UNEXPECTED PASSING OF COLR. DENIS MONTAYNE

KNOCKANORE

The news of the death of Mr. Denis Montayne, M.C.C. of Knockanore, which occurred on Sunday, 3rd inst., after a brief illness, was learned with deep sorrow, not only in his native district but throughout the county. Since 1956, when he was elected to the County Council and subsequently to subsidiary bodies, he had a reputation as a worthy representative of the people, wise in his decisions, calm in debate and approaching all contentious matters with tact. He represented the Fianna Fail party on the council, but while he held strong political views, he never allowed them to interfere with his personal friendships.

He was ever at the service of the people of his native district and laboured unselfishly in their interests. Every worthy cause, local or national, had in him a generous supporter. His untimely death is a grave public loss and it will be difficult to fill his place in the community.

On Monday evening very large numbers assembled for the removal of the remains, which were borne from the family home by the members of the local G.A.A. Club, and received by Very Rev. M. Power, P.P., and Rev. S. Nugent, C.C.

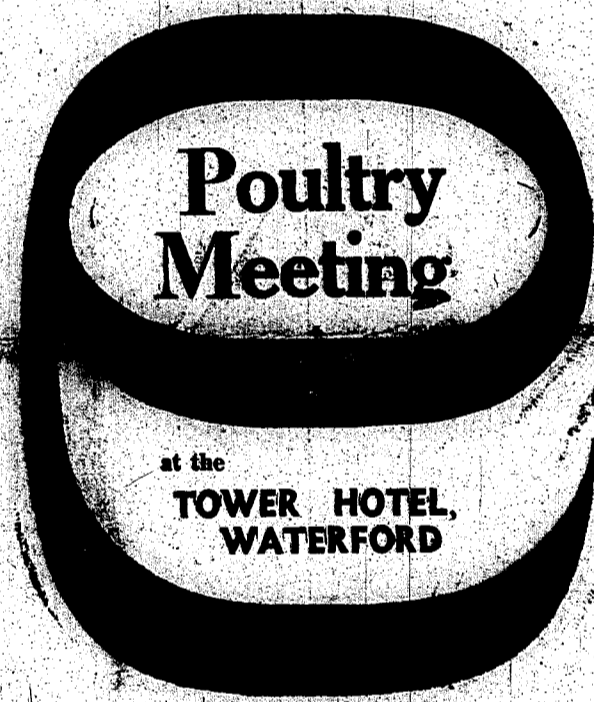

An Roinn Talmhaíochta Bonus on Sales of Turkey Poults by Licensed Hatcheries. It was announced in the Second Programme of Economic Expansion that the Government would pay a temporary bonus on high quality poults purchased by turkey rearers from hatcheries. The Minister for Agriculture, has arranged to introduce a bonus scheme accordingly for the coming season. Under the Scheme, a bonus of 1/6 per poult will be paid to licensed hatcheries on sale of poults to rearers, on condition that the poults are sold to the rearers at a price not exceeding 4/- per poult. The scheme will apply to sales of poults for rearing and fattening at the purchaser's premises for slaughter, i.e., it will not apply to sales by the hatcheries of poults exported or sales of poults for breeding. A list of licensed turkey hatcheries is obtainable from the Secretary, Department of Agriculture (Poultry and Eggs Division) 16 Upper Mount Street Dublin 2. 1st January, 1965.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

It is with interest that members of the N.F.A. have read of proposals to provide very costly public water supplies in the Waterford area. This 'one-off' cost for many years' benefit is a very attractive prospect to the public at large. The Waterford area is a very fertile one and the water supply is being extended to the area. The N.F.A. has been working for some time on this project and it is hoped that it will be completed in the near future. The N.F.A. has been working for some time on this project and it is hoped that it will be completed in the near future.

The recently published plan to install a 'sub-regional' scheme in the Modeligo area will cost at least £282,000, which does not include the cost of connecting houses to the main pipe line or connections within private property. This amount to a cost of over £540 per consumer (if all the hours and farms are connected and many already have their own supplies), in contrast to an average cost of about £250 for a private supply which includes a deep well and pressure pump, and piping into the house and yard. There is a 50% Government grant, which halves the cost of the installation and, of course, there are no subse-quent water rates to pay and no cost to the rate-payer.

