TRAGIC PASSING OF POPULAR DUNGARVAN MAN

LATE PATRICK PRENDERGAST

14, Congress Villas, Dungarvan



Dungarvan town and district was plunged into mourning on Thursday night of last week, 29th inst. when it was learned of the death of Patrick Prendergast, 14 Congress Villas, Dungarvan, as a result of a car accident at Killminion.

"Mackey Pender" as he was so popularly known by his legion of friends, was but in his 37th year. He was walking toward Clonea to the Dungarvan Show Dance when he was in collision with a car and was killed almost instantly.

In his native town he was deservedly held in the highest esteem by all. The possessor of countless outstanding qualities, he was noted for his joviality and wit. A keen follower of the Gaelic games he was himself a playing member of the St. Garvan's club in his earlier days. He was noted also for his ability to drive the hurling ball such tremendous distances and only at the recent long puck competition during Gala Week finished second on 82 yards.

To his heartbroken mother, brothers and sisters we tender sincere and deep sympathy on their great loss.

The removal of the remains to St. Mary's Parish Church on Saturday from the District Hospital, was followed by one of the largest corteges ever seen in Dungarvan. The entire route was lined with people paying respects to one who was a favourite with all. The remains were received and blessed by Rev. D. Byrne, C.C.

The 11.30 Mass on Sunday morning in St. Mary's was offered up for the repose of his soul and the burial took place immediately afterwards in the Old Churchyard, again in the presence of a huge concourse and amid manifestation of very great sorrow.

Dungarvan lost one of its best liked sons on Thursday of last week, 29th ult., when Patrick

Prendergast was fatally injured at Killminion whilst wending his way towards the annual Dungarvan Show dance in Clonea.

It is not, however, as Patrick Prendergast that he will be remembered. For to one and all he was just "Mackey Pender" which in the writer's eyes was but a likeable, non-de-plume for an extremely popular individual.

"Mackey" in every sense was one of the town's real "characters." He was known far beyond the confines of his native town, and his untimely passing under such tragic circumstances has left a void that can never be adequately filled.

He was, too, a keen lover of sport. But if he had an avid interest in the horses, his first love was undoubtedly for the game of hurling. He himself, wore the St. Garvan's jersey when that club was in existence and ever since he has followed the fortunes of Dungarvan and Waterford with more than average interest.

To many also he was known as "the long puck specialist." He had the ability to get phenomenal length into his drives and only at the recent long puck competition during Gala Week he was second to Tipp's, sub. goalie Peter O'Sullivan, beating in the process, several well-known hurlers.

