Road Workers Want Weekly Pay DELAY CRITICISED BY MEMBERS

THE DELAY IN CARRYING OUT A RESOLUTION PASSED BY WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL WHICH AGREED TO PAY WEEKLY WAGES TO COUNCIL ROADWORKERS, WAS CRITICISED AT A MEETING OF THE COUNTY COUNCIL IN DUNGARVAN, ON MONDAY LAST.

Mr. John Fahey said there seemed to be an undue delay in implementing the resolution of the County Council by which it was agreed to pay the roadworkers weekly. He was very perturbed about this and it appeared that when something was passed by the Council it was very hard to get it implemented. There seemed to be an unreasonable delay in paying the roadworkers weekly and the workers themselves were very anxious that the new system should come into operation immediately.

weekly pay sheets and that was the crux at present. In other Co. Councils weekly pay sheets were used, but the Co. Engineer, Mr. J. D. Hally, had recommended an advanced pay

system. In a county near to them, the advanced pay system was in operation, but he was not prepared to take his cue from what they were doing in any other county, and he would not accept this advanced pay system.

In a report submitted by the County Engineer, on September 3rd, he stated that the system where the pay sheets would have to be paid weekly would involve a lot of time, particularly on the Engineer-

ing Staff and it would make serious inroads on their present work. He would not recommend weekly pay sheets, but was in favour of an advanced pay system.

Mr. O'Leary said there was no question of his looking for authority to have this system put into operation. The Chairman, Mr. Curran, said it would cost about £2,500 a year extra to have the weekly pay system introduced. Colr. H. K. Dowd said that six or seven years ago he mooted the weekly pay system for road workers and was told at that time it would cost £1,500.

Deputy T. A. Kyne said it was now a function of the Co. Manager to decide.

The Manager, Mr. S. J. Moylan said he had not the opportunity to decide the matter now, but would make a decision on it as soon as possible. The discussion then ended.

