Tenant Must Leave Within 14 Days

Dungarvan Urban Council prosecuted Michael Hennessey, Youghal Road, Dungarvan, at the local District Court, on Wednesday, under the Local Government Sanitary Services Act. Judge Skinner made an order whereby the defendant must vacate the house in which he resides within 14 days, because of its dangerous condition, and the danger to adjoining householders. The Justice however, refused the Urban Council costs of the action because the "defendant was in trouble enough."

Mr. A. R. Farrell, So.r. for the Urban Council, said these proceedings were in respect of a house occupied by the defendant. It was in a dangerous condition, was a danger to the occupant and people living in adjoining houses, as well as anyone that might pass by. The Council was seeking an order to get the man in possession out. The house was not owned by the Council, but by a Mrs. O'Donnell, Youghal Rd.

Mr. P. Walsh, Borough Engineer, said he inspected the house from the outside. At least 75% of the back section of the roof of the house and the one immediately adjoining Congress Villas. Annually, the

Urban Council offered applications for housing and the defendant applied in 1961 and '62. He did not apply, however in '63, '64, or '65.

In 1961 three names were received for a one roomed house and the defendant refused it. The defendant was a single man and was on the priority housing list by virtue of the fact that he was residing in an unfit house.

Mr. B. White, Rate Collector, said he personally served notice to quit on 15th Sept.

Judge Skinner said he would have to make the order. Addressing the defendant: "You are now at the mercy of the Council with regard to the giving of a house, but I am sure they will give you one as soon as possible."

He then made an order compelling the defendant to vacate the house within a 28 day period.

Mr. Walsh, B.E., said he did not consider the house safe and it was a great danger to the adjoining householders.

Judge Skinner: You are in grave danger living there, Mr. Hennessey.

The defendant said that whilst he lived there the roof had not slipped out of position. Judge Skinner said in view of what had been stated in evidence, he would make the order 14 days. He would not allow the Council costs, however, because the defendant was in enough trouble as it was.

REFERENCE TO CONDITION OF

ARDMORE RUINS

At a meeting of the County Waterford National Monuments Advisory Committee on Wednesday of last week, reference was made to the condition of the ruins under the care of the Board of Works at Ardmore.

Before the meeting was a letter from Mrs. Siobhan Lincoln, a member of the Ardmore Tidy Towns Committee, referring to the ruins under the care of the Board of Works. Mrs. Lincoln said that she wrote to the Board about their deplorable condition but nothing had been done about it. She also made reference to the dangerous condition of the arch in the Cathedral and to the missing slates in the Beannachain. These were in a dangerous condition, said Mrs. Lincoln and would have to be repaired.

The Chairman, Mr. Nicholas Whittle, said that Ardmore was omitted by the Board of Works from their national list and in view of the fact that Ardmore was one of the most historic places in the country and was more authenticated than some of the places listed, having a Rund Tower, Cathedral, etc. he regretted their omission.

It was finally decided unanimously to instruct the Secretary, Mr. Christy Condon to write to the Board of Works regarding Ardmore's omission and so send them a copy of Mrs. Lincoln's letter. They also decided to ask the Board to carry out the requested repairs as soon as possible.

Mr. M. Brennan suggested that they also write to the Ardmore Tidy Towns Committee asking them to give this matter prominence by having it mentioned in the local papers.

Mr. M. Creagh said that Ardmore deserved a certain priority owing to its historical background.

The discussion then ended.

UNEXPECTED PASSING OF GREAT KILROSSANTY FOOTBALLER

Late John "Maheer" Moroney 871A Fulham Rd., London last half mile to the Church the remains were carried shoulder high by members of the Kilrossanty and John Mitchels Clubs. Appropriately the coffin was draped in the Kilrossanty colours. The remains were received and blessed by Very Rev. Fr. O'Donovan, P.P. in the presence of a very large and representative gathering. The burial took place in the adjoining cemetery on this Thursday morning following.

Another of Kilrossanty's most illustrious sons has passed to his eternal reward. He is John Moroney, but known to all Kilrossanty as "Maheer" Moroney, who answered the great call in London, on Thursday of last week, 21st inst.

The deceased was only in his late fifties, and his death, which occurred unexpectedly whilst on his way to work, came with tragic suddenness. For over twenty years he had been domiciled in London, but at all times he remained a Kilrossanty man through and through.

