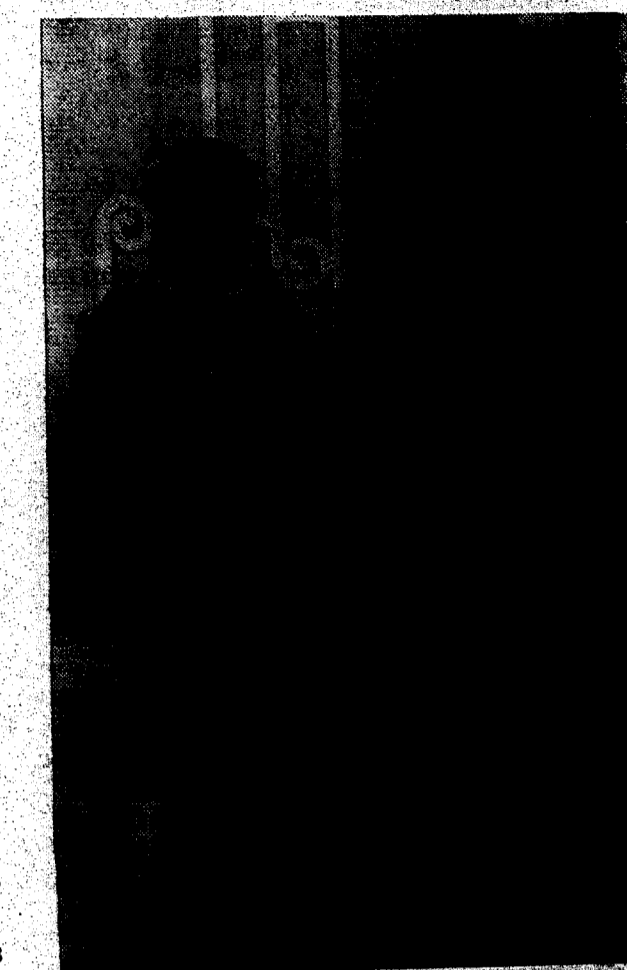

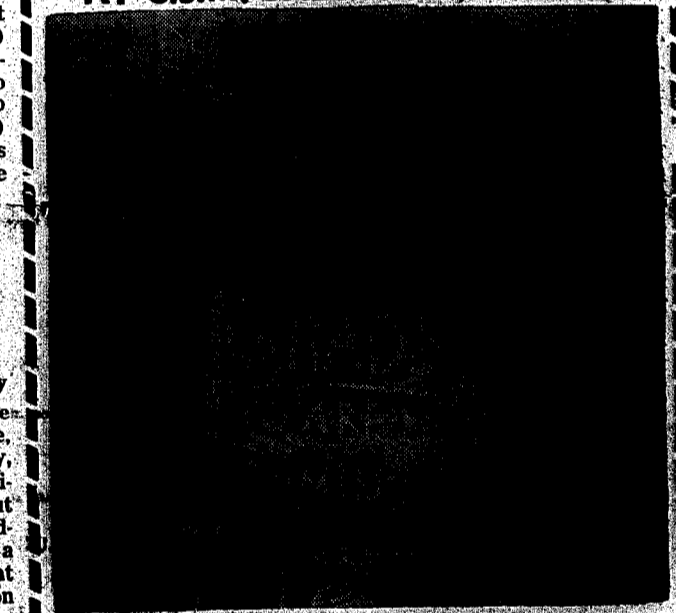

At the annual general meeting of the County Executive N.F.A. in Hotel Ormonde, Dungarvan, recently, Mr. John Barry, Glencairn, Lismore, was elected the new Chairman. He is also the National Secretary of the N.F.A. and replaces the outgoing Chairman, Edmund Cheasty, Kilmalee. The new vice-chairman is Mr. David Hourigan, Cappagh, whilst Mr. Brian Pearce, Monatrim, Lismore, continues as Hon. Secretary and Treasurer.