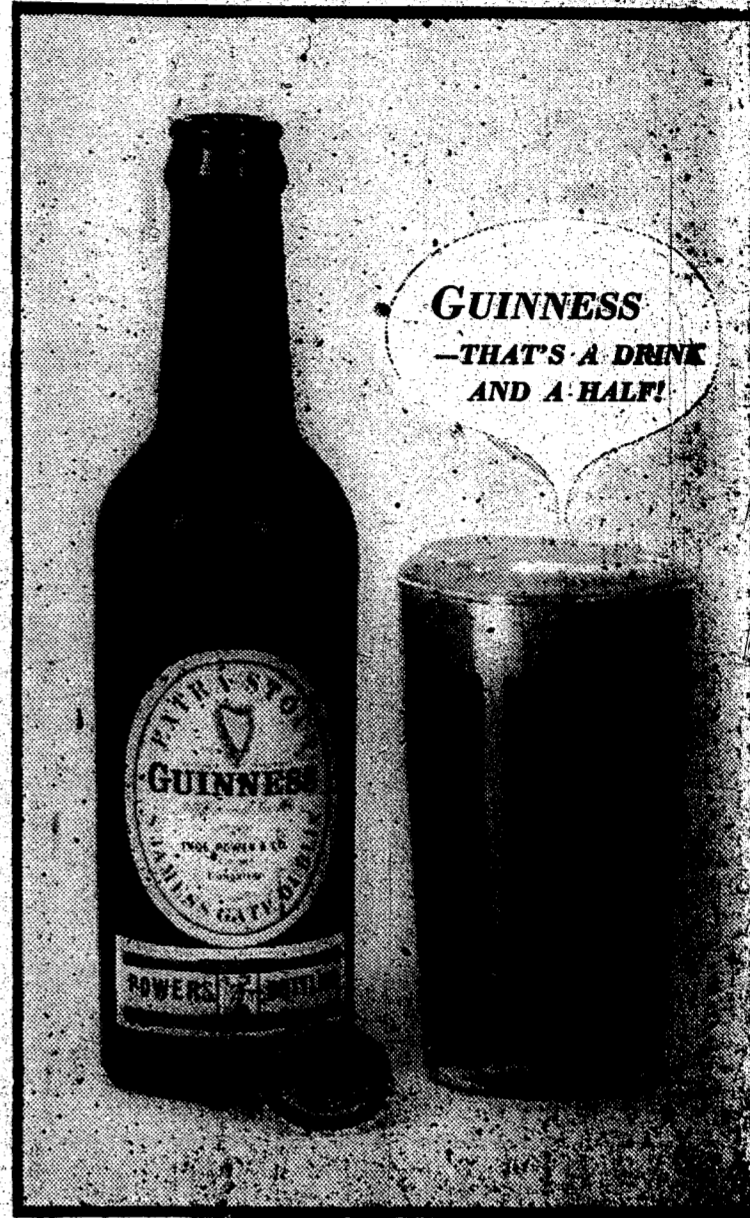

4.—Proper amount of Licence Duty.

This, of course, was quite true, because he had nothing to do with the building of the cottages. From this simple statement appears to have arisen serious misunderstanding, leaving the cottier to believe that the cottages were not going to be built at all. It is in fact he had mentioned Deputy Tracey's name in the circumstances in which the conversation took place he would attach no particular or certainly no sinister significance to it and it seemed to him that the situation had arisen completely through a misunderstanding by the cottier and a remark that the Overseer passed.

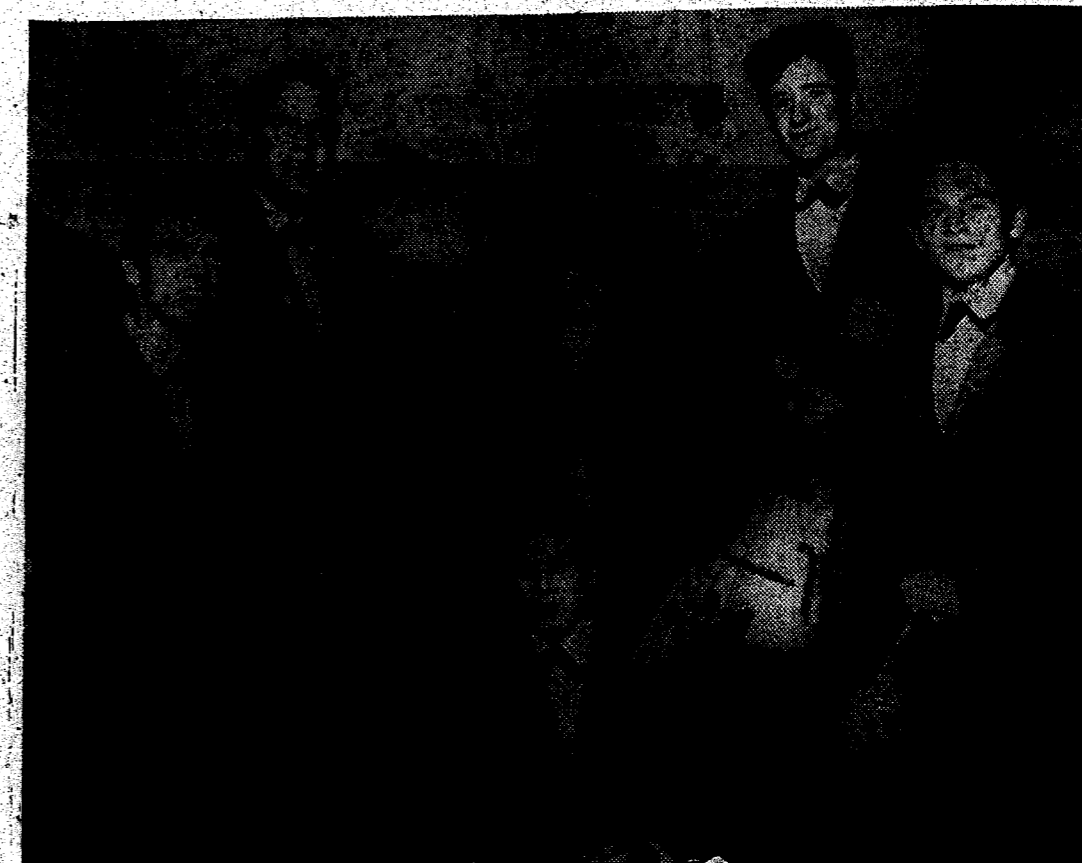
Why Colr. Hartly Left Meeting

Mr. Curran said he did not consider C.I.E. an efficient body. In fact he considered them a most inefficient body. Their charges were out of line from those of private hauliers.