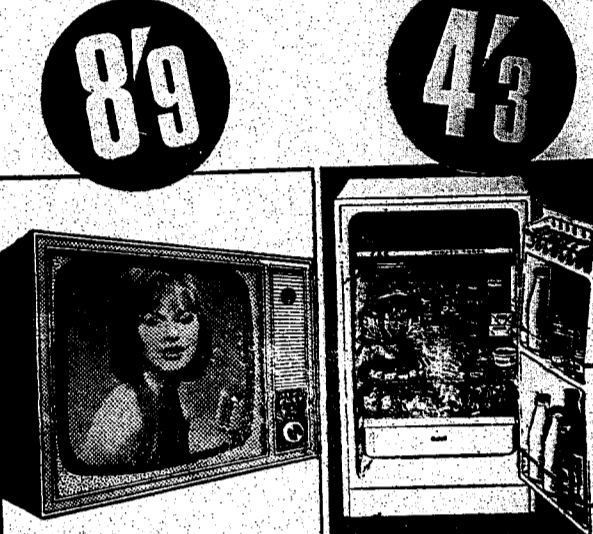

OLD GRAVEYARD CLEANED

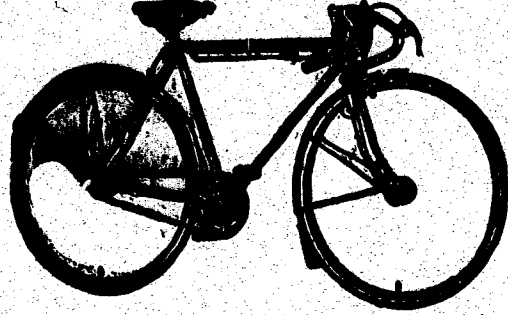

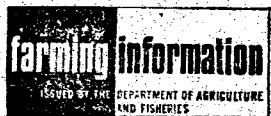

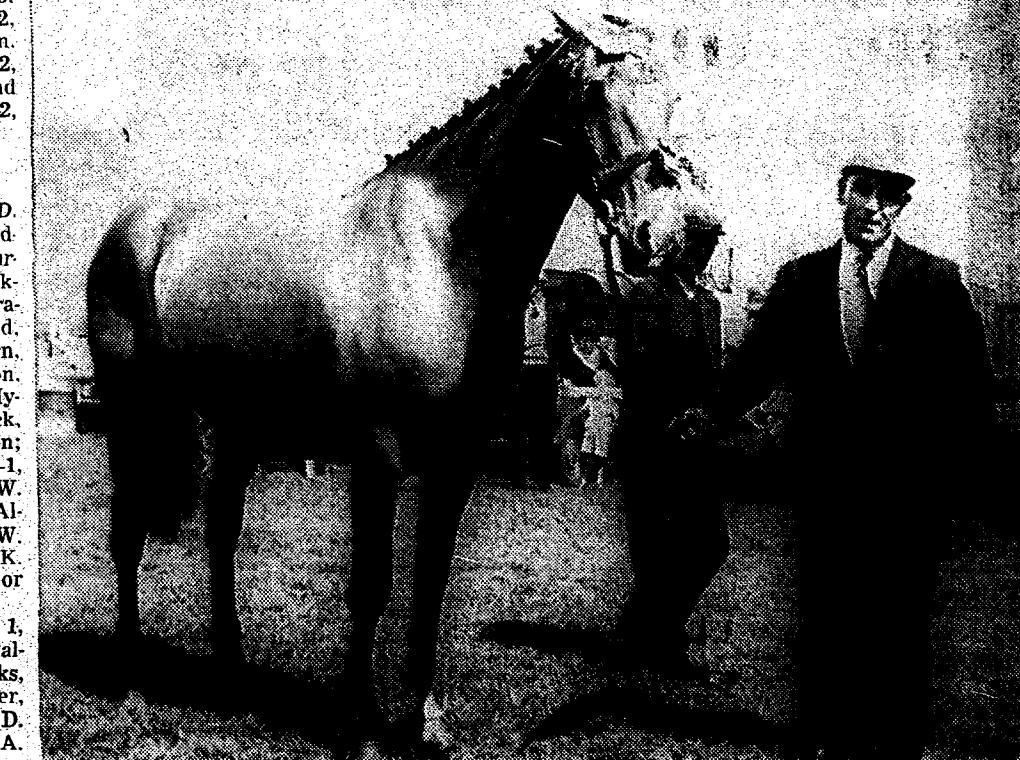

Vin Donoghue Retires from Teaching

Mr. M. V. O'Donoghue, B.E., H.D.E., has, after more than forty years service in the cause of secondary education in the Lismore area, finally closed his

text-books and laid away his an extent had he mastered the chalk to take a well-earned rest.
 The news, when it reached my ears some few days ago, sent my mind racing back over the years to a day long ago, when as a small boy of ten, I saw him for the first time, striding purposefully across the old school-yard, accompanied by the late Rev. Bro. J. A. Carey, C.B.S., in the direction of the upper school which was then known to all as "The College."

Some years later I had the privilege of sitting in his class. Since those far-off days I've sat in other class rooms and have been lectured by many other teachers but never by anyone who inspired more, encouraged more, or gave a nobler example to his pupils than Vincent O'Donoghue of Lismore.
 Mr. O'Donoghue entered somewhat later than others the ranks of the teaching profession. There was a reason for this as I found out years later. While others were preparing for their future careers in college and university, Vincent O'Donoghue, in his academic course already complete, was fighting his country's battles with the famous Flying Column of West Cork under Commandant-General Tom Barry. Later his activities took him along the whole western seaboard from Kerry to Donegal and later still into what we now call the Six Counties, during the Pograms of '22.
 But Mr. O'Donoghue was never a trumpeteer. I've never heard him speak, except in the vaguest terms, of his work for Ireland and many of those who know him well are unaware of his record in the last struggle to win for Ireland its rights as a free unfettered nation.
 Of course everybody knows his work for the G.A.A. and the Irish language. In the athletic field he was a sportsman par excellence and in the council chamber a giant—although at times his decision may not have pleased all. Nevertheless, even at moments of highest tension nobody doubted his sincerity, his integrity or his love for Ireland and all its traditions.

And in the tongue he loves best—Go geuthidh Dia a shaothar do. Is go mba fada buan e da mhnaoi uasal, da chlann dhlis, da chairde, da ath-seolairi scaipithe ar fud an domhain uile, go bhfuil meas acu air.—Is mise.
 Now that the time has come for him to rest from his labour we say with the Latinists — ad multos annos.