N.F.A. NEWS Mr. Peart at N.F.A. House

The British Minister of Agriculture, 50 years old Mr. Fred Peart, who is on a short visit to this country at the invitation of his Irish counterpart, Mr. Charles Haughey, was guest of honour at a reception given by the President of N.F.A., Mr. Rickard Deasy in N.F.A. House on Wednesday last, April 21.

Mr. Peart is the third Cabinet Minister to visit N.F.A. Headquarters in the past few months the two others being Mr. Haughey and the Northern Ireland Minister of Agriculture, Mr. Harry West. When Mr. Peart Peart was greeted by Mr. Deasy on arrival he was accorded a terrific reception by the distinguished gathering, which included members of the Oireachtas and most of the leading figures in agricultural circles in this country.

The Minister's itinerary during his four-day stay includes calls on the President, Mr. De Valera, the Taoiseach and the Minister for External Affairs; a Government dinner at Iveagh House; visits to a number of "typical" Irish farms, both large and small; a tour of the National Stud and a day at the races, probably Naas.

A keen sportsman—he was a university boxer and also played rugby and soccer—he would probably have attended one of the big matches in Croke Park or Dalymount Park on Sunday afternoon if his packed schedule did not oblige him to return to London on Sunday morning.

Not exactly the product of an agricultural background—both his parents were school teachers—Mr. Peart had a brilliant scholastic career before the war interrupted his progress. He first entered Parliament as a Labour M.P. in 1945 and was immediately appointed Parliamentary Private Secretary to the Minister of Agriculture. He was then only 31. Mr. Peart became chief spokesman on science and agriculture when the Labour Party went into opposition. He was also British delegate and representative for agriculture on the Council of Europe.

Married with one son, he was accompanied to Dublin by his wife and private secretary, Mr. Smith.

It is N.F.A.'s hopeful anticipation that the spirit of cordiality which was so clearly evident at Wednesday's reception, will be reflected in the future Anglo-Irish trading pattern.

GROUP FARM PROJECT

Eight farmers, whose acreages range from 40 to 100, came together in Schull, Co. Cork, this week to draw up a planned development programme for their farms, covering the next five years. The meeting was a 100% success resulting in the initiation of yet another group farm development project under the wing of N.F.A.

Mr. Tom Llewellyn, secretary of the Rural Development group of N.F.A. and Mr. Derry O'Sullivan, the local agricultural instructor, were at the meeting to help out on details. Both men will now work at shepherding the project into "greener pastures."

"I explained the whole idea to them and told them what they might expect to get out of it," said Mr. Llewellyn. "I also made it clear that the success of the project depended on each of them working according to the plan drawn up by the advisor. It was most encouraging to see the enthusiasm with which they all agreed to work on such lines."

The farmers filled in a questionnaire giving details of their farms and the next step in the project will be a visit to each farm by Mr. O'Sullivan as a prelude to the completion of a detailed plan. When the Group meets in a month's time detailed plans will be submitted to each farmer and a comprehensive discussion will follow.

The eight farms concerned in the project all have rough grazing land so poor that livestock carrying capacity is as low as four acres per cow. The plans drawn up for each farm will aim at a gradual improvement each year and will be based on the capacity of the individual farmer.

The establishment and servicing of such group farm projects is part of the function of the N.F.A. Rural Development Section. An example of how N.F.A. helps in the field of credit, where the Association will negotiate with the Agricultural Credit Corporation if farmers are experiencing any difficulty in obtaining loans.

Mr. Llewellyn envisages eight to fourteen farmers as the ideal group. "Naturally they must live near one another and they must be very friendly," he said. One of the things he found

The public image of the farmers as "heavily subsidised, grasping, grumbler" is worrying the Seed and Cereals Committee of the Ulster Farmers' Union. The Committee, which would give country children a basic knowledge of agriculture and would give the town children a greater respect for their farming brethren through an understanding of their problems.

