DEPT. TREATED US UNFAIRLY

INCREASE OF £1 FOR CARTER

An increase of £1 a week was unanimously agreed for the carter employed at the County Home, Dungarvan, at Monday's meeting of Waterford Health Authority.

Mr. C. Curran said that was what was wrong. These people were earning only £6 a week and others were getting £80 a week.

PRAISED AND CRITICISED

At last Monday's meeting of Waterford Health Authority, Mr. P. Cahill, said he had received letters from Waterford, Kilkenny, Carlow, Dublin and Galway, congratulating him on his efforts to have a winning Willie erected outside the entrance to Ardkeen hospital. The letters also criticised the Health Authority for turning down the suggestion. Mr. Cahill said it would only have cost about £50 but it could have saved lives.

Only 50 Per Cent Grant for Ardkeen Repairs

I think the Dept. has been less than fair and far from generous in this matter. They appear to be at fault in that they accepted from the contractor an inadequately done building, and by giving us an extra grant they are afraid they would be admitting that public money was unwisely spent, and this is something public officials would not do unless they had to. . . this was stated by Mr. John Griffin at a meeting of Waterford Health Authority on Monday last when the proposed repairing of the roofs at Ardkeen hospital was discussed.

A report was read by Mr. F. Contractor, an inadequately done building and in giving them an extra grant between a deputation from the Authority and Department admitting that public money officials in connection with was spent unwisely and that this matter. The cost of repairs would not do unless they had to. He thought, however that the Health Authority should accept the responsibility of trying to patch up the building and they offered them a 50% grant and nothing better.

The Secretary, Mr. J. A. Hynes said the Department offered them a 50% grant and nothing better.

Mr. Curran said the roofs were defective from the very first day.

At Monday's meeting, Mr. Thomas Lannon said the people's money was being squandered and there was nothing being done about it.

Mr. P. Cahill congratulated the Health Authority's deputation on the great fight they put up.

Mr. Hynes said they would have to do something about the roofs. He did not think the Department would give them any more than a 50% grant.

Mr. T. Gallagher said the roofs would have to be done or they would get worse.

Mr. John Fahey said the cost would be higher if the repairs were not carried out now.

Mr. Lannon said that seven or eight years ago he heard complaints of the roofs leaking.

Mr. Mongey said their Engineer had recommended that a layer of asphalt be put on all the roofs.

Mr. W. Kenneally said that would have to be should be as well to do the repairs now. If not it would cost £20,000 next year.

Mr. Griffin said he believed the Dept. were less than fair and far from generous in this matter. 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Increase for Stor Assistants

A notice of motion, proposed by Mr. W. Kenneally and seconded by Mr. P. Cahill, that they increase the wages of Store Assistants by £3 a week as from January 1st last, was passed by eight votes to five at a meeting of Waterford Health Authority on Monday last.

Mr. T. Gallagher said he was in agreement with the notice of motion. The Store Assistants were handling very important equipment and were very responsible men. They were only getting about £9 a week which was a very poor wage.

Mr. John Griffin said a man who was not getting a fair wage had also to resist the temptation of not being over dutiful. The stores assistants need only get a bit neglectful for half an hour and twice as much might be gone from the stores as they were going to give these assistants today.

The Acting Chairman, Mr. Norman Walsh said four men were involved.

A vote was then taken and the increase was given on an 8-5 vote.

Increase for Nurses

Consequent to an arbitration award, eight General County of Waterford trained nurses were given £25 a year extra in addition to their salaries as Psychiatric nurses, at a meeting of Waterford Health Authority on Monday last.

Alderman T. Gallagher said these nurses had to wait 11 years before they reached their maximum and that was a disgrace.

Colr. T. Lannon said when the old age pensioners had been treated properly they could then consider this. There were some Home Assistance people

assistance cases in the County of Waterford on 15/- The only people discussed at these meetings were the big people. These meetings were not for the poor people. The increase was given 8 votes to 5.

Mr. P. Cahill said the student nurses had not got an increase and at the meeting he would not give notice of motion for an increase for them and that was a disgrace of £1 for the Home Assistance people.

St. Patrick's Night Vandalism at Clonea

This week we feel it our duty to condemn some of the most disgraceful acts of vandalism ever carried out in the Dungarvan area.

Following the St. Patrick's night dance in Clonea, hoodlums, irresponsible in the extreme, maliciously smashed the goal posts belonging to Abbeyside Soccer Club, to an extent that put them beyond repair.

Not satisfied with their destructive work, they then went and destroyed cabbage plants the property of Mrs. Power and cauliflower plants owned by Mr. Dan Casey.

It is sickening to think that in this day and age we are still breeding thugs—no more apt adjective comes to mind, who can gain satisfaction and pride from such acts of blackguardism. These acts of vandalism were maliciously schemed and without the slightest provocation or cause.

