defendant told him it was all his (defendant's) fault but that he was very heavily insured. There was a heavy smell of drink from him and he was not fit to drive a car.

Mr. Matthew Power, another passenger in Mr. O'Sullivan's car corroborated this evidence. Garda O'Callaghan, Leamybrien, said he went to the scene of the accident and spoke to the drivers of both cars. The defendant smelled of intoxicating liquor and he would say he was not capable of driving a car. He took him being drunk. Witness decided to the station and he denied to call Dr. Lynch, who examined him at about 8.30.

Judge Skinner said driving of this type on a 25 ft. wide straight road merited a removal of the licence.

The defendant, Michael Keame (68), said he was presently home on an extended holiday from America. Coming from Dungarvan on his way home he stopped at the Pike and had one whiskey and two small glasses of beer on the straight stretch of road. He was driving the motor and when he saw the car after that he did not know. He was examined by Dr. Lynch in the barracks and there was nothing in the world wrong with him that day. Judge Skinner said he would have to convict the defendant. He fined him £2 on each of the two charges of drunken and dangerous driving and suspended him from driving for twelve months.

## LATE MRS. C. M. Guinness for POWER

"St. Hillary's" Tourmore  
Dungarvan

It is with regret we record the passing of Mrs. Constance Mary Stone, St. Hillary's Tourmore, Dungarvan, at her daughter's (Mrs. P. J. Lynch's) residence "Tara", Tourmore, in the early hours of Tuesday morning after a rather protracted illness. Deceased was a kindly, courteous and charitable lady who never lost a friend and made an enemy. A member of a well-known Portlawn family—the Medley-cotts of Rocketts Castle—she was relict of Thomas J. Stone who predeceased her by



more than two years. A great lover of greyhounds (her late husband was a former Manager of Harold's Cross Race Stadium) she had just donated a magnificent trophy in his honour to Dungarvan Coursing Club of which he was a well-known member, to stimulate Keener's competition among the members of the Club. As a result of proper care she had been able to attend every night's meeting of the Club and was admitted without transacting any business. The funeral takes place in Ballinacorney Church this Thursday evening at 8 p.m. and interment takes place in the adjoining cemetery after 10 a.m. Mass to-morrow (Friday).

**Youths Charged With Damaging E.S.B. Lights**

There is a lot of this type of vandalism in this area, remarked St. S. Fanning, when five Dungarvan youths appeared before Judge Skinner at Wednesday's District Court with damaging telegraph lights to the extent of 36/6.

One of the youths said that in the last 12 months 75 bulbs and 20 lamps had been broken in this area. Damage to the extent of £37 had been caused.

Judge Skinner said that anyone caught in Dungarvan in future for breaking lamps would be fined the entire amount to cover all the damage that had been done during the year. That would stop others from doing it. There was terrible vandalism going on and the parents in Dungarvan would not get any sleep if the guards if they had seen it happening.

He adjourned the case for two months to see how the five defendants behaved. They all pleaded guilty to the damaging of lights, on Nov. 6th.

**Dangerous Driving Charge Dismissed**

A charge of dangerous driving against Thomas Fitzgerald, Windgap, Dungarvan, was dismissed by Justice Skinner, at the local District Court, on Wednesday. He was given the benefit of the P.O.A. on a charge of driving a defective vehicle.

