## Council To Scrap Water Scheme

### In Favour of Local Minor Schemes

AT Monday's meeting Waterford County Council decided to scrap the already approved £210,000 Rathgormack regional water scheme and to provide water by a minor scheme as well as encouraging private and group schemes.

Mr. C. Curran (Chairman) already had their own water supplies. The Council had been undated with requests for water during the past three or four months. Their policy had been to encourage private and group schemes.

Mr. F. Roche said when the N.F.A. protested against the installation of the Rathgormack Scheme it was not speaking for the working man or the small householder. The majority of the people in Portlaoise and Rathgormack would be in favour of the scheme. The farming organisation was speaking for itself, as most of the members

Mr. J. D. Hally (Co. Engineer) said 62½% of the people in the Rathgormack district had no water and the majority of them would find it difficult to put in their own supplies. To date the

Council had spent £2396-10-8 on the scheme, for consultants fees and expenses and the erection of gauges.

Mr. D. Aherne said if the scheme was scrapped all the money spent would be thrown down the drain.

Mr. T. Lannon said a lot of the Council Engineering staff was engaged in private business and carrying out private work. Mr. Hally replied that none of his staff were engaged in private work.

Mr. Lannon said if enquiries were carried out it would be discovered that members of the staff were doing private work.

Mr. Curran said if Mr. Lannon's allegations were true it was very serious and the matter should be investigated.

Mr. Lannon said before he the Co. Manager had made an had been elected to the Council order preventing members of the staff from doing private work and as far as he was aware, nobody was doing work outside the office.

Mr. Lannon said the Rathgormack Scheme would cost approximately £400 a house to install the water. This was outlandish.

Mr. Curran said the Waterford County Council had not the staff or the equipment to supply water for minor schemes.

Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D., said he knew of three pumps in the Rathgormack area that needed attention, but it was a waste of time to do anything with them because no decision had been taken on the regional scheme.

Mr. Kyne said the majority of the people were in favour of the Rathgormack Scheme. He was in favour, he said, of going ahead with eight minor water schemes, which had been drawn up by the Co. Engineer, for 61 new houses. He hated to think of the people who had been waiting for three years for water and he wondered if they would have to wait much longer.

Mr. N. Walsh asked if the county could be supplied with water on the basis of minor schemes.

Mr. Hally said if it was intended by the Council to turn down the Rathgormack Regional Scheme, he intended to prepare a map showing each group of 6 houses and to relate them to the source available. He believed the regional schemes were the ultimate answer, even though the cost per house may be high. The

more realistic approach to the question of cost was the cost and expenses and the erection of gauges. He did not believe that regional schemes should be despatched all over the county.

Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D., said the farmers who came in and paraded against the regional scheme were doing themselves been carried out properly.

The Co. Engineer said that two regional schemes were in operation at the moment. The Dunmore East-Pagga-Cheep point Regional Scheme had cost £76,757 and the Ballyduff-Cappoquin-ismore Regional Scheme had cost £78,000.

Mr. Milo Galgey said that about £20,000 could have been saved on the Dunmore East regional scheme if the job had been carried out properly.

The Co. Engineer said the Consultant Engineer who had worked on the Dunmore East scheme was one of the most conscientious men he knew.

Mr. Roche said the members of the Council expected to get water today at the same price as 20 years ago. If they turned down the Rathgormack scheme they would be denying the people of piped water, which they were entitled to.

Mr. Kyne said the N.F.A. deputation which had protested against the Rathgormack scheme was a deputation of a type, it did not represent the small farmers, but it did represent the people who had put in their own water and who did not want to pay for installing water for other people. It was the old principal of "I'm all right Jack" and it was very natural.

Mr. Hally said that if the Council went ahead with the Modeligo and Rathgormack Schemes it would have an impact of 10d. to 11d. in the rate.

On the proposal of Mr. T. Lannon and seconded by Mr. K. O'Ryan, it was decided by 7 votes to 5 not to go ahead with the Rathgormack Scheme. The voting was: For—Messrs. Harty Dower, Lannon, O'Ryan, N. Walsh, Aherne, Curran; Against—Kyne, Fahey, Foran, Roche, Galgey.

Mr. Kyne said the Co. Engineer should now list all the feasible minor schemes, but he felt the work on them would now be carried out in 40 years.

The Council then decided on a policy of minor water supply schemes and the encouragement of group and private schemes.

## Minister Refuses Sanction

In order that the public may understand what is happening to the proposed school in Cappoquin for mildly-handicapped children, we, the members of St. John's Association of Parents and Friends of Mentally Handicapped Children wish to place before them the following facts.

Nearly 80 years ago a residential school for the education and care of young orphan boys was founded in Cappoquin by the Sisters of Mercy. This institution must soon close because the Government has decided that orphan children shall in future be placed in the care of selected families.