Early Trials Pinpoint Sweeps Derby Potentials

(Acceptors for the Irish Derby appear in black.)
By no means all the talent engaged in the Irish Sweeps Derby was exposed last season. That was the lesson taught by the one mile Gladness Stakes at the Curragh (April 3rd), in which two "unknowns" and two top-ranking 1964 juveniles filled the first four places, in a contest that provided the first really significant Derby trial in Ireland. Victory went to Mrs. A. B. Biddle's Western Wind (Milesian-Palestrina by two lengths from Mr. G. M. Bell's Meadow Court, with Mr. E. Kennedy's Flaming Red one and a quarter lengths away third and Lord Donoughmore's Wedding Present four Belgrave who started odds-on favourite, by virtue of a smooth win at Leopardstown in March, failed to improve and was relegated to fifth place.

Western Wind, a full brother of three winners including L'Homme Arme, had not run since the corresponding meeting twelve months ago when he had been unplaced to Wedding Present in a maiden race. Since then Mrs. A. B. Biddle has split up her private stable and Western Wind has been sent to the Curragh to be trained by Michael Dawson. His two lengths winning margin gives little idea of the amount he had in hand on this occasion.

Even though the better of Paddy Prendergast's pair, Meadow Court, had to be content with second place, his trainer derived a good deal of satisfaction from the outcome. This son of Court Harwell is expected to do a good deal better over the Sweeps Derby distance (1 1/2 miles) and his trainer houses several other three-year-old colts held in higher esteem, notably Mr. J. R. Mullion's Hardicanute and Mr. L. M. Gelb's Carlemont, both of whom will be making their seasonal debut at the Curragh next week.

Prendergast took Hardicanute to Navan last week and galloped him over ten furlongs after racing with the four-year-old Dilettante 11, who ran so prominently behind Santa Claus in last year's English Derby and Irish Sweeps Derby. Hardicanute emerged much superior to his older rival and, said Prendergast, "it was a striking performance by a three-year-old at this early stage in the season."

A feature of the early Classic trials has been the shock results. At Newmarket Dandini, the ante-post favourite for the 2,000 Guineas, started odds-on for the Craven Stakes only to be relegated to fourth place behind Mrs. S. Jacobson's 20/1 chance Corifi (Acropolis-Peterkin) who was making only his second track appearance.

However, the result of the Prix Greffulhe, at Longchamp's opening meeting of the year (April 4th) was more in accordance with juvenile form. The winner Sea Bird, does not hold the Curragh engagement, but the Baron Guy de Rothschild's Corduroy 11, who filled second place after making much of the running, does. Sea Bird's trainer Etienne Pollet, who won the first Irish Sweeps Derby with Tambourine 11, has left his four entries in the race namely, Mrs. F. A. B. Widener's Grey Dawn 11, Eton Lad, the Comtesse Jean de la Valdene's Jacopo and Lord Derby's Gold Digger. Most interest in this quartet will focus upon the performances of Grey Dawn 11, who topped last year's French Free Handicap and who beat Sea Bird in the Grand Critérium in October. However, in discussing his prospects with newspaper correspondents, Pollet sounded a warning note that his home gallops this year suggested he might do best as a sprinter. The stamina potential of Grey Dawn 11 (Herbager-Polamia by Mahmoud) is just one of the tantalising questions to which punters will be seeking clues in the exciting build-up to the Irish Sweeps Derby.

This year's race will be run at the Curragh on June 26th and at the second acceptance stage on March 31st 219 of the original 649 entries stood their ground. Almost half (104) are trained in Britain; about one-third (73), in Ireland; a little less than one-sixth (32) in France, with Italy (8), Germany (2) and Belgium (2) supplying the balance.

The trainer with the largest representation of all is Paddy Prendergast, a previous winner of the race with Ragusa, who can choose between the following fourteen colts on the big day: Bam Royal, Carlemont, Condoller, Hardicanute, Khalife Meadow Court, Newsrillah, Noble Record, Old Yellow, Prominer, Quintillian, Ragazo, Sciuscia and Sweet Aly.