Not in a day's walk could one expect to find a more unassuming and likeable individual than "Maheer" Moroney. And in keeping with the football heritage of his native parish, he was an outstanding exponent of the football code in his playing days. Midfield was perhaps his best position, and he starred on the Kilrossanty team that brought county junior honours to the parish in 1937. Two years later he was at full forward when Kilrossanty captured the senior title.

Since boyhood he had been nick-named "Maheer" Moroney, a name that will surely attain ever-lasting remembrance in the Comeragh country, which he himself loved so well.

To his bereaved wife, son, daughters and other relatives we offer our deepest sympathy in their hour of sorrow.

The remains were flown in to Cork Airport on Wednesday 1st, 27th and the funeral took place from there to Kilrossanty Parish Church. For the

Requiem Masses, again in the presence of another large concourse.

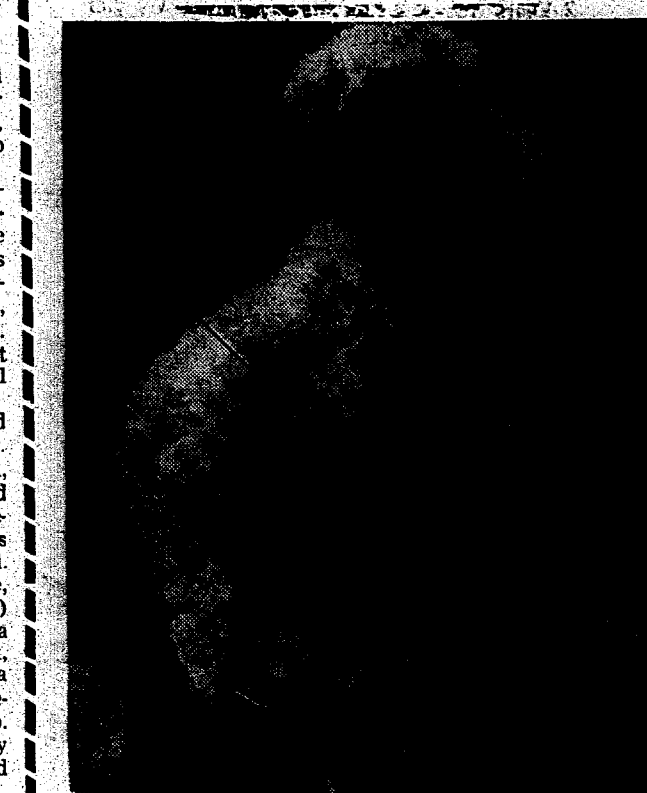

CREDIT UNION NEW

The interest payable on loans is not fully understood. Many people are of the opinion that, because the interest is described as 1% per month, that this is equivalent to 12% per annum. It must be remembered, however, that the 1% per month is charged only on the outstanding balance of the loan each week.

For example—one a loan of £10, repayable at £1 per week, over ten weeks, the interest payable at the end of the first week is 6d. (1% per month on £10, i.e. 2/- per month, or 6d. per week); at the end of the second week the interest is payable on £9 and amounts to 5d.; at the end of the third week the interest is payable on £8 and amounts to 4d. and so on until the end of the tenth week. The interest is payable on £1 and amounts to 1d. The total interest paid on the above loan would be 2/7.

A few further examples may be a help to prospective members.

A loan of £25 paid back at 10/- per week over a period of 50 weeks—total interest would be £1-10-2.

A loan of £100 paid back at per week; at the end of the 50 weeks—total interest would be £5-18-4.

It must not be forgotten that dependants, in case of the death of the member, will not be held responsible for either the loan balance or the interest which the member would have paid had he lived. Neither should it be forgotten that the savings of a member will normally earn a dividend which will go a long way in offsetting the loan interest.

U.D.C. 'FEELS THE PINCH'

Following on the difficulties which Waterford County Council experienced because of the present "credit squeeze," Dungarvan Urban Council is now beginning "to feel the pinch".

DROGHEDA DEMONSTRATION

It is now estimated that over 20,000 farmers from counties Meath, Louth, Cavan, Monaghan, Dublin, Westmeath, Donegal and Longford will parade through the streets of Drogheda on Friday, 5th November next to protest principally against falling farm incomes and high rates. Plans for the demonstration, which is being organised by the N.F.A., are almost finalised. The demonstration, which will also be attended by groups of farmers from counties in Connacht and Munster is the second in a series of mass demonstrations organised by the N.F.A.

