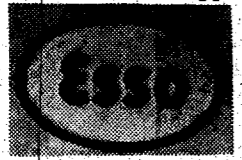

## Council Meets to Strike County Rate

**RECORD FIGURE  
ANTICIPATED**

ON to-day (Friday) the members of Waterford County Council face what is undoubtedly a dreaded task — that of striking the County rate for the coming year. They are faced with an increased demand of 6/7.62 which would bring the County rate to a fantastic 58/1.62 in the £ as against the present rate of 51/6.

The demand of County Manager, Mr. S. J. Moynihan is certain to meet with strong opposition, and one County Councillor said there would be public outcry if this proposed rate was adopted.

This year, however, the NFA will not send a deputation to address the meeting. Instead they have sent a letter to the Chairman confirming their views on the whole situation and explaining their position in relation to rates. Speaking to the County Secretary of the NFA, Mr.

Brian Pearce, Monatrim, Lismore, he told me: "We have decided not to send a deputation to the meeting as there is very little to add to what we have already said. Also our views are known following the recent deputation in regard to the proposed Modeligo Water scheme."

Personally, I find it difficult to visualise the Council striking a rate at the first go and when I spoke to the Chairman, Mr. Charles Curran, during the week, he said

"No, I don't think a rate will be struck on Friday." The original demand of the County Manager was in fact an increase of 7/8.62. Then the Estimates Committee, comprising Colrs. C. Curran, H. R. Dowd, K. O'Ryan and M. Galgey, met and after a day's long work succeeded in cutting the proposed increase by 1/1.

With such a steep increase pending, Friday's meeting is certain to be a lively one. But the ironic part of it all is that the hands of the Council members are tied to a considerable extent, and many of the increases are mandatory.

When speaking to Colr. Curran he was alarmed at the possibility of such a big increase. Health, he said, was the biggest single factor in the increased rate (2/8 of the

proposed 6/7.62 increase is due to increased Health Demand" whilst Mr. Curran also outlined the following as contributing to the steep increases: salaries, increased cost of roadworks, retirements (the impending retirements of a number of officials, entailing payment of retiring bonuses and pensions by the Council) housing and water and sanitary schemes.

Mr. Curran also added that to maintain the present level of services would cost more in the coming year because of increased over-all costs. Continuing, he said: "The bulk of the increases are due to circumstances entirely beyond the control of the Council and at this stage are either mandatory or obligatory."

In previous years it was possible to ease the burden on the ratepayers by having recourse to certain devices—some rather unorthodox. It is quite impossible for a public authority to continue such a policy indefinitely.

As I see it the significant feature of this proposed estimate is the impact the Health Service have on it. This should present further ammunition to those who for some time now have been vainly advocating to have the Health Services made a national charge.

Thus, our public representatives face a hazardous evening's work. They can be depended upon to do their best but this is one occasion when we feel their best will hardly be good enough.

### SHOULD WE HAVE ANOTHER GAELTACHT ?

At a meeting of Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan on Wednesday, Mr. Charles Curran said that a statement had been made by some people in the Ring Gaeltacht that they had been treated niggardly in the allocation of public services.

However, said Mr. Curran, in the Munster Gaeltacht, four areas as much Irish was spoken as in Ring, yet they were cut out of the Gaeltacht. The people in these areas were very interested in the Irish language and folklore.

Mr. Kieran O'Ryan asked if Irish was the spoken language in Ring.

Mr. Curran—A good question.

The C.A.O. (Mr. P. Conroy) said that Irish was the everyday spoken language in Ring.

The Chairman (Mr. John Fahey) said he was very disappointed that the people of Ring were criticising them. They had been very good to the people of the Gaeltacht.

Mr. H. R. Dowd said he had a fair amount of contact with the people of Ring and he had always heard them speaking the Irish language to each other. They were exceedingly courteous people and Irish was the spoken language there and "beautiful it is to hear them speak it."

Mr. John Drohan said there was a nucleus of people in the areas referred to by Mr. Curran where Irish was the spoken language. There were poets and writers there and could they not have a Gaeltacht there.