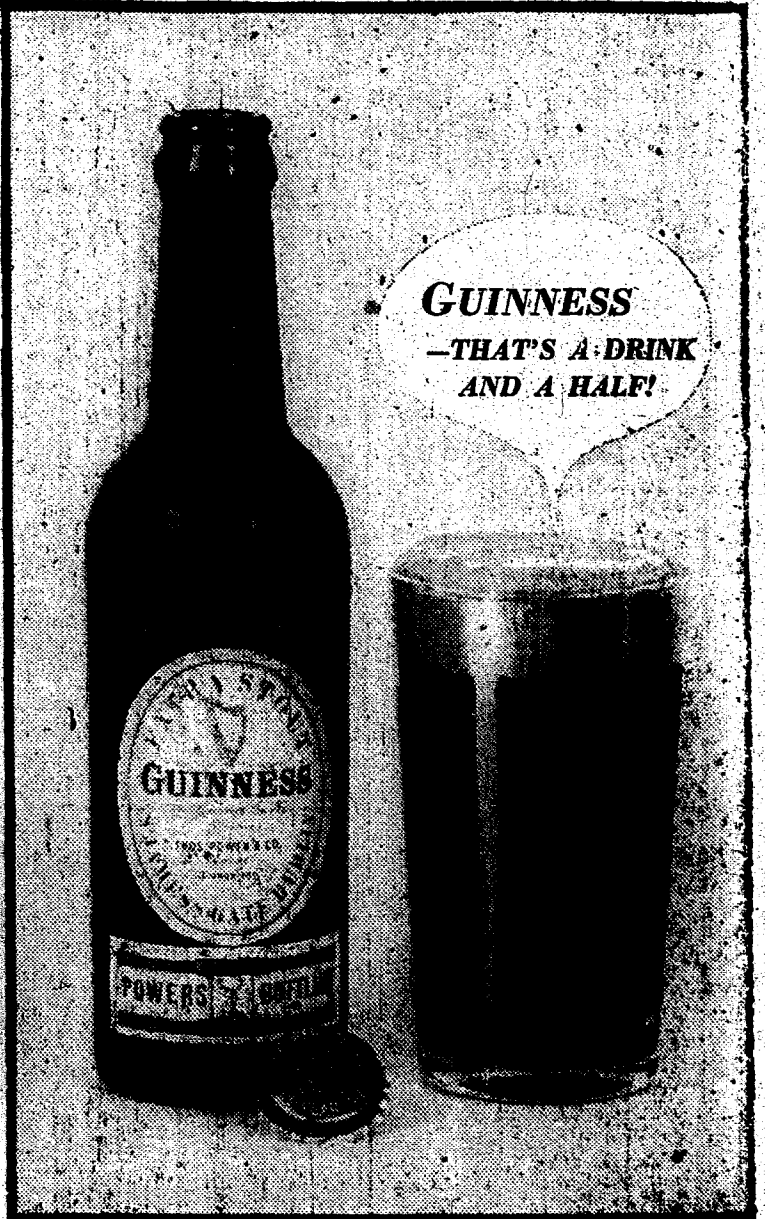

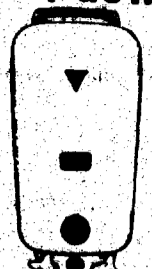

## What is a Credit Union?

A Credit Union is a group of people who agree to save their money together and to make loans to each other at low interest rates.

A Credit Union is organized by the members of a particular group. For instance, people working for the same employer, people who belong to the same fraternal association, or people who live in the same closely knit community, such as a parish. Membership is open to all in the group, regardless of race, colour or creed.

Credit unions are democratic organizations; the members elect their own governing body and committee-men, and set policies for the credit union at their annual meetings.

### HOW IT WORKS

Members are encouraged to save regularly. (Savings are actually shared in the credit union). From this accumulated capital loans are made to members for any good purpose, at low interest. Any earnings remaining after expenses are paid and reserves set aside, are returned to the members in the form of dividends on their shares or interest; rebates on their borrowings.

### LOANS FOR GOOD PURPOSES

Common reasons for borrowing include payment of bills to various creditors, taxes, rates, medical expenses, weddings and funerals; home repairs; farm equipment; vacations; education; cars; scooters; bicycles; clothing; to take advantage of financial opportunities; and for family emergencies.

Loans vary as to how much a credit union may lend to any one member, but it is common for a credit union to lend reasonable sums on the borrower's own signature, and additional amounts with other security.

A credit union prefers to make a number of small loans than one big loan, as in this way it is helping more of its members. A credit union may not lend money to a non-member; in this way it preserves its non-profit or mutual trading character.

### LOW-COST CREDIT

Interest on credit union loans is never more than 1% per month on the unpaid balance and there are no other charges. Most credit unions provide loan protection and life savings insurance to their members at no extra cost. Each year, many credit unions are able to refund to borrowers a portion of the interest they paid on loans. Credit union members are thus saving themselves more money for any other things they may need.

### THRIFT PROMOTED

A year-round educational campaign to get members to save regularly, has helped them to form the habit of thrift. Many people who had never saved before, began by putting a little aside each pay-day.

N.F.A. Annual Dinner

The annual county Dinner and Social of the N.F.A. was held at the Tower Hotel, Waterford, and many of the prominent guests were present. The Chairman, Mr. J. P. Twomey, President, Mr. J. R. Butler, Vice-President, Mr. J. P. Twomey, Chairman of Waterford L.C.A. Federation, Mr. P. J. Casey, Chairman of Waterford Co-Op. Society Ltd., was represented by senior management personnel and the Co. Committee of Agriculture by most members of the advisory staff. Among those unable to attend were: Mr. P. Conroy, C.A.O.; Rev. Fr. P. Farrell, President, Waterford Municipal Tce and the Presidents of both Waterford Chambers of Commerce.

