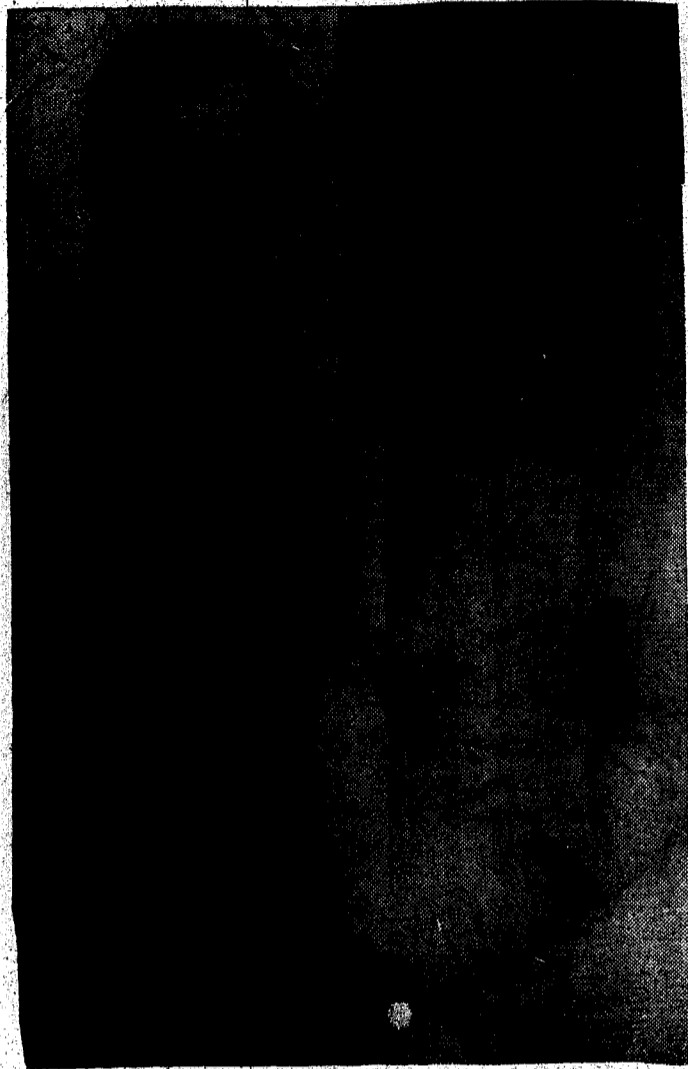

## County Council Pays Tribute To Late Colleague

TRIBUTES to the memory of the late Colr. Denis Montayne were paid by his County Council colleagues prior to the adjournment as a mark of respect at last Monday's meeting of the Council.

The Chairman, Mr. Charles Curran, said this was the second time within a few months that they were assembled to pay tribute to the memory of a colleague. The death of Colr. Montayne came as a profound shock to them all—to the members of the County Council, to the people of his native district and to the people of the entire County Waterford. It was hard to realise that never again would they see his happy smile or hear his pleasant voice. Denis Montayne was a man among men—a faithful colleague, a sincere friend, a devoted and unselfish Public Servant whose outstanding characteristics were kindness, gentleness, devotion to duty and love for his fellow man.

Mr. Curran said the late Colr. Montayne set a standard for them all in private and public life and the best tribute they could pay to his memory was to carry on the work to which he devoted his life. "To his bereaved sisters we extend our sincere

sympathy," he added. Colr. H. H. Dowd said it was with very deep regret that he rose to speak of the late Colr. Montayne. He was a great friend of his and for that reason he did not feel like saying a lot about him now. In his native parish, on the County Council and as a member of his Political Party he was as honourable a man as one could meet and this Council, his own district and the County as a whole would be the poorer without him.

Colr. Norman Walsh said Colr. Montayne's death had come as a great shock and with complete surprise to him. He had been doing business with him the day before he died and little did he (speaker) think then that the great call would come for him the very next day.

Colr. Montayne, he said, was a loyal colleague, quiet unassuming and inoffensive. He did trojan work for the people of Knockanore, Glendine and Kilwatermoy and he never spared himself for them. To him he was a close

and esteemed friend and he had always found him to be a man of integrity—strictly honest and just. He was the guiding light of the United parishes of Knockanore, Glendine and Kilwatermoy. He wished to join in extending deepest sympathy to his bereaved sisters.

Colr. Wm. Dower said he also wished to express sympathy with Colr. Montayne's sisters. He had little to add to what had already been stated.