The matter has been reported to the Gardai, who are presently enquiring into it.

The public too have a big responsibility in matters of this kind. They must in every way possible co-operate with the Authorities, and any evidence however slight that may help to bring the culprits to justice for these despicable acts should be reported to the Gardai. All decent citizens have a moral obligation in this and for the common good we sincerely hope that those responsible are found out and properly dealt with.

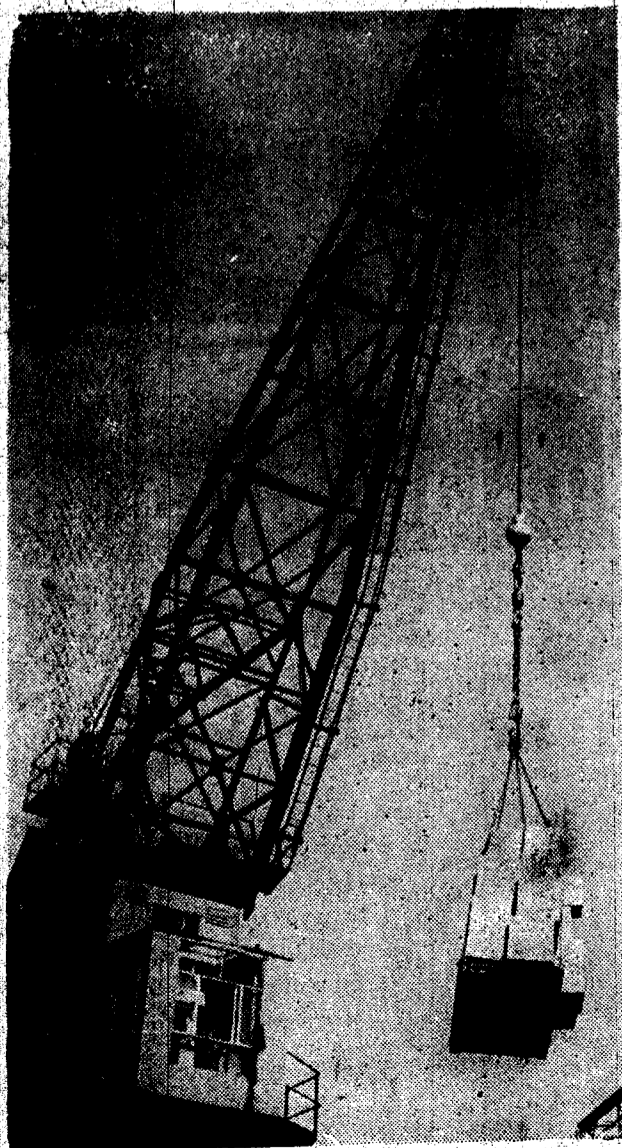

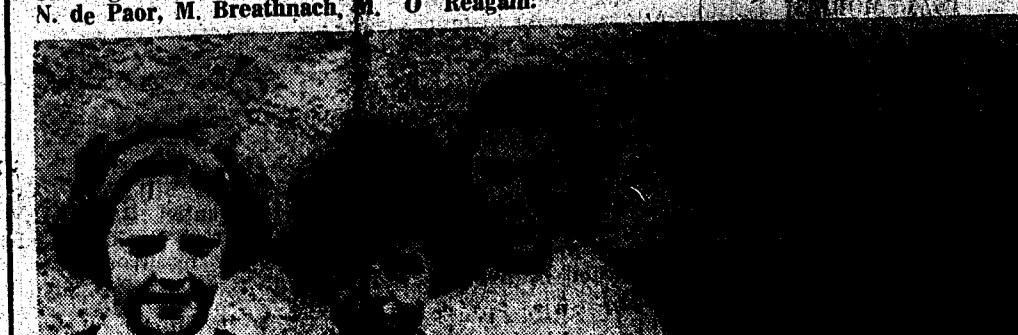

Delay in Opening Unit Criticised

Six months ago when he said Mr. Charles Curran at a was shown the new psychiatric Unit in Ardkeen he felt proud as a Waterford man that they were pioneering this new treatment in Ireland. But now he was ashamed that there was a hold-up in the opening of it.

TO APPOINT TECHNICIANS

Waterford Health Authority at its monthly meeting on Monday last decided to appoint three additional technicians for the Health Authority's Laboratory in Ardkeen.

The Secretary, Mr. J. A. Hynes said the cost would be £2,000 and they would receive a 50% grant. The cost to them would be only about £250 a year because five Health Authorities would be sharing the total cost.

It was passed on the proposal of J. Griffin, seconded by P. Cahill.

The Secretary, Mr. Hynes, said consultations were still going on with the Unions concerned but there were certain matters still to be cleared up. He hoped this would be done in the near future.