With these considerations in view, the N.F.A. have already held a special meeting, with public representatives, to discuss the seriousness of the situation. As a result, three meetings are being arranged in the Modeligo area on the nights of January 14, 19 and 22nd. Speakers will put the facts and discuss the possible alternative method of providing piped water and the cost. Let there be no doubt that N.F.A. know and appreciate that piped water is essential to all the community and to modern farming, but it must be installed at a cost which the community can reasonably afford to pay.

Late Col. Denis Montayne

AN APPRECIATION

The Grim Reaper's call was answered on Sunday last by Denis Montayne, Knockanore, a genial and highly respected member of Waterford County Council. His passing at a comparatively young age came with tragic unexpectedness and had a shattering impact on the public he served with unflinching loyalty for so long.
 Five short years now I have known the late Denis Montayne, but during that time I had come to know him as a most dedicated Public Representative that never spared himself in helping the people of his Electoral area. He could not be described as a man of many words, but when he did speak, it was with an authority and confidence that commanded respect.
 Although a most valued member of the Fianna Fail Party since boyhood, he was never one to introduce politics into the County Council chamber. He worked ceaselessly for all who sought his aid irrespective of political affiliation and since his election to the County Council first in 1956, he was duly elected at the subsequent election. He has also served with credit, distinction and honour on the Committee of Agriculture and the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee.

His outstanding political career apart, the possession of so many exemplary features in his character makes the writer steel itself to his acquaintance. In ever respect he was as straight as the proverbial die, a Public Representative who in a distinguished career achieved an incalculable amount for his local area. Whenever I met Denis prior to the commencement of Council meetings, joviality was his keynote and he seemed to possess an endless amount of wit.
 Now he is with us no more. The Council chamber will not be the same without him; his passing has treated a void not easily overcome. Men of Denis Montayne's calibre and integrity are all too rare in this present day world and to the people he represented his untimely passing is little short of catastrophic.
 To his bereaved family the writer extends deepest sympathy on their great loss.

The local firm of Messrs James Watson and Son, in open competition, were successful in tendering for the supply of three large stained glass windows for the new church at Worcester Park, Surrey. Amongst the recent commissions were 14 windows for the Church of Our Lady of the Wayside, Maryville, Johannesburg, windows over the high altar of Pope St. Gregory, Missouri, windows for Presentation College, St. John, Barbados, W.I., and three windows for La St. Union Convent, Herve, La St. Union, Old Land Mark.


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Western Convention In Lismore On Sunday

the existing bye-laws amended; That goal nets be placed behind each goal for all championship and league matches at Grade "A" pitches;