Deputy T. A. Kyne said as deputy for the County he would like to be associated with the expressions of sympathy. Colr. Montayne had been a loyal and worthy colleague and although they differed in politics, Colr. Montayne did not allow that to come between them.

Colr. George Heekin said Colr. Montayne was a great loss not alone to the County at large but especially to the people of Knockanore. He was always available running here and there for them and never spared himself working for the good of his locality.

Colr. Frank Roche said he was second to none as a colleague and they would all miss him very much.

Colr. John Fahey said he would like to endorse everything that had been said about Colr. Montayne. He felt privileged to be able to call himself a friend of his. He was always smiling and although he did not speak very often at their meetings but when he did he was well worth listening to. He accompanied Colr. Montayne to many houses in the Knockanore area some time ago and he would never forget the welcome that awaited Colr. Montayne in every house. He did trojan work for these people and was a man always doing a good turn. He was the essence of kindness and he was one that appreciated what the people of Knockanore thought of him. He was a great loss to the Co. Council but the greatest loss was to his sorrowing sisters.

Senator J. Butler said Colr. Montayne had been a very sincere friend of his and he was shocked at the news of his death.

Colr. Michael Harty said that all the glowing tributes that had been paid to the late Colr. Montayne were merited. He too had always held him in the highest esteem. The best tribute of all they could pay to him now would be to have Requiem Mass offered for the repose of his soul.

Colr. M. Galgey said he was very sorry to have lost what he would call a friend of the whole county. He was always interested in everything good for every part of the County and he was a great loss to the people of his own area.

Colr. Sean Whelan described him as one of the

best friends anyone could have had on the Co. Council. Colr. W. Foran said he was a gentleman to his finger tips—a man that was to be admired.

Colr. Kieran O'Ryan said of him: "He was a real true friend. A most inoffensive and unassuming man."

Colr. J. Drohan said the first thing that struck him about Colr. Montayne was the kindness of his expression. They had lost a worthy colleague.

The County Manager on behalf of the Council staff and on his own behalf was associated with the expressions of sympathy. So also was the County Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dowling.

It was also decided on the proposal of the Chairman seconded by Colr. Dowd that they adjourn as a mark of respect to the late Colr. Montayne.

Resolutions of sympathy were also passed with the wife and family of the late Declan Barron, former Co. footballer; to the wife and family of the late William O'Brien, Talow and to the family of the late Jack Cummins, O'Connell St., Dungarvan.

## Fined £18 and Disqualified from Driving

Thomas O'Sullivan, Ardmore, was fined a total of £18 and was disqualified from driving for six months by District Justice Skinner at Dungarvan Court, on Wednesday.

The defendant was charged with (1) On Sept. 20th, at Pulla, Ring, driving a motor car without insurance; (2) £15 fine for driving without Tax; (3) no rear white light; (4) failing to produce a driving licence.

The defendant pleaded guilty to all the charges. He had no previous convictions. He was fined £18 and disqualified from driving for six months.

## Smashed Bottle For 'Good Luck'

A DEFENDANT who smashed three bottles inside a chip shop and another outside the door for "good luck" appeared before Judge Skinner at Wednesday's District Court in Dungarvan. He was Terence O'Sullivan, Boreenatra, Dungarvan, and he was fined £1 and ordered to pay 12/- compensation.

Supt. S. Fanning, Prosecuting, said at 12.30 a.m. the defendant called on the chip shop of Mrs. Maureen O'Doherty at Mitchell Street, Dungarvan and asked for chips. Mrs. O'Doherty asked him to leave as the defendant had some differences with her previously and he would not be served in the shop. He refused to leave and she called her husband, but the defendant still would not leave. Mr. O'Doherty then rang for the Guards but the defendant smashed three bottles in the shop and said they had now no reason to send for the Guards. He was using bad language. Outside the shop and smashed another bottle and said "that is one for good luck."