It is worth noting too, that Vincent O'Donoghue, unlike so many of his contemporaries, did more than just pay tribute to the Irish language. When he returned from active service he sat down and once again began to learn it. How many of those who have listened to him addressing the G.A.A. Congress or heard him in the midst of Gaeltogairí from Donegal to Ring knew that he hadn't talked Irish until 1931-'32? To such

 The Social Welfare (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, 1965, makes provision for the following increases in payments and other improvements in the Social Assistance Schemes.
OLD AGE AND BLIND NON-CONTRIBUTORY PENSIONS
 As from 1st August, 1965, all rates of pension are increased by 10/- per week where the annual means do not exceed £26.58.0d. and by 5/- per week in other cases. The yearly means limit of £143.15.0d. for the receipt of pension is raised to £156.15s.0d. and in the case of pensioners with qualified children it is further raised, as follows:—
 In the case of a person with one qualified child £182.15.0d.
 In the case of a person with two qualified children £208.15.0d.
 Where there are more than two qualified children the yearly means limit of £208.15s.0d. (applicable to a pensioner with two qualified children) is increased by £13 for each qualified child in excess of two.
 Persons whose claims to pension were disallowed because their means exceeded the previous limits are advised to make fresh applications if their yearly means do not exceed the new limits.
 Other improvements in relation to the pension code are also brought into effect as from 1st August, viz:—
 (a) Income from charitable organisations is disregarded when in assessing means;
 (b) in the case of blind pensioners, the amount of annual earnings disregarded in assessing means is increased to £65 in respect of the pensioner, £52 for the spouse and £39 for each qualified child;
 (c) the maximum amount of pension which may be allowed by the hospital authorities to certain detained patients in mental hospitals is increased from 10/- to 20/- a week. The hospital authorities may also make payments out of pension, on the patients behalf, in respect of his commitments by way of rent, rates, land purchase annuity, etc.;
 (d) in the case of claimants to pension who are in receipt of annuities from the sale of holdings to the L-and Commission under Section 6 of the Land Act, 1965, up to £3 weekly of annuity is disregarded in means assessment.
WIDOWS' NON-CONTRIBUTORY PENSIONS
 As from 1st August, 1965, all rates of pension are increased by 10/- per week where the annual means do not exceed £26.58.0d. and by 5/- per week in other cases.
 The yearly means limits are extended by £12 to enable a minimum pension of 6/- a week to be paid to widows whose yearly means are just outside the previous limits, e.g., a widow with no qualified child whose yearly means exceed £143.15.0d. but do not exceed £156.15s.0d. will get 6/- a week, and a widow with two qualified children will get 6/- a week if her yearly means exceed £195.15s.0d. but do not exceed £208.15s.0d.
 Changes are also made in the method of assessing yearly means as follows:—
 (a) income from charitable organisations is disregarded in assessing means;
 (b) a deduction of £39 in respect of each qualified child is allowed from a widow's earnings derived from personal exertions. Previously this deduction was allowed only from earnings in insurable employment;
 (c) not more than £26 in the case of one child, or £52 in the case of two or more children, of the yearly means of qualified children is included in a widow's means. Previously, all the yearly means of not more than two qualified children were included in the widow's means.
 Widows who consider that they are affected by any of the changes should apply to the Secretary, Department of Social Welfare, Aras Mhic Dhiarmada, Dublin, 1, to have their claims reviewed.
ORPHANS' NON-CONTRIBUTORY PENSION
 The maximum rates of orphans' non-contributory pensions are increased by 5/- a week from 1st August, 1965. Other rates are increased by 4/- or 4/6d. a week.
 The yearly means limit is extended by £6.12.6d. to enable a new minimum pension of 4/- to be paid to orphans whose yearly means are just outside the previous limit.
CHILDREN'S ALLOWANCES
 In the case of a multiple birth of three or more children double the rate of children's allowances is payable in respect of each child of that birth so long as not less than three of the children remain qualified for an allowance. Persons who are eligible for payment of children's allowance at double the normal rate must make application in writing for such payment to the Secretary, Department of Social Welfare, Aras Mhic Dhiarmada, Dublin 1.
UNEMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE
 As from 1st August, 1965, Unemployment Assistance rates are increased in all areas by 10/- a week for an applicant who has an adult dependant and by 5/- a week where there is no adult dependant. Payment at the increased rates is being made without special application.
 Provision is also made in the Act to enable a newly-granted Qualification Certificate to take effect from the date of the application for, instead of the date of grant of, the Certificate, thus permitting unemployment assistance to be paid for all or part of the intervening period in appropriate cases.
SOCIAL INSURANCE
REMUNERATION LIMIT
 An Order has been made under the Act raising the income limit for insurance in the case of non-manual employees to £1,200 a year with effect from 6th September, 1965. Any such employees whose remuneration is not at a rate exceeding that figure will be compulsorily insurable from that date.