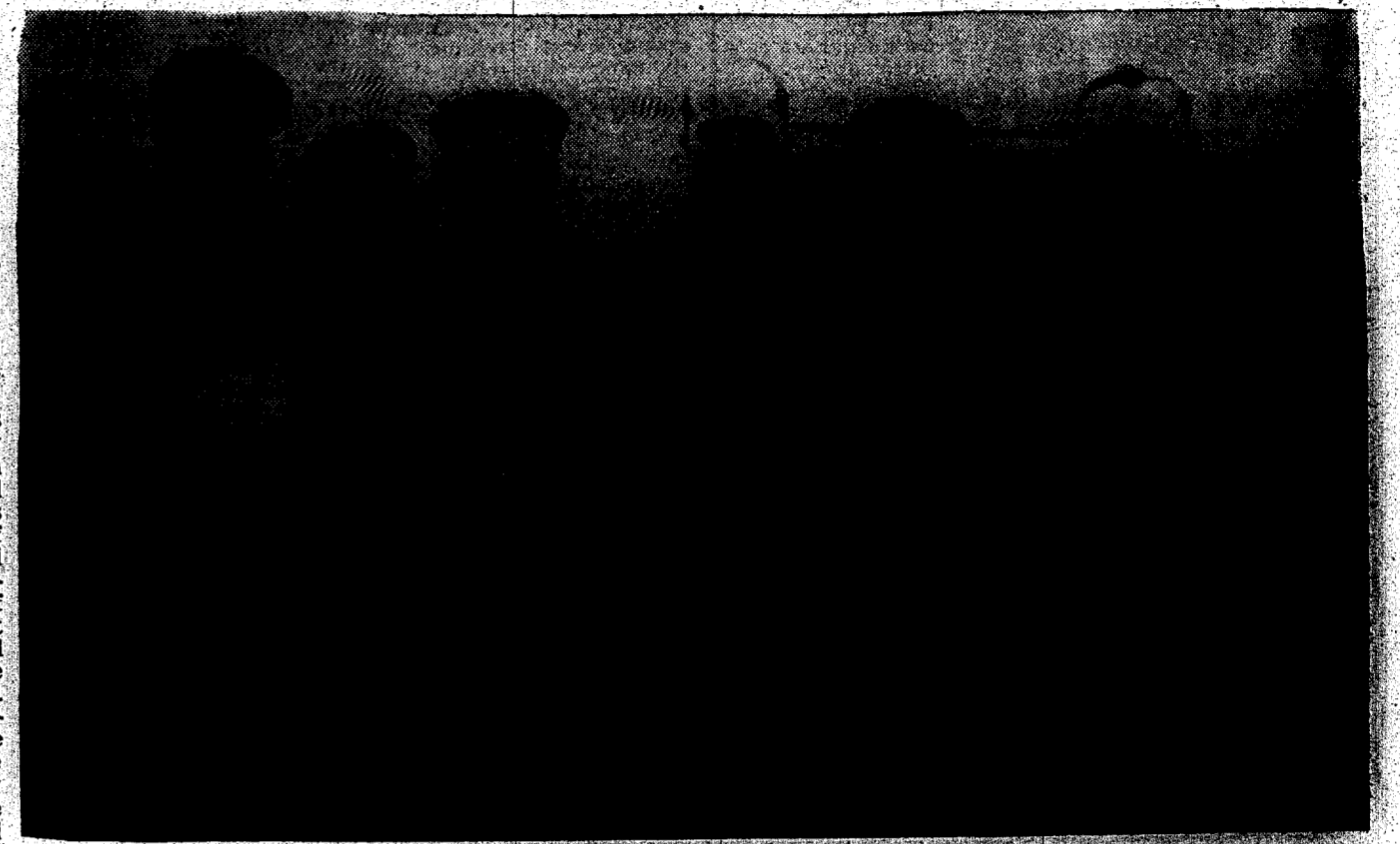
That fixtures, venues and time of matches appear on local weekly papers for the following Sunday's fixtures. Completing the list of motions are the following two by Abbeyside—

Abbeyside Lose 2-Goal Lead in drawn league tie

ABBEYSIDE UTD., 2; WOODSTOWN, 2.

AFTER some weeks of inactivity, Abbeyside United resumed their battle for Division 111 League honours on Sunday last when they travelled to Woodstown and took a very valuable point from the homesters. This was one of Utd.'s stiffest obstacles to-date, and under the circumstances they did well to share the spoils. Yet, ironically, it was a game Utd. could and should have won, as they surrendered what appeared to be a commanding two-goal lead.

The conditions were all against good football, but nevertheless, the sides displayed enough spirit and skill to satisfy the fairly large attendance. There were plenty of goalmouth thrills at both ends, and in this draw, both looked capable of having quite a say in the league series to come.

Utd. will, of course, forever bemoan the loss of a point in this game. They took the initiative, at an early stage and so confidently were they playing for one of the tie that even the Woodstown players themselves may have been resigned to defeat. But then came two inexcusable defensive errors by United and their lead had been erased. And at the end the sides were still level.

The opening half was a comparatively even one although Utd. looked the more dangerous of the two up front. After missing from some very scorable positions, they took a deserved lead with a goal by Francis McGovern and shortly afterwards were out of luck in not scoring, when a

great shot by Mick Brett came thudding back off the cross-bar. Towards the interval the homesters began to come much more into the game, but Utd. still turned over with that loan goal advantage.

Woodstown sunk deeper into trouble within five minutes of the restart, when Utd. scored their second goal. The ball broke loose from a duel between Milo Tierney and Peter Power and the Abbeyside centre-forward quickly snapped up the chance to slam the ball to the net from close range.

Then in the 15th minute Woodstown came right back into the game with their first score. They forced a corner which was taken by Tierney and though his centre looked well covered by the defence left a home forward with but the simple task of tapping the ball home from less than two yards.
