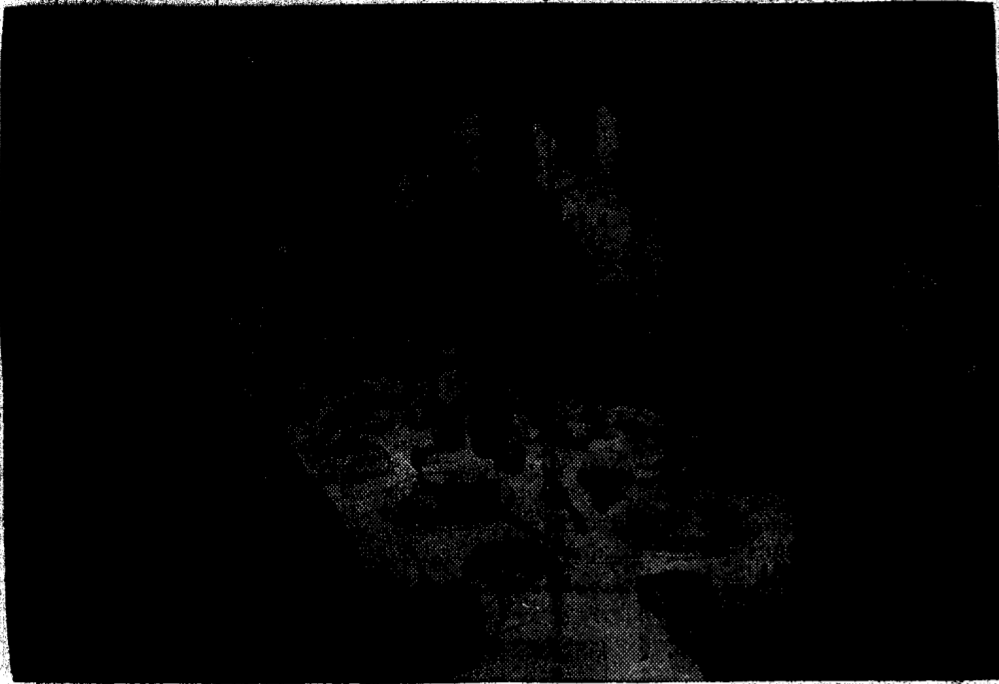

Referred Back To Urban Council

At a meeting of the County Council in Dungarvan, on Monday it was decided to refer the estimate for urban roads back to the Urban Council for consideration, and the provisional road works scheme was referred to the Estimates Meeting. In his report the County Engineer (Mr. J. D. Hally) said the total amount provided for ordinary maintenance was £28,133, based fundamentally on an allowance including white lining. In addition to the basic allowance of £105 a mile there were certain special allowances for street cleaning in individual areas and there were indicated in the Road Works Scheme.

This year he increased the provision for street cleaning from £1,520 in the current year to £1,980 in the coming year, because the money provided before proved inadequate. For the first time provision had been made for street cleaning in Clashmore and Tallow.

The Co. Engineer said that it should also be noted that the allowance of £600 in the case of Dungarvan includes a sum of £390, a contribution by the Co. Council to the Dungarvan Urban District Council in respect of this work.

The Co. Engineer said that the total mileage proposed for the coming year, 1965-66 was 3,566 miles which was slightly up on 1964-65. The condition and shape of the surface of the main roads throughout the county was 62,600. This was based on the effect of heavy traffic. He again provided for the work of re-shaping

and strengthening of road surfaces where necessary. According to census figures, mechanically propelled vehicles on the Co. Waterford roads continued to grow in numbers. There was a 17% increase in 1964 over 1963 as measured by the 12 hour traffic census taken before the August Bank Holiday each year. He anticipated that the car ferry service on the Cross-Channel route would have a significant effect in increasing the volume of traffic in the coming and future years.

The Co. Engineer said he had provided for a further special railway closing grant and he strongly recommended that the Co. Council press their case for further funds for the realignment of the Waterford-Tramore road. He also provided for a tourist grant on the same basis but he pointed out that this grant was grossly inadequate having regard to the tourist potential of Co. Waterford. He also pointed out that there had been no change in the amount of cash allocated over the last ten years although the value of money had changed very substantially in that period.