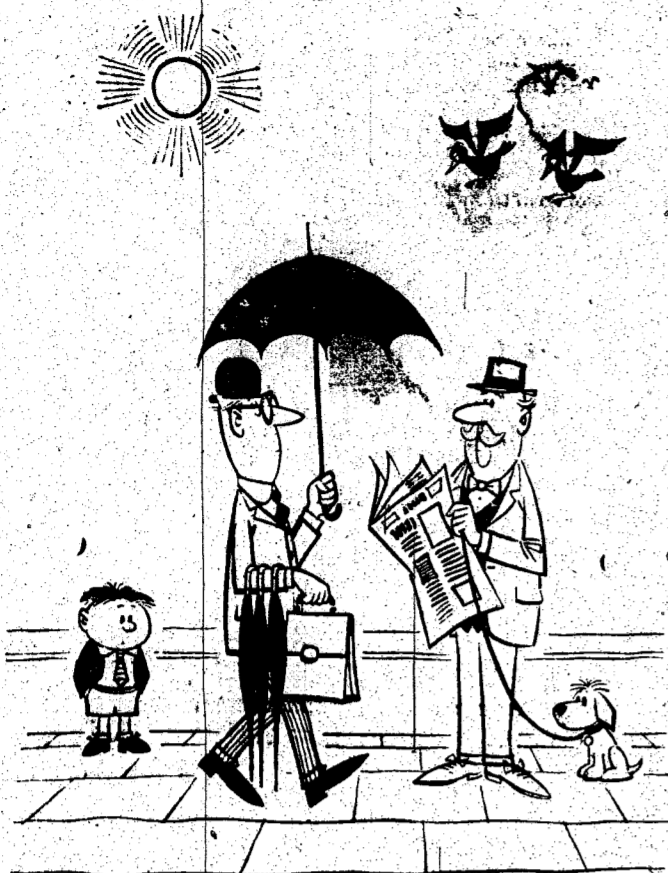

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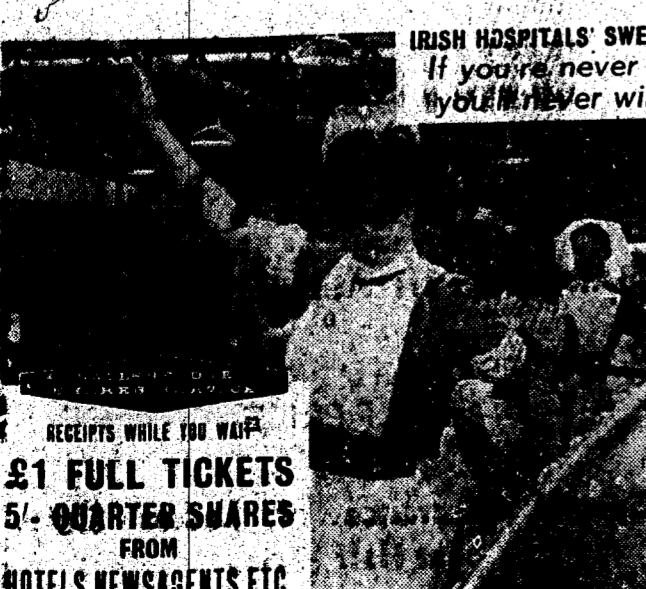

The Committee's Chairman Ven. Archdeacon D. Power, P.P., said that since their last meeting they had lost one of their most valued members in Mr. Montayne. He was a sincere member of the Committee and a fine type of man. He did not say a great deal, but when he did speak he was well worth listening to. He was a great loss to the Committee and to the people of Knockanore, whom he served so well.

Vice-Chairman, Mr. Norman Walsh said the late Mr. Montayne was a highly esteemed and respected member of the Vocational Committee. He was keenly interested in Vocational Education and particularly so in West Waterford. He would always be remembered for his trojan work in having a technical school established in Tallow and for also acquiring the Mobile School for his native Knockanore. He was a quiet unassuming and inoffensive man and in all his years in Public Life, he (speaker) could not recall Mr. Montayne uttering a harsh word to anyone.

Deputy T. A. Kyne described the late Mr. Montayne as a humble man, keen in his job and a man that represented his area very well. It was with shock and regret that he heard of his death.

**Deputy Kyne Criticises Party's Representation**

Speaking at a Labour Party Branch meeting at Tramore on Thursday last, Deputy Kyne said that it was disgraceful that out of twenty-three Councillors in Co. Waterford, only one Labour Councillor had been elected. The fault lay with the workers themselves, he said, as it was not to be expected that forces in the county should vote on Labour representatives when the farm workers, road labourers and factory workers were foolish enough to vote to represent them people, who, no matter how well meaning they might be, did not understand the problems of the workers.

How could men who did not have to count the pen-

nies to try to provide for themselves and their families understand the problems of those whose income is just bordering on the poverty level.

In Co. Waterford Health Authority, a body that is set up to look after the Health Services for the workers in the main, it was unbelievable that not a single labour representative was selected from the county. Much as the City representatives might try to give attention to the problems of rural workers, they would be unable to deal with problems of which they had no personal knowledge. This was only common sense and the blame for it did not lay on them, but on voters in the county who failed when given the chance to elect sufficient of their own councillors to make sure that county workers interests were looked after and protected.