In proposing the toast to N.F.A., Mr. John Rushe, C.E.O., referred to the period of extreme hardship during the Economic War and of his early experiences as one of a large farming family in the west of Ireland. In contrast, he spoke of the developments in agriculture during the past ten years since the rise of the N.F.A. to an influential force in the national economy. For, perhaps the first time, the voice of the farming community was not only recognized by the people of the country, but also by the Government. N.F.A. had introduced a stability to the agricultural sector.

Mr. J. Butler, in replying to the toast, said that N.F.A. had had to fight its way to the position it now held. Many people had said that farmers could not progress together, but these pessimists had been proved wrong. The N.F.A. had, in 1964, achieved recognition by the Government as the principal farmers' organization, and, as such, would be included in any consultations at Government level concerning agriculture. Mr. Butler drew attention to the fact that for every £100 exported by the N.F.A. in 1964, £40 needed to be imported in the form of materials. In agriculture for every £100 exported, £70 had to be spent on imported materials. These figures illustrated the importance of agriculture as the present mainstay of the country.

County Chairman, Mr. J. P. Twomey, in proposing the toast to "Our Guests," referred to the happy relations enjoyed by N.F.A. and the other organizations and groups in the county. Mr. P. Twomey, replying, referred to L.C.A.'s seventy years and said that when N.F.A. celebrated its 50th birthday, like L.C.A., it would have great cause to be proud of its continued achievements. Both the Chairman and County Secretary, Mr. Brian Pearce, spoke of the "Livingstone Project" to send five young Jersey and two young Kerry bulls to form the nucleus of an A.I. station and laboratory in a

hunger haunted area, where famine was the principal consideration. The bulls have been donated, but the cost of transport, insurance, etc., requires the collection of £2,000 immediately, so that the animals can be sent during the cool season. In answer to an appeal for donations, £25-10-0 was collected after the dinner and was added to the £25 already given by the County Executive of N.F.A.

The evening concluded with dancing and entertainment provided by local guest artists; this latter feature was new to the annual function and provided great pleasure to those present.

Council of Maps Replies to Deputy

A Charge: In a recent issue of your paper you published a letter from Mr. Sean Treacy, T.D., addressed to the Waterford County Manager criticising members of Waterford Co. Council. The Labour Party Deputy for South Tipperary appears to have worked himself into a frenzy because members of the Council called his bluff. There is, of course, no foundation for the imputed allegation that some members of the Council are obstructing him in the discharge of his duties as a Dail Deputy. He appears to be particularly annoyed at the decision of the Council to make known to members what transpires at meetings between deputations led by members of the Oireachtas from outside county Waterford and Officers of the Council. Surely this was a very reasonable decision and in keeping with the principles of democracy. It is seriously suggested that such proceedings, involving the spending of public money should be excluded in secrecy? It should be clearly understood that all schemes concerning road works, water, sewerage, housing, etc., are the responsibility of the Council, which Body has to (1) Pass a resolution approving of each scheme; (2) Pass a Financial Resolution to provide the necessary money. In the circumstances one is entitled to hold the view that all deputations should come before the Council in a public session rather than meet officials behind closed doors. With regard to Villenstown Water Scheme - The Council decided about five years ago to provide that village with a new scheme and preliminary steps were taken to implement that decision. Following the national water survey, however, the Council agreed to provide Villenstown with a scheme which would supply the surrounding country (Ballingown, Kereen, Droim, etc.) in addition to the village. As a matter of interest this was the first such scheme approved by the Council arising out of the survey. Unfortunately, some delays have occurred due to technical problems, which were entirely outside the control of the Council. These problems have now been resolved; plans have been approved and work will commence in the course of a few months. I am conscious of the urgent need for an adequate water supply for Villenstown and have repeatedly appealed to the Oireachtas to expedite the matter. No member of the Council was present in this or similar matters. New sewerage schemes have been approved for both Aghla and Villenstown villages. Plans for the Modello Water Supply Scheme are being prepared in the normal way. This scheme was approved by the Council (on the proposition of Mr. Sean Whelan, M.C.C.) when the members had satisfied themselves that the local demand for water justified such a step. Mr. Treacy appears to be very upset because I took positive and necessary steps to assure two families in the Glendine area that there was no foundation for statements that their names had been removed from the list of approved applicants for Council cottages. I do not understand his peculiar interpretation of my action in this matter. I dealt with the case in the proper manner and if Mr. Treacy wishes to pursue it further I am satisfied.