Mr. Hally went on to say that there was 1,234.73 miles. It was estimated that 855.14 miles or 70% of the roads would be dust free by March 31 next. This would leave 379.59 miles of traffic bound roads. The total expenditure proposed for ordinary maintenance of county roads this year was £62,600. This was based on £40 a mile for dust free surfaces and £270 a mile for traffic bound and non-dust free surfaces. He also

increased the provision for street cleaning of county roads from £1,195 to £1,835 because experience had shown that the previous allocation was inadequate.

Colr. M. Harty said there were many bad bends on county roads and he suggested that they be removed. Colr. John Fahey said that if the Council put up the money he felt sure that the Co. Engineer would remove the bends.

Mr. John Drohan said a census should be taken of some county roads to determine whether they should be converted to main roads. A number of county roads were at present taking as much if not more traffic than main roads.

He was told by the Co. Engineer that it was the Department who decided when a county road should become a main road.

When a suggestion that local Dail Deputies and Senators should see the Minister about the possibility of an increased Tourist Grant for the county, the vision of the constituency was referred to.

The Chairman said that Tipperary Dail Deputies did not have the same intimate contact with the county as the local deputies had.

Colr. Dower said that at the next meeting of the County Council he would propose a resolution as it was church and state dignitaries. Many tributes were paid to

B.G.A. Meets in Dublin

At a recent Council Meeting of the Irish Sugar Beet Growers Association Ltd., in Dublin, the Chairman, Mr. M. J. Corry, T.D., presided. The report of the recent beet price dispute with the Sugar Company and its eventual conclusion was given by the emergency committee. After a discussion the committee were congratulated on their handling of the dispute. On the proposition of the Chairman, seconded by the Vice-Chairman, Mr. Bernard O'Neill, Kilkenny, the Secretary was instructed to convey the Association's thanks and appreciation to all those who helped and supported them in the dispute particularly the other farming organisation whose members gave every assistance possible. The Council also decided to proceed with the election of Board Members immediately and the Secretary was instructed to insert the usual advertisements in this connection in all the local papers. Deferred Question of Extra Engineer

Waterford County Council decided by nine votes to three at a special meeting in Dungarvan on Tuesday to refer the question of appointing a Permanent Engineer to design and supervise road works.

The County Engineer (Mr.

J. D. Hally) said there were eight engineers attached to the County Council at present. The Chairman (Mr. Charles Curran) suggested that the matter be referred to the estimates meeting. Mr. Hally said he wanted

a temporary engineer to be appointed on a permanent basis. Over the past four or five years engineers had left the County Council to take up permanent appointments with other County Councils.

Deputy Kyns said the Industrial Consultants in their report on the workings of the County Council suggested that the engineer on this work should be appointed on a permanent basis.

Finally, on the proposal of Mr. Kieran O'Ryan, seconded by Mr. N. Walsh, the Council decided to adjourn the matter until they considered the Industrial Consultants report.