In view of the impending closure of the orphanage, the Sisters, acting on the advice of Most Rev. Dr. Cohalan, the late Bishop of the Diocese, requested the Departments of Education and Health to sanction the premises as a residential school for mildly-handicapped children. Meanwhile several committees, located in the East Cork-South Tipperary

West Waterford region, were elected to help the nuns in promoting this very worthy project. If zeal, good will and earnest endeavour could accomplish anything, success seemed assured and within the short period of a few months more than £2,000 has been collected from generous supporters. The only thing needed was official recognition but we have now been informed by the Minister for Health that this will not be granted and for the following reasons: (1) The premises are too small. The Minister is advised that they could suitably accommodate only 25 to 30 girls. In relation to residential centres, the Commission has recommended that, for the younger age groups, it will usually be found that 100 to 200 patients are desirable and that centres catering for smaller groups are difficult to operate satisfactorily. (2) There is inadequate recreational space in and around the premises and there is no suitable room for expansion. (3) The report of the Commission has made it clear that the modern care and treatment of the mentally-handicapped requires the services of a wide range of staff and the provision of a variety of facilities. It would be extremely difficult if not impossible to provide such facilities at Cappoquin. (4) The operation of the Home, even if it were

otherwise feasible, would be otherwise feasible, would probably be very costly and uneconomical.

Having given every consideration to all these reasons, we, the members of the Committee, are convinced that they bear no relation to the facts as we know them. For this reason we have decided to request the Minister to receive a deputation to discuss with him all matters connected with the Cappoquin School.

It is our intention to keep the public fully informed of the progress made in our continued efforts to secure official recognition.

