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## Council's Financial Position

**£60,000 WORSE  
OFF**

Once again the seriousness of Waterford County Council's financial position was referred to at last Monday's meeting of the Council. The position of the roadworkers was also referred to and Mr. J. D. Hally, County Engineer, said that one of three alternatives would be to let

### "DON'T SELL OUR QUARRIES"

Speaking at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan, Mr. Thomas Lannon said he saw no reason why they should sell any quarries throughout the county. He said: "are we going to sell our quarries to people who can then charge us what they like for the stuff they will produce. I think it is a very bad policy to sell our quarries."

Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D., said he was in complete agreement with Mr. Lannon. It was madness to dispose of their quarries. Mr. Lannon then proposed that they sell none of their quarries. Mr. Kyne seconded. Mr. M. Harty said they should adjourn a decision until they considered the report of the Co. Engineer on this. Mr. Lannon said if they sold out their stock, the men that would purchase them would charge them well for the stuff in return. He would advise them to keep their independence. Inside twelve months they would pay ten times what they should for stone. Mr. Madden then proposed that they adjourn a decision until they considered the report of the Co. Engineer and this was passed by 10 votes to 5.

them go. But the Chairman, Mr. Charles Curran gave an assurance that there would be no redundancy amongst the road working staff.

Mr. F. J. O'Leary (Co. Accountant) said they were £60,000 worse off this year than at the same time last year. Their present overdraft was £118,652 as against £58,632, last year. They had not yet got all the capital monies that was owned to them. Since the last meeting they had received £60,000 from the State, but there was still another £58,000 due to them.

Mr. Norman Walsh said the cause of their grave financial trouble was that there was a long delay in getting the loans from the Departments.

Mr. Michael Harty said they should bring pressure to bear on the Dept. to give them the money that was due to them.

Mr. Curran said that was being done. All counties were doing the same without result.

Mr. O'Leary said they made application for the £60,000 in March and only received it recently. They were still awaiting the £58,000 which they had also made application for. The Dept. told them they would have to take their place in the queue.

Mr. Thomas Lannon said that what was wrong in this country was that colossal increases were being given to highly paid men. Soon there would only be officials and very old people left in this country. Status claims had capped this country, he added, and now they would have to pay big interest to the Banks for their overdraft. It must be gold mines they think that in the country, and it was about time someone came along and took back these big increases and make those people work

for the big salaries they were earning. "The County Council have this country broke," he concluded.

Mr. Curran said the Waterford County Council was the one county council in Ireland that did not give these wholesale big increases. They rejected them, but they were given over their heads.

Mr. Norman Walsh said that if all other County Councils followed their example the country would be in a better financial to-day.

Mr. Hally said he had now transferred workers to other work as far as possible, but he would be out of cash by the end of this month. There were then three things that he could do: (1) let the workers go; (2) carry on an overdraft, by approving of excess expenditure; (3) or they could agree that if they did not get sanction of the necessary money by the end of the month they could continue in anticipation of getting it.

Mr. Lannon asked when would they get a loan for cottage repairs.

Mr. Curran said they would not get any. They had already

been refused it by the Bank, but they might get a loan for cottage erection.

Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D., said it would be terrible if men were let go.

Mr. Curran: That will not happen. I propose that if the sanction for the money is not forthcoming from the Government by the end of the month for cottage erection, that the men be transferred to cottage construction by direct labour, in anticipation of we getting the loan.

Mr. J. Fahey, T.D. seconded. It was unanimously agreed to.

Mr. Kieran O'Ryan said that if men would have to be let go why not let some of the Engineers go.

Mr. Curran said there would be no men let go. They were being let go in other counties but not in Waterford. They were, in fact, the only county in Ireland that were not letting men go because of the financial crisis.

Deputy Kyne then proposed that the overdraft be agreed to and this was agreed to with Mr. Lannon dissenting.

### CLASHMORE DEPUTATION BEFORE COUNCIL MEETING

A seven man deputation, headed by Mr. Jim Foley, appeared before last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council complaining at what they termed the scandalous condition of the road from Ballycurrane to Cladagh, Clashmore.

The roads in the Clashmore area, he said, could be called nothing but river beds. Shovels of gravel were being put into the holes in the road and when the rains came the gravel was washed away. No one came to see their roads and was it, he asked, because they were afraid to the parents in the district were advising their children to go to school through the fields and the makeshift job which should have been done in July was left until the last week in October.

Mr. Foley continued: "Was there any Engineer along to see this job that was done? It was a disgrace and an insult to the

ratepayers. I do not know why we are being treated like this, and what conditions must roads go into before anything will be done to them. There are six car owners in this area I am referring to and in another area nearby where there was only one car owner work was done to the road there.

