He (Mr. Kyne) said he would like to pay tribute to Mr. McCarthy for his years of devoted service on the Council. He had been an excellent member and attended meetings whenever possible.

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COUNCIL TOLD OF THREE FAMILIES LIVING IN ONE HOUSE

Just how urgent the need for houses in Dungarvan at the present time was forcibly shown on Friday night last, when a young married man, James Veale, told the members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting that he was presently living in one room of a house shared by two other families.

Mr. Veale said his name had been on the housing list for the last five years but he had never even got an offer of a house from the Council. In the house in which he was at present living, there was a total of ten people in occupation there and only recently the Sanitary Officer called on them.

The Chairman (Deputy Kyne) asked why this particular case was not raised at the special housing meeting of the Council.

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'Plan' For Dungarvan Adopted

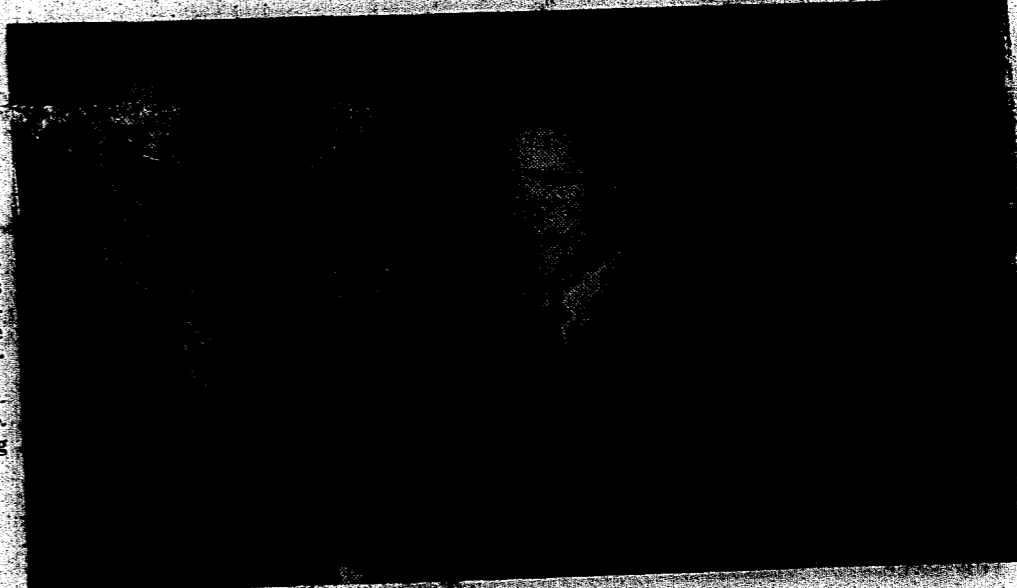
Dungarvan Urban Council at its monthly meeting on Friday night last unanimously adopted the provisional plan for the development of the town under the Local Government Planning and Development.

The plan, deferring to the population points out that the population of Dungarvan urban area has remained almost static between 1911 and 1961 while the population of Dungarvan rural area decreased by 2,896 over the same period. In view of the static nature of the town's population over the years of emigration it would now appear reasonable to assume a possible increase in population for the years ahead. The plan also states that of the 5188 population, a total of 1988 persons over the age of 14 years were gainfully employed. The total number of males employed in the town over the age of 14 was 1244 while the total similar number of females was 571.

The plan continued: "Having regard to the unemployment figures of Dungarvan and allowing for those leaving school annually who were likely to accept factory work it would be desirable to attract immediately to the area industries which would employ eventually almost 400 persons over and above those at present employed."

"With regard to social facilities, Dungarvan is lacking adequate library accommodation and also facilities for the many organisations in the town. A site at T. F. Meagher Street is at present under consideration for a library. The town is well provided with schools and a number of new structures are in the course of erection. It, however, further housing development taking place at Abbeyside the Department of Education. The planning report also stated that Dungarvan was provided with a first class beach and therefore much of the tourist trade. There was, however, such a beach on the Cunnigan Peninsula and the provision of means of access to it and its beaches would be investigated."