Ballingoul Sewerage Scheme To Start

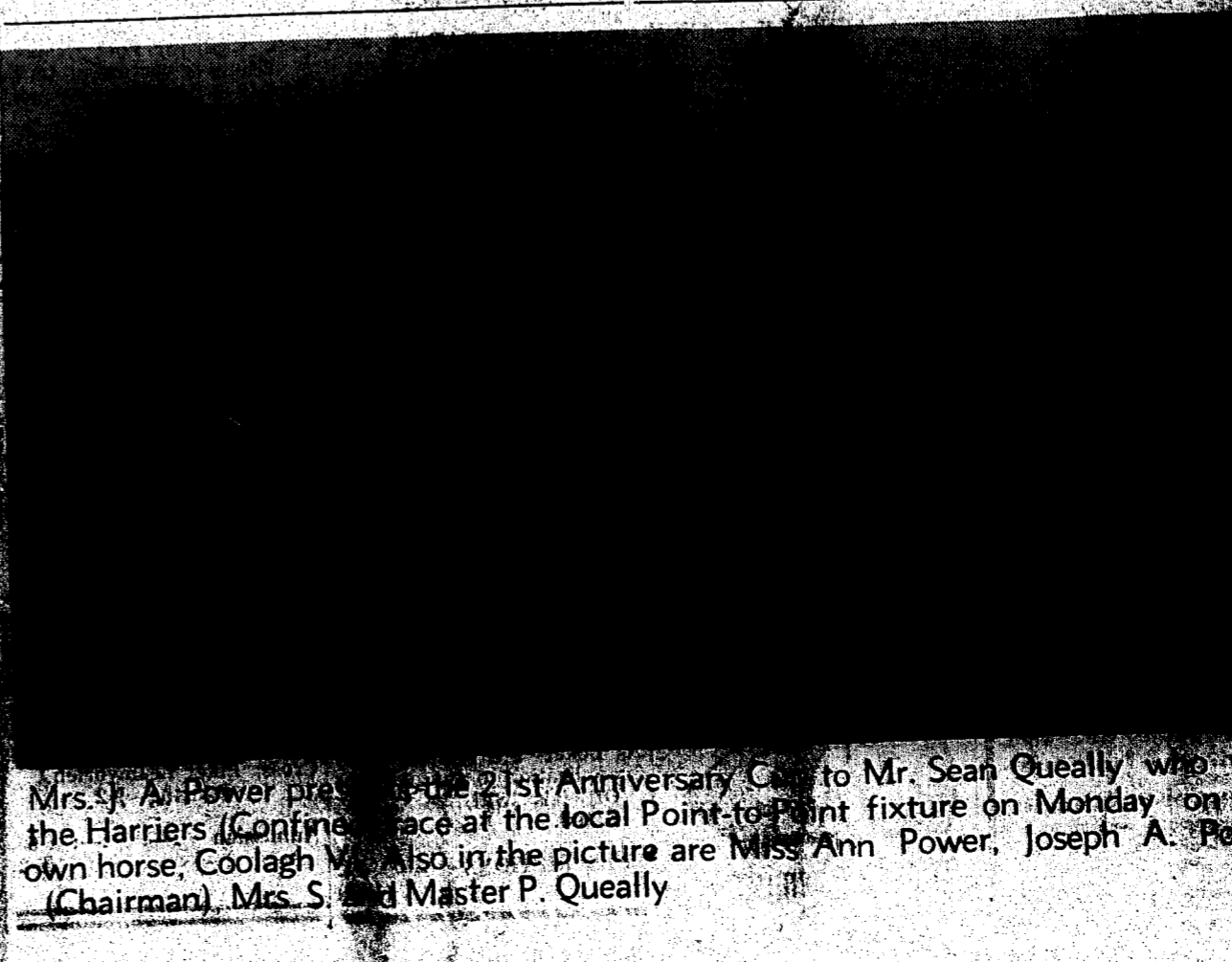
At Monday's meeting of Waterford Co. Council, the Co. Engineer promised Colr. Michael Harty that the Sewerage Scheme at Ballingoul would be started in March, by the Contractor.

The Co. Engineer also said that he had failed to procure a dredger for Helvick Harbour.

Mr. Harty suggested he use pressure on the Board of Works to do a temporary job there as an expedient.

Mr. Harty proposed that they increase the Co. Tourist Grants to the same level as three years ago, and also that they pay salaries of engineers on main road alignment outside of Local Government Grants.