Mr. Foley went on to say that over in Grange a few years ago the road was tarmacaded and it was tarred again recently. If Engineers came out to see this road he was referring to, they would take briars back with them in the bumpers of their cars. The road in Grange was a monumental work catering for the tourists. But tourists were like birds of passage, here to-day and gone to-morrow. Was there any consideration given to those that remained at home. They were all good ratepayers and he did not see why they should be neglected to such an extent. A man in their area who collected milk was threatening to give up the job because of the burden it was on tyres it would not pay him. He would ask an Engineer to come and see the road when the rains came. Something should be done for them, quickly.

Mr. J. D. Hally (Co. Engineer) said the road was one of the important ones left to be done. It was now included in the next five year plan and would be one of high priority in that plan. He would try to keep it as best he could until a proper job could be done on it. The other road referred to by the member of the deputation was included in the last five year plan and that was the reason the work was done on it.

The members of the deputation then withdrew, Mr. Foley thanking the Council for hearing their views.

The Justice then adjourned the case for six months to see how the defendant would behave.

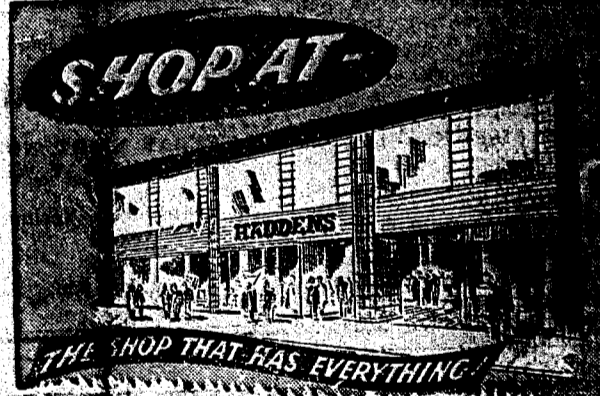

Bonus on Sales of Turkey Poults by Licensed Hatcheries The Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries announces that the scheme of bonus payments on sales of turkey poults by hatcheries will be continued in operation in 1966, on the same basis as in 1965.

The scheme was introduced in January, 1965, and provides for payment of a bonus of 1/6d. per poult to licensed hatcheries on sales of poults to rearers, on condition that the poults are sold to the rearers at an inclusive delivered price not exceeding 4/- per poult. The scheme applies only to sales of poults for fattening at the purchaser's premises, i.e., it will not apply to sales by the hatcheries of poults exported or sales of poults for breeding.

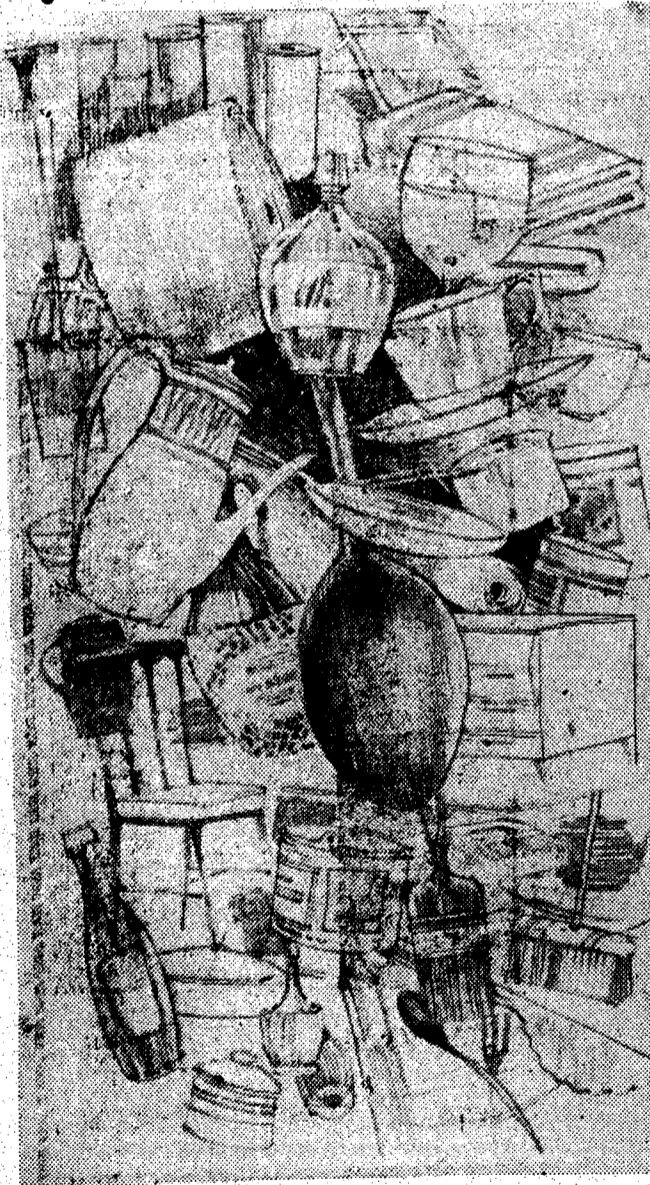

**News of N.F.A. in the County**

It may not be generally known to farmers that the Waterford County Executive meets at least once a month in Dungarvan, when delegates from the 28 branches in the county meet to consider matters of local importance and N.F.A. national policy.