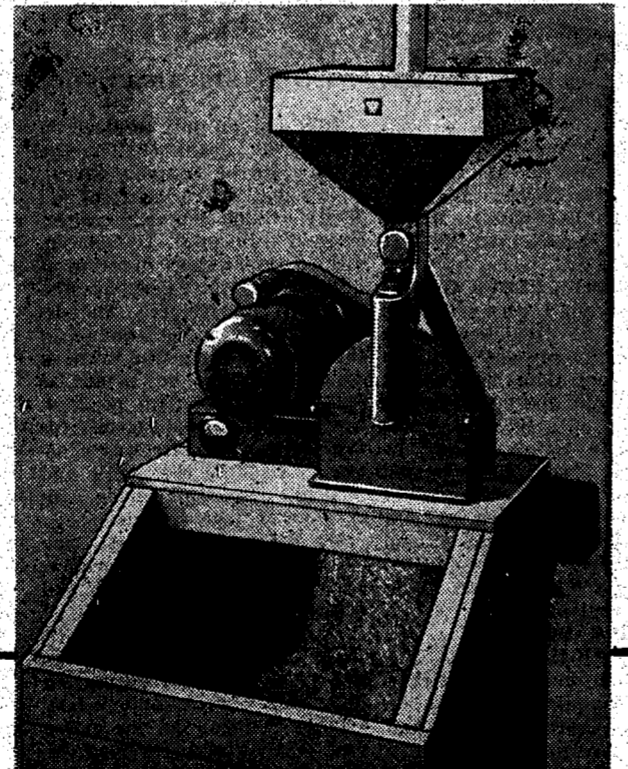

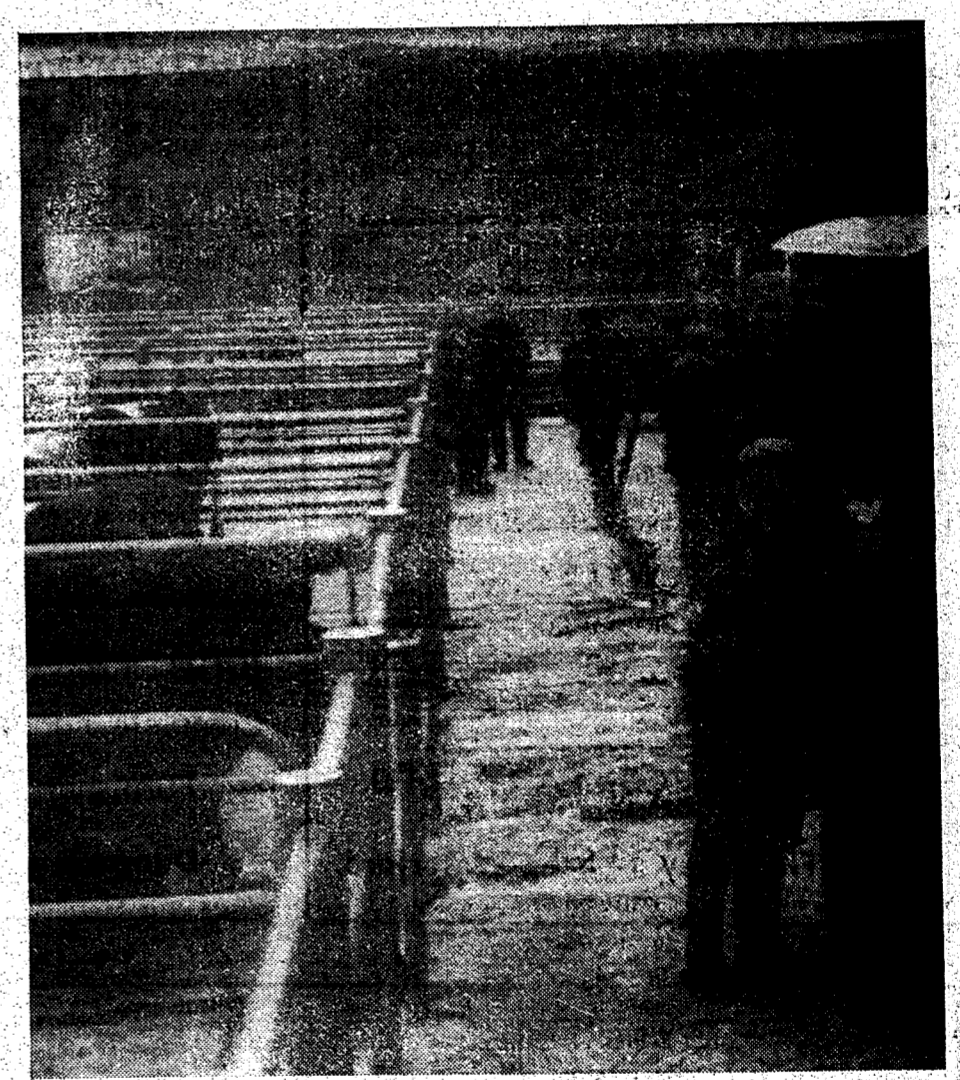

DON'T LET THAT WARBLE FLY!

The period for dressing cattle against the warble fly started on 1st September. The new chemical used against this costly parasite is easy to apply and is very effective. It is simply poured on the backs of cattle and absorbed through the skin. It then kills the young warbles which are developing in the animal's body. The fly itself dies having laid its eggs on cattle during the summer. Therefore if all cattle are dressed in the next three months all these developing warbles will be killed. No warble fly will emerge from the backs of cattle next Spring.

Farmers are advised to have all their cattle dressed against warbles. After 1st December only cattle that have been so treated can be offered for sale, slaughter or export. When cattle are treated by an artificial insemination centre or a veterinary surgeon an official certificate is issued. This must accompany each animal's blue card. Farmers will be notified of the intended visit. All cattle should be available on the date arranged, together with the correct blue card for each animal.

The benefits are well worth the trouble and expense. It costs 3/- per animal. As a result gadding ceases, cattle put on condition quicker and give more milk. Injuries caused by gadding cease and Irish cattle will obtain better prices. More hides will be available for leather goods. At present hides are imported. Over 2 million cattle were treated last year and the farmers who did so had no regrets.

A small number of the two million cattle dressed showed some after effects. This received a lot of adverse publicity. This year an insurance fund against possible losses has been established. Criticism has been made that perhaps only 95% of the cattle population might be dressed this year. If this proves true it will be a tremendous success and evidence of great co-operation. Quicker weight gains, increased milk production and the other advantages would be proportionately widespread. It would be illogical to postpone such an achievement even for 12 months when so effective a drug is available.

Seldom has a remedy been so simple or a way of having hard cash been more certain. It is in everybody's interest to have all cattle treated now. It is a challenge to all.

SECREGATION OF QUALITY OF WHEAT

As already announced the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries has arranged that wheat will be segregated in regard to quality by reference to the falling number method of measuring the degree of sprouting damage. The segregation will be made into millable, potentially millable and unmillable categories.

The Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries has now decided in the light of the circumstances prevailing this year after consultation with the parties concerned, that he falling number limits in accordance with which these classifications will be made, will be: (1) Millable wheat, over 160; (2) Potentially millable wheat 120-160; (3) Unmillable wheat less than 120.

As already announced growers will be paid full millable price for wheat falling into the millable and potentially millable categories.

In order to ensure that the falling number test is carried out in a uniform manner the Minister has also arranged, with the co-operation of the Irish Flour Millers' Association, that technical officers of his Department will carry out a system of inspection at each intake point. Growers should note that it will be open to them to appeal against a decision on which classifies wheat as unmillable on the basis of its falling number value. In such cases the Departmental officer at the intake point concerned will decide appeal cases at intake points as far as possible. Where appeals in respect of rejection on falling number grounds cannot be decided at intake points, they will be submitted to the Central Wheat Laboratory for decision.