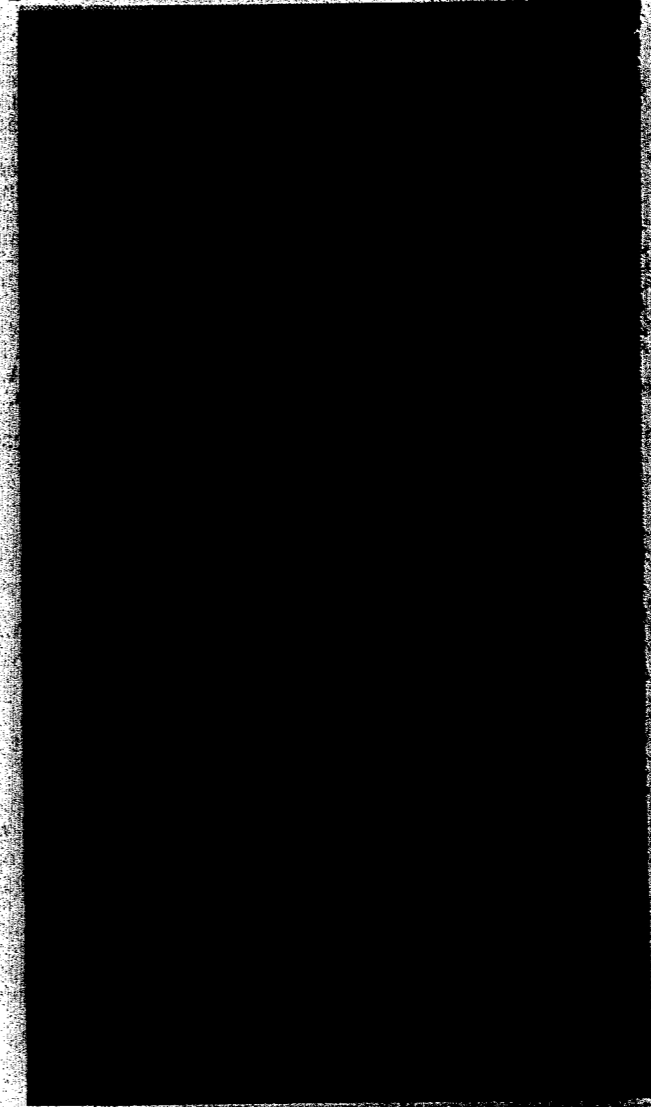
Mr. Curran said these areas should be included in the Gaeltacht. There was quite a considerable amount of people in these areas speaking Irish but they were not getting any practical recognition. Ardmore and surrounding districts were recognised as "Breac Gaeltachts" but they also were not getting any practical recognition.

### "Serious Situation in Ardmore"

A very serious situation had arisen in Ardmore, stated Mr. Charles Curran, at a meeting of Waterford Committee of Agriculture on Wednesday evening.

Mr. Curran said that some time ago the Irish Land Commission secured 65 acres of land and it now appeared that this was going to be given to one man, coming in from an outside area. He wished to protest on behalf of the farmers of the Ardmore area. They were only small farmholders who would be well satisfied with five or ten acres each.