The first was held in Castlebar on Saturday last when the assembled farmers were led by the President of the N.F.A., Mr. R. Deasy. "We are here today because we are fed-up with years upon years of neglect of our industry." The demonstrations are intended to highlight the disparity between agricultural and industrial incomes; falling farm incomes; increased production costs; rates and Government indifference towards the country's basic industry.

In conjunction with the demonstration, farmers throughout the country are adopting a "go slow" attitude on the payment of the second moiety of the rates.

Early estimates of the numbers which will be attending the Drogheda demonstration are as follows: 5,000 each from counties Meath, Louth and Monaghan; 3,500 from Cavan; 1,000 from Donegal and large contingents from counties Longford, Westmeath and Dublin.

The farmers will assemble on the North side of Drogheda and march through the town carrying banners and placards to the junction of the Duleek Road with the Dublin road, where they will be addressed by leading members of the Association.

It is intended that this demonstration will be an orderly and dignified protest against Government indifference towards agriculture; a N.F.A. spokesman said this week. Each county will have its corps of marshals to deal with its own members with the chief marshal coming from Co. Louth. It is also intended that either "walkie-talkie" apparatus or motor cycles may be used by

the marshals to control the crowds.

THE 64 CREAMERIES WHICH EXPRESSED SUPPORT FOR MR. MAHER. A recent statement from the I.C.M.S.A. stated quite baldly that: "The Council (I.C.M.S.A. Council) is aware that considerably more than 64 committees decided to vote for the N.F.A. candidate."

The election resulted in the defeat of the N.F.A. candidate, Mr. T. J. This was sufficient to give Mr. Maher victory in the election as the total number entitled to vote was 126.

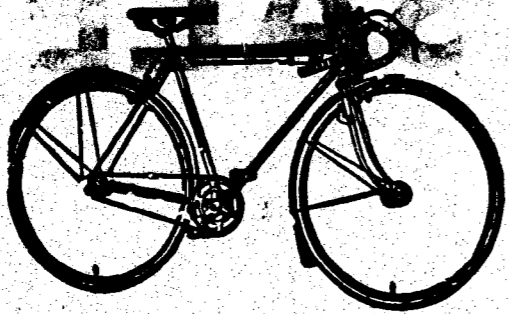
No doubt the honours of this win must go to the Abbeyside defence who held out heroically during that intense first half pressure.

C.I.E. BUS DISAPPEARED OVER NIGHT

At Youghal District Court, before Mr. Justice L. Skinner, Gerald Forde of 9 Mt. Eden Rd. Novel Senior Hurling Final

MOUNT SION MAY RETAIN TITLE

TRAMORE commands the hurling spotlight on Sunday next, when the county senior hurling championship final will be staged at the seaside venue. This year there is a unique pairing, as the youthful Ballygunner attempt to wrest the coveted crown from the oft times champions, Mount Sion. This will be the Gunners first ever appearance in the senior decider and public support will undoubtedly be solidly behind them in their bid to make hurling history. But for all that, Mount Sion remain favourites to retain a title they won somewhat luckily at Abbeyside's expense just twelve months ago.

Since gaining senior status by virtue of their defeat of Lismore in the junior final of 1957, the Gunners have progressed slowly but favourably since. Yet they have never quite made it to the top, and when they failed again last year many doubted their ability to ever really crash through to highest honours.

But now all connected with the club are satisfied that their hour of supreme achievement is at hand. They will be as fit as the proverbial fiddle and outsiders though they may be, there is no lack of confidence in their camp.

And what exactly is the Mount Sion reaction to this latest challenge to their title of Deise kingpins? I spoke to Seamus Power on Monday night; he thought very highly of the Ballygunner challenge, and assured me they would be

going to the farmers themselves. There were no "hand-outs" about this project. All the farmer received for his support was the payment to him of the market value of his reactor. At no time was the payment of compensation for the inconvenience caused to him or for other consequential losses, taken into account. Yet there was almost 100% voluntary support from the farmers from the beginning and in fact so enthusiastic were they that despite the mass slaughterings during this period the national herd still continued to grow. As one leading authority put it this week: "The farmers deserve the highest tribute for their efforts during the period of the campaign as their enthusiasm meant that there was no upset to the economy."

He added: "The number of non-cooperative farmers was completely insignificant as is evident from the speed and manner in which this disease was eradicated from the country."