Where wheat is classified as unmillable for sprouting damage, and/or other reasons, it will be open to the growers to appeal against the decision to the Central Wheat Laboratory in the same manner as applied last year.

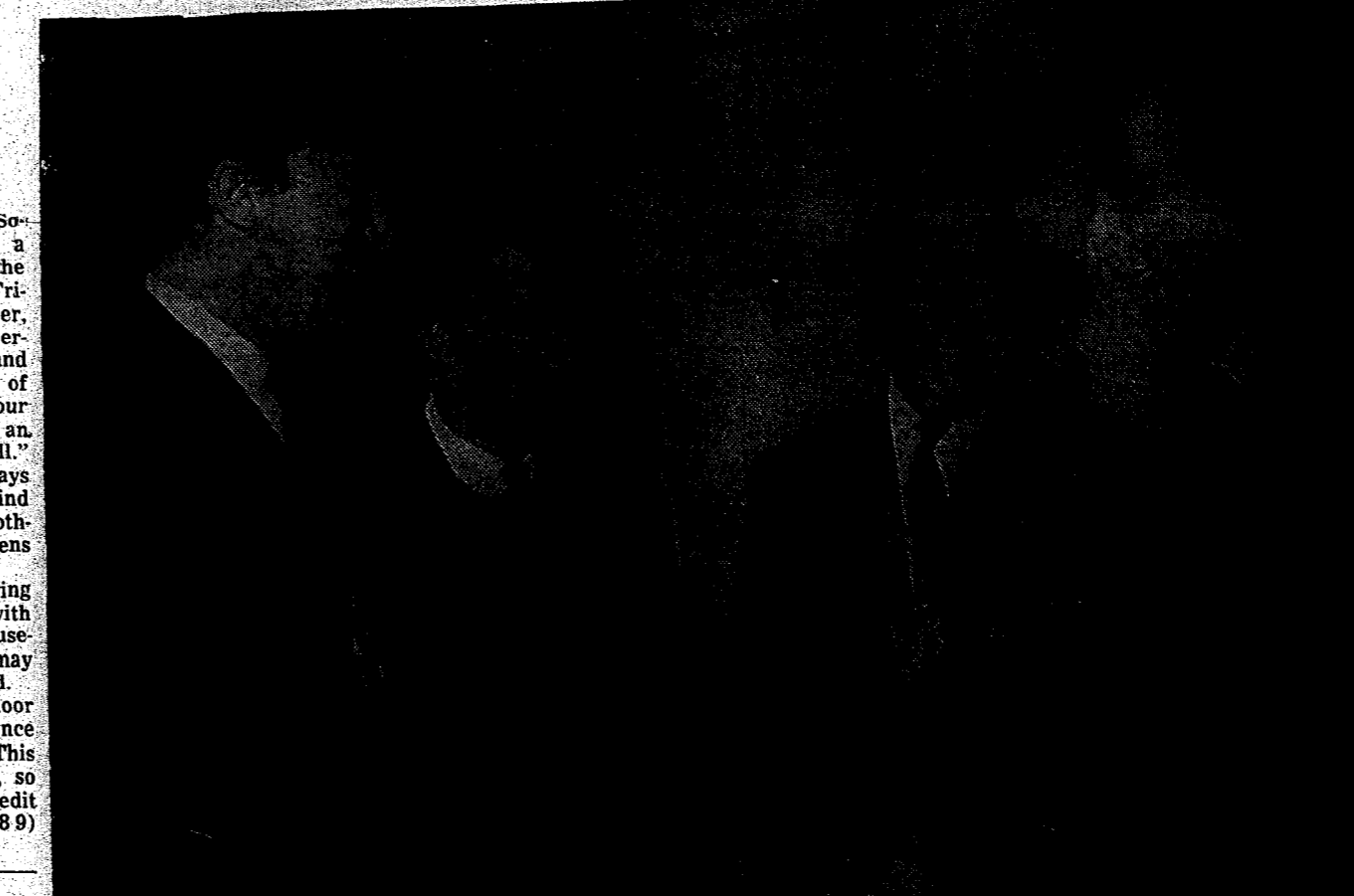

## A WINNING RECIPE BY LOCAL SCOIL NA gCEARD GIRL WHITING ARMERIA

This is the recipe that won for Mary Daly, Voc. School, Dungaivan, Waterford county honours in the 1965 National Fish Cookery competition.

Ingredients: 1 lb. whiting, 2 teasp. anchovy essence; 1 teasp. vinegar; 1 teasp. lemon juice; 1 teasp. mayonnaise; 1 pt. aspic jelly; pepper and salt; 1 pt. cream.