Dawson (Retreat, Soldier, St. Brendan, Traneen and Western Wind, all owned by Mrs. A. B. Biddle; Michael Hurley (Gareine, Rose D'O, Zand Avesta, Henri Quatre and His Brother); Seamus McGrath (Ballyclicke, Dante's Hill, Dux Bonus, Indian Snow, Selar Chev, Fuenjirola and Sierra De Mizas); Vincent O'Brien (Cadet Rousell 11, Scapani, Tomahawk IV, Chambrun, Baljour, Big Moment, Donato, Valentine's Day and Belgrave), and John Oxx (Wedding Present, Jealous, Pirathon and Sweet Sultan.)

A run down the list of English acceptors shows that Captain Cecil Boyd-Rochford, whose Lionhearted took second place to Santa Claus last year, has left in both Lady Zia Wernher's Claude and Dogged, that the highly rated Rehearsed owned by Lady Zia's husband, Sir Harold Wernher, is J. M. Gosden's sole potential challenger and that W. R. Hern has ac-

cepted with seven (Craighouse, Nearside, Prince of Paris, Cut and Thrust, Dashing, Provoko and Sepoy), all of which are owned by the Astor brothers. Noel Murless, who has not yet had a runner in the race, can remedy that omission with his choice of Again and Again, Alan Adare, Blomdrin and Crispian, while Jeremy Tree is one of the most lavishly represented of all the English trainers with the following still engaged, Bandar, Yankee Clipper, Pamir, British Soldier, Easter Island and Gulf Pearl.

The English trainer with the mostest is the nine handed Jack Watts (Legion, Presto, Wisdom II, Admiral, Honan, Menaphon, Super Sam, Albert, Hall and Solstice). The same distinction in France goes to Francois Mathet, who from his mammoth string, the largest in Europe, has settled for the following half dozen: M. Francois

Dupre's Dushan, Reliance II, and Tynostrom, M. Arpad Plesch's Pimento, as well as the Aga Khan's Fighter and White Fire III.

The Aga Khan, one of those whose generous action in ceding sheep grazing rights on the Curragh enabled the racecourse to be completely fenced in to its subsequent improvement, has not so far met with any success in a race which, in its pre-sponsorship era, was won on five occasions by his grand-father with Zionist (1925) Daastur (1932), Turkhan (1940), Nathoo (1948), and Hindostan (1949). Her Highness, the Begum Aga Khan also won an Irish Derby in 1951 with Fraise du Bois II and this year she owns one aspirant Prince Du Vent, a useful two-year-old in France last season.

The Irish Sweeps Derby will be run at the Curragh on June 26th.

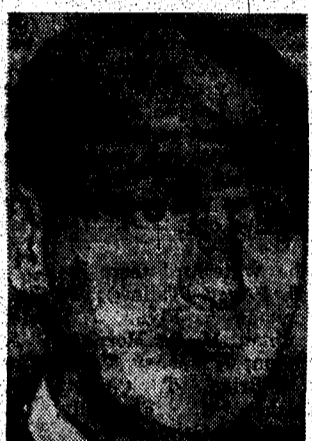

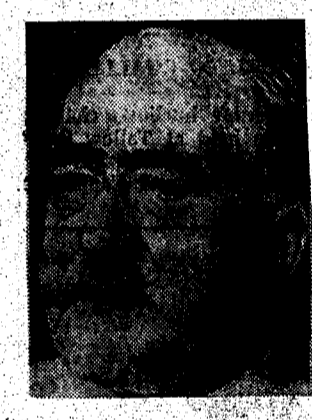
Mr. Lemass made a short reply, forecasting that Fianna Fail would remain in office until the middle of 1970.

MR. J. LYNCH... Minister for Finance.



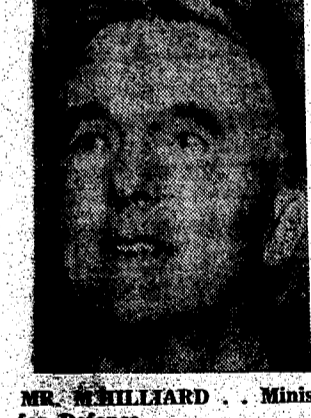
MR. F. AIKEN... Minister for External Affairs.