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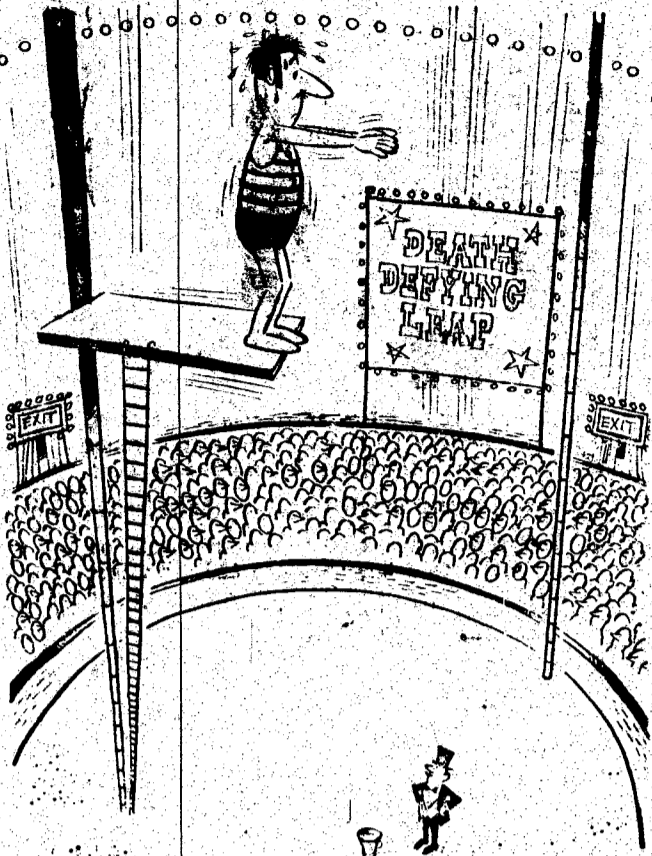

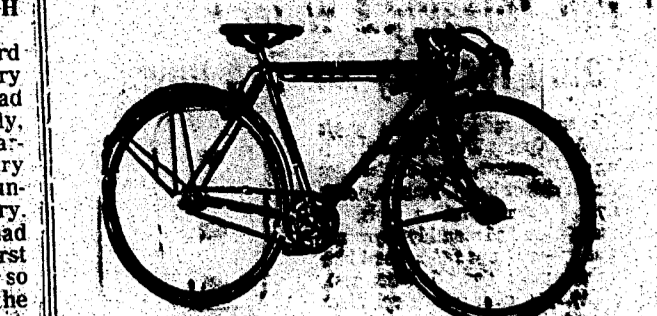

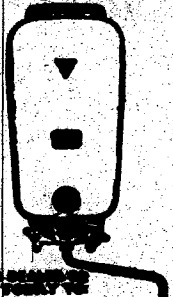

Councils' Sympathy on Bishop's Death

A special meeting of Waterford County Council, was held on Friday last, in Dungarvan, in connection with the death of His Lordship, Most Rev. Dr. Cohalan, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore. The motion of sympathy was proposed by the Chairman, Mr. C. Curran, and seconded by Mr. Norman Walsh.

Mr. Curran (Chairman) said: "We meet to-day under the shadow of a great loss—a loss which everyone in the County of Waterford, I am sure, feels in a special and personal manner—I refer to the recent lamented death of our beloved Bishop, the late Most Rev. Dr. Cohalan, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore.

"His Lordship deserves to rank in the forefront of the great line of illustrious prelates who have ruled these ancient and historic Dioceses of Waterford and Lismore. He was specially distinguished for his great sanctity, courtesy and humility—

qualities with which he was endowed in great measure. He was a distinguished scholar, having read brilliant courses as a student, attaining the highest academic distinctions, both in Sacred Theology, Canon Law and other branches of Learning.

"He was a successful administrator and earned the affection and esteem of his flock and flock, and the friendship and respect of all creeds. He was particularly concerned for the interests of the poor and the welfare of our emigrants, and was an active and zealous supporter of every good cause, whether religious or secular, of our gaelic games and language, and of the temperance movement. Notwithstanding his exalted office, he was the most approachable of men, and was always ready to give his help and wise and prudent counsel to all who sought it. He was father to his flock, who will now sadly miss him, not only as Bishop but as a true friend. The children also had a very special place in his affections.

"To his bereaved relatives we extend sincere sympathy on the loss of their distinguished kinsman; to Dean Barron and the Clergy of the Diocese we tender our respectful condolences in their great loss.

"And I would ask you, gentlemen, on this sad occasion, to pass a Resolution of our sympathy, and to adjourn our meeting as a mark of our respect to the memory of Dr. Cohalan."

The Resolution passed was as follows:—

"That we, the County Council of Waterford record our profound sorrow at the recent lamented death of the Most Rev. Doctor Daniel Cohalan, Lord Bishop of Waterford and Lismore.