Garnishes: Lettuce, olives, prawns, lemon, eggs and tomatoes stuffed with cheese, pineapple tossed in french dressing, cucumber stuffed with shrimps, chopped chives, parsley.

Method:

- 1—Wipe fish, steam it.
- 2—Melt aspic jelly and leave till almost set, line mould.
- 3—Put mayonnaise, pepper and salt, vinegar, anchovy essence, lemon juice and aspic jelly into mixing bowl.
- 4—Flake fish and add to ingredients.
- 5—When nearly set, add cream, put into mould, leave in fridge to set.
- 6—Stuff tomatoes and eggs with a mixture of mayonnaise.
- 7—Stuff cucumber with shrimps.
- 8—Arrange lettuce on dish, turn out mould and decorate with eggs, pineapple tossed in french dressing, tomatoes, cucumber, olives, prawns, cocktail onions.
- 9—Garnish with parsley and lemon butterfl'es.

This week's statement by the Minister for Finance cannot conceal the fact that both the Agricultural Credit Corporation and the Commercial banks are restricting agricultural credit. We have very definite evidence of a credit squeeze.

We are concerned that in many instances loans other than for land purchase and funding of bank deb'ts have not been sanctioned by the Corporation. We are in correspondence with the Corporation in regard to a number of these cases. In other cases offers of loans which had been sanctioned by the Corporation have apparently been withdrawn.

Many farmers who applied to the Corporation recently for credit for purposes other than land purchase and repayment of bank deb'ts have been written to in the following terms:—

"The Corporation is not at present prepared to consider an application for a loan for this purpose. We suggest that you get in touch with us in about 6 months time in the matter."

### BANKS ALSO RESTRICTING CREDIT

While we appreciate that bank credit to agriculture has increased substantially in recent years, there is concrete evidence that the banks are actively restricting credit to farmers. Farmers are being pressured by Bank Managers to reduce accommodation and unless there is a change of attitude by those bank managers, farmers will be forced to dispose of stock, including breeding stock, which was not intended for sale.

An example of the attitude of the Banks is the following letter issued by a bank manager a few days ago to a small farmer in Co. Cork: "My Head Office has written to me to propose that you should make application to the Agricultural Credit Corporation for an advance sufficient to repay your indebtedness to the Bank. Failing this, they require a definite proposal and undertaking from you as to repayment."

It has been common knowledge for some weeks now that the Agricultural Credit Corporation have not been making loans for repayment of Bank deb'ts.

### ANNUAL REVIEW ASSURANCES

We would again remind the Minister for Finance that during the Annual Review discussions on 31st March last, we received the most explicit assurances from Representatives of the Department of Finance, Agricultural Credit Corporation and the Department of Agriculture that the A.C.C. would be placed in such a position that it would have sufficient funds to meet all present and future demands for credit.

The Minister for Finance will also recollect that during the Second Stage of the Agricultural Credit Bill 1965, which was to make an additional £14 million available to the Corporation, he declared in Dail Eireann: "The Bill which I now present to the House is intended to enable the good work in progress by the Corporation to be continued and expanded" and he shared the "hopes that the Corporation will be able to dispose of or use up this new capital (£1m.) in a short time."

This Agricultural Credit Act 1965 became law on July 6th, 1965, yet within a few days the Department of Finance were imposing restrictions on the A.C.C.

We again call on the Minister for Agriculture to ensure that the credit guarantees given to the N.F.A. by the Government are honoured by the Department of Finance and to see to it that agricultural production is not hampered by credit restrictions.

### N.F.A. CALLS FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF RURAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

The N.F.A. is glad to see that the Government do not accept the view that the establishment of industrial centres in our Northern and North Western counties is "unlikely to be effective."

The population in the counties named is more than 500,000.

Following a Report of the Committee on Development Centres and Industrial Estates, just published, it appears that Waterford and Galway are now to 'take their place with Dublin Cork and Limerick-Shannon-Feris, as development centres. Other centres are to be named, for each Region, when the Regional Surveys now being carried out, are completed.

The Government, however, has not gone far enough in its statement of policy. More is

# N.F.A. NEWS We say there is a Credit Restriction

### RESOLUTION FROM RURAL DEVELOPMENT SECTION

Last week a resolution from the Rural Development Section was passed unanimously by the National Council of the N.F.A. It called for the immediate establishment of a Rural Development Authority.

This Body—possibly under the Chairmanship of An tAoisceach—should devote itself at once, to the drawing-up of a long-term, comprehensive and coordinated programme for the rehabilitation and expansion of the economy in Western type areas. It should be given adequate power to implement this programme and besides being given a special budget to be spent in the above areas (over and above the normal amount coming to them from the National Budget) it should also be empowered to raise monies from outside sources, if necessary.