Mr. T. V. Llewellyn, Secretary of the Rural Development Section, attended a recent meeting held the night before the N.F.A.'s National Scheme for Small Farms was presented to a press conference in Dublin and as a result of which it has received wide spread publicity.

Mr. Llewellyn outlined the Scheme with special emphasis on the small farm problem in County Waterford, where, he said, one third of the farms are under 50 acres (the national figure is two-thirds) and a further one third between 50 and 100 acres. We also pointed out that of the approximately 3,500 farmers in the county, one third are bachelors and that 14% were over 50 years of age and also bachelors. He suggested that there is not only an economic problem, but also a social one.

At the same meeting a resolution from Coolnasmear Branch asked for N.F.A. support in helping individuals and groups to obtain water supplies. Delegates said that it had always been N.F.A. policy to support the economic type of rural water supplies and to oppose uneconomic extravagant ones. It was unanimously agreed that the Executive should provide all possible help in this matter and should, in co-operation with the County Engineer, make available all the necessary information to enable farmers and householders to obtain piped water.

A further resolution drew attention to the danger to livestock of rabbit 'dazzling' and asked that steps should be taken to control this menace. As a result the gardai have promised every assistance and have requested the co-operation of farmers in notifying them of this type of illegal trespassing.

Reference was again made to the loss and damage caused to sheep owners by dogs and for the need of a greater control of dogs, particularly at night. It was reported that in the Coolnasmear area 100 sheep have been killed by dogs during the past year, while on one farm near Waterford City 43 sheep were killed and 60 muled. The N.F.A. Sheep Committee are again to make recommendations to the Government.

A special meeting was called in Waterford to consider the county's part in the national campaign to draw the Government's attention to falling farm incomes and rising farm costs. It was expected that a Waterford contingent would travel to Carlow on 12th November. The county was also represented at the Castlebar demonstration last month.

**SOME FURTHER QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**

Q.—Does asking for a loan from the Credit Union imply that the applicant is in very poor circumstances?

A.—Not at all. On the contrary, it means that the applicant is in a sound financial position; that he has been managing his finances wisely and that he now wishes to enjoy the fruits of his wise action. Such a man can ask for a loan with dignity because all he is doing is borrowing his own money (plus a little extra, perhaps). He can smile at the man who never bothered to save and has no place to turn to when he needs ready cash.

Q.—Can you give an example of how the Credit Union Loan can help?

A.—John is a member who has saved £30. He wishes to buy an item advertised at £50. He finds that for cash he can get it for £45. He gets a £5 loan from the Credit Union, pays the shop with this and takes home the item. He pays back the loan at 10% per week over 90 weeks. The total interest paid on this loan works out at £4-15-8, which means he pays a total of £49-15-8 for the £50 item. Over the two years, his £30 shares will have earned at least £15-0 (this would be much more than the Credit Union is older) leaving his final net outlay at £48-10-8 for the £50 item.

Could Jim, who never joined the Credit Union, show him a better way? Jim does not forget, of course, that while he is paying back the loan, his wife is relieved of any responsibility in case of his death. Rather a comforting thought this.

The object of the Order is to eliminate sheep scab, a disease which causes serious loss of condition and of wool and is a threat to the sheep export trade.

By conscientious dipping of all sheep over a few years the disease can be entirely eliminated, with consequent gains to flock-owners and to the country as a whole.

Farmers are urged by the Department to ensure that all sheep are dipped and farmers are reminded that every flock must, under the Order, be covered by a certificate showing that all the sheep in the flock have been treated in accordance with the law. This applies whether the sheep are for sale or not.

Farmers who buy sheep should be sure, in their own interests to see these certificates before they agree to buy.

The first period for dipping is July 1st to August 7th, and the second is from October 1st to November 30th. We are thus in the middle of the second period, with less than three weeks in which to comply with

Even when playing against the breeze in the opening half, they had by far the better of the exchanges, and when they turned over leading by 2-5 to 0-4, it must have been obvious to even partisan Aglishers that the writing was on the wall for them. And as expected, the second half was just one procession of eastern monopoly. Their for- wards were rampant, with minor Al Bowman—not good enough for this year's minor team in the opinions of the selectors, causing havoc in the Geraldines defence. Long be- fore the end the result was in- evitable, and the brutality that followed was needless in the extreme. This was a really well bal-