"And that we convey to the relatives of the late Cohalan our respectful and sincere sympathy on the death of his Lordship, and we tender our condolences to Rt. Rev. Dean Barron and the Clergy of the Diocese.

"That we place on record our grateful and sincere appreciation of the late Dr. Cohalan's zealous and successful work for the Church and for the people of this Diocese during his episcopate and of his brilliant attainments as a Scholar and his kindly and fatherly concern for his flock at all times.

"And as a mark of our respect for his Lordship's memory, this Meeting of the County Council of Waterford do now stand adjourned."

If your dog worries livestock on agricultural land—

- You commit an offence and are liable on conviction to a fine of up to £20 for a first offence or up to £50 for a second or subsequent offence.
- If you are not present to claim it your dog may be seized and destroyed.
- If your dog is shot by a sheep-owner you may have no redress.
- You may be sued and be liable for heavy damages.

If you allow your dog out without control between the hours of sunset and sunrise, you commit an offence under the local authority bye-laws (except in the City of Dublin) and may be fined up to £100.

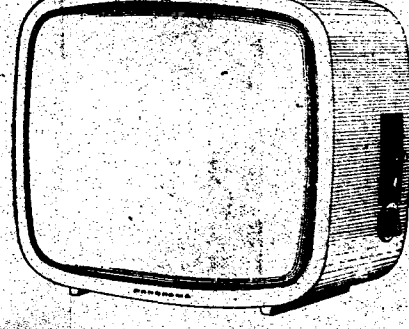

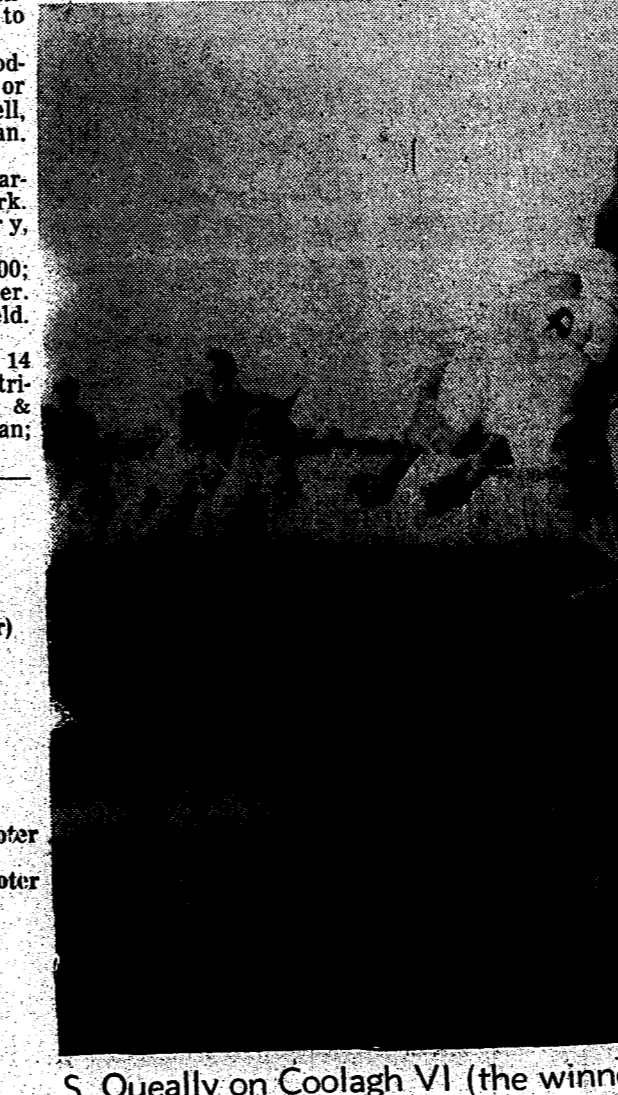

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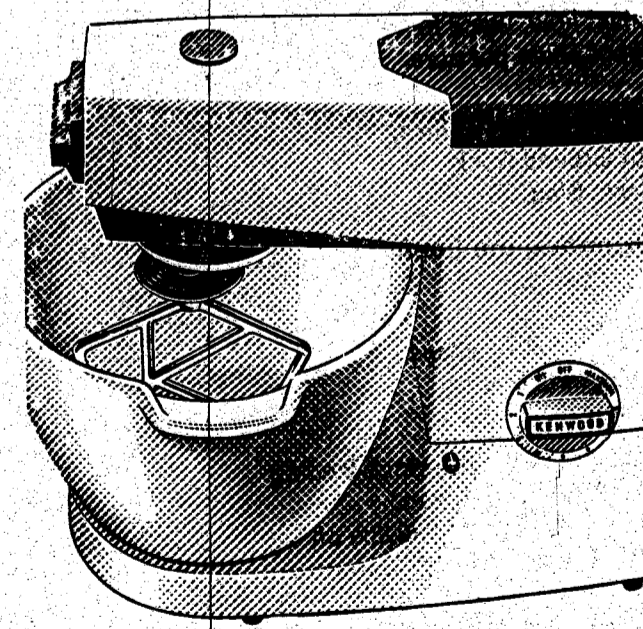

An old roadway known as the Famine road which was started in the Nire Hills (highest peak in the Coromagh's) over a century ago, but was never finished, may be recommenced and completed in the near future. The following motion proposed by Mr. John Fahey, and seconded by Mr. Kieran O'Ryan was approved by the Waleford Co. Council:—

"That we request the Co. Engineer to negotiate with Bord Fáilte with a view to having the old roadway from the Nire v. Knockanaftrin to Rathgormack brought up to standard to facilitate tourist traffic and allow it to be taken over by the County Council."

Mr. J. Fahey said the Nire Valley where there was some of the grandest scenery in the country was neglected where tourist development was concerned. OPENING OF SALMON SEASON