Mr. Thomas Lannon said a Unit was lying idle and sick people were waiting to go into it.

Mr. Curran having stated as quoted above said some members should try to solve it. Mr. J. Griffin said the officials had a happy solution in sight and it should be left in their hands.

Mr. Hynes said he would have a full report on it for the next meeting. They might prejudice the case if they discussed it in public now.

Authority Rejects Salary Increase

Waterford Health Authority on Monday last refused to grant a revised salary scale for 24 dispensary doctors, which had already been decided by arbitration.

The revised scale would increase their present maximum from £1400 per annum to £1820. Mr. P. Cahill said he had great pleasure in proposing that they give the revised scale. Besides half of it would be recoupable.

Mr. Thomas Lannon said doctors were very nice as individuals but when they get together in a body they were worse than Bank directors who were also fleecing the country. They would have to have proper people in the Dail to see that their money was being spent properly.

There were poor people in the County living on 25/- a week and it was a case of the poor being made poorer and the rich richer. All they now were short of in this country now were silk tall hats to go out on Sundays. There would be Galgey, Griffin.

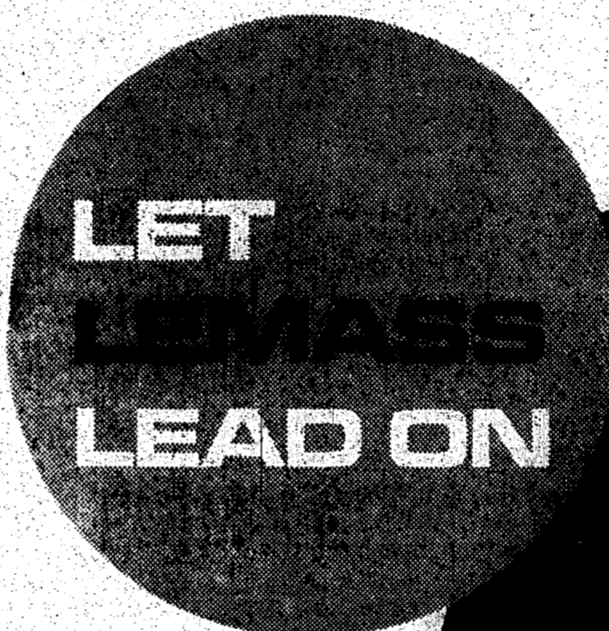

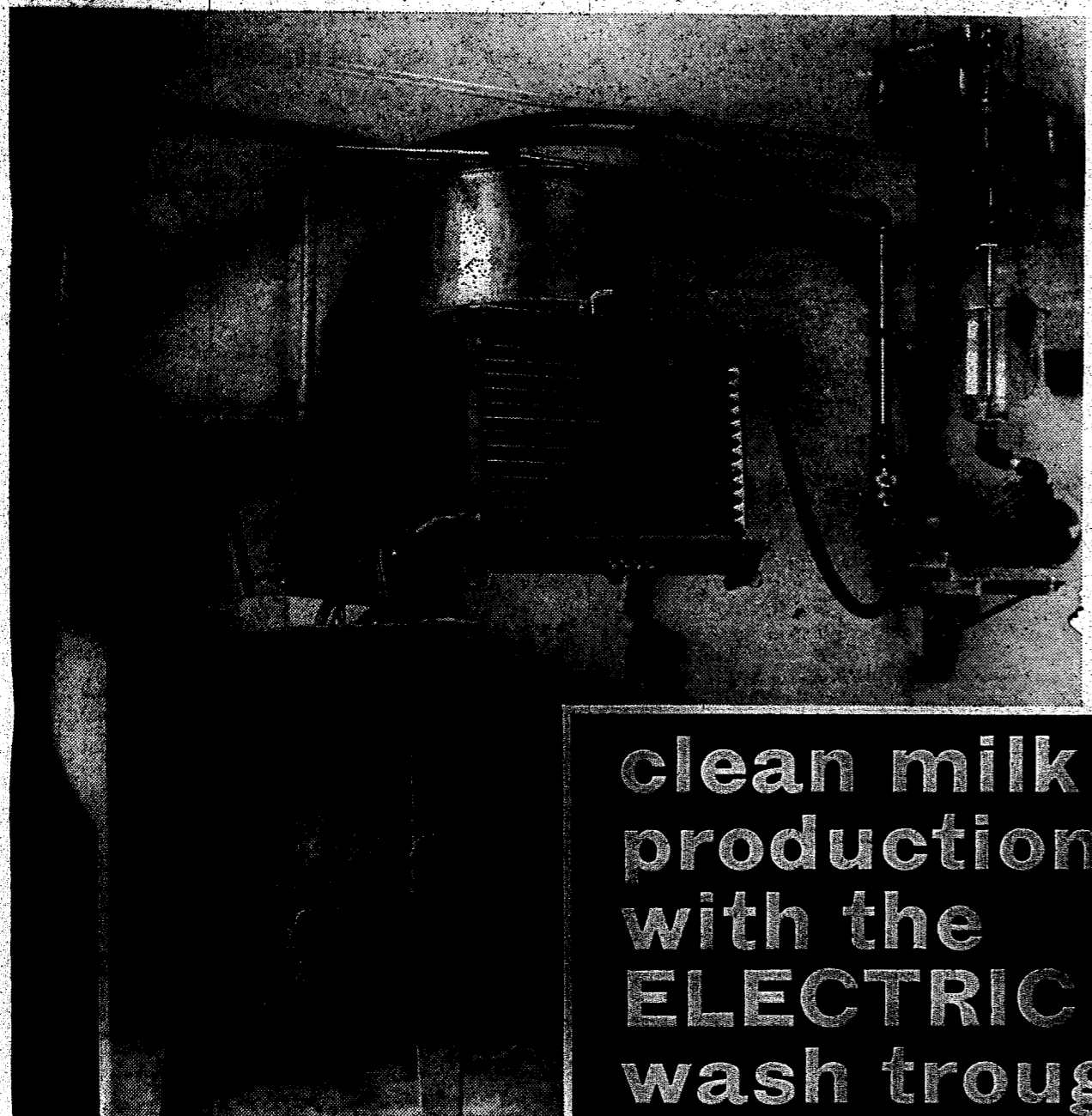

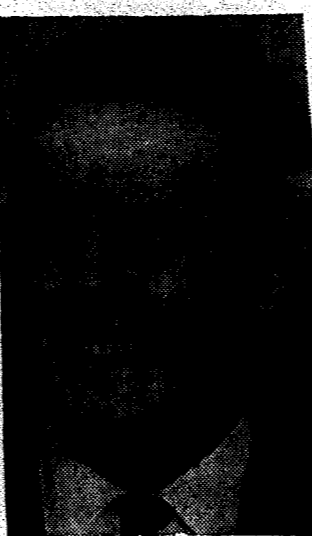

all those who are now forced to forego necessary medical attention for themselves and their families due to the cost of doing so. He had pressed that all who came under the Act should have a free choice of any doctor within his district who would accept them on his panel and that in the event of a question arising out of the Health Authority refusing a medical card the aggrieved would have the right to appeal to a higher authority on the lines of the present Social Welfare Act. The Minister for Health had said in the Dail that the reason the committee had not been called together for over ten months up to March last was no room could be got in