Next June this position could be rectified. It was up to workers all over the county to band together in Labour Branches such as Tramore and put forward candidates for county, urban and town Councils and then to work hard to convince the workers that by voting for those Labour candidates, they would be voting in their own interests and when they needed help to fight a wrong remedy an injustice or expose failure on the part of any paid official to do his or her duty fairly and without discrimination—they would be able to demand from their own representatives that service.

The following were re-elected to contest the Tramore Town Commissioners election as Labour Party candidates: J. McCarthy, T.C., and R. Flynn.

J. McCarthy was also selected as the candidates to be put forward to the Constituency Conference to contest the Tramore Division in the coming County Council elections.

Mr. John Power said he had always found him to be an honest and upright man.

Mr. Michael Harty said they had lost a colleague that had given the utmost co-operation in the furtherance of all vocation matters and his area had lost an excellent representative. The school that was established through his influence would stand in his memory.

Rev. Fr. T. C. Butler said that although he had only known the late Mr. Montayne one year but all that had been said about him was true.

The C.E.O., Mr. J. Rushe, on behalf of the Vocational teachers, the clerical staff, and on his own behalf, said he wished to be associated with the expressions of sympathy. He had met Mr. Montayne outside the Committee on a number of occasions, principally in connection with the new Tallow technical school and the Mobile school in Knockanore, and he found him to be a thorough gentleman. His death was a great loss to the Vocational Committee and especially to the people of the area he served so splendidly and so unpar-

**THE '65 SUGAR BEET CROP**

The Company has refrained until now from making any detailed or general refutation of allegations in the Press attributed to the Beet Growers' Association. It has done so:

- (a) in a desire to minimise the serious injury being done to the interests of Irish Agriculture in general, and beet growers in particular. (Delays in contracting always impose extra costs on farmers for fertilizers, sprays, etc.) and
- (b) because it has sufficient confidence in the good sense of the efficient and economic beet growers to believe that they will not be taken in by such propaganda. The returns from their beet crops show them the big increase paid.

We now have proof of this in the fact that a very large number have, in the first four days, signed their Contracts for 12,900 acres of the 1965 beet crop. This is much above the normal rate at which contracts come in.

The essential facts of the dispute are:  
(1) Since 1948 the Company has succeeded in giving growers a price for beet which gives them the costs of production plus a fair profit. This, in fact, is now the highest price in the world after taking into

account all such matters as freight subsidy, terms of sale of Pulp, Seed, etc. Can this be said of anything else the farmer sells?

- (2) The Company believes that it is foolish and dangerous to the true interests of farmers to divorce prices from costs and that a shilling saved by farmers in costs is much more useful than a shilling gained in higher prices. There will be many hands reaching out to take an increase in price from the farmer. They cannot as easily take from him a shilling gained by reduced costs.

- (3) The Beet Growers' Association in 1963 repudiated the existing method of costings and demanded £1 when the agreed costings showed them entitled to only 6/1d. They got 11/1d. on the understanding and agreement:—

- (a) that the extra 5/- would go towards meeting the impending 9th round of wage increases;
- (b) that the costing of production by the modern and lower cost means available to the farmers would be undertaken.

- (4) While still maintaining friendly and close relations with the Company, the Beet Growers' Association Negotiating Committee at its Annual General Meeting dropped a bomb in the shape of a resolution instructing the Negotiating Committee to demand £1 a ton increase in price and to take nothing less. This decision was made before ascertaining costs of production by any system and even without meeting the Company to discuss this. When it was made, certain members are reported in the papers to have declared their determination to have a fight with the Company and, in the words of one, to "give it no escape hatch".
- (5) The Beet Growers' Association had, at this time, made no such claim on the Company but only to the Press, nor has it even yet presented its claim in writing but only in the form of a verbal ultimatum at a date when contracts and fertilizer order forms should already have been issued. Why did it not hold its meetings with growers last summer and autumn instead of now after it had already decided to try to disrupt the industry?
- (6) The Beet Growers' Association Negotiating Committee refused to even discuss the important questions of how to reduce farmers' costs unless it first got an extra £1 a ton. For example, the Negotiating Committee refused to discuss, or make proposals on, the subject of Pulp which is of serious concern to most beet growers who require it for feeding.
- (7) There has been no change in the policy of this Company which remains one of striving by every means:—

  - (a) to reduce farmers' costs;
  - (b) to expand the opportunities for guaranteed markets at guaranteed prices;
  - (c) to pay the best possible price for every commodity;
  - (d) to do all its business with farmers in close co-operation and constant consultation with its contract growers and with their elected representatives.