CHEESE FACTORY FOR TALLOW



At a meeting in Cahir House Hotel, last weekend, it was announced that a new cheese factory is to be erected in Tallow, Co. Waterford.

The building of the factory, which will initially employ 100 people, will commence almost immediately and the factory, it is expected, will be in operation this summer.

The products will be mainly for the export market. Creameries within a 45 to 50 mile radius of Tallow will supply the new factory.

The condition of some streets in Dungarvan was described as scandalous by Mr. Thomas Lee at last Friday's monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council.

Mr. Lee said that in Friary Street and Mitchel Street, the grass was even allowed to grow in the gutters.

Mr. Paddy Whelan said he wished to endorse the remarks of Mr. Lee. The urban area he said was not getting a fair crack of the whip from the Co. Council. If they employed a man themselves out of the money they were giving the County Council for the upkeep of the town it would be much cheaper for them. The streets mentioned by Mr. Lee were situated in the centre of the town and that made matters even worse, he added.

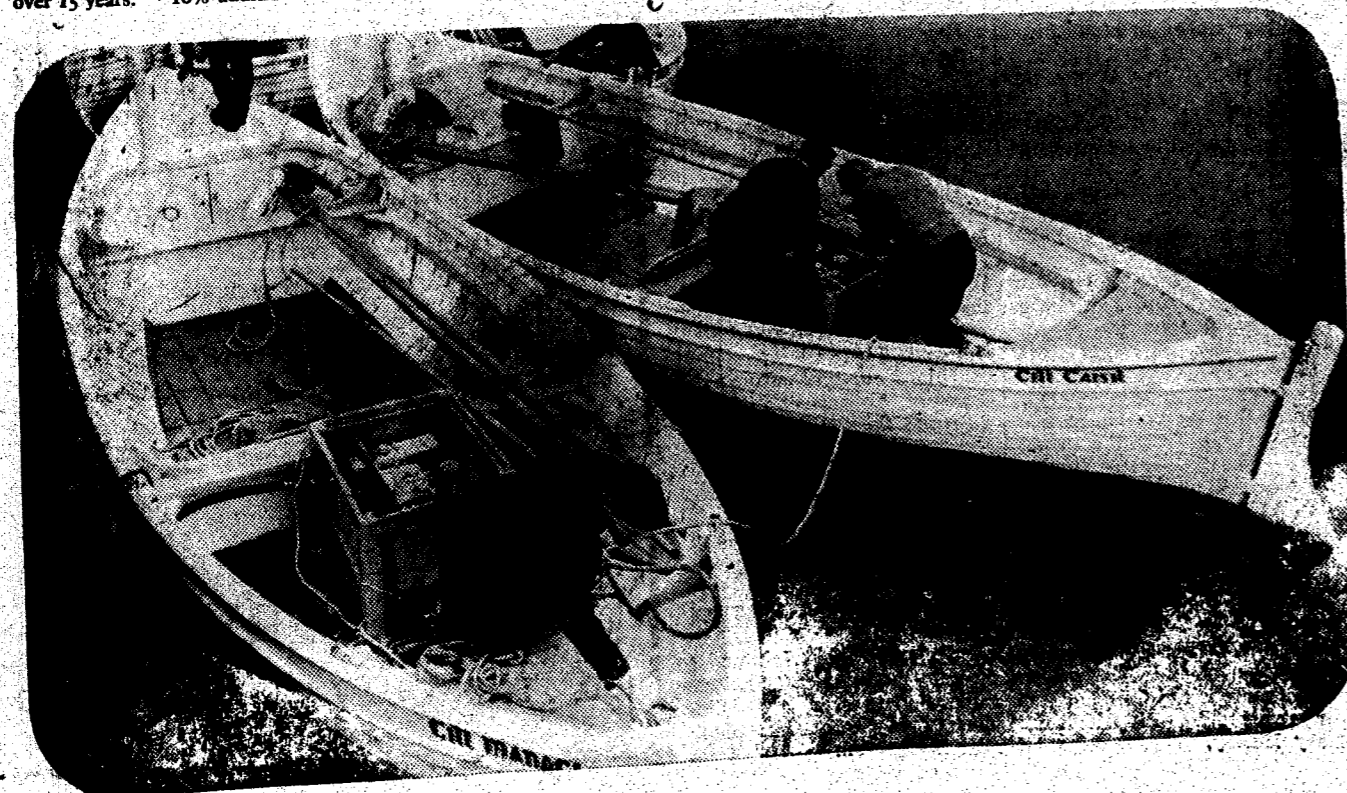

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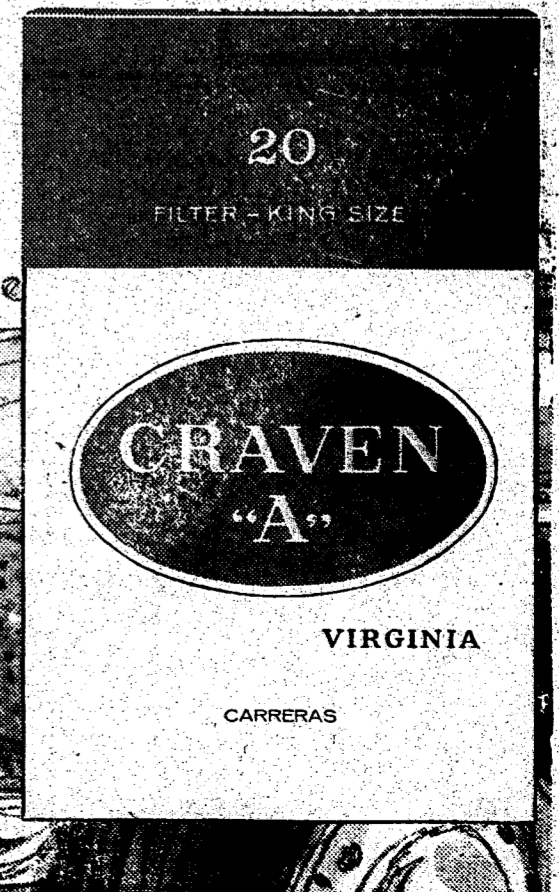

FOOTBALLERS UNLUCKILY BEATEN

Tipperary 2-5
Waterford 0-10