The salmon season opened on Monday morning at 6 o'clock. It was a mild opening as far as catches were concerned but quite the opposite as regards weather conditions. The fierce south east wind with strong tides prevailed and the netmen who braved the tempest in Youghal landed only eight salmon. Many of the two handed boats did not operate at all on the first few days, but up to the time of going to press there were very little hopes of an improvement in weather conditions. The number of drift snags and draft net licenses issued by the Clerk to the Board of Fishery Conservators were somewhat similar to that of last year. Due to the bad weather the boats in Ardmore, Knockadoon and Ballyvoton did not operate. The price to fishermen on the opening day was 15/- per lb. and it is indeed a tragedy that fishermen are hampered in their efforts by the weather. On the opening day an angler landed a 19 lb. salmon valued at £14.12.6.

BLESSING OF BOATS

For the first time ever the blessing of the boats and crews arranged on Saturday morning last after Mass had to be postponed. It will now take place on next Saturday morning at 11 o'clock.

MONUMENT NETS BANNED

By Bye-Law No. 520 dated January 22nd made by the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Fisheries, banned the use of monofilament drift nets. This bye-law forbids as from February 15 the use or attempt to use in fishing for salmon any drift net made wholly or partly of monofilament synthetic material; the possession on any boat or quay or on any bank of river or estuary, or on or near any sea-coast of salmon net for the capture of salmon, being a net made wholly or partly of monofilament material.

As this was a serious matter for Youghal fishermen who had already purchased these nets, the matter was taken up with the Parliamentary Secretary by three members of the Youghal Fishermen's Association led by Deputy Martin Corry, T.D. As a result it was agreed to postpone until May 31st the operation of this bye-law, the purpose of the postponement is to allow time for fishermen for adaptation of gear to comply with the new regulations. The deputation agreed that the ban on these types of nets was desirable in the long-term interests of salmon stocks but operated that the immediate effect of the bye-law would cause hardship and financial loss. The Parliamentary Secretary emphasised that there would be no further relaxation of the provision beyond the end of May, and that it would be strictly enforced as from 1st June.