State and semi-State bodies should be obliged to spend a substantial percentage of their budget in Western-type areas. Such a move would attract private investment and private undertakings to these areas. Development centres should be decided upon for each natural region and adequate incentives given to entrepreneurs to establish themselves there.

Annual development programmes should be drawn up relating to specific projects, sector by sector and district by district.

Initially the Authority would be mostly concerned with improving the agricultural structure—the foundation for lasting success in these areas. A sound infrastructure is essential also. Later it is expected that the emphasis will shift more and more in the direction of industry and improved social services.

### INCREASES IN LAND PROJECT GRANTS TO APPLY FROM APRIL 1st

The President of N.F.A., Mr. Richard Deasy was informed by the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Haughey this week that "the increases in the maximum amount of Land Project grants will now apply to approvals issued from the commencement of the current financial year, i.e., on and after the 1st April, 1965, other than cases on which final payment of grant had been made by the 18th August, 1965."

Following the previous announcement from the Government that the increases would cover only the approvals issued on and after August 18th, N.F.A. protested that this would in effect, be a penalisation of progressive farmers whose applications had been approved prior to August 18th.

The Minister's latest announcement was welcomed with reservations by Mr. John Murphy, Secretary to the N.F.A. Industrial and Transport Committee. "We still have the position," he said, "that farmers who had got approval before April 1st, but were unable to go ahead with their work, through no fault of their own, are excluded from the increases." He cited, as examples, farmers who were unable to get a contractor to do the work or others who were waiting for credit to be made available.

### MAYO COUNTY EXECUTIVE MEETING ON CLOSURE OF THORNBERG'S HATCHERY

A protest meeting against the announced closure of Thornberg's Hatchery in Ballina was held by the Mayo County Executive of N.F.A. in the Town Hall, Ballina, this week.

A telegram from the President of N.F.A., Mr. Richard Deasy was read to the meeting. The text of the telegram was as follows:—

Following a series of discussions with the Minister for Agriculture I am satisfied on the following three points: Minister had no official information of intended closing of Ballina Hatchery; Department has arranged immediate high level meeting with management; Department urgently exploring every possibility of keeping hatchery open at Ballina.

The closing was discussed at the recent meeting of the N.F.A. National Council when a resolution was adopted requesting the President of N.F.A. to seek an early meeting with the Minister for Agriculture on the matter.

### PRICE FOR UNMILLABLE WHEAT

Following widespread reports that only a 3/- per barrel increase was to be paid for feed wheat this year the President of N.F.A. and the Chairman of the Grain Committee of N.F.A. met the Minister for Agriculture to clarify the position.

They pointed out that unmillable wheat was just as nutritious as feeding barley and should be paid for on the same level. The Minister accepted the N.F.A. arguments and N.F.A. has now been notified by the Department of Agriculture that "the Minister has arranged with An Bord Grain that a price of £27.70 per ton, for feed wheat of this year's crop, dried to 15% moisture content, offered to the Board on December 31st, 1965, will be guaranteed." The letter from the Department adds that this price is the same as that guaranteed by An Bord Grain for feeding barley purchased on the same terms.

This means that the farmer should receive for feed wheat a price of 56/3d. per barrel at 20% moisture content if correctly related to the dried price which the Grain Board guaranteed on the 31st December, '65.

The Department also announced this week the falling number limits for segregation of wheat of the 1965 crop. Wheat will be segregated into three categories: millable, potentially millable and unmillable. The falling number limits decided upon are as follows: Millable, over 160; Potentially Millable, 120-160; Unmillable, less than 120.

The Department statement also says: "In order to ensure that the falling number test is carried out in a uniform manner the Minister has also arranged, with the co-operation of the Irish Flour Millers' Association, that technical officers of his Department will carry out a system of inspection at each intake point. Growers should note that it will be open to them to appeal against a decision which classifies wheat as unmillable on the basis of its falling number value. Such cases the Department Officer at the intake point concerned will decide appeal cases of intake points as far as possible. Where appeals in respect of rejection on falling number grounds cannot be decided at intake points, they will be submitted to the Central Wheat Laboratory for decision."

Where wheat is classified as unmillable for sprouting damage and/or other reasons, it will be open to the growers to appeal against the decision to the Central Wheat Laboratory in the same manner as applied last year.

A spokesman for the N.F.A. Grain Committee said that while N.F.A. would have been happier with a lower level of limits, nevertheless, the scale fixed was closely in line with the recommendations of Dr. Olorod, and not as severe as those which operated in the past.

### PIGS COMMITTEE CONCERNED

While the new developments are due in large measure to the hard work of the N.F.A. Grain Committee, another N.F.A. Committee—the Pigs Committee—is also vitally concerned. "There is a duty on the Government now to look after the interests of the pig producers. Many of them are going out of the business because of the constantly rising cost of feeding brokers."

