WITH 643 votes over the quota William Kenneally, F.F., headed the poll in the Waterford Contituency, in the General Election.

With a staff of twenty, Mr. J. F. Kenny, Returning Officer, opened the boxes at 9 a.m. and sorting concluded at 11.25. Then the First Count started at 11.30 and ended at 3 p.m.

The total valid vote was 27,203. There were 181 spoiled votes. The quota was 6,801.

In recent years I have seen infinitely superior Deise sides whip better teams than the Limerick one of Sunday last with relative ease, and much as I regret saying, it is a case of tempus fugit for some of the veterans that have given such sterling service over a decade or more years.

Almost from the start, Sunday's tie was all too obviously going to be a "needle one." For Limerick victory was absolutely imperative if they hoped to remain in the league race, and with that thought foremost in their minds, they set about their task in something more than a dedicated manner. Such was the prevailing atmosphere that it was but inevitable when the "pot" eventually boiled over towards the close of the first half and hurleys were used indiscriminately in the Waterford goalmouth.

UGLY SCENE

Even in the second half tempers became more frayed and petty incidents led up to a major outbreak of violence ten minutes from time. With Philly Grimes careering goalwards on a so-called run, he was unceremoniously and unfairly "downed" by Limerick full-back, J. J. Bresnihan. Immediately there was retaliation by some of the Waterford forwards and within seconds an ugly scene had developed. Fists and hurleys flew with one regard for one's safety and for a few brief but anxious moments, there was danger that the game might never finish. Fortunately, however, order was restored but because of the extraordinary tendency of referee Paddy Conroy, of Cork, no one was sent to the sin bin.

Both sides must shoulder blame for these game-marining incidents, although one cannot let the occasion pass without making reference to the play of the Limerick full-back trio who displayed little or no inclination to play the ball. Full-back Bresnihan, in particular, was a prime culprit, and had the referee been more vigilant and strict, Waterford would surely have got a considerably greater number of close-in frees.

The opening ten minutes of this game were played at an energy sapping pace with Limerick, no doubt, geared for early all-out attack. But gradually the pace slackened, the standard suffered with the reduction in tempo, and over all the tie was greatly disappointing.

Whilst Waterford fully merited their three points victory, they made unexpectedly heavy weather of doing so, and many sectors looked in immediate need of repair. True the withdrawal of John Meaney was a severe blow, Vinny Connors who was called in as a replacement in the half-forward line with John O'Brien partnering Tom

Indeed the outcome of this game looked anything but good for three-quarters of an hour, and as the Shannon sides led by a solitary point entering the closing fifteen minutes, yet another Deise flop was well within the realms of probability.

In fact Limerick seemed perfectly poised for a surprise victory at the interval, when having played against a stiff breeze they only trailed 1-3 to 0-5. Territorially Waterford had enjoyed a definite advantage during those opening thirty minutes, but their attack found few chinks in Limerick's defensive armour, and so visitors turned over in a very favourable position.

over a fine point. Then as the game entered the final quarter Philly Grimes lost a golden opportunity of a goal. But minutes later he made it all square again with a point from a free. Limerick now found themselves very much on the receiving end and as their defence became more pressured, panicked into conceding frees. In the 17th minute Grimes pointed a placed ball and three minutes later when he was unceremoniously felled on route towards the Limerick goal a flare-up followed that shed little credit on those responsible. Again from the resultant free Grimes obliged with a point.

Vainly Limerick tried to hit back but Waterford were now supreme, and further frees in the 23rd and 27th minutes yielded points to give Waterford their hard-won and unimpressive victory.

CUNNINGHAM BEST

On the Waterford side, their full-back trio took the

clearances found Cregan difficult to contain.

John O'Brien, who moved to midfield because of John Meaney's absence, was not a success, and it was left to the hard-working Tommy Hearne to sway the balance of power in the area. One cannot, however, ignore the weaknesses of this sector.

The attack, either individually or as a unit got little change from an unnecessarily uncompromising Limerick defence.

Grimes, as always was deadly accurate from frees, but Seamus Power was never allowed hurl by full-back Bresnihan, whose one objective seemed to be to contain Power by any means.

Cheasty was completely out-hurled by a classic centre-back in John O'Donnell, and of the remainder Frankie Walsh was most conspicuous.

On a Limerick side that for most of the hour stood an excellent chance of victory, their half-back trio of Tony O'Brien, Jim O'Donnell and

In the other semi, Glen proved far superior to Erin's Own, and had a comfortable winning margin at the end of a disappointing hour.

Main attraction in Sunday's final will, of course, be the appearance of Mr. Hurling himself, Christy Ring at full forward for the Glen. The very presence of Ring is drawing power enough to fill any venue, but there will be many other inter county stars in action also.

Ring, however, will command greatest attention. He has not played for some time now, but is a definite starter against the Rockies. In many quarters throughout Cork they are crying out for his recall to the Cork team, and Sunday should furnish followers with a fair indication of whether or not the maestro is still good enough to wear the vivid red jersey. The writer feels, giving full consideration to the material available at the moment in the county that he is.

The Glen team is of course by no means a one man outfit and it bristles with stars in practically every sector. Between the posts they have Finbar O'Neill, presently the county's number one choice, and in defence are such notables as Jerry O'Sullivan, Mick McCarthy and Seanie Kennefick, all of whom have

worn the county persey. At midfield the Glen will be depending in the main on the efforts of former Galway and Connacht star Joe Salomon, and up front the great "Ringey" Patsy Harte, Bill Carroll and minor of last year, Andrew Flynn, will be the biggest dangers to the Rockies defence.

Inter-county man John Hayes will be at midfield, and John Bennett, Florrie O'Mahony and Jim Redmond spearhead their attack.

Yes, view this game whatever way one will, and the nett opinion remains the same—a game not to be missed if at all possible. These Cork rivals have the material to make this a spectacular hour's hurling and patrons are guaranteed of exceptional value from this tournament final.