Tipperary, despite having far less of the play territorially qualified for the under-21 football provincial final by beating Waterford by the minimum of margins in a thrill-packed game at Dungarvan on Thursday night last. Played in ideal conditions, and before a good attendance, this game blossomed into a vibrant life after a somewhat insipid opening but on the hour's play, Waterford were decidedly unlucky not to have at least earned the right to a replay.

In fact it looked odds-on on minutes left when the sides were level. But then in one of the few sweeping advances upfield, Tipp. notched a great point by corner-forward Redmond and this was sufficient to put them in the Munster final against Cork or Clare.

Defeat however, was little short of heart break for Waterford, who for so long were masters in this thriller. They got off to a disastrous start when they fell two goals into arrears after only twelve minutes of play and both goals were of the fortunate variety, that might with any luck at all have been averted. Such a double hammer blow would have been more than sufficient to force any team to "throw in the towel" but such was not the case with Waterford.

Instead from that 12th minute onwards they began to play a brand of football that would have done more credit to the senior fifteen and Tipp. quite definitely were on the run. The standard of football, aided by some great fielding by players on both sides, for the remainder of that first half, left nothing to be desired, but it was Waterford, now urged on by the big home following, who had distinctly the better of the exchanges. And it was but fitting reward for their first half endeavours that they should chalk up six great points to leave them deservedly on level terms—2-0 to 0-6 at the interval.