## ATTITUDES TOWARDS E.E.C. AT N.F.A. NATIONAL CONGRESS

Europe's present in the person of M. Roger Savary, Secretary General of the International Federation of Agricultural Producers, and Mr. John Schlingemann, President of the Group of Economic Experts, C.O.P.A. (the combined organisation of farmers' unions in the E.E.C.)

Europe heard the N.F.A. demand Common Market membership and Europe heard the Taoiseach, Mr. Lemass, herald.

"I would like to repeat," said Mr. Richard Deasy, President, N.F.A., "the N.F.A.'s demands for an immediate and resolute approach to the E.E.C. and the immediate appointment of a separate Irish ambassador accredited to the Community. I know that the present Ambassador and his small staff, overburdened as they are with their obligations to represent us to the Belgian Government to the E.E.C. Euratom and the European Coal and Steel Community, have done much excellent work. But we should do as Spain has done and have an Ambassador full-time on this, the most important of all the economic issues affecting Ireland's future."

**TAOISEACH'S VIEW**

Mr. Lemass's attitude was: "We are an applicant country for E.E.C. There is nobody who can have any doubt about our desire to obtain membership or misunderstand our position in any serious degree. We will re-activate our application when after a cold, calm and comprehensive calculation of all the facts and probabilities, we see that our national advantage will be served thereby. That calculation cannot yet be made with any confidence, and we have no intention of making it until it is possible."

Stating that 72% of our total exports and 79% of our agricultural exports now went to the British market, Mr. Lemass said that sensible plans for the expansion of our agricultural exports could not ignore the necessity for obtaining and retaining freedom of access to the British market.

"We are having discussions," he said, "with the British Government on future trade arrangements between the two countries. What may come of them, if anything, cannot yet be forecast, but in any intelligent order of priorities these discussions must take place before we consider the alternative courses which may be possible for us." Dealing with the British 15% surcharge, Mr. Lemass said that it had complicated the situation and he did not think it very likely that this situation would be clarified to such an extent this year that we would be able to map with certainty the road ahead in all its aspects.

**EUROPE'S ATTITUDE**

M. Savary said that the atmosphere towards Ireland within E.E.C. was receptive and he felt that a favourable attitude would be taken to a follow-up to Ireland's application for membership. He felt that the first step for Ireland was to try to re-open negotiations with the E.E.C. Commission so as to ascertain what would be the problems confronting the country and how they would be solved. He admitted that in the case of Ireland there would be problems because Irish industries "may have fears about competition from better established industries. But all that would be solved in the famous Community spirit which provides assistance to developing areas."

"I can never understand," he said, "why the Irish Government is so hesitant in forging ahead with negotiations in view of her current trade picture." M. Savary's final words were: "I think the future of Europe lies in the largest possible Community."

Mr. John Schlingemann's advice was what we immediately develop diplomatic contacts with the E.E.C. so as to ascertain our exact position in relation to the Common Market. On his arrival in Dublin, Mr. Schlingemann stated that it was politically and economically possible for Ireland to join the Common Market, she should do so

for 10 pence and the Soviet Republic enough for only 4 or 5. — Mr. C. S. Stephaneides, Agricultural Attaché to the Embassy in Moscow.

"I have heard some things that the farmers should be happy to see Haulbowline Island subsidised under the pleasant waters of Park harbour, Dublin, and the feather bedding of the Irish (Steel) Holdings (I.E.C.) which of course is quite contrary to the trend of our free trade policy, adds something between £30 and £40 to the cost of a hayshed. — W. A. Nedman, Irish Press.

The chances for the farmers will be great in the E.E.C.—so also will be the competition, — John Schlingemann, President of the Group of Economic Experts, C.O.P.A.

**10th N.F.A. Birthday Celebrations**

Co. Waterford was represented in Dublin on Wednesday at the 10th birthday celebrations of the N.F.A. by Co. Chairman, Edmund Cheasty, Kilmacdonagh, Co. Secretary, Brian Pearce, Monaghan, and Messrs. D. J. Coughlan, Michael Power, Eugene Power, Paddy Heekin, Eddie Cunningham, David Hourigan, Sean Maher, also present, from Co. Longford and former Secretary of the N.F.A. in Waterford.

Two resolutions from Co. Waterford Executive were accepted by the Congress. They pointed to the lack of energy on the part of the Government to gain entry into the Common Market and so the lack of action on the part of the Government to now reverse the adverse foreign trade balance and to gain entry into the European Market.