A Credit Union is owned, controlled and operated by its membership. There are no outside shareholders, concerned only with the biggest possible return on the money they have invested. There is no dictation as to policy, methods or operations by any group or clique.

Each member has one vote, and one vote only, regardless of how much he has in savings or on loan from the credit union. The individual member votes what kind of an organization his credit union will be.

A Credit Union is an opportunity for each of us to practice the Christian ideal of the universal brotherhood of man. "Bear ye one another's burdens," said St. Paul, "For in so doing you shall fulfil the law of Christ."

The person who gets most out of a credit union is the person who puts the most into it. Not the person with the largest share account, nor the one who pays the most interest on his loan, but the person who gives of his time and talents, his intelligence, his sympathetic interest in its welfare and progress.

(Presentation Convention), for best original essay, and John Reedy, Ardmore (Vocational Schools) for best essay in Irish which was read by the Town Clerk, Mr. Frank Mooney.

In congratulating the winners, the Chairman, Mr. P. J. Lenehan said that they were doing their best to make school children road safety conscious as well as all users of the roads.



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Permanent Instructor for Lismore

WATERFORD COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE at its monthly meeting on Wednesday decided on the casting vote of the Chairman, Mr. John Fahey, to fill the vacant post of permanent instructor for the Lismore area in a permanent capacity. Mr. O'Brien who has taken up a temporary post in Westford had been acting in a temporary capacity, and before the meeting was a three month deputation from the N.F.A. appealing to the Committee to appoint an instructor on a permanent basis.

At the outset of the meeting, the C.A.O., Mr. P. Conroy said there was great pressure on the present instructor to get in the work for the area covered by Mr. O'Brien.

Mr. Norman Walsh said this was a very important issue and he would like to see Messrs. Denis Montayne and George Dowd both Committee members from the area involved at the meeting.

Mr. Fahey (Chairman) then welcomed the members of the N.F.A. deputation: Brian Pearce, Thomas Fives and John Murphy. Mr. Fahey said Mr. O'Brien was only appointed in a temporary capacity, and when he was offered a permanent appointment in another county he took it.

Mr. Pearce said he was very glad to be given the opportunity of addressing the meeting. He wished to apologise for the absence of their Chairman, Mr. Edward Chesnut. The members of West Waterford were very sorry to see Mr. O'Brien leave the area after a good number of years. The matter was raised at a meeting of the N.F.A. in Talow and at that meeting it was decided to ask the Co. Executive of the N.F.A. to look into the matter. Over a number of years they constantly had a temporary instructor in the area and in the last 18 or 19 years they had lost several outstanding men that were highly valued for their work. A temporary man, when he was appointed, was probably straight from college and was green, but with time, improved his technique and knowledge. Then, when he really knew his job and had proved his efficiency, the

chances were that he would move to a permanent position elsewhere and some other county would get his services. They were losing the benefit of men who had come to learn and understand the problems of the farmers in this particular area. Just when the understanding between farmer and instructor was reaching maturity it was broken by the instructor moving. They felt that each area should have a permanent instructor and a temporary instructor could be an assistant to the permanent man or to the C.A.O. and in this way the temporary man would be serving a useful purpose. That was basically their feelings on the subject.

Mr. John Murphy, another member of the deputation said he wished to endorse everything Mr. Pearce had said. Just when the temporary was really doing a good job, he moved and they were back again with a young and inexperienced man.

Mr. Norman Walsh: Do you know the reason why we are anxious to have a temporary man? Our rights on this body are very limited as can be seen from salaries, etc. We are entitled to appoint a temporary man ourselves, but not to have a permanent appointment and we feel this is one of the few powers we have. Then, if at all possible, we would give the post to a Waterford man, and these are two very important points from our point of view. I will agree there is for and against but it will take a lot to convince me to give away my rights to select a temporary man for this post.