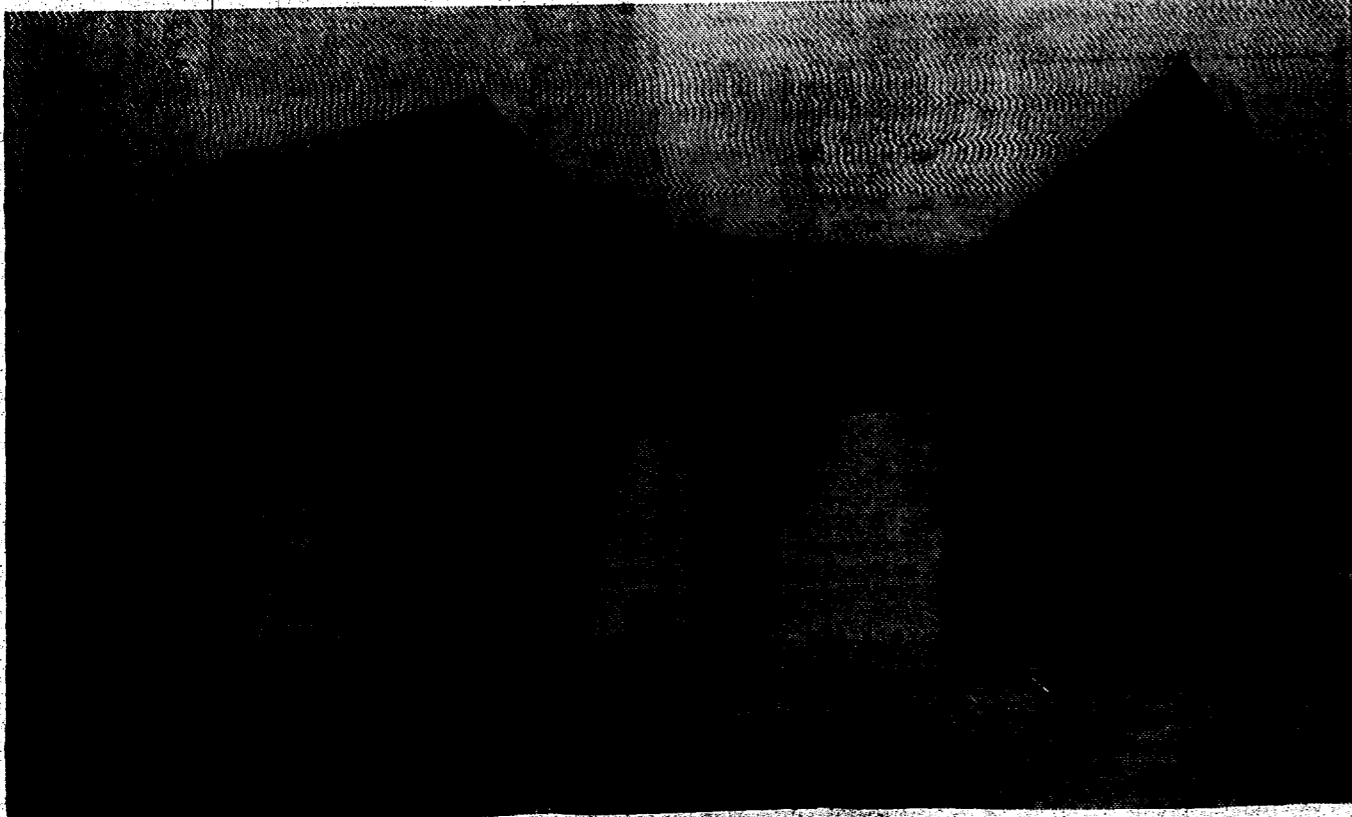

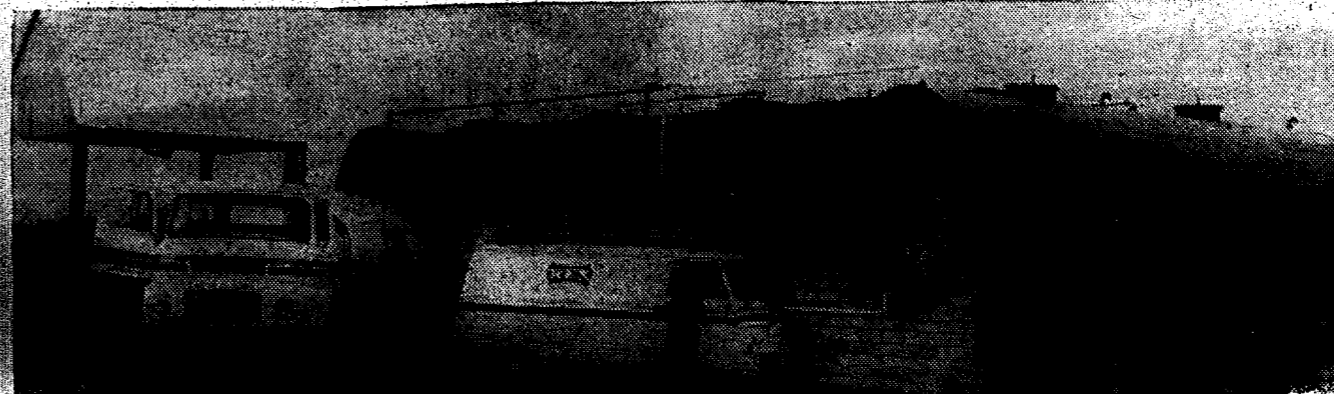

# N.F.A. NEWS

## Irish Preferences on British Market Being Whittled Away

An Ireland shackled to a "pedestrian British economy" could not compete with the other countries of the world, all of which were straining to break economic records, said Mr. Rickard Deasy, President N.F.A., at Trinity College, Dublin, this week. He was speaking to the motion: "Should Ireland Apply for Association Membership of E.E.C." at a meeting of Dublin University Economics Society.

Those who advocated staying with Britain seemed to ignore the fact that the process of tariff reduction, both within E.F.T.A. and G.A.T.T. was going ahead and was likely to continue with increasing speed. The process meant that the margin of industrial preference which Ireland was presently enjoying in Britain was being continuously whittled away, and Britain could not, even if she wanted to, give us any other preferences because of her commitments to G.A.T.T. and E.F.T.A. Furthermore, the emphasis in British domestic agricultural policy was now less and less on deficiency payments and more and more on import quota restrictions. "The pattern of the British market as I foresee it is constantly increasing competition for Irish industry from E.F.T.A. countries, and every indication that it will not be able to take the quantities of agricultural products that we will have to sell; is Britain going to take 45,000 tons of Irish butter in 1967, when she buys only 17,000 tons now?"

"There is also the dark cloud which hangs over all our trading arrangements with Britain. The lack of binding force in the trade agreements means that if they are broken there are no penalties. What of Europe? The facts spoke for themselves. Between 1956 and 1963 the gross E.E.C. product increased by 30% against 23% in the U.S. and 16% in Britain. It is a foregone conclusion that the U.S. will show an increase of nearly 250% trade between the Community and non-member countries over the next three years before all the per capita wages and salaries in the Community rise by 56%, while consumer prices went up by only 16%."

Commenting on the idea, Mr. T. J. Maher, Chairman N.F.A. National Dairy Committee said that such a move would be a logical follow-up to the I.A.O.S. programme of grouping supplies around the various manufacturing interests. "It would take two to three years before all the snags leading to central administration could be ironed out, but it was something that would have to come as soon as practicable if the dairy industry was to be effectively rationalised and streamlined."