Pig Price Increase Inadequate

"Inadequate" was the term applied by the NFA annual review team to the price increase of 10/ per cwt. for bacon pigs as announced by the Government on Wednesday, July 28. The announcement was made by the Minister for Finance when he and the Minister for Agriculture met the N.F.A. Review Team to continue the discussions on farm income.

It was pointed out that the N.F.A. Price Committee had made a clear case for an increase of 15/3 per cwt. based on the increase in the price of home grown barley and other increased costs.

The effect of the announcement is that the new minimum price for Grade A Special and Grade A will be 260 and 248/ per cwt. d.w. respectively, as from Monday, October 4, 1965.

It will be remembered that the need for an increase in the guaranteed price for bacon pigs was accepted by the Government in this year's annual review of agriculture with N.F.A. N.F.A. has been pressing for some time to have the actual amount of the increase announced and at the recent annual general meeting of the Association, the President, Mr. Richard Deasy referred to the fact that it was long overdue.

COUNCIL MEMBERS BRIEFED ON FARM INCOME TALKS

Inquiries from members of the N.F.A. Review Team subsequent to their meeting last week with the Minister for Finance, Mr. Lynch, and the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries, Mr. Haughey, disclosed that the team was far from satisfied with the outcome of the talks on farm income and on the prospects for agriculture in the remainder of 1965. However, they withheld

detailed comment until the situation has been discussed by the National Council.

Council members have been informed of the position and there are reports already of a number of special meetings being held in the Provinces.

The N.F.A. delegation was led by Mr. R. Deasy, President, and included Messrs. J. R. O'Keefe, J. Buttiner, B. Donohoe, and Rev. P. Brady, C.C. (all vice-presidents); Mr. A. M. C. Smith, Cavan; and Messrs. B. Power, Asst. Gen. Sec., P. Hartnett, Livestock Consultant, J. Howley, Economist and J. Murphy, Secretary to the Review Team.

We would like to have as much evidence as possible of the attitude of Bank Managers at the present time. HOWARD SPEAKS FOR SMALL DAIRY FARMERS

Speaking at NFA Regional meetings in Co. Wick and Skibbereen, Mr. Michael Howard, N.F.A. Treasurer, stressed the vital need for improvement in income from dairying especially for the small dairy farmer. Mr. Howard, who has been a member of N.F.A. National Creamery committee for a number of years and a member of NFA Rural Development Committee is one of the NFA candidates in the forthcoming Bord Baine election. The seat on Bord Baine for which he is a candidate represents suppliers of milk to creameries or milk separating stations of which the proprietors are University College, Cork, the Dairy Disposal Co. Ltd., the Condensed Milk Co. of Ireland and the Newmarket Dairy Co.

Mr. Howard declared that NFA was greatly concerned at the low level of income of our dairy farmers and emphasised that the Association would continue to pursue vigorously its demands for both a realistic and basic price increase together with a quality payment of an amount sufficient to compensate dairy farmers. Dairy farmers, he said, work long hours seven days of the week and their payment contribution to the national economy appears to be overlooked. They are economy and would continue to be its sheet anchor.

These small farmers had responded in no uncertain fashion to the call for increased production and exports and but for their efforts we would have been faced with an economic crisis long ago. These were the people who were entitled to a status and to a status increase.

A solution to the country's present financial problems would depend on agriculture, and without a dynamic and vigorous dairy industry our livestock trade, which is our best currency earner, would not expand sufficiently.

The N.F.A. Rural Development Committee has already carried out an amount of preliminary work and would actively pursue its objective of ensuring that the small farmer was not forced out of existence. Small farmers were en-

titled to preferential treatment in the matter of grants and prices on a sliding scale.

Mr. Howard declared that when elected on the Board, he would ensure that producers were assured the opportunity of knowing what the Board was doing and he would welcome suggestions from them on matters pertinent to the marketing of their products. Unless the primary producer was given the opportunity of putting forward his view, the representative on the Board of dairy farmers.