### N.F.A. CALL FOR FERTILISER PRICE INQUIRY

N.F.A. renews its demand for a full-scale inquiry under the Prices Acts into the cost of manufacturing and compounding fertilisers. This should be done through a Prices Advisory Committee with N.F.A. representation on it.

In the 1965 Annual Review, N.F.A. exposed the very high charges for compounding and granulating fertilisers. We showed that the wholesale price of compounds was anything from 25% to 45% above the known value of the ingredients. Some examples were £3.48d. per ton on granular 4.7.14 and £4.14d. per ton on granular 8.6.16.

This is a clear demonstration of the effect of monopoly in the fertiliser industry in this country. An inquiry on the lines proposed by N.F.A. should lead to a worthwhile saving in farmers' fertiliser costs. The plans announced by Nitrogen Eireann Teo. for the production of complete concentrated fertilisers (CCF) should ensure that they will not be subject to any similar profiteering when they come on the market.

Competition is a vital requirement in any trade from the consumer's point of view. Nowhere is this more clearly demonstrated than in the fertilisers industry, where the lack of competition has left farmers in a very vulnerable position.

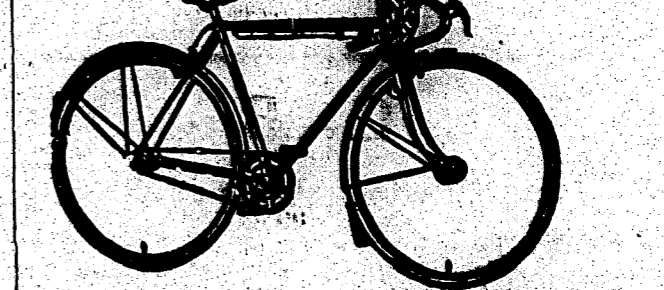

### Protection Against 'Flu this Winter

Many industrial concerns are now beginning to appreciate the value of protecting their workers against influenza during the winter months. It has been estimated that on average about one half-day per person is lost annually due to influenza.

Where widespread vaccination is undertaken, immunity can be conferred to give protection in the order of about 70 per cent.

A single injection of a vaccine, given in late October or early November, will provide useful protection during the period of greatest risk.

Routine annual immunisation against influenza is recommended for people at special risk, such as those with chronic disease of the heart, lungs or kidneys.

Protection against influenza is also particularly valuable for hospital staffs and other workers in key occupations.

In view of an influenza vaccine made available by Glaxo Laboratories (Ireland) Ltd., is supplied in a disposable syringe unit which requires no assembling or filling.