It had been a splendid half-hour's football but even those opening thirty minutes paled into insignificance when compared with "the helping" that followed in the second half. It was championship stuff at its best, with the initiative changing hands repeatedly and all the time the final outcome in doubt.

First it was Waterford who took control, and when they looked good enough to prevail. This lead they held until great "Babs" Keating. True Tipp. reduced the deficit to the very minimum and with only five minutes left, dual star "Babs" Keating tapped over the equaliser. The tension was now almost unbearable. An exchange of points still left it all square and as the final minute ticked by, thoughts of a replay must have crossed every one's mind. But it was not to be and Tipp. secured the all-important winning point just three minutes before the end.

But to Waterford's credit, they refused to give in, and for the short time that remained they peppered that Tipp. goal area. Twice the winners full back, Pollard, cleared in style and seconds from the end a Pa Walsh 50 was barely scrambled to safety.

One again the Tipperary hero and matchwinner was the flying and greater steadiness he was closely watched by a vigilant Deise defence but it was Keating with some telling scores that carried Tipp. to victory.

The winners also had outstanding players in full back Tom Pollard—the best defender on view, Eddie Gorman, Sean Kearney, Kieran McGrath and T. J. Redmond.

It was cruel luck on Waterford to go under after an enjoyable quite a marked territorial advantage for so long during the hour. But they went under at least with colours twelve minutes from time when up front would undoubtedly have given them their passage to the Munster final.

In defence they were brilliantly served by Paddy Carlton, Ger Mooney and Pa Walsh, the latter's prodigious kicking being the feature of his display.

At midfield, Michael Power and particularly Tom Gough, the master of different Tipperary pairings, and in attack, the deadly accurate Tom Cunningham—he notched no less than seven points from play and frees, was undoubtedly star of

the sector. He got greatest assistance from his half line colleagues Achill Lannon and Vincent Rourke, and full forward Pat Clancy.

THE SCORING

The winners got off to a great start with a goal after nine minutes. A low drive by Dabs Keating was only partially saved by goalkeeper Tom Power and Anthony Burke was on hand to bolt the ball to the net. Then three minutes later came Tipp's second goal—scored by Keating from an acute angled free. The Waterford goal was completely unguarded for this free and Keating deftly took advantage of the stacking defensive covering to lob the ball to the corner of the net. This undoubtedly was a goal that should never have been conceded.

But then came the great Waterford fight back. Pat Clancy pointed a free in the

14th minute and a minute later Cunningham had a point from play. Midfielder Tom Gough added a third in the 20th minute and almost immediately Cunningham obliged from a free effort, and try as they might in the short time that remained, Waterford just could not penetrate the Tipp defence for an equalising point.

Within four minutes of the restart Waterford took the lead for the first time and again it was the unerring boot of Cunningham from a free that gave it to them. In the 11th minute things looked even rosier when Cunningham, this time from play, added another minor. Keating quickly replied with a Tipp. point but again Cunningham neutralised it with a like score.

But with only twelve minutes left Tipp. made their effort. Centre back Kearney ranging unfield kicked a point, and with five minutes left Keating equalised from a free. Seconds later Keating again put Tipp.

SALMON FISHING

Driftnet fishermen have been doing fairly well for the past week in all parts of the district with the exception of Ardmore where catches are said to be the lowest on record due to unfavourable weather conditions. Many of the boat crews have been "squared up" for the salmon portion of the season which ended on May 31, and they are now attaching grilse nets to their crafts. Grilse first made their appearance in the first week in May which is rather early as they do not usually appear until late May or early June. The price for salmon to fishermen is still 7/6 per lb. and is deemed to be a good price in the fifth month of the season. It is hoped that the grilse season will be at least as good as last year when 24,751 were taken weighing 136,681 lbs.