There were at present over 100 dairy farmers members of N.F.A. and this made it imperative that if dairy farmers were to be represented it was necessary that the N.F.A. candidate be elected. Mr. Howard assured the meeting that he would be contacted by producers when they had problems.

Many people at the meetings complained that heretofore they had never been given an opportunity of discussing their problems with representative elected by Dairy Disposal suppliers.

MINISTER'S ASSURANCES ON LAND ACT

The outcome of last week's meeting between the N.F.A. Oireachtas Committee and the Minister for Lands, Mr. O'Morain, accompanied by the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries, Mr. Haughey, was a clear and unequivocal assurance that the Government does not intend the recent Land Act to constitute any threat to the security of working farmers.

The Minister for Lands will follow up his verbal undertaking to this effect with a letter to the N.F.A. setting out the position more fully. It is hoped that the Minister's letter will help to ease the minds of many farmers who have been very worried about the three mile limit clause in Sections 35 and 42 of the Act.

N.F.A. is still convinced that it would have been a much better approach, if specific safeguards for working farmers had been written into the Land Act itself. But since this was not done we are glad to have the assurance of the Minister for Lands as to how the present Government intends that it should be implemented.

PRICES OF REACTOR CATTLE

With the receipt of further clarification from the Department of Agriculture last week on the raising of the maximum price payable for non-pedigree reactor cattle from £80 to £100, it is timely to recall the efforts of N.F.A. over a period of many months to secure this revision under the B.T.E. scheme. In fact as far back as last year this was the subject of numerous resolutions to the N.F.A. National Creamery Committee from county executives.

The N.F.A. efforts to have the upper limit raised were intensified in the annual review between the Association and the Government last March and it was emphasised that this would be an important factor in speeding up the attestation of the remaining six dairy counties.

It is not without significance, therefore, that the introduction of the higher maximum figure should be followed up so soon by the preliminary announcement of the likely attestation of Cork, Kerry, Kilkenny, Limerick, Tipperary and Waterford in another two months or so.

SALMON NETTING SEASON ENDS The 1965 salmon netting season ended at 6 a.m. on Saturday last, but the rod season will continue until 30th September. For the last few days of the season there was a rather sudden scarcity of both salmon and grise in all parts of the tidal area. On the whole the season is termed as being fairly good but when the final records for the season will be available it is believed that the total catches will not be near last season's figures. Certainly the grise will not equal last year's figure which was 24,751 weighing 136,681 lbs.

By order of the Government the use of monofilament drift nets were prohibited as from June 1st and in this connection Public Inquiries will be held in Waterford on August 17th; at Youghal on the 18th and at Cork on the 19th.

NO WEEK-DAY TRAINS FOR YOUGHAL Recently the Cork Council of Trade Unions made representatives to C.I.E. to have a week-day train service for the summer months from Cork to the Youghal. The reply was read at a recent meeting of the Council which stated that it was regretted that the request could not be acceded to. The letter pointed out that up to two years ago there was a regular week-day and Sunday service which had to be curtailed to Sundays only due to lack of patronage. Various views were expressed as to the cause of the decline but it was agreed generally that the growth of motor traffic rather than the fare charged, or the service provided was the main reason for the situation. The letter advised that the substitute bus service continues to adequately cater for the number offering on week-days. The Council agreed to again take the matter up with C.I.E. and request (1) excursion trains on Sunday; (2) daily excursion trains during the August bank holiday fortnight; (3) and reduce the excursion fare to 6/-.

FILM ON YOUGHAL FISHING Bord Failte have expressed the wish to make a colour film on fishing in Youghal in the immediate future for circulation abroad. When it is completed, they will also take films in other parts of the country and will give visiting fishermen some idea of what to expect on a fishing holiday in Ireland. The camera is expected to arrive in Youghal in a week's time. Those directly concerned are Youghal Sea Anglers Club and the Boat Club who have pledged their fullest co-operation. The local net fishermen's association will also make as many boats as possible available and the townspeople will also give every support to the project.

WATER SAFETY WEEK Water safety week commenced on Monday last when all the phases of safety is being dealt with. Through the week there were lectures at the Town Hall and demonstrations were given in rescue operations, artificial respiration and the kiss of life. Youghal Safety Water Group is comprised of very young persons, all being excellent swimmers and thoroughly conversed in the art of rescue.