Mr. George Heskin said he agreed with the views expressed by Mr. Pearce. Just when they got to know a temporary man he was gone. He would prefer to have a permanent man that they knew would be there for years. He did realise the fact that the power of appointing a permanent man was out of their hands.

Mr. Pearce said he believed they could come to terms with the two distinct problems. The temporary man could be used as an assistant to the senior advisory member of the staff.

Mr. Charles Curran said if this suggestion was agreed to it would mean increased personnel, and more expense.

Mr. Thomas Fives said they thought each area should be covered by a permanent instructor.

Mr. Curran said they were trying to keep spending within reasonable limits.

Mr. P. Conroy (C.A.O.) said they had six full-time areas in the county and something like 700 holdings per instructor. Some of them were overworked at present and just could not meet all the days a week at present and were working more hours a day than they had daylight.

Mr. K. O'Riain: I wonder, Mr. M. Galgey said the Deputation had proved that a temporary man was not the thing. They would have to decide if the farmers were worth having a permanent man for, or they having the right to appoint a temporary man.

Mr. J. Drohan said they had no guarantee that a permanent man would stay with them either.

Mr. Heskin said they would have a better chance of holding a permanent man.

Mr. W. Foran said they had four permanent men at present and they could give each of them a bigger area.

Mr. Sean Whelan said he believed that most of their instructors were overworked as it was.

Mr. Heskin said he would like to see another instructor appointed, but of course, that would mean a higher rate. He did not think, however, that they were properly serviced with instructors in the county at all.

Mr. Fives said it was their opinion that a permanent instructor would serve them better and they merely came to the meeting to point that out.

Mr. M. Galgey said that if they got a direction from the N.F.A. to appoint a permanent instructor in the area they could then say it was the N.F.A.'s doing.

Mr. Pearce said he would put that question to the Co. Executive of the N.F.A.

The deputation then withdrew.

Mr. O'Riain then proposed that the post be filled in a temporary capacity and Mr. Norman Walsh seconded.

Mr. G. Walsh proposed an amendment and Mr. S. Whelan seconded that the appointment be a permanent one. Mr. Heskin's amendment was carried on the casting vote of the chairman after the vote had ended in a tie—six votes each.

The voting was as follows: For—Messrs. Hartly, Dowhey, Whelan, Heskin, Galgey, Fahey (6); Against—Messrs. Butler, Curran, Drohan, Foran, O'Riain, N. Walsh.

The C.A.O. then stated that the filling of the permanent post would then take about six months and they would have to make arrangements to appoint a temporary in the meantime until the appointment was made.

Mr. K. O'Riain: Yes, and you will keep on the temporary man also when the permanent appointment has been made. It was done before in the case of a Horticultural Instructor.

Mr. Heskin proposed that a temporary instructor be appointed until the permanent appointment was made. Mr. S. Whelan seconded. This proposal was carried by eight votes to four.

Mr. N. Walsh: I suggest that the terms of our temporary appointment be strictly adhered to.

Mr. O'Riain: That was done before and it was useless. The discussion then ended.

Doing Admirable Work

Waterford Vocational Education Committee at its monthly meeting on Tuesday unanimously gave the Friends of St. Martin's (Dungarvan) Technical School for a party they are giving for the old people of the town on Tuesday next.

The Chairman (Ven. Archbishop Power, P.P.) said they were doing administrative work and they were making great sacrifices. He proposed they give the room: Mr. M. Hartly seconded.

The Committee also passed a vote of sympathy to the relatives of the late Dr. Vincent Crotty, former R.M.S. St. Otteran's.

Mr. Charles Curran said the late Dr. Crotty was a first cousin of their respected Vice-Chairman, Mr. Norman Walsh.

REFEREE'S REPORT ON COUNTY J.F. FINAL

There was a pretty lively discussion at the County Board meeting, on Monday night last, following the reading of referee Hugh Donnelly's report on the Rathgormack-Ballyduff county junior football final. (The report of the meeting appears elsewhere on this page).