From the very outset, when a deputation went to the Department of Agriculture offering the full assistance and co-operation of the Association, N.F.A. was totally committed to the furtherance of the campaign. Indeed the Association offered many suggestions to the Department which were later adopted. There is also no secret about the major role played by the co-operative livestock marts in the success of the programme. N.F.A. was responsible for the setting-up of these marts, where the rules governing the segregation of tested and untested cattle were always strictly adhered to.

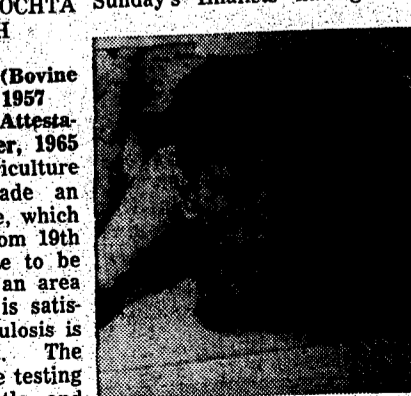

TIPP. ON TOP IN FINAL QUARTER

TIPPERARY 5-9; WATERFORD 2-7

THE victory march of hurling champions, Tipperary, continues unabated. But for almost fifty minutes at a crowded Fraher Field, Dungarvan, on Sunday last they were matched stroke for stroke by a Waterford team displaying determination and at times no little skill. Then, however, the probing onslaughts of the champions revealed chinks in the Deise defensive armour and a gallant try at upsetting the odds was doomed to failure. With grinding efficiency Tipp. piled up the scores that gave them their decisive victory, albeit one must not hesitate to add an eleven point winning margin greatly flattered them.

This believe you me was a game not easily won. And if this fully merited win sets Tipp. off on the winning trail that they hope will culminate in the retention of their league pennant, they may not have to play as hard again for any other brace of valuable points. True I felt at all times that they had the winning of this game, but to have gone under by so great a margin did less than justice to the encouragingly and spirited display of the homesters.

The drawing power that is reflected in the huge crowd that turned up for this visit of the triple champions. The day, though cold, was dry and ideally suited for fast open hurling. And that exactly is what these two sides served up. Not too surprisingly there were late alterations on both sides, which led to some positional switches also.

In fact Waterford's pre-game plight was a serious one. They had no more than seventeen players at their disposal, and Frankie Corcoran of Shamrocks who had played in the football tie which preceded the big game was added at the last minute to the panel to make up the third sub. Tommy Hearne and Larry Guinan both cried off—the latter due to tragic circumstances, and to meet the emergency the selectors nominated a completely new midfield, Willie and Tom "Doc" Walsh.

Tipp also had to find replacements for absent stars. An arm injury kept Mick Burns off the original team and John Doyle, Mick Maher, Mick Roche and Liam Devaney were other absentees.

But though defeat was their lot, Waterford showed that perhaps the end of the hurling road is not in sight after all. It looked that way following their league defeat at the hands of Kilkenny, yet few would have watched Tipp as Waterford did on Sunday. There are weaknesses it is true, and this defeat ends their league hopes to all intents and purposes. But let it be remembered that such key men as Frankie Walsh, Larry Guinan and John Kirwan were all absentees—all possible attackers and the inclusion of this trio would undoubtedly bolster up the one sector that was really found wanting. Though league hopes have now vanished their next outings will be watched with avid interest.

TOOK CONTROL

Then however, inexorably, Tipp. assumed complete control. The precision accuracy of Jimmy Doyle brought him four points off the reel and when McLoughlin followed with a goal, it was as good as over.

There can be no gainsaying the fact that this is a truly powerful Tipperary combination. They are sweeping all before them in a tidal wave of success and deep down even Deise followers will admit that this result had an air of inevitability about it.

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VITAL DIFFERENCE

—and vital difference was the potency of the respective attacks. Whereas Waterford with the exception of a brilliant Tom Cheasty and to a lesser extent Mick Murphy laboured in vain up front, Tipp. had the marksmen supremacy at their call all through the hour. True the resolute guard kept the tally low for quite a time, but when eventually they found the answer, Jimmy Doyle, Sean McLoughlin and their able assistants literally ran riot.

account with a 5th minute Walsh never hit it off, however and made no impression when look was gloomy.