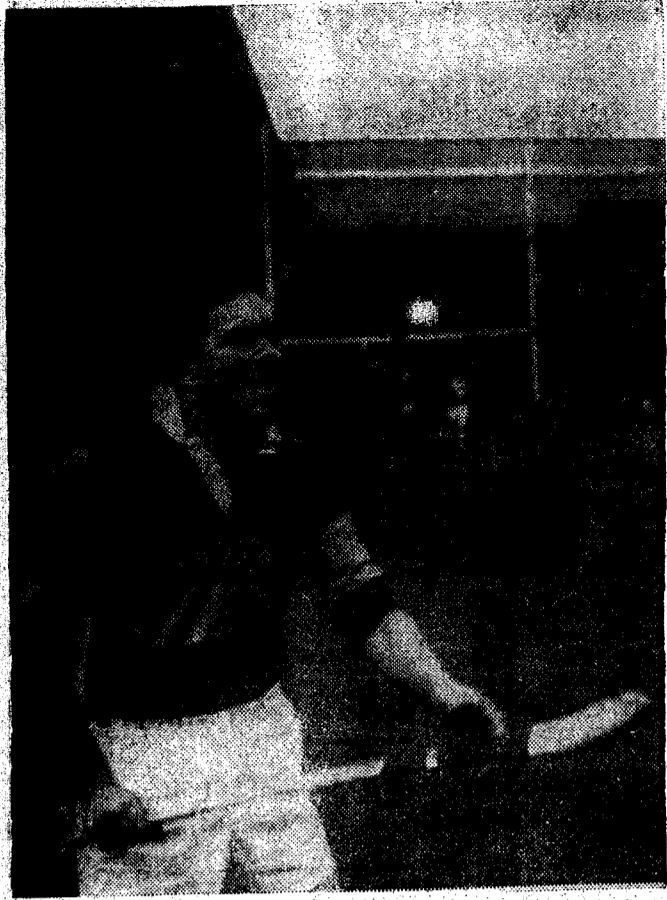

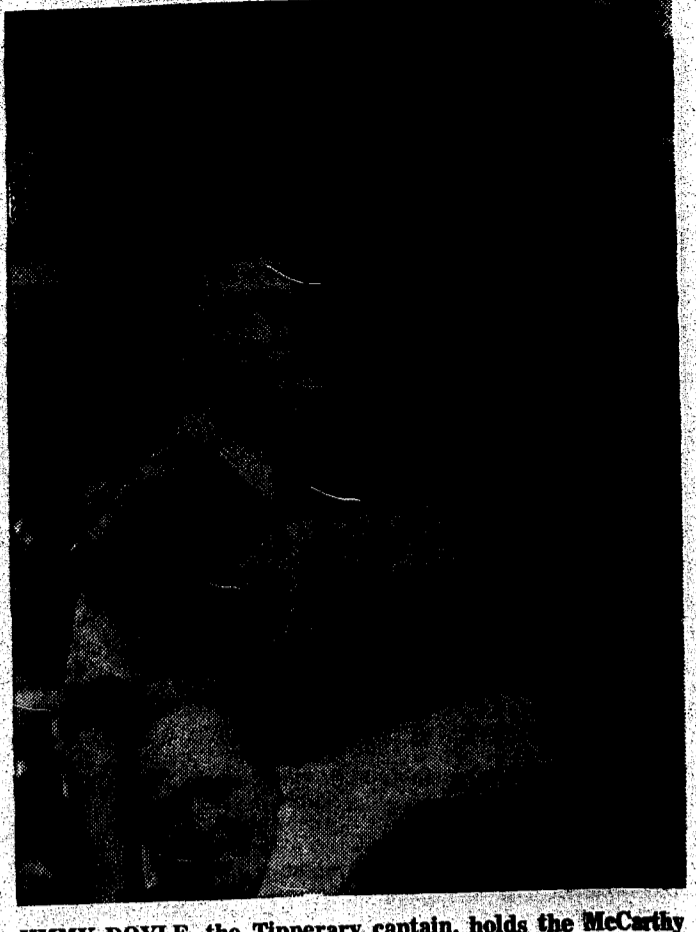

FOR the second time in three years, Limerick minors' bid for All-Ireland honours was dashed when the Munster champions, failed to a rather strong Dublin XV. This was a sweet victory for the Dubliners, as it was their first title in this grade for seven years.

Limerick never struck anything like the form that saw them sweep through Munster, beating Waterford, Cork and Tipperary in the process. Their forwards, however, were a big disappointment on Sunday, and one found it hard to believe that they had amassed the huge total of 30 goals coming through Munster. Yet they had to wait until two minutes before half-time on Sunday before raising a green flag.

This, added to their two points scored earlier, left them trailing at the interval by seven points. But their followers must bemoan those missed chances early in the second half. The first came in the third minute when, with the sides level at a point apiece, full-forward Murnane received from Grimes after a great passing movement, but he slipped in the square.

and his intended hand-pass to the net went inches wide. Almost immediately afterwards Dublin goalie Cunningham was jucky to push away a Shanahan effort at the expense of a "70," which, however, proved fruitless. They had many more misses during the half, particularly in the 10th minute when missing from a 21 yards free and again in the 25th minute when Grimes' effort from a similar distance was blocked down. In between however, the winners forward line game the Limerick defence a real roasting. They were helped to a great extent by midfielder Harry Dalton, who whipped over two good points in the 5th minute.

It was all Dublin at this stage and in the seventh minute their efforts were rewarded when corner-forward, McCann latched on to a partial clearance by the Limerick keeper, and smacked the ball home to the net. Ten minutes of scoreless play followed before Hayes had his side's second point from a difficult angle on the sideline. Dublin broke away from the puck-out, however, and some clever play by McCann saw him coolly beat three defenders before

lobbing the ball in, and which was promptly crashed to the net by full-forward Whelan. Kinsella and McCann added further points to Dublin's tally before Limerick had their only goal of the first half in the 28th minute. This was a really good effort, with John O'Hehir cutting off a dangerous Dublin raid and hand-passing to midfielder Doherty, who passed to Grimes and his beautiful through-pass was whipped to the net by corner forward Grace.

On resumption of play in the second half it looked as if Limerick were really going to make Dublin fight all the way, and when Grimes had cut their lead to five points after two minutes, it seemed the sage was set for a thrilling finish. But in the sixth minute Dublin again broke through for another goal, scored by Fetherson.

Limerick again came back to score another goal, but gradually the Dublin men were taking over and added another goal and four points, and Limerick could manage only two more points.

Dublin's clever forward line undoubtedly were their biggest asset, and had brilliant displays

from Kinsella, McCann and Harry Dalton excelled at midfielder in this sector. Fetherson in defence Tony Fletch, Leslie Deegan and Colum Brennan were the pick. Grimes' best was undoubtedly Eamonn McCann. Also impressed were Nick Hayes, Tom Power, M. Hennessy.