APRIL SALMON RETURNS

The recorded catch of salmon for the month of April was 2,714 weighing 26,238 lbs. of which 2,207 were taken by nets 334 by rods and 173 in the state weirs. This is an improvement compared with the number taken in the same month in 1964, but is about 700 salmon less than the catch for the previous month of March this year.

MONOFILAMENT DRIFT

NETS BANNED

The Minister for Fisheries has by bye-law banned the use of monofilament drift netting for salmon in all fishery districts operating as from June 1st. It was to have been in force on February 1st last but as a result of talks between the minister and fishermen's representatives it was decided to postpone the operation of the Byelaw from 1st June to 31st December when the matter will be further considered. Under this bye-law a person shall not (a) use or attempt to use for fishing for salmon any drift net made wholly or partially of monofilament synthetic material; (2) have in his possession, on any boat or quay, or on or near any bank or estuary, or on or near any sea-coast, any drift net for the capture of salmon, being a net made wholly or partially of monofilament synthetic material.

LATE MR. JACK KENNEALLY

The death took place last week at oughal Cottage Hospital of a member of an old established Youghal family in the person of Mr. Jack Kenneally, of Tallow Street, Youghal, after a prolonged period of illness. 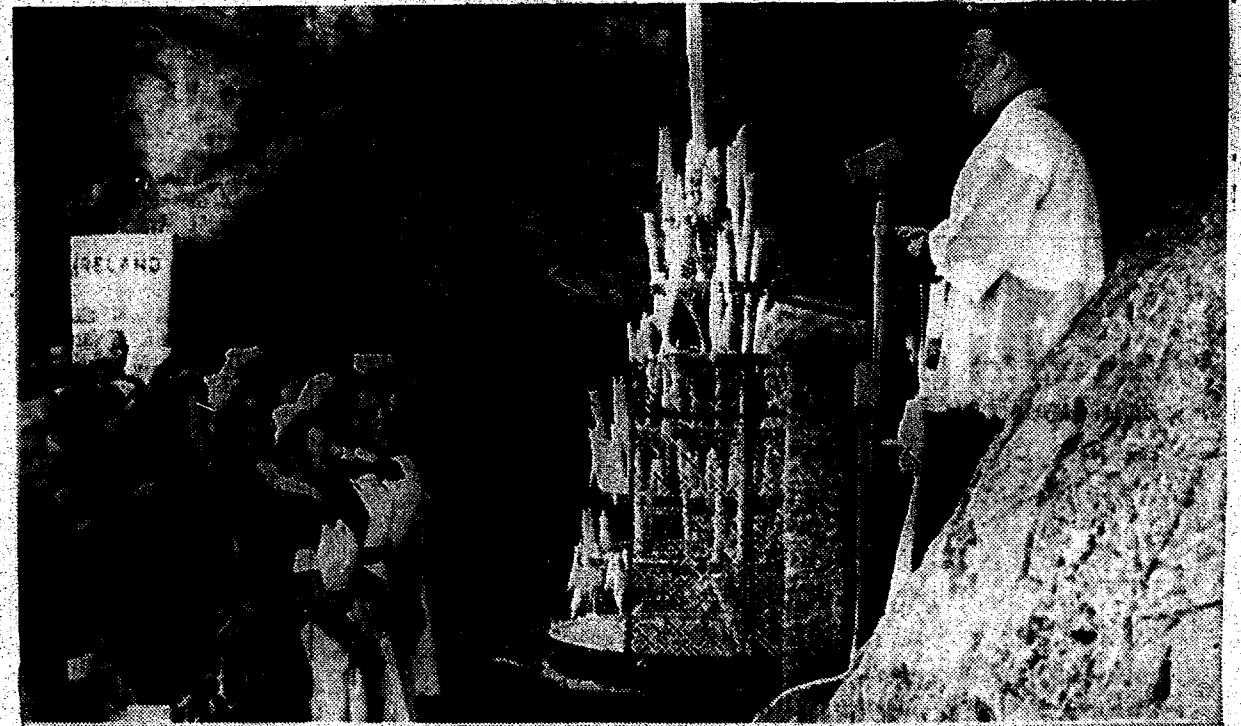

Mr. George Heskin seconded. Mr. W. Foran said they could be very generous with the ratepayers money. They could be inundated with requests for grants.