The immediate aim of the Labour Party would be to use their position in the Dail to press for an improvement in Social Welfare benefits especially for the non-contributory groups. Everyone agreed that no matter where the money had to be got these groups must be given benefits sufficient to meet their needs at the present time. If returned I will try to see to it that those unfortunate people, the aged, the sick, the widow and the orphan get at least as much as will keep them in frugal comfort as long as they live.

As regards housing the Labour Party believed that everyone who required a home for himself and his family was entitled to be provided with one. To help local authorities to meet the great demand for housing the Labour Party would press for greater grants and loans at lower interest charges to encourage those able to build their own houses to do so.

The Labour Party were willing to co-operate with any party or parties that would agree on a national programme in the interests of the country as a whole. They believed the question of which side anyone took in the Civil War should be forgotten and that all parties should put the good of the country above party interests. The selection conference was presided over by Col. John Griffin, N.T. and was attended by delegates from throughout the City and County. T. A. Kyne was proposed by Ald. T. Gallagher on behalf of Waterford City Branch and seconded by Col. John Griffin, Dungarvan Branch.

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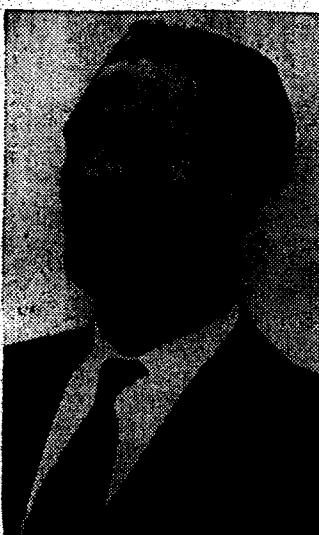

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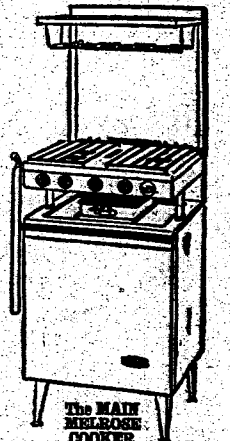
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