Mr. P. Kelly, Secretary of I.A.O.S., said that if they got down to telling the creameries where to send their milk they must take on corresponding obligations to the creameries by ensuring that they got their due share of the profits and had a say in what happened to their milk. "This indicates a federation of the manufacturers and of the supplying creameries with the milk going into marketing pools of up to 50 million gallons."

"We would eventually hope to get these federations to join a national federation and look on the country as a national milk pool. The body controlling this pool would decide on overall plans for the milk industry."

**CALL FOR LIAISON BETWEEN MEAT MARKETING BOARDS**

This was the ideal moment for a full examination of the proposed Meat Marketing Authorities for Northern Ireland and the Twenty-Six Counties to see if they could not be set up on closely parallel lines and with the highest possible degree of co-ordination and liaison, said Mr. Deasy at the Tenth Anniversary Dinner of Meath Co. Executive of the Association in Kells this week.

A move such as this would serve the ultimate interests of livestock farmers in the North and the South. The Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Haughey had rightly pointed out in his speech at Queen's University earlier this week that we already had in this part of the country a chain of highly-efficient and modern meat processing plants, capable of handling almost the entire cattle output of the whole of the island and prices but any farmer can that this factor should be taken into account in Northern Ireland when they were making their own plans for meat processing.

Paying tribute to the success of the warble fly eradication scheme in Co. Meath, Mr. Deasy said that it was primarily due to the friendly co-operation between N.F.A., the County Committee of Agriculture and the A.I. organisations.

It had often seemed to him in the past, that quite unnecessary misunderstandings and suspicions had existed between N.F.A. and Co. Committees of Agriculture. "It is becoming, I think, increasingly clear that these two organisations exist for the same ultimate purpose—to help farmers, and that in achieving this object, our roles are complementary to one another rather than in competition with the other," said Mr. Deasy.