Then came a golden era of Deise supremacy. Inspired by the ebullient Cheasty they had Tipp. playing second fiddle and it was the Ballyduff man who reduced their deficit with a point at the end of the opening quarter. He again obliged minutes later from a free and in the 18th minute spread-eagled the Tipp. defence bringing the best out of goalkeeper John O'Donoghue, whose partial save however, saw Mick Murphy on hand to crack the ball to the net. An exchange of points followed between Jimmy Doyle and Cheasty, but again Waterford hit back for further minors by Murphy and Peter McGovern direct from a '70. But with seconds of the half remaining Tipp. cut their deficit to the minimum when Donie Nealon's pass was grabbed by Jimmy Doyle and almost in the same lightning instant had it nestling in the net.

A point lead in all the circumstances looked inadequate, and heroic though their resistance was, Waterford found this to be so. Two minutes after the restart McLoughlin had his second goal—a beautiful overhead flick from another of those accurate Nealon centres. And when McKenna added a point the Deise out

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moved to centre-forward. But once again the Deise attack was plagued with an abundance of shortcomings. Tom Cheasty was the shining star, and not since the paining days of '59 has he wreaked such devastation on any opponent. He scored four points himself, and both goals were the culmination of his own work. Yes, this game belonged in the main to Cheasty.

Next in the honours list came Mick Murphy, who had a really satisfying game, but this pair apart, the sector was without thrust. Martin Morrissey never evaded the attentions of Carey, nor did John O'Brien or Frankie Whelan make any headway. Peter McGovern too, found Tony Wall a superior rival, but fared well when teaming up with Willie Walsh at midfield.

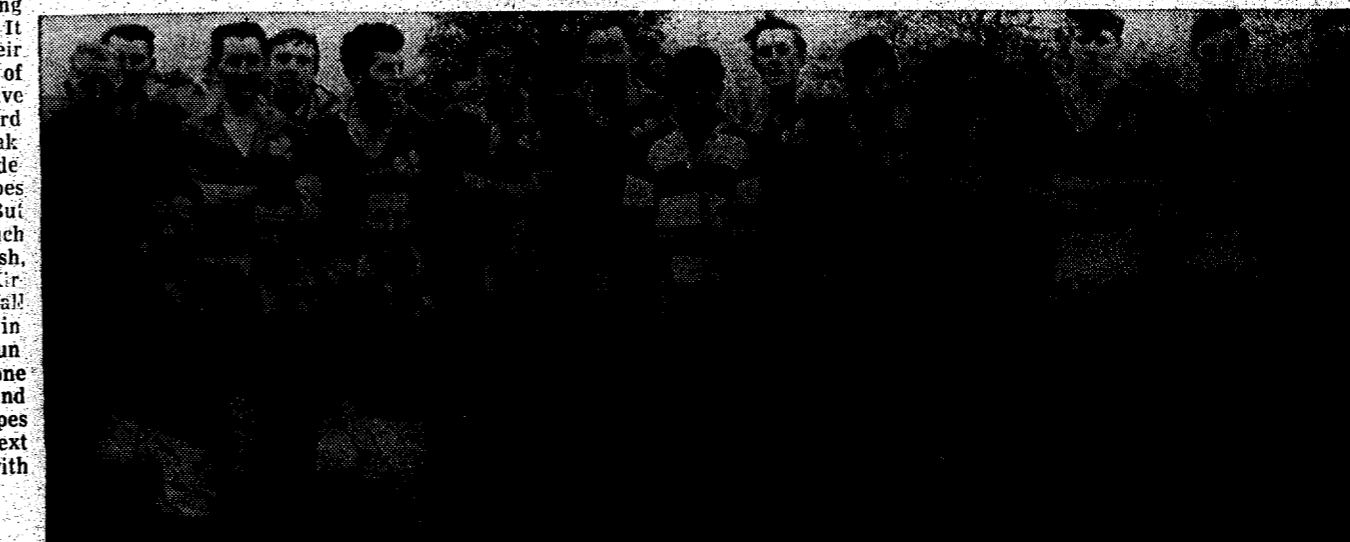

PURSUANT to the powers conferred on the Urban District Council of Dungarvan, being the Sanitary Authority for the Urban District of Dungarvan (hereafter referred to as the "Sanitary Authority") by virtue of Section 31 of the Local Government (Sanitary Services) Act, 1948, the Sanitary Authority being of opinion that the erection or retention of temporary dwellings in the areas referred to in the Schedule to this Order would be prejudicial to the amenities of the locality HEREBY ORDERS:— That the erection or retention of tents, vans or other conveyances (whether on wheels or not) or sheds, huts or other structures whatsoever of a temporary nature within forty (40) feet of the centre line of the portion of the roads within the Urban District of Dungarvan set out in the schedule hereto is hereby prohibited.