**MR. DILLON ON THE "NEED OF FOUR TIME"**

Mr. J. Dillon, T.D., Leader of the Opposition, stated that in the world where the great majority of men and women were hungry, it seemed fantastic to be talking of agricultural surpluses. The need of our time was not to restrict production on the land, but to feed the hungry. The great problem of our time was not over production but inadequate distribution.

A farm worker in the U.S. now produces enough to feed 21 persons. In 1920 he fed only 8. In Europe the average farmer produces enough

**MR. DEASY CALLS ATTENTION TO MANY PROBLEMS**

In his speech to the Congress, Mr. Deasy said that far greater speed in the division of land acquired by the Land Commission was necessary. "We are convinced that the Land Bill should have included our own providing for the division of commonages by the Land Commission where the majority of users formally request such division," he said.

He believed the Pilot Area Scheme to be an honest and sincere attempt to get down to brass tacks, but it was, yet, too small in scope, too narrow in conception and too slow in action to cope with the requirements of today. "I cannot see in it, so far, even a trace of the dynamic determination which Mr. McEder has revealed in his Glencolmcille Project."

"N.F.A. must develop in the immediate future," he said, "its plans in this field of regional development so that small farming communities will organise themselves everywhere, within the N.F.A. framework, to demand immediate progress and to work for it."

"I say to the Minister for Agriculture that this is the most urgent and the most challenging of all his many problems and I urge him to involve himself personally in the rebuilding of the West."

He was perturbed by the swing away from tillage, particularly the decline in wheat and beet acreage. The only answer to declining tillage was the payment of increased prices for grain and the Irish Sugar Beet Growers' Association Ltd., must be supported in its present efforts to secure an increase in the price of sugar beet.

Other points made by Mr. Deasy were: He called for the establishment of a Meat Marketing Board and warned of dire consequences if this was not done; he expressed concern at the cut-throat competition which had been allowed to develop between rival co-operatives in the new dairying areas of the West and Midlands; he was yet to be satisfied of the Government's genuine intention to implement the Dr. Knapp Report on the dairying industry.

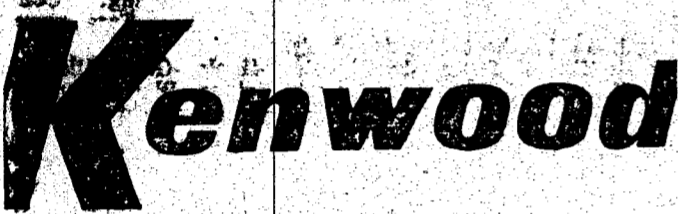

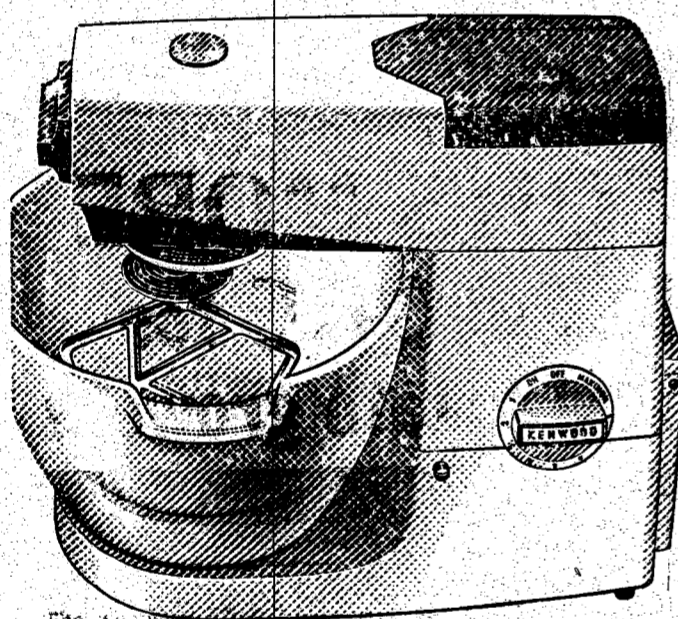

# WESTERN GAELS MEET

## Shortest Convention On Record

**ONE** hundred and twenty three delegates representing every club in the Division attended at the Palladium Cinema, Lismore, on Sunday last for the annual Western Convention. It was without doubt, one of the shortest Conventions on record, lasting less than two hours, and as expected all the outgoing officers were re-elected. Several of the motions were ruled out of order whilst many others were referred to the County Convention at the end of the month.