**DONEGAL GETS HEADLINE IN CO-OPERATION**

Donegal seems set to show the rest of the country what the word "Co-operation" means. Last week's Bulletin told of how the farmers along the River Kesh on the Devo-Donegal border came together in an effort to alleviate the flooding of 1,000 acres in the area. Floods in the area of the River Finn also brought co-operation between farmers on both sides of the border.

This week's report from Donegal tells of a dramatic development in co-operative farming in the Glencolumbkille and Ardara area of South-West Donegal. More than ninety farmers covering approximately fifteen miles from Glenties to Malinbeg have amalgamated for the next fifteen years. The owners of the farms, details of the plan have been submitted by its promoter, Rev. Fr. J. McDermott, to the Dept. of Agriculture, the I.A.O.S. and the Agricultural Institute, all of which have passed it as technically and economically sound.

Sean Nugent, C.C., officiated.

**NARROW ESCAPE**

Mrs. M. Linn, Knockare, had a narrow escape from injury when a cow at her home, Knockare, went to a ditch and fell from a falling stone. She was caught when she was struck by the stone and was injured. She was taken to hospital and was treated by a doctor.

Because of the fact that they play in a higher grade, will probably make Kilgobinet slight favourites, but it is with every confidence that I give the vote to Ardmore. The meeting of old rivals, Affane and Ballinacourty in the big ball code should also produce thrills aplenty, and this is one game that could go either way. When last these sides met—in the opening round of last year's intermediate championship, Affane scored a shock one-point victory. On that occasion Ballinacourty were the warm favourites, but Affane, even without the services of sterling full back John Healy upset the form book. Now Ballinacourty seek revenge, and at the Dungarvan venue many will fancy them to do just that. But, as I stated, this game could go either way.

AT CAPPOQUIN

There is a most attractive two-game hurling programme down for decision at Cappoquin, and there should be a good crowd at the Cornerstone venue.

Colligan Rockies and Fourmilewater do battle in the opening game and this clash of former senior sides could be a very close affair. Last year the Rockies stepped down from senior grade, but then surprisingly made a first round championship exit in the Intermediate grade. That defeat was a sore blow to Colligan morale and they hope that Sunday next will mark the return of "better times." Certainly they have come top class hurlers in Paddy and Mickey Walsh, although the loss of goalkeeper Paddy Fitzgerald, now in Enniscorthy, is a severe one.

Like the Rockies, Fourmilewater have this year decided to out their senior status after but one year in the under grade. Their decision came as something of a surprise to many, the writer included, and they should prove one of the really "big guns."

For once Mick Connolly will not be at the call of the inter-provincial football selectors, and he is expected to team up at midfield with the evergreen Kieran Ryan. These are the key men of this Fourmilewater side, and I expect them to engineer victory over the Rockies, if only by a slight margin.

The second game at the same venue between Shamrocks and Geraldines makes forecasting a most difficult task. Both fancy their chances of winning out this league and this is another tie that seems certain to produce a close finish.

Shamrocks are holders of this league and are determined to retain their title. But Geraldines, led by Paddy Kennelly, Johnny Grady, Billy Crotty, and company are equally intent on determining the holders. However, I have a slight preference for Shamrocks on this occasion.

AT TALLOW

There is only one game down for decision at Tallow, between neighbours Ballyduff and Lismore. For this game Ballyduff will have to field their entire "second string" and Lismore, even without Tommy Hickey, now transferred to Tourin, should be good enough to advance.

AT CLASHMORE

The remaining game of the day brings Ballinacourty and Old Parish into opposition at Clashmore. When last these sides met in the championship a few years back, Bal-

linacourty won a great game by two points, and if they serve up a repetition on Sunday, no one will be disappointed.

SEASON RE-OPENED WITHOUT SHOCK RESULTS

The G.A.A.'s competitive season opened in West Waterford on Sunday last with games at Dungarvan, Cappoquin and Aglish. All games however, went according to plan and the day failed to produce a shock result.