Well, referee Donnelly certainly pulled no punches in his report, and as a result of the disgraceful incidents that marred this game, Hugh Donnelly has decided to retire from refereeing. That, as I see it, is the tragic part of it all. Good referees are very scarce nowadays and so thankless is their task, that few are anxious to take over the whistle. Now, because of the black-guardism that went on in this final and the manner in which he was insulted and treated, Hugh Donnelly has decided to "call it a day." He was an excellent referee, and the Board is certainly the loser because of his decision.

Referees have, in the past, been promised the full backing of the County Board and here surely, is a case where they can adhere to that promise. The referee has stated in his report who the aggressors were; where the blame lies for all the trouble and has recommended the suspension of the entire Ballyduff team. He would not have been the one to make such a recommendation unless he felt it was fully justified, and his views should be given careful consideration.

The Chairman, Secretary and team captain of Ballyduff have been summoned to the next meeting of the Co. Board when the matter will be dealt with in detail. Ballyduff are undoubtedly entitled to this opportunity. But I would urge the Board to keep carefully in mind the context of the referee's report. It is a long accepted maxim that the referee's report is final, and bearing that in mind, I hope the Board will back Hugh Donnelly up to the hilt. I do not relish any club being punished, but so low was the standard of sportsmanship displayed by Ballyduff in this final that some form of penalty should be imposed.

REFEREE'S REPORT ON J.F. FINAL 'Playing Pitch Was Like A Battlefield'

"THIS was the most unsportsmanlike game I ever witnessed. During the second half which was uncontrollable, I sent a player (Joe Daly) to the line for dangerous play and if this player is suspended as I think he should be, then I would recommend that the entire Ballyduff team be suspended. They were the aggressors and whenever I looked behind me during that second half I saw players indulging in fisticuffs all over the field. After the match the pitch was like a battle-field." These are extracts from the report of referee Hugh Donnelly on the recent County junior football final between Rathgormack (winners) and Ballyduff Upper, read at last Monday night's meeting of the County Board in Dungarvan.

Mr. Donnelly also stated in his report that some of the Ballyduff players used foul language to him and it was his belief that if he took stronger action in the second half the game might never have finished. He wished to have his name withdrawn from the panel of referees as he would not officiate at any more games in the County.

The Chairman, Mr. J. Moloney, said they would deal with the player that was sent off first—Joe Daly, the Ballyduff defender.

Mr. Paddy Kenneally (Geraldines) proposed the minimum suspension of one month.

Mr. Jack Kiely (Bmmetts) seconded.

Mr. Paddy Coffey (Chairman of the Eastern Board) said the most significant part of the referee's report was that he would not officiate at any more games in the county. He asked if this player was ever suspended before for rough play, dangerous play or for striking a player.

Mr. Moloney said he had never come before him for suspension previously.

Mr. Seamus O'Brien, Secretary of the Western Board, said he had not been suspended by their Board within the last four years at least.

There was no other proposal and Daly was declared suspended for one month from the date of the match.

When the Board commenced dealing with the report in general, Paddy Kenneally said he wished to state that Ballyduff were big and strong and by nature almost always played rough. But he found them to be a very sporting team at all times.

Mr. P. Coffey said he saw the last five minutes of the game and he thought it was the worst exhibition of sportsmanship he had ever seen. By the Ballyduff club.

Maurice Dowling (Erin's Own) said there was a lot of talk in the city after the game.

Mr. Mossie Hallahan (Ardmore) said he was a spectator at the game and what he saw was not sportsmanship. It was the most disgraceful exhibition he had ever seen.

Mr. John McKenna (Brickkeys) said if it was as bad as the referee had stated, he should have called off the game.

At this stage, Mr. Michael Feeney (Ballyduff) asked if he could say something about the matter, but he was ruled

out by the Chairman, who said the Ballyduff representative was not entitled to say anything at this stage.

Mr. Moloney went on to say that he was there during the game and the way it was played did no credit to the Association. He had no axe to grind with anyone. He ordered the Chairman, Secretary and captain of the Ballyduff Club to appear before the January meeting of the Board.

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Utd. back on winning trail