The Convention was opened with addresses of welcome to the delegates by Rev. Bro. Burke, newly elected Chairman of the Lismore Club and Mr. Vin Donoghue, former President of the G.A.A., representing the Coiste na Banban (the weekly pools for G.A.A. Clubs and members), Mr. Finbarr Hickey also addressed the meeting and appealed to all clubs in the Division to join the pools.

There was something of a surprise in the election of three representatives to the County Board. Outgoing man Mickey Tobin (Dungarvan), to the surprise of many did not seek re-election and clubmate Liam Power stood instead. Both the other outgoing men, John Fraher (Cappoquin) and John McKenna (Brick-Kays) were again successful, but it was Tallow clubman, Ned Power who headed the poll with 42 votes—eleven over the quota of 31. Fraher polled 24 first preferences and McKenna 19—just one more than Liam Power (Dungarvan). In the distribution of votes and following eliminations McKenna just pipped the Dungarvan man for the third position.

As expected the outgoing Chairman, Nicolaas MacCraith was again unopposed but the Vice-Chairmanship, Paddy Keenally (Gerardines) had to contend with Liam Sheehan of Tallow and after a close contest was elected by 69 votes to 61.

Outgoing treasurer Tom Walsh (Fourmilewater) was opposed by another Tallow man, Michael O'Brien, but was re-elected by double figures, 82 to 41.

Four of the thirteen motions were referred to the County Convention and three others were ruled out of order. Five of them were passed and the remaining one withdrawn.

The five motions passed were: (1) That the Board play at least two rounds of the minor championships before June 1st (Lismore); (2) That fixtures, venues, and times of matches appear on local papers each week for

are in order or feasible." "Again it disturbs one to observe, at every level something less than adequacy in outspoken and straight dealing. Our political and social history has kept up somewhat scant of the courage required to speak and act what is true and just. A great weakness in our Association is that in many cases those best trained and competent to become leaders in the different clubs deny us their support and leave it to others less qualified to do as best they can. This is a selfish attitude and smacks of spurness when those same people often turn critics of their less accomplished brethren.

"Our ideal," he said, "must be a club in every Parish, or every district associated traditionally with our games, and that club must embrace the entire community and be led by the best fitted to do so in order that they may have a healthy and guiding influence especially on their young and impressionable members. Only when we have this will we get a really top effort from players, officials and followers. In this regard too, I would suggest to you that there is great importance attached to even naming your club. Some of you invoke our Saints, others of you our Patriots, but I believe there is no substitute for the name of your parish as a clarion call to unity and effort. You will understand, I think, what I have in mind if I tell you that it has often occurred to me that my many times opponents and very good friends. Cill Rosnata have derived at least as much from their very name as they have from their many fine players."

In evidence, Mr. M.J. Joseph Power, Old Parish, said on that date he was driving his tractor to his home in Old Parish. He was doing about ten or twelve miles an hour and he saw a car coming towards him. He dimmed and the oncoming car appeared to be in the centre of the road. As it got closer it came in towards him. He (witness) swerved into the left hand side slightly as the oncoming car was now coming straight for him. The car missed the front of his tractor but hit the trailer behind. The defendant stopped and said to him "why didn't you dim your lights."

The Society confidently appeals to the public to maintain and if possible, to increase its support to the Conference funds during the coming year and thereby to share in these worthy undertakings.