With the very last kick of the game, Tom Cunningham earned a replay for Dungarvan in this Phelan Cup clash at the Fraher field, on Tuesday night, when he pointed an acute angled free, a result however, that in all the circumstances was an equitable one.

There was much confusion after the game, as Brickey players crowded around referee Tom Ryan (Fourmilewater). When the free was awarded Cunningham came up from defence to take the kick and just as he was about to do so the referee called for him to delay the free—quite obviously to tell him it was the final kick of the game and that he would have to score direct. But "Cunn," not hearing the referee took the free and as the ball dropped into the Brickey goalmouth the full-time whistle went. Immediately, Dungarvan players protested and the free was ordered to be re-taken, and Cunningham duly obliged by almost nonchalantly landing the point that earned for his side the right to fight another day.

Greatest interest will undoubtedly be centred on the hurling clash, if for the only good reason that Waterford stand a reasonably good chance of winning. This unfortunately is something Waterford cannot do, yet there is more than an air of hope that they will advance to the second round.

A series of trials was held before Sunday's team was selected, so it can be logically assumed that the best fifteen will be on duty. Ground advantage is also to be taken as being a considerable help, but whether or not all this adds up to one thing—victory—remains to be seen. The Clare side contains several players with considerable senior experience and indeed there is considerable confidence within the Banner County that not alone will Sunday's hurdle be surmounted, but if left intact, the team will go on to take provincial honours.

Thus the magnitude of Waterford's task becomes all the clearer. But despite the disappointing standard shown in the recent trial in Dungarvan, it contains many hurlers of proven ability, and the writer confidently expects them to be a match for the fancied visitors.

Between the posts is senior keeper Ned Power and this is one position that creates no doubts or headaches. But Joe Daly, now well into the veteran stage, is a surprise selection at full back, although flanked by two solid defenders in the U.C.C. and former Four-milewater man Tom Walsh and Sonny Walsh.

John O'Donnell, currently on the County senior panel is at centre back with Tourin's Ollie Wilkinson and Shamrock's Frankie Corcoran on either side of him. This latter pair fully deserve recognition and I fully expect both to vindicate themselves on Sunday.

Midfield is commanded by John O'Gorman (Ballyduff Upper) and Portlaw's Frank Whelan, and the attack containing as it does hurlers of the calibre of Kieran Ryan, the long serving Fourmilewater club man, John Kirwan, who has worn the county jersey and holder of a National League medal and John Whelan, should be capable of notching a respectable tally.

The Clare team has also been announced and on paper at least looks a really potent one. The visitors in view of the fact that this is their second best side, will undoubtedly wear the mantle of favourites; but this is a Waterford side of experience and talent, and they could well fall Clare, if only by a slender margin.

KERRY CANNOT BE OPPOSED The footballers are really up against it, however, as the Kerry team contains no less than eleven players who have worn the famed green and gold in senior ranks on more than one occasion. The Waterford team is not a bad one by any standards but quite honestly I hold out little hope for them against so talented a Kingdom fifteen.

A glance through the Kingdom team will reveal the real strength of their side, and they are certainly not prepared to take any unnecessary risks. In goal is Pat Hanley, of senior experience, and their defence is backboned by Sean Og Sheehy, who had the distinction of captaining a Kerry senior team to victory in an All-Ireland final last year. Their midfield of Jerry O'Riordan and Jimmy Lucey would do justice to any senior team in the country, whilst all six forwards have worn the senior jersey. Against such opposition then it is almost impossible to visualise other than a convincing Kerry victory. True anything can happen in the championship and very often does, but this is one occasion when I ex-

pect form to run true. The Waterford team, in both defence and attack contains players who have also had senior inter-county experience. The side will acquit itself creditably no doubt, but their best is unlikely to be good enough on Sunday.