PROPOSED YOUGHAL ABBATOIR

At a recent meeting of the Urban Council the Town Clerk, Mr. F. Moloney, presented a summary of the file in connection with provision of a public abattoir. The County Veterinary Officer considers that a central slaughtering premises with an area of 1,820 sq. feet might be adequate for the Youghal requirements. The estimated cost of providing such premises of this size without including the cost of lairage would be £8,000. It would necessitate the employment of a full-time attendant at £9 per week, provision of a truck for removal of offal etc. at annual cost of £876 apart from other incidental expenses such as lighting and heating. During the year to 31st December, 1963, 768 cattle and 64 pigs were slaughtered in Youghal Urban district. The Council agreed that the County Veterinary Officer visit Youghal and with the Town Engineer and Town Clerk inspect what would be a suitable site and report back to the next meeting of the Council.

FEAR FOR SEA-WALL

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Waterford Convention Decides BAN MUST GO

All Outgoing Officers Returned

WATERFORD wants an abolition of the Ban. That was the outcome of an historic vote at the County Convention in Dungarvan on Sunday when a motion calling for its abolition was carried by 129 votes to 123. It was an open vote, in which the name of each delegate was called and he was then asked to vote for or against the

As expected there was no change in the Official personnel for the coming year. Contrary to expectations Seamus Grant, Eastern Board Secretary, did not contest the County secretaryship against the man in possession, Deuglan Guid and the Dungarvan man was returned unopposed. Likewise there was no contest for the Chair, and Seamus O Maoldomhnaigh as expected was given a unanimous vote of confidence.

Of the four nominated to contest the treasurership, only two decided "to fight it out" — outgoing man Paddy Kennedy and Cappoquin's John Fraher. It resulted however in a sweeping victory for the Waterford City man by 190 votes to 60. The two outgoing representatives to the Munster Council — Tom Lannon (Dungarvan) and Seamus Power (Mt. Sion) were duly re-elected without a contest but the outgoing representative to Cen-

tral Council, Charlie Ware, was opposed by Billy Jones, and he defeated the Gael Og man by 151 votes to 103. The outgoing Chairman Mr. J. Mooney, N.T., in his address said that the clubs were the foundation stone on which the Association was built. The G.A.A. was as strong as its weakest link so long as the G.A.A. then would be as strong as its weakest club. If the Association was to remain strong and virile

At the outset Mitchels' delegate Sean Power proposed that the Ban be abolished. It

Mr. Watty Morrissey (Mt. Sion) opposing the motion said that if the ban was abolished people with no national outlook would take over the Association and in six or seven years it would no longer be an amateur association but a professional one. If Rule 27 was abolished the national language and games would die a sudden death.

Mr. Charles Curran (Clashmore) said he thought the time had come for the Association to take another look at Rule 27. He agreed that it needed modification but thought that it's complete abolition could be a sell out to the anti-Irish forces in the country.

Mr. Sean Power (Mitchels) said the rule in actual fact no longer existed as it was no longer being enforced where and as it should be. Of the thirty two motions listed 10 were passed, 9 lost 7 not moved and the remainder not moved for various reasons.

Other motions in the name of the John Mitchels Club that were passed were: That a panel of 25 players be selected and put into training at least one month before the Munster S.F. championship and before the commencement of the 1965/66 National football league and that in each case at least two challenge matches be played within the three weeks prior to the commencement of the first rounds; that a panel of 25 be selected at least one month before the J.F.C. and that at least two challenge games be played also before the first round; That at the first meeting of the County Board in each year a trainer be appointed to train and prepare the county senior and junior football teams for the Munster championship.

Inexorably the Convention dragged on and it was almost 7.45 when the still remaining few delegates rose to sing the National Anthem.