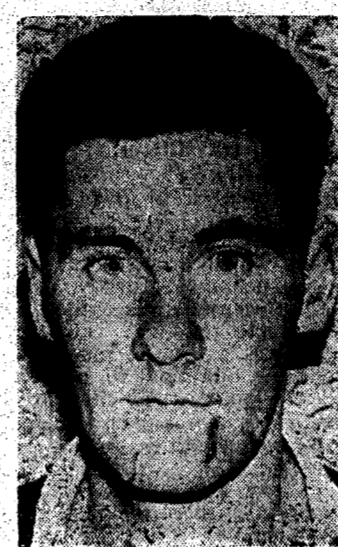

This reorganised defence is an even stronger one than did duty in their last appearance against Waterford, and the Deise forwards will certainly have to snap up all available chances if a winning tally is to be amassed.

Nor are the Limerick midfielders satisfied with midfield and now are gambling on a P. J. Keane-Eamonn Cregan partnership.

Their mentors, not unlike their Waterford counterparts, aware of weaknesses in attack, have made some surprise moves in an effort to bolster up the sector. In fact so sweeping are the changes up front that four of the sextet have not done duty for the County for some considerable time. It is more than a year or two now since Liam Moloney played in serious competition in the green jersey, and Eamonn Carey and J. Hayes have also been out of favour for some time past.

Because of Jimmy Byrne's transfer to midfield, the selectors were forced to make changes in defence. However,

one felt following the league defeat by Tipp that Martin O'g was something of a doubtful proposition at centre-back and the writer for one is surprised that he has been retained in the position. Nor was one prepared for the placing of Joe Joes Condon at left full to team up with Tom Cunningham and Austin Flynn, both of whom are playing better hurling right now than at any other stage in distinguished careers.

IRISH RETURNS

Another of those recalled is Jim Irish flanking Morrissey, with Larry Guinan completing the half line. It is a defence of vast experience, which will be pitted against Limerick's speedy forwards, and the outcome should be intriguing to say the least.

Midfield I have already dealt with but whether or not the present attacking set up is the complete answer is at this stage a matter for conjecture.

With Cheasty's transfer to midfield the attack is now led by John O'Brien and on either side of him Mick Flannely and Frankie Walsh are undoubtedly in their best positions.

Whelan's recall gives the full line an even more veteran look about it. The Abbeyside is playing really well just now and he could create the openings for Power and Crimes.

Limerick will undoubtedly set a hot tempo from the start hoping no doubt to outstay a Deise side now advancing in years. But provided that Morrissey will hold the centre-half fort adequately, I have no doubts about the remaining

defenders rising to the occasion. An even break at midfield is, however, imperative if Waterford hope to advance. And in Byrne and Cheasty there is hurling know how and ability to achieve this despite Limerick strength in the sector.

Going on the assumption that the latter pair will do the necessary, and satisfied that the Deise defence is strong enough to effectively contain the Limerick attack, I believe the Waterford forwards will notch just enough to give a very narrow and hard earned victory.

ROCKIES AWARDED GAME

COLLIGAN ROCKIES 2-7; KILGOBINET 1-0

It was gruesome! It was bloody! That I feel is the apt, though unfortunate description of last Sunday's first round intermediate hurling championship meeting between Colligan Rockies and Kilgobinet at Dungarvan's Fraher Field, which quite rightly was abandoned by the referee ten minutes after the restart. Never before have such disgraceful, untidy incidents been witnessed on a playing pitch within the County, and it is to be sincerely hoped its likes will never again be seen.