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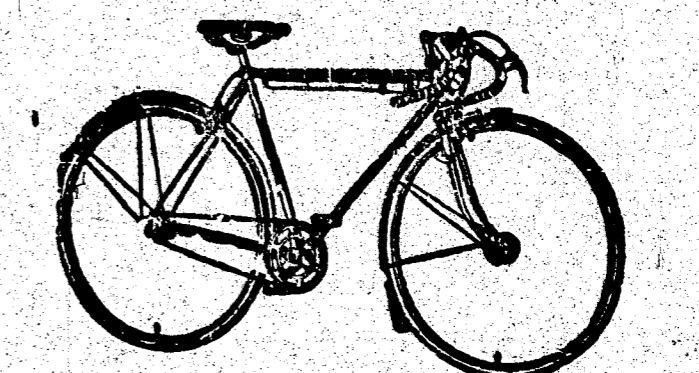

When at the call of time the sides were gripped in scoring equality, neutrals in the small attendance must have given a sigh of satisfaction that a repeat is necessary to decide the cup holders. Yes, it was that type of game—an encounter that shed lustre on both Mitchels and Ardmore. Many will, of course, contend Mitchels were unfortunate to concede the belated point that made a replay necessary but surely there could not have been a more equitable result. This was a final that did not deserve to produce a draw—a final that provided thrill after thrill in a suspense filled hour.

But how close Ardmore came to losing a third major cup in the year. They had set up an interval lead of three points but soon found themselves in arrears and only in the dying seconds did they catch a second bite at the cherry with a point by team captain Jim Rooney. They set themselves back from the very start but Mitchels matched them stride for stride and in their decision earned a new status for themselves.

What a tragedy, however, that the conditions should have contrived to mar the spectacle. At times it was nearly impossible to play

**MITCHELS FIGHT BACK**

# Abbeyside Suffer First Defeat

**ABBEYSIDE UTD.** suffered their first defeat in the current League (Division 3) competition at Killohan Park, Waterford, on Sunday last, when they went under to a very impressive Crusaders by 3 goals to 1. This defeat seriously impairs Utd.'s hitherto bright hopes of league honours and any more dismal displays such as this will surely mean a further sliding down the league table.

This was Abbeyside's first away game of the season and for them it certainly wasn't a very celebrated occasion. From their three home games they had collected five points, and their form suggested that they would readily dispose of this City opposition. But on the vast expanses of Killohan Park practically every member of the team hit rock bottom form and were outplayed to a far greater degree than the two goal margin between the sides might suggest.

Fore and aft, the Vikings showed glaring weaknesses. Goalkeeper McGrath and his five fellow defenders were very uncertain throughout and seemed to have no understanding between each other whatsoever. The attack was not that plentifully supplied, but on the occasions the quintet Crusaders proved themselves did get moving they achieved

However, this resurgence was but temporary and once Crusaders notched their second goal, which came as a result of a mix-up in Abbeyside's goal area, the issue was put beyond doubt. Mr. Maguire said that there was enough youth at the Pike to form a strong football club now more than ever before.

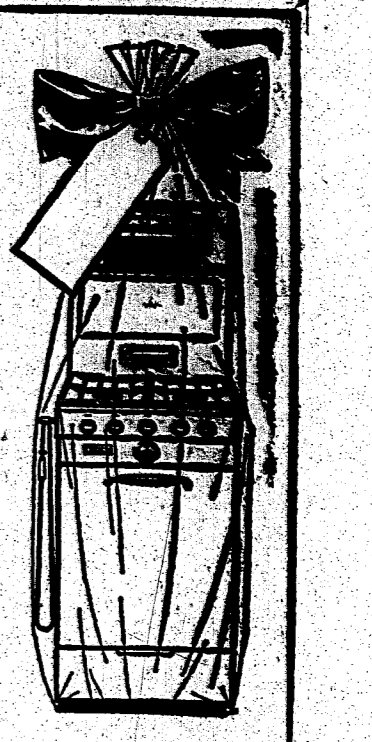