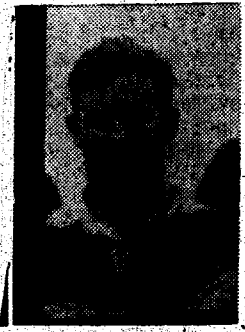

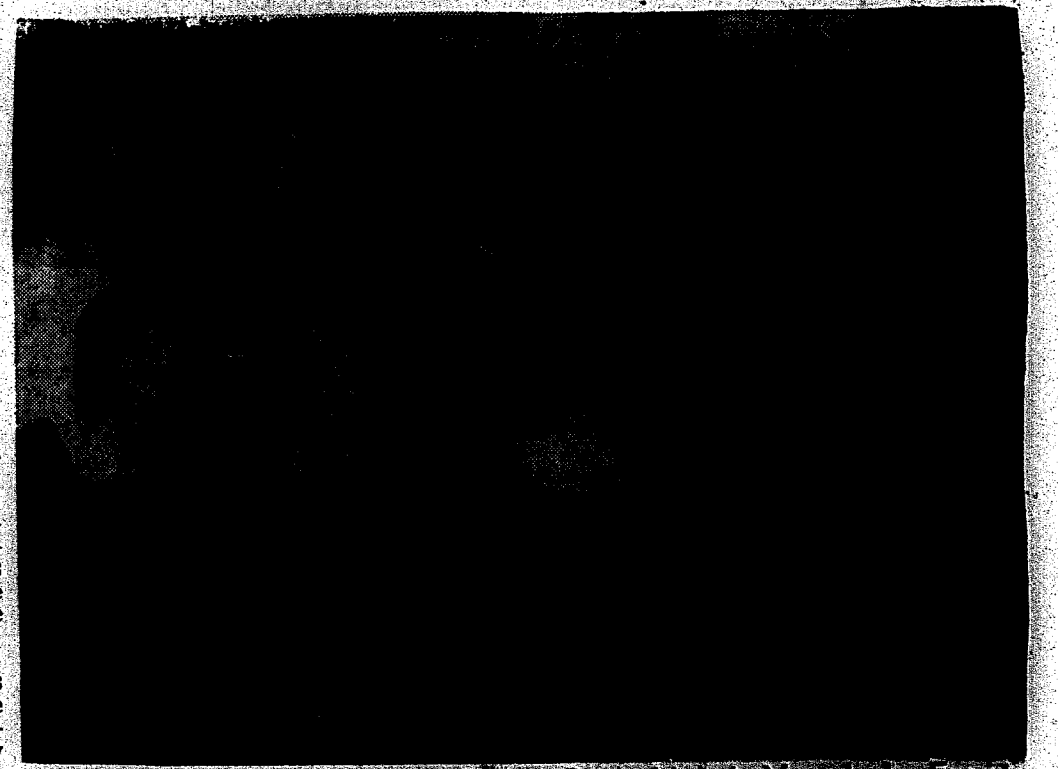

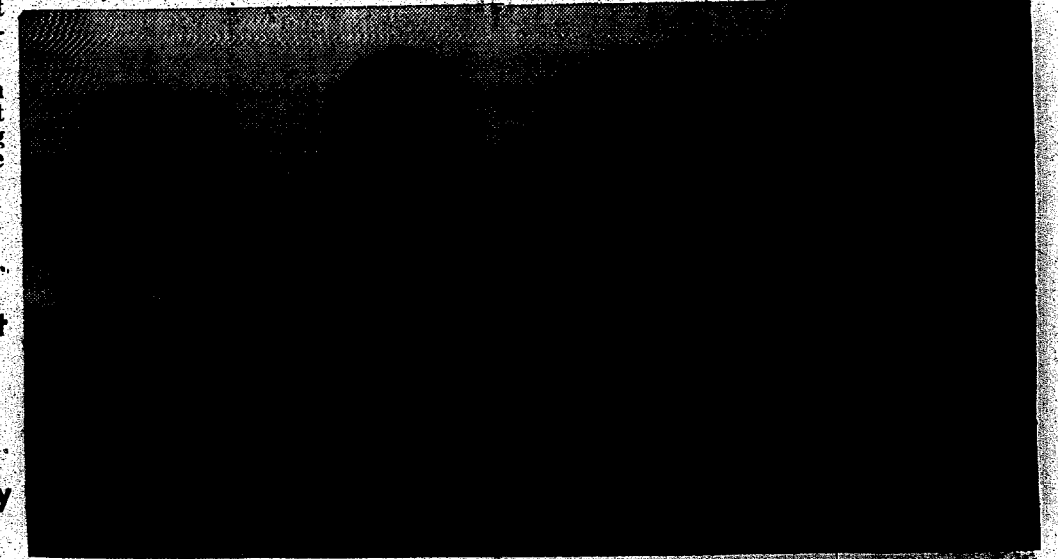