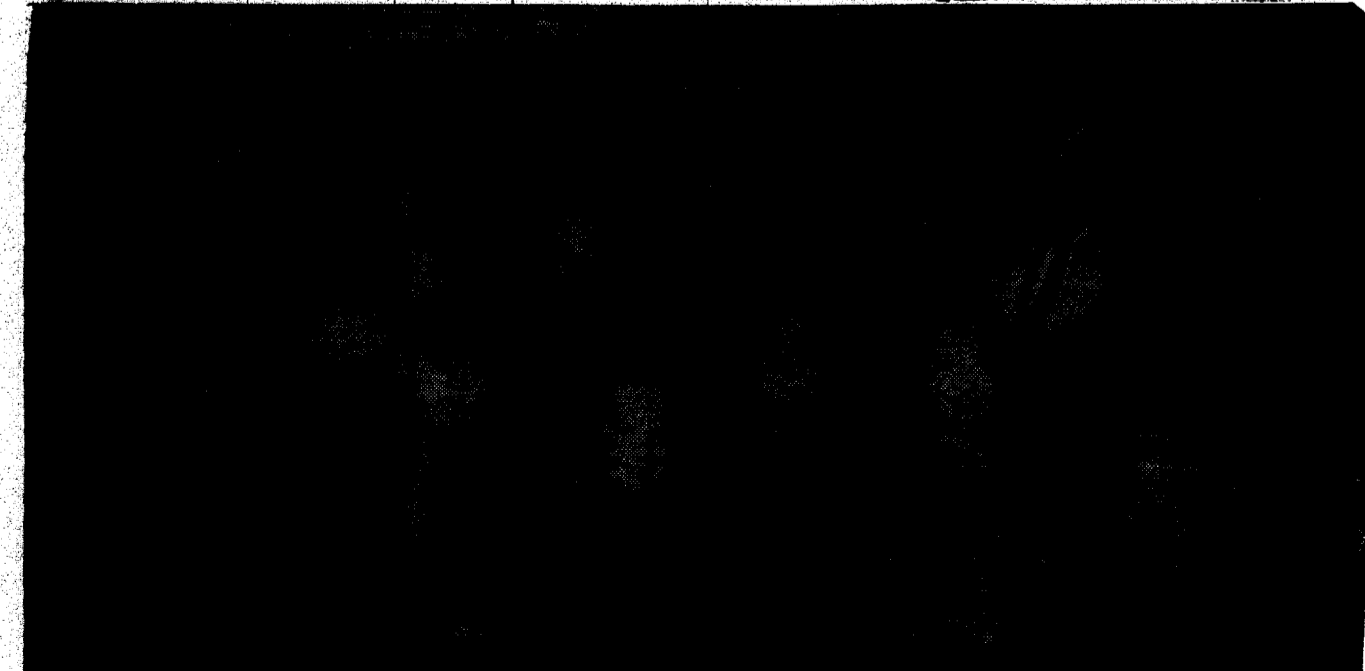
## DIOCESAN PILGRIMAGE TO LOURDES IN MAY

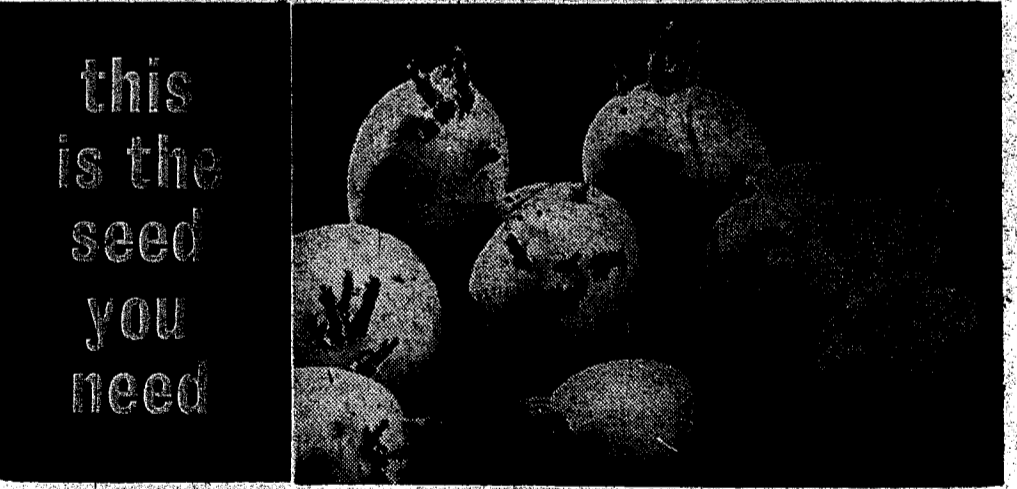
Full details of the fares and travelling arrangements will be published shortly.

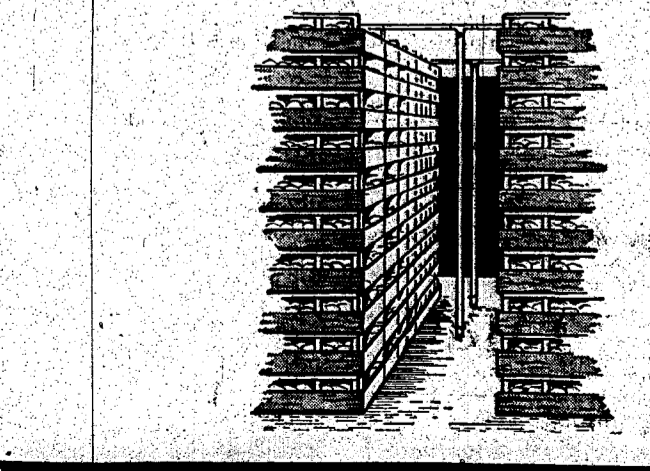