Just where to start in this first two minutes, and in the first four minutes, the good name of sportsmanship was smeared to a point almost beyond redemption, as these parish rivals on that occasion carried rivalry much too far. The spectacle, particularly when the game had been abandoned, was a frightening one, as players fought out a hurley swinging battle in the middle of the field that was both shameful and a disgrace to humanity. Injuries—some quite serious, were many, but one must, I suppose be thankful for small mercies, that no one was killed from a blow of a flailing head-directed hurley. Yes, that is the kind of championship game this was.

One is always loathe to apportion the blame to one side above another when such incidents occur, but I have no hesitation in saying that Kilgobinet were 90% the culprits on Sunday last. They were out-hurled and outclassed by a far superior opposition, and that I suppose they found to be a pill just too bitter to swallow. In any case several members of their side went literally stone berserk as they mowed down opponents without a thought for their safety or welfare.

Colligan, it is true had their small quota of hot heads, who joined battle when "war" had been declared but in fairness to them, not once during the hour did I see one of their players openly "down" an opponent until he himself had been struck first.

In passing, however, I must commend referee Sean O'Brien who did all in his power to keep matters under control. He correctly sent offenders to the line... but as matters transpired he was left to deal with a position that grew more impossible as the hour wore on. The needle in the exchanges was evident from practically the moment the game was set in motion. And after the Rockies had shot a brace of points

only possible decision he could make in the circumstances. But that unfortunately heralded scenes that will never be forgotten by the huge crowd present. Around midfield some Colligan players were set upon by opponents who cared nothing about the consequences their behaviour could have had. Players were attacked from in front and behind—the head at all times apparently being the main objective. All in all it would have done less than justice to an uncivilised race.

When some semblance of order had been restored, we had the quite unusual experience of having Gardai intermingling with the crowd and that surely indicates how unsavoury it all was.

ALARMIN

The aftermath too was quite alarming. One Colligan player had to have stitches inserted in a lip wound; another had head stitches; another lost consciousness for a time and another had two broken fingers and a badly damaged wrist. Many others too will be carrying the marks of battle for some time to come.

Kilgobinet too had their casualties in plenty. One player had a mouthful of teeth blown in; another was removed to Ardkeen with a damaged back for a check up, and several others had nasty abrasions on head, hands and body.

As for the game itself, it was too one-sided to hold any great interest. Colligan, except for early in the second half, were masters all the way and a surprising lack of fitness was no aid to the losers.

Only once during the game were Kilgobinet in the lead, and this was in the fifth minute when Lar Cummins flashed a great ball to the net, for their one and only score. That goal wiped out two early Colligan points: but soon the Rockies were on level terms and thereafter piled on their winning tally.

For the Rockies, Jim Joe Bannon, having his first game between the posts never put a foot wrong and made one superb first half save from Lar Cummins.

They were first on the ball and of the sextet Dick Tobin and Paddy Walsh did most damage. Frank Tobin and James Hickey weren't around long enough to achieve anything of note, but Tommy Byrnes and Jimmy Tobin also played valiant parts in victory.

And what of Kilgobinet? They have produced many a fine side and by tradition have always enjoyed a fine reputation for good sportsmanship. Why that reputation should be so distastefully tarnished on Sunday I do not know.

But if I believe they were primarily to blame for what happened, I cannot let the occasion pass without exempting such as John Woods, Michael Kelly, John Fennell, Peter Power, Jim Dee, Desal Brenock Denis Flynn and Bobbie Buckley. They played the game as if their three substitutes, as did their substitutes, Anthony Hayes, Joe Power and Roger McCarthy. Scorers for the Rockies were D. Tobin (0-5), T. Byrnes and P. Walsh (1-0) each; C. Bannon and M. Walsh (0-1) each.