MIDDLETON U.D.C. RESOLUTION ADOPTED At a recent meeting of the Youghal Urban District Council the following resolution from the Middleton Council was unanimously adopted: "That we the people of Middleton who have been the victims of a recent takeover of our town-council without any regard to our goodwill, call on the people of Ireland to support us in making this a national issue and restrain unjust landlords from depriving our people of the right to hold freehold interest in their property."

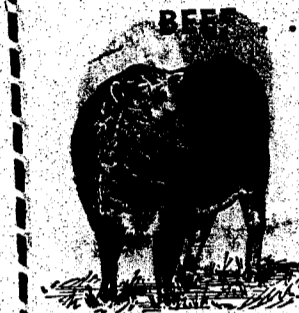

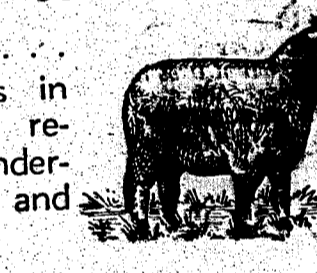

'Inter' Hurlers Well Beaten Disappointing Munster Final

CORK 1-15; **WATERFORD** 3-2
ANOTHER anti-climax Munster final! The expected thrills failed to materialise at Dungarvan on Sunday last when Cork's Intermediate hurlers romped to the easiest of victories over a thoroughly disappointing Waterford side. The torrential first half rain completely marred this Provincial decider but even the inclemency of the elements cannot even partially atone for the negative, spoiling and above all, substandard hurling that prevailed for most of the hour.

Cork, let it be said were very worthy winners. Of that there cannot be the slightest doubt. But in truth to tell it did not require many flashes of brilliance to overcome a Deise fifteen that never hit the form displayed in the earlier rounds. They were slow and sluggish, and despite the pre-match dedication towards training

inated this final for the greater part, and had their forwards been in scoring form then Waterford must have gone under by an infinitely greater margin. But just like their seniors of the previous Sunday, those red jerseyed forwards were plagued by inaccuracy and over the hour shot no fewer than 23 wides.

Almost from the throw-in, Waterford found themselves in trouble, and labouring under a beaten midfield, the flow of exchanges was in the main towards the Deise citadel. Thrice Cork missed highly feasible scoring opportunities before they eventually opened their account with a point in the fifth minute. Seconds later they added a second and

things looked exceedingly blue for Waterford. Then the heavens literally opened as rain came beating down incessantly for the remainder of the half. But even under the appalling conditions that now prevailed, Cork, without having it reflected on the scoreboard, continued to hold sway.

As the half rapidly drew to a close, and the Leesiders leading 0-5 to 0-2, Waterford had their first ray of hope. Right corner forward Danny Mahon racing over to the other flank gained possession and sent over a perfect centre into the goalmouth. Up rose centre forward Kieran O'Ryan and he smacked the ball to the Cork net. That left the sides level, and although Cork had again edged into a 0-6 to 1-2 lead at the interval, the issue now remained wide open.

That, however, was just about the extent of the Deise challenge. Straight from the restart Cork again assumed control, and quickly the scoring differential between the sides widened. So pronounced in fact was their superiority at this stage that their attack could even afford the luxury of several wides, and still looked odds on to win. It took Waterford in fact exactly 24 minutes to register their first score at the half—a goal by substitute M. Power, but almost immediately Cork negated this score at the other end. For good measure they tucked on a brace of points, and only a last minute goal from a free took the bare loof the scoreline for Waterford.

The merits of Waterford's display—or should one say the demerits—can be best gauged by the fact that Cork won pulling up, and yet they were far from impressive in doing so. With the exception of the closing stages of each half the Leesiders reigned supreme and with greater scoring power in attack would have had the issue sewn up long before they eventually had.

Their goalkeeper, Jack Dempsey could not be faulted for the three Deise goals, and otherwise had a trouble free hour. The defence had little difficulty in subduing an utterly inept attack, whilst midfielders Oliver O'Keefe and John Hogan were too good for several Waterford pairings.

Up front the forwards wasted several scoring chances, and of the sextet Willie Galligan, Sean Barry and Mick Murphy were best.

Waterford truly disappointed beyond words. It was to say the least an insipid, uninspiring display and many reputations were greatly tarnished as a result.

Ironically it was the old men of the side that took all the honours. In defence Joe Harney was a towering full back and in the outler line the ebullient F. Corcoran, proved the team's top star with a classical display. Ollie Wilkinson and Tom Walsh were others to acquit themselves well, whilst goalkeeper Pat O'Grady, although not blameless for Cork's lone goal, was a great success.
